TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rye in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

And to the Inhabitants of the School District in said Town of Rye, qualified to vote upon District Affairs, for the limited purpose of electing officers of the Rye School District at the annual Town Meeting, in accordance with procedures authorized by statute (RSA 197:1 a et, seq.) and adopted by the District at its March, 1962 Annual Meeting under Article 2 of that warrant.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rye on Tuesday the ninth day of March, next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to vote upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To choose all necessary officers for the Rye School District in accordance with the statutory procedure adopted by said District at its March, 1962 annual meeting, to wit:

- a. To choose a Moderator for the Rye School District for the ensuing year.
- b. To choose a Clerk for the Rye School District for the ensuing year.
- c. To choose a member of the Rye School Board for the ensuing year.
- d. To choose a Treasurer for the Rye School District for the ensuing year.

The following subjects will be voted upon at the business meeting which will be held at eight o'clock P.M.:

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same

Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money from the Trustees of Trust Funds.

Article 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Select-

men to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to allow five percent discount on all property taxes on or before October 1, 1965.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the recommendations of the committee appointed in accordance with Article 12 of the warrant for the 1964 annual Town Meeting as follows:

1. To vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease Sawyer's Beach, so called, from the owners for another year.
2. To vote to restrict parking on the extensions of Wallis Road and Cable Road, east of Ocean Blvd. to the use by residents or taxpayers of the Town of Rye and by permit only and to amend the parking ordinance of the Town of Rye to the effect as more particularly set forth hereinafter in this warrant.
3. To vote that the necessary steps be taken to create a commission known as the Rye Recreation Commission. That the Commission consist of seven members, six appointed by the Board of Selectmen and the seventh member being the Chairman of the Rye Planning Board. That initially the Board of Selectmen appoint two members for one year, two members for two years, and two members for three years. That annually thereafter, two members be appointed for a three year term by the Board of Selectmen. That the Commission elect its own chairman and any other officers it deems necessary to best accomplish its function. It is intended that the function of this commission be specifically that it concern itself with all that which has to do with recreation in the Town of Rye and that it have general supervision of all Town lands, buildings and facilities reserved or accepted for recreational use by the Town or its Selectmen, subject only to approval of the Selectmen.
4. To vote that the area known as the Rye Harbor Reservation be considered as a central municipal recreation area and initial development be started in the spring of 1965 as follows:
 - a. To construct a road on the existing right of way from Locke Road into the property.
 - b. To clear and grade an area for purpose of parking cars.

- c. To construct a playground area.
 - d. To construct an area designed for picnic use.
 - e. To designate an area, as soon as possible, for use as a Boy Scout camping and training area.
 - f. To designate an area, as soon as possible, for use by the Rye Rifle Club for the construction of a permanent rifle range, practice and training area.
5. To vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to accomplish the aforementioned recommendations of this article.

Article 8. If Paragraph 2 of the foregoing article is favorably acted upon then:

To see if the Town will vote to amend the parking ordinance adopted under Article 10 of the Town Warrant for the annual Town Meeting of March, 1956 as follows:

- 1. To amend Section 2f (Rye Beach Precinct) by adding the words at the end thereof "by permit only" so that the same shall read as follows:
 - 2f. Parallel parking on east side of Ocean Blvd. from a point 100 feet north of Schlott property to William Brown property, by permit only.
- 2. To amend Section 3d (Jeness Beach Precinct) by adding the words at the end thereof "by permit only" so that the same shall read as follows:
 - 3d. No parking south side Cable Road Extension from Ocean Blvd. to beach and parallel parking on north side of Cable Road Extension, by permit only.
- 3. To amend Section 4 (Rye Water District) by adding a new subsection d to read as follows:
 - 4d. No parking south side of Wallis Road Extension from Ocean Blvd. to beach and angle parking on north side of Wallis Road Extension, by permit only.
- 4. To further amend such parking ordinance by adding a new Section 10 to read as follows:

"In certain areas, the Town may designate that parking shall be restricted to the use by residents and taxpayers of the Town of Rye who are in possession of a valid permit for such purpose. The Selectmen shall determine the terms upon which such permits shall

be issued, unless the Town shall otherwise designate''.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA 35:1 to 35:18 as amended for the purpose of accumulating funds for the purchase of a fire truck or trucks as Town needs may require together with such necessary pumps and equipment as may be required from time to time by the Board of Fire Underwriters, and to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for this purpose.

