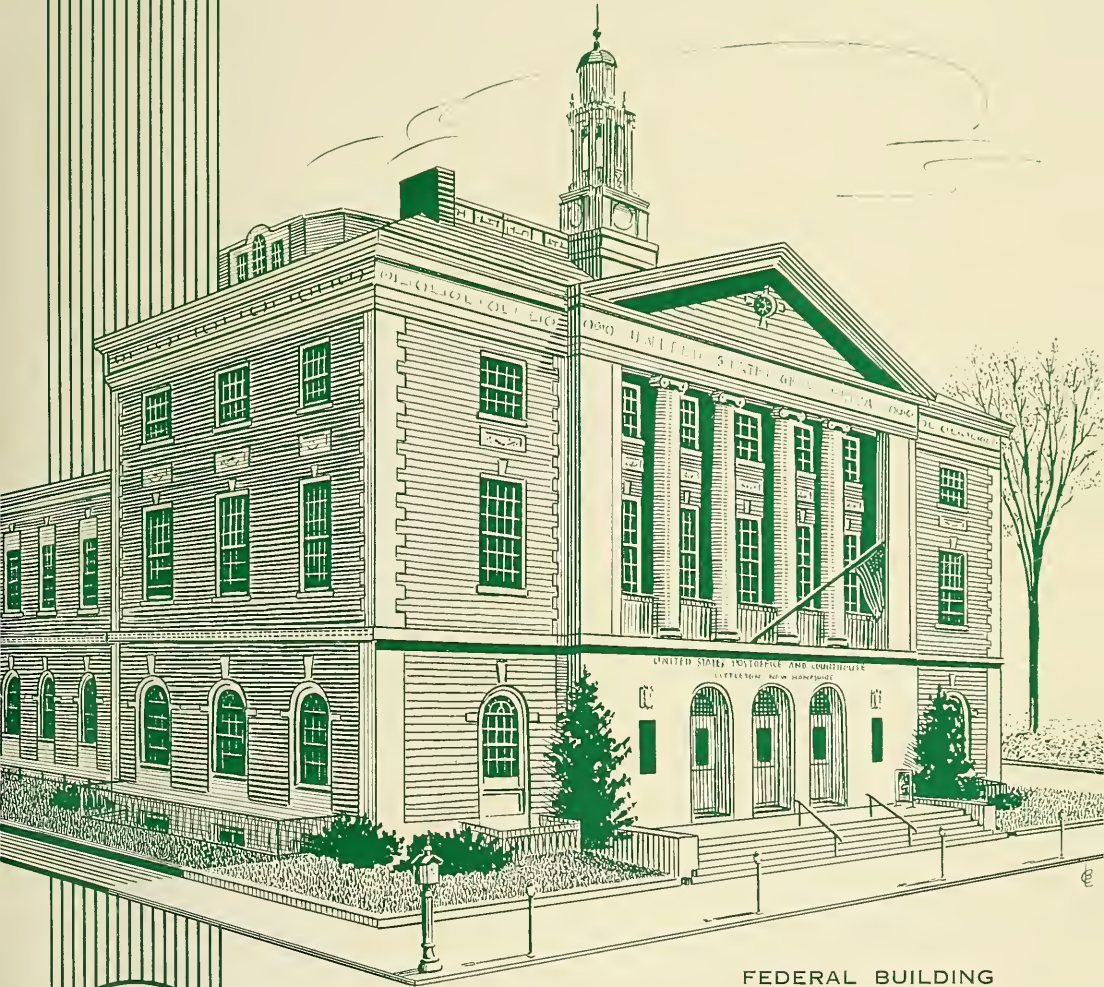

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building on the 10th day of March, next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, and one Trustee of Trust Funds.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting—"Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?"

ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, Municipal Court, Town Building, Police Department, Forest Fires, Sewers, Streets and Highways, Street Lights, Vital Statistics, Sidewalks, Town Garage, Superintendent of Public Works, Health Officer, Hospital, District Nurse, Public Dump, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Civil Defense, Social Security, Blister Rust, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, Garbage Disposal, Special Highway Account, County Tax, Public Library, Cemeteries, National Holidays, Advertising, Region Association, Planning Board, Recreation, Debt Retirement, Interest on Indebtedness and all other necessary expenses.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1959 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to use excess funds from the Union Street Sewer Project to finish construction of the Cottage Street Sewer Extension in the Badger Street area.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Four Hundred Six Thousand Six Hundred Thirty Dollars and Fifty Eight Cents (\$406,630.58) for the reconstruction of Union Street; the Town to be reimbursed approximately one-half by the Federal Government and a portion to be contributed by the State of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 7. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance act.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to purchase a new fire pumper complete with all necessary equipment; to replace the 1941 Ford Pumper.

ARTICLE 9. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to construct an outdoor swimming pool at a site to be selected at Remich Park, and authorize a Committee to be established made up of the Selectmen, the Park Commissioners and three voters appointed by the Park Commissioners, the Committee to decide on all details relative to site and construction specifications, and the completed project turned over to the Park Commission for operation and supervision.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum not to exceed Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) for the construction of an outdoor swimming pool, the loan to be repaid over a period of ten (10) years and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to publish and print in their annual report a list of the owners, together with the assessed value of all taxable properties in Town, as the same appear upon their invoice book; and a separate listing be made of stock-in-trade assessed values; and that the foregoing be placed on the printed ballot to be used at said meeting.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the non-partisan ballot system for election of Town Officers is hereby rescinded and the Australian ballot system be legally adopted; and that the following question be placed upon the ballot—"Shall the non-partisan ballot system for election of Town Officers be rescinded and the Australian ballot system be legally adopted?"

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to lease the parking area situated on Thayer's Hotel property on Main Street for parking purposes during shopping or business hours, at an annual rental of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), the Town to maintain, light, patrol, plow, line, sweep and generally maintain said area; the Hotel to retain the right also to use said parking area.

