WHEREAS, the Honorable David H. Souter, along-time resident of the Town of Weare, New Hampshire, has distinguished himself in his service to his community and the State of New Hampshire as a whole; and,

WHEREAS, the Honorable David H. Souter has dedicated his professional career to public service through the Executive and Judicial Branches of New Hampshire State government; and,

WHEREAS, he capably served as the Granite State's Chief Law Enforcement official as Attorney General for the State of New Hampshire between January 16, 1976 through April 9, 1978; and,

WHEREAS, the Honorable David H. Souter donned the robes of a trial judge in New Hampshire by his appointment as a New Hampshire Superior Court Justice in 1978, a position he served in with distinction until 1983; and,

WHEREAS, he was appointed as one of the five justices of the Granite State's highest court...the New Hampshire Supreme Court... in 1983, where he served as a valuable member through May 23, 1990; and,

WHEREAS, the President of the United States, with the consent of the United States Senate, named Mr. Souter as Judge on the U.S. First District Court of Appeals in Boston, Massachusetts, in May, 1990; and,

WHEREAS, the legal talents and abilities of the Honorable David H. Souter were recognized by George H. W. Bush, President of the United States, who named Mr. Souter to serve as an Associate Justice on the highest court in the land on July 23, 1990; and,

WHEREAS, the United States Senate confirmed the President's nomination of David H. Souter of Weare, New Hampshire, to serve as an Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court on October 2, 1990; and,

WHEREAS, Mr. Justice Souter assumed his position as Associate Justice in formal ceremonies on October 9, 1990; and,

WHEREAS, he has long served the best interest of his community and fellow citizens through his active participation in the activities of the Board of Trustees of the Concord Hospital;

NOW, THEREFORE, WE, THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN OF THE TOWN OF WEARE, NEW HAMPSHIRE, do hereby recognize and commend the public service and dedication of the Honorable David H. Souter of Weare, New Hampshire, upon his appointment to the United States Supreme Court. By all standards, Mr. Souter represents the best of judicial temperament, sound and proven intellect, compassion for his fellow citizens, and a genuine sense of humor which, combined, provides a standard which is a model for all of us to strive to achieve.

FURTHER, in recognition of the professional achievements of the Honorable David H. Souter of Weare, New Hampshire, we do hereby proclaim him to be Weare's Citizen of the Year of 1990.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary town officers for the following year. (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 2: Shall the government of the Police Department of the Town of Weare be entrusted to a police commission? (By Petition) (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 3: If so, shall such police commissioners be chosen by: (By Petition) (By Official Ballot)

- A) Popular election at town election; or
- B) Appointment of the governor with consent of the council?

ARTICLE 4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article 18.2 to clarify the intent of the article by the words "as all structures"? (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 5: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article 4.1 to add a new definition as follows: Structure: That which is built or constructed? (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 6: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article 5 by adding a new subsection as follows: 5.1.2 Violation Penalties: Reference NH RSA 676:15-17? (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 7: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend the Weare Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 412, Lot #234 from Residential (R) District to Rural Agricultural District? (By Petition) (APPROVED by the Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 8: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend the Weare Zoning Map, by changing 10 acres of Weare Tax Map 411, Lot #160 from Rural Agricultural (RA) District with the Rural Conservation Overlay to Commercial Zoning District in accordance with the zoning plan of Jean Wood dated January, 1991 prepared by Robert Palmer? (By Petition) (APPROVED by the Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 9: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend the Weare Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 409, Lot #004 from Rural Conservation (RC) District to Rural Agricultural District? (By Petition) (DISAPPROVED by the Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 10: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend the Weare Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 202, Lot #60 from Rural Conservation (RC) District to Rural Agricultural District? (By Petition) (DISAPPROVED by the Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 11: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend the Weare Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 412, Lot #235 from Residential (R) District to Rural Agricultural District? (By Petition) (APPROVED by the Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 12: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 9 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town building and permit ordinance as follows: Amend Article 4, Paragraph 4.1.8, page 5, line 11, to provide that each day of violation of the Ordinance shall be considered a separate offense, pursuant to NH RSA 676:15 and NH RSA 676:17? (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 13: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 10 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town building and permit ordinance as follows: Amend Article 4, Paragraph 4.1.9, line 8 to provide that unlawful continuations of construction after a stop work order shall be punished pursuant to the provisions of NH RSA 676:15 and NH RSA 676:17? (By Official Ballot)

NOTE: IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE VOTE OF TOWN MEETING OF MARCH 6, 1973, ARTICLES 14 THROUGH 52 WILL BE TAKEN UP AT AN ADJOURNED SESSION OF THIS MEETING ON MARCH 16, 1991, AT 10:00 AM IN THE MULTI-PURPOSE ROOM OF THE CENTER WOODS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal and State grants which may become available during the course of the year, to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, and also to accept gifts of real and personal property from any governmental unit or private source, provided that such grants and other monies and gifts do not require the expenditure of other Town funds; and that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipts and expenditure of such grants and monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95b, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction, advertised sealed bid or in other such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require, except for any parcels of land larger than five acres if land only, or larger than ten acres if a dwelling is present. Any and all sales are to follow the provisions of RSA 80:42, Sale of Tax Liens/Tax Deeded Properties, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any used and surplus Town equipment, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts, bequests and trust funds received during the year, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayments of property taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,938,073.00 to defray general government charges for the ensuing year:

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000.00 for reconstruction and resurfacing of roads, including \$93,160.00 for principal and interest payments on the Road Improvement Bond approved by the 1990 Town Meeting. Of the \$200,000.00, the sum of \$107,947.00 would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire, pursuant to RSA 235, and the sum of \$92,053.00 would be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,400.00 for the purpose of purchasing a stainless steel sander, two snowplows and teeth for the Town crusher for the Highway Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$90,983.00 for the purpose of leasing a Dresser 850 Motor Grader for the use of the Highway Department, and authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a one-year lease agreement for that purpose, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$15,683.00 from the Highway Grader Capital Reserve Fund. At the Town's option, the lease may be renewed for an additional one-year period subject to further appropriation by the Town.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to clarify the following roads and ways as Class VI subject to gates and bars at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen as provided by RSA 231:45-a, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

- 1) Bassett Mill Road (450 ft.)
- 2) Chuck Lane (600 ft.)
- 3) Chuck Street, North (1,900 ft.)
- 4) Clark Road (2,100 ft.)
- 5) Clark Mill Road (1,000 ft.)
- 6) Devil Step Road (1,050 ft.)
- 7) Horse Spring Hill Road (3,900 ft.)
- 8) Maplewold Road (250 ft.)
- 9) Melvin Valley Road (8,700 ft.)
- 10) Oliver Road (1,050 ft.)
- 11) Sawyer Road (1,350 ft.)
- 12) Worthley Road (9,206 ft.)

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey or exchange all the Town's rights, title and interest to that portion of Gould Road, located north of Gould Road at the intersection of Route 77 (Dustin Tavern Road) 24.75 ft. northerly of the new centerline as depicted by the existing paved roadway. In exchange, that portion of Tax Map 411, Lot 210 located on the south side of Gould Road which is 24.75 ft. southerly of the new Gould Road centerline as depicted by the existing paved roadway, or to take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote "to reclassify the section of Barnard Hill Road from the Leon Favor Farm to the intersection of Mary Hadley Road and Barnard Hill Road. This road is to be improved to Class V status at the expense of John Brown and Sons, Inc., of Weare under the direct supervision of the Road Agent", or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to clarify the terms and conditions relative to the discontinuance of a portion of roadway known as Nichols Road from Tiffany Hill Road past the Osborne farm to the intersection of a proposed new road to be known as West Quaker Street by voting to discontinue that portion of the roadway known as Nichols Road from Tiffany Hill Road past the Osborne farm to the intersection with a proposed a new road to be known as West Quaker Street upon the completion of the following terms and conditions.

