#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenfield in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Greenfield on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Art. 3. To choose one or more and not more than three highway agents for ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To hear reports of Selectmen, Road Agents, Treasurer, Overseer of the Poor, Library Trustees, and other Town Officials, and take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of highways and bridges, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of Public Library, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial day, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money to pay town debts, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$54.00 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relative thereto.

- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for civilian defense, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for continuing the control of White Pine rust in cooperation with State Forestry and Recreation Department thereby receiving the usual state aid, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 toward the reduction of town debt, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to rescind \$459.18 from class 2 roads to class 5 roads. The above amount was voted last year, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate an increase in amount of money paid to Selectmen for their services by an additional \$50.00 per year for each selectman. A large amount of additional work is now necessary to carry out Federal and State requirements, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of construction of a suitable fire escape in rear of town hall building, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

#### To the School Board and Citizens of Greenfield:

I respectfully submit my tenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

#### The Shortage of Teachers is Serious

Since Pearl Harbor 120,000 teachers or one-eighth of all the teachers in the United States have left the profession for causes directly due to the war emergency. The largest source of replacement is the teachers colleges, but the enrollment in these institutions has fallen off 60% in the same period. Some vacancies have been filled with teachers of lower than standard qualifications and many schools throughout the country have been closed. There is no indication that this condition will not be worse next year.

The most pertinent facts in the situation are these:

- (1) The country over, about one-fourth of all the teachers (254,000) are getting less than \$1,200 salary this year. In New Hampshire nearly one-half (45%) are paid less than \$1,200. In Maine and Vermont the proportion is slightly above 50%, but in the other New England states and in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, and Maryland, fewer than 5% are paid less than \$1,200.
- (2) Teachers' salaries in the United States have increased on the average about 10% above the level of 1939. Thousands of teachers see their former students scarcely out of high school making better wages than teachers of long experience.
- (3) The pay of the average factory worker the country over is 80% higher than it was in 1939, workers in ship yards have doubled their earnings, and the net income of farmers has more than doubled.
- (4) Until 1940 teachers were exempt from paying federal income tax. Now a single teacher with no dependents with a salary of \$1,200 pays \$140 income tax. No special salary adjustment has been made in recognition of this fact.
- (5) In the same period in which teachers' salaries have increased 10% the cost of living has increased 26%, so that in purchasing power teachers' salaries are lower than they were in 1939. The teacher who received \$1,200 in 1939 is actually worse off today with her 10% larger salary of \$1,320; she pays \$164 of it in income tax, and the remaining \$1,156 will buy only slightly more than \$900 would buy in

1939. The factory worker who was getting \$1,200 in 1939 and is now getting 80% more, or \$2,160, pays \$332 income tax, and the remaining \$1,828 will buy slightly more than \$1,450 would buy in 1939.

It is circumstances like these that are to blame for the teacher shortage. It is not to be wondered at that teachers feel themselves forced out of the school when they cannot cover the increase in taxes and the cost of living on the salaries they are paid, but can go into industry and command an average salary of at least \$600 more. In fact most teachers are far better trained than the average wage earner and can command not the average but the top wages in industry. Teachers like everyone else must have the necessities of subsistence and must meet the usual obligations that require thrift and economic independence, to provide for the uncertainties of life. But the teacher has other obligations; he is charged with passing on the ideals and standards of good living and the culture of our democracy. To do this requires cultural and professional preparation.

It is evident that the salary question is the main issue and we must think of this not merely in terms of the requests of teachers for higher salaries, but from the standpoint of the type of service the public schools must have. We must protect the educational opportunities of the children. With juvenile delinquency on the increase, competent teachers are more necessary even than in ordinary times. It is not possible to name a figure that would represent the actual worth of a good teacher, but each community may well ponder whether it can afford to employ a teacher who is not worth much more than is now the prevailing salary.

#### School Budget

The budget presented for 1944-'45 differs very slightly from last year's budget except for an increase of \$150 needed for teachers' salaries and \$250 less anticipated balance. The state aid figure is not known at this writing; the estimate of \$400 is based only on the amount received this year; if it is correct, the assessment required will be approximately \$250 more than last year.

The report of the school nurse follows this report.
