

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hanover in the County of Grafton, in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Gymnasium of the High School Building in said Hanover on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First: To choose by ballot a clerk to serve for one year.

Second: To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors, and other town officers and committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

Third: To choose by ballot

*To serve for three years*

One Selectman

One Library Trustee

One Trustee of Trust Funds

One Member Advisory Assessors' Board

*To serve for one year*

One Treasurer

Two Auditors

Three Fence Viewers

Two Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.

A Prosecuting Agent to prosecute violations of the Liquor Laws and any other necessary town officers.

Fourth: To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Fifth: To see if the Town of Hanover will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot for the election of all Town Officers. Vote on the Article to be by ballot. (On petition of George A. Porter and others.)

Sixth: To transact any other business that legally may be brought before said meeting.

Seventh: To bring in your votes for three delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

## ABSTRACT FROM THE TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Hanover, March 9, 1937 the meeting was called to order by Harry E. Burton Moderator.

The Town Warrant was read by the clerk.

The Town Report was accepted as printed.

*Voted:* That in addition to the State, County, Highway and regular Poll taxes provided by law, the sum of twenty-three thousand one hundred fifty dollars (\$23,150.00) be raised, and appropriate said sum and all other moneys which may be paid into the treasury, and which are not required by law otherwise to be expended, according to the budget, and report, as printed by the Selectmen.

*Voted:* That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of three percent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before July 15, 1937 and that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the Town's obligations until the taxes have been collected and paid into the Treasury.

*Voted:* By ballot using the check list on the following question: Is it expedient that a Convention be called to revise the Constitution of the State of New Hampshire? Total number of votes cast ninety-one, (91). Seventy-eight, (78) being cast in the affirmative and thirteen, (13) in the negative.

*Voted:* To adjourn.

In 1937 Lloyd P. Rice and Walter H. Trumbull completed their service upon the Committee, which had been continuous since 1932. Professor Rice's knowledge of both the theory and the practice of taxation, and the business experience of Mr. Trumbull made them very valuable members of the Committee. They were constant in their attention to its business (which has indeed been true of all the members) and the thanks of the community are due to them for their unselfish work.

RESULTS OF THE TAX YEAR 1937

The Selectmen undertook an extensive program of road repair. As the work progressed unforeseen difficulties appeared in some localities so that the completion of the work which had been begun necessitated the expenditure of about \$2450.00 more than the budget had contemplated. This has been financed by a short term note which will be paid off during the year 1938 out of the regular appropriation, and without any effect upon the tax rate.

When this report was made one year ago, the town tax rate for the year 1937 was estimated to be \$1.17. Because of a decrease in the State and County taxes below the estimates, and other favorable circumstances, it became possible for the Selectmen to lower that rate to \$1.13

before tax bills were issued, so that the budget estimates for last year were improved upon to that extent.

The Precinct Commissioners kept within the limits of their budget estimates, and it is expected that on June 30, when the fiscal year of the School Board ends, the results will show that they have done likewise.

#### ESTIMATES FOR 1938

The Committee has spent four long sessions in going over the budgets for the year 1938. The results of their consideration appear in the estimates of the Selectmen, the Precinct Commissioners, and the School Board, which follow, each in its proper place, all of which have been approved by the Committee.

As was the case last year, no outstanding new items of expense, and no major changes are contemplated.

If these estimates are accepted by the voters, the town tax rate will be \$1.11 — a decrease of two cents from the 1937 rate.

The Precinct tax rate, \$.56, is the same as in 1937.

The School tax rate will be \$1.47 — two cents more than in 1937.

The reason why the town rate will be decreased is briefly as follows:

In the estimates submitted by the Selectmen there appeared an item of \$5600.00 for the purchase of a new Diesel tractor and snow plow. The members of the Committee from the eastern part of the town objected to this item, it being their judgment that more money should be spent directly on highways and less on equipment. While the Selectmen did not recede from their opinion that the purchase of this new piece of equipment was necessary, and stated that the comparatively good condition of the roads in the winter time is due to the fact that equipment has been ample, yet the Committee voted to accede to the wishes of the other group, and to defer, at last for one year, the purchase of any new equipment. Therefore, the item of \$5600.00 was taken out of the budget, and in place of it \$1300.00 will be set aside as a reserve toward the purchase of new equipment in the future; and \$3500.00 will be spent upon the highways. The other \$800.00 will be saved, thus enabling the total tax rate for the community to be held at the same level as in 1937. This saving will counterbalance the increase of two cents in the School tax rate from \$1.45 to \$1.47.

