TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Temple in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Temple on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To cast your ballot for the election of delegates-at-large, alternate delegates-at-large, delegates and alternate delegates, to the National Conventions of the various political parties, to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.
- 2. To cast your ballot for the election of a delegate to Constitutional convention.
- 3. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling roads completed under the T.R.A. program.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Library.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day, said sum to be handled under the auspices of the Legion.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Temple Volunteer Fire Department, said sum to be turned over to the Treasurer of the department.

- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$59.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.
- 13. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to heat in the Town Hall, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 14. To hear the reports of the Cemetery Trustees and take any action thereto.
- 15. To hear the reports from the Committee on the 200th anniversary of the Town and take any action thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes not exceeding the sum of \$20,000.00.
- 17. To see if the Town wishes to take any action in regard to Zoning.
- 18. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to the games of Beano in said Town.
- 19. To transact any further business which may legally come before the meeting.



FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Be A Good Citizen - Cooperate

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 — 235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 1861 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 8 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things—while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. Will YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

REMEMBER

- 1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
- 2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
- 3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

BY-LAWS

OF THE MANSFIELD PUBLIC LIBRARY TEMPLE, NEW HAMPSHIRE

- 1. The board may from time to time adopt such by-laws for its government, as it shall deem proper.
- 2. The board shall appoint annually a sub-committee of three to consult with the Librarian in the purchase of books. Also they shall act as the Executive Committee for the Trustees,
- 3. The Secretary, Treasurer, Librarian, and Sub-committee shall make a full report of their doings to the Trustees at their annual meeting in April, and the same shall be placed on the records of the association.
- 4. The regular town auditors shall examine all accounts and money transactions of the library committees.
- 5. Officers are to be elected by nomination and the vote shall be by paper ballot.
- The Librarian shall thank the donors of books on behalf of Trustees.
- 7. The Librarian shall keep a record of all fines and all expenditures from the same for library supplies. The balance of fine money is to be turned over to the Treasurer.
- 8. Budget for the year shall be made out by the Trustees at their meeting in January and turned over to the Selectmen. One-third of the insurance premium and a special amount for the repair fund shall be set aside yearly. The town appropriation paid to the Library Treasurer each year shall be expended by the Library Trustees. Fund set aside for repairs shall not exceed ten per cent of total appropriation for the year.
- 9. The Secretary shall notify the Trustees of time and place of all meetings.
- 10. The Legion and Auxiliary may use Memorial Hall free of charge and do their own janitor work.
- No books are to be disposed of without unanimous vote of the Trustees.
- 12. Librarian is to dispose of weekly magazines after three months and monthly magazines after one year, at her discretion.
- 13. Library is to be open on Memorial Day from 2 to 4 p.m. The President to see that someone is on duty for that time. Notice of this is to be printed on the program or calendar for the day.

MANSFIELD PUBLIC LIBRARY LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

Temple children borrowed 1728 books during the past year. The adults 1216, bringing our total circulation to an all-time high of 2944 books.

The trustees met with me to discuss a plan which would make us eligible for State Aid. We agreed to apply for funds with which we could purchase juvenile non-fiction, our weakest area. After receiving our request, the Assistant State Librarian Miss Catharine Pratt met with us to check our library standards with those set up by the American Library Association. We fulfilled those requirements, and agreed to spend \$50 on children's books so that we would be eligible for State Aid. When the State Library Commission met with Miss Pratt, she presented our plan to them. The result was most gratifying — \$250 to be spent on books from selected lists.

Those books are now being circulated and are a thrilling addition to all who have seen them. They cover a wide range of topics, and are well graded. We have recently been notified of an additional \$75 grant to be spent on this same age group. I believe that now we have one of the finest collections of juvenile literature in a library of our size in the area.

Additional gifts of books were given to us by the Tobey and Gamsby estates. With the money in the Senator Tobey Memorial fund a large library table and four chairs were purchased for Memorial Hall.

The Bookmobile and State Library continue their valuable service to our library.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 3a. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing two years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.00 for the purpose of installing and maintaining a telephone in the Temple Public School or take any action relating thereto.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purpose of water-proofing the cupola and repairing the ridge-pole flashing on the Temple School or take any action relating thereto.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Temple:

I respectfully submit my ninth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Staff

School opened this fall with the same staff as last year, namely Mrs. Lucy Carter, teaching grades 1 and 2; Mrs. Alice Hammond teaching grades 3 through 5; Miss Helen Stone teaching grades 6 through 8, and acting as Principal of the building; Miss Ethelyn G. Edwards, Music Supervisor and instructor; Miss Sybil M. Beatham, School Nurse; Dr. Cayward, School Doctor and Mrs. Dorothea Leighton, school lunch manager.

