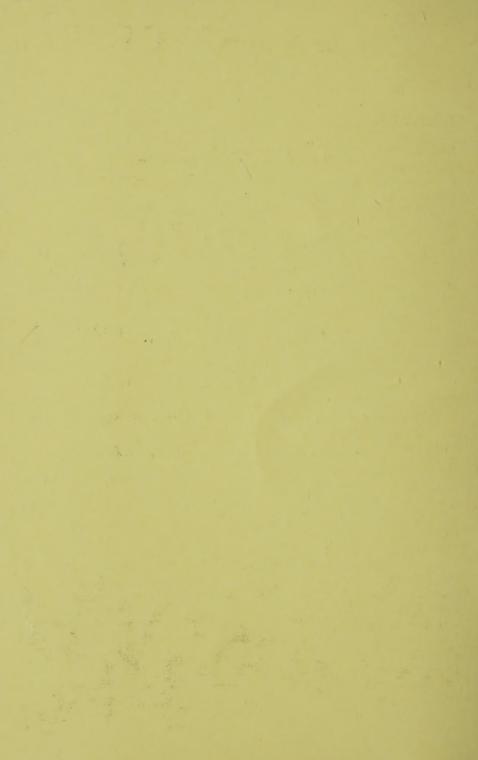

The polls will open at 1:00 P. M., and will not close before 8:00 P. M.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the sixth day of March, next at seven of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the reports of Agents and Auditors, and take any action relating thereto.

*4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$890.00 as its fair share of operating costs of Elliot Community Hospital.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to be deposited in the present Town History Savings Account; the principal to be used toward the printing of a Town History and Genealogy, the interest to be used for accumulating material for the same; or take any other action relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote for Class IV or Class V roads construction; reconstruction or betterment aid, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$830.74, the State contributing \$5,538.26.

*7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$387.00 for support of the Monadnock Regional Association.

*8 To see if the Town will permit the Westmoreland Athletic Association. Inc. to play basketball in the Town Hall. in accordance with rules and regulations mutually agreed upon by the Association and the Selectmen of the year 1972 until the next annual meeting.

9. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding of either Class V or Class IV roads, or to take any other action relating thereto, to raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate in addition to what is required by law for highways and bridges.

11. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord Fund.

*12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$339.00 — 30 cents per capita, for Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

*13. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Conservation Commission as set forth in R. S. A. 36-A; and that the Selectmen appoint said Commission within 30 days from the date of the Annual meeting and that a temporary chairman be appointed to call the first meeting of the Commission.

*14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Benton D. Mellinger past the Henry Dutton place, so called, to its junction with the road leading from South Village to the County Farm, said road having been discontinued subject to gates and bars under Article 16 of the Town Meeting of Westmoreland of March 12, 1957.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the remaining Trust Funds now held by the East Westmoreland Cemetery Association.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Planning Board to locate a parcel of land suitable for a highway garage and storage of highway material.

17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum, not to exceed \$50,000.00, for the purchase of land, the erection of a suitable highway garage, and the purchase of necessary highway equipment; to authorize the withdrawal of Capital Reserve Funds of \$8,500.00 and the withdrawal of \$16,000.00 of Revenue Sharing Funds as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972; the balance to be paid by issuing bonds or notes, payable in three years starting in 1974.

18. If Article 17 is voted, to see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to select a committee of three persons to work with the Selectmen to implement the provisions of the Article.

*19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to repaint the outside of the Town Hall.

*20. To see what action the Town would take relative to hiring two full-time men for the Highway Department; compensation to be set by vote of the Town. In the event two men who would be willing to accept the positions for the compensation voted by the Town cannot be found, the matter of compensation shall be left to the descretion of the Selectmen.

*21. To see if the Town will vote to purchase two new trucks and two new snow plows and a front-end loader for the Town Highway Department; and authorize the Selectmen to issue notes or serial bonds for the payment of same. *22. To see if the Town will vote to replace the present fixed salary paid the Tax Collector by a variable salary based on a percentage of the Warrant, as recommended by the New Hampshire Municipal Association, effective as of April 1, 1973.

