TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby instructed to meet at the Adams Memorial Building in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect one selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Library Trustees, Trustees of the Trust Funds, Auditors, and all other necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.

2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, for building and repairing bridges, for the maintenance of trunk line and state aid roads, for the suppression of moths, for the police department and municipal court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of town officials, for the Board of Health, for the expense of town halls, for the support of libraries, for payments to the sinking fund, for state and county taxes, for the use of Upton Post No. 45, G. A. R. for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, for play ground purposes, for cooperating with the state and federal governments in control of the white pine blister and for all other necessary charges arising in said Town and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of cooper-

ating with the state in the permanent improvement of its highways in accordance with the provisions of chapter 84 of the Public Laws entitled "State Aided Highways" and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes on the negotiable notes of the Town and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will direct the Collector of Taxes to allow a discount to all persons paying their taxes within such period as the Town shall limit to fix the rate of such discount, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from all local taxes, for a period of five years, machinery and stock in trade of the Emerson Company, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will authorize its board of selectmen to abate during the years 1929 and '30 in whole or in part all local taxes which may be assessed upon machinery and stock in trade of the Emerson Company, providing the same may be lawfully done, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see if the town will vote to exempt from all local taxes for a period of five years, machinery and stock in trade of the Woodbury Shoe Manufacturing Company, Inc., and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will authorize its board of selectmen to abate during the years 1929 and '30 in whole or in part all local taxes which may be assessed upon machinery and stock in trade of the Woodbury Shoe Manufacturing Company, Inc., providing the same may be lawfully done, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its board of selectmen to contract with the Derry Electric Company for additional lighting service on its highways, raise and appropriate money for the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to grant leave to the Frederick J. Shepard family to erect upon the Parker Lot at East Derry a suitable and substantial building for the housing of the "Taylor Library", the same to be donated to the town when completed; the exact location of the building and construction thereof to be left to the Trustees of Taylor Library together with the donors, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for the Derry band, and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution and pass any vote relating thereto, viz: Resolved that the Citizens of the Town of Derry appreciate in the highest degree the munificent gift of MacGregor Pioneer Park and the MacGregor Library Building made to them by Elizabeth F. MacGregor and the executors under the will of Henry F. MacGregor late of Houston, Texas, and are gratefully sensible of the sterling character and rugged manhood of him to whom said gift will be a lasting memorial. That copies of this resolution shall be sent to said donors.

14. To appoint any necessary committee on any article embraced in this warrant.

15. To hear the reports of agent, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

PUBLIC LIBRARY

The second year in our new library building has come to a close and proves to us that we made no mistake in removing the library to its present location.

You will notice by the librarian's report that our circulation has been the largest on record, an increase of five per cent over our last annual report, which was due in part to our able and efficient librarian and her faithful assistants, which we all appreciate.

You will also note the number of books worn out and the number of replacements, which shows that we should receive the same appropriation as last year. The usual repairs to keep the property in first class condition have been made from time to time.

A large supply closet has been built in basement for storage purposes. We also contributed one-half the cost of the new cement walk in front of the building, which gives a finished appearance to the grounds.

The detail of the year's work will be found in the librarian's and treasurer's reports on another page.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank all who have donated books or other reading matter to the library, also the local press, which has very generously without cost published lists of new books added from time to time.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Trustees of the Derry Public Library:

The 24th annual report is herewith presented:

Two years in our new library building have passed, and this the second year has shown a marked gain in growth. In the circulation this increase can most easily be tabulated. We have during the year issued 46,174 books for home use the largest yearly circulation yet reached, and an increase of 5% over last year. It is the largest gain made in one year since 1924. This has meant extra work and more intensive work during rush hours by the library workers. The time is near when more help will be required to meet the increasing demands of the public. Much reference work is being done at the library and if more time could be given to this department it would be greatly appreciated by the students. At present we can help them only when not too busy at the circulation desk.

