TOWN MEETING AND ELECTION MARCH 10, 1970

At a legal meeting above notified and held at the Central School in Greenland, N. H. on Tuesday, March 10, 1970 at 9:05 P.M.; the following business was transacted: Meeting was called to order by Moderator, John R. Brackett. The colors were advanced by Scouts, Raymond Boardman, Everett Kerns and Brian Chick. Invocation was given by Rev. Clayton Reed and pledge of allegiance was led by Scouts.

Article 1 & 2

By non-partisan ballots cast from 10 A.M. to 6 P.M. the following officers were elected and the following action taken on the Zoning Amendments as proposed by the Planning Board. Ballots cast - 520.

Town Clerk, Bonnie L. Tebbetts; Selectman (3 yrs.), George E. Gowen; Selectman (2 yrs.), Sigmund V. Wroblewski; Treasurer, Nathalie Chase; Tax Collector, Bonnie L. Tebbetts; Highway Agent, W. Richard Weeks; Auditors, Herman W. Parker and Frank E. Wirling; Library Trustee (3 yrs.), Charlotte Ireland; Trustee of Trust Funds (3 yrs.), Parker A. Rolston.

Central School District Officers: Moderator, Wendell H. Parker; District Clerk, Marcia Haslam; School Board (3 yrs.), Parker A. Rolston; Treasurer, Frank Wirling; Auditor, Wendell H. Parker

Amendments (Zoning)

No. 1 - Article XVI "Quarries and Gravel, Sand, Loam, and Borrow Pits" - Yes - 284, No - 190.

No. 2 - Article XVII "Junk yard Regulations" - Yes - 325, No - 148.

No. 3 - Article XVIII "Private Disposal Sites" - Yes - 291, No - 166.

No. 4 - Article XIX "Out of Town Refuse" - Yes - 324, No - 150

Town Officers as appointed by the Selectmen: Police Chief, Asa Waitt; Dog Officer, Paul S. Barnes; Fire Chief, Franklin P. Durgin; Deputy Fire Chief, Kenneth N. Fernald, A. Duncan Brackett; Conservation Committee (3 yrs.), Eleanor Ireland and Glenna Brown; Health Officer, Frank Marshall; Building Inspector, Jarib Sanderson; Water Board (3 yrs.), Harry Dowling; Planning Board (5 yrs.), Frederick Bourassa, Jr.; Board of Adjustments (5 yrs.), Paul Hughes; Assistance Town Clerk, Shirley Hoonhout.

All elected and appointed officers were announced by Town Clerk, Bonnie Tebbetts and sworn in by Moderator, John Brackett.

Article 3

Motion made by George Gowen to fix the salaries of the Town Officers and to raise and appropriate the estimated sum of \$5,690.00 in payment of salaries and commissions. Seconded by Sigmund Wroblewski. Estimated expenditures for Town Officers were read by Mr. Gowen. Andrew Schools moved to amend Article 3, by increasing the Town Treasurer salary from \$200.00 to \$300.00 per year. Seconded by Barbara Schools. Article 3 passed as amended.

Article 4

Clayton Spinney moved the town raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year. The estimated amount for town charges is \$56,787.50. Seconded by George Gowen. Ronald Demo moved to amend Article

4 by deleting the Contour Plan. Seconded by John Driscoll. By a standing vote of 129 for and 114 against, \$800.00 for the Contour Plan was deleted. Ronald Demo move to further amend Article 4 by deleting \$100.00 for the Seacoast Regional Asso., seconded by John Driscoll. This motion was defeated by voice vote. After a discussion on the need for additional street lights, Clayton Spinney moved this be resolved at Selectmen's meetings, seconded by George Gowen and passed. Roland Parent moved the Town raise \$2,000.00 to pay back to the Trust Funds; this amount having been borrowed in the past. This would save the Town from paying interest on this money each year. Seconded by Charles Beatty. This motion was last after a vote of 80 for and 114 against (hand vote). Article 4 passed as amended, thus making the estimated amount for Town Charges to be \$55,987.50.

Article 5

Sumner Patten moved the town vote to raise and appropriate for the building, repair and maintenance of highways and bridges the estimated amount of \$8,000.00 for summer work, and \$7,500.00 for winter work. Seconded by Edwin Howe and passed.