In the opinion of the Committee the budgets of the town and the

Precinct are, and have been for some years, at an irreducible minimum. In this connection attention should again be called to the fact that there are several items in the town budget over which neither the Selectmen nor the Finance Committee have any control whatever. The chief such items are the State tax, the County tax, and "Relief."

The School Board felt that a budget calling for an additional expenditure of about \$800.00 more than last year was an absolute necessity. After prolonged discussion the Finance Committee approved their figures. It is the opinion of the Committee, however, that unless very extraordinary circumstances occur the annual expenses of the Hanover schools should not be further increased. The School tax rate in the year 1939 will rise sharply under any circumstances — probably to the figure of about \$1.55 — even though annual expenses are kept where they are now, or even reduced a little. This is because, as explained in our report last year, the amount derived from the sale of the Allen Street property has been applied to reduce the School budget for the years 1937 (\$7,000.00) and 1938 (\$4,600.00).

Taxpayers living outside the Precinct are not affected by Items 3 and 4.

In addition, on February 1, 1938, the town owed the School District the sum of \$4000; but there is an offsetting item of cash on hand of \$3555.39. There is also the short term town note of \$2450.00 already referred to.

#### GENERAL

The Finance Committee thoroughly understands that there are many things which could be done to improve conditions within the community of Hanover. We repeat, however, that in our judgment it is not wise to consider undertaking any major project calling for expenditures which involve borrowing until our total community indebtedness which, at the end of the current year, will stand at approximately \$200,000, has been cut in two. Barring unforeseen emergencies that time will be reached about the year 1944.

Because of the great load which the community placed upon itself in 1933 when the construction of the new high school and the new bridge were voted, it has become necessary for us to practice rigid economy in other respects, and prudence dictates the continuance of this course. On this account the Chairman of the Committee has been compelled to defer urging the creation of a new joint town and precinct office, that of an executive clerk or executive assistant to the Selectmen and Commissioners. This matter has never been discussed at length in the Committee, and this statement regarding it should be considered the individual opinion of the Chairman who believes that such an office should be established just as soon as financial considerations will allow.

Column A: Represents the amount of the original bonds issued for payment of Hanover's share of the cost of constructing Ledyard Bridge.

Column B: Represents the Ledyard Bridge Bonds outstanding on February 1, 1938. The amounts given are not in addition to the amounts listed in Column A but are the amounts of the original bonds mentioned in Column A which were outstanding on February 1, 1938.

The State, by vote of the Legislature, paid \$10,000.00 in addition to the \$20,000.00 required by law. With this \$10,000.00 was paid one \$1,000.00 bond due in each of the years 1936-1939 inclusive and 1949-1954 inclusive.

Column C: Represents town notes outstanding. It contains two of the four notes of \$1000.00 each issued in 1935 and due in the years 1938-39; two notes on account of the amount due on Ledyard Bridge and which was not covered by bonds, —one note of \$1000.00 due in 1940 and one note due in 1941 for \$569.83. (\$899.42 less an additional Federal Grant of \$329.59) and a note due in 1942, of \$1000.00 issued in 1936 on account of the Mount Support Bridge.

There were due in 1936 a \$3,000.00 bond and a \$1,000.00 note. They were paid for by \$4,000.00 raised by taxes in 1936. The cost, \$4,000.00, to the Town of the Mount Support Bridge over Mink Brook was paid by a \$1,000.00 note due in 1942, \$2,000.00 raised by 1936 taxes and \$1,000.00 raised by 1936 taxes for payment on indebtedness.

Column D: Represents the total amount of Bonds and Notes due in each of the years 1938-1954 inclusive.

Each bond and note is due on December 1. Interest rate on each bond is  $3\frac{1}{4}\%$  and is payable semi-annually.

## HANOVER TOWN LIBRARY REPORT

The work and program of our library has been carried on in the usual way during the past year. The library was open (Wednesday and Saturday afternoons 2-5; Wednesday evenings 7-8:30) on ninety-nine library days, making a total of approximately four hundred and fifty hours. During this period two thousand eight hundred and eighty nine books were borrowed, as well as many magazines and other periodicals. The largest circulation for a single day was eighty-six books; the smallest number being one book on a very stormy day in December. The average circulation for each library day was twenty-nine books. January saw the largest number of books loaned in one month; the month of August showed the smallest number of books loaned in a single month. During the year thirty-five books came from the State Library at Concord, which were loaned sixty times to nineteen people. These books have been on various technical subjects and have provided helpful and interesting supplementary reading.

