#### REPORT OF YOUR RECREATION DIRECTOR FOR YEAR 1968

The success of the past year was due greatly to the splendid cooperation that was received from the following: The Recreation Committee, the Town Manager, the Selectmen, the Superintendent of Schools, the Salem School Board, the Principals of all the Salem Schools and last, but not the least, the devotion shown by members of the Recreation Staff. Special thanks to Mr. Theron Lundberg and the Highway Department. The help received from the Police and Fire Departments is greatly appreciated.

During the past year we had the first summer swim program at the newly developed Millville Lake. Some 2,740 children attended swim lessons and over 5,469 people used the Town Beach for public swimming.

#### EDUCATION AND TRAINING

January 16, 1969

Several members of our Department have successfully completed a police school conducted by the Rockingham County Sheriff's Department over the past six months. The program was entirely voluntary and all are to be congratulated for improving their knowledge of police procedures, with a corresponding increase in the efficiency of our Department.

One of our Sergeants was assigned to the firearms instructors school at Wakefield, conducted by the F.B.I., and he will be placed in charge of our departmental program. Another is completing a course in criminal investigation and related sciences at St. Anselm's.

#### TRAFFIC CONTROL AND HIGHWAY SAFETY

During the past year a Highway Safety Committee was organized and is presently functioning. The purpose of this committee is to improve pedestrian safety, traffic accident prevention programs, accident investigation, and enforcement practices and procedures.

In order to participate in the National Highway Safety program and the New Hampshire Highway Safety Plan, the community must conform to the standards set forth by the "National Highway Safety Act of 1966" and the New Hampshire Highway Safety Program of 1967.

The community has made considerable progress in the Records Division at Police Headquarters, accident investigation, traffic control signal installations signs, highway marking, emergency ambulance and service needs, improved street lighting, sidewalks — all of which are directly related to traffic safety.

The program shall be periodically evaluated by the State and the National Highway Safety Bureau shall be provided with an evaluation summary.

Therefore it is important that we continue with our safety program in order to benefit from Federal funds allocated by the National Highway Safety program.

#### SALEM FIRE DEPARTMENT

Dear Mr. Staples:

During the year 1968, the Salem Fire Department answered 553 fire alarms, 146 more than the previous year. During the same period, the ambulance responded to 664 calls, 102 more than 1967. The fire loss for the year 1968 amounted to \$263,906.00 compared with a loss of \$110,405.00 for the year 1967. Six lives were lost in two fires in 1968; one in an automobile fire, and five members of a family in a house fire.

The Civil Defense Rescue Truck was delivered in June, 1968. Upon being accepted by CD Director Melvin Marsh, the unit was placed in service at the Main Street station. The rescue equipment and lighting unit have greatly aided the Department.

The new 1000-gallon pumper should be delivered in the early Spring. Before acceptance the apparatus will have to pass all the pumping tests required by the New Hampshire Board of Fire Underwriters.

I must recommend again this year that serious consideration be given to the construction of a substation south of the Spicket River near Route 28. The continued growth of Salem makes it mandatory that formal plans be instituted.

The other major deficiency in the Fire Department is the need for an aerial ladder truck. This was mentioned in the 1966 and 1967 Town Reports, and I recommend it once again this year.

The Department extends its thanks to the people of Salem for their continued interest, cooperation, and support.

#### REPORT OF KELLEY LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The Kelley Library has made gratifying growth during 1968, both in number of patrons and in public service activities. The present excellent condition of the library attests to the efficiency of the combination of an experienced professional librarian and a loyal, cooperative staff.

The quality of the literary materials has been enhanced by the careful weeding out of old material and the acquisition of new. To this end the nearly \$7,000 balance of Lancaster Fund, money allocated to the library when the building was erected, and the town appropriation of \$5,000 were spent. However, many empty shelves are yet to be filled.

The window frames and lower faces of the roof overhang showed evidence of weathering and were given a two-coat protective painting. The parking lot has been marked off and bumpers placed to prevent cars from encroaching upon the grass area.

The Lancaster Room is being used increasingly by the public. School Art Department exhibits in this room have been popular as well as decorative and instructive. Similar exhibits of school art and natural science activities also have enhanced the display areas adjacent to the main entrance of the library.

The lower floor area has been used again this year by the Boys' Club pending completion of their new quarters. The trustees are glad to have been able to assist in this worthy enterprise.

Space has also been provided for use of the Unemployment Insurance Office in giving service to Salem residents.

In response to a request from the Salem Historical Society, space on the lower floor has been allocated for their use. A display wall board and bench have been installed by the Society on which historical items will be displayed for public view. The exhibit and the occasional meetings of the Society in the adjacent Lancaster Room should arouse even more public interest in Historical Salem.

The Kelley Library of Salem has now been designated by the New Hampshire State Library as a Service Center Library. The material significance of this action will not be evident until 1970 at which time it is hoped that a new financial program will have been effected by the State which will assist Service Center Libraries in acquiring more books and rendering greater service. Salem and adjacent communities should benefit by this cooperative arrangement.