Article 10. On petition of Hope Wright and 30 others
To see if the Town will establish a Town Conservation Commission as set forth in RSA 36-A.

Article 11. On petition of Helen S. Shaw and eleven others:

To see if the Town of Rye, New Hampshire will vote to accept Appledore Avenue as a public highway and to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) to place said road in acceptable condition.

Article 12. On petition of Joseph O. Varrell and nine others:

To see if the Town will vote to accept the street known as Harborview Drive, so called, off and intersecting at two places with Wentworth Road in the Town of Rye, together with certain drainage easements and drainage lines draining said Harborview Drive and for such purpose to accept a Warranty Deed from Seybolt Realty Corporation to the Town of Rye, dated December 29, 1964, conveying said Harborview Drive, drainage easements and drainage lines to the Town of Rye.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract with the Municipal Accounting Division of the State Tax Commission or a firm of certified public accountants for the purpose of conducting the annual audits of the financial accounts of the Town and at other times as the need occurs.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Selectmen's Report

To The Inhabitants of Rye, New Hampshire:

The firm of Northeast Planning Associates, the people who have been conducting a study of the Town of Rye for the past two years in order to recommend a ten year plan for our Town, has as last submitted its recommendations. The Selectmen feel that the recommendations can not be acted on at this year's Town Meeting as the plan requires a great deal of study by the Town and we have to hold Public Hearings on the proposals because it involves changes in our Zoning Laws.

The firm of Arthur N. Parmenter, Civil Engineers, have delivered the property maps of the Town to the Selectmen. This will be corrected and brought up to date after April 1st so to include all property transfers during the past year.

The leasing of Sawyer's Beach at Rye Beach for the exclusive use of the Taxpayers of Rye proved to be a desirable project. There were 121 permits issued for parking at this beach. A committee was appointed to investigate the desirability of acquiring other beach frontage for the same purpose. This committee was expanded into a recreation committee to study and make recommendations to the Town as to the best use of the land in the Rye Harbor area that we got from the State of New Hampshire.

The Selectmen wish to call your attention to the urgent need for more office space for the Selectmen, the Police Department and the Tax Collector. Some of this can be accomplished by relocating the toilets at the Town Hall and using that space for an office but the time is coming very soon when we will need to consider consolidating all Town Departments in one place. The Selectmen feel that this could be done at minimum cost to the Town by adding a story on top of the present Fire Station.

We wish to mention here the addition of two new places of business that have been added to the central sec-

tion of the Town. These are the new Post Office building and the Rye Branch of the First National Bank of Portsmouth. The locating of these places of service to the citizens of Rye, in the center of the Town, is in keeping with the recommendations for the long range plan of the Town to keep the center of Rye as a typical New England Village District.

In compliance with the favorable action taken at the Town Meeting of last March in regards to purchasing and erecting a refuse burner at the Town Dump, the Selectmen wish to report that this has been done. We feel that conditions have been immensely improved, the terrible fire hazards have been eliminated, the sea gull nuisance has ceased to exist, the rodent problem has been nearly removed and in general we now have a greatly improved and more sanitary Town Dump area.

The Selectmen wish to call your attention to a growing unsightly condition that seems to be cropping up in several areas of the Town and that is the accumulation of old cars within sight of the highway. This condition is a violation of our own Zoning Laws as well as the laws of the State of New Hampshire. We hope that the citizens of Rye will have pride enough to co-operate and remove these old cars without civil action being taken to enforce the provisions of the law.

We again wish to commend the Rye Veterans of Foreign Wars for the excellent manner in which they conducted the Memorial Day Program.

Again this year the ladies of the R.V.F.D. Auxiliary provided the meals for the election officials at all the elections, we appreciate their efforts and the excellent menus.

The Selectmen wish to take this opportunity to express our appreciation to the Spindrifters Club for their gift and installation of a complete set of venetian blinds for the auditorium of the Town Hall.

We wish to express our hearty "thank you" to the

members of the Rye Ambulance Corp. for the fine service they are providing to the Town of Rye and for the many many hours of volunteer time they are giving for this service.