ARTICLE 15. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the rental for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, as amended to date, being an act authorizing Towns to establish the office of Town Manager; and that the foregoing appear on the printed ballot to be used at said meeting.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$10,830.00) to construct a sewer line on the Old Franconia Road in conjunction with the building of Interstate Route 93 as far as the Water & Light Department lays new water lines.

ARTICLE 18. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000.00) to purchase a street sweeper of approved design.

ARTICLE 20. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 21. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 22. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF LITTLETON PLANNING BOARD

February 16, 1959

To the Citizens of Littleton:

Your Planning Board presents a summary of some of the activities undertaken during the year 1958. F. Bingham Walsh was reappointed by the selectmen to fill the 1958 vacancy. In April, at the first of more than thirty meetings held during the year, the board consisting of the following members, elected the officers named:

On May 27, 1958, at the Annual Conference of the N. H. Planning and Zoning Association, your Planning Board had the pleasure of receiving the first annual merit award given by the Association for accomplishments in the field of planning. It was a distinct privilege to be able to bring this honor and recognition to the town of Littleton.

During the year the Planning Board continued working on several projects for the betterment of Littleton, both physical and economical, and the following report is a summary of some of the activities of 1958.

RIVER POLLUTION ELIMINATION

Your Planning Board, after making an extensive study of Littleton's sewage disposal problem, recommended having the engineering firm of Camp, Dresser & McKee, specialists in this field, to prepare a plan for a sewage disposal system for the town. Employed in 1957, this company completed its field studies and engineering and presented its report to the Planning Board and Selectmen on August 14, 1958. A copy of this report may be seen at the Town Clerk's office.

This is a long range, comprehensive report that outlines the town's requirements for a complete sanitary sewerage and storm drain system to be installed over a long period of time. This is to be carried out as each street or portion of street is rebuilt throughout the town. Provisions for potential new streets are included.

During the course of this study the sewerage and drainage plans for Beacon Street, Bethlehem Road, Oak Hill Avenue, and Union Street were carefully reviewed. As a result of these field studies changes in the sewerage system design were made that resulted in the saving of about \$15,000 for the town of Littleton.

Also an examination of the storm drains indicated that inadequate provision had been made to receive all the drainage from the north side of Union Street and this could have resulted in faulty operation of the system during periods of heavy rain. To correct this, the N. H. Department of Public Works and Highways requested \$32,000 additional money from the town. Upon the request of the Planning Board and the Selectmen, Camp, Dresser & McKee carefully reviewed the drainage for the Union Street Project with the state. This new exam-

ination has revealed that Littleton's fair share of the cost of increased pipe sizes and other facilities is about \$6,000, instead of \$32,000. On the advice of the engineers, the Selectmen are including this revision in the contracts for the reconstruction of Union Street, thus saving the town an additional \$26,000.

The long range goal of this entire project is to have separate sewers and drains on as many streets as possible and to pipe all of the sewage to a treatment plant for disposal. This plant, located on the land the town purchased in 1958 for this purpose, would be unique in that it could be built, as is the entire system in fact, without any pumps. The topography of Littleton, plus the desirable location of the treatment plant site, make this possible. Needless to say, this will be a source of great savings in the cost of operating a future plant for the town of Littleton.

This system will be needed in order to comply with the river classification order that is expected from the N. H. Water Pollution Board sometime in the foreseeable future. This Board has indicated that the Ammonoosuc river will probably receive a B1 classification. This means that the river shall be kept free of toxic substances, oil, grease, and odor forming materials and shall have a bacteria count of no more than 240. Such a stream is suitable for fishing, boating, swimming and public recreation. Random sampling of the water showed that the Ammonoosuc, as it flowed through Littleton, showed bacteria counts as high as 70,000. Certainly this can be a serious health hazard.

The engineers have outlined an initial construction program, of which the Union Street Project is part, that Littleton will need in order to clean up the river, and comply with the future Water Pollution Board order. This initial program, it is estimated, will cost about \$985,000, of which about \$385,000 is the estimated amount of State and Federal Aid, leaving a balance to be paid by the town of an estimated \$600,000.

Recommendation:

The Planning Board calls to your attention and supports the following recommendation of the firm of Camp, Dresser & McKee: "The initial program proposed will accomplish abatement of pollution in the Ammonoosuc River. The town will not be ordered to proceed with a pollution abatement program until after the river is classified. Nevertheless, we recommend prompt construction of the initial program while grants-in-aid are available and in consideration of the fact that construction costs are increasing at the rate of about 5% per year."

ZONING

The Planning Board has two major tools at its disposal for carrying out its responsibility of providing plans for the orderly growth of the town. They are zoning and subdivision control.

Zoning establishes "use" districts and specifies the conditions under which these districts shall be developed. Under the provision of state and municipal legislation it is a responsibility of the Planning Board to recommend a zoning ordinance and changes to the town as the need for such changes arise.

However, the role of the Planning Board is an advisory one. Since a zoning ordinance is a legislative function, the power for adoption of it, and major changes in it, rests with the people at Town Meeting. Although the development of a comprehensive plan for the town is

the responsibility of the Planning Board, the plan is of limited use unless protected by an adequate zoning ordinance.

Lack of protection that could be afforded by a zoning ordinance exposes every home owner to the hazard of obnoxious or undesirable development or changes in his neighborhood. While there are some nuisance and health laws that provide limited protection from extreme hazards, actual experience has shown that they are very difficult to enforce. As things stand today, anyone can build anything anywhere, often with considerable disregard for the welfare of his neighbor, or the effect upon the town. It is the intent of zoning to protect the individual and the town from such adverse effects.

