THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A. M. TO 6:00 P. M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pittsburg on Tuesday, the fourth day of March, next at 10:00 of the the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for the election of one Selectman, for three years; one Road Agent for the Lake District, one Road Agent for the Middle District, one one Road Agent for the Lower District, a Town Clerk, a Treasurer, three Auditors, one Overseer of the Welfare, a Library Trustee, for three years; one Trustee of the Trust Funds, and one Representative to the Board of Directors of the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital Association, for three years.

Also, to bring in your ballots to see if the Town will vote to have one Road Agent for the Three Districts.

- 2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under Article 1.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise five hundred dollars (\$500) for same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to elect a committee to set a date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of seven hundred forty-six dollars aand sixty-five cents (\$746.65) for the White Mountain Regional Association.
- 8. BY PETITION: To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operating expenses of CONVALESCE.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to apply towards the 1974 GMC Fire truck note.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the funds necessary for the balance of the 1974 GMC Fire Truck note.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new Ambulance, and appropriate monies for the Fund.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept on behalf of the Town, grants of Federal or State aid, or both, as may become available.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the North Country Council, Inc.
- 14. To see if the Town will appropriate six hundred twenty-nine dollars (\$629) as the Town's share of the operation of the North Country Council for one year.
- **15.** To see what action the Town will take to increase the wages and salaries paid by the Town.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell and deed that certain parcel of land containing 6.2 acres, situate on the northern end of Hall Stream, and formerly a part of the France Crete property, on such terms as the Meeting may determine, reserving nonetheless a 50-foot right of way as presently travelled over said parcel.
- **17.** To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Covered Bridges.
- 18. To see what action the Town will take regarding the amount charged for Water Utilities.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
- To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

During 1974 the Fire Department was called out six times; wo chimney fires, one grass fire, one out-of-town false alarm, and three property fires. The combined value of the property fires was \$75,000, and all of them were of suspicious origin.

The Department held its regular meetings as well as training sessions and schools. Two inspections of the school and town hall were held with the fire marshal's office, and all fire safety standards are up to date. Monthly meetings included films on ventilation, forcible entry, propane gas fires, petroleum fires, and forest fires. Training sessions involved actual operating and checking of equipment, and working on setting up at a fire situation. Schools were held in Colebrook and Gilford, and twelve men attended for a total of fifteen man days of classes. In addition to these sessions, the men put in over 300 hours working on equipment maintenance at the station, and checking equipment at least once a week. I might add, they do not get paid for their time; they only get paid for meetings, schools, and some fires.

This year we obtained a new GMC pumper through Revenue Sharing Funds that carries 1.000 gallons. We were very fortunate to make connections on a new truck, a 1974 GMC, 6500 Series, and to have the work done at Pierre Thibault Ltd. in the space of three months. Many departments have a truck-equipment waiting period of from 12 to 18 months.

In the coming year we are planning to install more dry fire hydrants to improve fire protection. We are also drawing up a fire plan for each and every residence in the town based on the season of the year.

We would like to take this opportunity to invite all ablebodied men to join the Department, whether they have the time or not. We don't always feel we have the time either, but someone has to do it. Half the job of fire fighting is done at the station before a fire starts in being mentally and physically prepared for it.

I would like to thank each man in the Department for a job well done in the past year, and to call on them to work just as hard in the coming year to provide the town with the best fire protection possible. Anyone is welcome to look the station and equipment over almost any Sunday morning between 10 a. m. and noon.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PITTSBURG AMBULANCE CORPS

The Pittsburg Ambulance Corps during the past year of 1974 has been busy. Our present strength of 16 attendants have been receiving in-service training at their monthly meetings. A cardiopulmonary rescuscitation (CPR) course was completed this summer by the corps members. It is very important that refresher training is an on-going program to provide the best ambulance emergency care possible.

During the past year our ambulance made 31 emergency runs and 31 transfers. There was only one traffic related accident. The average time of dispatch of the Pittsburg ambulance is three to four minutes, which, considering the attendants are volunteers, is a very good record. Of all the runs and transfers, our corps had only one patient expire while enroute to the hospital. An interesting factor is that of the runs from Pittsburg, approximately 75% are heart attacks or heart related problems.