We have added a good selection of new books, and have tried to divide the number for adult and juvenile readers. Fiction continues to be in the greatest demand. However, some non-fiction books of value and importance have been purchased. These have become a valuable part of our reference division. A number of gift books have been received, coming directly from the publishers, with the compliments of the authors. Some industrial descriptive booklets have also been received, which prove interesting and especially helpful to the school children who seek information along these lines. We have added "World Horizons," a new magazine for young people, to our subscription list. This is proving to be a very popular addition to our magazine section.

Miss Spencer has encouraged the children to do definite reading projects, and has given rewards to a number who have successfully completed this work. These rewards have been framed pictures, which have presented interesting studies in animal life.

Miss Spencer attended the district Librarian's meeting held at Lyme last Spring. These meetings, which are held at stated intervals, prove very helpful in the exchange of ideas concerning library administration.

Miss Pratt, from the Public Library Commission at Concord, paid us an official visit in July. She reported favorably on the work and organization of our library. She gave valuable assistance to Miss

Spencer in helping to classify and re-number some of the books after the Dewey Decimal System. Her interest and help is greatly appreciated by our librarian and trustees alike.

Our property is in good repair and has not necessitated any expenditure of money. We do need a new stove as the one now in use has served its purpose, and become much the worse from its years of service. This is a matter which must be taken care of before another winter.

The trustees appreciate the interest and effort which Miss Spencer puts into her work as librarian. Her care and thought in many matters, make our library of a larger service to the community. We also wish to take this opportunity to express our sincere thanks to some who have given books to the library during the past year.

The library is well patronized and meets a real need in our community. We would like to invite and encourage any of the community who are not borrowers, to make use of what we have for their enjoyment and culture.

## ETNA FIRE ASSOCIATION

### Report of Secretary

The Etna Fire Association has responded to eight calls this year. Six being chimney fires, one false alarm and one serious forest fire covering about seventy-five acres.

The Association has in its possession, one portable pumper and one thousand feet of hose, purchased by the town of Hanover.

Upon the advice of two delegates, one representing the Finance Board and the Board of Selectmen, and one representing the Hanover Fire Dept., this association moved that they be dissolved and that said association become a branch of the Hanover Fire Department. It was also moved that the Etna Fire Association should accept the by-laws of Hanover department as far as same could be applied to said association practically.

Then the above not being carried out, the Hanover dept. asked the association to carry on, and an amendment was added that the above should take place only at such time as and when rules and by-laws are presented and accepted by the Etna Fire Association.

It was decided by the Selectmen not to make a change, so now the Etna Fire Association must reorganize.

We greatly appreciate the financial aid of the Town of Hanover.

It has been a successful year from the Forest Fire standpoint with only one fire occurring on April 26th. This fire was caused by a permit fire which was *not entirely put out* and as a result burned over some 75 acres, some of which was valuable timber land.

In the past year 28 permits have been issued and 40 posters placed in the town.

Bush and slash, uncut hay and rubbish near or in woodlands and along our trails and highways are dangerous fire hazards. We ask your cooperation in the removal of these hazards at a safe time.

Watch your matches, cigarettes, etc., and be sure they are out before throwing them away.

The department is pleased to state the purchase of a portable fire pump by the town which will be of great value in our fire fighting work.

Your Warden wishes to thank you most heartily for your excellent cooperation in the past and may it continue.

Following is a copy of the forest fire permit laws of New Hampshire, please read carefully:

### SYNOPSIS OF FOREST FIRE PERMIT LAW

No person shall kindle a fire upon the land of another without permission from the owner, agent, or caretaker thereof.

No person shall kindle a fire or burn any material in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste or cut over lands, except when the ground is covered with snow, without the written permission of the Forest Fire Warden or the presence of the warden or person designated to superintend such burning.

Any person, firm or corporation causing or kindling a fire without a permit, when a permit is required, *and also any person, by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fires shall be caused*, is liable to the town for all expenses incurred in attending or extinguishing such fire.

