THE 1947 TOWN MEETING

Summary of Action taken at Town Meeting held March 11, 1947 and Explanation of Special Appropriations Expended during the year.

Article 4. The Sum of \$55,621 was raised as the Town Budget for the year. This amount was about \$5,000 more than in the previous year.

Article 7. The sum of \$2,500 was raised for a War Memorial. The original motion to install a new Town Clock was amended so that plaques listing those who were in the service were to be erected. This amendment, without increasing the appropriation, was inadequate to purchase both clock and plaques. But the Committee installed two plaques; one for World War One and one for World War Two and, later in the year, purchased a clock (one face only) with the intention of asking for a further appropriation in 1948.

Article 8. The sum of \$500 was raised for the use of the Bicentennial Committee. This amount is still being carried on our books for the use of the Committee.

Article 9. One thousand dollars was raised to repair the sidewalks. Several entrances over the sidewalks were lowered and paved with tar and sidewalks were patched in several places.

Article 10. The sum of \$1,000 was raised and an electrical fire siren was installed on the south side of the Town House.

Article 12. The sum of \$2,000 was raised to repair part of the Lake Road. Culverts were installed, road widened and gravelled. With a further appropriation this year this road can be vastly improved.

Article 13. The sum of \$1,000 was raised to improve Pumpelly Hill Road. The tar was scarified and the hill gravelled.

Article 14. The sum of \$500 was raised for shingling and painting the tool barn. The shingling only was done.

Article 15. The sum of \$1,500 was raised to install and repair water holes. Several holes were repaired but no additional ones constructed.

Article 19. The sum of \$4,000 was raised to purchase a new truck. The Town purchased a new International 3 Ton truck and with the balance of new equipment money left over from 1946 appropriation a Galion grader and two truck snow plows were also purchased.

The total amount of these special appropriations amounted to \$13,000 which added to the budget brought our total appropriation up to \$68,621.11, this amount being about \$6,000 more than in previous year of 1946 . . . and owing to a small cash surplus our revenue for 1947 was about \$2,500 less than in 1946. Consequently, less revenue and a larger appropriation

made our tax rate rise about \$4.00 per thousand.

The Selectmen's recommendations for the coming year call for several special appropriations and the budget will be about the same as last year. The total amount to raise, however, will be less. Therefore, a reduction in the tax rate of about \$2.00 per thousand can be had.

We further call attention to graph and tables on following pages which give a picture of appropriations, assessments, expenditures, and valuations for several previous years.