The work with the schools which meets the whole-hearted approval of the teachers and superintendent takes much time outside of library hours. Your librarian has made 36 school calls during the year, all in the forenoon, speaking to the pupils upon the advantages the library offers and in other ways trying to interest them in reading library books. She has also addressed the Parent Teachers Association and the Child Welfare Club of East Derry.

The vacation reading club was participated in during July and August by 56 children, 22 of which received diplomas for completing the course and reading 10 or more books from the prescribed list. Some read 35 and 40 books from this list during the two months.

Book Week was observed in November by an exhibit of nearly 100 children's books which were put into circulation the following week,

A children's story hour was conducted one day each week during the late spring by Mrs. Lena T. Beardsley. This was enjoyed by the children too young to take library books. It was made possible by the kindness of Mrs. Gilbert Hood in financing the course. It is earnestly hoped that sometime this may be a regular feature of the library work.

The picture collection has been increased but only time is needed to enlarge it much more, for there are many pictures waiting to be mounted and lettered. Before much increase can be made however another case must be provided in which to keep the pictures and make them accessible to those who would use them. Besides being used in the school-rooms by the teachers the pictures have been displayed in the library entrance, showing 50 or more at a time. These have been on special subjects, New England, our Western States, Japan, Asia and famous paintings are some of the groups shown thus far. These pictures have been admired and the source of favorable comment and the practice of exhibiting them will be continued.

We have purchased 811 books during the year. In order to bring them to the attention of the public, a list of 10 or 12 books with descriptive notes were published weekly during the late fall and winter and less often at other times. For this service the library extends its thanks to the publishers of our local papers. These lists have supplemented the regular quarterly bulletins which have been freely distributed at the library. Bulletin boards have also displayed the jackets of new books and items of interest in regard to books or authors.

Each month posters appropriate to the season have been made at the library and used to decorate the children's room. One bulletin board has been reserved for picture postcards of the scenes from our

own and foreign lands. Some of the cards used belong to the library others were loaned for the occasion. By keeping plants and flowering bulbs about the rooms and in all ways possible we have endeavored to make the library attractive and a pleasant place to pass a leisure hour.

Books are wearing out rapidly owing to the constant use they have and we have discarded a large number this year. This has been offset by the number added and I trust the same appropriation will be continued that the library may gain in volumes and in value to the community. Some fine illustrated editions of the classics have been added the past year, this has stimulated the reading of better literature and has been especially appreciated by the Academy teachers and students. I believe the policy of purchasing these better editions should be continued as our appropriation allows

An especially interesting set of reference books for the younger students has been added, "The World Book". The popularity of this set is evinced by the constant use it is having. The New Learned History has also been purchased and will be found useful by the older pupils.

Your Librarian attended the New England Conference of Library workers held in Portland, Maine, in June and also, in company with Mrs. Harriet D. Low, Trustee, a district meeting in Hollis, New Hampshire.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote in relation thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to build a wing in the school building in order for the school building to properly accommodate the pupils of the district and raise and appropriate a sum of money, or authorize the School Board to borrow a sufficient sum of money spread over a term of years to pay for the same; issuing the notes of the district according to R. S. 119:4.
9. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public

