**TOWN WARRANT****THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

---

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kensington in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Kensington on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The Selectmen's estimate of expenditures for the ensuing year is \$32,359.08.

3. To see if the Town wishes to allow a discount on taxes paid within 30 days or 60 days after presentation of tax bills.

4. To vote on the basis of payment and the amount thereof to be paid the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$625.00 (Six Hundred and twenty five dollars) for the purpose of rewiring the Kensington Library and installing all necessary circuits, receptacles and switches needed to insure safe operation, of electrical facilities.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,246.00 (Two Thousand Two Hundred and Forty-six dollars) to carry out recommendations of the Committee on alterations to the Town Hall and Brick School House.

8. By petition of Carl F. Kenerson and twenty-eight others to see if the Town will vote to open bidding for snow removal to contractors of the Town.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Town Ordinance enacted by the Selectmen on August 11th 1964.

1. No person, firm or corporation officer or employee thereof, shall keep or maintain a place, area, pen or sty for pigs or swine for commercial purpose without a permit from the health officer and written approval of the Selectmen of the Town.

2. No person, firm or corporation officer or employee thereof, shall use or occupy a place, area, building or other structure within the Town for a slaughterhouse or related uses without a permit from the health officer and the written approval of the Selectmen.

3. No person, firm or corporation officer or employee thereof, shall place, leave or cause to be placed or left or exposed unburied, any animal or other substance or deposits of garbage or refuse on premises within the Town not designated as public dumping facilities in accordance with the provisions of RSA 147: 23-29; nor shall any person, firm or corporation bring into the Town for commercial use or otherwise (including deposit on the public dumping facilities) any of the materials described herein except with written permission of the health officer and written approval of the Selectmen of the Town.



4. The term "public dumping facilities" and "garbage" are used in this ordinance as defined in RSA 147:24.

5. Any violation of this ordinance shall constitute a public nuisance and be subject to legal procedures under pertinent laws of The State of New Hampshire and further shall be subject to a penalty of twenty dollars for each day of violation hereof.

6. Any portion of this ordinance declared to be illegal or unenforceable shall not effect the legality or enforceability of the remaining provisions.

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Proposed Amendments and Additions to the Land Use Ordinance for the Town of Kensington.

#### ARTICLE 1, SECTION B, Second Paragraph

Amend present entire paragraph to read as follows: Any trailer or mobile home to be located and occupied in town, for any period of time, shall require a permit from the selectmen. This permit shall be granted for a 90 day period of time, for temporary residence. Any trailer or mobile home located and occupied for more than 90 days shall be considered a dwelling or residence, and shall be subject to the restrictions in this ordinance regarding lot size, frontage, set-back, etc. Trailer parks and mobile home parks are prohibited.

#### ARTICLE 1, SECTION C

Amend after the sentence "Any non-conforming use of land may continue in its present use, by adding: A junk yard may not continue as a non-conforming use for more than one year after the effective date of this Ordinance, unless within the period it is completely enclosed within a continuous solid fence at

least eight (8) feet high which will completely screen the operations of the junk yard. Plans of such building or fence shall be approved by the Board of Selectmen before it is erected.

#### Addition to the Zoning Ordinance

Amend the Zoning Ordinance and incorporate a new Article to be numbered Article V III, to read as follows: No commercial or privately operated junk yards shall be maintained or operated anywhere in the Town. A junk yard is a collection of any old metals, bottles, cotton or woolen mill waste, unfinished cloth, unfinished cotton or woolen mill yarns, old paper products, two or more unregistered vehicles which are unfit to use on highways, used parts and material or motor vehicles and other second hand articles, the accumulation of which is detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

#### Addition to the Zoning Ordinance

Amend the Zoning Ordinance and incorporate a new Article to be numbered Article I X, to read as follows: Every person, persons, firm or Corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than Five Dollars (\$5.00) upon conviction for each day such violation may exist.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase of a new tanker and pumper fire engine and necessary equipment, said engine to meet specification as drawn by the Board of Fire Engineers; and for this purpose, to raise a sum not exceeding Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) by issue of serial notes of the Town, under and in accordance with, the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act) of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated as amended, the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, interest rate or

discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said notes to be delegated to the Selectmen.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Business meeting starts at 7:00 P.M. Polls will close at end of business meeting.

