TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Farmington, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one selectman for three years, one selectman for one year, a town clerk, two auditors, a trustee of the trust funds for three years, and three budget committee members for three years, and one for one year and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

You are also notified to meet at the Town Hall at seven o'clock in the afternoon on Wednesday, the 10th day of March, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of general government as defined in the budget.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for forest fire protection.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance for the town employees.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 to be applied to the payment for services of a district nurse, of said town, said funds to be disbursed through the Farmington Visiting Nurse Association.

- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town. (By request).
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for vital statistics.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Strafford County Guidance Center.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the Health Department and Town Dump.
- Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for summer and winter maintainenance of highways and bridges and for the general expense of the Highway Department.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.18 in order to assure State Aid in the amount of \$8,667.84 for the improvement of Class IV and V Highways.
- Article 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association. (By request).
- Article 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance, town poor and soldiers aid.
- Article 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post No. 60, American Legion, to be used for Memorial Day observance.
- Article 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of parks and playgrounds.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$185.00 to help defray the cost of Christmas lighting.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the maintenance of the Cocheco River Project.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$864.70 to pay for water service at Davidson Rubber.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,000.00 to purchase a new loader.

Article 22. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair and paving of another section of Spring Street, from the new section on, which had been started two years ago. (By Petition).

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to reinburse the sum of \$1,542.00 for the sewer line run on town property on Berry Court and the aforementioned sum be divided equally between, Edward Hersom, Gertrude Rollins and William Eldridge. (By Petition).

Article 24. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to zone Lancelot Shores for single family dwellings of masonry and or frame construction. No Mobile Homes or Trailers or Tents or Quonset Huts

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to use parks and playgrounds for other purposes.

Article 26. To hear reports from the Sewer Committee and Planning Board and to transact such other business as may legally come before this meeting.

Respectfully Submitted BARBARA G. DREW, R.N. Farmington Visiting Nurse The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture—to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. with the following exceptions:

Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

- 2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?
- 3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help," and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

As may be seen from the above, the recruitment of teachers continued as a problem. There is some indication that this problem may diminish, but it will still, as we see it, be a problem in the area of the primary grades, special class teachers, science and mathematics, and similar areas.

Another problem confronting the district is classroom space. A Building Needs Committee has been working on this problem and its final recommendations are to be found elsewhere in this School District Report. It is urged that careful study be given to this problem, and that the article relating to a building comm—ittee in the School District Warrant be given careful consideration.

Although an AREA School Study Committee was appointed at the 1969 District Meeting, at this writing it had not met with its alter-ego from Middleton and its work has not been completed.

Perhaps the most important problem to be considered by the District and the Board in the immediate future is the effect that the new minimum standards for elementary schools will have on the educational program of the district. These minimum standards are expected to be well on the way toward complete implementation by the start of the 1972–73 school year. For purposes of explanation, there follows a resume of the standards and the progress the district has made toward implementation.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The undersigned herewith submits this annual report for the period beginning January 1, 1970, and ending December 31, 1970.

The 1970—71 school year began on Wednesday, September 9, 1970, with 355 students, an increase of five students over the previous year's beginning enrollment. Six classroom teachers were replaced and one additional staff member was added.

For years this report has mentioned the "lack of continuity in the Farmington High School teaching staff," as a major draw—back to quality education at Farmington High School. This year is no exception as I should like to run a comparison of my three years as follows: 1968–69 — eleven (11); 1969–70 — eight (8); and 1970–71 — six (6). Turnover figures for the three years would thus be 25 based on the 20 teaching positions. This fig—out to 125% turnover of teachers during those three years. Ac—companying this is the fact that two teachers were replaced during the 1969–70 school year, and one new teacher was added during the current school year. One position actually had five different teachers during the 1969–70 school year. I mention these statistics to underline one everpresent theme: We cannot offer our students quality education until we can attract and hold quality educators.

Until the above—mentioned situation is corrected, I do not feel that our students are given the same opportunity that sur-rounding communities give their children, and we are negligent in our obligations.

The positive aspects of the 1969—70 year certainly deserve notice; namely, the 1970 Class M Basketball championship, Mr. Kourkounas' tutoring program; Mike Furber's assuming the custodial care of Farmington High School, Kiki Morris and her staff feeding 80% of Farmington High School and Memorial Drive School daily, and the advent of computer scheduling at Farmington High School for the 1971—72 school year. The above are mainly attributed to the personal effort of the individuals in charge; Art Parissi, George Kourkounas, Mike Furber, and Kiki Morris. I feel these contributions should be noted and acknowledged.

