BOARD OF HEALTH

With the exception of a slight epidemic of scarlet fever in the spring, the past year the town has been free from contagious diseases.

Last year I made a recommendation that modern toilet facilities be placed in the Town Hall and the Grammar School. The School Board during the summer vacation replaced the old toilets with modern ones, so that now both the High School and Grammar School toilet facilities are more in keeping with the times. The town should place modern facilities in the Town Hall without further delay.

The town water has been examined according to the mandates of the state law during the past year and is always found to be in good condition.

The State Board of Health, Division of Maternity, Infancy and Child Hygiene, Mary H. Cunningham, nurse, submits the following report:

At the toxoid clinic held in cooperation with the local School Department there were 51 children given treatment. They were from 6 months to 1 year—2; 1 year to 8 years—33; 8 years on—16. Home visits were made to mothers, infants and pre-school children during the year by the state nurse.

We have examined the accounts of the Selectmen, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Road Agent, Electric Light Commissioners, Water Commissioners, Treasurer of the Common Fund, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library Trustees, Overseer of the Poor, Board of Health, Old Home Day Committee, Memorial Day Committee, and find them correctly cast and properly vouched. We find a balance in the hands of the Town Treasurer of \$6,669.36; balance in the hands of the Treasurer of the Common Fund of \$42.54; balance in the hands of the Treasurer of the Library Trustees of \$181.11 in the Peterborough National Bank and \$1,802.14 in the Peterborough Savings Bank.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HANCOCK:

The financial condition of the School District is excellent, and the budget which is presented to the annual meeting again shows a balance which can be used for the reduction of assessment.

It is of interest to know that the budget for the year 1933-1934 asks for the lowest sum in nine years; and with one exception it is the lowest in twelve years. It presents a cost more than \$2,000 less than in 1927 and about \$1,000 less than for the other years.

The usual system of continuous survey and remedial teaching maintained the elementary schools at the same point as for the previous year. Within the high school this survey system is annually becoming more an integral part of the administration. It is difficult to over-emphasize the value of Miss Manchester to the children of Hancock High School.

The installation of bench type power machines for the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades would make possible the development of handicraft and the motivation of valuable skills, as well as formal education. Numerous installations can be seen at several nearby towns and their value is not questioned. The cost is trifling compared with the old style Manual Training needs.

The Board could also consider the possibility of radio education, particularly in music. Children of today need to be prepared for living in tomorrow; and the progressive spirit of the Town of Hancock will, without a doubt, manifest itself in the protection and advancement of its school system.

For the cooperation which has been so pleasant, the superintendent extends his sincere appreciation.