- A. Construction, excluding paving, by the 1789 Limited Partnership, or its successors, and at its sole expense, of a new road to be known as West Quaker Street connecting Quaker Street and Nichols Road, the layout of said West Quaker Street being shown on a plan entitled "Lot Line Adjustment Plan for Town of Weare and 1789 Limited Partnership, both sides of Nichols Road, North Side of Quaker Street & Tiffany Hill Road, Weare, New Hampshire, Hillsborough County" dated February, 1988, as revised on March 15, 1990;
- B. Upon completion of the construction of West Quaker Street, excluding paving, the Selectmen shall be authorized, and are directed to accept the conveyance and ownership of West Quaker Street on behalf of the Town by deed of the 1789 Limited Partnership or its successors; and
- C. Contemporaneously with the conveyance and acceptance of West Quaker Street to the Town, conveyance of that portion of the roadway known as Nichols Road from Tiffany Hill Road past the Osborne farm to the intersection of a proposed new road to be known as West Quaker Street to the abutters of the discontinued portion of Nichols Road by deed of the Town, which deed the Selectmen are authorized and directed to execute and deliver. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund, previously established, to the Transfer Station Capital Reserve Fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as the agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$133,780.00 for principal and interest payments due on a long-term note previously authorized for the constuction and equipping of the Weare Transfer Station, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$7,873.00 and all accrued interest as of the date of withdrawal from the Transfer Station Captial Reserve Fund previously establish, for this purpose, with the balance of \$125,907.00 to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,500.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$6,500.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose with the balance of \$7,000.00 to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33,700.00 to be added to the Police Department budget for the purpose of hiring two full-time police officers and a part-time attorney to prosecute Weare cases, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum \$75,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing a Class A 1000 GPM Front Mount Pumper for the Fire Department initially authorized at the 1990 Town Meeting, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$65,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund created for the purpose with the balance of \$10,000.00 to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the Rescue Squad Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 37: To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the Town Hall and Stone Building Restoration Capital Reserve Fund previously established to the Town Hall, Stone Building and Town Office Building Restoration Reserve Fund, and to designate the Board of Selectman as the agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 38: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the Town Hall, Stone Building and Town Office Building Restoration Capital Reserve Fund previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 39: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,505.00 for capital improvements and/or expenditures for the ensuing year including:

ARTICLE 40: To see if the Town will vote to establish a town office Photocopier Capital Reserve Fund, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed in that fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as the agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 41: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 for the purpose of establishing a gasoline and diesel fuel pumping system for Town vehicles, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 42: To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the Chase Park Erosion Control Capital Reserve Fund previously established to the Town Ballfield Improvement Capital Reserve Fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as the agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 43: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,900.00 for the purpose of erecting a chain link fence at the Town Ballfield on Salmen Road, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$3,900.00 for this purpose from the Town Ballfield Improvement Capital Reserve Fund previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 48: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to use for boundary maintenance in the Town Forest and to authorize the withdrawal of \$2,000.00 for this purpose for the Town Forest Account, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 49: To see if the voters will authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute a deed to Anna McLaughlin King to a tract of land on Craney Hill Road in order to correct a title defect caused by the failure to record a deed, dated October 26, 1940, for the same property from the Town of Weare to King's predecessor in title, George G. Hood. The Town originally obtained title by a Tax Collector's deed to the Town dated September 6, 1939, and recorded in the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds, Book 993, Page 312.

ARTICLE 50: To see if the Town will vote to require the Selectmen to provide the Town with a separate warrant article for all salaries, insurance and other benefits and compensation for all town employees, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 51: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to adopt an "ALARM ORDINANCE", which regulates the use of Alarms Systems reporting directly to Police and Fire Dispatch, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 52: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

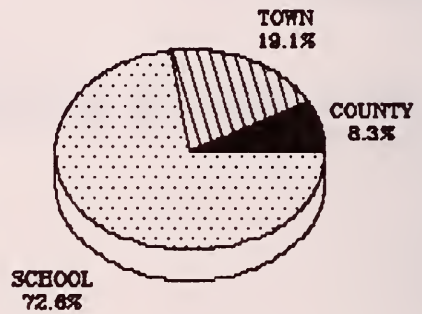
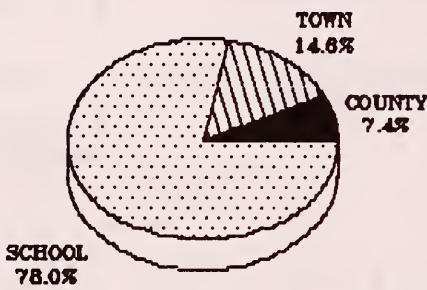

The polls were closed at 7:01 p.m. At 11:35 p.m., the Town Moderator announced the result of the vote. The Meeting was adjourned by the Moderator at 11:42 p.m. to resume on Saturday, March 24, 1990 at 10:00 a.m. in the Weare School Gymnasium.

At 10:08 a.m., Saturday, March 24, 1990, the Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Neal M. Kurk. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Gordon M. Tiffany. The Meeting was asked to stand to hear the reading of town residents who have died since last Town Meeting. This was followed by a moment of silence.

The Moderator read the results of the Town, the Weare School District and the John Stark Regional School District elections held Tuesday, March 13, 1990 and the results of the votes on Articles 2 through 6 of the Town Warrant. He announced that

those who were elected may come forward at the close of Town Meeting to be given the oath of office.

The Moderator stated the rules for today's Meeting would be Garfield Jones' Parliamentary Procedures at the Glance as interpreted by the Chair. This will be supplemented by ten specific rules as follows:

1) You may address the Chair or may address another through the Chair.

2) If you wish to be heard, please stand or raise your hand so that the Chair may recognize you. When recognized, you should approach the microphone, give your name and proceed with your remarks. It is important to use the microphone for two reasons: first, to allow everyone to hear remarks - the accoustics in this gymnasium are not the best - and second, to permit remarks to be recorded through the public address system.

3) If you proposed an article, you will be recognized first. After you have spoken, the person who rises and addresses the Chair first after the floor is yielded will be recognized to speak. If you make a motion, you may claim the floor in preference to others.

4) You are not entitled to the floor a second time in debate on the same motion as long as someone who has not already spoken desires the floor. You may speak a third time only by permission of the Meeting.

5) Motions to reconsider will be entertained only while the article to which they pertain is properly before the Meeting.

6) Lengthy or complex motions or amendments must be presented in writing.

7) In addressing the Meeting, you should keep your remarks to the subject currently on the floor. Remarks which are not germane to the subject at hand or which involve personalities will be ruled out of order.

8) Legally registered voters only shall be recognized. They should be displaying voter identification badges passed out at the door by the Supervisors of the Check List. Those who are not legally registered voters may not address the Meeting without its consent.

9) After each article dealing with the raising and/or appropriating of monies has been moved and spoken to, the Chair will recognize the Finance Committee so it may present its recommendations to the Meeting.

10) There will be no smoking in the gymnasium during the Meeting. Smokers are advised that smoking is permitted in the anteroom just outside the door at the rear of the gym.

The Moderator introduced the Town Officers, Joseph Kelly, Town Administrator and Stephen Buckley, Town Counsel. The Moderator asked if there would be any objection to hearing from either Town Counsel or the Town Administrator during the Meeting. No objection was made, and Mr. Buckley and Mr. Kelly were granted the privilege of addressing the Meeting, if necessary.

The Moderator recognized William Herman, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, to hear the State of the Town address.