The physical limitations of Farmington High School continue to present obstacles. Classrooms are filled to capacity and every available bit of space is utilized continuously. A most serious problem is developing here, and I feel it cannot be ignored much longer. Foresight and planning must develop. It is my sincere hope that our educational process will be determined by considerations other than economy. We are morally obliged to provide education for the community and the citizens of Farmington, the best education available. Unfortunately, taxpayers' money must precede and support this concept. Our "kids" must compete for education and jobs with students in other communities offering much more. Our direction is clear and our children's education far surpasses any priority for community support.

In closing I should like to thank those citizens of Farm-ington, the students of Farmington High School and the faculty at Farmington High School for their support of my administration at Farmington High School last spring. It is always unfortunate when personal attack clouds our real goals and objectives; however, I sincerely express my gratitude.

MAIN STREET SCHOOL FI EMENTARY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Main Street School has had three new teachers added to its staff: Mrs. Ann Sobocinski (Math. and Lang.) who replaces Mr. Richard Welch; Mrs. Miriam Winter (Reading and Lang.) who replaces Mrs. Sylvia Kastberg; Mr. Garrett Vander Els (Math and Social Studies) who replaces Mr. David Roberts. Mrs. June McIntyre replaces Mrs. Vera Maxfield who, because of ill health, tendered her resignation in December, 1970.

On a limited basis we have implimented a physical education program utilizing the facilities offered to us by the 500 Boys' Club. The program is instructed by Mrs. Sobocinski, Mr. Gould and Mr. Vander Els. The program, which is on a once-a-week basis, has been well met by the students and faculty.

The students at Main Street have painted their own basketball court on the boys' side of the playground and through a generous gift from the Singletree 4-H Club, the girls will have their own half court in the spring; presently the girls use the boys' basketball court once a week.

Gradually we are replacing some badly worn text books, primarily in the areas of Social Studies, Language Arts and Science. Also texts in the above subjects have been purchased that are grade level topics but written for those students whose reading level is not up to their grade level. I feel that this is an important step for us at Main Street.

I must mention that we are becoming more and more seriously overcrowded. At the time of this report the total enrollment here at Main Street is 267, which strains our facilities, educational and physical. This large enrollment coupled with our small playground area creates problems. The breakdown by grades is as follows: Grade 5 - 94, Grade 6 - 86, Grade 7 - 87, Total 267.

I feel I must also mention the condition of the building proper especially the classrooms. Several classrooms have paint and plaster flaking and chipping. There are water stains on several walls and ceilings. While I realize that Main Street is not a "new" building I do not think that the above mentioned conditions are conducive to either an educational climate or to the type of student we try to graduate to the High School.

In closing I would like to express my appreciation to the parents, tomy staff and to the Superintendents Office. I include a special note of thanks to our teacher's aide, Mrs. (Fox) Bergaglio who has proved to be of immeasurable help to the staff and to myself.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The teaching staff at Memorial Drive School had a turnover rate of 50% from the 1969—1970 school year. The six new teachers on the staff are Miss Mary Rundlett, grade 1, Mrs. Victoria Gremlitz and Mrs. Bonnie Wilkinson, grade 2, and Mrs. Susan Clough and Mrs. Mary Cullen, grade 3 and Mr. Richard Welch, grade 4 and principal.

The enrollment at Memorial Drive continues to be a problem with an average of thirty two in grades one and two. The maximum set by the New Hampshire State Department of Education for an approved elementary school is twenty five with twenty being the recommended number.

Grades three and four are now under the minimum of thirty pupils in each classroom, however next year the third grade class will be above this figure as classes move up.

Steps have been taken toward meeting the library requirement of the minimum standards through the use of federal funds under Title II ESEA to purchase approximately 600 new elementary library books.

The physical plant at Memorial Drive School does not meet the requirements for space noticeably lacking are an elementary lib-rary, space for much needed special education, and adequate class-room space to allow for recommended class sizes.

Future planning should allow for a full time non-teaching principal, a secretary for the elementary school and a guidance counselor for the elementary school to meet requirements in these areas.

A new program of Physical Education under the direction of Mrs. Mary Cullen has been instituted.