Article 6

Motion was made by Jarib Sanderson that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$192.06 against the State's \$1,280.42 for construction and maintenance of Class V roads. Seconded by Donald Ladd and passed.

Article 7

Motion made by George Gowen that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the care and replacement of trees. Seconded by Basil Richardson and passed.

Article 8

Motion made by Violet Chisholm that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for the support of the Weeks Public Library. Seconded by Edwin Howe and passed.

Article 9

Motion made by Clayton Spinney that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the care of parks and playgrounds. Seconded by Kenneth Young, Jr. James Wilbur made a motion to amend this Article by leaving out the word "playgrounds". Seconded by Samuel Dilzler. Motion to amend was defeated, Article passed as originally stated.

Article 10

Motion was made by Clayton Spinney that the town vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes. Seconded by David Richards and passed.

Article 11

Motion made by Jarib Sanderson that the town vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept as town roads any road which may be completed during the year, which have been approved by the Planning Board, constructed in accord with the required specifications and approved as to construction by the Town Road Agent, and the land on which said roads are located, deeded to the Town. Such approval by the Selectmen shall be recorded with the Town Clerk. Seconded by Leo Spencer and passed.

Article 12

Motion made by Eleanor Shauger that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the care of cemeteries. Seconded by Clifford Flanders and passed.

Article 13

Motion made by Clayton Spinney that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 as Greenland's share toward the support of the Mental Health Clinic in Portsmouth. Seconded by Ralph Davis. Mrs. Barbara Schools read a letter which she had written in support of the Clinic. Motion passed.

Article 14

Motion made by Wendell Parker that Article 14 be amended to read "to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed \$8,250.00 to defray the cost of a Comprehensive Master Plan". Seconded by Frank Kimball and passed. Motion made by Wendell Parker that Article 14 be voted as amended, seconded by Donald Ladd. Redford Rand presented the outline of what this plan was about, using slides, pictures and graphs. Wendell Parker spoke on the need for this plan in relationship with the South - Eastern Regional plan of which we are a member. Speaking against the plan, Mrs. Pauline Preston, felt people within the town should do their own planning. Gene Kozolowski also spoke against the plan. Speaking in favor were, Eleanor Shauger, Clayton McNabb, Rance Collins, Peggy Hoonhout, Mr. Bankston, Rudolph Smith; John Brackett asked for a ballot vote. Ballots cast - 184; In favor 124, against 60. Article 14 passed as amended.

Article 15

Waldemer Hermenau made a motion that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Portsmouth-Kittery Armed Services Committee. Seconded by Kenneth Young, Jr. and passed.

Article 16

Motion made by Franklin P. Durgin that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 to

purchase a tone alert radio system for the fire department. Seconded by Richard Hazzard and passed.

Article 17

Jarib Sanderson moved to table Article 17, which was to see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have an annual audit of the town books by a Certified Public Account, (this Article was by petition) Seconded by David Richards. Motion to table passed.

Article 18

A motion to table Article 18 was made by Mr. Bankston, seconded by Waldemer Hermenau. Article 18 was to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,500.00 to extend the present 12" water line from the corner of Portsmouth Avenue and Winnicut Road plus the necessary valves and hydrants. This to include \$12,000.00 for installing a line under the Winnicut River. Motion to table passed.

Article 19

Roland Parent spoke on the retirement of Mr. & Mrs. Andrew Schools as Tax Collectors, and asked for a standing vote of thanks for their 29 years of service to the town. This request was acknowledged by all present. Mr. & Mrs. Schools both spoke of their years of service and thanked all the people who helped them, especially naming the Town Officials and Mrs. Edna Weeks. George Gowen thanked the Schools and all retiring Board members for their service on behalf of their service to the town, these included Frank Emery, Jr., Harland Boardman, Robert Hussey and Glen Harvey. John Brackett read a resolution on the control of dogs, presented by Mrs. Barbara Schools and signed by more than 100 residents. Mrs. Schools recommended a committee be chosen by the Selectmen and Moderator to study the dog situation, this committee to include Mr. Charles Beatty, John Brackett, Paul Barnes, and

others to be selected. This resolution, petition and recommendations were accepted by the Selectmen for future action.