When permission has been obtained from the land owner, camp or cooking fires may be kindled without permission of the Forest Fire Warden (unless such permission is required by city or town), at suitable times and in suitable places where they will not endanger woodlands. Upon failure to totally extinguish such fires the parties responsible are subject to the same liabilities and penalties as are prescribed for other fires.

Penalty for kindling a fire without a permit, \$200, or imprisonment not more than thirty days.

Penalty for kindling a fire willfully, or in a careless or imprudent manner, \$500, or imprisonment not more than one year.

The assessed valuation of real estate and property in the Precinct is \$4,855,440.00 and the insured valuation is approximately \$30,000,000.00. The estimated total fire loss was \$99,465.50 which is approximately a loss of just over two percent of the assessed valuation or .033 of one percent of the insured valuation. The total cost of the maintenance of the Fire Department for the past year was \$3,567.96 which is .008 of one percent of the assessed valuation.

Inspections of the business area have been made during the past year and considerable improvement has been noticed. It is urged that every precaution be taken to keep this area free from fire hazards.

The company has received a comprehensive course of training during the year. A member of the department was sent to the Fire School in Arlington, Massachusetts for two weeks. As a result of his training, he has been able to add greatly to the effectiveness of the training given the local company. Mention should be made of the splendid attendance record of the company at all fire drills.

The engineers at this time wish to state that in their opinion improved equipment will be needed in the near future.

The company appreciates the cooperation which the citizens have shown them during the year and at this time wishes to express its thanks for their cooperation.

## REPORT OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT

To the Commissioners of the Precinct of Hanover, N. H.:

Thirty-one cases of contagious disease were reported during the past year — much less than usual. Two known cases of meningitis were admitted to the local hospital from nearby towns and carriers were discovered but no case occurred in Hanover. There were two cases of scarlet fever but no other cases appeared as contacts from these.

Twenty-six milk licenses were issued through the Town Clerk's office. Dairy inspections and milk sample analyses were made showing in general satisfactory conditions.

One nuisance was reported and investigated.

Examinations of the water and inspections of the Reservoir and Storr's Pond were made.

The mileage chargeable to the Precinct was very little as a considerable proportion of the distance covered for investigations was in connection with State work.

H., be decreased from nine in number to six, and that, beginning this year, two members shall be elected to said board each year to fill vacancies occurring from expiration of term of service so that the board will decrease an equal number each year until it shall be composed of only six members, and then two members to be elected each year thereafter. The motion was lost. It was then voted that this meeting proceed to elect three members for the Board of Education of the Hanover School District.

*Article IV:* Andrew B. Elder and Albion R. Fogg were re-elected and Alice M. Gilbert elected members of the Board of Education for the Hanover School District, each for a term of three years.

*Article V:* Voted: That the Annual Report of Agents, Auditors, Committees or other officers hereto chosen be accepted as printed and placed on file.

Voted: That the report of the Building Committee be accepted as printed and placed on file and the Committee discharged.

Voted: That the Building Committee be given a vote of appreciation for their splendid work.

*Article VI:* Voted: That the income amounting to \$11,053.50, received from the sale of property formerly owned by the School

District of Hanover and located on Allen, Prospect and Maple Streets, be applied as follows: An amount not to exceed \$3,000, to the budget for the year 1937-38 for the improvement of the playfield; \$4,000 to the budget for the year 1937-1938 for the retirement of bonds or payment of interest; the balance of \$4,053.50 and any additional amount remaining, plus interest, to the budget for the year 1938-1939 for the retirement of bonds or payment of interest; that the School Board be and hereby is authorized to execute vouchers to the Treasurer of the School District of Hanover for payments as above specified.

*Article VII:* Voted: That articles 7 and 8 be considered together.

*Articles VII and VIII:* Voted: That the District raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law, together with the unexpended balance and receipts of the Department, \$62,260.37 for school purposes as follows: \$11,000.00 for the payment of bonds, \$210 for the payment of salaries of the School Board and other Officers of the District, and \$51,050.37 for general expenses and improvements as set forth in the budget.

Voted: That the above named amount to be raised by taxation be reduced by \$4000.00 as voted in Article 7 above.

*Article IX:* Voted: That the School Board be, and it hereby is, authorized to sell the land and/or building of the school in the so-called North Neighborhood District when in their judgment it is for the best interests of the District to do so, and that the Chairman of the Board and the Treasurer of the District be, and they hereby are, authorized to execute the deed or deeds therefrom.