At this time, the Moderator recognized the members of the Finance Committee, Betsy Moore, Representative to the General Court and former State Senator Jack Chandler.

William Herman moved the reading of the Warrant in its entirety be waived at this time and that each article be read as it is taken up. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550,000.00 for the purpose of road improvements, sealing and paving, on approximately 23 roads throughout the community, the sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes in accordance with New Hampshire RSA 33:8, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Weare. (By Ballot)

Lloyd Bailey, Jr. moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded by Harold Hall.

The Finance Committee recommended acceptance of Article 7 with the recommendation that a committee be formed to study a master plan of the roads involving a member of the Planning Board, a Selectman, the Road Agent and a member of the Finance Committee. It was stated this recommendation was not made in the form of an amendment to the article.

A written ballot, as required by law, was taken on Article 7. The polls were opened at 10:45 a.m. and the Meeting proceeded to ballot on Article 7. The polls remained open until 12:05 p.m. at which time the Moderator stated the polls were closed. The result of the ballot:

No - 47

The Moderator announced that the vote was affirmative having the necessary 2/3 vote. There was no motion to reconsider Article 7.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal and State grants which may become available during the course of the year, to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, and also to accept gifts of real and personal property from any governmental unit or private source, provided that such grants and other monies and gifts do not require the expenditure of other Town funds; and that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95b, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Merrill Shepard moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction, advertised sealed bid or in other such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require, except for any parcels of land larger than five acres if land only, or larger than ten acres if a dwelling is present. Any and all sales are to follow the provisions of RSA 80:42, Sale of Tax Liens/Tax Deeded Properties, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any used and surplus Town equipment or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts, bequests and trust funds received during the year, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Merrill Shepard moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayments of property taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Chester Rhodenizer moved acceptance of this article as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee does not recommend this article.

The vote on Article 33 was negative and the article failed.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Weare Board of Fire Wards to accept all gifts, equipment, bequests, and donations received during the year and applied to the Weare Fire Department budget or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)

Chester Rhodenizer moved to dismiss Article 34. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Article 34 was dismissed.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$277,500.00 for the Phase II closure of the Town Landfill and to authorize the withdrawal of \$97,924.00 and all accrued interest from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose with the balance to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved to adopt the article as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee recommended this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 36. (By Petition)

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee recommends this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 56. To see if the Town will send a message to the legislature and Governor calling for a comprehensive Toxics Law requiring coordinated programs of planning, research and development, education, enforcement, and economic incentives to achieve Toxics reduction by substitution with safer substances. (By Petition)

Dorthea O'Neil moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee had no recommendation on this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 57. To see if the Town will vote to designate and proclaim April 22, 1990 as Earth Day 1990, and to set aside that day for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching the "Decade of the Environment". (By Petition.)

Dave Maynard moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 58. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for financial support to the Youth Baseball/Softball, Soccer and Basketball Programs within the Town of Weare. (By Petition)

Fred Roberts moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee recommends this article.

Richard Townes moved to amend the article by adding "the \$10,000.00 to be taken from the December 31, 1989 General Fund Surplus". The motion was seconded.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative.

The vote on the amendment was negative.

Matthew Esenwine moved to amend the article by changing the amount to be raised and appropriated in Article 58 to \$2,500.00. The motion was seconded.

The vote on the amendment was negative.

The vote on the original motion was by division vote. The result of the vote:

No - 52

The vote on Article 58 was negative.

ARTICLE 59. To transact any other business which may legally come before this Meeting.

Marilyn Carson moved that we direct the Finance Committee to report, in writing, any and all warrant article recommendations no later than one week prior to each Town or School District Meeting. This written report shall include:

1. The total amount requested by the Selectmen, Town Department or School District for any given warrant article.
2. The total amount recommended by the Finance Committee for the same.
3. The reason(s) for the Finance Committee recommendation.

The Finance Committee Report shall be made available to any and all interested persons at the Town Office prior to each Town or School District Meeting and again at the voter check-in table during each Town or School District Meeting.

Further: The Selectmen, Town Departments and the School District shall be notified of any and all relevant Finance Committee recommendations as soon as such recommendations are finalized, but no later than two weeks prior to each Town or School District Meeting.

The Finance Committee shall be required to work cooperatively with the Selectmen, Town Departments and School District to ensure that all the respective budgets will best serve the community's needs.

Further: The Town Moderator is encouraged to ensure that the Finance Committee members represent a cross-section of the community, giving preference to those individuals with business management experience.

The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Stephen Flanders moved to have the Selectmen take a poll of the citizens of the Town of Weare with respect to their preference between Showcase and Continental Cable Company.

The motion was seconded.

The vote was negative and the motion failed.

Richard Townes moved to see if the Town will authorize the Planning Board to give a developer a choice of either installing a cistern or the equal value of said cistern to the Fire Department for future purchases or to take any other action in relation thereto.

The motion was seconded.

Town Counsel was asked for an opinion and stated it would be inappropriate for the money to be given directly to a department,

but that it could be put into a Capital Reserve Fund, with the funds to be raised and appropriated at some future time.

Mrs. Knowles requested Bossie, Kelly and Hodes send the Planning Board a legal opinion stating that we can raise funds in this manner.

Mr. Townes amended his motion to read "or the equal value of said cistern to a Capital Reserve Fund for future purchases". The second agreed with this change.

The vote was affirmative.

William Herman stated the estimated increase in the tax rate will be \$1.42 rather than \$1.76 which was mentioned at the beginning of the Meeting.

Mr. Herman moved to adjourn the Meeting with a round of applause to the Moderator for a job well done. The motion was seconded. The Meeting adjourned at 6:15 p.m.

RECORD OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

September 29, 1990

William Herman moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

The Moderator recognized William Herman who yielded to Carolyn Shinn to make the presentation.

Mrs. Shinn explained the proposal for the addition to the library. Following her presentation, permission was given to Sam Clemens of Merganser Corporation who answered questions from those in attendance. Questions were also directed to the Board of Selectmen.

Following discussion, the Moderator called for the vote on Article 1. The vote was affirmative by a unanimous vote.

Howard Ineson, Sr. moved for the record that this Meeting waive all rights of bidding for the purpose of this building. The motion was seconded.

The Moderator stated that he did not feel this motion would have any legal binding validity, but that it would set the sense of this Meeting.

The vote was affirmative, again by a unanimous vote.

The Meeting was adjourned at 10:55 a.m.

1990 TOWN AUDITORS REPORT
February 5, 1991

It is the responsibility of the auditors to express an opinion on the financial statements of the town. The auditors review of the records and financial reports of the Town of Weare produced the following:

The general fund balance as stated in the Treasurer's report has been reviewed and in our opinion fairly reflects the ending balance for the year ended December 31, 1990.

The financial statements of the town are the responsibility of the Selectmen. The Town Financial Report (MS-5) had not been prepared at the time of our audit and therefore, no opinion is given as to its correctness.

The accounts and reports of the Trustees of the Trust Funds are prepared by the Trust Department of BankEast. The Capital Reserve Funds created by vote of the Town are also in the custody of BankEast. The trustees oversee the accounts and transactions of all the fund activities as well as authorize all expenditures. The BankEast Trust Department holds all of the securities of the Trust Funds and they were not produced for our audit.

As stated in our 1989 audit report, the Federal Revenue Sharing account should be closed out as should the Sewer Fund account. The other special accounts of the Town have been reviewed and in our opinion fairly represent the transactions of the Town for the year ended December 31, 1990.

The Town Auditors recommend that an outside audit firm be retained to perform the Town Audit for the year ending December 31, 1991.