The benefits of a zoning ordinance are emphasized when considered in the light of the proposed new highway system. If there is to be orderly industrial, commercial and residential development of this area, a zoning ordinance should be adopted soon. Lack of zoning at this crucial stage in the economic growth of Littleton can prove detrimental to any long-range plan.

By Town Meeting vote you asked your Planning Board to recommend a set of zoning rules. It then became our duty to inform you about the subject and to recommend to you a zoning ordinance for you to act on at Town Meeting. Therefore, your Planning Board, with the assistance of the engineering firm of Conklin & Kulski and the State Planning and Development Commission prepared a proposed zoning ordinance which your Planning Board felt would provide protection for the property owner and would help guide Littleton's future development. This was published in The Courier on September 25, 1958. Copies of the ordinance together with explanations were mailed to everyone in Littleton in order that they might be able to read and study the proposal.

This ordinance was explained by the Planning Board to several civic groups and clubs as well as to individuals who came to the Board for answers to their questions. We held three public hearings, although only one is required by law, to give people an opportunity to discuss the ordinance and offer suggested changes. As a result, several amendments were made in the ordinance as finally presented at the special Town Meeting held on January 21, 1959. The proposed ordinance was rejected by the voters attending, 436 being opposed and 90 in favor.

Recommendation:

Since the growth and development of a community creates problems and frictions which are magnified by lack of planning, your Planning Board feels there is definitely a need for zoning in Littleton. Therefore, your Planning Board recommends that the voters of Littleton reconsider the matter of adopting a zoning ordinance in the near future.

SUBDIVISION CONTROL

Subdivision control, the other tool of planning under the state law, is the responsibility of the Planning Board. In March 1958 the Town Meeting granted this power to the Planning Board. While it is desirable that subdivision control be coupled with a zoning ordinance, it is not necessary. In fact, some people have expressed an opinion that this is all that Littleton needs at the present time.

Essentially, subdivision control refers to the proper development

of vacant land with specific regard to street layout and utilities. Subdivision control would be primarily concerned with residential developments. However, industrial and commercial developments would also come under the jurisdiction of the subdivision control ordinance.

Standards for land planning and required street and utility improvements would be set forth in the ordinance. The installation of such improvements would be made by the builder or subdivider, and the performance of such installations secured by appropriate guarantees. The essential point is that the builder or subdivider would be responsible for new streets and utilities, whereas formerly the town paid for all such costs, excepting water service.

The provisions of the Subdivision Control ordinance apply to development of all land on unaccepted streets or that land which would require streets to serve such development. Most of the entire area of the town would fall under the jurisdiction of subdivision, this representing the undeveloped portions of the town. In administering provisions of the ordinance, the Planning Board would be careful to avoid imposing unnecessary hardship on the applicant, while at the same time protecting the public interest.

A simple version of obtaining subdivision approval would be as follows:

1. Informal discussions on the proposed plan are held between the Planning Board and the subdivider.
2. A preliminary plan is then submitted to the Planning Board for its approval.
3. A public hearing is held on the proposed subdivision.
4. If the Planning Board grants tentative approval, conditions upon which such approval is granted are stated.
5. A final plan is submitted after tentative approval. If the conditions of tentative approval have been fulfilled, final approval is granted.

The Planning Board has received a proposed subdivision ordinance that was prepared with the assistance of the consultants, Conklin and Kulski and the N. H. Planning & Development Commission. This will be presented at a public hearing in the near future. During the past year the Board, feeling that it was of greater importance, concentrated its efforts on the presentation of a zoning ordinance thus making it impossible to complete this assignment.

TRAFFIC

The Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board, in a joint project, employed the firm of Anderson Nichols Company to further study the problems of traffic control and parking in Littleton. The project consisted of the following items:

1. General traffic counts, using State Highway Department counters.
2. General plan for street extensions, connections, and widenings.
3. Connection plans for interstate highway access.
4. Design standards for future street construction.
5. Traffic study at the Town Hall Corner.
6. Recommendations as to traffic movement and parking related to it.

Such a study appeared necessary to help the town meet the problems created by the new Interstate highway. It was also felt that the street reconstruction program should be carried on in a logical

manner, giving priority to those projects that would be of greatest benefit to the entire town.

The traffic congestion at the Town Hall corner is more acute each year. This will not be relieved to any extent after the super highway is completed because this is the junction of three state highways and one federal highway, as well as the focal point of Littleton's major streets.

A proposal, previously submitted by a traffic light company, outlined a plan of traffic control at this corner by using lights. While it would control the flow of traffic, there was no assurance given the town by the company that this would relieve the congestion on Main street. In fact, it might be worse as traffic could be held up on Main Street waiting for the lights to change.

All of these questions made it advisable that the town secure a complete survey of its traffic problems before proceeding to rebuild any more streets or to purchase any traffic control devices. This was especially true of the Town Hall corner as the proposed lights would cost more than \$10,000.

On February 2, 1959, the Anderson Nichols Company presented the results of their findings. This report contains many long range recommendations for improved flow of traffic. This includes street reconstructions, intersection improvements, street relocations and some new street extensions. The report also suggests priorities for these improvements, placing the highest priorities on those projects that will benefit the town the most. These recommendations are coordinated with the sewage and drainage report recommendations of Camp, Dresser & McKee.

The lack of a zoning ordinance may hamper the efforts of the town to make some of these recommended improvements and it may make some of them unnecessarily expensive to the taxpayer. Nevertheless, the Planning Board, the Selectmen, the Public Works Department, Police Department, Fire Department and the Water and Light Department are all carefully studying this report at this time in order to formulate a general town improvement program that is realistic both as to cost and to results.

Recommendations will be made after there has been opportunity to study all of the suggested proposals. A copy of this report is on file at the Town Clerk's office.

