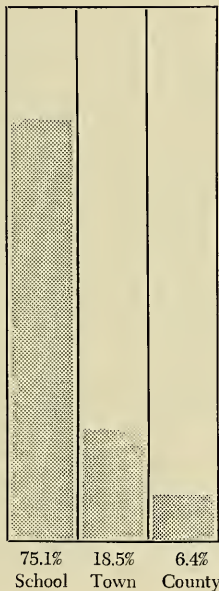

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

During the 1960's many changes occurred. The volume of crime has soared. Since 1960 the risk of being a victim of serious crime has nearly doubled. Crime has become such a heavy burden to our society that many authorities believe it to be the Nation's most serious internal problem. Although Deerfield is a rural community we cannot expect it will be trouble free. The causes of crime are many, and there is enough blame

to be shared by all. In our fight against crime, as in many other struggles the value of good work cannot always be measured by the results achieved. Often credit is due for what men do, although there may be no appreciable gain. In spite of increasing demands, new responsibilities and many obstacles this department reached new heights of efficiency, public service and protection of the rights of all.

During 1966 we were fortunate to unite with the communications system of the Rockingham County Sheriffs Department, which is one of the most efficient and extensive systems in our state.

We purchased a rescue wagon through our Civil Defense Agency, and hope to complete equipping it in the near future. At this time we are in hopes that the town will see within its means to purchase a much needed cruiser. During the past years I equipped and used my personal vehicle for patrolling. But due to the increased demands on this department, I can no longer do so. Repairs, tires, gasoline, and increased insurance, etc., were very costly.

We uniformed our most active officers, and purchased equipment such as a latent print kit to help us in our criminal investigations.

Regretfully, the Deputy Chief Donald Averell resigned, he was a dedicated and efficient officer and his services were greatly appreciated.

Richard Gilson joined the department and is one of its highest assets. Dick is in charge of Criminal Investigations, having been a former state trooper he has several years of experience in law enforcement.

Raymond Heon was appointed as dog officer and has been most efficient in handling dog complaints.

Through dedicated service to our community and with the help of you public-spirited citizens, we hope the crime rate in the 1970's can be contained.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

Fire Permit

A *fire permit* is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Penalties

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
2. For kindling a fire by any means willfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

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STATEMENT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

In 1969, Deerfield grew from a population of 1,095 to 1,245, an increase of 150 persons, or about 14% increase over 1968. A visit to the school will show it bulging at the seams indicating the need for additional space, and with more space, comes more teachers and more books. Add to this the increased costs of both town and school budgets due to inflation and one wonders what can be done to better control over future spending.

Obviously, one cannot control all the factors which influence public expenditures. However, there are steps which can be taken to prevent uncontrolled growth of the town, and hence, uncontrolled spending.

The most important step is to adopt a zoning ordinance which permits the town to grow and expand with the desires of the citizens. We recommend that you vote in favor of the zoning ordinance being proposed in the Town Warrant to help accomplish this.

Keeping costs at a minimum is important but it is just as important that we all share these costs fairly.

This can only be done if all property in town is assessed on a fair and equitable basis so that each property owner pays his fair share of property taxes.

It takes skilled professionals to appraise property on an unbiased and equitable basis and we therefore urge you to vote in favor of the article on reevaluation.

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We appreciate the cooperation and help of all the citizens and especially wish to thank those who have served the town quietly but efficiently.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE VEASEY PARK COMMISSION

Veasey Park enjoyed a full season this summer, experiencing some minor vandalism to the bathroom, and some sand washout problems, particularly after exceptionally hard rainstorms.

The Town budgeted funds, and the much appreciated and needed donations, were used exclusively for the cost of operating the beach this past year.

Volunteer help towards the end of the season cleaned and extended the

drainage ditches above the sand area. This is expected to considerably reduce the washout problem. It is felt that perhaps in the future a more extensive drainage system will be needed to permanently solve the problem.

The Commission hopes that in the forth coming season that more contributions will be made by the users in order that the facilities, in the future, may be expanded, such as clearing a larger area for picnicking, more tables and benches, more fireplaces, paved drive and parking area.

It is recommended the following improvements be considered:

1. Sodium chloriding the drive and parking area to reduce the dust problem.
2. A styrofoam float, minimum of 12' X 12' be installed off shore.
3. Extending the off shore boundary buoys and placing a single warning buoy another fifty feet out for boating limits.

The Park belongs to the People of Deerfield and it is incumbent upon the users to keep it clean and safe for all.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

If the people of this nation ever subscribed to the concept of providing equality of educational opportunities, it has never been fully implemented. While some progress has been noted in the districts of Supervisory Union No. 53 from year to year, it has always been within the framework of the same basic program. It becomes particularly noticeable in the upper grades of the elementary schools, where boys and girls, whose interests begin to differ widely, continue to be subjected to the traditional academic program. With no opportunity to explore within broadened educational offerings, some young people become disillusioned about the values of education and, subsequently, never realize their potential.

