TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon in the County of Sullivan in said S⁴ate, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for same.

ART. III. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Highways and Bridges and make appropriation for same.

ART. IV. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$330.00 for State Aid Construction; or if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$284.44 for Class 5 assistance, or T. R. A. so-called.

ART. V. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 in trust from Hannah Maria Adams for the care of the Norman Adams lot in the lower cemetery.

ART. VI. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid on or before a certain date.

ART. VII. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00 for the celebration of Memorial Day.

ART. VIII. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for fire protection.

ART. IX. To see if the Town will vote to make any change relative to the by-laws for collecting dog licenses.

ART. X. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of snow fence.

ART. XI. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the road leading from the Whitney place to the Fish pasture owned by Mr. Wilson.

ART. XII. To see if the Town will vote to regulate the price of digging graves.

ART. XIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22.50 foi it's share in the publishing of a book in accordance with the plan of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

ART. XIV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ART. XV. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

ART. XVI. To allow accounts.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Langdon:

I hereby submit my eleventh annual report as your superintendent of schools.

You have been fortunate to have two teachers with very high standards for the third year. They are interested in their work, and have each days work well prepared.

I found on my first visit in February that the attendance in grades five to eight seemed to be very poor, but upon a little study most of this was explained to be justifiable. The enrollment to date is 22 of whom 20 are new members. There has been a total of 321 half-day absences, 34 tardy marks, and 165 pupils excused from school. Sickness accounted for a large part of the absents, music and dental work for the excuses, but a number of the tardy marks it would seem could have been avoided.

In the lower grade room there has not been as many absentees, although there is one rather flagrant case.

Schools cannot do good work with pupils who do not attend regularly. Even those who are at school every day are held back by those who are in and out and have little interest in the work. Your superintendent has too large a district without any office help to follow up these cases as they should be. I recommend that a truant officer be appointed with a salary sufficient that he may investigate cases of absent pupils as soon as they occur, and if necessary punish the parents who do not take the responsibility of having their pupils in school.

There are different opinions as to what constitutes a good school. Many citizens still feel that an absolutely formal school where the children are taught at home that the teachers are the superiors of the pupils as far as the school is concerned in the right type. There is a modern theory that the pupils should run the schools and the teachers should be their helpers. Some see in the first type a confining of the pupils that is too hard on them, while others see in the second type a school where children are brought up to be impudent, even insolent, and a development toward lawlessness. It is very evident that a school cannot be both types at the same time. I have seen schools of each type that were very successful and did not produce the harms so often claimed for them. It seems to me that there is a place somewhere between the two that is far better than either. We must remember that the attitude of the teachers and parents as well as that of the pupils, which is generally a reflection of the home training, is what makes a good school or a poor one.

I wish to thank the Langdon School Board and the teachers for their help and kindness.