Acknowledgment

The Littleton Planning Board wishes to thank all of those who rendered valuable assistance in the past year. Although it is impossible to list all who have helped us in our work, we wish to acknowledge the substantial assistance given us by the following: the Selectmen, Water and Light Department, Police, Fire, and Public Works Departments, N. H. State Department of Public Works and Highways, N. H. Water Pollution Board, and N. H. State Planning and Development Commission.

The keen interest and active participation of the people of Littleton in all affairs of town government continue to make Littleton a town that is justifiably proud of its accomplishments. Your Planning

Board is honored to have the opportunity to serve our community.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library, Municipal Court and Planning Board.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1957-December 31, 1958: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1957 and December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$58,009.31 during 1958.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with

the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$13,836.23, less a revenue surplus of \$1,843.07, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$11,993.16.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treas-

urer's balance as of December 31, 1958, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Parking Meter Account: (Exhibit B-4)

A summary statement of the Parking Meter Account is presented in Exhibit B-4.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1958, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$11,959.31, from \$20,216.86 to \$8,257.55 during 1958, as shown herewith.

Town Treasurer's Surety Bond:

The surety bond of the Town Treasurer should be

increased from \$15,000.00 to \$25,000.00, in order that the amount of the bond may be more commensurate with the amount of funds which are in the custody of the Treasurer.

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

1958

A marked upsurge in the use of the library was very evident in 1958. The total number of loans for home use was 41,138, the largest circulation since 1939, and 5,400 more than in 1957. A small proportion of this gain is attributable to the accelerated reading program at the Littleton Elementary School, but library use in all other fields increased substantially.

Mrs. Mark Buxton was appointed assistant librarian in July, and Mrs. Ray Howard, second assistant, has been working additional hours to help with activity at the desk. The budget for 1959 should provide a larger allowance for salaries. The need for more books is apparent by the number we have been obliged to borrow from the N. H. State Library and its bookmobile, 692. Direct loans of recent books from the latter have been a tremendous help in supplying the demand. Our own collection of children's books is still inadequate to fill the needs of all classes at the grade school. As has been stated in previous reports the distance from school to library discourages direct loans to the children and books must be provided in the classrooms themselves, changed regularly and more often. This is an important service which the library should give. The only solution is an increased book budget.

The librarian must point out that the cost of books, library help, supplies and building maintenance has been rising steadily at a rate far exceeding the increases in the library appropriation. The close of a year of gratifying library activity is the time for Littleton to see that the library trustees receive support when they request a higher appropriation.

The trustees voted to accept the offer of the N. H. State Library to conduct a survey of library and community relations in Littleton. This project was started in June and a number of interesting facts and useful interim suggestions resulted. The formal report of the survey team is expected in the near future.

The first country-wide National Library Week was observed in March with a very successful and impressive exhibit of local handcraft. The display, organized by Mrs. Paul Holly, trustee, brought many people into the library. Notices to churches and clubs, and other publicity were effective in making the public library-conscious. A Senior Citizens club was organized by Mrs. Reginald Colby and held meetings in the newly renovated back basement room.

The summer brought large numbers of temporary borrowers who expressed their pleasure and surprise in finding good library service and a wide selection of recent books immediately available. Children's Book Week in November was celebrated with a story hour for the youngest; the upper grades enjoyed a book game and films provided by the State Library. An Open House for teachers was held one evening during the week.

Books and phonograph records were presented as memorials to Ernest Labonte, Cynthia Ann Fogg, Mrs. C. T. Bodwell, Mrs. Alson H. Robinson and Mrs. Harold A. Edson. The librarian would like to thank those who gave money and books and all who in many other ways contributed to a satisfying year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF LITTLETON DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

Sewer Projects

During the year of 1958 there was extensive work done on sewer lines, some of which are as follows:

Highland Ave.-Beacon St. and Outfall to River sewer project which was contracted by Clinton Clough, and the **Cottage St. Extension** sewer which was contracted by Kenneth E. Curran, Inc. These projects were designed by this department and approved by the N. H. Water Pollution Commission and the N. H. State Health Dept. before the contract for construction could be let.

Union St. sewer. An extensive cleaning job was done on the Union St. sewer by the Pittsburgh Pipe Cleaning Co. It was found that the sewer line had considerable deposits of silt, sand and gravel. After the sewer was cleaned, the interior of some sections of the sewer line was photographed and from these photographs it was possible to determine the condition of the existing line, and to decide which sections had to be replaced prior to the reconstruction of Union St. As a result of these photographs, some of the old sewer lines were saved and did not have to be replaced, resulting in a saving in the anticipated outlay on the Union St. sewer.

The Union St. sewer was contracted to Kenneth E. Curran, Inc. The contractor has laid about 1,530 L.F. of 12-inch, 462 L.F. of 8-inch, 740 L.F. of 14-inch sewer pipe with necessary manholes and service connections. The contract was let in ample time for completion this last fall, but due to extreme cold weather approximately two weeks earlier than normal, which was not anticipated, the contractor was unable to fully complete the contract. Therefore due to these early and extreme weather conditions, the street has been left in bad condition. The contractor is being held responsible for the completion of the contract as soon as weather conditions permit.

Along with the normal maintenance of the sewers in town, this Department added several new manholes in trouble spots and on dead end lines to make maintenance of these lines more efficient. Many new manholes are needed on the old sewer lines, and it is planned that several of these will be installed this coming summer.

T.R.A. Work

With the Town Road Aid—IV money from the State of N. H. amounting to \$7,378.29 and with the Town's share amounting to \$1,258.67, the following work was done by this Department under the guidance of the N. H. State Dept. of Public Works and Highways:

On **Slate Ledge Road** from Col. England's house to the turn that goes to Hicks', a distance of about 0.65 miles, the finish course of gravel was put on and a 3-inch-thick, mixed-in-place bituminous surface was laid. Also one ditch was lined with stone and surfaced with a spraying of asphalt.