We are very fortunate to have so many fine books given to the library each year .

The Friends of the Library group has continued to give of both money and time. Mrs. Carl Brewer is chairman this year and Mrs. Ray Thivierge is secretary-treasurer. The total value of the buildings, etc. involved was \$15,000 and the estimated loss was \$13,000 of which \$10,800 was covered by insurance.

A total of 2,000 feet of 2½" and 1,500 feet of 1½" hose was laid out and used. Also, 30 lbs, of CO2 and 400 feet of booster hose.

The Fire Department with the aid of several individuals was able to sponsor a very successful Horse Show, some of the proceeds of which were used to purchase much needed two-way radios. Each of the engines, the Chief's car and the Fire-Station are now equipped. These provide not only intra departmental communication but also with most of the other Fire Departments in surrounding Towns, and the State Forestry Fire Towers and allied units.

## RECREATION COMMISSION

---

The Kensington Recreation Commission was appointed in Sept. by the Selectmen in accordance with New Hampshire Laws governing Recreation Programs. (31:44-31:50)

The Commission consists of: Doris Swift, Warren Sargent, Joan Engel, Joyce Shute, and Charles A. Bickford.

“The increasing amount of time available through shorter working hours and automation; the lengthened life span and earlier retirement; the mobility of the nation’s population—These forces create a changing scene wherein recreation must provide for more satisfying fuller lives.”

Realizing these facts the Kensington Recreation Commission has been meeting monthly to plan for the recreational needs of the town, present and future. As a beginning we have obtained the use of Young’s Pond for skating. Further plans are being made to make coasting uses available and to provide playing space for baseball in the Spring.

A meeting was held in November to which representatives of all organizations in the town plus the Selectmen, School Board and Planning Board were invited. The purpose of this meeting was to assess the recreational opportunities offered in Kensington and to determine which age groups were neglected as well as inform the organizations of the purposes and aims of the Recreation Commission.

It was immediately apparent that the major need for our town is land acquisition suitable for the recre-

ational needs of the future. We must plan for this now while land is still available and before the full effect of the encroaching suburbs are felt .

Although we realize that this probably means purchasing land through a bond issue, we also note that nearly one third of the municipal park acreage in the U.S. was acquired through gifts and we urge civic minded citizens to consider this a fitting memorial which would benefit all as well as provide a setting of natural beauty.

It is the earnest hope of the Commission that interest in Recreation will be generated in the organizations and by concerned citizens which will result in formation of a Recreation Board to help carry out the total program.

Mrs. Marion Holmstrom retired at the end of the last school year after several years of faithful and dedicated service to the school. Mrs. Carol Graves, a graduate of Keene State College, who taught in Heniker last year replaced Mrs. Holmstrom as the teacher of grade 4. Mrs. Helen Pierce a graduate of Sarah Lawrence College, was employed as an additional teacher for grade 3.

Following is a statement by Mr. Frederick King, Teacher Consultant for Supervisory Union No. 16, on his work as supervisor of elementary education:

“Last year at this time I reported that a committee was formed to study various arithmetic programs and to select one that could be used in all of the towns of this school union. I am happy to report that after

careful study and much discussion the Elementary School Mathematics Series was selected. It has been widely adopted and successfully used in thousands of classrooms. It reflects much of the thinking and findings of leading educators, psychologists and mathematicians over the past decade. It incorporates proven teaching techniques with the latest findings in learning theory, blending the best of the old with the exciting, creative ideas of the new.

“All of our first three grades are working with this program now, and I expect it will be expanded to the intermediate grades next fall. A workshop for teachers will be held soon in which teachers will have a chance to discuss any phases of the new program that need further explanation.

“Public elementary schools will soon get a chance to look at themselves through a new State of New Hampshire Department of Education publication, **Guidelines for Public Elementary Schools**. I have had the pleasure of working as a member of the state committee responsible for the new ninety-page booklet which discusses all phases of elementary education from the building itself to the facilities and teaching within the walls. I feel there will be much material here for discussion in the coming months as we move toward the maximum standards and practices recommended in the publication.