Effective instruction is being given in the fundamentals, namely the three R's, with proper attention being devoted to the social and emotional development of the pupils through music and health instruction and health examinations.

Special attention this year has been devoted to arithmetic fundamentals and the development of good reading habits. The Temple Public Library, through the cooperation of the Librarian, Mrs. Barbara Hedman, has been very helpful in providing the necessary books and reading matter.

Building and Grounds

Practically all of the work relative to improvement of building and grounds that was proposed last year has been completed. This spring it is contemplated that the grading around the new building will be completed.

The heavy rains this fall revealed several leaks along the ridge pole area of the old building with water coming into the attic and rusting out the metal ceiling in Mrs. Carter's and Miss Stone's rooms. Decomposition of the roof rafters is taking place to a degree. The cupola has been a problem for several years, with water being forced through the openings by heavy winds, into the attic, causing considerable damage to the rock wool insulation and in time will affect the roof timbers in this area.

Article 10 in the warrant is presenting this problem to the voters for their consideration.

The exterior of the original building requires painting to preserve the wood area. Consequently, the School Board has provided in its budget a sum of \$450 to do this and to paint the Cafeteria floor.

The lighting in the upper grade room has been condemned by the State Health Department as inadequate. The candle power produced on the desk tops at the present time is approximately 16 candle-power. The desirable candle-power requirement for adequate protection of the children's eyes is between 25 and 30. Consequently, the School Board has included in its budget an amount of \$225 to rectify this situation.

The Temple American Legion Post is to be commended for their interest in the outdoor activities of the school children by providing basketball backboards for the play area.

The Temple School children are to be commended for their interest in the school plant and the splendid manner in which they, under the supervision of their teachers, are maintaining the plant. The money paid to them by the school board for this service has invariably been returned to the school district by the purchase of equipment that would otherwise be an additional expense to the district. This past year they have purchased fifty folding chairs at a cost of \$170. for use in the cafeteria for various activities.

Article 9 requests the voters to consider the advisability of installing a telephone in the Temple School. As our building becomes more useful to the town, it seems that this service should be provided.

Two serious accidents occurred at the school this year, one involving the school lunch manager during school hours and one involving a volunteer worker at a special evening function. Adequate telephone service at the time might have reduced the affect upon the individuals concerned.

Finance

The School Board's Budget for the school year 1956-57 calls for an appropriation of \$28,476.21, an increase of \$2,370.42 over last year's budget. This increase is reflected in the areas of tuitions, teachers' salaries, new equipment (replacement for fixed furniture in primary room), fuel, repairs, insurance (this is the year that the insurance comes due), expenses of instruction and miscellaneous items. Reductions amounting to \$179 have been realized in the areas of tax for state wide supervision, transportation, grading, and interest payments.

The income estimated next year will come from the state equalization aid and the state school building aid, amounting to approximately \$540. The last Legislature passed a bill providing for \$350,000 for school building aid. Aid to individual districts will be based on 20% of the principal payment made during the year 1955-56. Since our principal payment annually is \$2,000 we can realize \$400 from this source. Thus it would appear that the estimated assessment for 1956-57 will be \$2002.09 more than last year exclusive of any special appropriations that may be made.

Several questions have been raised in the past as to why Temple

does not receive more from the State Equalization Fund. The following is an attempt to explain this.

The two factors playing an important part in this formula are the average daily membership of pupils and the millage tax on the equalized valuation. The relationship between the foundation program and the wealth of the community expressed in equalized valuation, and the amount appropriated by the state legislature determines the amount of money received by a district.

Conclusion

I wish to express my appreciation to the Temple School Board and the citizens of Temple for the fine cooperation given me the past year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

As your School Nurse I made fifteen visits to the Temple Public School during the year of 1954-55. The communicable disease rate was low until the final weeks of the year when measles were prevalent in the first grades. There were many upper respiratory infections during the year.

Dr. Cayward examined the children in October and I assisted and kept the health records for the children. Seventy-four children were examined by the Doctor and the following defects were found:

All children were measured and weighed twice during the year and six were found to be overweight. The other children showed a gain in weight and height that was most satisfactory.

Vision tests were given by means of the Snellon Chart and found that three children were in need of further treatment. Notes were sent to the parents of the children and two received treatment.

The Salk Polio Vaccine program required much attention. After the initial request slips were sent out, arrangements were made to transport the children to Peterborough for the actual shot. The Red Cross of Temple provided the bus transportation for the trip on May 25, and June 7, 1955. Nineteen children went to the clinic on May 25, 1955. There were no reactions but one child was not very well that afternoon.

I attended the Workshop on Vision conducted by the N. H. Department of Public Welfare Sight Conservation Program at Keene, and the meeting at Concord on exceptional children during the spring institute for the teachers. Both were very helpful in the program of school nursing.