On the **Manns Hill Road** from Hopkins' turn to the Dalton Town line, the road was widened, new drainage installed, the grade made more uniform, and a heavy blanket of gravel laid. This section of road is to be topped in the same manner as the Slate Ledge Road this coming spring.

Pleasant St.—Oak Hill Ave. Project

Pleasant St. from Main St. to Oak Hill Ave. and up Oak Hill Ave. to Remich Park was surfaced with a Type I-1 Hot Bituminous Asphalt Concrete. This work was done by the L. M. Pike and Sons Co. from Laconia, N. H., low bidders for the job, under the supervision of this Department.

The balance of **Oak Hill Ave. from Remich Park to School St.** was rebuilt by the low-bidder, Kenneth E. Curran, Inc., of Littleton. At the time of reconstruction, the storm sewer was removed from the sanitary sewer. Along with this work the Littleton Water and Light Department took advantage of the opportunity to replace old water service lines with copper pipe and move the shut-offs out of the street to the rear line of the sidewalks.

The surface for the balance of **Oak Hill Ave. to School St.** is scheduled to be laid this coming spring.

Class IV Roads

The Littleton Department of Public Works and Highways did considerable maintenance and improvement work on the Class IV Roads. Numerous culverts which were rusted out were replaced with new culverts and in some cases additional culverts were installed. About 5,500 cubic yards of gravel were placed on the gravel roads, aside from the T.R.A. Work. In the fall, considerable ditch cleaning was done, with much left to do. During the summer months approximately 10 miles of tarred roads were surface-treated, using about 30,000 gallons of asphalt.

Winter Sanding

During the fall about 4,500 cubic yards of sand was stock-piled at the Town Garage for winter sanding. This supply was depleted and it became necessary to purchase 1,000 cubic yards. This is more sand than has been necessary in past years.

Snow Removal

It was recommended at last town meeting that the Town look into the possibility of contracting for the removal of snow. Bids were asked for and two were received, one being for 48 cents per cubic yard and the other being 74 cents per cubic yard. It was felt that these prices were too high, and both bids were rejected. By keeping exact records this winter it has been found that the Department can remove snow much cheaper than these quoted prices.

51st Annual Report of the Administrator To The Littleton Hospital Association

Your administrator is most happy to be able to present a very favorable and encouraging report based on the operation of the Littleton Hospital for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1958.

Statistically speaking, 1,221 patients were admitted, an increase of 100 patients over the previous period; the number of patient days of service was 8,444 compared with 7,928; 192 births were recorded compared with 195; the average daily census, including new-born was 25.80 compared with 24.49; in fact, according to available records the figures above set new records for the Littleton Hospital. A total of 2,432 X-ray examinations were made compared with 2,106 last year; 10,626 laboratory tests compared with 9,685 last year; 596 surgical procedures compared with 569 last year.

Medically speaking, the control of the quality of medical care rendered has been verified by the number of consultations between physicians and also the number of post-mortems performed. The rate of consultations showed a percentage of 18.7% compared with a desired national average of anywhere from 15 to 20%. The post-mortem rate was 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ % compared with a national desired average of 20% for non-teaching hospitals. The medical staff is to be commended on this excellent record.

We have all noted articles in various magazines pertaining to the number of infections reported by hospitals. We are happy to report that your hospital has been kept free of such infection by virtue of the strict rules set up and enforced in regard to proper technique in surgery and the nursing floor as well as in the other areas of the hospital, including the dietary department, laundry, housekeeping and other departments.

During the year the medical staff and trustees approved the appointment of Dr. Harry D. McDade to the medical staff with surgical privileges. Also during the year Dr. Ralph E. Miller of the Hitchcock Clinic assumed supervision of the clinical laboratory, replacing Dr. Merriam who had resigned to further his studies in Burlington.

During 1958 a special committee was originated called the infections committee to deal with prevention of infections and also the measures to be taken to stamp out any cases of infections that might occur. The committee consists of Dr. Hume, Dr. Bogle and Dr. McGregor, together with Mrs. Miller, Mrs. MacDonald, Mrs. Cole, and the administrator. The inspection of the hospital by the Joint Committee on Hospital Accreditation will be due during next year, and I am happy to report that, in my opinion, the hospital will once again receive the status of full accreditation. This opinion is based on the excellent condition of the medical records as recorded by the medical staff and maintained and indexed by disease, operation and doctor, by our medical record staff, and meeting all other standards set up by the committee.

A pharmacy committee also was formed, consisting of Dr. Ralph E. Parker, Mrs. Miller, our nursing director, and a pharmacist from Parker's Drug store to supervise the hospital drug room in the proper use, stocking and dispensing of drugs. Spencer's Pharmacy and Winslow's Pharmacy have agreed to supply a pharmacist during succeeding years.

Our nursing staff meets monthly at which time a member of the medical staff or a member of the nursing staff presents a program pertaining to patient care and the treatment of different diseases. Mrs. Miller and other members of our excellent nursing staff attended several instructional conferences held in Concord.

Financially speaking, the Littleton Hospital showed an operating gain of \$1,014.60 for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1958, after all income, including appropriations from all towns, were credited. Patient income increased from \$158,425 last year to \$177,224 this year. General operating expense increased from \$164,766 to \$176,824. Of the \$176,824, over \$102,000 was paid out in salaries. This does not include private duty nurses' salaries or fees paid to laboratory and X-ray consulting physicians.

Many improvements were made to the equipment and physical plant including a completely renovated dietary department at a cost of \$4,414.98 of which \$3,000 was donated by the Woman's Auxiliary, and a shower for maternity patients at a cost of \$1,491.68. The exterior of the hospital was painted at a cost of \$825.00, and the exterior of the nurses' residence was painted at a cost of \$352.50 which was paid for by the Woman's Auxiliary.