Meeting adjourned at 11:45 P.M.

EXEMPTIONS FOR THE ELDERLY

The 1969 Legislature passed a law providing for some tax relief for the elderly. The provisions of the act state that the applicant must:

1. Be 70 years of age or older and the owner of the property. Ownership may be with spouse or jointly with another person.

2. Have been a legal resident of N. H. for five years beginning April 1, 1965.

3. If a single person, have an annual income not in excess of \$4000. If married the annual income must not exceed \$5000. After deducting (a) life ins. paid on the death of an insured. (b) expenses and costs incurred in the course of conducting a business enterprise. (c) proceeds from the sale of assets.

4. Not own assets of any kind, tangible or intangible less bona fide encumbrances in excess of 25,000 on April 1, 1970. This applies either to a single person or to a married couple.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Selectmen have authorized the Planning Board to prepare sufficient copies of the Comprehensive Master Plan summaries together with the full text of the proposed zoning amendments; these will be distributed with the Annual Town Report. It is the judgement of the Selectmen that the people of Greenland are interested in their town and desire to study these documents to be better informed about the questions which will appear as Article 1 on the ballot. It should be noted that \$8250 appropriated last year did not include the costs for the Comprehensive Master Plan summaries and proposed zoning amendments in quantities required for wide distribution. An additional \$375 for printing is therefore included in town charges under the Planning Board budget. It should also be noted that an unexpected balance of \$4852.00 for the Comprehensive Master Plan is reported as an unexpended surplus. This sum is also included in Town Charges this year for the completion of the Master Plan in calendar year 1971. Your support is urged.

The Supreme Court of New Hampshire has ruled in favor of the town regarding the challenge of our zoning ordinance concerning trailers and mobile homes. The legal costs in conducting town business keeps increasing. The Selectmen consider this expenditure a necessary cost in administrating town affairs. It is extremely difficult for us, the members of our Boards and Town Clerk to project what legal action or counsels advice will be required in the ensuing years. We believe that the laws of the town and the state must be enforced as challenges occur and the necessary expenses submitted to the voters for approval. This past year we have incurred \$3998.00 fees in addition to what was appropriated. We have budgeted this year this sum and an equal amount to be appropriated this year for

anticipated legal expense.

The Selectmen believe that the people of Greenland should be proud of the work done by their Planning Board on the Comprehensive Master Plan. The Selectmen took part in establishing the Goals and Objectives which provided the general direction for the plan. The Planning Board has considered the proposed zoning amendments carefully; the selectmen unanimously support the adoption of zoning amendments as they appear in the ballot.

This year, it is expected that the full assessment of the Sylvania Plant can be realized for the first time. The tax rate should be reduced significantly.

The South Eastern N. H. Regional Planning Commission has budgeted .60 per capita population of each member town. The Commission is in business; a Comprehensive Master Plan for the Region was completed last year. The member towns are now eligible for Federal Aid on projects undertaken on a Regional basis such as water extension, sewage plants, etc.

A request for an estimated \$800 for a contour study on the best use of the land acquired by the town is again included in the budget. An expenditure of this amount is considered reasonable to protect the equity of the town in this property. The selectmen urge approval of this item of the budget. It should be noted that all recommendations on what to do with the land and gravel which may be surplus must be brought to the voters for prior approval. We believe this item speaks for itself; please support it.

The selectmen have also included in the budget for a full time dog officer. This has been the unanimous recommendation of the Dog Committee nominated

during last year's Town Meeting.

The Selectmen have denied a request from the City of Portsmouth, use of a gravel pit for a Sanitary Land Fill operation. The zoning amendment passed last year prohibits out of town refuse disposal within the town of Greenland. The Selectmen do not consider land fill to be a solution to solid waste disposal. It is believed that this is a most pressing problem of the near future but requires a great deal of coordinating effort of necessary disciplines and especially money for solution. We believe the nature of the problem requires action at the state level to develop a reclamation and recycling system. Until such time as a system is developed, the selectmen believe that the nuisance of waste disposal should be distributed among the towns creating it rather than collecting all garbage for one town to accept.