The music program is again under the direction of Miss Edith Skidds. The Christmas concert by the children was well attended and included participation by students, a number by the teachers, and audience participation in carol singing.

The curriculm is being enriched by educational television particularly in literature, science, and history.

Miss Rundlett, grade one teacher, and Mr. Richard Welch, principal, attended seperate conferences held by the New Hampshire School Readiness Project. The major concern of this project is to

acquaint teachers and administrators with the concept of a child's readiness for school and the individual differences of incoming first graders with an eye to avoiding the constant frustrations of failure by children who are unready for school programs.

The students and staff at Memorial Drive School are indeed appreciative of the tutoring program which is being offered by the Farmington High School students under the direction of Mr. George Kourkounas with the cooperation and support of Mr. Erwin. Tutored students, teachers and student tutors are all pleased with the arrangements. Much progress has been made by the tutors who are able to work one to one or in small groups to hear reading, assist in phonics or mathematics and other subject areas.

Parents are reminded that the school is a service to them and that they are welcome to call or come to the school to discuss any school problem.

I wish to thank teachers, others principals, townspeople, the librarians at the town and school libraries, the school board, and administration for their help and cooperation during the school year.

The School Nurse herewith submits her report for the 1969—1970 school year.

The communicable disease incidence was low with the following number of cases found: chicken pox — six cases, mumps — one case, and impetigo — seventeen cases.

There were seventeen cases of pediculosis (head lice) last year and all seventeen cases were reported and treated.

The School Dental Clinic, sponsored by the Farmington Visit—
ing Nurse Association was started in January 1970. Grades one
through seven participated with a total of three—hundred and sixty
three students taking advantage of the clinic. The teeth were cleaned
examined, and given a flouride treatment: all parents were notified
of any defects and advised to take their children to their family
dentist as so on as possible.

The Pre-School Round-up was held on May 4, 5 and 6 and seventy-four children were registered at the :ound-up to start school in September 1970. Each child received a vision test, a hearing test, was weighed and measured, and had a dental check. A medical hist-ory was also taken of each child.

The Orthopedic Clinics were held in Dover (Nurses Home) during the months of December and May and four children attended.

A measles clinic (old fashion measles) was held in November 1969 for grades one through six and one—hundred and nine children received their measles shot. A Rubella Clinic (German measles) was held in April 1970 for grades one through four and two—hundred and thirty—nine children received their Rubella Shot (German Measles Shot).

Heaf Testing (for tuberculosis) was offered to grade one and grade seven and one—hundred and seventy—five students took advan—tage of this test.

School health physical examinations were carried out by the school physicians, Dr. George E. Quinn and Dr. Robert E. Lord. Five—hundred and fifty—six children were examined. Whenever there was an abnormal condition found, the parents were notified and advised to consult their family physician. Minor defects were promp—tly treated.

Vision testing was administered to five—hundred and ten stu—dents. Hearing tests with Maico Audiometer were done throughout the school year to help students and two—hundred and thirty—two students were tested.

No child needs to go without glassas because financial assistance is available in obtaining proper diagnosis and corrective treatment. This may be arranged through the school nurse with the help of various organizations.

During the school year, five—hundred and eighty—seven home calls (contacts with parents) were made by the school nurse.

In concluding this report it is a privilege to cite the cooperation of the following organizations and groups who helped in many ways and many times throughout the school year: Kiwanis Club, Salvation Army, Farmington Woman's Club, American Legion, Legion Auxiliary, Elks Club, Rainbow Girls, 500 Boys club, V.F.W. and V.F.W. Auxiliary and Ladies' Church Service Organizations. These clubs and organizations are continuously serving and helping to provide suitable clothing, dental and visual aid, food and many other things for the school children and their families. By doing so they help build a better and healthier community.

REPORT OF THE GUIDANCE COUNSELOR

Report of the Guidance Counselor to the Superintendent of Schools:

The counseling services are concerned in acquiring a thorough knowledge of each student as an individual; to know his abilities, interests, aptitudes, mental, physical, and emotional condition, family background including economic status, and other pertinent information which indicate the way to his best adjustment now and in later life. As in previous reports, I still hold to this philosophy of counseling.