Voted: That it is the sense of this meeting that if in the judgment of the School Board satisfactory arrangement can be made for the use of the North Neighborhood School House by the residents in the neighborhood such arrangement be made.

*Article X:* Voted: That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of 3% be allowed the tax payers if paid on or before July 15, 1937.

Voted: To adjourn.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hanover:

The twenty-first annual report by a superintendent of schools, the tenth by the present author to the School District of Hanover is herewith presented. It constitutes a part of the eighty-fourth annual report of the public schools of the School District. Many written reports of the several school districts in the township were prepared long before this series began.

**PURPOSE** The value of these reports lies not only in their use in connection with the current problems but in their utility in future years as evidence of progress. The aim of this particular report is to record some of the changes which are taking place in the actual operation of the schools. It will also attempt to portray some of the more outstanding developments within the past year. It will likewise point out certain trends which the schools of the community may take in the near future.

**OVER VIEW** The policies of the schools continue to be those of cooperation and united effort in aiding the boys and girls to acquire those skills and knowledges, and those habits and attitudes, which shall enable them to adjust their lives better to the situations which they may meet. The third year of occupancy of the new High School building emphasizes the idea that environment does much toward improving the outlook of the pupils in contact therewith. The integration of the subject matter in all schools is constantly in the minds of the teachers and apparently leads the pupils in the direction of better capacity to apply the learnings of the classroom. The school program has not been expanded to involve any increase in costs of operation. The teaching corps itself continues to show a professional attitude and a personal desire for growth as illustrated by a willingness to attend summer schools and engage in travel during the summer months. Efforts are constantly made to improve the reading capacities of the young people and to overcome the difficulties of non-readers

through certain practices of remedial reading. The emphasis for the year has been upon the scholastic side of the educational process.

**BUDGET** The request made by the Board for the year 1938-1939 is only slightly in excess of the request made for that of the present school year. This is as might be expected in view of the fact that the new High School building has been occupied only long enough to begin to have a knowledge of the yearly requirements for the operation of that school building. It has been possible from time to time to make adjustments in individual items in the budget. Such arrangements cannot always be made as there are many items in the budget which are merely the amount which must be expended for those items. If at one time expected expenditures are postponed they almost always must be cared for in a succeeding financial estimate. It was pointed out in the report of last year that actual yearly experience is necessary in order to be reasonably certain that the items requested are not extravagant and that they are not too limited to make possible the satisfactory operation of the schools.

Another factor that enters seriously into the making of any school budget is that of estimating uncertain incomes such as tuitions, dog tax, and unexpected sales. A decrease in the number of tuition pupils has been taking place for the last year or two. If such decrease continues this item will continue to decrease, which in turn will make the tax request greater. A survey of the student situation leads us to believe at the present time that we have reached about the lowest point in the number of such pupils and that there will begin to be an increase following next year. The School Board takes into consideration all of these varying factors and uses its best efforts to arrive at an estimate which will make possible an economical administration of the school system.

**BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS** Occasionally by the very course of events there will arise unforeseen and unpredictable difficulties. It is with regret that it becomes necessary to report such a happening about a year ago. The unusually severe rains amounting to almost a deluge which occurred last spring caused water to settle beneath the gymnasium floor. After a thorough investigation it was found that through some oversight or because of lack of full information, one of the drains had been stopped so that the water could find no escape. As a result it backed up and forced its way through the walls beneath the gymnasium

floor. No single individual or group of individuals could be charged justly with blame for this particular situation. So far as it is humanly possible the condition has been corrected and the gymnasium floor re-laid. Every precaution possible has been taken to avoid a recurrence of this difficulty. While it seems to have been possible to finance this outlay without asking for an additional appropriation it has nevertheless limited some of the needed expenditures in other items of the budget. It is hoped that it will not be necessary to restrict expenditures to meet such emergencies in the future.

One additional improvement to the school properties was begun and will be completed in the early spring. That is the grading and draining of the school grounds to the rear of the school buildings. When this work is entirely completed it can be truly said that the Hanover schools are excellently equipped for nearly all types of out of door activities. The citizens have acted wisely in bringing about such a wholesome condition for the young people of the community.