TOWN WARRANT --- 1971

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Greenland in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Greenland Central School in said Greenland on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and to cast your ballot on the following question: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendments to the Greenland Zoning Ordinance and Zoning Map as proposed by the Town Planning Board, and consisting of 20 mimeographed pages entitled for convenience, "Revised Zoning Ordinance", together with a revised Town Zoning Map, all as per copies of said zoning amendments and map file with the Town Clerk and to be posted at the time and place provided for election of Town Officers.

(The polls will open at 10:00 A.M. and will close no earlier than 6:00 P.M. to cast your ballot on Article 1. Discussion and action on other articles in the warrant will take place in the evening beginning at 8:00 P.M.)

2. To hear the report of the Town Clerk on the result of your ballot in the election of Town Officers and the disposition of the question on referendum.

3. To fix the salaries of the Town Officers and to raise and appropriate the estimated sum of \$6,015.00 in payment of salaries and commissions.

4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year. The estimated amount for town charges is \$63,491.00.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the building, repair and maintenance of highways and bridges. The estimated amount is \$8,000 for summer work and \$7,500 for winter work.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$190.59 against the State's \$1,270.62 for construction and maintenance of Class V roads.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450. for the care of trees.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700. for the support of the Weeks Public Library.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700. for the care of parks and playgrounds.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept as town roads any road which may be completed during the year, which have been approved by the Town Planning Board, constructed in accord with the required specifications and approved as to construction by the Town Road Agent and the land

on which said roads are located deeded to the town. Such approval by the Selectmen shall be recorded with the Town Clerk.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise an appropriate sum of \$1,000. for the care of cemeteries.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600. as Greenland's share toward the support of the Mental Health Clinic in Portsmouth.

14. To see if the town will vote to elect the Town Clerk for a three year period such an election to be held in 1972.

15. To see if the town will vote to elect the Tax Collector for a three year period such an election to be held in 1972.

16. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following ordinance. The following ordinance is enacted pursuant and amended to the enabling provision of R.S.A. 466 and its amendments, for the purpose of regulating the restraining of dogs owned or kept within the Town of Greenland, N. H.

No dog shall run at large within the Town of Greenland, N. H.

"Dog" shall mean both male and female, neutered or spayed, and including puppies so-called.

"At large" shall be intended to mean off the premises or property of the owner/keeper and not under the control of a responsible person and obedient to that

person's commands, or on a leash, cord, chain or lead not over eight (8) feet in length or confined within a vehicle, or within the real property limits of the owner or keeper. At no time, without the property owner's permission shall any dog be permitted on the private property of another person.

Any owner or keeper that refuses or neglects to comply therewith shall be fined not more than twenty five dollars (\$25.) for each violation. Such fine shall inure to the general funds of the town of Greenland unless otherwise directed by the Selectmen.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1059.00 as Greenland's share toward the support of the Southeastern New Hampshire Planning Commission.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. for the Portsmouth-Kittery Armed Services Committee.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. toward the support of the Great Bay School.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount equal to \$1.00 per capita, namely \$1,765., for the Portsmouth District Nursing Association so that Greenland may receive coverage in the services of that organization.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000. to replace the tank on Fire Engine No. 3.

22. To transact any other business that legally may

come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE GREENLAND VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1970

During the year 1970 the Greenland Volunteer Fire Department responded to a total of 39 calls for all types of emergencies. This represented a decrease of 20 calls as compared to the 59 received during 1969.

Property damage was very low compared with previous years. This was no doubt due to the fact of early discovery of fires by home-owners and action on their part in being able to contain such fires until the arrival of the Fire Department.

Brush and grass fires continue to be the seasonable problem, mainly along the B & M. tracks during the spring and fall months.

On August 1, 1970, members manned the Fire Station with 2 hour shifts from 8 P.M. that day until 10:00 A.M. the following day when the telephone cable serving the Town of Greenland was severed at a construction site on Route 101 leaving the town without communication. People were advised via local radio stations as to what steps to take in event of fire.

During the year 1970 the local department provided assistance to the town of Stratham for a housefire near the Greenland-Stratham line.

During the same period under the Mutual Aid System the Greenland Department was assisted by departments from Rye, Portsmouth and Newington in containing a grass fire on Post Road.

