

The Honorable Ada C. Taylor

Representative from Whitefield 1947 - 1967



From the time she was elected to her late husband Carl's seat in the House of Representatives in 1947 and through the ensuing twenty years, Whitefield, its people and its problems were the first order of business for Ada Taylor. Her accomplishments and honors were legion, as they are now legend. Locally, three dams—one bearing her name, numerous miles of new highway, the Whitefield Regional Airport, and the greater development of two State Parks, all bespeak her interest in and devotion to the Whitefield area.

Throughout the two decades that Ada Taylor represented Whitefield her horizons expanded as did her influence in state affairs. Her fellow legislators, of both parties, were early to appreciate the wisdom, determination, and dedication of the Member from Whitefield. In recognition of her interest in education—Ada was a former teacher—she was placed on the Education Committee of the House. There she served many years as a member and later as Chairman. She further served education as Chairman of the University of New Hampshire's budget following her appointment to the Legislature's important and powerful Appropriations Committee. Of her many honors, it was Ada's succession to the Chairmanship of the Appropriations Committee of which she was most proud—the first woman in state history to occupy this post, ranking only behind that of the Governor, President of the Senate and Speaker of the House.

In addition to ability, good humor and a genuine interest in people were the considerable personal assets of the Member from Whitefield. Though a life-long Republican—Ada was a firm believer in the axiom that "strong parties make good governments"—her diplomacy in legislative matters enabled her to serve effectively and conscientiously her Town, County, and State during the administrations of five governors, four Republican and one Democrat. Nor was Ada Taylor any stranger to the "whys and wherefores" of Washington, national politics or issues, particularly where New Hampshire's interests were concerned. Many a time a New Hampshire Congressman or Senator called upon her in Whitefield or in Concord to find out "What Ada thinks" about this or that. When her good friends Sherman Adams and the late Senator Styles Bridges became, respectively, President Eisenhower's Chief Deputy and President Pro Tem of the U. S. Senate, Ada was there!

To Ada Taylor politics was more than just an honorable calling—it was her heritage, from her own great-uncle Henry Wilson, Vice President during the Administration of Ulysses S. Grant, down to her husband Carl, the Representative from Whitefield before her. Despite this proud tradition, despite her own many accomplishments and public honors, Ada's first love was this town and its people. Though, under the circumstances, our humble thanks seem somewhat inadequate, we are proud to dedicate our 1967 Town Report to the memory of Ada Taylor.

It is that time once again when your Board of Selectmen and other Town Officers are called upon to report to you on the financial condition of the Town and, in a general way, of our endeavors on Whitefield's behalf throughout the previous year. With this Report, we also submit the customary Warrant covering appropriations and such related subjects as bear upon the anticipated affairs of the town for the year 1968 and on which you have the opportunity and responsibility for expressing your pleasure at our Annual Meeting, Tuesday evening, March 12, 1968.

In terms of accomplishments, one of major significance was the construction of a new and badly needed Town Highway Garage at the lower end of Brown Street. This steel and concrete structure of 3,200 square feet contains four equipment bays, superintendent's office, wash room, workshop, and storage space. Though the building has yet to be landscaped, total net cost—after credit for the sale to Nuroco Woodwork, Inc., of the old Mellin Quincy paint shed and brick office, will approximate \$23,500. Based on our overall cost of about \$26,000.00, without credit, the town got this building complete with lights, heat, water, etc., for \$8.13 per square foot—a very reasonable price in terms of present construction costs. The Beecher Construction Company of Colebrook was the low bidder.

In the matter of a water supply for the Industrial Park at the Airport, the town was less fortunate. Water from the old spring on which we had relied to provide service to the new Miles Pond, Inc. plant, White Mt. Air Service, and the town's hangar-administration building, went sour after well tiles were set, pipe lines run, and pumping equipment installed. Though two previous tests by the State indicated that the water was abundant both in quantity and quality, an excess of iron developed, spoiling it for any but commercial use. Subsequent expenses for professional advice and attempts to correct the situation have added almost

\$1,300.00 to our original estimate of \$2,000.00 for this work.

The Miles Pond Company has been very patient throughout but, since without good water we cannot hope to attract further industry, we have taken the problem to the Whitefield Village Fire District. The Commissioners have given us their full cooperation and after consultation with their engineers have suggested enlarging the water district to include the airport and supplying it from an existing district main located approximately one-half mile from the area. Accomplishing this will require the approval of both the Town and District, as well as an appropriation by the Town for one-half the estimated cost. The necessary articles appear in the Warrant and we urge you as a voter in either or both the Town and District meetings to give them your careful consideration. Under present circumstances, we have never felt the Town belonged in the water business and only took the step last year to obtain a new industry.

