

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Auburn, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Auburn on Tuesday, March the 12th, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First: To bring in your ballots for:

Town Clerk for the ensuing year,
One Selectman for three years,
Tax Collector for the ensuing year,
Town Treasurer for the ensuing year,
Highway Agent for the ensuing year,
One Library Trustee for three years,
One Cemetery Trustee for three years,
One Trust Fund Trustee for three years,
Three Auditors for the ensuing year,
Overseer of the Poor for the ensuing year,
Police Chief for the ensuing year.

At seven o'clock in the evening, the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second: To see if the Town will vote to incur debt for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes.

Third: To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust Funds as may have come in during the year and such Trust Funds as have not been previously accepted.

Fourth: To see if the Town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham fund for schools or library.

Fifth: To see if the Town will vote to give the building known as the Police Station to the Auburn Volunteer Fire Department to be used as a Fire House for the Lake Section at a future date. — by the Committee appointed at 1956 Town Meeting:

Clifford Stacy Alfred Jacobsen Roger Laliberte Lillian C. Llewellyn Edward Sargent

Sixth: To see if the Town will vote to set aside \$500.00 being part of an unexpended balance for the year 1956, as a Capital Reserve Fund to be used toward the purchase of a new Town Grader at such time as the Town will vote to purchase one.

Seventh: To see if the Town will change the purpose of the Capital Reserve Fund from the Purchase of a grader to the Purchase of Highway Equipment and to authorize the use of part of this fund for the Purchase of Two Snow Plow Blades.

Eighth: To see if the Town will vote to accept the road known as Maple Hill Farm Road as a town road. This road is approximately three-tenths of a mile long and thirty feet wide running east from the Hooksett Road to the farms of Mr. and Mrs. John P. Madiasz and Mr. and Mrs. Emile A. Gingras.

Tenth: To see if the provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws Relative to Playing Games of Beano be adopted in this Town (Vote on Official Ballot.)

Eleventh: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Twelfth: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# REPORT TO THE SCHOOL DISTRICT BY AUBURN SCHOOL BOARD

As suggested in last year's report the board has studied the school housing problem in the district. The suggestions made in last year's report were considered and with the help of Irving Hersey Associates, of Durham, plans were evolved to submit to the voters.

The suggestions of adding an area equivalent to four rooms was developed for several reasons. The first was one of flexibility. The suggested scheme allows for several modifications if deemed advisable. All indications are that the addition will be less costly now than at some future date. There seems to be no question but that the district will continue to grow in line with the national trend. The enrollment makes it impossible to do as well as possible the task of educating the young people of the district. The plan permits, at least temporarily, the use of large area for assembly purposes and the possible development of a Hot Lunch area. For all these reasons we felt it desirable to present the plans at this time.

#### POLIO INOCULATION REPORT

Two polio clinics were held in 1956. One was held in May, the other in October.

At the first clinic 221 children and 3 pregnant women received their first injection. In October, 139 attended the clinic. Of these, 23 received first injections and 116 received second injections.

We assume that many had already gone to their family physicians for their second shots.

In May, 1957, those who received their second inoculation in October will be ready for their booster shot. We hope to set up a clinic at that time if the vaccine is available.

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Auburn, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March, 1957 at 8 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing 3 years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in the warrant.
- 7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 8. To see if the district will vote to build an addition to the Auburn Village School including new construction, any necessary alterations to the present school, new equipment and such other items necessary to complete the construction and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 9. If the vote on the preceding article is in the affirmative, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000 or any part thereof and in order to furnish such funds to authorize the school board to issue notes or bonds upon the credit of the district in accordance with Chap. 33 Revised statutes annotated (Municipal Finance Act) and any special acts governing the issuing of bonds or notes of the school district of Auburn and further authorizing the school board to fix the time and place of paymenn of such notes or bonds, the rate of interest thereon and to provide for the sale thereof and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any state agency.
- 11. If article 9 is adopted, to see if the district will authorize the appointment of a building committee for the new construction and to authorize the school board acting upon the advice of the building committee, to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper and advisable in connection with this construction.
- 12. If the vote on article 9 is in the affirmative to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$7,500 for the operational expense of the addition and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 13. By petition: To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 said amount to be placed with the Trustees of Trust Funds (School playground equipment fund.)