**GRADE SCHOOL** A few years ago a teachers committee prepared and provided each teacher in the elementary schools in the District with a list of books suitable for reading in a given grade. This compilation was very carefully done by referring to similar lists in other communities and lists prepared by the American Library Association. The plans to enrich somewhat the regular classroom activities of the pupils have resulted in an increasing demand on the part of the school for more and better reading material. This has been further enhanced by the plan for more intensive work in the literature and reading for the middle grades, or grades four, five, and six. The need became apparent to the Principal and teachers of the Grade School that more supplemental material should be found. A committee of parents was organized so that when an appropriate opportunity arrived they were ready to join with the teachers in creating a library fund for this building. This fund has now reached a sufficient size to enable the purchase of library books for the pupils of these grades. This purchase is now in process, and will be consummated sometime during the present school year. It can then be said that both schools have been provided with a minimum number of school library books for the broadening of the scope of the pupils' reading. These libraries are not intended to replace or supplant the use of the Howe Library. They are rather intended to

have immediately available at all times at the schools books which will have definite correlating values for the educational work which is being undertaken. Those agencies which have helped to make this possible may well feel that they have made a definite contribution to the educational program of the community.

**READING** Several of the colleges and higher educational institutions of the country as well as certain of the psychologists have awakened recently to the fact that many young people find themselves in such institutions with a limited capacity for reading the necessary books set apart in the various courses of study. Many of the secondary schools both private and public have undertaken some form of reading to assist the young people in overcoming this difficulty. Much can be said in favor of the old fashioned method of having pupils read a great deal orally in the classroom but this, on the other hand, did not result in ease, proficiency and rapidity in gaining thought from the written page. It is for these reasons that in both the high and elementary schools in Hanover a distinct effort has been made to increase the reading facility of the pupils. Much remains to be done to bring about an ideal situation of speed, accuracy, and comprehension in reading but it can be said that at least a beginning has been made. This may not result in bringing about a condition in which the pupils in the lower brackets of capacity will be able to read with entire freedom but it seems already to have helped many such pupils to get a better understanding of the subject matter required in their classroom work. Reading tests have been given also, in both the high and elementary schools, and as a result certain pupils have been given special exercises which tend toward aiding them in a better reading adjustment.

**IT CAN BE DONE** The question sometimes arises in the minds of both pupils and parents as to whether or not a high school student in Hanover can acquire sufficient knowledge and skill to do the work on the next school level, or in college. These reports from time to time have shown that a good percentage of the boys and girls graduating from the Hanover High School enter college; another percentage enter other institutions and from there go to college; and a third group enter higher institutions which are somewhat less than college grade. It is interesting to note that over a period of years the successes among those who have entered college direct from Hanover High School have been

very high. Within recent years there have been students who have stood near the top of their classes in colleges, who had no secondary education other than that received in and through the Hanover High School. There are other cases of those who have difficulty in maintaining good scholastic rank in college. More frequently than not these students are those who have had difficulty in maintaining a reasonably good rank in the secondary school.

What is it that characterizes those whose success is outstanding as contrasted to those whose educational difficulties are almost insurmountable? After much consideration it is believed that the difference between the two groups is caused in part by innate ability, in part by environmental circumstances and in part by the inner urge or driving power of the individual boy or girl. If the driving power comes from without, caused by parent, teacher, or other influence, a pupil may succeed but that success will not be marked by any such strength as will the success of the pupil who drives himself constantly to whatever task he undertakes. Sometimes it may be said that pupils succeed better under different school auspices. This is often true in individual cases. Experience teaches that it is due mainly to the fact that there has been built up gradually in the mind of the pupil this inner urge to make a success in some other school, which urge was lacking in the local situation. The causes for this are somewhat obscure. They have little to do with the success or failure of the local school system. The very glamour of a new experience, the opportunity to become affiliated with new associates, or the desire to satisfy the longings of a family may all have their weight in producing this desire. But whatever be the cause the inner drive is the necessary element to bring about success. Sufficient numbers of the Hanover pupils have entered college during the past several years, have succeeded, and are succeeding to establish the fact that any boy or girl of average ability, with the proper determination and an opportunity for a reasonable amount of home study under reasonably quiet conditions can not only accomplish the work of the High School but do so in such manner as to be able to take the next steps and carry on in college.

