TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same as recommended by the Budget.
3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid two weeks after approval of tax rate by the State Tax Commission.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on town labor and pay same out of the Highway Department.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the Concord Hospital.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the Pittsfield Town Dump.
8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tractor Grader for junk.
9. By petition: To see what action the Town will take in regard to black top road from Shackford's Corner to Archie Carr's Corner.
10. By Pctition: To see if the Town will vote to hold Town Meeting on the Wednesday evening following Town Election at 8:00 P. M. This to take effect March 1960 until rescinded by a vote taken at a later Town Meeting.

11. To see if the Town will vote to grant Tax Exemption on the following properties: Churches at North, South, Center and Parade, also the Catholic Church near Route 28. Grange Hall at North, Legion Hall at Parade, and Firehouses at Center and Parade.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800 for the Civil Defense to acquire a Grader through the Federal Surplus Property, and authorize acquisition by the Board of Selectmen, Director of Civil Defense and Road Agent.

13. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light at the entrance to the New School.

14. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Remember — Before You Burn, Get a Permit

You Can Help Prevent Forest Fires

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning — brush, paper leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as two hundred dollars (\$200).

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home. Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc., cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you — personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

(b) Superintendent Jason E. Boynton's Report

Your Superintendent of Schools serves six towns; namely, Barnstead, Alton, New Durham, Pittsfield, Tuftonboro, and Wolfeboro.

In these 6 towns of Supervisory Union No. 49 there are 9 public schools and 1 private academy. There are 87 full time, 7 part time and 3 nurse teachers employed for the 7 elementary and 3 secondary schools — a total faculty of 97 teachers serving 1837 pupils in 10 schools.

Previous Superintendents of Union 49 have written in annual reports of their real concern for employing competent teachers. They have sought to avoid too great a turnover of teachers because of the disorganizing effect it has on educational organization. This problem continues to be of paramount importance since the quality of our schools reflects very directly the quality of our instructional staff.

The question of how much a town can or cannot afford to pay is one of the important questions of our times. History may reveal that we have paid too much or perhaps the judgment will be that we have saved only to lose a disproportionate value. Voters will, and rightly should, make the necessary decision in this regard. Recent experience indicates that often the inexperienced replacement must be paid as much, and sometimes more, than the veteran teacher being replaced. Many question the fairness of such a situation but it results primarily from "supply and demand" in a land of freedom of choice. The voters of Barnstead must make the final decision each year as to whether or not sufficient funds will be provided.

Our testing program has been revised and expanded. One important feature of our achievement testing is the graphic representation of achievement growth from year to year. This objective information will become available to parents of pupils grades three through eight inclusive. A test with high validity is given pupils in grades 1, 3, 5, and 7 to measure mental maturity. Teachers having the results of this testing program can objectively evaluate a pupil's progress and note whether or not the pupil is making good use of his talents. The test results are so constructed that comparisons may be made, with scores recorded in many of the schools across our nation.

The new school and all that it implies has significantly raised the sights of pupils and teachers. In use this fine building proves to be every bit of what it was expected to be. The quality of education which is being provided Barnstead pupils is, in your Superintendent's opinion, very commendable. Teachers are not only conscientious but they know well the techniques of their profession.

Mr. Paul Seavey has demonstrated a high quality of leadership. The many details of opening a new school have been carefully planned and implemented, and the organizational procedures have contributed significantly to educational progress.

The program of studies offered must square with the capabilities of youth and the nature of our technical and diversified adult world. Students likely to go on to higher education must have the opportunity to acquire a high quality academic preparation and others must be given much, much more than an opportunity to socialize. Statistics show the long-term worth of college education but not all job-rewarding opportunities require college. The non-college group must receive high quality education. The emphasis may be somewhat different but this must not imply second-rate performance. Besides continually trying to improve the quality of educational opportunity, school people in Barnstead are attempting to provide a greater challenge to the talented student and are expecting more hard work from all pupils.

There is much evidence that the school people are receiving fine cooperation from parents and pupils and for this we are extremely appreciative. For school people and parents to work together to the benefit of pupils is of vital importance.

My sincere thanks to all school people and townfolks for their efforts.

PART V. AUXILIARY REPORT

Report of the School Nurse

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of Schools of Barnstead:

The following is my eighth annual report of the school health work of Barnstead.

In the spring of 1958, we had an outbreak of the measles in town. We had one case of pneumonia, as complication to the measles.

As of the autumn of 1958, the attendance has been very good in school. The week before Christmas, the attendance dropped due to colds and the grippe that usually accompanies the onset of cold weather and confinement to indoor living.

The improvement in the school environment has eliminated many of our health problems in our school. Personal hygiene is good. Dr. Quinn made the comment last spring, when he examined the children, that the dental health of the Barnstead school children has improved.

The P.T.A. and the State Department of Health are sponsoring a dental clinic this year. The purpose of this program is educational and, going over the letters that were sent home to the parents, it was gratifying to see that almost 100 % of the parents signed for private dental care for their children. As school nurse, that has been my goal as far as dental health education is concerned.

A tuberculosis skin-testing clinic is planned for early spring, through cooperation with the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

Parents of both pre-school and school children, please make an effort to have your children immunized for polio, whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus, or lockjaw.

One problem that exists in all towns is the care and training of our physically and mentally handicapped children. Various school districts in the state have felt the need and importance of doing something for these children. At present, we have in the area of Alton, New Durham, Barnstead and Pittsfield a group of six boys . . . or probably more . . . in the age group of from ten to fifteen years, who need special training. To set up a special class for these children with instruction in manual training, as well as teaching of the 3 R's, seems to be the solution to a community problem of this kind. These children have the right to an education and the parents of these handicapped children feel they should have it.

Geographically, Alton or Barnstead seems to be the central place as far as transportation is concerned. My suggestion is to consider the Center Barnstead School as a training center for our physically and mentally handicapped children in this area. I hope the superintendent, school boards and people of these towns will consider this problem of a special class for our less fortunate children. It is an endeavor that is worth trying and it is needed now. Consideration by the towns mentioned might make it a financial reality.

The routine school nursing work will be found in the statistical report.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to parents and teachers and all others who have helped with the school health program.