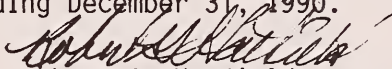

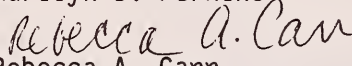

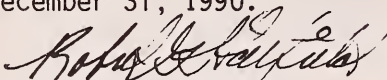

We encourage you to express your concerns and interest to your elected representatives. I would like to thank all town employees, department heads, board and committee members for the help and assistance offered to me, as Town Administrator during the past year, and together we can look to the challenge of the new year.

II. SUMMARY: 1990 completed our first full year of operations with positive results. We delivered 105,385 tons of trash from our 27 communities at a Co-op cost of \$36.45 per ton covering full cost of all operations, including our landfill, plus future landfill expansions and closure funds. While our delivered tons were down in 1990, we expect in 1991 to be much closer, due to operating experience, to our 1991 Guaranteed Annual Tonnage of 110,893 tons. Our operator at the Landfill, J.D. McLeod, continues to function in an exemplary manner and his efforts are greatly appreciated by the Co-op. Our tipping fee in 1991 was set at \$37.45 and we intend to commence the design and some construction of our Phase II Operations at the Landfill. Once again the communities should be grateful to their Co-op representatives who have given much time and effort since 1985 to pull this project together and to continue it into the coming years.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Weare: Home Care, Hospice, and Health Promotion.

Home Care Services respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and paraprofessional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

Hospice Services provide professional and paraprofessional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs. This is the only certified Medicare Hospice Program in New Hampshire.

Health Promotion Services focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, family planning, sexually transmitted disease, adult screening, immunizations, and HIV testing and counseling. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior Health services are provided at congregate housing sites. Professional and paraprofessional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families, and individuals through early intervention and health teaching.

Health education and instruction is part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Weare may request service: patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. All requests are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) between the hours of 8:00 am - 4:00 pm seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. A Hospice nurse is on call (224-4093) 4:00 pm - 8:00 am daily.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for that person, without a health insurance and/or who is unable to pay the full charge. However, for fee scaling, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of New Hampshire and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

BOARD OF FIREWARDS

In 1990 after March Town Meeting, the Board had a few problems to iron out: A) Finish the South Weare Station, B) Improve cooperation, communications and relationships with other sections of Town Government.

South Weare Station is now a modern functioning facility with room for expansion if future needs dictate -- a storage facility for replenishing water used in fire suppression. It has a very active group of fire fighters. It is one of the most desirable locations in Town from which to respond -- the fact the Town already owned the site near the inter-sections of Routes 114, 77 and 149. I have a Special Thanks to all the volunteers who made this happen. It shows such a facility can be built at a reasonable cost without large profits all going out of town, however, not without sacrifice, I might add. It took a general understanding, patience and a willingness to communicate between workers who shared a common goal.

Another area addressed was communication and cooperation between the Selectmen's Office and the Fire Department. The Board of Firewards and Selectmen, at a joint meeting, agreed we do have the same common goal, "To serve the best interest of the Town of Weare." It was agreed to put aside personal differences and put energies toward a cooperative effort. So far, I believe we have worked towards this.

For those citizens who do not realize it, the Board of Firewards is not the Weare Volunteer Fire Department. It is, however, an elected body of the Town bound by RSA 154 to govern affairs, oversee expenditures, approve policies and in other matters comply with the statutory requirements of the State of New Hampshire. The Weare Board of Firewards does play an important part in the health, safety and welfare of the Town of Weare.

RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

This year the Rescue Squad answered a total of 219 calls from November 1, 1989, through October 31, 1990. These calls are broken down into the following categories.

This total includes calls from the "Red Network" Police, radio, and walk-ins.

In 1990 the members of the Rescue Squad have attended numerous courses to expand their medical training. We now have 11 people certified in defibrillation and seven people I.V. certified. One member is enrolled in a paramedic program and two members enrolled in an R.N. program. Advancement training is very beneficial for Rescue calls, the Town, and betterment of the Rescue Squad.

The Rescue Squad would like to acknowledge the following people whose families have asked that memorial donations be sent to the Weare Emergency Medical Services Association. With these funds the Rescue Squad purchased training manikins for C.P.R. to replace the old ones and a simulator for the Cardiac Monitor as a training aid.

FIRE AND RESCUE DISPATCH STUDY COMMITTEE

Introduction

During the 1988 Town Meeting, the Board of Selectmen announced that a committee would be formed to study the dispatching needs of the Weare Fire Department and Rescue. Since then, this committee has been meeting to determine which outside dispatch service is the best for the future needs of the Town of Weare.

The Decision Process

The Dispatch Study Committee has narrowed the dispatch center decision process down to two final groups: Capital Area Mutual Fire Aid Compact and Goffstown Police. Both of these dispatch services are capable of providing excellent service to the Town of Weare.

Committee Recommendation

On December 27, 1989, the Dispatch Study Committee conducted a meeting and voted on recommending Capital Area Mutual Fire Aid Compact to the Town of Weare. The dispatch committee believed Capital Area could provide the best service out of the six dispatch services we interviewed.

On December 29, 1989, we received word that Goffstown Police Department was interested in talking to the Dispatch Study Committee. Goffstown Police had told us earlier in the year that they were not interested due to labor shortages and other internal problems. The committee chairman contacted Selectman, Bill Herman and told him what had occurred. After some discussion, it was determined that the Dispatch Study Committee should speak to Goffstown Police Department and postpone making a recommendation to the town until all the facts had been reviewed.

The dispatch committee has taken the future of the town into consideration in its recommendation. The town has seen steady growth which places an increasing demand on the services of the town. The majority of committee members believe that Capital Area Mutual Fire Aid Compact can provide much more than dispatching services to meet the challenges of a growing community.

Capital Area Mutual Fire Aid Compact dispatches the surrounding communities simultaneously through the dispatch radio network, rather than by telephone.

This method saves valuable time when personnel and equipment are being "toned" for rapid response to an emergency situation. The dispatch center is also equipped to handle 911 telephone calls.

FIRE AND RESCUE DISPATCH STUDY COMMITTEE

Capital Area Mutual Fire Aid Compact employs a full-time chief coordinator who assists the member communities by employing the mobile Incident Command System. The coordinator appears at the fire scene in a specially equipped vehicle and assists the fire chief in organizing the fire scene to rescue people and fight fires as efficiently as possible. Hazardous materials training is also available to make sure fire fighters are as safe as possible when they perform their difficult tasks.

Capital Area Mutual Fire Aid Compact supports a Central Purchase Plan which allows member communities to purchase equipment at group rates, thereby saving considerable expense of tax dollars to the member communities.

Finally, each fire chief of a member community is a member of the Capital Area Mutual Fire Aid Compact Board of Directors. This is an important feature because the fire chiefs provide input to decisions which should eliminate problems for everyone in the compact.

Due to reasons listed in this recommendation, the Dispatch Study Committee hereby recommends that the Town of Weare consider Capital Area Mutual Fire Aid Compact for future fire and rescue dispatching needs.

FOREST FIRE STATISTICS - 1990

On May 2, 1990, 3/4 of an acre was burned at Clough State Park on a peninsula. This was an accidental fire caused by a camp fire. Mutual aid from Goffstown and Dunbarton was received. The dryness of the season played an important role in the deepness of the burn. This is why no permits are issued for burning during dry and dangerous conditions. Please be careful with cooking fires.

Ferrin Pond, Old East Weare and Daniels Lake are very busy places for illegal fires. These places must be closely monitored. We would like to Thank the following people for use of their four-wheel drive vehicles for patrolling these and other secluded wooded areas: Lee L'Heureux, Alan Sheldon, Larry Damour and Ron Nash.