Approximately 42 per cent of the Farmington High School grad—uates go on for further education with about 21 per cent to four year colleges and about 15 per cent to junior colleges, nursing programs, business schools, beautician schools, manpower schools, vocational colleges and technical schools. The per cents are based on the classes of 1967, 1968, 1969, and 1970. Approximately 73 per cent of the graduates who go on for further education are still attending or have completed their respective programs. Around 72 per cent of the graduates who have enrolled in four year colleges are still attending and approximately 75 per cent of the graduates who have enrolled are still attending or have completed one or two year programs. The per cents are based on the classes of 1967, 1968, and 1969.

Graduates have been accepted at such institutions as the University of New Hampshire, Jackson College, Plymouth State College, Keene State College, Laconia Vocational College, Portsmouth Vocational College, Northeastern University, McIntosh College, United States Air Force Academy, Houle's Beauty Academy, Portsmouth Beauty College, Concord Hospital School of Nursing, Salem State College, Belknap College, Canaan College, New Hampshire Department of Employment Security Manpower Training, Simmons College, Wellesly College, and Boston College.

The guidance department cooperates with the Department of Employment Security in assisting the graduates who expect to enter the world of work. Several of the graduates have been able to find employment locally. The General Aptitude Test Battery is adminis—tered to all interested seniors. This test is a useful tool in determining an individual's aptitudes for entering various fields of work or occupations.

Some of the graduates have entered the Armed Services. Representatives from the Army, Air Force, Coast Guard, Marines, and Navy have spoken to interested students about their respective services.

Three projects which the Guidance Department has undertaken this year are perhaps worthy of note. One of these projects is the tutoring program. Approximately sixty students volunteered to participate during their study periods. Some Farmingtoh residents have also volunteered for the program. Each tutor teaches on a one to one basis for high school students with learning disabilities. These pupils appeared to lack sufficient arithematic, reading, and writing skills for independent living in the adult world.

The second project, educational and occupational material for career planning, is geared for every student. Articles have been submitted to local newspapers pertaining to careers. Individuals who are either training for a career or who are presently employed have spoken to interested students about their respective jobs and training requirements. Movies, films, film strips, and tapes, have been used in explaining careers.

The third project is conducting a series of lectures relating to drugs. The lectures cover what drugs are, legitimate manufacture of drugs, physchological and psyiological effects, what signs to watch, and dangers of drug abuse.

The guidance department attempts to use the team approach. Conferences with teachers, administration, school nurse, parents, and other community organizations interested in assisting students are held frequently.

Community resources as Educational Talent Search, Upward Bound, Strafford Guidance Clinic, Farmington Police Department, New Hampshire Departments of Welfare, Probation, Vocational Rehabilitation, Blind, and Employment Security, college and vocational representatives and the armed services are utilized by the guidance department in assisting students.

In closing, no guidance program would be successful unless you have the cooperation of the administration, faculty, school secretary, students, community, and the local government agencies. To them, I am grateful.

FARMINGTON BUILDING NEEDS COMMITTEE FINAL REPORT

The Farmington Building Needs Committee met three times during the 1970—71 School Year and completed its study on January 11, 1971. It completed its study with an assessment of the effect the Elementary School Minimum Standards, the implementation of which are scheduled to begin in September of 1972, would have on the Farmington School System.

In order to meet the minimum standards and projected population growth of the Farmington School District, the Building Needs Committee recommends the construction of the equivalent of twelve class-rooms.

- 1. For grades 1-8, a minimum of 2,800 square feet of space for library services and twenty six standard classrooms of 900 square feet are needed. At the present time, there are eighteen classrooms of standard size available.
- 2. The suggestions listed below are made in an effort to provide a solution to the Farmington School housing problem.
- a. It is recommended that the school system be organized as an eight grade elementary school and a four grade high school. The first eight grades are to be housed in two or more buildings.
- b. Reinstate, as originally planned when the high school was designed, the science facility, the art facility, the business suite, and the guidance center.
 - c. The Main Street School is to house grades 7 and 8, and include space for a library and a special classroom.
 - d. The solution suggested for grades 1 through 6 is to add the equivalent of twelve classrooms, which would include space for supportive services, such as library, guidance, and the like.

As this report completes the task charged to the Building Needs Committee, it respectfully requests its discharge from service and strongly recommends the appointment of a Building Committee to carry on this work. It further recommends that a sum of money be made available to the Building Committee to enable it to negotiate for an architect, or similar consultive service, to carry on its work.