- 14. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 to defray the school district's share of the cost thereof.
- 15. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
- 16. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation of which is on a fee basis.
- 17. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the school district will authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the school district will designate the superintendent of schools as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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#### REPORT OF THE HELPING TEACHER

As the helping teacher, I have spent a majority of my time in the classrooms of the union as this is not an administrative position, but one to help meet classroom problems. There are several reasons for classroom visits and these include the following: to obtain information and a better understanding of some of the problems, an opportunity to suggest a different approach in some fields of work, an opportunity to coordinate the work in the schools and an understanding of pupil problems enabling me to discuss them with pupils and parents. Other activities of the helping teacher include: conferences (with parents, teachers, and pupils), teaching demonstration lessons, reviewing text needs, making curriculum studies, charting test results, in-service training for teachers, and aiding in the preparation of educational materials.

The courses of study in this supervisory union are in keeping with the suggested programs as outlined by the New Hampshire Department of Education. However, efforts are continually being made to strengthen our program. There are many factors to influence our work, but we believe that the results are comparable to that in other unions.

The proposed change in arithmetic texts was not made this year, but it is still being considered. A new basic history text was adopted for use in grade eight, several books were added for the purpose of extending interests as a part of the reading program, a change was made to an improved spelling text-workbook, and a number of texts were required because of the increased enrollment in certain grades. Text changes and additions for the coming year are being considered in arithmetic, grade four history — if they become available, and science.

Teaching in an elementary school has become a very complex process. Additional burdens and responsibilities have been added gradually over a period of years. A changing civilization is bound to require a change in the demands made upon its schools and the committee for the White House Conference on education believes that this broadening of the goals should be recognized as legitimate. Your teachers are certainly in accord with the belief that every child should have an opportunity to become a good citizen with high moral, ethical, and spiritual values; trained in leisure-time activities; with a knowledge of health and safety factors; trained for a wholesome family life and having good mental health; with an understanding of the problems America faces in international relations through an education geared to the needs and abilities of the individual child.

Your teachers are striving to meet these goals through an enriched basic program, lessons and activities for health and personal development, consideration for those at each end of the ability scale, opening exercises, observances for special days and events, and introducing leisure-time activities. Valuable lessons are also taught in team games, glee clubs, school programs and safety patrols because the entire day has to be considered for teaching opportunities.

The teachers in our supervisory union realize the responsibilities placed upon the schools and they have felt the need of additional training to help them meet these respossibilities which have increased for the schools while decreasing in many homes. The sixty-nine teachers in this

union will have earned approximately 150 credits in the one year period ending this summer. (Each credit equals the satisfactory completion of fifteen hours of classroom instruction, outside readings, and project work under a qualified college instructor.)

In view of the additional aims for our educational system, we must now evaluate our program and consider some of the following questions: 1. The amount of time to be given in each subject area. 2. The value of time-consuming activities of teachers in non-teaching school activities. 3. The consideration to be given at each extreme in the wide range of abilities within the class. In keeping with a general trend throughout the nation, the Spring Institutes for the teachers of the state will be concerned with the evaluating of elementary and secondary schools and it is hoped that we may make a self-evaluation of all phases of our school program during the next year.

### Envollment

The enrollment remained at approximately the same level as last year. The lower grades 1-4 however, had 24 more pupils than the upper four grades as of January 15th. The enrollment figures support the statement made last year that the housing problem would need some study and probably some action. For that reason the school board has presented a plan to meet the problem. Ideally a room to a grade means that educationally each child will have a better opportunity to progress at his own rate.

A problem that must be considered seriously is that of solving the problem of secondary education. The uncer-

tainty of the present and past arrangements make it desirable that some study be made of possible solutions of the problem. There is no easy solution of such a serious problem and a snap judgement may offer a quick solution, but not a permanent one. The problem should be studied thoroughly by your school board assisted by any others who can bring factual information of value to them and to the district.

The problem of enrollment at both the elementary and secondary level is the fundamental problem. To provide adequately for the education of these children is one of the most pressing problems of the generation. It means increased building, expanded staff and necessarily more books and supplies.