During the year 1970 the local department assisted the Portsmouth Fire Department with a simulated oil spill in the Piscataqua River, also a simulated oil tank fire at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. Both of these events were carried out to test a large scale operation of the Mutual Aid System.

A total of approximately 304 man hours of actual time was used to answer calls received for various emergencies within the Town of Greenland during the year 1970 and does not include time spent at station in cleaning apparatus, reloading hose, checking equipment and refueling of trucks to make sure trucks are ready for next call.

During the year 1970 members continued their training with a course on "Fire Department Tactics". Also a course on "Sprinkler Systems". The latter course was held due to the construction of the "Sylvania Plant" off Route 101 to acquaint members of the department in the proper procedures in providing

additional water to the plant "sprinkler system in case of fire, also methods to be used to reduce "water damage" in case of accidental discharge of sprinkler heads.

These courses were conducted by instructors from the N. H. State Fire Service training program and were attended by an average of 15 members for a total of 525 man hours. Regular drill sessions held on the fourth Tuesday of each month accounted for an additional 400 man hours.

Officers of the department also attended training classes at "Lily Pond" Gilford, N. H. and the yearly Fire Chief's sponsored school at Fitzwilliam, N. H. in order to keep up with the latest methods in fire fighting.

New equipment provided for the use of the Fire Department by town appropriated funds consisted of the following items.

Also purchased by town funds were 15 tone alert receivers for use of Fire Department. The En-Corder or

Tone Generator to be used with these receivers was purchased with funds provided by the Women's Auxiliary of the Greenland Volunteer Fire Department.

Also installed during the month of January 1971 was a new device known as a Co-Ordinator which is tied into the Red-Phone Net-Work. Upon receipts of a telephone call reporting a fire or similar emergency, members are now able to activate both the Tone-Alert receivers and Siren and give the location and type of emergency from any Red-Phone location. This will greatly reduce the response time in alerting members of the fire department to an existing emergency.

The cost of the above device of approximately \$300.00 was provided by funds from the Women's Auxiliary of the fire department with installation cost of approximately \$75.00 being provided from the General Fund of the Greenland Volunteer Fire Department.

The Fire Alarm system at the Sylvania Plant is also connected into this system with an identifying tone of their own. Cost of this installation was borne by the Sylvania Plant.

Thru the generosity of a donor who wishes to remain unknown, a portable Resuscitator-Inhalator has been made available to the Town of Greenland. The Fire Department has purchased an extra oxygen tank and regulator valve to be used with the original equipment and will be available thru either the Fire or Police Departments.

Also during the early winter months and spring of 1970 considerable work was done on Engine No. 1 with motor and transmission over-haul, also piping was increased in size and re-arranged to provide better flow

to the pump to increase water supply and pressure.

During the year 1970 the following amounts in excess of Town Appropriations were raised by members of the Fire Department and their Women's Auxiliary to assist the town in operation, maintenance and continued improvements to the Fire Department.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture-to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. with the following exceptions:

Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?

3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match

you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help", and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Planning Board held forty-six meetings from 1 January through 31 December 1970. Eleven subdivisions were reviewed. Ten subdivisions were approved and one disapproved. Twenty four meetings were devoted to the Comprehensive Master Plan for the town. The zoning amendments included in the town warrant implement the most important provisions of the Comprehensive Master Plan which has been adopted by your Board. The majority of the Board supports adoption of the zoning amendments which will appear on the official ballot. Adoption of the zoning amendments is considered necessary in order to achieve some of the goals and objectives of the Comprehensive Master Plan which were adopted unanimously during a joint session of the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board on 8 October 1970.

The results of the survey taken during the data gathering phase of the Plan were distributed to the residents last year. Although the replies to questions dealing with mobile homes and town houses/apartments were generally in the negative, the members of the Board believe if properly designed and regulated to the growth of the community, the sites for mobile homes and apartments can be beneficial to the town. The members of the Board envisions that as the population in Greenland increases, and the proposed sites are demonstrated to be assets to our community, additional sites can be provided by changes to the zoning ordinance.