Again we call attention to the need for all property owners to fill out their property inventories in **DETAIL** as required by the Laws of the State of New Hampshire. This must be done in order for the Selectmen to make a proper assessment of your property.

The Board of Selectmen hold regular meetings on the first Monday of the month for public business and at other times by appointment.

Highway Agent's Report

We are closing out this year with some very bad break up. Due to two thaws in December which in this area is unusual. Most of these places occurred where we widened the road and the oils did not have a chance to set before the freezing set in.

The section of road south of Foye's Corner on Sagamore Rd. was so uneven that it took the most of the material to level the base. It is not recommended to put too much of this material on at once so another year another layer would improve the riding surface. Some of our paving money was used to try some mix-in-place on two sections of rough surface and about .06 of a mile was done. To date they seem to be holding up.

We had an outside contractor do some surfacing for us this year and while they can do more in two days than we can do in as many weeks this does not smooth the road very much. It's main purpose is to seal the surface and fill cracks that do not always fill under other methods.

After a delay of several months we were able to get started on the Jenness Beach drainage system. I can assure you it was not our idea to do this kind of work in freezing weather but we felt that if it were not done at this time the water in the ground would be too high in the spring. This would mean waiting for another dry fall and all falls are not dry. As it was, much of the ditch had water in it. The pipe is in and when the weather warms up enough we will clean up the ditch area and repair the roads, driveways and yards where we crossed them.

Fire Chief's Report

To the Citizens of Rye:

This has been a year without any real big fires and I feel that the people of the town can be credited for much of this good condition. When they become fire conscious then fire prevention begins to work and the fire loss is lower.

We have had one of the driest seasons in a great many years with strong winds that could have fanned small fires into large ones. The restrictions on burning permits had to be tightened to a point where at times no permits could be issued. The result being that we had very few fires. There are hundreds of acres of woodland in Rye that can not be reached with fire trucks due to trees that have been blown down in wind storms and not cleared from roadways or from lack of use have been allowed to grow up with trees that cannot be pushed aside. Such places when on fire must be fought by carrying equipment in on your back.

With the ever increasing loss of life in home fires it would be well for everyone to take stock of the house they live in. See if you can get out of every room in your house. If the regular exits are impassable is there another way out? Look real close at the bedrooms. Are the windows too high for you and your children to reach, can they be opened wide enough to get through, if you have combination windows does everyone know how to open them? Our modern homes are nice to look at and are convenient to work in but they are practically air tight. Unless sleeping quarters are well ventilated a whole family could be wiped out by gases generated by a small fire that was nowhere near them yet confined to the house. Remember an average of thirty seven people die in fires every day in this country.

Fire training was held at the fire station this year with the area State Instructor in charge. Much thanks is due Captain Lane of the Portsmouth Dept. who served

as our instructor. Some of our men attended fire training schools outside the town, one at Meadow Wood drill yard sponsored by the New Hampshire Fire Chief's Club and one at Lily Pond sponsored by the Lakes Region Mutual Fire Service. Both of these schools will be run again this coming year and all are welcome to attend.

Since the Water District has installed a pumping station and stand pipe the water supply at Rye Center has been greatly improved. This makes a great improvement in the area fire protection.

We wish to thank all persons and organizations who helped us this past year. The Children's Christmas party sponsored by the Volunteer Firemen and the Rye Lions Club gets bigger and better every year and thanks is due all who assist or donate to a good time for over two hundred and fifty children.

Report of the Fire Warden

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the last half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963 the number of fires showed only a slight increase. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming realities. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy, both industrial and recreational, is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area, 4,350,000 acres, is everyone's. Fire Prevention is one of our effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
3. Be sure discarded smoking materials and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for and your very fine cooperation during the past fire season. With your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

and their report will be forthcoming shortly. We are most grateful for their splendid help and advice.

The steady request for sub-division approval indicates a growing population for the town with its attendant problems which the Planning Board will be concerned with during the coming year.

The Planing Board would like to express its appreciation to Vincent Boutilier for his many years of faithful service to the Town on the Planning Board, to John Kelly for his able handling of Mosquito Control work and to the Selectmen for their help and cooperation.

