THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hebron, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Hebron Community Hall on Tuesday, the eighth of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the ensuing year for expenditures enumerated in the proposed budget appearing in the Town Report. Copy of the budget is attached to the posted Warrant.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to give two per cent cash discount on taxes if paid fifteen days from date of tax bill.

5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the Rudy Merton property bought by the Town at Tax Sale.

6. To see if the Town will accept from Mrs. Justin T. McClure the sum of \$100.00 to be added to J. T. McClure Trust Fund for the care of the McClure Lot in The Hebron Cemetery.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$100.00 for the Hebron and Groton Athletic Association to be used specifically for the improvement of the ball field.

8. To see if the Town wishes to have members of the Common and Cemetery Committee elected on Town Meeting Day or appointed by the Selectmen.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Other articles may be added before the Warrant is posted.

SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 4 BUDGET

N. H. Laws Chapter 135, paragraph 43. "The school boards of the several districts forming a supervisory union shall meet between April first and June first in each year at a time and place fixed by the chairmen of the several boards, and organize by choosing a chairman, a secretary and a treasurer. They shall, when necessary, nominate a superintendent or superintendents, fix the salary or salaries, and apportion the same among the several districts and certify the apportionment to their respective treasurers and to the state board of education."

Chapter 135, paragraph 47. "At a meeting held before January first of each year the supervisory union board shall adopt a budget required for the expenses of the supervisory union for the next fiscal year, which budget may include the salary and expenses of supervisors of health, physical education, music, art and guidance, and any other employees, and expenses necessary for the operation of the supervisory union.

. . . The basis for apportionment shall be one-half on the average membership of the previous school year and one-half on the last adjusted (Ch. 157, 1951) valuation of the district."

The chart of expenses is based on action taken by the union.

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SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

We quite often see articles in newspapers and magazines written by nationally syndicated columnists "panning" education and "telling" educators what ought to be done. Simply because one becomes an authority in the field of politics, foreign affairs, farm subsidies, or even football, does not qualify one as an expert in all things. The expert on what can be done in an ungraded rural school is to be found in an ungraded rural school; the expert on what can be done in a small high school is to be found in the small high school. These columnist experts are unacquainted with the "educational facts of life" and will remain so until such time as they actually spend a year, more or less. in an actual situation teaching the pupils themselves. Of course, they can not afford to do this and a quick, superficial survey plus a few interviews and a posed picture or two must be the basis of material for an expression of opinion. Unfortunate it is that their opinions are so widely read, and believed. Now all of us in the educational field can improve our work and have the potential of always doing a better job. Much remains to be discovered and learned in the field of human conduct, but for a college president or a noted columnist to write that all pupils in high school should have a couple of years of Latin, or three years of college preparatory mathematics is too obsurd to merit additional space. Our pupils must be taught to read current publications with the proverbial grain of salt. Freedom of the press is not license, and carries on its shoulders the greatest of responsibilities.

Once again we enter a legislative year with political leaders of both parties pledged to no new sources of tax revenue which simply means that the local property tax will continue to bear the major part of increased costs of educating our children. Even granting the possibility of a stable economy, costs of educa-

tion will increase where: 1) There are significant increases in the school population; 2) There is need of extensive remodeling or new buildings; 3) Where new educational offerings become necessary; 4) Where there is competition for teachers. There is an old, and elementary, law to be found in any high school economics text book that where there is a limited supply and an increasing demand for a commodity the price will increase. Numerically there will be a shortage of teachers for many years ahead; qualitatively speaking there is always a shortage. Teachers have the benefit of now being in the driver's seat of a "selling market." Until such time as state aid becomes available in sufficient quantity to absorb these increasing costs the local property owner will pay the bill. Only when this condition has been met will state aid, in still larger quantities, be of any great value in lessening the burden on the property owner. If you, as a property owner, are willing to absorb these costs there is, and will be, no need of new taxes; if you really want tax relief new sources of revenue are necessary, in the opinion of the writer. To say that it doesn't make any difference because the consumer pays the bill anyway is to overlook the fact that different people consume different things, and all consumers in the State of New Hampshire do not live here "the year round" nor do they all own property! There are several towns in this union which could well use several times the aid now being received. Other towns can not have modern buildings until special building aid is allocated from a higher level either state or federal. What do you want for your children? Are you willing to "pay the freight" on present tax bases? These are the vital questions. The squeaky wheel gets the grease. Legislators have sensitive ears!

At this writing early in January it looks as though a deficiency of about \$200 will be necessary for the current year. This is due actually to figuring our items too closely so that when a fuel tank springs a leak we have no appropriation to cover it. A few extra dollars to pay for the transportation of a high school pupil until he reaches the age of 14 is another small item. We figured our deficiency of last spring about \$20 too low. All of these various items plus some minor ones total close to \$200. Some of the towns in this union like to carry a small contingency fund equalling the amount of one or two high school tuitions; other towns prefer to run the risk of a deficiency. There must be some provision made to give a bit of flexibility in any budget or a deficiency will follow.

The school board has increased the salary item by \$400 hoping that it will be possible to hire music and handwriting supervisors in cooperation with other towns. There is no substitute for expert supervision in these fields. It seems quite possible to be able to get supervision at least in one subject if not both for this figure.
