vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in
said Madbury on Tuesday the 14th day of March, A. D.,
1944, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon, to set upon the
following subjects:

- ART. 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three
years.
- ART. 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensu-
ing year.
- ART. 5. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the
ensuing 3 years.
- ART. 7. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Select-
men to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$129.77
to be matched by \$510.00 by the State for
class V roads.

- ART. 10. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town of Madbury will cooperate with other towns in this area by appropriating \$30.00 for the Seacoast Regional Association.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 55 of the State of New Hampshire Laws of 1935 authorizing towns to appoint town Planning Boards and authorize the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Madbury to appoint such board to consist of five (or seven) members.
- ART. 13. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS IN MADBURY, N. H.

To the School Board and Citizens of Madbury:

I respectfully submit my fifteenth Annual Report. The report of the school nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald of Newmarket accompanies it.

Madbury has been fortunate to secure good teachers at a time when such are at a premium. Mrs. Edna Ordway is returning another year at the North School and Mrs. Mina M. Sanders, who has helped us in difficult situations at other times, is teaching at the Center School.

The two schools remain about equal in number of pupils as you may note from the table of Comparative Statistics.

This year only one child is being transported at District expense. As in previous years the pupils residing on the Dover-Durham road are attending the Durham schools at the expense of their parents. One pupil attends in Durham from the Durham-Portsmouth road at Madbury's expense.

The so called "Surplus Products" program of the federal authorities has been discontinued but a school lunch program may be assisted from federal funds by the purchase of certain approved foods. Mrs. Sanders is taking advantage of this program and providing a hot lunch for those pupils who remain at the school for the lunch hour. This means a great deal of extra work on her part and she is to be commended for doing it. The pupils are willing helpers and several of the parents have contributed foods.

This school year only one day has been lost because of the teachers having to carry on the rationing pro-

gram. We are assured that no more lost time for this reason will be necessary this year.

The pupils are buying war savings stamps and bonds and helping to collect scrap of all kinds. The North School is flying a Minute-Man Banner awarded to the school for having 90 per cent or more of the pupils buying war savings stamps or bonds.

Only one day has been devoted to a meeting of the State Teachers' Association held at Rochester. No Rural Institutes have been held. The Superintendent has had one meeting of the teachers of his union, primarily for the purpose of instructions for the issuing of Ration Book No. 4. Transportation difficulties prevent the holding of such meetings.

Your superintendent still has to devote much time to defense duties, supervising Defense Courses at Somersworth and Durham. He attended the meeting of the New England Superintendents' Association at Boston in November and has made plans to attend the meeting of the American Association of School Administrators to be held in New York February 22-25.

The tuition rate at Dover High School has again advanced from \$89.79 of last year to \$100.78 this year. This is the state average. This unforeseen increase will mean that the annual meeting in March will have to make a small appropriation available to meet a deficit in tuition for the Spring term. In planning a budget this item is always uncertain. Since the making of the present budget three families have moved into town with pupils of high school age. The school district is liable for the tuition of such pupils from the time they actually settle in the District. For school purposes the "legal residence" dates from the time of "moving-in".

Your School Board has held regular meetings and has acted as a unit. The cooperation of all parties has been

good. There has been no "let down" because of war activities. We are all working a little harder without complaint.