Other purchases outside of the normal purchases of sutures, syringes, plaster, catheters, sponges, adhesive tape, cotton balls, solutions, rubber gloves, surgical soap, disinfectants, nursing bottles, just to name a dozen of several hundred medical items, included new and replacement instruments at \$337.67, a recovery room stretcher at \$292.56, a wheeled stretcher at \$112, an exercise bar at \$24.75, an aspirating pump at \$95.00, four bedside cabinets at \$151.00, six side chairs at \$98.28, six overbed tables at \$336.00, 1 pair safety sides at \$48.75, another pair at \$23.40, and six floor lamps at \$126.00 plus many smaller items adding to the safety and comfort of our patients.

Noting the increased utilization of the facilities of the Littleton Hospital, I would like to reiterate my belief that some remodeling, and as a result of this remodeling, some addition to the present building will be

necessary in the near future to accommodate the needs of our communities in their desire for a modern up-to-date hospital. I have particular reference to the necessary separation of certain of our departments which should operate as isolated units contained within themselves, and to the fact that the present elevator has outlived its life expectancy and should be replaced, and also additional space is required for the economical and efficient operation of the laboratory, and additional space is needed for out-patient facilities for physiotherapy, examinations, treatments and plaster work.

I would like to make particular mention of the generous donations received from George W. Collier of the Forest Hills hotel in Franconia. Part of the funds have been expended for the complete refurnishing of a private room with the latest and most modern furniture, including a bed which can be raised and lowered and adjusted electrically by the patient. Gifts were most gratefully received from the following: a wheel chair from the V.F.W. Auxiliary, cash donations from the Bethlehem Hebrew Congregation, Mrs. Bessie Martin, Miss Helen I. McGroray, Mr. J. Albert Wolfe, the Lisbon Girl Scouts and Rabbi Augenstein. A special thank you is extended to the children and folks that contributed fresh fruit, vegetables and canned goods, etc., on Donation Day!

I would like to close this report with an expression of recognition and appreciation to all who have assisted in making the Littleton Hospital the fine institution which it is today. This may be a lengthy list, however the Littleton Hospital has many friends including our able board of trustees, who represent the Littleton Hospital association, the very generous Woman's Auxiliary board, the excellent medical staff, the nurses of the Community Nursing association, the Littleton Garden club, the Police and Fire departments, the U. S. Postoffice, Miss Warren, the Littleton and Grafton

county case worker, the Public Welfare office in Woodsville, the overseers of poor and the selectmen of the towns served by your hospital.

Mere words cannot express my appreciation of the help and understanding extended by the staff of the hospital, the medical staff, the board of trustees, the Woman's Auxiliary, and all the friends of the hospital.

REPORT OF THE LITTLETON PARK COMMISSIONERS

Exceptionally good skiing conditions were in evidence during the first three months of 1958, with record crowds participating in this sport at the Mt. Eustis ski slope. A smaller tow, donated by the Chamber of Commerce, was installed and put into operation at Remich park, being thoroughly enjoyed by the smaller youngsters. While an abundant snowfall provided excellent ski conditions, it did however make it quite difficult to maintain good skating ice. "Art" Tunney did a very commendable job in providing fine ice as evidenced by the large skating attendance. A smaller skating rink was in operation at the Apthorp Common for the youngsters in that vicinity.

Cold weather arrived early this last winter permitting the skating rink to be in full operation as early as December 1st, with "Bud" Hanley producing exceptionally good ice. While skaters were enjoying their sport, unusual light snowfall allowed little or no skiing. The Mt. Eustis ski tow operated only intermittently until the heavier snows of early February.

With the arrival of spring the parks, playgrounds and the Dells area were again subjected to a general house-cleaning, with a result that all areas maintained a well-kept appearance for the entire summer season.

Mr. Charles Higgins was employed at Remich park as custodian during the summer months, and his understanding and humor made him an immediate favorite with the children. Meanwhile at the Common, "Don" Ross again did an excellent job in maintaining the area and providing general supervision.

The summer recreation program got underway shortly after the start of summer vacations with Robert

Enderson again employed as recreational director, and Mrs. Eunice Cady as assistant. A well-rounded program was provided, including baseball, softball, volleyball, archery, horseshoes and field events for the boys.

Under the supervision of Mrs. Cady, the younger set enjoyed the playground equipment, wading pool, sand boxes, and games such as badminton, volleyball, etc. Doll carriage parades were popular with the young ladies. The facilities of the grandstand were available during inclement weather with table tennis tournaments, table games, painting instruction, coloring and various other games to keep the youngsters happy and occupied.

During the summer swim program the recreational personnel assisted in making this again a success.

One of the major projects this year was the development of the Chiswick Inn property into a very appealing site and picnic area. Although funds for this venture were not provided in this year's budget, the area was turned over to this department for development. Approximately \$600 was expended in the area after the inn was razed. The remaining debris from the inn and brush accumulated in the clearing of the property were placed in the cellar hole and topped with fill. A major portion of the area was then graded and seeded, with commendable results. Picnic tables were added and the construction of fireplaces is contemplated for the future. This area affords one of the finer views of the White Mountains and has a great potential for further development. It is indeed an asset to the Town of Littleton.

Following the request of many residents in the Athorp area for a playground supervisor at the Common, it was decided to have a trial program for a two-month period. This program was aimed to provide instruction in the use of the playground equipment and to encour-

age team participation for the children, especially those too young to make their way to Remich park. We were fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Louise Ross to work with these children.

The response to this program was beyond expectation as it was not uncommon to see over fifty children enjoying themselves, having equal opportunity to use the playground equipment and, more important, learning to play together. Mrs. Ross is to be commended for a job well done, especially for working with so limited a supply of games and equipment. We sincerely urge that this program be continued in the years to come.

