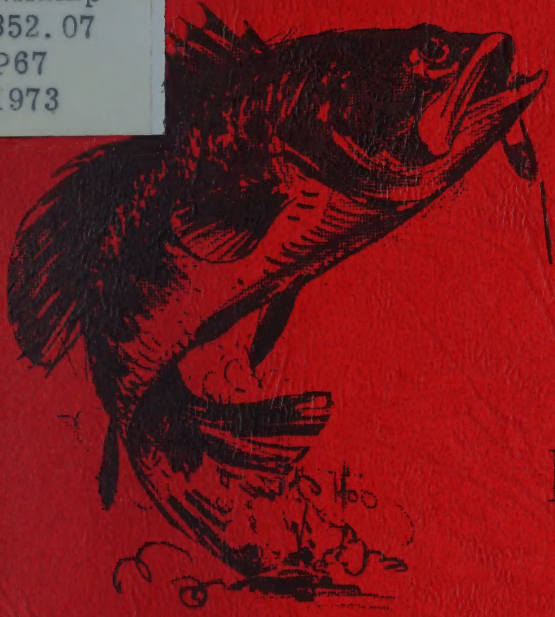

WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. TO 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pittsburg on Tuesday, the fifth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for the election of one Selectman, for three years; one Road Agent for the Lake District, one Road Agent for the Middle District, one Road Agent for the Lower District, a Town Clerk, a Treasurer, three Auditors, one Overseer of the Welfare, a Library Trustee, for three years; and one Trustee of the Trust Funds. Also, to bring in your ballots for the election of delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under Article 1.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for same.
5. To see if the Town will vote to elect a committee to set a date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$746.65 for the White Mountain Regional Association.
8. To see if the Town will vote to elect by ballot at future town meetings a representative from the Town to the revised Board of Directors of the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital Association for a term of three years.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$750 for the operating expenses of CONVALESCE.
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to pay the balance of the contract for Tax Maps.
11. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise towards the purchase of a new ambulance.
12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract, in the name of the Town, for the purpose of purchasing a new fire truck, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the necessary funds for same.
13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) for a new fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 with the balance to be raised by a long term note to be paid off in two equal payments.
14. To see if the Town will vote to apply the balance of Revenue Sharing Funds, if any, towards highways.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to replace the "cowpass" at the Donald Wheeler farm on Hall Stream Road.
16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept on behalf of the Town, grants of Federal or State aid, or both, as may become available.
17. BY PETITION: To see if the Town will vote to tar or pave the so-called Beach Road from Route 3 to Back Lake Beach, and raise money for same.
18. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the North Country Council, Inc.
19. To see if the Town will appropriate \$594 as the Town's share for the operation of the North Country Council for one year.
20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue BEANO licenses.
21. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise to be used in preparation for a sanitary land fill dump.

22. To see what action the Town will take to increase the wages and salaries paid by the Town.
23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to require any person building a new building or an addition to an existing structure to file a written notice of same with the Selectmen.
24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
25. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

There were 2,272 books borrowed this past year. Forty new volumes were added to our collection and we now subscribe to seven magazines.

The State Bookmobile visited us four times last year. Each time approximately 400 books were loaned to our library and the previous ones returned. Therefore, we have a constant turnover of the very latest in fiction and non-fiction for adults and children.

Another service which is available through your library are items for the physically handicapped. For those unable to read, there are "talking books" and the machines on which to play them. There are cassette tapes, and a bi-monthly magazine from which to make your selections. For those unable to hold a book, there are book holders with electric page turners, and we also have large print books and books in Braille. All

of these items are free and may be returned to the State Library postage free.

Our library has received many donations of books this year from our townspeople, the town of Clarksville, the Colebrook library, several summer residents and visitors. We also received a gift of \$100.00 from the American Legion with which we plan to have several of our more valuable books rebound and also have a glass case built in which to display them.

Much volunteer work has been given, such as cleaning the library, typing catalog cards, which was done by the Trustees and also volunteer work was done by some of the townspeople in helping with the alphabetical arrangement of books on the shelves which has to be done constantly.