*23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the three Selectmen to \$900.00 each.

*24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the Trustees of Trust Funds to \$50.00 each.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for a new roof for the Firehouse.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for a new roof and insulation of the ceiling for the Town Library.

27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget, as submitted by the Budget Committee under the authority of the Municipal Budget Act. This Budget may be considered item by item or as a whole but may not be increased more than ten per cent, in any item as a whole.

28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

29. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING

March 7, 1972

The Annual Town Meeting of Westmoreland was opened at 10:00 A.M. by Moderator Pro Tem, Donald A. Paine who read the Warrant and opened the polls for voting. Mr. Paine was sworn in by the Town Clerk prior to the meeting.

Moderator Hood called the regular Town Meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. with the reading of the Warrant. He also set forth rules of procedure for the meeting as to questions and debate, and stated that the polls would remain open for voting until all had voted.

Article 2. Mr. Moore moved this article be taken up under Article 16, which was the Town Budget. Seconded and voted in the affirmative.

Article 3. Moved and seconded that the reports be accepted as set forth in the Town Report. Voted in the affirmative.

Article 4,5,6,7,8,9,10 were passed in the affirmative with no discussion.

Article 11. There was discussion about the sum of money involved. This was passed over to Article 16 for consideration with the Budget. Voted in the affirmative.

Article 12. It was moved and seconded that the income of the Jotham Lord Fund be used for the Westmoreland Library. Voted in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted in the affirmative.

Article 14. Moved, seconded, voted in the affirmative.

Article 15. After some discussion about the need for an additional \$200. (there is still \$200. left from last year) the motion was put to a vote. Because of the closeness of the voice vote a show of hands was called for. Aye-40 Nay-62. The motion was declared defeated.

Article 16. Moved and seconded that the Budget be taken up item by item.

Discussion: The sum of \$4700. was discussed. Wesley Staples said this amount included \$2500. to surface and prepare a parking lot for the Town Hall.

Increase in Police Department. The Budget Committee said as expenses were nearly this figure it was decided to so set it out for this year. The usual complaints about roads, etc. were aired. The Chair entertained a motion from Lawrence Stevens to increase Public Welfare by 10% as allowed by the Municipal Budget Act. Upon vote this was defeated.

A motion was made to APPROVE THE BUDGET AND APPROPRIATE AND RAISE MONEY FOR ITEMS NOT ALREADY VOTED ON. Seconded and voted in the affirmative.

Article 17. There was discussion as to why Stone Assoc. wanted to give this land to the Town. It is not salable and the thought was put forth that it might well be used to construct a fire pond. Mr. Moore presented the following motion: Move that the Town of Westmoreland accept from G.W. Stone approximately 7 acres of land located at the entrance to their Owl's Hill Project, so called, the only restriction being that the Town accept this land as permanent green space, not subject to sale at any time in the future. Seconded, passed in the affirmatiie.

Article 18. Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

Article 19. The first subject for discussion was presented by Carl Messer as follows: The Selectmen could not open a closed or abandoned road without the vote of the Townspeople. This was discussed and after several attempts the final motion was voted on as follows: MOTION: No Class VI road can be opened without the authority of the Townspeople. Seconded and voted in the affirmative. In reference to the above it was brought out that some members of Town are presently trying to establish the status of all roads abandoned, closed, etc. The Selectmen felt they would like this motion made as it would help them when new land owners felt the Town should summarily rebuild a road for them.

Mrs. Hurwitz then made the following motion: There be no overnight parking on Town roads during the winter months of November through March so as to facilitate plowing and sanding and if necessary this is to be published in any pertinent periodicals and strictly enforced by the Constable and Selectmen. Seconded. There was discussion on this motion to the effect that this was the matter for the Constable to take care of and also that it was a law of the State of N.H. It was seconded, and a call for a vote was made. Because of the difficulty in ascertaining the vote a show of hands was called for.