Report of Library Trustees

In March, 1964, the Board of Library Trustees welcomed to its membership John L. Parsons, replacing Helen F. Philbrick, retired. The members of the Board wish to express to Mrs. Philbrick their appreciation of her many years of helpful service and to assure her that we fully realize how much the Library and the Town are indebted to her.

The Board and staff have carried out a major weeding project under the direction of State Library Consultant Rachel Sanborn. All the books in the collection have been checked against the standard lists and a large number discarded. Many of the discarded books have been sold and the rest are on display in the basement and may be purchased at a very low cost. We plan to go ahead now with the re-cataloging of the entire collection. When this is finished one of the important recommendations of the 1962 State Library Survey will have been accomplished.

This year the Trustees will have to decide whether to join the new statewide library system being set up under the 1963 Library Services Act. The system offers many advantages—centralized purchasing and cataloging and other helpful professional services and it is probable that we would benefit from membership.

This year the Art Teacher of the local schools has had a changing and very interesting display in the library. This has been enjoyed by our patrons, the Trustees and the staff. We acknowledge, with thanks, the many gifts of magazines and books and the EOTC gift of \$10.00 for books. The Trustees commend the staff, Mrs. Trefethen and Mrs. Leach, who continue to provide excellent service under far from satisfactory working conditions. We wish more people would visit the library, both to appreciate the attractive atmosphere and to understand the handicaps under which the staff works.

We call your attention to the Comprehensive Town Plan prepared by Northeast Planning Associates for the

Planning Board, copies of which are available at the Library. Pages 57 to 61 of this report deal with the Library. In the chart on page 57 you will find that while we meet minimum standards in the number of books owned and circulated we operate in quarters well below the accepted requirements. Most of our failure to provide recommended services stems from lack of space. This situation, as the Town continues to grow, will become increasingly serious and restrictive. Until such time as the Town provides the needed space, we will continue to be unable to expand our services into the areas expected of a modern library in a town of the size of Rye.

Librarian's Report

The Rye Library continues to be a busy place all through the year, but the type of activity varies with the months. During July and August, with the added patronage of many summer visitors, circulation soars. From September to June, during the school months, circulation drops somewhat and reference work increases greatly. Students, from first graders to college seniors, make use of the resources of the Library, for research work is now a major part of the modern education system. Youngsters still in the elementary grades have term papers to write and find it necessary, after school hours, to make use of the encyclopedias and other reference books found in the public library. This is all wonderful preparation for increased work of this type required by secondary schools, but it makes demands on the public library never felt before. These demands have been noted nationwide and have been much publicized, for in many libraries, particularly in the larger

cities, serious problems of abuse of books and library property have resulted. We are fortunate in Rye in the caliber of our young people, for they seem to appreciate the Library and what it has to offer, are courteous in their requests and grateful for the help they receive. It is a pleasure to serve them. The capacity of our reading room is often taxed to its limits and we have recently found it necessary to order additional chairs. It is difficult to study under such crowded conditions, but until we have more space it is the best we can do.

During 1964, 27,790 books were circulated. Of these, 10,144 were children's books, 11,236 adult fiction and 6,410, adult non-fiction. These totals showed a decrease in the circulation of children's books, due, probably, to the fact that there is now a much more adequate library at the Rye Junior High School.

685 new books were added to the shelves during 1964. 58 of these were gifts and 627 were purchased from town and trust funds and from fine money. We have also augmented our own supply by borrowing from the State Bookmobile 777 books. In answer to many requests for specialized material we have made good use of the excellent interlibrary loan service offered by the State Library and have borrowed by mail from this source 240 books.

We have recently purchase a new World Book Encyclopedia Dictionary and a World Book Encyclopedia. By so doing we will be able to circulate the individual volumes of the older edition of this encyclopedia which we bought several years ago. We have also purchased several other excellent reference works.

Many Rye teachers are borrowing collections of books to use in their classrooms. We are more than happy to have them do this, for it brings the resources of the Rye Library to the attention of many children who do not have the opportunity to visit it. We welcome suggestions regarding book selection from the teachers and will gladly acquire from one source or another books needed for specific projects.

We are happy to again have on display art work done by Rye school children. These exhibits have brought forth much favorable comment and we are grateful to Miss Perfect, Art Instructor, for placing them in the Library.