The Ambulance Service was given, from the Brenda Pierce Memorial Fund, a fixed suction unit mounted in the ambulance, an oxygen demand valve (used in cardiac arrest) and a oneman stretcher. The Pittsburg ambulance is equipped to handle any emergency situation to which it is called.

Our corps, with monies raised through fund drives, purchased a hospital bed and an oxygen control flow valve for the large oxygen cylinders. Also, two pairs of crutches and a support walker were donated. Also, for your information, oxygen units are located in strategic areas in Pittsburg (for emergency use). One unit is at the Powder Horn Lodge, Back Lake; one at the fire station; and two units at Martin Hewson's (1st Connnecticut Lake)--one at my residence and one in my car.

This equipment is available to the residents of Pittsburg on a loan basis if one is in need of such items. The oxygen units can be used, if needed, while awaiting arrival of the ambulance.

Our corps has 80 auxiliary ambulance members and would like to welcome you all to join. In February our ambulance attendants enrolled in an eight-hour defensive driving course instructed by N. H. Highway Safety instructors. On January 30th I began an 81-hour emergency medical technician ambulance course at the U. C. V. Hospital and Pittsburg had six persons enrolled. Upon passing this course, this will give the ambulance corps 22 attendants in Pittsburg. I hope you will not need our service, but should you, we will be ready to serve you. I wish at this time to thank all the residents of Pittsburg for their loyal support of the Pitsburg Ambulance Corps.

REPORT TO THE TOWN OF PITTSBURG FROM THE NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL

The North Country Council (NCC) is the official planning organization (RSA 36:45-53) for the North Country. The Council undertakes area-wide planning programs, when appropriate, and provides community planning services and information to Towns. The Council's Board of Directors, two representatives from each of the 19 Member Towns, determines the work program and budget.

During 1974, the Council completed an Economic Base Study, assisted 30 Towns in solid waste by organizing site inspections and planning by providing information on volume, cost and transportation of solid waste. The Council also prepared a model Town Kit Fact Book, and a model flood district ordinance. The Council is preparing a Public Transportation Plan for the North Country and has submitted an application to the Federal Highway Administration for a rural transportation demonstration project. NCC has updated the State's Outdoor Recreation Plan for the North Country. This enables communities to maintain eligibility for federal funds. The Council has sponsored meetings and conferences of flood insurance, solid waste, land use, and septic tank disposal. NCC reviews and comments on projects for federal funding under the regional clearinghouse program.

The greatest benefit a Town can gain from membership in NCC is an on-going program of community planning services and assistance. NCC is assisting its member Towns in applying for Community Development Grant funds.

What's in store for the future? NCC will continue its work with member Towns by providing an on-going program of planning services and information in order to help the Town cope with potential growth. NCC is developing legal information on land use which is available to Member Towns. The Council is also a point of information and assistance for potential sources of federal funding. In conclusion, the North Country Council hopes to continue working on a regular basis in areas of local and area-wide concern.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

As directed by the voters of the Pittsburg School District at its last annual meeting, members of the building committee, school board and school staff have investigated the space needs for the Pittsburg School. A report of the findings resulting from the meetings conducted by the committee this past year will be presented at the annual meeting.

Joining the staff of the Pittsburg School are the following teachers: Miss Deborah Eldredge - Grade 1; Miss Laurie Potter -Grades 2 and 3; Miss Dawn Beasley - Grade 4; Miss Ann Getchell -Home Economics; Miss Brenda Barton - Science; and Mrs. Constance Pierce - School Nurse.

Presently, the school board, staff and administration are engaged in developing a local educational accountability program. The program will become effective during the 1975-76 school year. Under this program, voters will be informed annually of the degree to which the district has achieved its stated educational goals and objectives for the preceding year. Also involved will be a state testing program which will help assess educational programs in local school districts.