RESULT: Aye-72 Nay-34

Mr. Rouner made a motion as follows: Moved the Selectmen are directed to appoint an appropriate committee to investigate the status of existing, unused or little used roads in the Town, including abandoned roads, roads closed to gates and bars, discontinued roads, Class VI roads and other such categories and report back to the next regular Town Meeting with recommendations and the necessary funds be taken from any available funds. Seconded. After a short discussion period this was voted on by a show of hands. Aye-53 Nay-31. Mr. Rouner also called attention to the fact that Westmoreland is written up in the Fall Folder of Monadnock Region.

Mr. Putnam reminded everyone that the Planning Board is to be held Wednesday next, at 7:30 P.M.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 8:35 P.M.

The Polls closed at 9:02 P.M.

LIBRARY REPORT

It has been a continuing year of progress for your Library. During this past year we were open an additional two hours Monday evening during Daylight Saving Time, held a Children's Summer Reading Program during the month of July, are distributing both reading and audio visual materials to the County Home and are conducting a program for the Kindergarten children. In addition to this, we are continuing our efforts to classify our book stock...a time consuming process which serves you in your search for specific subjects.

We are greatly indebted to Lucy Thompson, Katherine Warner, Mildred Greene and the Westmoreland Snowbelters Club for their monetary contributions this past year. Their gifts have added immeasurably to our ability to purchase interesting reading material for you. Your Library, over the years, has received many gift books for which we are grateful. Our appreciation is also extended to Mrs. Russell Prange for her many gifts of children's books.

As stated in last year's report, we are still a member of the Affiliated Libraries of New Hampshire. We sincerely hope that we can continue to be a member. The benefits we receive are, namely, bookmobile service and the ability to obtain your specific book requests through the District Library Office, Inter-Library Loan, or directly from the State Library in Concord.

The State Library Commission has published minimum qualifications that must be met in order to remain affiliated with the State Library Development Program. We do not meet these qualifications. For a Town with a population over 1000, the physical plant should be open 15 hours a week, should have toilet facilities with both cold and hot running water, and a telephone. We must make progress toward these physical goals by June 30, 1974, or we shall loose the many benefits of membership.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board in 1972 held meetings on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month, with several extra meetings during the year. Much time was required finishing the Subdivision Regulations, which became effective in August.

Four major sub-divisions with a total of 86 lots in Westmoreland were presented to the Planning Board for approval, with enough legal problems attached to have the Planning Board retain Mr. Charles Morang of Keene, as our legal advisor. Mr. Morang attended 7 meetings, during the year, with Sub-division problems involved. During the year we also had several minor sub-divisions of 5 or less lots each.

In April, we were asked by the Selectmen to study the road status of each and every road in Westmoreland. Mrs. Marjorie Hudson completed a thorough study from old records, on actions taken on roads in past years. A review by the Planning Board with Mr. Morang found that about one third of the roads, believed to be discontinued, were not legally discontinued. However, they are now Class VI roads.

Class V Rural Highways consist of all highways, which the Town has the duty to maintain regularly.

Class VI Highways, consist of all other existing public ways, including (1) highways discontinued as open highways, (2) highways closed subject to gates and bars, and (3) highways not maintained in suitable condition for travel for five years or more.

When does a Class V road become a Class VI road? When Town meeting discontinues an open road subject to gates and bars or when road is not maintained by the Town in suitable condition for travel for 5 consecutive years or more.

When does a Class VI road become a Class V road? When the Town maintains the road or when the Selectmen lay out a Class IV or V highway.

Many roads in question can now be classed as VI with no chance of reopening unless the Town accepts them back as Class V. The Planning Board's stand is, No road shall be considered for Class V unless it shall have been brought up to the Westmoreland Town Road Specifications.

The Planning Board would like to have two more members, so we could split the work into a planning group and a subdivision group, both of which take a lot of time if you are to become knowledge-able in the problems and recommendations for possible solutions. Our meetings are always open to the public and you are always welcome to attend. We meet the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month at 8:00 P.M. at the Town Hall. Come and visit. We can always use some extra help.

The scene on the cover of this town report is of the "East Village" in the early part of the nineteen hundreds.