The telephone, which was installed in 1963, has proved to be most useful. However, we would again like to call to the attention of our patrons the fact that books may be renewed by telephone and that in this way many overdue fines could be avoided. Also, many patrons still do not seem to realize that there is a book drop in our door for the convenience of those who wish to return books on non-library days.

On the recommendation made by the State Library in its survey of library service in Rye, we have made a good start on the recataloguing. With the aid of Mrs. Richard Sanborn, State Library Consultant, we have done a very complete job of weeding the entire book collection. 1802 books have been discarded. These have been arranged and placed on sale in the basement. Many have been sold at a very minimum price and to date we have realized \$85.65 from this sale. During the process of weeding, many books have been checked and recatalogued, but the major part of this job still remains to be done. With the continued help of Mrs. Sanborn and by working many extra hours, we hope to make a great deal of progress on the actual recataloguing of the book collection during 1965.

It is with deep regret that we lose the services of Mrs. Shirley S. Philbrick on the Board of Trustees. She has devotedly served for many years and will be greatly missed. We know, however, that her interest in the Library will never cease and that we can always seek her wise advice and counsel. We are fortunate to have as a new member of the Board Mr. John L. Parsons.

Mrs. Clark H. Leach, Assistant Librarian, has served efficiently and well during the year and we greatly appreciate her services. Our former Librarian, Miss Marjorie L. Chapman, has substituted during vacations and served in many other ways. We are always grateful for her help.

Many individuals and several organizations have been generous with gifts of money, books and magazines during the year. We extend to them all our sincere thanks. Such interest in the Library is always appreciated.

VOLUNTEER ORGANIZATION

Report as of December 31, 1964

My sincerest appreciation is extended to the members of the Rye Ambulance Corps for their complete and undivided devotion to the Corps and to the people they serve. The residents of Rye are being provided with one of the finest, most efficient ambulance services within a 50 mile radius, by a group of strictly volunteer, non-paid,

devoted Rye residents.

For those residents who are not familiar with our services, we are a group numbering approximately 30. Our Corps commander is Dr. Sidney Baker, assisted by deputy commanders, Dr. Issac Katz, Dr. Wm. Bradley and Dr. Chien-Min Chen. We meet every Wednesday night at the Rye Fire Station at 8 P.M. excepting for July and August. During this period, we have a 21 week extensive First Aid Course administered by the above doctors and assisted on many occasions by other doctors in the area. At all times our training is by professionals in the field, thereby raising our level of training far above a usual First Aid Course.

We are given a series of exams which upon passing, qualifies us to The American National Red Cross certificate in the advance course of first aid to the injured. An attendance record is kept and no member may miss more than 3 meetings and qualify.

Upon completion, our members take turns with three members on duty at all times covering the 24 hour day. Their personal life is adjusted to their schedule to provide this coverage for the area residents. The following breakdown will give you the trips made by the Corps this past year, made at all hours of the day and evening:

The above totals are 134 trips. We have a total membership of 484 with an additional 75 memberships given out to generous benefactors who helped with the purchase of our new ambulance, making a grand total of 559. Membership is still at \$3.00 per family.

The corps expresses thanks to the fire department under Charles Gordon for their faithful performance in handling telephone calls for the corps; Ed Bromfield, Dick Eaton, and Len Brown. Also the police department under Fred Perry, chief, and Jennie Creighton for her service on telephone duty.

Lastly, The Rye Selectmen consisting of Robert Goss, E. Leroy Greene, and Ralph Hammond for providing us with many aids to our proper functioning.

REPORT OF
THE RYE RECREATION COMMITTEE
TO
BOARD OF SELECTMENT
PLANNING BOARD
TOWN OF RYE, NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Rye Recreation Committee was created by the townspeople of Rye at the town meeting in March, 1964. The members of the Committee were appointed by the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board and the Committee held its first meeting in November, 1964. The specific function of this Committee is to investigate and make a report, with recommendations, as to the need for recreation facilities in the Town of Rye, the type of recreation for which the townspeople felt there was the greatest immediate need, the possibility of acquiring beach front property for the exclusive use of the residents and taxpayers of the Town of Rye, and the feasibility of an orderly, planned development for recreational purposes of the so called Rye Harbor Reservation, a ninety-seven acre tract of land acquired by the Town from the State of New Hampshire.