The trustees wish to express thanks and appreciation for gifts of books, magazines and records received from both organizations and individuals during the year.

#### SALEM CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1968

Members of the Commission have been working on an inventory of "Open Space" in Salem and preparing a map illustrating the variety of natural resources of the town, such as forest, meadow, farm, natural beauty areas, historic spots, marshlands. In conjunction with this, a Survey, modeled after a form suggested by the University of New Hampshire, Durham, has been circulated and is still available to any interested citizens of Salem. On this Survey form a citizen may write his concerns and suggestions for a better environment in Salem; these include park and recreation spots, watersheds, pollution problems, wilderness. These Surveys continue to be available at the book counter of the Municipal Library.

The Chairman attended a Conservation conference on Community Planning at Pembroke in October, as well as the second annual session of "Focus Outdoors" at Amherst, Massachusetts, in August. She and Mr. and Mrs. Gerard Bauters participated December 7 in a meeting at Concord of all the Conservation Commissions in New Hampshire where problems of amazing variety were shared and aired.

Conservation Commission members and children worked with the Salem Garden Club and boys from three Boy Scout Troops to clear and clean up "ABENAKE PARK", the Garden Club Park Project, at the corner of Geremonty Drive and Veterans Memorial Highway.

We entered a Statewide contest "to improve the beauty of New Hampshire". This was sponsored by the Governor's Committee on Natural Beauty and was a community project at MILLVILLE LAKE involving cooperation among the many service groups of Salem, such as Garden Club, 4-H girls, Boy Scouts, Conservation Commission, -- and the Municipal Recreation Department, which carried the Responsibility.

Conservation Commission members worked hard to support and to publicize the need for passage of Amendment or Question No. 7 on the November 5 Referendum Ballot, which encourages the protection of undeveloped land through taxation on the basis of current, not potential, use. Pamphlets and posters were distributed throughout the town to stores and public buildings, and news articles written to spread the word.

An important part of the overall program of a Conservation Commission is that of Education. Towards the goal of educating an "environmentally literate citizen", a six-month series of articles was printed weekly in the "Salem Observer" called "CONSERVATION CONVERSATION".

The Commission met with the Planning Board on September 11 to share views and goals and to lay the groundwork for future communication and cooperation in order to plan wisely for the best interests of Salem, now and for years to come. We hope to cooperate more fully in the future.

A program of "self-education" was begun, with showings of excellent nature and conservation films, such as "MARSHLAND IS NOT WASTELAND", "WORLD IN A MARSH", etc. The public is always invited to these film showings.

Projects begun and to be continued in 1969 were many, but the most pressing is the need for Salem to plan for flood plain zoning and to keep a watchful eye on the health and unimpeded flow of the Spicket River, the preservation of her flood plain, marsh valley and wildlife.

A clear grant of \$250.00 was given in 1968 to the Salem Conservation Commission by the Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trust, to enable the work to proceed more smoothly and surely towards the much-needed goal of community awareness of the need NOW for a "Conservation Ethic" in all dealings of private citizens, educators, builders, contractors and planners for the future.

Our MOTTO: EDUCATION-to combat the forces of destruction of our natural environment; to teach children to be less concerned about superficial things. Our JOB: WORK-to preserve find historic and open space land for future Salem-ites, for New Hampshire, for the world; to save living museums of the past, which are also storehouses for the present and resources for the many generations to come.

### HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

The Salem Historic District Commission was established in 1965. The following members were appointed by the Selectmen: Mrs. Evelyn Ebert, Chairman; Mrs. Evelyn Seed; John S. Turner representing the Planning Board, Leonard B. Peever representing the Selectmen; and the late Mrs. Ruth Hanson, Secretary, who was succeeded by Howard E. Turner. Other Selectmen who have served on the commission are George Gelt, L. Edward Ross, and Arnold Leriche, who is the present member. Terms of office are staggered so that one term expires each year and, according to statute, no member may serve consecutively for more than two three-year terms.

The purpose of an Historic District Commission is to preserve structures and places of historical and architectural value. The protection of these values has been declared a public purpose by the New Hampshire Legislature.

The heritage of the municipality is safeguarded by:

(a) preserving a district in the municipality which reflects elements of its cultural, social, economic, political and architectural history;

(b) conservation of property values in the district;

(c) fostering civic beauty;

(d) strengthening the local economy;

(e) promoting the use of an Historic District for the education, pleasure and welfare of the citizens of the municipality.

The commission sponsored an article, which was adopted at the 1967 Town Meeting, to designate the area in town having the greatest historic value to be known as the Salem Historic District. This area includes a number of outstanding sites such as the Town Common, the old cemetery, Town Hall, the former library building (originally one of Salem's first schoolhouses), the meandering Spicket River, the Woodbury residence (formerly the residence of Salem's first Senator, Silas Bretton), Florence Kelly's residence (the first Methodist Meeting House, which was moved to its present location from Bluff Street in 1836) and many other sites of historic value.

The commission has held a few meetings to pass on requests for alterations to existing structures and also requests for commercial operations. Some were approved, but the commission is unanimously opposed to the commercialization of the area.