An unscheduled expense this year was for extensive repairs on the bleachers at the Common. An inspection by insurance investigators deemed these as unsafe and a hazard. To comply with their recommendations, steel guard railing was required at the back and sides of each bleacher, and most of the wood planking required replacement. Following a close examination of the planking it was decided to make a complete replacement to make the bleachers uniform and unquestionably safe. These bleachers now should give many years of service with a minimum of upkeep cost. It is well to note that these bleachers are used to a great extent for Little League games and softball games and are filled to capacity during the band concerts.

Lumber salvaged from the bleachers was used to build new benches and to repair sand boxes.

Picnicking at the Dells area is increasing with each year. Many of the local residents, as well as those from out-of-town and state, are making use of the facilities provided, which include picnic tables and fireplaces. We hope more of the local people will use this area for picnics and cook-outs, for it is close to home with ample room for the children to release their energy. It is YOUR area, let's all enjoy it.

In closing, this has been an active year for your Park commission. We are happy to report that your parks and playgrounds, your recreation buildings and playground equipment are in excellent condition. We again urge each and every one to make full use of the facilities provided. Our most sincere thanks to the many people who extended their support.

The budget request for the coming year is higher than that of the previous year due to a number of factors. Principal and interest on the bonds for the elementary school addition accounts for 36% of the increase; salaries of additional teachers necessary to carry on the program 49%; and miscellaneous items throughout the budget such as increase in teachers' salaries, heat, light and supplies 15% of the total increase. We can also anticipate an increase in receipts of approximately \$13,000.00 for the coming year.

In order to carry on an adequate school program and meet the requirements of present day school curricula, we recommend an appropriation of \$412,260.55 for the ensuing year.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Littleton Union School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1957 and June 30, 1958, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$39,773.64 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—

Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$8,249.63, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,766.00, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$5,483.63.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1958 is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Building Fund Account: (Exhibit B-3)

A summarized statement of the Building Fund account is presented in Exhibit B-3.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit C)

A statement of the bonded indebtedness of the School District

as of June 30, 1958, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit C.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report relative to your schools.

This past year brought a number of changes in the teaching staff in our schools. There were two changes and one teacher added at the elementary school and seven changes and three teachers added at the high school.

Mr. Richard C. Leone of Sunapee, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, was elected teacher of Mechanic Arts, to replace Kenneth N. Aldrich who resigned to accept a similar position at the St. Johnsbury Trade School.

Mr. Francis A. Paquette, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected to teach French and English to replace Lester C. Shiere who resigned to accept a position in Salem, N. H.

Mrs. Shirley M. Aldrich of Dalton, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with six years' experience in Dalton and Lancaster, was elected to teach English in Grades 7 and 8. Mrs. Aldrich replaced Miss Nancy J. Ledoux who resigned to get married and leave the area.

Mrs. Marion W. Hall of Littleton, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with four years' experience in North Stratford, was elected to teach Home Economics and English, replacing Miss Janice A. McNamara who resigned to accept a similar position in Brockton, Mass.

Mr. James E. Darling, Jr., of Lebanon, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with two years' experience in Lebanon, was elected to teach Science in the junior high and high school, replacing Orin Smiley who resigned to accept a position elsewhere.

Miss Zula Westmoreland of Summerville, South Carolina, a graduate of Sargent College, with three

years' experience in Fryeburg Academy, was elected to teach girls' Physical Education and coach girls' basketball, replacing Miss Anna J. Seavey who resigned to accept a similar position in Exeter.

Mr. Harold C. Eichel of Gorham, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected to teach junior high Mathematics to replace Mrs. Bertha E. Buckley who resigned during the summer to accept a position in her home town of Berlin.

Peter F. Graham, III, of Plymouth, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected to teach Social Studies in the high school and assist in football and basketball. Mr. Graham was elected as an additional teacher.

H. Leonard Valway of Medford, Mass., a graduate of Boston College and with a master's degree from the same school, was elected to teach English in the high school. Mr. Valway was elected as an additional teacher due to the increased number of English sections.

Mr. Richard D. Daley of Groveton, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, was elected to teach Science in the high school to replace Christie J. Drago who resigned to accept a similar position in Exeter.

Mr. James M. Winer of Portsmouth, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, was elected to teach English and History in the high school after the opening of school due to the heavy load in certain sections of English and History.

Mr. Theodore J. Pfeuffer of Pompton Lakes, New Jersey, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College and Paterson Teachers College, with two years' experience in Haskell, New Jersey, was elected to teach the Sixth grade in the Elementary School, replacing Miss Jean Blakley who resigned to accept a position in Connecticut.

Mrs. Marion Pfeuffer of Pompton Lakes, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with three years' experience in Pompton Lakes, New Jersey, was elected to

teach Grade 3, replacing Miss Carlene Allison who resigned to get married and leave the area.

Mrs. Nancy R. Stearns, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with a year's experience in Whitefield, was elected to assist in the primary grades in the elementary school, to replace Mrs. Bevalie C. Nute who helped out last year on a part-time basis.

Mrs. Martha B. Wood of Bethlehem has been employed on a part-time basis to assist with one group in the intermediate reading program.

Mr. Hamish MacEwan of Bethlehem, instructor of Art at St. Mary's-in-the-Mountains, has been employed on a part-time basis as instructor of Art in the high school.

Your high school this year is meeting the minimum standards in all respects and exceeding them in a number. This year the library has been organized as a definite part of the program with Mr. Basil Walker as librarian. Mr. Walker devotes three full periods per day to this activity. Many books have been purchased, catalogued and placed in the library for pupil use. Books were selected from the list recommended by the American Library Association.

Pupils in the elementary grades are tested annually for achievement and every other year for mental maturity. When necessary, pupils in the elementary school are given individual tests by Mrs. Selby. We are most fortunate to have a member on the staff qualified to do this work. Pupils in Grades 8 and 11 are given the University of New Hampshire guidance battery each year. These prove invaluable to the principal and teachers throughout the year.