The Planning Board held a public hearing at the Rye Town Hall on December 2, 1964. The meeting was exceptionally well attended and it became immediately evident that there was a great deal of interest in the objectives of the Recreation Committee and that several groups and individuals within the Town were prepared to participate in the development of recreational facilities of one sort or another.

The Recreation Committee initiated investigation into the following matters:

INVESTIGATIONS

1. The availability of beach front property that could be acquired by the Town.
2. The possibility of entering into an agreement with Mrs. Clark for another year for use of the beach leased

from her for the summer of 1964.

3. The possibility of use by the people of Rye of the facilities at the State parks, Wallis Sands, Rye Harbor and Ragged Neck, on a basis other than that now exists.

4. The adaptability of the Rye Harbor Reservation land for the development of recreational facilities.

5. The possibility of restricted parking for residents and taxpayers only on the shoulders of the road on the extension of Wallis Road and Cable Road east of Ocean Boulevard.

6. The desirability of the creation of a Recreation Commission to effect the planning and implementation of recreation facilities.

7. The availability of State and Federal funds for the aforementioned purposes.

Since time would not allow, the Committee was unable to resolve all the matters in which it was interested. However, it was able to come to the following conclusions and submits the following recommendations for your consideration.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Selectmen negotiate with Mrs. Clark to lease the beach front as it did last year at a price mutually agreeable to both parties. The parking "by permit only" be continued for the use of the beach by the residents and taxpayers of the Town of Rye.

2. That the shoulders of the road on the extensions of Wallis and Cable Roads likewise be posted for parking "by permit only" for the exclusive use of the residents and taxpayers of the Town of Rye.

3. That the necessary steps be taken to create a commission, known as the Rye Recreation Commission. That the Commission consist of seven members, six appointed by the Board of Selectmen and the seventh member being the Chairman of the Rye Planning Board. That initially the Board of Selectmen appoint two members for one

year, two members for two years, and two members for three years. That annually thereafter, two members be appointed for a three year term. That the commission elect its own chairman and any other officers, it deems necessary to best accomplish its function. It is intended that the function of this commission be specifically that it concern itself with all that which has to do with recreation in the Town of Rye.

4. That the area known as Rye Harbor Reservation be considered as a central municipal recreation area and initial development be started in the spring of 1965 as follows:

a. The construction of a road on the existing right of way from Locke Road into the property.

b. The clearing and grading of an area for the purposes of accommodating twenty-five cars.

c. Construction of a playground area for children and suitable for limited adult activities with suitable equipment.

d. Cleaning up of an area for picnic use and the installation of picnic tables, fire places, etc. in order to make the area suitable for family and group picnics and similar functions.

5. That an area be designated as soon as possible for use as a Boy Scout camping and training area.

6. That an area be designated as soon as possible for use by the Rye Rifle Club for construction of a permanent rifle range, practice area and training area.

7. That a sum of \$4,500.00 be made available to accomplish the aforementioned recommendations as soon as possible.

CONCLUSION

It is the belief of the Committee that the area known as Rye Harbor Reservation can eventually become a well developed recreation area which will serve the recreational needs of the residents and taxpayers of the Town of Rye.

The initial development herein recommended has been thought of as an initial step in the eventual over all development which could include all the types of recreation desired by Rye residents and taxpayers. The Committee respectfully requests your favorable consideration of its recommendations.

Report of Trustees of Trust Funds

During 1964 twenty one new trust funds totalling \$3,300. were established for the perpetual care of cemetery lots. There are still many lots that are not under perpetual care. Owners of these lots should consider the advantages of creating a trust fund for this purpose.

The Trustees of the Cemetery recommended that a new building be erected to be used for the storage of all equipment. This has been completed. Bids were submitted and the contract was awarded to John Patrick. The total cost of this project was \$2,222.09 and this building will serve the needs of the cemetery for many years to come.

The charges for the care of the individual lots generally increased over previous years. This was due to the expense of returfing and reseeding lots, cleaning stones and in several cases, placing new foundations under monuments.

Also during 1964, a total of \$1,413.24 was turned over to the Library Trustees to be spent as specified by the individual trusts.