Hoping the above explanations may be of some help to the voters of the town,

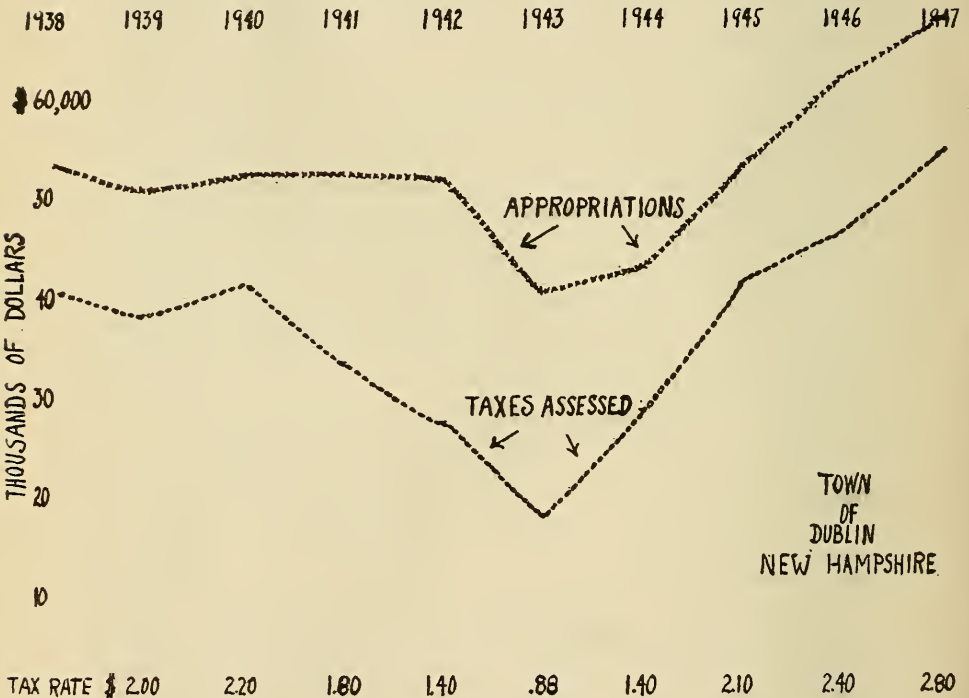


TABLE OF VALUATIONS FOR THE PAST FIVE YEARS

Owing to the increase of real estate values in general during the last few years, Towns were instructed by the State Tax Commission to raise these.

Accordingly during the past year, the Selectmen revalued most of the real estate in Town in an endeavor to show property

values in true proportion. We feel on the whole these revised valuations are fair and just.

There are a few places on which the valuation was either too high or too low. Some have been adjusted and others can be easily corrected in another year.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dublin qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 9th, 1948 at nine o'clock in the forenoon until five o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

2. To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Water Commissioners, Library Trustees, and Trustees of Trust Funds,

3. To choose all other necessary Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, and Committees for the ensuing year.

4. To hear reports of Agents, Officers, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and for any other purposes that may be mentioned in the budget.

6. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply for Town Road Aid.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to purchase two more faces for the Town Clock or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of the road on the South side of Dublin Lake or take any action relating thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to enlarge and repair present Fire Station or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to design and excavate for a new building adequate enough to house all highway equipment or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new tractor to replace the present tractors or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deeds.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to purchase new snow fence or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY AGENT

In reviewing the activities and accomplishments of the department during the past year, there are several outstanding events which I wish to recall. First, the abnormally dry season and the inability to purchase calcium chloride prevented us from properly maintaining our gravel roads. Many yards of gravel will have to be added to replace those lost by these conditions.

Several miles of brush were cut but could not be burned because of the fire hazard existing in late summer. This condition will also exist in early spring, causing an added task for this department.

This winter of 1947-48 has been the severest that this department has encountered for many years. The equipment has withstood the strain very well. However, we have missed the large tractor. Since this tractor is 12 years old and requires several hundred dollars to recondition, we should replace this piece of equipment.

I wish to recall my remarks in last year's report concerning the inadequate garage and storage space at the highway tool barn. Considering the shortage of space and the weakening structural condition of this building, some action should be taken for improvement.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency, based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped, rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or are in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available manpower in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near

woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

B. Administrative Policy

The position of first place in this report is selected for the discussion of the topic of administration not because it is of major importance but because it is the machinery which puts into operation the process for which the schools exist: the instruction of the child. In order that the child may have the educational opportunity which society wishes for him, teachers for subjects from beginning reading to advanced mathematics, debating or metal turning must be procured; buildings with their heating, plumbing and lighting facilities, and building furnishings from clocks to pupils' desks and power saws must be maintained; janitor service must be furnished; instructional materials from textbooks to preserved grasshoppers must be selected and a continuing supply provided, and transportation, safe and comfortable, must be operated. In a democracy the answer to all problems arising from all of these various areas must be found in the light of the welfare of the child. The need for wise decisions in handling these problems is a tremendous challenge to the highest type of educational leadership and cannot come without it but the wisest decisions will be reached and the soundest policies developed not by such leadership alone, but will only grow out of a continuous frank and honest cooperative interplay of the interests and energies of professional educators, school boards and intelligent, public-spirited laymen. Man's search for a life of order and peace will be successful only to that degree that education meets the developing challenges of each generation and education will meet those challenges to that extent that those laymen of greatest wisdom and public spirit give of their abilities to the continuing development of the school. The schools belong to the people and must be what the people want. They will be good when the people take time to study their needs carefully and conscientiously and they will fail when the people neglect to support them or support them with money alone. They are the living part of our social existence and they derive their vitality solely from the very life streams of society's individual members. They must continuously receive the radiant energy of the very souls of the people. It is urgent that all take as active a part as possible in those activities that pertain to the school: P. T. A. meetings and committee work, school district meetings, forums for discussion of school matters, etc. The people of the Monadnock Region are constantly evidencing a high interest in cultural and educational matters. We should continue to strive to develop this potentiality into an ever more effective working force for the growth of our schools.