The State Forestry department burnt several fields in Old East Weare to help cut fire danger, stimulate green growth and to invite new wildlife. Training was done at this time. Forest Fire Warden and Deputies attended Incident Command Training in Pinardville and eight Fire Fighters attended Forestry Training in East Weare.

Burning Permits are free of charge and can be obtained by contacting Raymond Eaton, Sr., Charles Osborne or Everett Stone. We would like to Thank all persons who contact the Fire Department to report when they are burning brush on snow covered ground. REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During calendar year 1990, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, permit fires that escaped control and rekindled fires. All of these causes are preventable, but ONLY with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000.00 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1990, including a 262 acre fire in Moultonboro and several fires in Hooksett, New Hampshire.

In 1990, the New Hampshire Division of Forest and Lands trained 844 local Wardens and Deputy Wardens in the Incident Command System (ICS), an incident management system for all types of emergencies. In 1991, Wardens will be trained in the use of Class A foam in wildfire suppression.

Our application was filed on November 1, 1990, and we hope to receive a "preliminary approval" in mid January 1991. This beautiful land would be added to the Weare Town Forest.

FOURTH OF JULY COMMITTEE

The 1990 Weare Fourth of July Celebration was a financial success from the standpoint of the Weare Fourth of July Committee. The committee went into this year's event with \$2,858.46 in the account and (as of today) the account stands at \$3,882.54 to be used toward next year's events.

Unlike past years, there was limited financial support from the merchants in the community, an obvious reflection of the current state of the economy. Despite this downturn in our fund-raising efforts, we were able to continue with a two-day celebration with the main event (from the entertainment and financial perspective) being the Truck Pulling Competition put on by the New Hampshire Truck Pullers Association (NHTPA) on Sunday, July 1st.

The Truck Pull cost the committee a total of \$4,287.00 broken out as follows:

- \$500.00 paid to the Weare Police Department for overtime details
- \$567.00 plus a \$200.00 deposit to Equalizer Enterprises for the pulling sled
- \$2,820.00 plus a \$200.00 deposit paid to NHTPA

It should be noted that the rain on the day of the event forced the cancellation of one of the truck classes scheduled to compete, reducing the amount owed to NHTPA by approximately \$800.00 so the cost would have been greater. There were 573 paid admissions to the event which brought in \$2,865.00 in ticket sales. Due to the truck pull the committee had a net loss of \$1,422.00

If the Truck Pulling competition is to be held again next year, increased promotion of the event by advertising in local newspapers (an expense of approximately four to five hundred dollars) should be considered. This would bring in a larger crowd to add to the base of local fans for this type of event and this should be pursued.

The gross income of the committee (from donations, ticket sales and vendor proceeds) was \$3,310.00 as of July 5, 1990. The total monies paid out by the committee to put on the 1990 celebration was \$6,428.83 as of July 5, 1990. The net profit shown by the committee in 1990 was \$1,024.08 as of July 5, 1990. These figures do not include any of the payments made by the Town of Weare on the committee's behalf.

Health service responded to a few inspections this year regarding child foster care. Day care centers were visited to verify licensure.

The usual septic system problems, that needed compliance with state law, were eliminated.

In addition, visits with the State Health Food Inspector were done in restaurants and stores making sure HEP 2300 guidelines were met.

Telephone inquiries regarding the impact of heat, ants, odors, litter and garbage were dealt with and resolved. There were two cases where residents left the property and left garbage behind. This involved calling people in charge of the property to get it settled. All in all, people were cooperative.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

It certainly would be an understatement to use the word "busy" to describe 1990 for the Highway Department! Winter-maintenance required an aggressive and expensive effort of labor and materials.

Citizen demands and mother nature's failure to cooperate, resulted in employees averaging 186 overtime hours per man. Our winter weekday routine consisted of frozen culverts/ice control problems, extensive vehicle/equipment maintenance and pushing back of snow accumulations. The department was forced to purchase an ice steamer to thaw frozen culverts. This proved to be an invaluable asset.

As springtime approached, we contended with mud roads and routine grading. Ditches on every tar road were cleaned. We are hopeful that in 1991, we can clean and establish ditches and work on culverts, on our dirt roads. This year we addressed culvert problems on Norris Road, Colby Road, Abijah Bridge, East Road, Chase Hill, Ridgeview Road and installed both culvert and catch basins on River Road and Short Street. The Town sub-contracted approximately 12 miles of shim and overlay work to Pike Industries. Highway personnel and equipment shimmed several tarred sections of Town roads. These included: Mountain Road, Lull Road, Colby Road, Flander's Memorial Drive, Reservoir Drive, Ridgeview Road and Riverdale Road. In 1991, the Town crew will shim and overlay a few remaining roads and use the balance of the bond account to sub-contract the sealing of several other Town roads. At this time, it appears that several roads in Town will need reconstruction. With the completion of the Gould Road Reconstruction Project, our attention will need to focus on Flander's Memorial Drive and Sugar Hill Road South (from four corners to flood control).

This year, the Highway Department launched a successful up-grading program on Barnard Hill Road and Chase Hill Road. With the use of our newly acquired dozer, we were able to stump, widen and/or gravel in both areas. Had we needed to sub-contract a dozer to do the work, it would not have been financially possible. My intention for 1991 is to complete Barnard Hill Road and continue onto Bart Clough and Mountain School Roads.

Pot-hole patching and tree removal were a regular occurrence. In August, we were hampered by torrential rains. Our department worked directly with F.E.M.A. officials, resulting in a 75% reimbursement for damages. Hopefully, next year, we will complete repairs and receive the remaining 12 1/2% State reimbursement.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

During the summer, we assisted the State in re-inventorying our Class V and VI roads. This required extensive field and staff hours to update and correct existing records. This ultimately affects the amount of money our Town receives from Block Grant Aid - therefore, it's important! Also, for minimal cost, an engineering student from New England College, was able to begin work on a project detailing the existing and deeded right-of-ways for all town roads.

We feel that it is important to note that from time to time, the Highway Department is also called upon to assist other Town departments with projects, repairs and problems. This helps keep Town costs down to a minimum. In 1990 we assisted the Transfer Station with start-up operations, the Police Department/Town Office sewer connection project, voting booth set-up and dismantlement and finally the back-filling of the Library foundation hole.

In late fall came the completion of the Center (Woods) Road Relocation Project, also done under the guidance of Highway and Town officials. And finally, just prior to our first call for winter maintenance for '90 - '91 (November 12th), temporary repairs to the decking were made to Abijah Bridge Road.

We hope that the residents of our Town will support our goals and efforts, as we strive for a better and safer transportation for all citizens.

OVERSEER OF PUBLIC WELFARE REPORT

During the year 1990, 54 applications for general assistance were received. This represents an increase of 64% from the 33 applications received in 1989, reflecting the economic conditions which have been rapidly declining throughout the New England region.

Of the 54 applications received, 49 were approved compared to 30 approved in 1989. Seventeen of the approved applications was for assistance in purchasing food, while the greatest need in terms of dollars spent was for rental or mortgage assistance.

The Town Poor Program cost the Town of Weare \$37,241.00 during 1990, which is up significantly from the \$11,023.93 spent in 1989. Additionally, \$4,735.00 was contributed to the Contoocook Valley Counseling Center and \$360.00 for the Meals on Wheels program. In addition, a one-time contribution of \$1,000.00 was made from this account to the Charpentier Children's Fund following the tragic murder-suicide of the children's parents in early 1990.

The holiday season was once again particularly busy. More than 20 families received food baskets at Thanksgiving and again at Christmas. The efforts of the Daniel Webster Council of the Boy Scouts of America and, in particular, the Weare Boy Scouts who collected food for the holiday season made this effort tremendously successful.