The commission is keenly interested in the preservation of the Town Hall and have suggested to the Selectmen that all the signs, with the exception of the Town Hall sign, be removed from the side of the building; and that the Selectmen erect a sign in front of the building suitable for this type of architecture. We also suggest that monies be included in the budget to cut the brush and grade the grounds in the rear of the old library and the Town Hall as we feel this area is a poor example for the beautification of Salem.

Also, outside of the Historic District, at a few of the intersections of the older roads in town, the old stone guide posts are still standing. We suggest that these guide posts be preserved and that board directional signs, similar to the ones that were formerly used, be posted.

I would like to report that the State Historical Commission is introducing a bill to the General Court, through Representative Arthur Marden, which will enable towns or cities to acquire, preserve and maintain historic sites and buildings within their limits.

We, the Salem Historic District Commission, are keenly interested in the preservation of the historical area of the town and hope that money will be budgeted to maintain the area for future generations.

Knowing that the Town of Salem needs taxable industry to relieve the increasing tax burden on homeowners, your officials have been actively engaged in promoting Salem to industries. Due to their efforts in the past year, two new industries have located here: one built a 32,000 square foot plant employing one hundred people; and the other renovatedan existing building which at the present time employs fifteen people and is expanding rapidly.

An Industrial Agent was retained to organize information about Salem and to start contacting prospective clients with this material.

Attracting industry is easy — getting them to make the decision to move here is extremely difficult, for the reason that every other community is contacting the same manufacturer.

Unlike neighboring towns, there are no existing buildings to rent in Salem; therefore, we can approach only those industries with enough capital to have their own plant built.

The Town of Salem owns no industrially zoned land which they can sell; so to bring industry into the Town we must work closely with the people who do own this property. We must provide them with the help and with the information necessary for an industry to make the decision to build in Salem.

A master book of complete information about Salem has been compiled and is available at the Municipal Center. From the master book a quantity of resumes were made and are being used to acquaint manufacturers and large real estate developers with Salem's resources. Material for an advertising program has been approved and will begin shortly.

### IS SALEM DESIRABLE TO INDUSTRY?

YES. Our industrially zoned sites, as well as our resources, are attractive to industry. However, because the sites lack facilities into or through them, industry tends to locate on sites in other communities where water, sewage, and electricity are existing.

### WILL INDUSTRY COME TO SALEM?

YES. New industry HAS located in Salem and it will continue to do so. Competition from surrounding areas is keen — To get our share of industry, we must continue to provide promotional effort and personal contact to attract industry's attention — and then work closely with both industry and property owners to give industry the information and services necessary for them to decide to build in Salem.



### TOWN MEETING WARRANT

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Salem, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to be at the Lancaster School in said Town on March 11, 1969, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and at the Soule School and Barron School in said Town as soon thereafter as the ballots can be delivered to said schools to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. By petition: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Salem Zoning Ordinance of 1961 by amending Article III, Paragraph B (Residential District - Restrictions Governing Uses) by striking out: "1. The minimum lot area shall be 15,000 square feet", and insert in its place: "1. The minimum lot area shall be 25,000 square feet", and by striking out: "2. The minimum frontage of each lot shall be 100 feet", and insert in its place: "2. The minimum frontage of each lot: shall be 150 feet."

Article 3. By petition: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Salem Zoning Ordinance so:

That Article III A. 1. be amended to read as follows:

One-family and two-family dwellings.

That Article III A. 4. be amended to read as follows:

Churches, parish houses, convents, public and parochial schools, municipal buildings and libraries, including structures and uses normally incident thereto.

That Article III B. 1. be amended to read as follows:

The minimum lot area shall be 25,000 square feet for a single family dwelling, and 10,000 square feet additional for an additional family unit.

That Article III B. 2. be amended to read as follows:

The minimum frontage of each lot shall be one hundred and fifty (150) feet for a single family dwelling and forty (40) feet additional for an additional family unit, except that on a curved street that the minimum frontage may be eighty-five (85) feet.

That Article IV B. 1. be amended to read as follows:

The minimum lot area shall be 30,000 square feet and 10,000 square feet additional for an additional family unit.

That Article V A. 1. be amended to read as follows:

Business and professional offices, banks, studios, apartment buildings, municipal buildings, passenger and taxi stations, parking lots.

That Article VI A. 2. be amended to read as follows:

Private garages, municipal buildings, gardens and orchards, incidental to residential use.

Article 4. By petition: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Salem Zoning Ordinance, Article III, Section B, Paragraph 1, to read as follows:

The minimum lot area shall be 20,000 square feet for a single family dwelling, and 10,000 square feet additional for each additional family unit except when the land requires to be filled or when the soil type, water level and natural drainage are considered to be inferior for leaching purposes by the Building Inspector, Health Officer and Town Engineer; then these aforementioned Town Officials, as a body, shall decide on the required increase in area of individual lot.

Article 5. At the request of the Salem Planning Board, to see if the Town will vote to amend the Salem Zoning Ordinance as follows:

1. Amend ARTICLE II DISTRICTS - Insert after item A. Residential the following new item to read as follows:

### A.1 Apartment Residential

2. Amend ARTICLE III - RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT to read as follows:

### ARTICLE III-A RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

In addition, amend all references throughout this ordinance which refer to ARTICLE III to read as ARTICLE III-A.