During the coming year we will continue to follow the recommendations of the N. H. Tax Commission regarding accounting procedures.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rye on Tuesday the tenth day of March, next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to vote by ballot upon the following subjects:

1. Balloting
 - a. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
 - b. To choose two delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
 - c. Shall Sweepstakes Tickets be sold in this Town?
2. To choose all necessary officers for the Rye School District in accordance with the statutor procedure adopted by said District at its March, 1962 annual meeting, to wit:
 - a. To choose a Moderator for the Rye School District for the ensuing year.
 - b. To choose a Clerk for the Rye School District for the ensuing year.
 - c. To choose a member of the Rye School Board for the ensuing year.
 - d. To choose a Treasurer for the Rye School District for the ensuing year.
3. To see if the Town of Rye will vote to continue the Municipal Court as provided in RSA 502-A:35 as inserted by the laws of 1963, Chapter 331.
4. On petition of Esther W. Parsons, to see if the town will vote to rezone from single residence to commercial district a parcel

of land on Washington Road owned by the petitioner and described as follows:

All that certain tract or parcel of land situated in said Rye, New Hampshire and lying on the southeasterly side of Washington Road, and generally situated between land of Donna Berry on the north and other land of Esther W. Parsons on the south.

This petition was approved by the Planning Board after two public hearings were held thereon on dates of January 3, 1964 and January 20, 1964.

The following subjects will be voted upon at the business meeting which will be held at eight o'clock P. M.

5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money from the Trustees of Trust Funds.

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to allow five percent discount on all property taxes on or before October 1, 1964.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of taxes and authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments in prepayment of taxes, in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:52-a as inserted by Laws 1963, chapter 36.

10. To see if the Town will vote to allow the full time employees of the Town two weeks annual vacation with pay instead of the one week they now receive.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease from the owners, for the sum of one dollar, a section of beach frontage located at Rye Beach, between the property of Carroll J. Brown at the north end and the property of Annie Schlott (formerly Sawyers Bath Houses) at the south end. Said beach frontage to be restricted to the exclusive use of the Tax Payers of Rye and their guests for a minimum fee, and that the Selectmen also be authorized to make whatever rules and regulations necessary to insure the proper control of the area and that the Rye Police Department be authorized to enforce such rules and regulations.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to investigate and make a report with

recommendations for the next annual Town Meeting as to the desirability of the Town of Rye acquiring other beach frontage within the Town for the exclusive use of the Tax Payers of Rye.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the establishment of an aeronautical fund as provided by RSA 423:6.

14. If the previous article is passed in the affirmative, to see if the Town will vote to transfer from the aeronautical fund to the New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purposes authorized by RSA 423:7 and RSA 423:8.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty thousand (\$20,000.00) dollars for the purpose of the acquisition of a refuse burner, a suitable site for the same, and a tractor loader, prepare the site, erect equipment and place the burner in operation to replace the present system of open burning of refuse at the town dump, and further to authorize the Selectmen to issue serial notes and/or bonds upon the credit of the Town in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA chapter 33 and any amendments thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 3 of the Ordinance adopted March 1945 Town Meeting, having been insterted in the warrant for said meeting by petition which reads as follows:

"1. No person having the custody of any vehicle shall stop or cause the same to stop, or park all night, not more than one hour, between the hours of midnight and eight A. M. from November 1st to April 15th, on any public street or highway in the Town of Rye.

2. Any person who violates the provisions of Section 1 of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than ten dollars.

3. The Chief of Police, or any officer of the Rye Police De-cause any vehicle parked in violation to Section 1 of this ordinance to be removed from the street or highway and stored in a suitable place. The reasonable cost of towing and storage shall be a lien on the vehicle, and shall be paid to the Town Clerk for the use of the Town, in order to redeem the vehicle in question. This ordinance shall take effect on November 1, 1945".

by striking out Section 3 and inserting in place thereof a new Section 3 so that the ordinance will read as follows: An ordinance to prohibit all night parking during certain months;

1. No person having the custody or control of any vehicle shall stop or cause the same to stop, or park all night, not more than one hour, between the hours of midnight and eight A. M. from November 1st to April 15th, on any public street or highway in the Town of Rye.

2. Any person who violates the provisions of Section 1 of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than ten dollars.

3. The Chief of Police, or any officer of the Rye Police Department, may cause any vehicle parked in violation to Section 1 of this ordinance to be removed from the street or highway. This ordinance shall take effect on its passage.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