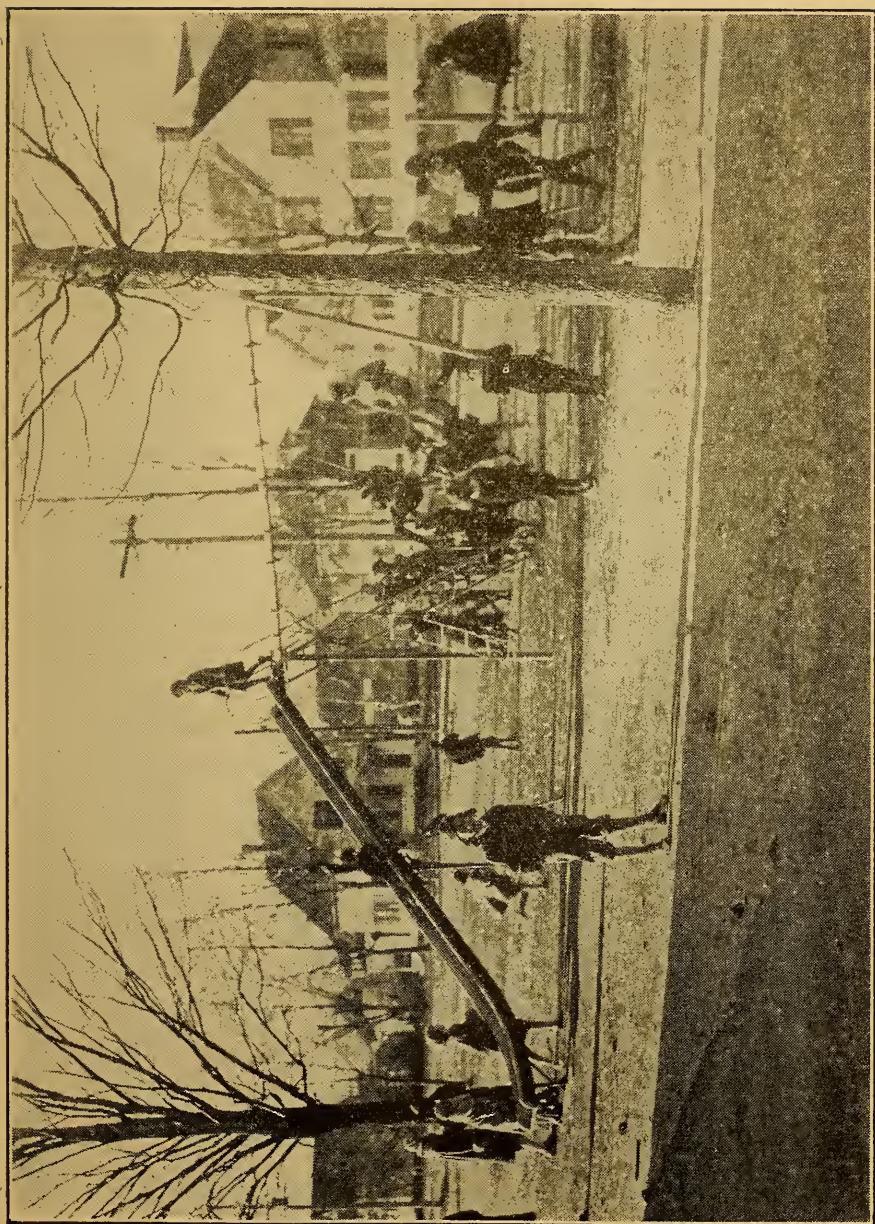

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS
To the Derry School Boards:

I take pleasure in presenting to you my ninth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. During the past year much attention has been given to a re-organization of the administration of the office. Larger quarters have been allotted to the school department for clerical work but a smaller space has been given for the storage of supplies. This necessitates the purchase of supplies more frequently than formerly when storage space was large enough for a year's supplies. Londonderry and Derry Village now utilize the facilities of this office for administrative purposes. Notwithstanding these changes a large part of the superintendent's time has been devoted to constructive work in methods of teaching and adjusting the materials of the curriculum so as to serve better the needs of the community.

Teachers

There were only three changes in the teaching force. One additional teacher was employed at Derry Village owing to over crowded conditions in the primary room. Miss Mary Gould, teacher of the first grade at Oak Street School resigned to accept a position in Manchester. Miss Lucille Nevers resigned to accept a position in the fifth grade at Winthrop, Mass. Miss Frances White resigned as teacher of history in the Junior school to accept the principalship of a grammar school at Plaistow, N. H. These vacancies were filled in the order named by Miss Maria Holmes, of Keene Normal School, 1928, Miss Grace Smart, Keene Normal School, 1928, Ellen Fortie, of No. 3 school Derry, Keene Normal School, 1926, and Viola Wilson of Manchester, Massachusetts who is a graduate of Provincial Normal School, Nova Scotia.

Miss Helene McLay of No. 5 School, Windham, was

selected to fill Miss Fortier's position at No. 3 Derry. While the number of teachers resigning has been the smallest in any one year I am glad to report that every one of these teachers has added strength to an already strong teaching force.