- 3. Amend ARTICLE III A, 1. which reads:
  - 1. One-family, two-family and multi-family dwellings.

to read as follows:

- 1. One-family and two-family dwellings.
- 4. Insert new ARTICLE III-B APARTMENT RESIDENTIAL (AR) DISTRICT, which reads as follows, immediately before ARTICLE IV RURAL DISTRICTS.

ARTICLE III-B APARTMENT RESIDENTIAL (AR) DISTRICT

The following regulations shall apply to every lot and building site in an AR District, and shall be subject to all the general provisions of this ordinance:

### A. PERMITTED USES - AR DISTRICTS

1. One multiple dwelling.

- 2. Dwelling group, subject to approval of site development by the Planning Board. Approval of the site plan shall be in the same manner as is prescribed by State Law for the review of subdivision plats and plans.
- 3. One two-family dwelling.
- 4. One one-family dwelling.
- 5. Accessory buildings and uses, as regulated herein.
- 6. Temporary building or use during construction phases only.
- 7. Sale or lease sign, as regulated in Article III-A, b, 6b.
- 8. Parking lot when established to fulfill parking requirements for a permitted use or uses in the district.
- 9. School, church and other institutional building for cultural or recreational activities; swimming pool, park and playground.

### B. RESTRICTIONS GOVERNING USES

### 1. BUILDING SITE REQUIREMENTS - AR DISTRICTS

The minimum frontage of a building lot or site shall be one hundred (100) feet on interior lots, and one hundred and ten (110) feet on corner lots.

The minimum area of a building lot or site shall be twenty thousand (20,000) square feet, except as specified in item 7a below.

### 2. HEIGHT LIMITATIONS - AR DISTRICTS

- (a) Dwellings shall not exceed two and one-half stories or 35 feet.
- (b) Accessory buildings shall not exceed 15 feet.
- (c) Other main buildings shall not exceed two and one-half stories or 35 feet.

### 3. COVERAGE LIMITATIONS - AR DISTRICTS

The maximum percentage of each lot which may be occupied by buildings shall be thirty (30) per cent. Upon any site occupied by a multiple dwelling or a dwelling group, there shall be not less than one thousand (1,000) square feet of usable open space for each dwelling unit, calculated as follows:

Usable open space is the area on a building site designed and used for outdoor living, recreation, utility, pedestrian access and landscaping. In calculating the open space available to meet the requirements of this paragraph, the following shall be deducted from the total area of the building site:

- (a) All the area of lot coverage, including all of the roofed area of any carport with open sides.
- (b) Two hundred fifty (250) square feet for each required parking space not enclosed or not roofed over; and
- (c) Any portion of the site having a ground slope in excess of twenty (20) per cent.

To the remainder shall be added the area of any roof top or balcony space which is at least four (4) feet in least dimension and is designed to be directly accessible to and usable by the occupants of the building.

### 4. YARD REQUIREMENTS - AR DISTRICTS

- (a) Each structure shall have a front yard and back yard of at least thirty (30) feet each.
- (b) Each structure shall have side yards of not less than fifteen (15) feet.

### 5. DENSITY LIMITATIONS - AR DISTRICTS

The number of dwelling units in a multiple dwelling or dwelling group shall not exceed the number obtained by dividing the square foot area of the building lot or site by three thousand (3,000), adjusting any fractional result, where the fraction is equal to or greater than one-half (½), to the next higher number.

### 6. DWELLING GROUPS - AR DISTRICTS

The following shall be minimum requirements for approval of site development for a dwelling group:

- (a) No dwelling facing a side lot line shall be less than twenty (20) feet from such line.
- (b) No dwelling having its rear to a side lot line shall be less than thirty (30) feet from such line.
- (c) The distance between dwellings which face one another shall be not less than fifty (50) feet, and otherwise the distance between buildings shall be not less than forty (40) feet.

### 7. REAR DWELLINGS - AR DISTRICTS

Where there is an existing one or two-family dwelling on a lot, the following special regulations shall govern with reference to any additional dwelling or dwellings.

- (a) No rear dwelling is permitted on any such lot or building site having a width of less than eighty-five (85) feet or an area of less than eighteen thousand (18,000) square feet.
- (b) For additional dwelling units to be placed in the rear of an existing dwelling, the calculations specified in paragraphs B. 4, B. 5, and B. 6 above shall be based upon the area remaining after deducting from the total area of the lot or building site the sum of the area covered by such existing dwelling unit and the areas of all required front, side and rear yards about it.
- (c) No such rear dwelling shall be attached to the existing dwelling, or be nearer to it than forty (40) feet or less than thirty (30) feet from the rear lot line.
- (d) The existing and rear dwellings shall constitute a dwelling group.