In April, Mr. Peter F. Guest was appointed to the Airport Commission to replace Mr. John T. Delany, who retired. Accordingly, we take this opportunity to congratulate Mr. Guest and to thank Mr. Delany most sincerely for his long and devoted stewardship of this important facility. As for the Regional Airport itself, a detailed summary by the Commission appears elsewhere in the Town Report. The fact, though, that the Federal Aviation Agency honored our request to allocate \$35,000.00 for airport lighting, in these times of tight federal funds, bears repetition. We are hopeful that the federal grant, the funds voted by Whitefield and sponsoring towns in 1966, and such State money as may be available will enable us to complete this project initiated four years ago. As a point of interest, federal and state grants to the Regional Airport now total over \$400,000.00.

Preliminary drafts of the Town's proposed pollution control and sewer project are now being studied. The study was made by Howard, Needles, Tammen & Bergendorf, Consulting Engineers, through a Federal Housing and Urban Development Agency grant/loan of \$14,000.00. As explained in last year's Report, this project which envisions a cost in excess of a million dollars, hopefully subject to federal-state aid of 90%, is required to prevent illegal pollution of the Johns River and to reconstruct a major portion of Whitefield's antiquated sewer system. The town has some thirteen miles of sewer lines crisscrossing it and, unfortunately emptying into the river.

As federal-state money and manpower shortages have produced a sizeable backlog of projects awaiting approval, our engineers have recommended applying again to the HUD agency for a second grant/loan for final design preparation. The necessary article appears in your Warrant requesting the Town's application for and acceptance of \$66,000.00 for this purpose.

A report by the Chairman of the Town Planning Board detailing the Board's activities is elsewhere included, so comment here is unnecessary. We will, however, take this opportunity to congratulate Chairman Lewis Marro and members, Mrs. William Deutsch, Wilfred Spencer, and Wendell Hutchins, on their appointments, willingness to be of service, and interest in the future of Whitefield.

Town roads and their maintenance, our largest single item of municipal expense, have received much attention during the past year. While in reasonably good repair, thanks to the efforts of Fred Hill and his men, who have been greatly assisted in their work by the new equipment purchased in recent years, there are some sections which are going to require major reconstruction in the near future. Most of our roads were neither planned nor built for today's heavy traffic, in terms of volume and weight. Much of the Town's sidewalk, too, has been patched piecemeal as time and money permitted and now requires attention. Accordingly, a long range program, with provisions for funding to cover these projects, should soon be initiated.

One road in particular, which has even become dangerous due to the quantity and type of traffic it receives, is that linking the airport with Route 116. With the cooperation of the State Highway Department, Representative Ada Taylor was successful in obtaining reclassification of this road and its acceptance by the State. A new and improved right-of-way is presently under survey by the Department. However, present law requires a fifty percent participation with the State in any reconstruction and, as a result, we have asked the Highway Department to stage the work to allow the town to participate as it finds itself financially able to do so. In the meantime, to encourage development as rapidly as possible at the Industrial Park, we have through an appropriate Warrant article again requested action on the old airport road to Jefferson. A petition for a new street has also been received. It is planned from Route 116 to the top of View Street and, in addition to improving traffic and maintenance on the latter, could open further real estate to residential development. An appropriation for this is also to be found in the Warrant.

On the matter of taxes, our favorite unpopular subject, Whitefield's rate, including school and county portions that by law we must collect but do not determine, increased from \$4.50 to \$5.30 per \$100. of valuation or 17.7%. This was the result, as will be noted, of expenditures of \$39,-982.89 more than the \$325,915.71 budgeted. Accounting for this overage were additions to the school's appropriation of \$32,816.36, the county's of \$5,725.73, and the Town's of \$1,440.80. In other words, almost the full amount of the increase was the result of greater than anticipated school and county costs. As to the obvious question why the school and county items were not more realistically budgeted-the answer is in the fact that when your Report went to print the information was not available. Though we substantially raised our estimates on these items from the 1966 figures, such were not sufficient to cover the 44% county and 22% school increases. The White Mountains Regional School Board has scheduled the School Meeting prior to Town Meeting this year and we congratulate the Board on this decision. Since the school appropriation represents about two-thirds of Whitefield's annual budget, and consequently of the tax rate, better fiscal planning should be possible as the exact school figure will be available for Town Meeting.

