# Warrant for Town Meeting

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(L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Grafton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Grafton on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls to close at four o'clock in the afternoon.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

4. To see what discount if any the Town will vote to allow upon all property taxes paid within fifteen days from date of bill.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make short term loans in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of maintaining Highways and Bridges, including the amount of one-fourth of one percent.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of cutting bushes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's deed.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to continue street lighting.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for tractor repairs.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the care of the common at Grafton Center.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$810.46 and thereby receive \$5,403.07 from the State for Town Road Aid.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the control of White Pine Blister Rust in cooperation with the Forestry and Recreation Department for the current year.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,400.00 for payment on Long Term Grader note and interest on same.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Old Home Day.

16. To see if the Town will vote to paint the interior of the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old Highway from Wilkins Corner so-called to the State Highway at L. M. Hazen's.

18. Shall the provisions of chapter 171-A on the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town?

19. To see if the Town will vote to accept a trust fund of \$200.00 from Mildred S. Braley, the income thereof to be used for the perpetual care of the Edwin L. and Flora E. Sargent lot in the Grafton Center Cemetery. Fund to be known as the Edwin L. and Flora E. Sargent Trust Fund,

20. To take any vote or transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

### Superintendent's Report

The past school year has been marked by the biggest material gains for a long time. Canaan has built and is now occupying a 10-room elementary school, Bristol's memorial school is now nearing completion and several other milestones have been passed. Hebron completely rebuilt its school adding a heating room and now has one of the best, if not the best, rural school in the state. Groton added automatic oil to its school; Bridgewater completed the furnace room, insulated, and painted and the other towns did significant amounts of maintenance. A great deal of repair and maintenance work has been done in the past five years and systematic programming of work should be continued. This may be done in some districts on a lower per year cost but it is questionable economy over a period of years to do nothing and then try to "catch up" for the years past. This may work well only in case such work is done on the down swing of an economic cycle but the chances seem just as good that they might have to be done on the reverse swing with inflated prices. A moderate amount of money on a yearly basis should now keep most of our buildings in good repair.

Our most successful workshop of the four was held this year on "Improving Reading." The teachers through their own members organized this, secured the speakers, and in general planned and executed the whole thing; a very fine achievement. After experimenting with various times of the year the Labor Day week was selected and proved a fine choice. Efforts will be made in the future to hold workshops during that week if possible. It is not a good week to obtain speakers but otherwise seems perfect. There will be no workshop next year since we all feel that we need a year to consolidate what gains we have made and to work continuously on reading and related problems.

For once Union No. 4 seems to be in front of a mod-

ern swing in educational circles back to more of the fundamentals. However, we should not feel too elated over this since we are in the fore only because we've never had the time or money to be greatly concerned with educational frills and it may be more truthful to say that the parade has made the cycle and finds us on its return trip! In spite of all modern theories and practices if we can keep classes small enough, and staffed well enough so that we do not lose sight of the individual child and do the best we can for him in school and out we will not err too much and our pupils will have a solid foundation.

This "reporter" believes in trying to keep well informed and to keep others with whom he works well informed. To overlook the fact that we do not live by ourselves alone and that we are in a highly competitive society would be disastrous to our children. Potentially excellent teachers, and even some of fine experience, are being drawn away from teaching by better paying positions either in the semi-skilled or skilled trades. Just one instance will show this. During the past week a representative of the federal government was in a high school looking for typists to start at over \$2700.00. We have 19 teachers, most of several years experience, getting \$2300.00 or less! A small chart showing comparative salaries for the current year follows:

Beginning teachers with degrees are being placed at \$2400 or more and it is rumored that the asking price this year will be \$2500 or \$2600.

The new State Aid distribution of funds made a good start towards reducing the spread in tax rates for education. It would have done more had the formula

been covered with the necessary funds. How much it did to improve education would be a highly debatable point since in this area the money was used to reduce the tax levy. As long as great uncertainty continues to exist on formulas, amounts, etc., it will be used in this respect. It would be naive to urge a couple of school districts to expand either its program or its plant promising that "state aid" would help pay the bill. This is being pointed out here merely to forestall critics who may ask to see the "improvements" made by these funds. The tax rates would have been reduced still more had the \$2,000,000 been voted. Expressing it another way would be to say that failure to vote \$2,000,000 increased the tax assessments and those who howl against sales or other new taxes are blind to the fact that the legislature did not save the tax payer money in refusing to vote the \$2,000,000; it merely passed the educational tax bill back to the local property owner who directly paid more than he otherwise would. The table on page sixty-four shows the nine towns in this area and how they compare with one another and with the state average.

Several things should be noted in the chart. 1) Adjusted valuations vary from \$6.421 per pupil in Danbury to \$55.261 in Hebron: 2) Bristol has the highest school tax rate with \$22.05 and Hebron the lowest with \$7.18, with Bridgewater not far behind with \$8.15. The state median of \$19.99 should be noted here. 3) Alexandria and Orange just miss qualifying for aid; they would qualify with a few more pupils provided the percentage of increase were greater than the average for the state. 4) The spread between the **cost of the foundation program** and the **17 mill share** shows that Bristol would need many more resident pupils to qualify, that Groton, Hebron and Bridgewater will probably never qualify on this basis. These towns will receive aid from the state only when so-called general aid be-

comes available; i.e. a blanket amount per pupil without using millage or anything else.

It is with considerable reluctance that we have decided to close the Pines School next year and revert to two teachers. This is being done because of the drop in the number of pupils due to a migration. Many pupils in the first grades need a great deal of individual attention both educationally and personally. Obviously one teacher with four grades and more pupils will not be able to do as well with the pupils as she could with fewer pupils and two grades. However, in a town not rich it is difficult to justify three teachers for less than 60 pupils. If and when the number of pupils does increase we will not hesitate to ask for three teachers again as we did a few years ago. It is our job to ask for the best which is reasonable and yours to say yes or no.

The sanitary facilities at the two schools have been under fire for several years by the health inspector and how much longer this issue can be delayed is a problem. To find a satisfactory supply of water in quantity for flush toilets and to keep it from freezing is usually an expensive problem varying from place to place. Very satisfactory furnaces are available today which do not demand a cellar. We have one in operation at the Hebron Village School. To say that they are immaterial in cost would not be quite true but \$800 or \$900 would probably be sufficient. The matter of securing water is anyone's guess. Then too there would have to be some work done on a furnace room, a pump and tank, and other items making this a major project. We should give this problem some rather serious thought before very long.

Grafton's State Aid picture is not pleasing at this time. Our amount received will vary directly according to the number of pupils we have; a smaller number will mean a smaller amount and vice-versa. As is true of all towns receiving any aid at all Grafton received this year

only 54% of what the formula would have given it but lack of appropriation by the legislature cut this to the 54% figure.

In idealistic and dreamy moments the writer visualizes a Grafton-Danbury Cooperative elementary school but in more sane moments he realizes that such chances are rather slim and that such ideas create hardly a ripple. It is a possibility from a distant viewpoint provided the construction were done by local help paying an architect for only the general plans. Certainly there is nothing in such a building as the new Canaan school which could not be done by local help with a good supervisor.

Some dreams come true!