The decision of Margaret (Robb) King to discontinue her teaching in Dublin was a great loss, not only to the local school, but also to the teaching profession as a whole. We were fortunate, indeed, to get such a promising teacher as Miss Putnam to fill the vacancy. She graduated last June from Keene Teachers College with a Bachelor's Degree having taken a course for elementary teachers and done much work in music, both on and off campus.

Last year two teachers, Mr. Lewis and Miss Grimes, improved their professional training by attending evening courses at Keene Teachers College during the year. This year Miss Grimes is continuing her professional study by attending the Keene Teachers College Extension Course in Social Studies being offered to teachers in this supervisory union at Jaffrey.

B. Program and Methods

To stimulate improvement in the schools in both program and methods of instruction in the social studies field, with particular emphasis on the elementary level, a forty-five hour extension course is being offered by Keene Teachers College to teachers in this supervisory union. A class of fifteen teachers—four from Peterborough, ten from Jaffrey, and one from Dublin—normally meets each Monday from four to six-thirty at the Jaffrey Grade School. The instructor, Miss Wilson, is doing an excellent job in making available for reference source materials and in stimulating productive thinking. The social concepts the boys and girls get in school today will have much to do with their future happiness and welfare. It is unwise to continue to use textbooks, maps, workbooks, etc., that inculcate concepts not in keeping with our present-day needs. There is great need for more interesting and better adapted materials of instruction in the schools and this course is helping greatly in discovering what materials are best suited for use, how to obtain them, and how to use them.

The plan initiated last year to improve the instructional materials in reading, social studies, health and science has been continued with some additional material procured. There is still a dearth of modern social studies material on the market but this condition is gradually improving. Another year should see still further progress made in the local schools in this field.

A. Report of School Nurse

Ola M. Myhaver

The following report is the summary of the health activities at the Dublin Consolidated School from January 2, 1947 to December 31, 1947.

At the beginning of the year parents of new entrants were requested to fill out a disease census card. This report was then transferred to the Student Health card and placed on file in the school. Also transferred from the physical growth chart to the health card were the height, weight and average weight for height and age, and the records of vision and hearing. (In the testing of vision the Snellen's (letter E) chart is used. In the testing of hearing the Pure-tone (Maico) audiometer is used. The latter test seems to be a great improvement over the old procedure). The school health examinations of students were then completed by the Medical Inspector, Dr. Donald M. Clark, assisted by the school nurse.

In the follow-up of the defects of pupils found parents have been notified of the defects of their children by letters, interviews or home visits by the school nurse. Cooperation of parents is necessary if defects are to be corrected. The nurse visited the school and made inspection of students at regular intervals each month.

In compliance with the laws of the State Board of Health regulating control of communicable diseases, exclusions have been made and all grades of the school were closed Sept. 16 to 19 inclusive and grades 5 & 6 inclusive on account of a communicable disease.

Classroom inspection has been carried on by the classroom teacher each day. Health classes are conducted by Mrs. Blomgren and first-aid treatment is delegated to Miss Grimes through the principal, Mr. Lewis. Minor accidents have been cared for. The first-aid cabinet is equipped for minor injuries.

Other health activities include:

- (a). The service of cod liver oil (sponsored by the Woman's Club);
- (b). A dental clinic by Dr. Lawrence at his office in Peterborough (sponsored by the Woman's Club);
- (c). The service of a "Hot Dish" lunch sponsored by the Board of Education (local) by the seventh and eighth grade girls under the direction of Mrs. Lewis. This year the service was begun in November rather than in January. It will be continued until the 22nd week;

(d). Through the cooperation of the State Board of Health and the Tuberculosis Association with the Board of Education (local and state) tuberculin skin tests and X-rays were taken at the school by the Tuberculosis Association nurse, Mrs. Aiken, and the X-ray technician, Mr. Alden, and the school nurse.

No child is sent to any clinic without the consent of the parents.