In addition, Christmas wishes of toys and clothes were provided to nearly 25 needy children in our community through a local "Operation Santa Claus".

The Town's holiday efforts were coordinated through a "Weare Care's" program which organized charitable donations and efforts by local community, school, church and government organizations. The "Weare Care's" program, which has promise of continuing for the community's benefit in the future, was spearheaded by the Weare Lions Club with assistance from Weare School Nurse, Ann Colburn and Overseer of Public Welfare, William G. Herman.

After three years of extremely dedicated and professional service to the Town of Weare, Overseer of Public Welfare, Phyllis Azotea, resigned the position in August, 1990 as her family relocated to Tennessee. The Board of Selectmen appointed William G. Herman to serve in this capacity until a new Overseer could be elected at the March, 1991 Town Elections. Mrs. Azotea provided the Town of Weare with established, formal guidelines for public assistance while providing the community with an extremely caring, yet fiscally prudent process for meeting the needs of those less fortunate residents of our community.

PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION

This has been a very productive year: improvements and additions to present facilities has been the Commission's priority. Chase Park started the year with 225 yards of replenished screened beach sand at the south end beach, and completed the year with a new cement block dressing room with storage area. In use upon the closing of the Park for the season, we can now store equipment under lock and key away from the weather.

The weather was not too cooperative at Chase Park this year with an average temperature of 77.8 degrees throughout the summer. There were six rainout days, six days with showers, and nine days with a temperature of 65 degrees and below.

Anticipated revenues surpassed 1989 sales and our daily records revealed the following: 691 season tickets sold, 213 second car decals, 35 senior citizens, 163 nonresidential boat launching, 54 resident boat launchings, 793 nonresidential adult and children ticket sales, and five special outings for groups. Red Cross and private swimming lessons were offered and will be continued in 1991. Unfortunately, vandalism and theft still prevailed which created an inconvenience for the patrons and unnecessary expense for residents.

The tennis court had increased activity as well. Although we hoped to have flood lights in operation, they had not been completed by closing. Hybrid Poplar trees were planted on the west and partially on the north sides of the tennis court. When fully grown, the trees will act as a sun screen from the mid-afternoon sun. Combination locks remain in effect and have proven effective to prevent alternative uses of the tennis court. In the 1991 season, players will have to acquire a new combination number as the numbers were changed at the closing of the 1990 season.

The ballpark at Salmen Road, used extensively by the Little League for practice and scheduled games, also had a few improvements. Two sections of the backstop were replaced to provide more height and safety for spectators. Two sets of aluminum bleachers, a combination snack bar and storage building, and a 100-watt high sodium night light were also added to the ballpark. Hopefully a four and one-half foot high chainlink fence, which will separate the wetlands from the ballfield, can be installed before the 1991 schedule begins.

PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION

As the number of children who participate in recreational activities continues to grow, so too does the demand for community facilities. During 1991, there were 234 little league and 290 soccer players in action. Another 265 children played basketball, but had to compete with other activities and events for the shared facility.

At this time, the Commission wishes to thank all those who recognized the needs of the community and helped improve these facilities. Through our cooperative effort, we now have three quality recreational areas. As the town grows, so too does the need of its citizens.

PLANNING BOARD

In spite of the slow down in the New Hampshire real estate market, the Board has had a busy year. The Board met in 1990, a total of 30 times to review 77 plans ranging from adjustments, bonafide gifts, and site plan reviews. And even though the number of plans have dropped, as expected, the complexity of these plans are ever increasing.

Once again, the March 1990 March Town Meeting supported the Planning Board in its recommendations for zoning changes and changes to the Building Code. As the community changes, these changes to the ordinances become necessary for the safety, health and welfare of all and this continued support by the public is greatly appreciated.

The Planning Board has amended the Master Plan with the adoption of the Water Resource Protection Section and will be updating the other various sections this upcoming year. Also, the redrafting of the subdivision regulations are near completion, and the Board looks forward to public input this coming year.

A subcommittee has been appointed to draft the Capital Improvement Plan chaired by Donald Hambidge. The Board would like to take this opportunity to thank Donald Hambidge, William G. Herman, Denise Purington, Francis Bolton, Jr., Suzanne Kelly, Rodman Wilson and Harold Hall for their many hours of hard work and dedication to this project. The Planning Board is very concerned with the formulation of a viable and efficient plan that will help to lessen the overall impact of the tax rate and will project the needs of the Town in a timely manner for proper future planning of capital expenditures.

Changes to the Board have been minimal. Francis Bolton, Jr. has moved to an alternate capacity, Richard Townes has become a full member, and the Board has welcomed the appointment of Timothy Reade as an alternate. There now exists two unfilled alternate positions.

As the Town grows, future planning has become more and more critical to the development of a safe and prosperous community for all citizens. Therefore, the Board as always, welcomes all interested residents to attend our meetings, and we look forward to your opinions and ideas.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

ACTIVITY

During 1990, major areas of concern to police and citizens were the large number of assaults, burglaries, thefts, criminal mischief, and disorderly conduct. As shown in the statistics, these incidents contributed to a large portion of the officers' time. Of special concern were the large amount of dog complaints and false alarms. These incidents occur because dog and alarm owners do not take care of their responsibilities, which in turn becomes a problem to the police department. Although this problem has been expressed over the past years, and owners have been spoken to, false alarms and dog complaints still take officers away from other more serious crimes. Although not everyone in Weare owns a dog or has an alarm, every taxpayer had to pay for answering these complaints. I have asked the Selectmen to initiate an ordinance to deal with false alarms.

STAFFING

Three part-time officers resigned, leaving the department without sufficient staff to cover shifts during the end of the year. A lot of time and money has been spent to train and equip part-time officers but due to other jobs or commitments, they have not stayed with the department. The Town must consider hiring full-time officers whose job and commitment is to the Town of Weare and who will stay with the department and devote their efforts to the job of being a police officer.

The recent survey completed during 1990 shows that Weare is far below towns of similar size in the number of full-time officers. In the survey of 20 towns, the average population is 5,568, with 34.4 square miles and 92.9 roads miles. In contrast, Weare has a population of 6,193, is 64 square miles and has 130 miles of road. The police staff in the surveyed towns was an average of seven full-time officers and eight part-time. Weare has only two full-time and five part-time. The budget average was \$342,397.00 for these towns but for 1990 the Weare Police budget was \$154,000.00. It is not possible for the Weare Police to properly handle your calls with the current staffing.

EQUIPMENT

The two portable radios approved last year were purchased and put into service in July. Officers now have dependable communications when they are away from their cruiser. The Town still needs to replace the other radios which we continuously spend repair money on, to keep them operating.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The new computer system was installed in November and is providing a daily log, monthly statistics and officers reports. The system will be a time saver for the department and will provide accurate and up-to-date reports and statistics.

With the defeat of last year's warrent article of a four-wheel drive vehicle for the department, we are now faced with the required replacement of two vehicles this year. Two vehicles have well over 100,000 miles and cannot continue as primary response cars. The high costs of repairs this year far exceeded the budget amount. I have recommended that the Town lease new vehicles, one a 4WD and the other a regular cruiser. The lease plan offers a stabilized tax rate for the Town as opposed to the large purchase cost of vehicles. Also the purchase of police vehicles is a poor investment for the Town as the return on costs after being used for police vehicles is minimal. The Town should also sell or trade the two oldest police vehicles, a 1982 and 1986.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

During 1990, three Neighborhood Crime Watch groups were organized with over 100 people participating. Crime Watch is an informal group of citizens who work with the police in observing and reporting crimes or suspicious activity in the neighborhood. It is not possible for a police department to cover an entire town and know everything that is suspicious. Generally neighbors know who belongs in the area and what is out of place. With citizen cooperation, the police can be successful in reducing the serious crime rate in Weare. Any group interested in organizing a crime watch may contact the Chief for more information.