Expansion of school programs depends upon facilities, equipment and teachers. For too long have we stood by complacently and allowed schools to be built without first determining what we should build. The reason for this is simple of explanation: Providing specialized facilities is more costly than building traditional academic classrooms; the less expensive the plan, the easier does it become to sell. In deference to the local taxpayer, the priorities of a child's right to an education become subverted. This is not to be construed that the individual property owner is opposed to good education; he rightly stands in opposition to assuming a disproportionate share of the tax load.

The time has come — if we really believe in equality of educational opportunity — to change our thinking about taxation. Based on an antiquated tax structure, providing for schools and all other phases of town government, the local citizens are finding it increasingly difficult to maintain the status quo, let alone improving services. As states have had to seek help from the federal government, it becomes increasingly mandatory that the towns and cities turn to the state. The big question here is with regard to the method of providing additional revenue. While no particular kind of tax reform is advocated in this report, one needs only to look at the differences in wealth amongst the towns of New Hampshire to appreciate that there are differences in what can be provided for education. The districts that make up Supervisory Union No. 53 had the following amounts of equalized valuation per pupil in 1968:

Allenstown	\$44,750
Candia	16,268
Deerfield	30,693
Hooksett	30,623
Pembroke	23,277
Raymond	21,974

The equalized valuation per pupil for Allenstown would be considerably lower if all children attended the public schools; a truer figure might be about \$20,000. The state average was \$35,510.

An examination of the wealth in some of the other towns makes it very evident that there is an uneven distribution:

Bow	\$143,259
Meredith	75,343
Newington	179,158
Moultonboro	232,642

Education is a function of the state and it would seem that steps to relieve the communities of the burden they have been carrying are long over due. Not only is the state in great measure ignoring its financial responsibilities, but, through standards imposed by the State Board of Education, even greater demands will be placed on the towns. Placing the blame on the state for not distributing wealth more equitably is to ignore the fact that it is up to the local representatives to agitate for tax reform in the General Court. Until such time as this occurs, heavier demands will continue to be placed on the local taxpayer, with no appreciable improvement in local education.

This is my last report and I want to take this opportunity to thank the members of the school boards, as well as those citizens who have served on numerous committees over the past years, for their support. I trust that my efforts, though seemingly small at times, have had some impact on the total educational program.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

Our report to you this year is of progress and growth and some of the resulting problems.

Of overriding concern to us all has been our rapidly growing school population and the crowded classrooms, overburdened teachers and scheduling difficulties that have resulted. It is our hope that you will all recognize the present and future need for additional facilities and act positively on the suggestions offered by the Building Study Committee, found elsewhere in this report, which they have established after two years of serious study and hard work.

In spite of these problems we feel we have been able to establish an excellent hot-lunch program, which operates at no cost to the Town, we have greatly expanded and improved our Library services, with many more books and good cataloging, and we have faithfully maintained our present building, with the repair and restoration of a 20 year old roof, and conscientious janitorial service.

In addition, we have been able to do this at a (per pupil) cost to the Town

that is one of the lowest in the State (\$124.00 less than State average figures). This has been possible due to generally good fiscal controls, the use of Cadet Teachers and Teacher's Aides, and to the many people of Deerfield who have helped in many ways, the friends of the library, the P.T.O., and many individual gifts and contributions.

This enabled us to return nearly \$3,000.00 of excess funds to the Town for the 1968-69 school year, and gives us the hope of returning nearly twice that much for the 1969-70 year.

With this report goes our pledge to you, the people of Deerfield, to continue to offer the best educational opportunities to our children, to help prepare them for a difficult future, consistent with the economies which we know are essential for our own survival. With your help we know we can accomplish these goals.

TO THE VOTERS OF DEERFIELD

Your School Building Study Committee has established the definite need for a school addition on the following basis:

1. Our school population has outgrown the 4 room addition of four years ago and 4 additional rooms are now urgently needed, (2 extra temporary classrooms are now in use and further

class divisions will be required for the coming year).

2. Conservative estimates show 325 students by the fall of 1973, or at least 13 rooms at a desirable 25 students per class.

3. The ultimate use of the existing site would limit enrollment to under 500 students because of state acreage and sewage disposal requirements.

4. Any addition of classrooms requires more "core area" such as kitchen,

eating space, administrative area, room for assemblies, etc.

On the above basis, the School Building Study Committee feels that development of the existing site to maximum capacity by the addition of 8 classrooms plus core area would be the best bargain for Deerfield at this time.

There will be a public hearing on the question and the required bond issue on Friday, February 20, 1970 at the George B. White School at 8:00 P.M. The bond

issue will be voted on by ballot at the School District Meeting on March 14, 1970, with polls open from 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. The School Building Study Committee asks for your YES vote on this important issue.