The following table pretty well spells out Whitefield's recent tax history and is included here, as well as in the financial section of your Report, to underline the point:

The position of your Board of Selectmen on White-field's tax rate is, or should be, well known. On the present level of assessments, we do not feel Whitefield can generally afford a rate in excess of \$5.00 per \$100.00 of valuation.

Your Board of Selectmen appreciate the confidence placed in us by you and your fellow citizens, without which whatever small accomplishments we have enjoyed over the previous year might not have been attained. Therefore, please give your Town Report careful attention and plan to attend Town Meeting. Remember, wherever the future takes Whitefield will be your responsibility.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Whitefield in the County of Coos and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs. You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next, at seven o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects. The polls shall open for voting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the afternoon.

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman to serve for a period of three years, a Town Treasurer, Highway Agent, two Library Trustees, one Trust Fund Trustee to serve for three years, and all other necessary Town Officers.
- 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for:
 - a. General Government
 - 1. Town Officers' Salaries
 - 2. Town Officers' Expenses
 - 3. Election and Registration Expenses
 - 4. Municipal Court Expenses
 - 5. Expenses Town Hall and Other Town Buildings

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to grant to the Woman's Study Club, American Legion, Lions Club, Morrison Hospital Auxiliary, Mount Washington Grange, Rotary Club, Chamber of Commerce and all church organizations for public purposes, the free use of the Town Hall.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money by temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deeds, or otherwise, until rescinded.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to have a three-year term for the town clerk, to take effect at the annual town meeting of March, 1969. RSA 41:16 a.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to have a three-year term for the town treasurer, to take effect at the annual town meeting of March, 1969. RSA 41:26 a.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey to the Whitefield Village Fire District by appropriate deed, all existing water pipe lines and water sources appurtenant thereto and also such easements for additional water pipe lines as may be necessary in connection with the District's supplying water to the airport site and consumers thereat. Such action being conditioned upon a legal vote of the District to provide water service as described. Further, to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum of \$4,000 (Four Thousand Dollars) to assist the District in the construction of the necessary pipelines and which sum will be amortized at not less than four years.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500 (Fifteen Hundred Dollars) for repairs to the bandstand on the Common.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000 (One Thousand Dollars) for the reconstruction of a certain portion of sidewalk.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application (in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P.L. 560, 83rd Congress) and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in the amount of \$66,000 (Sixty-six Thousand Dollars), to be made by the United States to the Town of Whitefield to aid in defraying the cost of final plan preparation for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of Whitefield, and, further, to see if the Town will make the necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds as may be required to defray the cost of preparation of the report and plans.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum not to exceed \$7,000 (Seven Thousand Dollars) to reopen the "Old Airport Road," so-called, from the Jefferson town line to the Whitefield Regional Airport and which sum will be amortized at not less than five years. Action on this article will be conditional upon the favorable vote by the Town of Jefferson to appropriate such sum or sums as may be required to open and maintain this road from N.H. Route 115 to the Whitefield town line.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum not to exceed \$5,000 (Five Thousand Dollars) to lay out and construct a new street from the top of View Street to intersect N.H. Route 116, adjacent to the

Pilotte house, and which sum will be amortized at not less than five years (By Petition)

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$827 (Eight Hundred and Twentyseven Dollars) as requested by the White Mountain Community Services, Inc. as Whitefield's contribution toward the organization's non-profit, mental health service. (By Petition)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to include for year round maintenance with other town roads, that section of the Kimball Hill Road which is now closed to winter maintenance and is necessary for use the year round by residents of Kimball Hill. (By Petition)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease from Fawcett Enterprises, Inc., the former Lewis property for parking, if available, at \$1.00 (One Dollar) per year. Said property to be rendered suitable for this purpose by the owner.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum not to exceed \$17,500 (Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars) less any amounts public or private that may be forthcoming and which sum represents the Town's 25% share of the Whitefield Regional Airport lighting project (\$17,500 of State and \$35,000 of Federal funds have already been allocated.) This sum to be amortized at not less than ten years.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to amend a resolution passed under Article 19, Town Meeting of March 11, 1947, creating an Airport Commission of three members, to read as follows: "Create an Airport Commission of five members to be appointed by the Selectmen and authorized to act for the Town in all matters pertaining to the establishment, construction, and operation of aircraft landing areas and to confer and consult with State and Federal officials and to execute in

the name of the Town any and all necessary or desirable instruments and agreements in connection therewith."

19. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before said meeting.

Given under our hands and seal of the Town this twenty-first day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixty-eight, and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and ninety-second.

WHITEFIELD PLANNING BOARD

To the Board of Selectmen:

Even though the State Planning and Development Commission granted recognition to an unofficial Whitefield Planning Board, in July 1966, it was the adoption of Article 16 in the 1967 Town Warrant that gave the Selectmen power to appoint a legal planning board. Adoption of Article 17 provided \$2,285.00 to the newly appointed Board and instructed it to continue the efforts of the unofficial committee to provide the Town of Whitefield with a comprehensive master plan.

Members of the Planning Board appointed by the Selectmen are as follows: Lewis C. Marro, Shirley Deutsch, Wendell W. Hutchins, Wilfred A. Spencer and Edward H. Spalding.

At the first meeting of the Planning Board, Lewis Marro was named chairman and Shirley Deutsch was elected secretary. By-laws were adopted and the first Monday of each month was chosen as the day of meeting. It was also voted, as indicated by Article 17, to proceed with planning studies for the towns of Whitefield, Lancaster, Northumberland, Dalton, Jefferson and Stratford. Planning Boards of the aforementioned towns organized a cooperative subcommittee. The immediate objective of the sub-committee is to interview professional planning firms and to employ one professional planning consultant to serve the six town area. The planning consultant would then provide the towns with an individual plan related to the current and anticipated future needs of each town. Other purposes of the plans are as follows:

(1) In the three central larger communities, Lancaster, Northumberland and Whitefield, the town plans will be aimed at meeting problems that are an

outgrowth of urbanization. In the three surrounding towns, Dalton, Jefferson and Stratford, the towns plans will aim at identifying natural resources, land capabilities for growth, and unique natural features that should be retained for the future.

(2) Plans will be coordinated and will identify with facilities and programs that can be mutually utilized so as to make most efficient use of community resources and codes. Ordinances and administrative procedures that can be standardized should also be identified.

As of this writing, interviews with planning agencies have been arranged and it is hoped that by the March town meeting we will have retained a planning consultant and that applications for Federal and State funds will have been submitted.

In conclusion, we wish to state that it has been a pleasure to present this report to the residents of Whitefield and to their elected officers. We thank the Selectmen for their cooperation and we look forward to a productive and well-planned future.

MORRISON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION

It is with considerable pride that I present my first Morrison Hospital Association Report for the Whitefield Town Report.

Hospitals are what economists call "labor intensive" organizations. Two-thirds or more of their total costs are in payroll and only one-third in materials, supplies, and other overhead expenses. In industry, it is usually the reverse. This is primarily because hospitals, unlike business and industry, require personal service by employees to patients 24 hours each day of the year. For the most part these personal services cannot be replaced by machines at a lower cost as in industry. Not if the quality of care and the life-saving advances in the last 20 years are to be maintained.

Morrison Hospital Association, this past year, showed an excess of income over expenses of \$4,500. This excess is shown on the Association balance sheet but it certainly does not include the good-will and the excellence of care that the patients received during that period. The Staff, the Board of Trustees, and the community at large, have contributed to the health and welfare of the town of Whitefield. With the advice of the Board of Trustees and the continued support of the town of Whitefield, the Morrison Hospital will continue to grow and expand its facilities so as to continue to give the community the best possible medical services.

To the Board of Selectmen:

I hereby submit my annual report for the year 1967.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the Selectmen, the officers, and the citizens and summer residents of our town for their unstinting support and cooperation.

Officer Gary Young left our department in March to assume the duties of Chief of Police at Sugar Hill. We were fortunate to obtain the full-time services of Guy E. LaLonde, a former resident of Ashland, N.H., and a capable and conscientious officer whom we consider a valuable addition to the department.

During 1967 a total of 185 cases were brought before the Whitefield Municipal Court. Of these. 157 were brought by Whitefield police officers; 25 by the State Police and 3 by the Fish and Game Department. The Whitefield Police Department cases were as follows:

- 124 Motor vehicle violations: 26 Speeding. 20 Yellow line violations. 15 Driving while intoxicated. 10 Operating without a license. 6 Operating unregistered vehicle. Remainder for various other motor vehicle offenses.
- 61 Criminal cases: 4 Burglary. 2 Petty larceny. 6 Drunkeness. 28 Minors in possession of alcoholic beverage. 1 Possession of marijauna. 2 Procuring beer for minors. 5 Giving beer to minors. 5 Brawling. 1 Bastardy. 1 Resisting arrest. 2 Using profane language to officer. 1 Disobeying an officer. 1 Carrying loaded rifle in car. 1 Illegal night hunting. 1 Fugitive from justice.