“Much profitable time this year has been spent in introducing new media and materials. We are continually developing new ways of reaching major understandings with learners through a variety of resources. The accessibility and correct usage of printed materials, graphic materials, audio-visual materials and television programs become more important each year. We need the best possible resources for teaching and learning,

and we hope for these resources to be used as well as they can be. Demonstrations, bulletins, and discussion sessions have helped teachers with the many resources available.

“As teacher consultant I shall continue as a part of my work to study new approaches to learning, and to evaluate curriculum changes throughout the country and to present to the staff only that which best fits our needs in this school union.”

The continued support of the school program by the Parent-Teacher Association is beneficial to the school.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow.

Again I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation of the citizens, the members of the School Board and the teachers.

### SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 16 CLASS

---

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The enrollment of the Union Class is at the capacity figure this year of fifteen students, thirteen boys and two girls. The grade levels range from low primary through sixth.

There is interchanging with other classes in science, New Hampshire History, physical education and special activities. Art and music supervisors come weekly to the group. The six boys who are covering in a modified degree the sixth grade curriculum join Mrs. Trefethen's group on three days a week. This proves to be challenging and rewarding.

We are continuing the experiment of having students from Phillips Exeter help the boys whose reading difficulties have hampered their progress. With their twice weekly tutoring, we have now no non-readers.

Boy Scout Troop #322 meets each Thursday at the Community Center. Dr. Pitchforth and his Academy assistants are very faithful. All boys are 2nd Class Scouts.

The variance of the class this year as regards achievement, aptitude, grade ranges, chronological age and physical size make the necessary individual attention and standards difficult to maintain. As we saw the need for continued personal assistance at the junior high level, it is apparent that the little people with special difficulties need more person to person relationship and guidance at the primary level than one teacher can adequately give. A part-time assistant in such instances would improve the learning situation.

**SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT**

---

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Health services to children have grown by leaps and bounds in the last few decades. The schools, with community backing, have provided (especially in our own Union #16) the services that are important if each child is to take full advantage of the educational facilities offered. The best trained teacher in the best equipped classroom cannot teach a child who is beset by the ills of the flesh and spirit. How much can a child learn who cannot see the blackboard, who can't hear instructions, who is listless from lack of proper rest or food, or who is emotionally disturbed?

For this reason all of our schools in Union #16 have a health service program with excellent equipment to detect such problems as vision and hearing. All have a school doctor—a specialist in children. Physical examinations are given in certain grades and to children who need special attention. Glasses are provided by the Lion's Club, State Sight Conservation program or the Salvation Army. Hearing aids are still hard to obtain due to cost, but so far we have been able to see that the child gets one where help is needed.

We have children in our classrooms who, until recently, would have been excluded. The epileptic sits right along with the normal child, his spasms controlled with medication; the diabetic, the cerebral palsy, and the severely physically handicapped child can receive the education he deserves. Even the retarded child goes to school and receives an education with the help of special teachers and program.

Immunization clinics are held to provide each child with necessary "shots" or to be kept up to date on his immunity. Every child has an annual vision and hearing test. Sight conservation clinics are held weekly, sponsored by the Exeter Lion's Club and the Kingston Lion's Club. Exeter has weekly dental clinics. Speech clinics are also available for each town but one. Some of the finances for this clinic are provided by school boards where necessary. T.B. tests and urinalysis for the detection of diabetes are also done each year.

Pre-school clinics are held in each town to provide the in-coming first graders the chance of starting school in tip-top condition, or providing time for the correction of remedial defects. There is a long journey ahead of each child during his school years. We must give him the chance to start this journey at maximum ability.

Orthopedic clinics are held monthly with over 200 children in attendance during the school year and chest X-ray clinics periodically. Other special clinics such as amputee clinics and convulsive disorder clinics are available as the need arises. The number attending these latter clinics varies each year.

Another most important role of the service is Health Education in the classroom. Teachers are doing more of this each year, incorporating it with science and social studies. Excellent TV programs and other visual aids are available today for each class at its own level.

This is a far cry from the scattered, unorganized beginnings of School Health Services—but there is yet much to be done. You, the parents, the school board, the school staff, and the general community, have made all this possible. Your help is still needed. "No man is so tall as when he stoops to help a child."