In the upper left is seen Gilboa railroad station situated near Mt. Gilboa. This was once a busy place, with mail going out and coming in several times a day, milk, express and freight, and many passengers. The station was removed in the thirties, although mail was sent and received from the stop until a motor route was established when passenger trains ceased to operate soon after the close of World War II.

The grocery store and the post office were in the Omer Thompson residence on the west corner of Gully Road (now called Gilbo Road) and the main road (Route #13);this building has since burned. The one-room school house was on Gully Road north of the store. Union Church, built in 1852, is on the north side of the main road, and the house directly across from the church was the Baptist parsonage.

The picture inside this report is of Centennial Hall which was situated south of the main road and opposite the Gully Road. In 1876 Albert and Carrie Thompson deeded a piece of land 30' x 60' to the East Westmoreland Public Hall Association for the purpose of erecting thereon a public building, with the condition that should the association cease to exist the premises would revert to said Albert Thompson or his heirs, but in that event the building could be removed by the grantees.

The Hall was used until the nineteen thirties. It was used for public suppers, and the ladies of the community were noted for their oyster stews, baked beans, harvest suppers and maple sugar suppers. The local Ladies Aid held quilting bees there, the P.T.A. and Men's Club used the Hall for their programs, and the residents will never forget the annual community Christmas program and huge tree lighted with real candles fastened to its branches.

The Hall had a floor good for dancing and people came from Surry, Walpole and Keene to dance to the music of the fiddles, and very popular was Henry Rogers with his "bull fiddle." In winter folks came up from Keene in horsedrawn barges, each carrying about twenty people. The horses were stabled in Thompson's barn during the evening.

About 1874 there were several residents who owned fancy teams and had a riding park around the circumference of "the Flat" (which was the area of East Westmoreland Village); the track had a judge's stand for the races held there. In September of 1874 eighteen ladies of the village donated fourteen dollars to purchase a large American flag to display over the rostrum in Centennial Hall, and for the judge's stand of the riding park. The flag can be seen in the picture in this report. On Fourth of July and Labor Day large celebrations were held.

When the automobile made it possible for people to travel outside, interest waned and the Centennial Hall association no longer existed. The Hall was sold and razed in the nineteen thirties, and the lumber was used in some of the houses since built in the village.

REPORT OF HISTORY COMMITTEE

During this past year the Committee has received from several interested contributors detailed history of the Park Hill church, the Congregational church, the brick church, Old Home Day celebrations, Cedarcrest, the mines, and the Men's Club.

Genealogy research is continuing, and the money has been earned and turned over to the Committee by Mrs. Marjorie Hudson for genealogical information supplied to out-of-town correspondents.

It is the intent of the Committee that all material gathered, whether finally included in the published history or not, will be preserved and made available for public reference. Therefore, it is our hope that people will still continue to contribute diaries, photographs, facts, writings, old maps, atlases, artifacts, memories, etc. so that someday soon Westmoreland will have in one place as complete a picture of its past life as is possible to portray.

Theere are still several topics to be researched for the written history, and the Committee is hopeful that interested people will come forward to take up these projects.

We are most grateful for all that has been accomplished, and look forward to your help and interest in the coming year.

Report of the Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control, but once allowed to run wild, it can become a disastrous and devastating Force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

Article 5. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Article 6. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Agreeable to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters having met at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the moderator, Marcius Butterfield, at 6:00 P.M., March 10, 1972. The polls were declared open for voting, under Article 1. At 7:30 P.M. the meeting was declared open for business by the moderator. The school warrant was read.

Article 2. Winnie Cox made the motion which was seconded, that the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers, as printed in the Town Report, be accepted. By a voice vote, the motion carried.

Article 3. Maureen Herrick made the motion which was seconded, that the District authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state or private agency. By a voice vote the motion carried.

Article 4. Don Hall, a member of the School Board, explained the A.R.E.A. planning committee, as it applies to the Westmoreland school. Mr. Churchill made the motion which was seconded that the committee be authorized to continue the study for the ensuing year. The administrative staff attending the meeting, answered many questions. Lois Delano spoke against making any definite decision under the A.R.E.A. study. The school board wishes to know the opinion of the people regarding continuing further study.