It has been possible to reduce the size of many of the classes in the high school this year with the additional teachers employed in spite of the increase of approximately 65 pupils. Your high school has absorbed the majority of the high school pupils from Carroll and Franconia.

The elementary school reading program was completely revised this year in the upper three grades. Pupils were grouped into seven groups according to reading ability and reading achievement regardless of grade placement. Pupils of like ability were placed in one group and taught reading on their own level and encouraged to progress at their own rate. Each group meets with its reading teacher for a 55-minute period for instruction. The Scott Foresman reading system is used for the basic reading program, with the Ginn readers being used for supplementary material. A recreational reading period is provided during the day when all pupils can read books on their own level for recreation. It is most gratifying to see the amount of reading that is done and the interest that these pupils have gained in reading.

One class has been organized in reading for pupils of Grade 2 who have evidenced certain specific reading difficulties. This class is under the direction of Mrs. Sylvestre who has done much study in this area. We are presently using the Gillingham system for this group.

It is most gratifying to see the progress that is being made in the construction of additional facilities at the elementary school. When classes in that school can be reduced to a size that is not overburdensome to a teacher, I feel very confident that there will be further evidence of improvement in quality.

I feel that much progress has been made this past year and I look forward to continued progress in our educational system. My recommendations include the addition of a full-time guidance teacher for high school and two additional teachers to care for science, mathematics and social studies in the high school, and additional teachers for those grades in the elementary school that exceed seventy. We need to continue to strengthen our reading program and to take a good look at our science, mathematics and English.

I wish to commend the school board for its keen interest in the schools and to express my appreciation to the community for its continued support of the schools by providing excellent building facilities, equipment and adequate teaching staff.

In closing I wish to thank the school board, principals, teaching staff, other school district personnel and the citizens of Littleton for their cooperation and support.

The total registration for the high school is 365 plus 122 in the junior high school, making a total of 487. This represents an increase of 84 in the high school and a decrease of 2 in the junior high school. Twenty-seven have withdrawn from school to date.

CURRICULUM

Our curriculum is based upon the philosophy that certain basic studies should be required of all pupils; these include English, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. The depth and degree of which these studies are pursued is determined by the ability, the educational aims and the future plans of the pupil.

The curriculum is divided into five programs, namely—College Preparatory, Business Education, Home Economics, Manual Arts and General. Health and Physical Education is required of all, and music, chorus-glee club and band may be elected by those interested in work in these areas.

GUIDANCE

The guidance program is based on the premise that good teaching and guidance are closely allied and that in the final analysis, it is the classroom teacher who must assume an important role in the program.

The program is headed by the principal who does most of the educational guidance. He is assisted in this by the college preparatory staff members who recognize particular talents in their classes and work with these individuals.

However, I would strongly recommend a guidance director.

TESTING

The testing program begins in elementary school and is recorded on the permanent record of each student. Testing in grades 7 and 8 includes: The California Mental Maturity and the California Achievement Tests of Basic Skills. This year grades 8 and 11 received a battery of 5 tests administered by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service which tests included: The California Occupational Interest Inventory, Primary Mental Ability, Clerical Speed and Accuracy, Mechanical Reasoning, Cooperative Reading Comprehension Test. Grade 10 takes the American Council of Education Psychological Examinations.

The Scholarship Qualifying Test and National Merit Scholarship Test are given each year.

PLACEMENT AND FOLLOW-UP

Prospective employers are urged to contact the school on job openings and many do work with the school in attempting to place people in positions commensurate with their ability.

ACCREDITATION

Littleton High School is accredited by the State Department of Education and the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The object of the Littleton Chapter of the National Honor Society of Secondary Schools is to create enthu-

REPORT FROM THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

1958 was a busy year for the White Mountains Region office, particularly in the information and transportation fields.

In view of foreseen drastic consequences, the Region took a very active part in representing our towns in fighting transport curtailment, particularly with regard to the railroads. We appeared at hearings in Concord, North Conway, and Littleton, and engaged in a considerable amount of travel and correspondence in the effort to prevent the Boston and Maine and the Maine Central railroads from cutting out their passenger service. While only limited success resulted, it should be pointed out that such curtailments will go through without even a delay if they are not strongly contested. We have also taken an active part in proceedings before the Civil Aeronautics Board in attempting to secure better air service for northern New Hampshire; the final decision on this is not yet in. In the meantime, we have worked with bus companies to publicize their service in the hope that bus travel may take up some of the slack.

Demands for White Mountains literature of all types continue to increase, and we have been considerably crowded to satisfy them. The new N. H. Montreal office, turnpike information booths, and new sources contacted while out of state have all upped the quantity of literature we need to distribute. As satisfying the requests for folders about our region means dollars to our towns, it is extremely important that we receive enough funds to supply the need.

We have continued our customary and tested programs of 4-H awards, Youth Awards in science, and of liaison with all types of organizations and departments who in one way or another are working for the benefit of our area and our state. We have confidence that 21 years has proved them worthwhile. We have continued to travel to areas outside our state to carry the White Mountains message, and have cooperated with attractions operators and others who are doing the same job in different ways.

We'd like to remind every town again in this legislative year that holding the line in taxes in New Hampshire will be possible to a large extent only as much as we continue to bring in out-of-state visitors to help finance our main sources of revenue (Ex: they pay over 40% of the gas tax and others). To do this, we have to continue to reach out and bring them in, and put up the small sums (which return many times over) that publicity costs. It's for our own benefit, and it does pay off. At a small outlay to any one town, an area publicity program operates that benefits all our towns. Our surveys in four consecutive years have shown consistently 2½ to 3 times the town monies coming back to the area out of just a few inquirers surveyed.

Your town's part in this work is important, and is appreciated. This is one way where we in New Hampshire can still do things for ourselves.