The NH State Police started the DARE program in the Weare Elementary School during 1990 and will be continuing in 1991. This program provides information and help to our children in resisting drug use. The LIONS organization in Weare is also working with local officials and organizations towards reducing the serious drug problem in town. The New Hampshire State Police with Weare and Henniker Police presented an Alcohol Awareness program at John Stark Regional High School and will be offering the program again in 1991. Alcohol is a drug, and abuse of alcohol by our teenagers is also a problem in Weare. Education is the best method available to make our children aware of the dangers of alcohol and drug abuse.

The Weare police joined with Henniker and Bradford police in sponsoring a Law Enforcement Explorer Post for teenagers. This self-supporting group will give our youth some insight into police work and an opportunity to be involved in their communities.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

During 1990, I revised the six year plan for the police department and submitted it to the Board of Selectmen. Weekly reports and monthly statistics were also given to the Selectmen throughout the year. I also submitted capital improvement needs to the study committee again, as they requested.

In this time of depressed economic conditions, it is difficult for everyone to make ends meet. Coupled with this is the fact that crimes and police calls in Weare have increased due to the economy. Without enough full-time officers and funding, the police department cannot offer adequate protection and perform proper criminal investigations. I have asked for two full-time officers to cover the required shifts and give you the service needed. This decision must be made by you, the voter. Whatever the outcome, I will continue to do my best to give the services available with my budget.

WEARE PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

This year saw the start of a two-phase building project for the Weare Public Library which would have provided much needed space at a remarkably reduced cost, compared to 1987 projections.

Funds for the first phase would have been provided by the Library's Capital Reserve Fund, Town Trust Funds and a generous private donation. The second phase would have been funded by an expected federal grant administered through the State and matching funds. However, unanticipated difficulties of coordination with the federal funding cycle and application process forced a temporary halt of the construction. At year's end Trustees and Selectmen are investigating what the next steps will be for the much needed expansion project.

In the meantime circulation has shot up again with 26,300 books circulated in 1990, making it a 15% increase over last year's figures. This also means more reference questions researched, answered, and books borrowed from other libraries using our donated IBM computer and modem.

Story hours and summer reading programs fulfill a very important need in the community. Space limitations prohibit the expansion of these programs and make it almost impossible to carry out the ones we now have which are filled to capacity.

In May the Library received a \$1,000.00 grant from the Prudential Foundation in recognition of the volunteer work Keith Lion had contributed as a Library Trustee. The Library purchased an air conditioner with part of these funds and also with money contributed by the Friends of the Weare Public Library.

The Nashua Trust Company donated \$200.00 in support of Library services for children, and the Weare Extension Club donated money for large print books needed by visually impaired children.

Our gratitude goes out to our volunteers and all who contributed in various ways for the benefit of the Library and the Town of Weare.

SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

All dues-paying members of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission are offered a wide range of services, resources and technical assistance by a professional planning staff who, from time-to-time, are assisted by specialized consultants on an as-needed basis. Under the direction of your representatives, the staff develops and carries out planning programs that require a regional perspective, as well as those which pertain more directly to your community.

Local planning assistance requests are generally received from your Planning Board and/or the Board of Selectmen. With the concurrence of the commission, certain general studies are conducted, notifications made and training workshops held that are considered essential for all member municipalities.

Services that were performed for the Town of Weare during the past year are as follows:

1. Provided testimonies, some in support and some in opposition, to the House and Senate Committees of the 1990 Legislative Session on a few bills which pertain to planning and zoning. SB 337, SB 358, SB 359, HB 1121, HB 1119, and HB 1375 dealing with impact fees deserve a special mention.
2. Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture meetings. These meetings were attended by Weare officials.
3. Conducted a six-hour training workshop for the Planning Board Members. The Weare Planning and Zoning Boards were invited to that workshop.
4. Provided limited assistance in developing a CIP (Capital Improvement Program) for the town.
5. Staff efforts were devoted to re-creating some of the maps and the text of the Master Plan for its reprinting.

TRANSFER STATION

The Transfer Station opened for use on April 28, 1990. At the time of this report, 1,722 permit stickers have been given out, as well as three licenses for the commercial waste haulers operating in Weare. There are also four septic pumping companies which dispose of material into the lagoons. Weare is a member of the Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resource Recovery Cooperative. Our household refuse, which is averaging about 60 tons per week, is transported to their incinerator at Penacook, New Hampshire. The tipping fee for 1991 has been set at \$37.45 per ton, and our quota is 3,168 tons. An average of 27 tons monthly of demolition debris is disposed of at a licensed landfill in Bethlehem, New Hampshire. So far this year about 100 tons of scrap metal and about 72 tons of newspaper have been removed. Through October of this year, approximately \$11,000.00 has been received from fees and sales of recyclables.

Plans and procedures for implementing a more comprehensive recycling program are in process. This has been slower in being implemented than had been hoped for, due to permitting and construction delays for Resource Conservation Services, Inc., of Hooksett, New Hampshire. A contract with them to receive, sort, and market recyclables is being reviewed at this time (end of November, 1990). When this is formalized and accepted, more definitive procedures and facilities can be created, including informational material and meetings for residents and businesses.

The hours of operation for the Transfer Station are 7:00 am to 3:30 pm Tuesday through Saturday. Copies of rules and regulations are available at the station; if there are questions, please feel free to contact the staff.

We would like to thank the townspeople, the commercial haulers, the Town Highway Department, and all others who have provided valuable assistance in adapting to the new facilities and operations.

WEARE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Weare Economic Development Committee met five times during 1990. During the early part of the year, it focused its discussion on the desirability and possible location of a town industrial park.

By mid-summer however, the deterioration of the state and regional economies was obvious. It also appeared that the State of New Hampshire would be focusing its industrialization efforts on the re-development of Pease Air Force Base.

An industrial park in Weare would face very tough competition at present and the committee decided to shelve the idea at least until the economy looked more promising. The committee began to work on an alternate economic development plan, eventually settling on an idea that capitalized on the rural aspects of the town - its many lakes and streams, hilly terrain, and woodlands.

The proposition is to build a series of campgrounds, one of the Town's more successful business forms, and add a hotel/restaurant/conference center to the package. The property would be developed and owned by the town and franchised out for operation. The franchise fees would be returned to the town to pay construction expenses and profits would be used to off-set property taxes.

The plan would provide jobs and increased revenues to the town without unduly taxing the town's services. Service businesses ranging from restaurants to sporting good stores would hopefully follow.

The Board of Selectmen have put \$5,000.00 in this year's budget to study the feasibility of the Committee's ideas.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Society's museum was visited by many school groups and members of the public. A new kitchen display was installed by Arlene Thorp and Carole Wigsten and was much appreciated by visitors. On view were some gifts received this year, including a Quaker wedding certificate dated 1800, a photograph of the Weare Coronet Band, a model of the Town Hall, advertising fans, posters, and an autograph book of a young lady of East Weare from the late 19th century.

The Society put on five programs for its members and the public, organized by Dennis Paquette. In the spring, the Granite State Wheelmen demonstrated antique bicycles, including the penny-farthing, and Stuart Wallace spoke of 19th century travellers and tourists in New Hampshire. In the fall, James Garvin told of early exploration on Weare before 1750; Carole Wigston illustrated how to make colonial Christmas decorations.

Thirty additional members joined the Society as a result of a membership drive. There are now 175 members enjoying and supporting local history.

