TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford on Tuesday the 11th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year; Also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds and one Library Trustee for three years.

2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended herein or pass any vote relative thereto.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town Winter Roads for the ensuing year.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town Property.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Electric Lights.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.

9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed or otherwise.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.00 for the use of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V Roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$575.14 for that purpose.

14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.

15. To see if the Provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relating to Playing Games of Beano shall be adopted in this Town.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to cover expenses of Memorial Day.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for a Community Center Memorial Fund.

18. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Care of Common.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Control of Pine Blister Rust.

20. To see if the Town will vote to build a fence of suitable design on the Easterly side of the West Cemetery, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for the same.

21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Provisions of the Municipal Budget Law.

22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title 11 of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

23. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

24. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the Compensation for which is on a fee basis.

25. If a plan for Social Security Coverage is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the Plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the Officer to be responsible for the Administration of the Plan.

26. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.

27. To see if the Town will vote to build a building to house the Fire Engine and Road Equipment and raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 for same.

28. To see if the Town will vote to build a new bridge on the Indian Pond Brook near Preston's and raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for same.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds to be used to buy road equipment.

30. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The following is a report of the activities carried on in Orford by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for the year 1957.

A total of eight clinics have been held in the town for immunizations of children.

Salk Vaccine clinics were held with a total attendance of 300 children from 3 months to 20 years of age.

The percentage of Orford children receiving the Polio Vaccine is excellent and Orford should be very proud of its record.

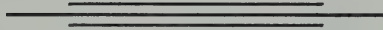

To the inhabitants of the School District of Orford qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District, on Friday, the 11th of April, 1958, at seven-thirty in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for three years, and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1957-58, a sum of money to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1958, in order to meet obligations due to unanticipated costs on the water supply at the Orfordville School and to greater costs than anticipated for the additional room at the Orfordville School and for the dumb waiter at the Street School.

SCHOOL WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 10. To see if the District will construct a new high school building or buildings including the acquisition of land therefor and the purchase of necessary equipment, or additions and alterations to the present high school building including the acquisition of land for a new playground therefor and the necessary grading, filling and draining of the land already owned or purchased and including the purchase of necessary equipment, or both such projects, and appropriate money therefor and raise the same by the issue of bonds or otherwise and authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts relating thereto including the employment of an architect and select and acquire such land and to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable.

Article 11. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I present herein my report for 1957, my fourth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford. In preparing the report, I have freely used material from the report made to me by Mr. Elmer Fulton, Principal.

Minimum Standards and Recommended Practices for New Hampshire Secondary Schools, Grades 9 - 12

As all of you are aware, the State Department of Education has published minimum standards that each high school is to meet if it is to continue to be an approved high school. These standards deal with the program of studies, staff, and administrative provisions. Unless a high school meets the minimum standards and so becomes approved, it is not eligible for state aid or for accepting tuition pupils. In addition to

the minimum standards, there are practices set forth that the State Department strongly recommends as being extremely desirable.

On December 12, 1957, representatives of the State Department of Education visited Orford High School to make a study of the whole situation and then to make recommendations as to what must be done and as to what should be done. The report from the State Department is so significant to the future of Orford High School that all of the citizens of Orford should have an opportunity to see it. It is, therefore, given below in its entirety:

Report on Visit to Orford High School

December 12, 1957

"On December 12, 1957, the following staff members of the State Department of Education visited Orford High School: Messrs. Neal Andrew, and Paul Quimby.

The purpose of the visit was twofold: first, to clarify what action, if any, is necessary to qualify Orford High School as an Approved High School under the Minimum Standards which will go into effect in September, 1958; second, to identify aspects of the school plant and program which are in need of attention if Orford is to offer a truly comprehensive high school program.

In addition to the comments included in this report, other recommendations and suggestions were presented verbally to Superintendent Arthur E. Pierce and Principal Elmer B. Fulton. Although these are not detailed here, it is hoped that each will be given careful consideration.

The staff of our department is available to assist in any appropriate manner as steps are taken to implement the ideas presented in this report.