It took considerably longer than the six months estimated to prepare the Comprehensive Master Plan. The delay was due to the increased number of discussions and studies required to reach agreements on the various issues involved. For this reason the 1970

appropriation \$8250 was not expended by 31 December 1970. A surplus of \$4852 remains which must be appropriated this year to cover the cost of Consultant's services. The members of The Board believed that it was more important to produce a plan in which we all believed rather than to expend the appropriated funds by a deadline and produce a mediocre plan.

The goals and objectives of the Comprehensive Master Plan of Greenland are as follows:

1. Preserve the Rural character of Greenland.
2. Good Administration of local government.
3. Planned increases in Public Facilities and Services.
4. Limited Business and selected Industries.
5. Preservation of Historic Areas.
6. Planned open space and recreational areas.
7. Adequate housing for those with low income and the elderly.
8. Provide for good public school facilities.
9. Provide for a healthy economy and controlled growth.

The Board was extremely careful to retain existing zoning requirements which stood the test of time and which are considered beneficial to the town; these have been incorporated into the proposed amendments together with new requirements. The Comprehensive Master Plan and zoning amendments are the best we know how to do. The Planning Board by itself cannot shape the character of the town. In the last analysis, what is done with the land in Greenland will determine the character of the community. It is therefore strongly recommended that the proposed zoning amendments be adopted so that our town can be what the people want.

REPORT OF GREENLAND DOG COMMITTEE

To the Board of Selectmen:

The Greenland Dog Committee was appointed by Moderator John Brackett as voted at the Town Meeting of March 10, 1970. The following people were appointed: Chief of Police, Asa Waite; John Brackett; Mrs. Herman Hughes; Charles Beatty; Dog Officer, Paul Barnes; Clifford Flanders and Selectman Clayton Spinney.

The committee has held ten meetings during 1970 and 1971, resulting in the following recommendations:

1. Full time Dog Officer — Salary \$500 dollars per year.

2. Purchase the following supplies: (a) A dog cage - approximately \$40.00 (for transporting) (b) Net for small dogs - approximately \$12.00.

Equipment on hand:

1 - 4 foot spring loaded noose.

1 - Pair of gloves.

3. A confinement law to be presented in Town Warrant, March 9, 1971, to be voted on by voters of Greenland as follows:

The following ordinance is enacted pursuant and amended to the enabling provisions of R.S.A. 466 and its amendments, for the purpose of regulating the restraining of dogs owned or kept within the Town of Greenland, N. H.

No dog shall run at large within the Town of Greenland.

1. "Dog" shall mean both male and female, neutered or spayed, and including puppies so-called.

2. "At large" shall be intended to mean off the premises or property of the owner/keeper and not under the control of a responsible person, and obedient to that person's commands, or on a leash, cord, chain or lead not over eight (8) feet in length or confined within a vehicle, or within the Real Property limits of the owner or keeper. At no time, without the property owners permission, shall any dog be permitted on the private property of another person.

3. Any owner or keeper that refuses or neglects to comply therewith, he shall be fined not more than twenty five dollars (\$25.00) for each violation. Such fine shall inure to the general funds of the Town of Greenland unless otherwise directed by the Selectmen.

SCHOOL WARRANT --- 1971

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Greenland qualified to vote in District affairs:

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Greenland qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Greenland Central School in said District on Saturday the sixth day of March, 1971 at eight o'clock P.M. to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To determine and fix the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and to fix the compensation of any other Officers or Agents of the School District.

Article 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate \$230. to cover the District's share of expenses incurred by the AREA Planning Committee during the continuation of their study.

Article 4. To see if the District will vote to amend the Portsmouth Authorized Regional Enrollment Area Agreement as follows:

A. Insert the words "average daily membership from the school year immediately preceding" in Article D, said number of pupils to be used as the divisor in determining the cost per pupil.

B. Insert the words "Fiscal year immediately preceding the school year" in Article D, said wording to provide for the dollar figure to be used in determining the cost per pupil.

C. Insert the figure "five million, one hundred fifty-one thousand, four hundred and thirty dollars (\$5,151,430.00) as the revised valuation on existing lands, buildings, and equipment. (Approved by the N. H. State Department of Education, January, 1971.)

D. Insert the words "Tuition payments for each school year shall be made by the sending Districts by December 31 and June 30, each payment in the amount of fifty percent in place of Article H, and to make other necessary changes in wording necessary to comply with the intent expressed within this total article.