Deserving special interest of the voters this year is an article in the warrant concerned with the forming of an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area (A. R. E. A.) Planning Committee. The purpose of the committee is to investigate, with a similar committee formed in the Clarksville School District, the feasibility of a tuition contract. Realizing that there are advantages and disadvantages to any tuition agreement, it is hoped that favorable action will be taken on this article to allow the forming of a committee which will investigate the feasibility and hold public hearings relating to information found. Should the joint committees find that such a tuition contract would be feasible and beneficial to both towns concerned, voters in each of the towns would have to vote by ballot at an annual or special school district meeting as to their acceptance or rejection of the tuition plan presented.

The following committee members are deserving of recognition for the giving of their time and efforts the past and present school year in working with the school board and staff toward improving educational programs and solving school district problems.

GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

Last fall, I administered Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests to eighth graders in the public schools of Supervisory Union No. 7. Early in January I administered the Differential Aptitude Test Battery to the same students. In May, I talked with each eighth grader concerning the results of his tests and the importance of the results to him. On the basis of these tests and the course offerings available at Colebrook Academy and Pittsburg High School, a course of study was developed for each student for Freshman year. A letter indicating the courses chosen was sent to parents for their review and signature. Where there were questions raised, I met with the parents concerning them. Also in May, arrangements were made for Stewartstown eighth graders to visit Colebrook Academy and Pittsburg High School - attending classes and touring the facilities. During the year, I met with Stewartstown eighth graders as regularly as possible and worked with them on matters of attitudes, values and career development.

In November, the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery was given to all Freshmen. The results of these tests were discussed with each Freshman in January and then used again in April when I was talking with them concerning their courses for the 1974-75 school year and their plans for the future.

During December, I discussed with each Sophomore his progress and plans. I met with each one again in April to construct a course of study for the 1974-75 school year.

In January. I talked with each Junior about his progress and plans. In the case of Juniors who had taken the Preliminary Scholastic Actitude Tests, results were explained to them. Where applicable, individual Juniors were encouraged and advised to take the College Board Examinations and the Achievement Tests. Each Junior met with me again in May to formulate a course of study for the 1974-75 school year.

In April, a state-wide Career Interest Inventory was administered to all upperclassmen.

During April and May, Stanford Achievement Tests were given for the purpose of measuring the progress of each student in the second, fourth and sixth grades within the District. I personally corrected the tests for Pittsburg and Stewartstown during the Spring Vacation at considerable savings to these districts. The results of these tests were reviewed with the teachers concerned and are available to interested parents.

During the summer a considerable amount of work was done on individual student records and on planning for the 1974-75 school year.

Since the opening of school this fall on September 4, I have been working with each Senior on concrete procedures to implement his plans whether job, Service or further schooling. I have tried a new idea this fall of talking with each Freshman early in the year about his adjustment to high school and his progress. I have also for the first time oriented them to the use of the Guidance Room. All of this hopefully will prevent future problems.

Thus far this year, Murphy-Durrell Reading Readiness Tests have been administered to all first graders and the results discussed with the appropriate teachers. I have administered Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests to eighth graders and the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests to those Juniors planning to attend a school of some type after high school. Ot's-Lennon Mental Ability Tests either are being, or have been, given to all second graders.

In addition to the above, much of my time is consumed with the following:

- 1. Transfer of records when a student moves to another school or a new student arrives to our schools.
- 2. Meeting with college admission representatives, Armed Service Recruiters, representatives of Talent Search, Vermont Student Assistance Corporation, Citizen's Scholarship Association, ROTC etc.
- 3. Providing information for teachers concerning their students.
- 4. Problems of individual students as they develop.
- 5. Helping students locate information concerning specific schools or occupations.

I have checked on virtually all of last year's Seniors and find that in Pittsburg, out of a class of 17, this is what they are doing:

Living at Home—2 Job—8½ (one is attending night school also) School—2½ (same person as above, working and attending night school) Married—2 Armed Services—2

This indicates that about 12% are attending school. However, 4 were admitted to college which is 23% of the class.

The Colebrook Class of 1974 is presently performing as follows:

Job-26

Living at Home-5

School-13

Married—2

Armed Services—2

This indicates that about 27% went on to further education.

