TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Hall in said Town of Brookline on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative to same.
- 4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
- 7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on taxes.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to charge a twenty cent penalty on each Poll Tax remaining unpaid after September first.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of property acquired by tax deeds.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 2 of the existing rules for Town Meeting and Caucus, and vote on what date the Caucus shall be held.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for necessary equipment and replacements for the Fire Department.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Aid for permanent improvement of highways or take any action relative thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following: from Mrs. Alpha A. Hall, the sum of \$100.00 to be added to the present fund of \$100.00 for the perpetual care of the Melendy, Peacock, Chase Lot in Pine Grove Cemetery; from Rev. and Mrs. William G. Berkeley, the sum of \$200.00, for the perpetual care of the Campbell-Berkeley Lot in Pine Grove Cemetery; from Mrs. Ethel Homoleski, Mrs. Maude Greeley and Mrs. Velma Mayou, the sum of \$200.00 for the perpetual care of the Edwin Taylor Lot in Pine Grove Cemetery; from William Armstrong, the sum of \$200.00 for the perpetual care of the Armstrong Lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.
- 17. To see what sum the Town will vote to transfer from the unencumbered surplus for the purpose of establishing a capital reserve fund to be used for repairing the Town Hall.
- 18. To see what sum the Town will vote to transfer from the unencumbered surplus for the purpose of estab-

lishing a capital reserve fund to be used for construction of a War Memorial.

- 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve the road and repair the bridge on Averill Hill Road or take any action relative thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to complete the new plans of the Cemeteries.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Municipal Court.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to allow the Parent-Teacher Association the use of the Town Hall without charge.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install a new pump and tank and make minor changes in the present water system at the Town Hall.
- 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to ascertain if copies of the original plans of the Town Hall can be obtained.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for additional dishes and kitchenutensils for the Town Hall.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a kitchen stove for the Town Hall.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a power lawn mower.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to have a street light installed at the junction of Hollis Road and Old Milford Road.

- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$58.65 to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Daniels Academy Building in said district on the ninth day of March 1948, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- . 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for special repairs, alterations, insurance and new equipment.
 - 10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to

raise and appropriate to erect fences at the Grammar School.

- 11. REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Brookline:

I herewith present my ninth annual report, the twenty-ninth in the series.

Teachers

A list of teachers is printed elsewhere in this report. I need comment only upon the changes, which were two in number. Mrs. Lizzie Steele in the Intermediate Room declined to serve longer. Mrs. Marguerite O'Neil in the Grammar Room transferred to another school.

Teachers' salaries have not kept pace with the increases in other lines. The average salary in New Hampshire of all school personnel, men and women, is now just under \$2,300; while the national average of industrial wages is about \$2,650. This comparison takes no account of the higher professional requirements for teaching. In one of the most progressive countries of the world, the average teacher receives about twice as much as the industrial worker and the training period is much longer. I quote the N. A. M. Congress of 1947: "We have placed in the hands of our school teachers one of the most important tasks confronting us-the job of making patriotic American citizens of our children. Let us set ever higher standards for our school teachers and pay them proper salaries for the important task we have entrusted to them." The C. I. O. and A. F. of L. have expressed similar views.

As the available supply of teachers is limited, I urge you to make funds available to adequately pay your teaching staff. The New Hampshire P. T. A. President calls attention to the small number of teacher college graduates and urges increased compensation. Retirement, marriage and other reasons may cause a hundred elementary grade openings in this State. Changes may result in a hundred other cases. Finances certainly will

not produce teachers if none are to be had, but will help if any desirable candidate is available.

Costs

Trends in school costs are upward. I give you the per pupil school costs for this Union, so that you may know the facts. Whether the upward trend is too little or too much, I leave to your judgment as you compare these costs with the costs of every other item in your living. Elementary Grades 1-8

The above refers to pupils in the first eight grades. Your town is number 2 on the above list. Last year comparable figures were 89.4%, 8%, 2.6%. There is very little change in the two years and points to no great problem in this regard.

Needs

As pointed out in years past, steps should be taken to eliminate the barbed-wire fence between the Daniels Academy playground and the adjacent property. The erection of a fence on the street side of both the Primary and the Grammar buildings would be a safety factor worthy of your consideration.

If the teacher situation remains as critical as it now appears to me, you may be forced to give serious thought to consolidation of the first six grades in the Daniels Building and transporting grades seven and eight to another town. This would eliminate one teaching position locally.

The new State Aid law contains a statement that aid is "for equalizing educational opportunity and improving the public elementary and high schools." It was not intended to reduce the cost to the towns, but to help them meet rising costs and to help them improve their services. In this Union of five towns, there are two school nurses working on a part-time basis. There are three music teachers on full-time or part-time work. There is no art or handwriting supervisor. This Union, through increased State Aid now available, could improve its services by employment of a full-time school nurse, a fulltime music teacher or possibly two, an art teacher, and the employment of expert handwriting service on a parttime basis. These items should be union-wide and as a unit. We need integration of efforts without dulling the endeavors of any individual community. There are now too many people concerned with the program to affect too definite a responsibility. As the superintendent has influence in all the Union, so should the field workers who work under his guidance and direction.

Gratitude

Again I am very grateful to all who have contributed to the success of the school. I pay especial tribute to the

teachers and to the School Board. An admirable spirit of cooperation has pervaded all our efforts.