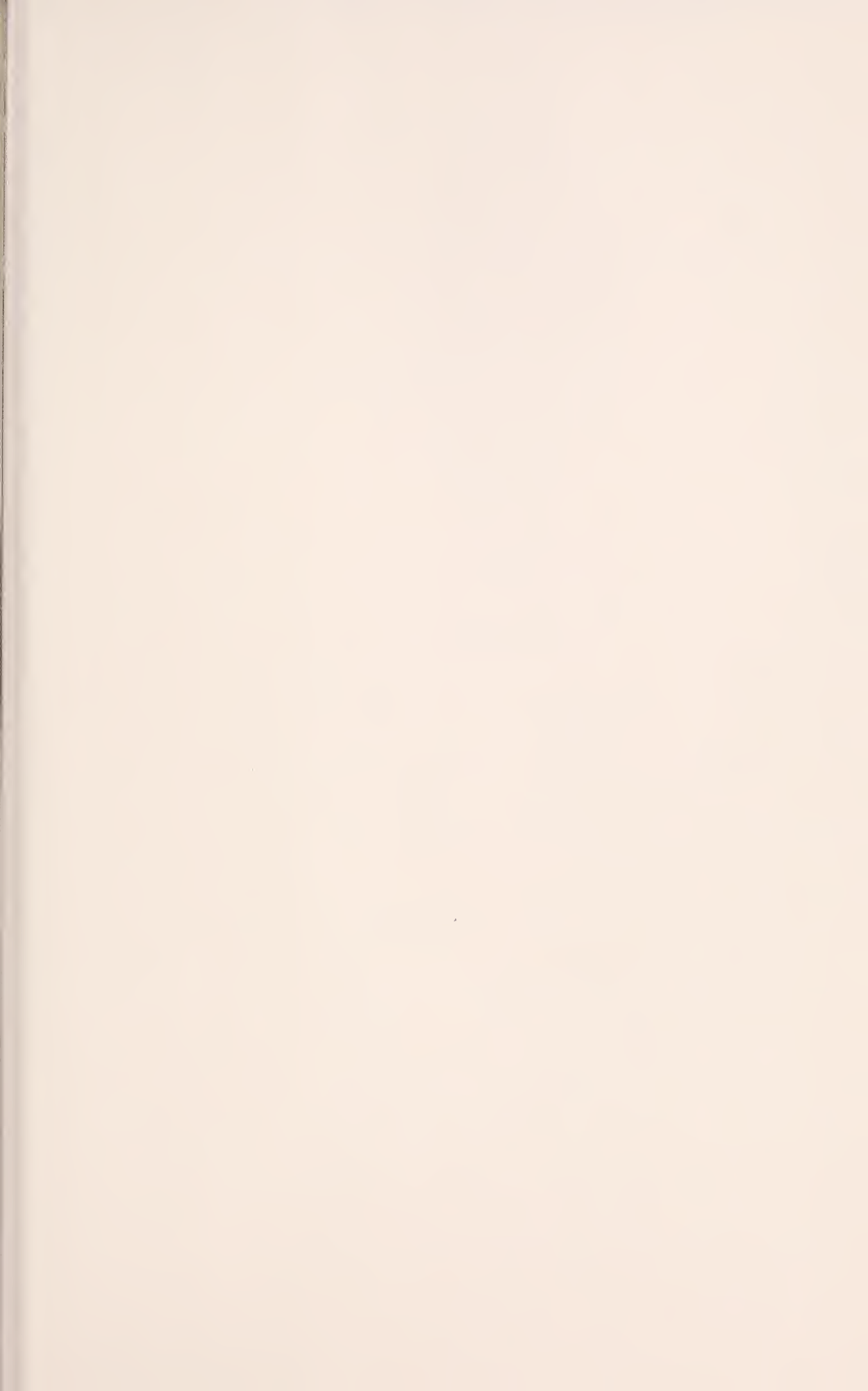

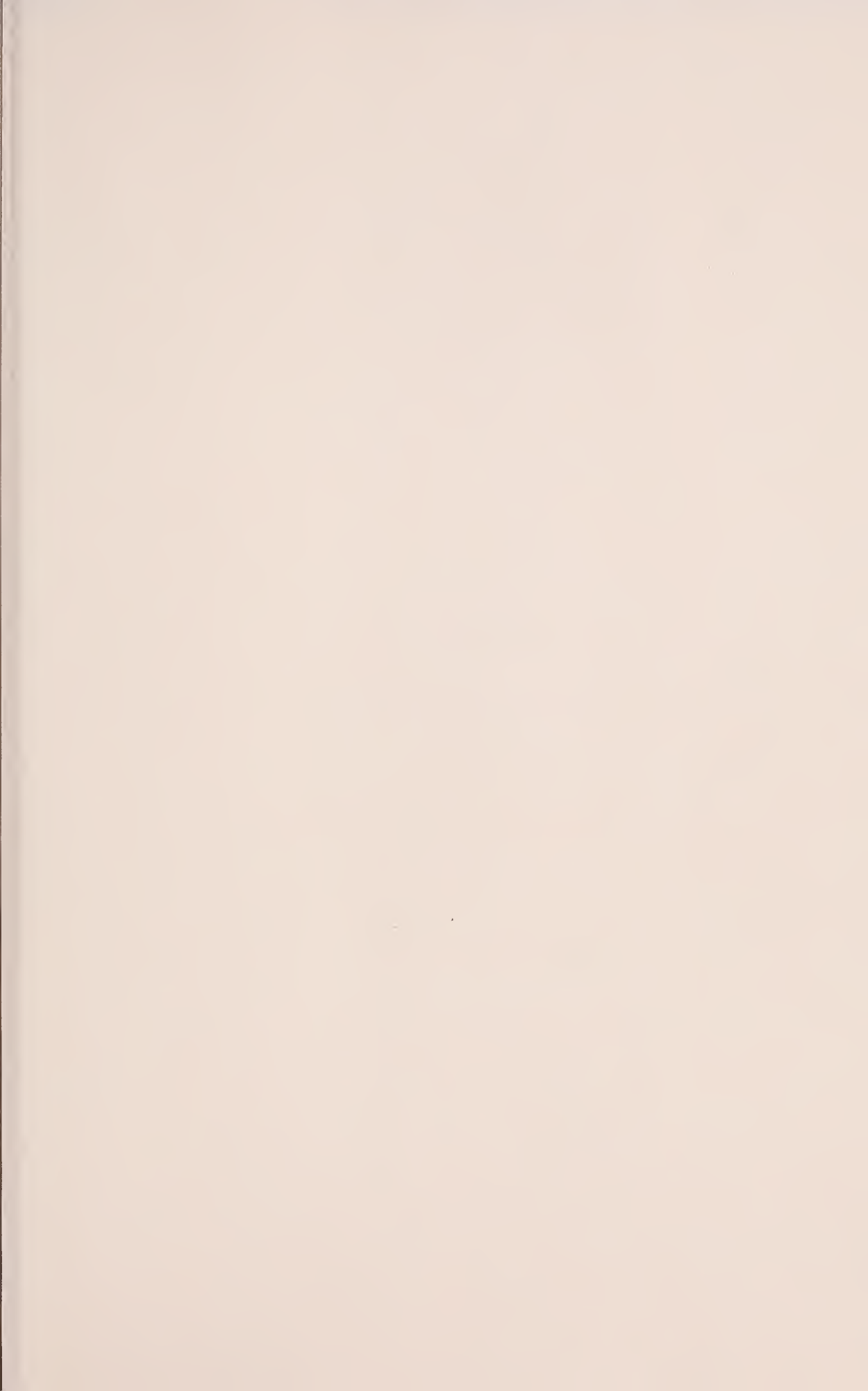