Robert Cox asked to have Mr. Day explain the advantage of sending local children to Keene for their schooling, and to explain more about the A.R.E.A. program, which was done.

By a voice vote, the motion made by Mr. Churchill was voted in the affirmative.

Article 5. Lois Delano made the motion which was seconded and voted that Article 5 be taken up under Article 8.

Article 6. John Terry made the motion which was seconded that the sum of \$201,277., as recommended by the Budget Committee, be accepted for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Donald Paine expressed the desire to have the budget taken up item by item, which was done. By a voice vote, the original motion was carried

Article 7. Roger Adams made the motion which was seconded and voted, to pass over this article.

Article 5 & 8. The school board feel they will have a chance to purchase land adjoining the present school, so they would like to have the meeting adjourned until a later date, when they will have more to report to the voters. Wesley Staples made the motion which was seconded that the school board have the authority, if necessary, to take an option on the land, before the adjourned meeting. By a voice vote, the motion carried. Lois Delano made the motion which was seconded that the district adjourn this meeting until Wednesday, May 24, 1972, at 7:30 P.M., at the Town Hall, to take further action regarding the purchase of property as stipulated under Article 5. By a voice vote the motion carried.

- The business meeting was adjourned, the polls to remain open until 9:00 P.M.
- The polls were closed at 9:00 P.M. and the following officers were elected:

Moderator - Marcius R. Butterfield received 63 votes and was declared elected.

- Clerk Dorothy R. Rhodes received 62 votes and was declared elected.
- School Board Member for three years Donald E. Hall received 63 votes and was declared elected.
- District Treasurer Marjorie A. Hudson received 63 votes and was declared elected.
- Auditors Griffith Royea received 63 votes and was declared elected.
 - Robert Cox received 17 votes and was declared elected.

Also receiving votes were Mary Ann Putnam, Marcia Starkey, Gilbert Bigelow, Bertha Staples, Arthur Herrick, Kenneth Woolley, Annie Shelley and Heather Beaman.

The officers were sworn in.

The meeting was declared adjourned until May 24, at 7:30 P.M.

(ADJOURNED DISTRICT MEETING)

The adjourned meeting of the Westmoreland School District was called to order by the moderator, Marcius Butterfield, Wednesday, May 24, at 7:30 P.M. at the Town Hall.

Mr. Butterfield read Article 5.

Roger Adams made the following motion, which was seconded, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for the purchase of approximately 17 acres of land bounding the present Westmoreland School from the Theodore A. Gerould Estate and that the Board of Education be authorized and given full power to contract for and effectuate said transaction to include, but not meaning to be limited thereto, the payment for same and any costs and expenses in connection with said transaction.

A discussion followed with many questions asked.

Supt. Day and Lois Delano told of their visit to the lawyer of the Estate, Mr. Hayward.

The original motion was voted, and by a unanimous vote, the motion carried. There being no other business, the annual school ditrict meeting for 1972 was declared adjourned.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

January, 1973

FINANCE

Westmoreland has every right to be proud of its educational system. Dollars do not come easy to a small school district with a limited tax base. Financial sacrifice for the welfare of a town's most valuable product--the children--has been self-evident.

A dedicated professional staff has presented to the Administration and School Board a budget which represents an honest concern for the general welfare of the students of Westmoreland, along with a concern for the taxpayer, who must support the best possible education within the current tax structure.

Requests for salary adjustments and modest increases in the instructional accounts represent approximately an increase of only 3.4% over last year's budget.

An increase of \$26,000.00 in the tuition account is based upon additional estimated numbers of students tuitioned to Keene High School, along with an increase of tuition rates. These increased rates are based upon new staff, new programs, and new subjects offered at Keene High School which will benefit Westmoreland students. It is interesting to note that the tuition rate at Keene High School is lower than surrounding school districts having similar programs.

Additional costs are reflected in Westmoreland's support for the Supervisory Union. Additional staff to service the districts in the Supervisory Union is needed.

Every Westmoreland resident should demand increased State financial support in order to promote equity of the tax burden.