The news letter of the Kiplinger Agency in Washington, D. C., a very conservative organization, devoted the entire issue of December 22nd. to population. The growth in population is not in the city itself but in the suburbs — the suburbs in immediate proximity to large urban areas have not shown as much growth as the more remote suburbs. Populaton growth in the immediate suburbs is 30% in the last six years — more remote fringes have shown a growth of 56%. Nation wide we will have 30% more elementary children by 1965 and 50% more secondary pupils.

Society is faced with a serious challenge to meet the problems of educating these young people. The state as an instrument of society should be prepared to meet this challenge.

Financial support is the area that requires the greatest study and effort. The tax structure is not geared to our present and future educational demands. The Statesmen of our time need to devote much thought and energy to furnishing adequate financial support to education so that the infants of today may have as good or better educational opportunity as that furnished their parents.

#### Personnel

There were only two changes in the personnel concerned with the educational program in Auburn. Mrs. Sarah Hampton and Miss Louise Bourgeois both resigned. Mrs. Hazel Hicks and Mrs. Frances Libby were secured to fill the vacancies.

Mr. Raymond, Mrs. Kelley and Miss Cronin continued in the positions of helping teacher, music supervisor and nurse teacher respectively. The retention of staff at supervisory union level and with only two changes in the regular staff make it possible for pupils, generally, to progress at a maximum rate.

The White House Conference on Education lists as one of the major problems of education in the United States the procuring of enough good teachers and keeping them. The recommendations of the Conference are concerned with both phases of the problems – keeping the teachers we have and recruiting a new and additional supply. The recommendations concerning recruitement are primarily aimed at colleges and the preparation of teachers. These we, at local level, can do little to implement. The recommendations concerning the teacher and the teacher's job are attainable at local level. These recommendations are for better salaries, improved working conditions, better instructional equipment, assignments geared to the ability and training of teachers, opportunity for advancement and improved status for teachers. The profession too has a responsibility to expect of its membership high ethical and professional standards. If both society and the profession attack the problem of attracting and retaining personnel one of the major and critical problems facing the educational system can be met and overcome.

#### Curriculum

The curriculum of the schools is constantly expanding to meet the needs of our modern civilization. The social studies now include a more extensive and intensive study of neighbors to the north and south of us. These nations particularly and peculiarily are of great importance to us. We are important to them. The more our young people can understand them the better relations will exist between us. The same is true of the other nations but most particularly those of the Western Hemisphere. For this reason we devote time to the study of Canada and our Southern neighbors.

The increased and increasing technological nature of almost all employment has made almost mandatory a more intensive study of arithmetic. For the same reason science is studied more extensively and intensively.

In addition the other basic tool subjects are taught as usual. The length of school day and year have not been changed materially. In order to do so much more in the alloted time the teaching process has had to become more efficient. This has been accomplished by the use of better methods and materials.

The textbook publishers have made a distinct contribution to this increased efficiency. The use of many pictures, some of which are beautifully colored, the scientific evaluation of vocabulary, the selection of authors who are recognized masters in their respective fields, and an editorial staff that are skilled in the art of book making as well as in subject matter areas have created textbooks that excite the interest of children and enhance increased learning. In addition the publishers have published many workbooks to augment the textbook. Reference and supplemental texts are also available in greater numbers and variety. All these improvements in books alone have tended to increase efficiency.

Supplies are also available in greater variety. Machines of all types are available in the audio visual field. Duplicating machines enable the staff to put more materials in the hands of pupils saving time and energy formerly used in copying. All of these are tools that make more efficient as

well as more enjoyable the process of learning the skills and attitudes that are so important today.

#### Finances

Exclusive of special articles the budgetary increase is \$2,255.29. The increase in income (anticipated) makes the increase in levy \$257.29. More than half of the increase is due to salary increases for personnel. The remainder is due to increased costs of educational and maintenance supplies.

The special articles concerned with an expanded plant are discussed by the board in its report to the district. The special article permitting employees of the district to join the retirement system is necessary so as to permit the employees other than teachers to enjoy the same benefits now extended to nearly all employed in this country. The article on playground is again included in order to build this fund to a point where equipment can be purchased.

It is pleasant to work in a climate of concern for the well being of boys and girls. All in the community are vitally interested in the welfare, physical, mental and moral of the boys and girls. The satisfaction of having a part in meeting these needs is great. Whatever is done, is done because of the cooperation of all. The staff appreciates this cooperation. The supervisory staff too appreciates the attitude of the community in promoting education for boys and girls.