I am pleased to say that in talking with Seniors this year, there has been a distinct upsurge in the number expressing an intent of going on to school.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

The school health program has been set up this year with two nurses to perform the necessary functions and requirements of the state and to maintain and promote good health to all the pupils in our schools under Supervisory Union No. 7.

Each year the following services are performed:

Checking heights, weights and teeth; testing hearing and

vision; physical examinations for those participating in athletics as well as grades 4, 8, and 11; TB skin tests as needed for students and annually for all working personnel in the union; immunizations as needed; urine tests for grades 4, 8, and 11; home visits; phone calls and letter contacts for follow through health care as deemed necessary; promotion of good mental health; first aid and emergency care; health teaching and counseling and continuous supervision of general health.

We have acquired school physicians this year - Dr. Gifford and Dr. Parsons who provide professional medical advice and care required to maintain health services for the pupils.

The Matching Dental Fund Program sponsored by the state and local towns was utilized again this year providing care to needy students as far as the funding would extend.

A Cardiac film was provided to pupils grades 7 through 12 and the public for awareness and concern of heart disease.

The pre-school hearing and vision clinic will be sponsored in May by the N. H. Division of Public Health for early detection of defects.

The Sight Conservation Program presented by the State of N. H. is still being utilized by those needing to do so.

The Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center is available to our area by mobile unit for evaluation of students failing hearing tests.

Crippled Children's Services has provided orthopedic exams and clinic treatments.

Again this year, the N. H. Bureau of Dental Health has presented the dental prevention program to fourth graders with daily brushing and flossing of teeth and weekly food coloring tablets used to detect plaque under supervision of their classroom teacher. The objectives of this program are to eliminate dental plaque and help the student develop daily habits necessary for effective oral hygiene and thereby reduce dental diseases.

North Country Education Services again provided speech therapy for all students in the union requiring help. The Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service is available as needed and we now have a psychologist in the area working directly in the schools.

A reminder to all parents of children entering first grade: The State Department of Education requires each youngster to meet the following requirements prior to school entry:

1. Physical examination.

2. T. B. test within one year.

3. Complete Diptheria, Pertussis and Tetanus Vaccine Series (5 in all).

4. Complete oral Polio Vaccine Series (5 in all).

5. Rubella Vaccine (german measles).

6. Rubeola Vaccine (measles).

All parents are urged to take advantage of the pre-school clinics available in their area to prepare their youngsters for meeting the above requirements for entering school.

Every year everyone involved in our schools strives to improve the health program for all. With everyone working together, I hope this will be achieved.

VER-SHIRE SCHOOLS AND SHOPS

Ver-Shire Schools and Shops is an educational and vocational training program for handicapped and disadvantaged persons within approximately a thirty-mile radius of Colebrook. Individuals from 6 to 63 have been referred to Ver-Shire's program by a wide variety of community and state agencies including the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, the Neighborhood Youth Corps, and Operation Mainstream, with the local schools providing the majority of referrals.

For school referrals in particular, Ver-Shire serves as a transitional step into the community. The goal of the program is to help each individual move on to work and live independently. To facilitate this process, Ver-Shire places strong emphasis on academic and social skills as well as on vocational training. Students receive an average of one hour of tutoring in math and reading every day. Social abilities are developed through weekly group-cooking, visiting local stores and industries, talking to customers who bring furniture to the shop to be repaired, and working part-time in local businesses. Vocationally, Ver-Shire students may receive training from a selection of nearly one hundred specialized skills. More intensive vocational training is offered in skills that graduates have found useful in securing employment in the area,• such as sewing, woodworking, general domestic and custodial training, and furniture repair and refinishing.

In 1974, a 3-year Title III Grant to help develop and improve Ver-Shire's program expired. A final report of Ver-Shire's progress was issued at the termination of the funding period. This study, which may be obtained from the Ver-Shire Project Director, documents Ver-Shire's success in achieving its fundamental goal of integrating its students into community life. Most significantly, of the original twelve Ver-Shire students, nine had graduated to regular jobs.

Without extensive community support for the Ver-Shire program, this accomplishment would have been impossible. At this time, I would like to thank everyone who has helped make Ver-Shire a successful and ongoing project.