The Medical Inspection Department wishes to express appreciation to the organizations (state and local) that assisted in the health program and to thank the dentists, teachers, principal, superintendent and Board of Education and all others for their cooperation.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purchase of new equipment.

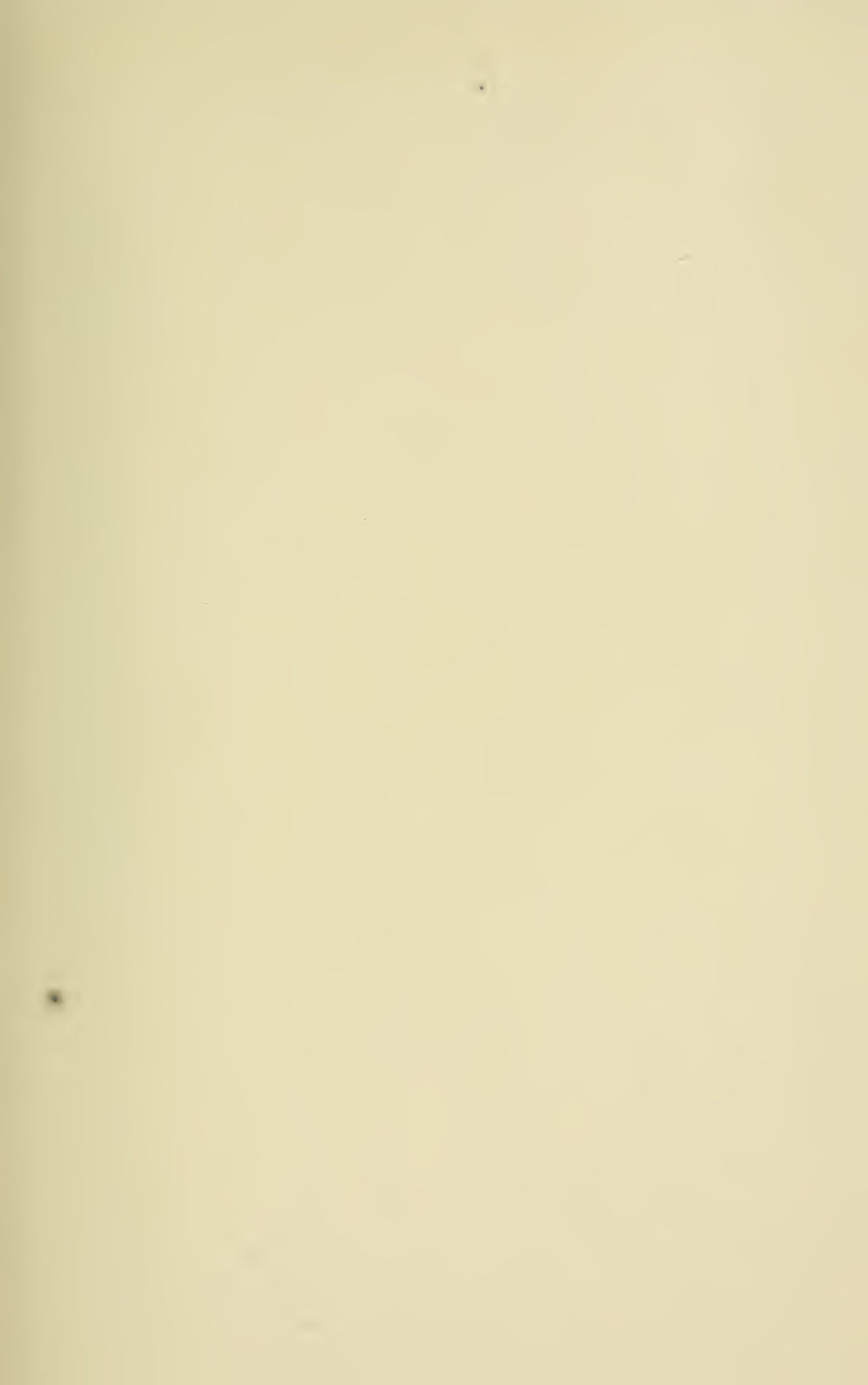