Before closing, I would like to say that one of our aims for next year is to renovate the upper floor of the library. It has been used as a storage room for older books, and with a little work would make a nice reading room and community room. It is small but could be made nice. We need shelves for books, bookcases would be fine, folding chairs, a sturdy table, window shades, window screening, paint, new light fixtures and lots of volunteers.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

During 1973 the Fire Department was called out seven times; one was out of town (Clarksville), two major property damage fires, one major property damage explosion, two vehicle fires, one chimney fire, and one lightning strike.

The department held its regular monthly meetings, as well as six training sessions. A special one day forest fire training session was attended by nine men. In addition, six men attended fire schools of one day duration at Milan and Gilford. Training films were utilized during some of the regular meetings, and two inspections of the school and town hall were held with a representative from the state Fire Marshal's office.

We acquired in 1973 another forestry truck outfitted with a portable pump, a 350 gallon tank, and the usual ladders and chimney fire equipment. The truck is located in the Lakes District through the courtesy of Phillip Young, who donated a garage to house it and his time to maintain it. He deserves a great deal of credit for his community spirit. Having a truck in this area provides closer fire protection to an area that much needs it.

A dry fire hydrant was successfully installed at Back Lake on the Beach Road. The hydrant will greatly facilitate access to water supply, especially in winter. We have two more dry hydrants to install in 1974.

This year we are asking for a new fire truck to replace the 1957 Ford, hoping to purchase it through Revenue Sharing Funds over a three-year period. We have been plagued with problems on the Ford truck due to the front-end pump assembly. It usually makes it to only one out of three fires, and it cost over \$500 to put it back into operation this year alone. When it is out of operation we are missing our largest water source, a 1,000 gallon tank. The state Board of Fire Underwriters recognizes only trucks less than 20 years old, and the Ford is approaching 20 years of use. If a new truck is approved it would have a 1,000 gallon tank, and the present Ford tank body could be transferred to the truck now housed at Phillip Young's. That would improve fire protection in the Lakes District, as well as increase our water capacity from 2300 gallons to 3300 gallons.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank each and every man in the Department for a fine job. The job of fire fighting isn't all done on the line at the time of a fire; at least half the job is done at the station before the fire starts, in the maintenance of equipment and learning how to use it. Let's all work just as hard in the coming year to have even fewer fires, and to provide the Town the best fire protection possible.

Report of Service Rendered in the Town of Pittsburg

Mental health services for the Town of Pittsburg have been successfully maintained during the past year with extensive counseling services being furnished to individuals and families of the Town. Working with the faculty and administration of the Pittsburg School, guidance, psychological testing and counseling services have been provided to the school children.

Nineteen residents of Pittsburg received counseling at their homes or at the Colebrook office, and regular visits to the school have been made by staff members. The professional services include psychological testing and evaluation, psychiatric care, and assistance to other professionals, such as teachers, doctors, and specialists such as speech therapists and the School Nurse.

The local direction of the agency, together with the nearby office at Colebrook, assures prompt action in emergencies and the availability of professional personnel for visitation and consultation.

Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc. meets all state and professional standards for such programs and is a full member of the New Hampshire Association of Community Mental Health Agencies.

Our full staff is prepared to respond to your requests.

The School Business Meeting will begin at 1:00 p.m. or immediately following the Town Business Meeting should it be extended to the afternoon session, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for the election of School District Officers to be elected by ballot for the ensuing year(s).
2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officers and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the District.
3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the District will vote to raise the sum of \$1,400 to supplement the salary of the school lunch program helper.
5. To see if the District will vote to hire a specially trained teacher to teach children with learning difficulties and raise money for the same.
6. To see if the District will vote to hire separate teachers for each of the elementary grades and to increase the budget by the necessary amount for the extra teachers.
7. To see if the District will vote pursuant to RSA 31:105 to provide indemnification for district employees, school administrators, school board members, district officers or agents from personal loss or expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property providing the indemnified person was at the time of the accident acting within the scope of his employment or office.
8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the

District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States.

9. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools for the payment of salaries of the School District Officials and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Teachers, pupils and supportive staff in the schools of Supervisory Union No. 7 are to be commended for the response and effort made in adapting to the energy shortage. As a result of the efforts made, a savings in heating fuel of approximately 7,000 gallons has been realized to date within the Supervisory Union No. 7 schools and the use of electrical energy has been noticeably reduced. Consequently, schools were able to remain open during a critical time of concern, namely, the last week in January and the first week in February.

Considerable review is now being given to the school calendar by the State Board of Education in light of the present energy situation. Whether there will be a change in school calendars regarding traditional starting dates and vacations will be dependent upon the anticipated availability of fuel and energy.

Rising costs have had their effect on local school district budgets also and noticeable increases are apparent in instructional materials, heating fuel, utilities and transportation. To add to the dilemma, there are indications that some school supplies may not be readily available. It is expected, however, that satisfactory adjustments can be made within each school without curtailing basic educational programs.

Supervisory Union No. 7 is indeed proud that one of its teachers, Mr. David Killam of the Colebrook School District, was chosen as the N. H. Outstanding Teacher of the Year for 1973. It is always pleasing to see dedication and hard work receive public recognition and it is hoped that the trend will continue in recognizing the many dedicated teachers within our local school system.

A major concern for the local education scene are the additional programs of instruction now required by statute. Instruction in nutrition and venereal disease along with past programs of instruction on drugs and alcohol are now mandated by law. These are certainly vital areas of social concern and do require attention by local citizens. It is becoming apparent, however, that schools are increasingly being called upon to correct social ills along with providing the primary function of educating youngsters in the basic skills of learning. Additional programs implemented into the normal school day, often at additional local costs, cannot help but take time away from other areas of study. Should the trend continue, a change in the school calendar year or the length of the school day will certainly have to take place if priorities in teaching skills are not to be sacrificed.

The local staff development committee comprised of teachers, parents, pupils, and school administrators is to be com-

mended for the excellent work it has conducted this school year. Although the response to questionnaires sent out to the public by this committee has in some instances been rather disappointing, sufficient information has been obtained to help the committee progress in its goal of developing a staff development program. The giving of their time and effort is certainly appreciated by all concerned in improving the educational program.

GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

People sometimes ask me, "What does a Guidance Counselor do?" The same question, I am sure, is on the minds of many who do not ask. Toward the goal of a better understanding of a counselor's work, I am presenting a twofold explanation of my work by way of this report. First, a general statement of what the job encompasses. Secondly, a general statement of a particular phase of the work followed by a specific example.

The job of Guidance Counselor essentially is to know each student; to help each student know himself both as an individual and as a member of society, to make each student aware of his strengths and limitations, and to help him use this knowledge to satisfy his immediate needs and to plan his future. Guidance is a never ending job entailing a great deal of work on a one-to-one basis with each student. While group work is used upon occasion, the real success of a counselor's work hinges on a favorable, personal counselor-student relationship. During the summer and the time since school commenced in the fall, I have been involved in over 400 of these individual conferences.

In order to fulfill the job adequately, a counselor must accumulate information concerning each student's mental and physical abilities, aptitudes, attitudes, achievements, interests and personality. Information gathered last year has been added to the files of each student in the three upper classes of Pittsburg High School and Colebrook Academy. Files have been started for all new students and Freshmen.

The counselor must be sure that information concerning post-high school education and career possibilities is available for students. During the summer and fall, a great deal of new material is received, reviewed and exposed in the new Guidance Room made available to me at Colebrook Academy. The room is by no means complete yet but it will serve as a resource

center for any student wishing to investigate either further education or careers. I hope that you will visit the Guidance Office in Room 26 at Colebrook Academy in the near future. Materials for Pittsburg and Stewartstown students have to be carried with me and be given as much exposure as possible.

The counselor must work with each secondary student in scheduling courses of study and with drop-outs or graduates on investigating educational or job placement plans which they may have. There are better than 300 secondary students in the two schools and the number of graduates seeking counseling is steadily increasing. I make every attempt to check on drop outs but this is a very difficult and time consuming job.

Time must also be reserved for the student who has a problem and wants to talk about it. Also, the student who is a problem and should talk about it. I do not have an accurate count of the number of individual cases of this type but considerable time is taken up in this manner.