Particular stress this year has been laid upon the improvement of the personality of the pupils in all of the schools and more particularly in the higher grades. The thought dominating this effort is that person-

ality includes character development and individual growth and confidence in one's ability. It is yet too early to determine whether or not this particular emphasis is resulting in greater responsibility on the part of the young people but there are many evidences that in various lines of endeavor the young people are taking their part in the school life activities and are ready to meet unusual situations and emergencies with some degree of poise and realization of power to accomplish.

One development of the English work in the High School has been that of the weekly news sheet. This has given the pupils of the English classes motivation as well as experience in producing material which is worthy of being put into print. Several of the pupils have shown superior ability in writing editorials, others in organizing the subject material, and still others in securing financial support for the undertaking through the solicitation of advertising from those who have kindly consented to assist financially in the promotion of the idea. This news sheet takes the place of mimeographed sheets of a similar nature which have been used in other high schools and which have sometimes resulted in something a bit less dignified and a bit more juvenile than appears to be the case in this printed sheet. The instructors have served only as a guiding group to assist the young people in realizing at the present time some of the values to be acquired from work in the English courses.

Much credit is due the teaching staff for their professional attitude in all of their work of instruction. Not only that, but practically every teacher has given abundantly of his or her free time to enlarge the scope of interests and worthwhile activities of the boys and girls. No longer are teachers satisfied with a mere day's work of classrooms, instruction, and assignments, but they are actually interested in seeing the young people develop in intellectual capacity as well as in all of the fields of human relationships.

The increasing responsibility of the boys and girls in the care and maintenance of the school buildings has been marked during this school year. The heads of both of the village schools and the teachers of the other schools have exercised every possible precaution and effort in trying to build up good citizenship habits so that there shall be a minimum of wear and tear upon the buildings and a minimum of waste in mater-

ial used, both for the maintenance of the buildings and for instructional purposes.

**SUMMARY** The consolidation of the gains made in past years in several educational fields has continued. Specifically it should be pointed out that there is a continuation of the health work in the schools and that the Parent-Teacher Association is still making possible the care of the teeth of the children. The music department continues to function in a strengthened degree in each year. The orchestra, at the present time composed of about thirty pupils, has among the number twenty-four who began their musical instruction as a result of the activities in the Hanover schools. The work in drawing which was modestly begun a few years ago has met a need on the part of the pupils. This work has been somewhat expanded until it includes some very satisfactory work which is being done by the pupils in the upper grades. There is so much of value to be gained by the pupils in all of these several activities that there should be little if any question as to their worth to the school system. Observations of the anniversaries and festivals of the year are continued and suitable programs provided by speakers and participants both within and without the schools. The Boy Scouts and the Girl Scouts have in no small way made their contribution toward improved citizenship. The High School Council, an organization of the pupils themselves, continues to be of definite aid in bringing about attitudes of self control. These gains are superimposed upon a program which is resulting in even higher scholastic attainment than has been the case in some years.

There is no doubt that systematic research would point out a little more specifically some of the low spots in the school work which could be greatly improved. The local school people are perfectly aware that improvements can be made. Such a research would reveal also that some of those closely connected with the educational affairs of the community have considered and put into operation ways in which to better the work of the schools. This year has been no exception although it has seemed more in point to proceed on a basis of recognized difficulties and on a basis of common sense and good judgment rather than upon a basis of continued research which in the nature of the limited personnel available can at present be only a part of the school work. As

previously stated progress is being made and as is readily ascertained, no retrogression has taken place.

It should be pointed out that during the past several years definite recommendations have been made to the Board, many of which have been adopted. There is one that still stands without a positive solution due to the economic situation. It has not been possible to meet the requests of many citizens and particularly of the Parent-Teacher Association for a definite program for physical education. These groups have pointed out rather definitely that such a program would aid much in promoting the physical needs of growing children. The time may soon come when the demand for this work will be so great that the community will feel the necessity of taking the necessary steps to bring it about. So much has been accomplished, however, that few complaints and more favorable statements as to the work of the schools have been made during the past year than has been true of any of the recent years. This condition is due in no small measure to the cooperation of parents and citizens, to the helpful interest and painstaking consideration of pending recommendations on the part of the School Board, and to the continuous conscientious endeavor of the teachers to lead the pupils to acquire the greatest possible advancement. These conditions and contributions are recognized by those who have given any thoughtful attention to the work of the public schools. They place upon those of us who have the direct management of the schools obligations which cannot be ignored and which are met with energy and enthusiasm for even greater achievement.