Article 5. To see if the School District will vote to approve participation in TWO Supervisory Union No. 16 Special Classes for the purpose of educating handicapped and/or retarded learners at a total cost of Nineteen thousand, seven hundred, fifty-six dollars (\$19,756.00) and to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand, nine hundred sixty-six dollars (\$1,966.00) as Greenland's share of the expenses.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for payment of salaries, for obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State equalization fund together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The new school year began with a Union-wide faculty meeting at the AREA Junior High School on Tuesday, September 8, 1970. Classes opened for instruction on Wednesday, September 9, 1970.

Greenland Central School opened this year with 322 pupils, an increase of 2 pupils over the beginning of school a year ago.

In curriculum, the school has this year introduced a new Science program Grades 1-4 and corrective reading part-time during the week. Transition education was also introduced by transporting children to the class in Stratham.

Mr. Haight reports he has been able to devote time to needed functions and projects at the school since his appointment to full time administrative duties. A new master schedule was introduced this year placing Grades 5 and 6 into self-contained classrooms and thereby reducing the movement of pupils in the corridors during the day. Ungraded reading through Grade 4 and corrective reading provided by Mrs. Carol Graves, participation in Transition education at Stratham, and full time operation of the library have each made a significant contribution to the school.

Supervisory Union 16 offices were relocated in August of 1970, to their present address at 24 Front Street, third floor. The elevator at the parking lot in the rear of the building gives the visitor his most convenient and direct access to the Superintendent's office. With the addition of a seventh town, Brentwood, to Supervisory Union 16, effective July 1, 1971, the workload of the office will undoubtedly increase significantly. Enrollment within the Union is likely to

run in the neighborhood of 3700 pupils during 1971-72. Not many years past, the Union educated only half this number of pupils.

There were 8 full time teachers and 1 part-time teacher new to the Greenland School in September 1970. All were replacements except the new part-time corrective reading teacher. The present staff and their assignments are listed below:

These estimated per pupil costs for 1970-71 are basis for setting tuition rates for 1971-72 in accord with the AREA contract; a rental charge is added to make up the total tuition. The new tuition rates for 1971-72 compare with the state average per pupil costs of \$759.00 per High School pupil, exclusive of rental charges. One should note that the state average is based on operating expenditures for all New Hampshire schools for the year 1969-70. This places the State costs 2 years in arrears of tuition year costs while Portsmouth costs are one year in arrears of tuition year cost.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The School Health Service is designed to serve the physical and emotional needs of all children in the school system - collectively and individually; to promote an awareness among parents and educators of these needs and of available help through this department. The School Nurse offers leadership and guidance to the development and maintenance of the over all health program.

Specific health services were listed in detail in the 1969 report and have been carried out in much the same pattern during the past year. Parents are welcome and encouraged to visit the health office for conference when there is a health related concern to be discussed.

Through education only can we expect returns from our efforts to establish understanding and good practices of health, hygiene, and safety. We plan to have interesting speakers, new films, filmstrips, publications and other aids to enrich the health education curriculum - ideally for use in connection with special class units at a time when material will be most interesting and useful to the students.

Phase II of the three part in-service training project developed last year in cooperation with the N. H. Department of Special Education, was directed by Dr. Clyde Shepard, Keene State College, and recently carried to a conclusion after a series of seven classes. This seven week course for tutors and aides was primarily to offer basic information and techniques on working with the learning handicapped child either in the classroom or on a one to one basis. It is hoped that all who attended will feel more confident and motivated

in the time they so generously contributed toward rescuing a child who "cannot seem to learn".

The earlier our investment of time, talent, and funds the more realistically we may anticipate success in reaching these children before it is too late. Utilization of all community resources is essential if we hope to fulfill our obligation toward meeting their learning needs.

Finally, plans are now being developed for a parent program of six weekly sessions through which parents may have an opportunity to hear outstanding professionals in the field of child psychology and special education, to join in discussion groups and thereby gain in their knowledge and understanding of children who may be educationally or socially handicapped. Indeed, many of these discouraged-through-failure children do present behavior problems in the home and any program intended to fully serve the needs of these children must, therefore, reach not only educators and para-professionals, but parents - parents whose role in understanding, management, and encouragement of this special child is vital. Dates and further details of meetings will soon be announced.