### 8. VARIANCES - AR DISTRICTS

In granting variances in the AR Districts, the Board of Adjustment shall consider the following to be contrary to the spirit of the Ordinance in said districts:

- (a) The use of land for the keeping of livestock and poultry (but not domestic pets).
- (b) The use of land for mobile homes, mobile home developments, trailers or trailer parks.

### 5. Amend ARTICLE IX - OFF STREET PARKING AND LOADING

Change item 'A. Dwellings' to 'A. Dwellings (1)' and by adding thereto the following new paragraph:

(2) For each dwelling unit constructed hereafter within an AR DISTRICT, there shall be provided on the same lot or building site, within fifty (50) feet of said dwelling unit, but not closer than twenty (20) feet to the structure, not less than one and one-half (1½) parking spaces. Said parking spaces shall be paved and marked according to proper traffic engineering standards and shall have minimum dimensions of not less than nine (9) feet by twenty (20) feet, exclusive of aisles.

Said AR DISTRICT shall be mapped on the following parcels:

Said parcels are referenced from the Property Map of the Town of Salem, dated 1968, and originally prepared by James W. Sewall Co.

- Map 1 Parcels 12, 13, 14, 15 and the rear portions of 17, 18, and 19 situated on the westerly side of a line drawn parallel to Sand Hill Road for a distance of one hundred and seventy (170) feet.
- Map 3 Parcels 47, 51, 51A, 52, 53, 54, 55, 59, 60 and those portions of parcels 56, 57 and 58 which are presently zoned RURAL DISTRICT A.

Map 99 Parcel 33.

Map 100 Parcels 8, 8A, 8B and that portion of Lot 10A situated north of Hagop Road.

Map 105 Parcel 2.

Map 106 Parcels 1, 2, 3, 3A, 3B, 3C and 3D.

Article 6. To see if the voters of Salem will vote by ballot to authorize the Moderator to appoint a seven (7) member committee to draft a city charter best adapted to the needs of the Town of Salem and to have the committee file the proposed charter, along with its report, with the Selectmen prior to the 1970 Annual Town Meeting in order that an article may be included in the 1970 Town Warrant for the acceptance or rejection of the said proposed charter.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the expenses of operation of the Town; Town Officers' salaries and expenses; expenses of Election and Registration; Planning Board; District Court and Town Buildings; Ambulance; expenses of the operation of the Police, Fire, and Civil Defense Departments; expenses of the Town Dump, and damage by dogs; expenses of the Health Department; Summer and Winter Maintenance and General expense of Town Highways; Street Lighting; Town Poor and

Legal expenses; Social Security and Retirement (Town's share); Interest; and other necessary expenses pertaining to the operation of the Town of Salem, including Water Department, all such amounts being shown in the posted Town Budget.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following article as proposed by the Salem Civic Organization, Inc.:

No person shall be allowed to build any Apartment Building on any land within the Town of Salem, N. H., until March 31, 1971, so as to enable the Planning Board time to approve and adopt a brand new Master Plan for the Town of Salem, N. H. ............ This moratorium effective immediately upon voter approval at the March 1969 Town Meeting.

DEFINITION OF APARTMENT BUILDINGS: A dwelling consisting of two or more units, wherein more than one family resides.

DEFINITION OF A PERSON: Any individual, corporation, partnership, associate, trustee or other legal entity.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Housing Code for Salem:

### TOWN OF SALEM

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixty-nine.

AN ORDINANCE Establishing and Enforcing Minimum Standards for Use and Occupancy of Dwellings and Requiring the Repair, Closing, or Demolition of Dwellings Unfit for Human Habitation.

Whereas, in the Town of Salem, there are dwellings which are unfit for human habitation due to dilapidation, dangerous defects that are likely to result in fire, accidents, or other calamities, unhealthful lack of ventilation or sanitary facilities, or due to other unhealthy or dilapidated conditions; and

Whereas, such conditions adversely affect public health and safety, and lead to the continuation, extension, and aggravation of urban blight; and

Whereas, adequate protection of public health, safety, and welfare therefore requires the establishment and enforcement of minimum housing standards; now therefore

The Town of Salem ordains as follows:

### CHAPTER I

### Residential Premises

Section 1. (a) Short Title. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Housing Code" and this Chapter shall be known as "Housing Standards Applicable to Residential Premises".

(b) That a public agency is hereby established under the provisions of RSA 48-A; that the Agency consist of the Town Health Officer, the Chief of the Fire Department and one representative from the Town Building Inspector's Office, such representative to be appointed annually by the Board of Selectmen. The person so appointed by the Selectmen shall be Chairman of the Agency.

## Section 2. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and enforcement of this ordinance:

- (1) "Agency" shall mean the public agency referred to in Section 1 (b).
- (2) "Basement" is a portion of any dwelling located partly underground, but having less than half its clear floor-to-ceiling height below the average grade of the adjoining ground.
- (3) "Building Code" is the Building Code of this Town.
- (4) "Cellar" is a portion of any dwelling having half or more than half of its clear floor-to-ceiling height below the average grade of the adjoining ground.
- (5) "Dwelling" shall mean any building, structure, camp, trailer, mobile home, dwelling unit, rooming house, or rooming unit, or any part thereof used for human habitation or intended to be so used, including any appurtenances belonging thereto or usually enjoyed therewith.
- (6) "Dwelling unit" is a room or group of rooms located within a dwelling and forming a single habitable unit with facilities which are used or intended to be used for living, sleeping, cooking, and eating.