Progress

The problem of whether there has been any substantial improvement in the work of the schools was taken up at a recent teachers meeting. All teachers who have served several years assumed that there had been considerable improvement both in the efficiency of the teaching and the changes produced in the conduct of the children. It was claimed that the methods of study and conduct of the recitations had resulted in larger opportunities for self expression on the part of the pupils, that improved materials have produced a spirit of eagerness to experience life contacts and rivalries which beget comparison, analysis and thought. Assuming this to be a hypothetical statement, the teachers believed that an investigation of the work in reading during the past five years would disclose the validity of their claim better than tests in other subjects.

Improvement in Reading

In the spring of 1922 the Ayer's Burgess Test in reading was given. It is recorded on page 95 of the 1923 town report. This test has not been given since. It is a test designed solely to determine how many problems out of twenty may be read within three minutes. Since then the testing in reading and other subjects has been more for diagnostic purposes. January 23, copies of this test were sent out to the teachers of the same grades as in the spring of 1922. Approximately the same number of children were tested.

A study of the table discloses that the fourth grade

read with a median score of 8 this winter and in the spring of 1922 with a median of 6, an improvement of 33%. The fifth grade read with a median score of 10 this winter and 8 in 1922, an improvement of 25%. The sixth grade had a median of 10 in 1922 and a median of 11 this winter, showing an improvement of 10%. The seventh grade read with a median score of 9 in 1922 and a median of 15 this winter which is an improvement of 66% over the scores of 1922. The improvement in score from 12 to 16 in the eighth grade is an increase in efficiency of 33%. Considering any limitations that these tests may have the scores show such substantial improvement in the reading efficiency that there can be no doubt concerning the validity of the comparison.

A more technical examination of the two tests discloses that the scores in the 1929 test are distributed over an average range which is five steps narrower. This shows both an improvement in teaching and grading.

Statistics in Reading

A committee delegated to investigate the nature and quantity of the reading which has been done during the past six years at the public library reported the reading by school children as given in the table below. The figures show that children of the town read annually today eighteen books each. In 1923 the average number of books read per pupil was twelve. These figures record an increase of fifty per cent in the amount of actual reading done by the children of Derry. An efficient library and library officials account for some of this improvement. There has been as one teacher well put it an improvement in cooperation all round by teachers, pupils, parents and all who are identified with the growth of the child.

An Improved Course of Study

The teachers of the district through a number of committees have been working for several years upon an improved course of study. This year they were asked to submit recommendations to the New Hampshire Educational Council for changes which ought to be inaugurated in the elementary school program published by the State Board of Education.

As fundamental to any changes which may be made in the course of study the teachers felt that more careful studies of the most common and val-

uable connections and contacts in lay life should be made in order to determine the main objectives of the course of study. This means that a scientific analysis of the life of the child both in and out of school should be made and an analysis of the more common adult activities should be made for the purpose of relating them to the life of the child. This means that we are committed to the philosophical ideal that education is not only, the life of the child but that it is also preparation for the generally common activities of life which may be arranged in the course of study at the place where such activities may be taught best.

According to the philosophical doctrine adopted by our teachers relating to the activities of the child and his natural growth, the child should be the center of the educational situation, and the social needs of the community should be the force that provides the motives for education.

The course of study should provide ample opportunity for the child to express himself by discovering his own materials which he may use for educational purposes, or the origination of new products and by normal growth in happy living. It should provide for variations in the talents of pupils and the problem child. The course of study should provide definite materials properly organized and arranged so as to avoid the intellectual waste so common in spontaneous activities not properly organized.

With these limitations reserved our teachers have presented to the New Hampshire Council of Education the general changes which ought to be incorporated in the elementary school course of study. Many of these changes, in fact nearly all have already been incorporated in our own course of study and brought to the notice of parents and pupils through the goal cards.

Measurements

Last year's report made a record of some tests in arithmetic, geography, history, spelling and reading which were given during the fall term of 1927 for the purpose of comparing the progress of pupils in rural and urban schools. The total scores in these tests disclosed little or no difference in the advancement of the two types of schools upon the basis of these tests.