Finally, the counselor must find time for a follow up of graduates. This has been done in the case of better than 75% of last year's graduates.

If the counselor is to carry out all of the above effectively, he should also find time and ways of obtaining desirable relations with teachers and parents for these are people without whose cooperation few guidance programs would succeed. I have already met with the Pittsburg teachers in regard to the guidance program and them and vice-versa. I hope to do this in the immediate future with the Colebrook and Stewartstown teachers.

I hope that this report will give you some idea of the type and amount of work involved in counseling. At the same time I would hope that you would realize that there is much that has not been discussed in this report. With approximately 540 students in grades 7 through 12 spread over the 5 districts of this union, there seems to be enough to keep one counselor busy!

I enjoy the work and like to feel that a little good is accomplished each day.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Professional nursing service in the school setting is provided to strengthen the educational process of students by promoting and maintaining good health. It is believed that only through the active and sincere efforts of school, home and commu-

ity, can health be promoted; knowledge be extended; and attitudes and behavior of all students be positively directed. These are our goals.

Two health aides have been added to the health program as additional supportive personnel. They are Mrs. Mabel Hunter (Pittsburg) and Mrs. Carolyn Hughes (Stewartstown and Colebrook.)

This year the following services were performed: checking heights and weights and teeth, testing vision and hearing, physical examinations for students in grades 4, 8, 11 and those participating in athletic sports as well as those absent last year and first graders who missed preschool physicals, T. B. skin tests for all personnel in the union and first graders who needed them, immunizations as needed, preschool clinics which include immunizations, physicals, T. B. and urine tests, home visits, phone calls and letter contacts for follow-through health care as deemed necessary, promotion of good mental health with the assistance of the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services, first aid and emergency care, health teaching and counseling, and continuous supervision of general health.

It is hoped that by 1974-75 there will be provisions for a school physician to provide the professional medical advice and care required to maintain optimum health services for the school child. Also, the school boards have been urged to form a school health council composed of persons who are highly qualified in the health field and those with sincere interest and concern for our youth. First, this would give the school authorities a resource for guidance on perplexing health problems including adoption of health policies and secondly, we would have a segment of the communities actively supporting the school health program.

The Matching Dental Fund Program sponsored by state and local monies was again utilized this year, providing many students with much needed dental care.

The American Cancer Society provided films and literature for all junior and senior girls and mothers for early detection and treatment of cancer. Dr. Marjorie Parsons volunteered her services for a discussion period following the presentation of films.

There was a preschool hearing and vision clinic in May sponsored by the N. H. Division of Public Health for early detection of defects.

Many deserving students received eye examinations and/or glasses provided by the Sight Conservation Program presented by the State of N. H.

Services of an audiologist, Andrew Brandon, from the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center is available to our area by way of a mobile unit for evaluation of students failing hearing tests. There is a charge of \$7 for each child examined.

Several youngsters attended the Orthopedic Clinic for evaluation and treatment in May at our local hospital sponsored by Crippled Childrens Services.

The fourth grade students participated in a classroom dental prevention program initiated by the Bureau of Dental Health. They brushed and flossed daily in school with weekly detection of plaque by use of food coloring tablets under the direct supervision of their classroom teacher. The objectives of the program were to eliminate dental plaque, help the student develop daily habits necessary for effective oral hygiene and thereby reduce dental diseases.

North Country Education Services again provided speech therapy for all students in the union requiring help.

As a reminder to all parents of children entering first grade, the State Department of Education requires each youngster to meet the following requirements prior to school entry:

1. Physical examination
2. T. B. Test within one year.
3. Complete Diptheria, Pertussis, and Tetanus Vaccine series (five in all)
4. Complete oral Polio Vaccine series (consisting of five)
5. Rubella Vaccine (German Measles)
6. Rubeola Vaccine (Measles)

All parents are urged to take advantage of the preschool clinics available in their area to prepare their youngsters for meeting the above requirements for entering school.

Each year we strive to improve the health program in our schools. With everyone working together, it is hoped that we can achieve our goal in this endeavor.