- (7) "Habitable room" is a room or enclosed floor space used or intended to be used for living, sleeping or eating purposes, excluding bathrooms, water closet compartments, laundries, foyers, pantries, communicating corridors, stairways, closets, basement recreation rooms, and storage spaces.
- (8) "Multi-family dwelling" is any dwelling or part thereof containing three or more dwelling units.
- (9) "Occupant" is any person including an owner or operator living and sleeping in a dwelling unit or rooming unit.
- (10) "Openable area" is the part of a window or door which is available for unobstructed ventilation and which opens directly to the outdoors.
- (11) "Operator" is any person having charge, care, management or control of any dwelling or part of it, in which dwelling units or rooming units are let.
- (12) "Owner" is any person who, alone, jointly, or severally with others, holds legal or equitable title to any dwelling, rooming house, dwelling unit, or rooming unit.
- (13) "Person" is any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company, or organization of any kind.
- (14) "Plumbing" is water-heating facilities, water pipes, garbage disposal units, waste pipes, water closets, sinks, installed dishwashers, lavatories, bathtubs, shower baths, installed clotheswashing machines, catch basins, drains, vents, and other similar supplied fixtures, together with all connections to water or sewer lines.
- (15) "Plumbing Code" is the National Plumbing Code.

- (16) "Premises" is a lot, plot, or parcel of land including the building and structures thereon.
- (17) "Rooming house" is any dwelling, or that part thereof containing one or more rooming units, in which space is let to three or more persons.
- (18) "Rooming unit" is any room or group of rooms forming a single habitable unit used or intended to be used for living and sleeping, but not for cooking or eating purposes.
- (19) "Supplied" is installed, furnished, or provided by the owner or operator at his expense.
- (20) "Town" is the Town of Salem.
- (21) "Two-family dwelling" is any dwelling containing two dwelling units.
- (22) "Temporary dwelling" is a seasonal dwelling that is intended for use eight or fewer months per year.
- (23) "Yard" is all ground, lawn, court, walk, driveway, or other open space constituting part of the same premises as the dwelling.

### Section 3. Minimum Standards for Basic Equipment and Facilities.

No person shall occupy as owner-occupant or shall let to another for occupancy any dwelling, rooming house, dwelling unit, or rooming unit which does not comply with the following minimum standards for basic equipment and facilities:

- (1) <u>Dwelling Units.</u> Every dwelling unit shall contain within its walls, and/or meet the following requirements:
  - (a) Lavatory Facilities. A room, separate from the habitable rooms, which affords privacy and which is equipped with a flush water closet and a lavatory basin.

- (b) Bathtub or Shower. A room, separate from the habitable rooms, which affords privacy to a person in the room and which is equipped with a bathtub or shower.
- (c) Kitchen Sink.
- (d) Sharing by Dwelling Units in Same Building. The occupants of not more than two dwelling units which are located in the same dwelling may share sanitation facilities, including water closet, lavatory and tub or shower, providing:
  - (1) Neither of the two dwelling units contains more than two rooms; however, for the purposes of this subsection, a kitchen with not more than sixty (60) square feet of floor area is not counted as a room.
  - (2) The habitable room area of each of such dwelling units aggregates not more than three hundred fifty (350) square feet, exclusive of sanitation area.
- (2) Water Line Connections. Every kitchen sink, lavatory basin, and bathtub or shower required by this Ordinance shall be properly connected with both hot and cold water lines. The hot water lines shall be connected with supplied water-heating facilities which are capable of heating water to such a temperature as to permit an adequate amount of water to be drawn at every required kitchen sink, lavatory basin, and tub or shower at a temperature of not less than 120 degrees Fahrenheit.
  - (a) All plumbing fixtures required by this section shall be properly connected to an approved water system and to an approved sewerage system.
- (3) Rubbish Collection. Every multi-family dwelling shall have approved common garbage and rubbish storage or disposal facilities.
- (4) Egress. Every dwelling unit and rooming unit shall have a safe and unobstructed means of egress leading to a safe and open space at ground level.

### (5) Rooming House - Additional Sanitation Standards.

- (a) Lavatories. Every rooming house shall be equipped with at least one flush water closet, one lavatory basin and one bathtub or shower for each six persons or fraction thereof living within the rooming house, including members of the family of the owner or operator if they share the use of facilities. In a rooming house in which rooms are let only to males, flush urinals may be substituted for not more than one-half the required number of water closets. All such facilities shall be properly connected to approved water and sewerage systems. No such facility located in a basement or cellar shall count in computing the number of facilities required by this subsection except when approved by the Inspector of Buildings. Every flush water closet, flush urinal, lavatory basin, and bathtub or shower required by this subsection shall be located within the rooming house in a room or rooms which:
  - 1. Afford privacy and are separate from the habitable rooms.
  - 2. Are accessible from a common hall and without going outside the rooming house.
  - 3. Are not more than one story removed from the rooming unit of any occupant intended to share the facilities.
- (b) Bedding and Towels. When bedding, bed linen or towels are supplied, the owner or operator shall maintain the bedding in a clean and sanitary manner, and he shall furnish clean bed linen and towels at least once each week and prior to the letting of any room to any occupant.
- Section 4. Ventilation, Light, Heating and Screens. No person shall occupy as owner-occupant or shall let to another for occupancy any dwelling, rooming house, dwelling unit, or rooming unit which does not comply with the following minimum standards for ventilation, light and heating:

# (1) Windows and Openable Space.

- (a) Total Window Area. Every habitable room shall have at least one window which faces directly to the outdoors. The minimum total window area, measured between stops, for every habitable room shall be 10 per cent of the floor area of such room. Whenever walls or other portions of structures face a window of any such room and such light-obstruction structures are located less than three feet from the window and extend to a level above that of the ceiling of the room, such a window shall not be deemed to face directly to the outdoors and shall not be included as contributing to the required minimum total window area.
- (b) Openable Window Area. Every habitable room shall have at least one window or skylight which can be easily opened, or such other device as will adequately ventilate the room. The total openable window area in every habitable room shall equal at least 45 per cent of the minimum area size or the minimum skylight-type window size, as required by this ordinance, except where there is supplied some other device affording adequate ventilation and approved by the Inspector of Buildings.
- (c) Glass-Fronted Porch. For the purpose of this section, where a living room faces onto a glass-fronted porch, the porch shall be considered as a part of the living room if the total window and open space area between the porch and the living room is at least 15 per cent of the floor area of the living room.
- (d) <u>Bathroom</u>. Every bathroom and water closet compartment shall comply with the window area and openable area requirements for habitable rooms, except where there is supplied some other device approved by the Inspector of Buildings as affording adequate ventilation.
- (e) <u>Laundry Rooms</u>. Every laundry room shall have a minimum openable area of at least three square feet except where there is some other device approved by the Inspector of Buildings as affording adequate ventilation.
- (f) Public Hallway and Stairways. Every public hallway and stairway within every two-family, multi-family dwelling and rooming house shall be adequately ventilated, and equipped with handrail as required by the Building Code.

- (2) <u>Lighting</u>. Every dwelling within 300 feet of a power line shall be supplied with electricity as follows:
- (a) <u>Habitable Room.</u> Every habitable room shall contain at least two separate floor or wall-type electric convenience outlets or one such convenience outlet and one supplied ceiling type electric light fixture, or a switch controlled outlet.
- (b) <u>Bathrooms</u>, <u>Utility Rooms</u>. Every water closet compartment, bathroom, laundry room, and furnace room, shall contain at least one supplied ceiling or wall-type electric light fixture.
- (c) Public Halls. Every public hall in a dwelling shall contain at least one supplied ceiling or wall-type electric light fixture. Every public hall and stairway in every two-family dwelling, multi-family dwelling and rooming house shall be adequately lighted at all times except that in a two-family dwelling an adequate lighting system which may be turned on when needed by conveniently located light switches shall be permitted instead of a full-time lighting system.
- (d) Standards for Installation. Every outlet and fixture shall be properly installed and maintained in good and safe working condition. All electrical installations shall comply with the requirements of the National Electrical Code.
  - (3) \*Heating. Every dwelling shall have heating facilities which are capable of safely and adequately heating all habitable rooms, bathrooms, and water closet compartments within its walls to a temperature of at least 70 degrees Fahrenheit when the outside temperature is -10 degrees Fahrenheit.
  - (4) Portable Heaters. Portable heating equipment employing a flame and using gasoline or kerosene does not meet the standards of this ordinance and is prohibited.
  - (5) Screens. During the portion of each year extending from May 15th to September 15th and as protection against mosquitoes, flies and other insects, every door opening directly from a dwelling unit to outdoor space and used for ventilation shall be supplied with screens and a self-closing device; and every window or other device capable of being opened to outdoor space and used for ventilation shall likewise be supplied with screens. Every basement or cellar window used for ventilation, and every opening which might provide an entry for rodents, shall be supplied with screens or such other device as will effectively prevent their entrance.

Section 5. Space and Occupancy. No person shall occupy or shall let to another for occupancy any dwelling, rooming house, dwelling unit, or rooming unit which does not comply with the following minimum standards for space and occupancy:

