REPORT OF THE ELECTRIC LIGHT COMMITTEE

The Committee in the first place got in communication with the President of the Bradford Electric Light Co. and tried several times to get a hearing with them. At that time they were negotiating with another company for sale. Under the circumstances we could not get anything definite from them.

Then we got in communication with Mr. Arthur A. Morrill to get lights from another source and the trade was all completed as we supposed. But owing to some parties (who we think were working against us and for themselves, and not for the citizens and the benefit of the town) the trade was knocked over.

Then we called on Mr. Herbert B. Rust of Meredith, N. H., and got him interested in the matter for the extension of his line to Warren. So as to provide electricity for lights and power for the towns of Warren. Wentworth and Rumney. Mr. Rust took the matter up. Got a 60 days' option of Mr. Carbee for the purchase of the Warren Light & Power Co. and the Rumney plant. Before the expiration of the 60 days Mr. Rust had purchased the above named plants and commenced operations. Owing to the poor condition of the lines in this vicinity, Mr. Rust found that there was quite a lot of extra work to be done. Setting new poles stringing mostly new wires, being held up on account of being delayed in getting supplies, etc., thereby being unable to get the line fully completed to the present time. Mr. Rust has already strung some 35 miles of new wire.

The committee have made a contract with Mr. Rust up to the present time for 50 lights of different candle power for one thousand fifty-six dollars and fifty cents (\$1,056.50) for one year from February 1st, 1927, to February 1st, 1928. Have also settled with Mr. Rust for the lights for the month of January, 1927. Mr. Rust made no account for what lights furnished in December.

The lamps now installed are as follows, viz:

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Warren:

I am pleased to submit my fifth annual report as superintendent of your schools. The accompanying statistical table should be of interest to every citizen. It brings out some important facts concerning our schools.

The total registration for the current year is 127 or 10 more than for last year. The average attendance for all schools was 93.7 per cent. The average for the state for this period was 94.6. There were 6 no-school days due to institutes, holidays and bad weather out of a total of 180 days. The attitude on the part of children and parents to attend school regularly when school is in session is a worth while result in education. I am convinced that children in general enjoy attending school, that it is a pleasure and not a duty.

The teachers for the present year are as follows: Village grammar, Bertha Placey; Intermediate, Isabelle Nelson; Primary, Rena Cameron, East Warren, Plymouth Normal School Cadet. The work of these schools is being done efficiently as is shown by results in standard tests given both by teachers and superintendent.

Miss Underhill, the school nurse, reports for last year 39 school visits, 20 home visits, and 14 cases of treatment of various defects. 11 children had work done at the dental clinic held at Warren last Fall. The teachers are "putting across" a good program of health training through the checking up of health habits, talks on personal hygiene, various health contests and health posters.

The pupil's desks in the two lower rooms of the Village School are in very poor condition. These desks

have been used for many years and have become so worn that they should be replaced by those having somthing like a smooth surface. This matter should receive attention. The teachers and pupils have started a fund for new seats which in another year should amount to about one hundred dollars. The district should add to this fund and put suitable desks in one room soon. Then later, and in a similar manner the other room could be given new desks.

It is my belief that the Warren schools are in a good condition. This condition should not suggest a passive satisfaction in our accomplishment but should give us hope for future advancement. There is in sight new and broader educational aims and objectives which will train our children for the present and future rather than the past.

In closing I wish to express my gratitude to the School Board for making my work so pleasant. And to the public, I am grateful for the cooperative attitude manifest in so many ways.