I should like to acknowledge with gratitude the many valuable hours contributed by Health Service Volunteers. Only their competent assistance has enabled us to carry out our far reaching Health Service program. My appreciation is also extended to the Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School Board and teaching personnel with whom it has been a pleasure to work.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR

Rising enrollments, increasing costs, the lack of meaningful state revenue, and the consequent climb in tax rates continue to plague those of us who must live with these problems daily. Education, perhaps more than any other single field, is caught up firmly in today's economic squeeze. I sometimes feel that the general public believes that we in educational administration are unconcerned about rising school budgets and the impact they have on the taxpayer. I can only say that we are genuinely and very deeply concerned and troubled with the economics of our schools.

It is perhaps true that only one involved directly with public education can fully appreciate the almost impossible task of balancing a sound and meaningful educational program with revenue requests that are manageable for the property owner and taxpayer. Unfortunately, it is he to whom we look for 70% - 90% (depending upon the district) of our total revenues.

It is my personal opinion that we must consider other methods of funding all local services including our schools. The property (real estate) tax is an archaic form of taxation originally levied many, many years ago when only those of financial means owned property. Given that situation and the fact that land was once the major source of wealth, the property tax made good economic sense. In 20th century, industrialized America, it no longer makes sense.

Today the circumstances are very much different. Now the property tax is rapidly developing into a levy which pits neighbor against neighbor, discriminates against the less advantaged and those on fixed retirements, and in all too many cases, has placed towns

in the real estate business selling property for unpaid taxes.

From where I sit, it seems apparent that something has to be done. I see no possibility, with increasing population and the effects of inflation, of school budgets going anywhere but up. It is imperative that we work toward a re-structuring of our system of taxation in order to bring about a more equitable climate for all.

Sounding a more cheerful note, I feel great progress has been made in Union No. 16 over the past 18 months in bringing the districts together into a more viable economic unit. Much has been accomplished in the area of joint bidding and purchasing, yielding significant savings to all of our towns. Positive steps have been taken in an effort to update, where necessary, and maintain our facilities in sound physical condition. Efforts are currently under way to streamline, wherever possible, our transportation system looking toward sharing buses among towns where new routes and additional buses become necessary. New methods of budgeting have been introduced which provide even greater detail than was previously possible and which, hopefully, will give your School Board members the kind of information which you, their constituents, demand and are entitled to.

In summary, let me say that my service to you continues to be demanding and challenging but always personally rewarding.

I look forward to working for and with you in the months and years ahead.

REPORT OF THE TEACHER CONSULTANT

For the past year a major study has been under way in a Science curriculum study, Grades 1 to 12. The program selected for the Elementary schools was Science - A Process Approach which places emphasis on students participation rather than the learning of an isolated body of facts. The program is already in the first three grades and some of the fourth and fifth grades. It is being well received by teachers and pupils.

Workshop sessions were held this fall in order to give teachers the necessary background methods of handling this program.

An excellent method of evaluating pupil's achievement and progress is build into the program. This goes along with today's educational trend of achieving instructional objectives that are measureable in the child's learning process.

I am continuing to act as Federal Title Director as various projects with federal funding come into our union.

Our transition classes for immature Grade One aged children continues as a highly successful Federal Funded project. The school year 71-72 will see Federal Funds dropped on this project. I am in hopes that local budgets can pick up this worthwhile activity of learning.

Through the National Defense Education Act I was able to obtain 50% of the cost of implementing the new Science program. This enabled us to get it into more classrooms faster than previously planned with local funds.

The ESEA Title II library project will put

approximately 1500 new library books into our elementary and secondary libraries. We also have available a filmstrip library which serves all of our communities.

Two new exciting projects for which we hope to receive Federal funds are now in the planning stages. One will investigate new ways to teach reading and the other will concern itself with learning disabilities. I hope by next year to have a favorable report regarding these projects.

On July 1, 1971 I start my tenth year in the service of this area and each new year brings new and exciting ways of working with teachers and pupils. May I take this opportunity to thank everyone for the support shown as we try to improve the programs of our schools.