ACTION NECESSARY UNDER MINIMUM STANDARDS

1. Only two Fine Arts opportunities are currently being offered on an activity basis for non-credit, one period each week for both art and chorus. At least one more Fine Arts opportunity must be offered.

ACTION STRONGLY RECOMMENDED

1. The school lacks a large multi-purpose area which is an integral part of the educational services provided by a school of this size. Such an addition would make the following three services available:

- a. An auditorium for large group learning situations such as dramatic work or assembly programs.
- b. A cafeteria which would free Room 8 for use as a classroom.
- c. A gymnasium area where a program of health and physical education instruction could be initiated for all students on a regularly scheduled basis.

2. Although a start has been made on developing a school library, this facility is far from adequate as a materials center and as a tool of instruction. If it is to become the educational center of the school, an annual appropriation in the budget should be made of at least \$300.00 for materials with additional expenditures made periodically for procurement of encyclopedias.

3. The lack of space is already of serious concern and will place limitations on instruction as additional students have to be accommodated. Consideration should be given to finding a solution to space problems in the following areas:

- a. The Homemaking room is so limited in space that the equipment needed for proper instruction in a comprehensive program of Homemaking will have to be planned carefully. Both space and equipment are inadequate at present to handle the enrollments in the courses.
- b. The space for Agriculture is inadequate to take care of the demands being made on the active program now maintained.
- c. The Science laboratory cannot service the present science enrollments unless classes are split for laboratory work.
- d. The Business Education room is so limited in space that necessary equipment to teach the several phases of Office Practice work will tax its capacity.

4. The program should be studied to determine whether or not any alterations could effectively be made that would help the school better to meet the needs of its students. Consideration should be given the following recommendations:

- a. The present arrangements for chorus and art activities appear inadequate to provide any sequence of instruction. It is urged that both offerings be taught at least two periods per week for credit. An opportunity for instrumental instruction is needed. Consideration of instruction in an appreciation course for art and/or music should be given.
- b. The present three-year sequence in French begins at Grade 9 and leaves the student with a gap of one year before using his language instruction for college entrance and/or placement. Consideration should be given either to placing the first year of French at Grade 10 level, or of providing for a refresher opportunity for seniors.
- c. The English language arts should provide for at least one elective either as an enrichment opportunity in such fields as Creative Writing or Public Speaking or in such remedial work as the Improvement of Reading. Every administrative arrangement for providing classes that are homogeneously grouped that number 25 or less should be explored.
- d. The social studies program currently offers seven separate courses over two years. A better balance might be obtained if the current offering of Economic Geography were alternated with a course in Consumer Education. This could combine the present courses of Economics and Consumer Education.
- e. The Business Education program should be reviewed in light of the school's objectives for this area of Practical Arts Instruction. The following practices should be given consideration:
 - 1) Only one year of Typing for Grade 11 is currently offered; if Typing I were offered for Grade 10 and Typing II for Grade 11, a much higher level of competence could be expected of Office Practice candidates in Grade 12.

- 2) An exploratory course in Business should be considered for Grade 9 students of all curricula with the possible exception of college preparatory students. The content of such a General Business course should and could be planned so that it is not simply General Mathematics nor Business Arithmetic.
- 3) Bookkeeping is now available for only Grade 10; a higher grade placement should be considered.
- 4) An opportunity for the non-business student to develop some competence in Typing should be provided by a course in Personal Typing. Sufficient skill may be acquired in one semester.
- 5) An Office Practice course of a clerical nature for students who have not had Shorthand should be offered, possibly taught concurrently with Secretarial Office Practice class. Adequate equipment to make such Clerical Office Practice feasible would have to be provided.

5. Guidance services are now being carried largely by the principal. If he were to be relieved of this responsibility, a qualified teacher should be assigned at least two periods daily, specifically designated for guidance work.

6. Principal Fulton's present administrative and supervisory responsibilities are exceedingly demanding for the principalship of a school of this size. In view of his teaching assignments, guidance work, and bookkeeping duties, it is urged that his responsibility be reduced and he be furnished with adult, secretarial help.