During the year the Whitefield police investigated 49 accidents. This year again, we are pleased to report, there were no fatalities. Night officers on their routine check of business establishments found doors unlocked a total of 226 times. On patrol of vacant homes and summer properties 29 broken windows were found. On seven occasions gas pumps were found left on.

In closing we would like to call particular attention to the gratifying response of the youth of Whitefield to this department's request for a sane and sensible Halloween. The majority of our young people demonstrated their willingness to comply with a reasonable request in the same cooperative manner they show throughout the rest of the year.

Whitefield Regional Airport Commission

There was a healthy increase in activity in the second season of use of the new runway and facilities. In addition to four regularly scheduled round-trips to Boston per day by Executive Airlines during the five month summer season, Shirley and Dick Mahn, Airport Managers, reported a total of approximately 3,300 private and business aircraft movements (not including locally based airplanes) through the season. This represents an increase of approximately 18 percent over the previous year's traffic. A substantial increase in night activity and instrument activity was particularly notable, highlighting the need for permanent runway lighting and improved radio navigation aids.

Airport users were widely scattered through the region served by the airport with traffic for Landaff, Sugar Hill, Lisbon, Randolph, Littleton, Carroll, Whitefield, Lancaster, Jefferson, Dalton, North Stratford and Gilman, Vermont noted particularly.

New regular users, reflecting advances in commerce and recreational use of the area, include the Georgia-Pacific Corporation, Englehardt Industries, IT&T, Timberland Machines, Inc. and Mr. David Dana. Among other business activities Mr. Dana is Chairman of Executive Aviation, a third level carrier based in Toledo, Ohio. He is currently building a vacation retreat in the new Dalton Ridge development.

Other frequent visitors are the two Bent brothers of the S. Bent Company in Gardiner, Massachusetts in their twin Comanche. They are operators of the new Miles Pond, Inc. saw mill located at the Whitefield Industrial Park adjacent to the airport. This highly automated facility, among the newest and most modern of its kind, provides square stock and other basic lumber products for the parent company in Gardiner.

The fleet of aircraft based at the field has increased by three, including Timberland Machines' new twin Aztec and two privately owned light planes.

The long awaited lighting project for the airport is closer to being a reality, based on recently approved Federal and State appropriations. This project should be ready to go out for bid this spring.

The Whitefield airport was the center of three search and rescue operations during the year. Notable among these activities was the successful location and subsequent rescue of two lost hunters.

In 1967, 214 visits were made in the community, and they are classified as follows:

Heaf testing was done on 188 school children and personnel, one child attended the Crippled Children's Clinic in Berlin, 7 children attended the Pediatric-Cardiology Clinic in Lancaster, 112 individuals attended the Mobile Chest Clinic, 56 preschool children were examined at the Preschool Vision Clinic, and 373 Immunizations were administered to children in the area.

Health services become a matter for community concern when an individual cannot cope without them, and yet are beyond his reach. Health care services are primarily directed toward keeping individuals functional as long as possible. To achieve this, the goal for each community must be; "The right service, for the right patient, in the right place, at the right time, and at the right cost." Hence, the community must move into action when the services and facilities for its citizens are inadequate or unavailable.

The way to get started is-to START. Four initial steps will be useful:

1. Assess your needs and resources.

2. Seek the support of, and involve local professional persons,

particularly the physicians in your planning.

3. Develop a tentative plan for action which is the right size for your community-one which provides short and longterm goals and priorities.

4. Put plan into action, involving local citizens.

I urge you, as a community, to move into action, so that all of your citizens will have within their reach, facilities to enable them to recapture, retain or improve degrees of usefulness—to themselves, to their family and to their community.

I extend my gratitude to the Citizens of Whitefield for their cooperation during the past year.

It will help if we follow these simple suggestions:

- 1. No burning of debris and waste between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. and then only with a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.
- 2. Take debris and waste to the town dump.
- 3. Maintain a clean, safe dump.
- 4. Keep matches away from young children.
- 5. Be sure matches and smoking material are dead out when we discard them.
- 6. Set a good example for others in fire prevention.