MAINTENANCE

Every effort is being made to insure that the Westmoreland School property is kept at a high level of efficiency, cleanliness, and appearance. We have a commitment to protect your long-range investment of dollars and hope you are proud of the present facility.

EDUCATION

Many new educational activities have developed at your school during the past year.

Westmoreland was the first school in Supervisory Union 29 to develop and implement an activity period for students. This activity period provides your youngsters with opportunities to pursue academic as well as cultural experiences which far exceed the basic reading, writing, and arithmetic.

An instrumental music program has been developed at the school for students who wish to pursue musical enrichment, at no additional cost to the taxpayer.

A variety of field experiences in terms of activities over and above those offered within the confines of the school have been made available to the students.

An updating of curriculum material, particularly in the areas of English and math, has made the matriculation to Keene High School that much easier for our eighth grade students.

Recent studies have indicated that the Westmoreland students, by and large, perform very well at Keene High School when compared with Keene students and students from other sending districts.

A LOOK AHEAD

Within the near future, serious consideration must be given to the implementation of new services and programs at the Westmoreland School, particularly in the areas of music, art, library, and guidance services.

A cooperative effort will be made by your School Board and administration to insure that the pupils of Westmoreland receive the highest quality of education possible within the financial limits of the District.

- 173 pupils received hearing tests
- 3 pupils received hearing notices for defects
- 173 pupils were weighed and measured
- 173 pupils received health inspections 8 pupils appeared to be in need of dental care
 - 60 pupils participated in the urine testing program
- 110 pupils participated in the Sternneedle Tuberculosis testing program
 - 6 pupils had positive tuberculin test results and were X-rayed with negative results
 - 43 pupils received physical exams
 - 10 pupils were referred to the Guidance Clinic
 - 14 pupils recieved Speech Therapy

The school nurse continues to serve this community as their yearly needs present themselves. With the cooperation from the school personnel and parents, we are able to discover health problems and correct them. The building of healthful attitudes is ever present and the prevention of health problems is one of our aims.

I wish to thank all who help make the school health program a successful one.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

January, 1973

The 1972-73 school year opened on September 7, with 158 students enrolled. At the present time there are 155 students.

Our main concern in curriculum for the past year and at the present time is in the area of science. The teachers and I feel that our present science program with its textbook approach is outdated. We would like to give the children as many firsthand experiences as possible, and we feel that a laboratory approach would give the children of Westmoreland the science background needed to be successful at Keene High School.

Although the main purpose of the Westmoreland Elementary School is to provide your children with the basic knowledge necessary for high school, I have also felt a need for them to learn non-academic skills which they could use throughout their lives. Thanks to our many parent volunteers, we have been able to set up a Friday afternoon activity period to give the children this opportunity. Just a few examples of what your child may select are: cooking, knitting, woodworking, photography, square dancing, typing and crafts.

I desire to call your attention particularly to the school library. During the past three years, I have been able to see the steady progress which is being made. It has become a story center for the younger students and a resource center for our upper grade children. Although this is a slow and expensive project, it is being accomplished through a complete community effort

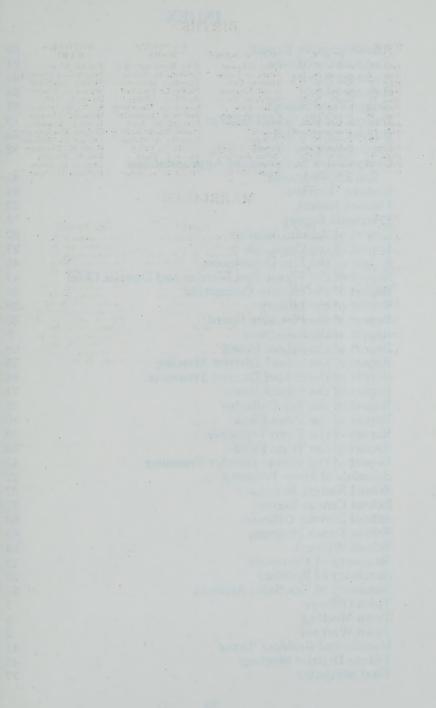