In the spring of 1928 another set of examinations was given covering the same subjects. The details of these total scores of the tests given are shown in the accompanying tables, III. and IV. Table III. shows the average scores fall, spring, and the average amount of gain each pupil made between the two tests together with the total scores of all the subjects of each grade.

In deriving these scores all the children of each grade were tested both rural and urban but only the scores of those children having the same mental ages were compared. Thus in arithmetic fundamentals, arithmetic problems, geography information, history information, spelling and reading the totals of each grade are summarized fall and spring with the total gain indicated.

Table IV shows the total scores of all of the grades fall and spring and the gains. Without going into an analysis of the scores in table III, the figures in table IV. disclose that in both the fall tests and the spring tests the rural school children made a larger score than urban children. The scores in the fall tests were somewhat larger than the spring scores in both rural and urban tests. This is doubtless due to the fact that the spring tests were slightly more difficult than the average pupil could do in order to bring the scores to the same level as the fall scores. It is to be noted that the net gain of the rural pupils over the urban pupils is only 5.2 points. It will be observed that this difference in gain between the rural and urban schools is less than three one hundredths or three fourths of one per cent. This difference is so small that it is hardly worth noticing. Hence we can assume that if the materials provided are the same and the quality of the teaching equally as good, the product of the two schools will be equal if the two types of schools are not too large.

The problem of whether the rural school offers the same opportunity concerning the social outcomes of education is not answered by above study.

Health

The health work of the schools for the year beginning February 1928 to January 1929 may be summarized as follows:

1. Routine physical examinations of the pupils were made by the local physicians in the fall. Parents were notified by card and in some instances, personally of all defects. The diagnoses revealed six-hundred and eighty-six defects which are classified below. Many of these defects have already been corrected, and many more need to be.

2. The nourishment of the pupils is enriched by

the service of milk in the local schools. Hot lunches are served in the rural schools during the cold months.

3. A number of pupils have been taken to Manchester for tonsil and adenoids, operations and orthopedic examinations. Appliances have been fitted to straighten backs, shoulders, or supports for deformed feet.

4. The under weight clinics established by Dr. Kerr of Manchester have been held frequently. Parents are brought into this clinic for the purpose of advising them relative to the diet and correct ways of living.

5. Many children were detected with defective eyesight and hearing. A number of these cases have been corrected.

Assuming that the health examinations are as carefully performed as usual the statistics for the past five years show increasing gains in health. This year six hundred and thirty-six defects were found among the school children while in 1922 seven hundred and thirty-nine were found which indicates a loss of 15% in the number of defects located by the various clinics.

Much credit is due to the Derry Woman's Club which conducts an annual drive to support the milk clinic. No doubt much of the improvement in the health status is due to this clinic. The local Red Cross also deserves to be mentioned for assisting deserving pupils in obtaining proper health treatments.

Playground Equipment

Approximately five hundred dollars worth of playground equipment has been distributed among the three main units of the town. The school committee were enabled to purchase this equipment by the generosity of the Parent-Teachers Association, The Woman's Club and the Playground Committee. An accompanying cut shows the piece of apparatus which was contributed by the Woman's Club in action at the Oak Street School. The teachers have found that the use of this apparatus not only creates health and strength but that its use is productive of a happiness that improves school life.

Housing

The problem of housing the school children of the town deserves the attention of both district meetings. At Derry Village one or two more rooms should be added to the existing units, preferably two rooms, which will give amply opportunity for the practical arts and preparation of hot lunches as at all of the other schools.

The Junior school has increased to such a large number that only five teachers are caring for two hundred pupils. More space must be provided. A wing built on to the Floyd School or a remodelling of the Oak Street School with fire proof vestibules would provide adequate space.

Plans for these projects should be submitted to the district meetings.

Assuring you once more of my appreciation of your hearty cooperation in the many problems that have arisen during the past year, and taking this opportunity to thank all others whose contributions to the welfare of the schools have not previously been acknowledged, this report is