We feel that the "Action Necessary" as set forth under that heading will be relatively simple to take care of. By having the art and music teacher offer a one-period course in, for instance, the appreciation of art or in instrumental music, we will have met this requirement.

I would like to give special emphasis at this point to paragraphs 5 and 6, the last two paragraphs in the report. Certainly, Mr. Fulton should be relieved of most, if not all, of

his teaching duties. It is impossible for him to adequately administer and supervise the Orford Schools with the present program. He will have to continue to carry on some of the guidance work. I would certainly hope that one of the other teachers could also help with it. It is apparent that in order to do this and also in order to even partially meet some of the other strongly recommended actions, we must have an added teacher at the high school level. Provision is made in the budget for such a teacher.

We are now making a complete re-study of the entire program that is offered in order to make as many changes as possible to meet the state recommendations. Even within the present high school physical facilities and with one added teacher and perhaps clerical help, we feel that quite a bit can be done.

It is impossible, however, to do all that should be done until we have added facilities. A great need is for a large all-purpose room that can be used as a gymnasium, auditorium, and cafeteria. Certainly too, there should be better shop and home economics facilities. If there is any new construction, the State Department will require that we have a regular library. Alterations to the present library-study hall would take care of this. These are the minimum needs. Obviously, further thought must be given to the needs of the elementary grades. The addition of a room at Orfordville has been a big help. The room freed at the high school, however, is now used as a cafeteria and is much better than the old one. The School Study Committee and the School Board are, of course, taking all of these matters into consideration. I sincerely hope that at the April, 1958, school district meeting, a substantial step may be taken in meeting the Orford school building needs.

It now seems that the possibility of a cooperative school district with neighboring communities is at best a very remote possibility. It is quite likely that Orford will have to continue to provide its own high school, but with the hope that it can continue to attract a large number of tuition pupils. Another alternative would be to send its high school pupils elsewhere and pay tuition for them. I doubt if many would be too happy about the latter, yet it is a possibility that should be explored.

I have emphasized several times the need to improve our school offering and facilities if we are to continue to attract

tuition pupils. To offer the present program to only the Orford pupils would be a great financial burden, even if we could find teachers who would be willing to teach the many subjects that would have to be assigned to each.

As of the time of writing this report, we estimate that the total cost for current expenditures (that is, expenditures exclusive of capital outlay) for grades 9-12 in Orford for 1957-58 will be \$36,736.00. It is now estimated that Orford will receive a total of \$18,990.70 in high school tuition. In other words, it can be said that tuition pupils pay for 52% of the current costs for Grades 9-12. The above figures are, of course, estimates made about six months before the end of the current school year. They, however, will not be very far off. A very careful study of the present high school daily program clearly indicates that if we did not have the tuition pupils and were to have the same offering for the Orford students, we could drop very few of the classes and, therefore, very few, if any, of the teachers. Each class, however, if made up only of Orford pupils would be so small that it would be economically unsound.

Teachers' Salaries

Orford is still not in a favorable position in regard to teachers' salaries. We had great difficulty in filling our vacancies this year. In fact, the last contract before the opening of the school year was signed on July 27. That person lasted only about one month. By chance, we found an excellent successor who signed a contract on October 15.

Of the 2,114 elementary women in the state, only 279 receive less than \$3,200.00. In other words, the Orford elementary women teachers are in the lowest 13% in the state.

Of the 718 secondary women in the state, only 95 receive less than \$3,400.00. In other words, the Orford secondary women teachers are in the lowest 13% in the state.

Of the 747 secondary men in the state, only 236 receive less than \$3,800.00. In other words, the Orford secondary men teachers are in the lowest 32% in the state. (Orford figure includes Vocational Agriculture teacher.)

Of the 747 secondary men in the state, only 92 receive less than \$3,500.00. In other words, the Orford secondary men teachers are in the lowest 12% in the state. (Orford figure does not include Vocational Agriculture teacher.)

Conclusion

In concluding, I want to express my thanks to the School Board, the school staff and to the citizens of the community for their support and cooperation.