- (1) Habitable Floor Area. Every dwelling unit shall contain at least 150 square feet of habitable floor area for the first occupant and at least 100 square feet for each additional occupant.
- (a) Exception for Children under One (1) Year of Age. For the purposes of this section, a person under one year of age shall not be counted as an occupant.
  - (2) Sleeping Rooms. In every dwelling unit and in every rooming unit, every room occupied for sleeping purposes by one occupant shall contain at least 80 square feet of floor area, and every room occupied for sleeping purposes by more than one occupant shall contain at least 40 square feet of floor area for each occupant.
    - \*Does not apply to temporary dwelling.
  - (3) Arrangement of Sleeping Room, Bathroom. No dwelling or dwelling unit containing two or more sleeping rooms shall have such room arrangements that access to a bathroom or water closet compartment intended for use by occupants of more than one sleeping room can be had only by going through another sleeping room, nor shall room arrangements be such that access to a sleeping room can be had only by going through another sleeping room or bathroom or water closet compartment.
  - (4) Calculation of Floor Area. Floor area shall be calculated on the basis of habitable room area. However, closet area and hall area within the dwelling unit, where provided, may count for not more than 10 per cent of the required habitable floor area. At least 75 per cent of the floor area of a room shall have a ceiling height of at least 7 feet and the floor area of any part of any room where the ceiling height is less than five feet shall not be considered as a part of the floor area in computing the total floor area of the room.
  - (5) Basements and Cellars. No basement or cellar shall be used for living purposes unless:
    - (a) The floors and walls are substantially watertight.

- (b) The total window area, total openable area, and ceiling height are in accordance with this ordinance.
- (c) The required minimum window area of every habitable room is entirely above the grade of the ground adjoining such window area, not including stairwells or access ways.
  - Section 6. Safe and Sanitary Maintenance of Structural Elements.

    No person shall occupy as owner-occupant or shall let to another for occupancy any dwelling, rooming house, dwelling unit, or rooming unit which does not comply with the following minimum standards for safe and sanitary maintenance:
    - (1) Foundations, Exterior Walls and Roofs. Every foundation, exterior wall and exterior roof shall be substantially weather-tight, watertight, and rodent proof; shall be kept in sound condition and good repair; and shall be safe to use and capable of supporting the load which normal use may cause to be placed thereon.
    - (2) Floors, Interior Walls and Ceilings. Every floor, interior wall and ceiling shall be substantially rodent-proof; shall be kept in sound condition and good repair and shall be safe to use and capable of supporting the load as specified by the Building Code.
    - (3) Windows and Exterior Doors. Every window, exterior door and basement or cellar door and hatchway shall be substantially weathertight, watertight and rodent-proof; and shall be kept in sound working condition and good repair.
    - (4) Stairways and Porches. Every inside and outside stair, porch, and any appurtenance thereto shall be safe to use and capable of supporting the load of 80 pounds per square foot; and shall be kept in sound condition and good repair.
    - (5) Plumbing Fixtures. Every plumbing fixture shall be properly installed and maintained in sound mechanical condition, free from defects, leaks, and obstructions, and in accordance with the Plumbing Code.

- (6) Bathroom Floor Surfaces. Every water closet compartment floor surface and bathroom floor surface shall be constructed and maintained so as to be substantially impervious to water and so as to permit such floor to be easily kept in a clean and sanitary condition.
- (7) Maintenance of Required Equipment and Utilities. Every supplied facility, piece of equipment or utility, which is required under this ordinance, and every chimney and smokepipe shall be so constructed and installed that it will function safely and effectively, and shall be maintained in sound working condition.

Section 7. Substandard Conditions of Structural Elements. Any dwelling which has any or all of the following defects of structural elements shall be deemed unfit for human habitation:

- (1) Structural Walls and Vertical Structural Members. Any dwelling whose structural walls or other vertical structural members list, lean, or buckle to such an extent that a plumb line passing through the center of gravity falls outside of the middle third of its base shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.
- (2) Supporting Members and Non-Supporting Walls. Any dwelling which exclusive of the foundation, shows 33 per cent or more of damage or deterioration of the supporting member or members, or 50 per cent of damage or deterioration of the non-supporting enclosing or outside walls or covering shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.
- (3) Floor and Roof Loads. Any dwelling which has improperly distributed loads upon the floors or roofs or in which the same are overloaded, or which have insufficient strength to be reasonably safe for the purpose used shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.
- (4) Damage by Fire, Wind or Other Causes. Any dwelling which has been damaged by fire, wind or other causes so as to have become dangerous to life, safety, or the general health and welfare of the occupants or the people of the Town of Salem, shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.

Section 8. Substandard Conditions Generally. Any dwelling which has any or all of the following general substandard conditions shall be deemed unfit for human habitation:

- (1) Dilapidated, Decayed, Unsafe or Insanitary. Any dwelling which has become or is so dilapidated, decayed, unsafe, insanitary or which utterly fails to provide the amenities essential to decent living, or which is likely to cause sickness or disease, so as to work injury to the health, morals, safety or general welfare of those living therein shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.
- (2) Inadequate Light, Air and Sanitation. Any dwelling having light, air and sanitation facilities which are inadequate to protect the health, safety, or general welfare of human beings who live or may live therein, shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.
- (3) Inadequate Egress. Any dwelling having inadequate facilities for egress in case of fire or panic, or those having insufficient stairways, elevators, fire escapes, or other means of communication shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.
- (4) <u>Insecure Parts.</u> Any dwelling which has parts thereof which are so attached that they may fall and injure members of the public or property shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.
- (5) Unsafe, Insanitary or Dangerous to Public. Any dwelling which because of its condition is unsafe, insanitary, or dangerous to the health, safety or general welfare of the people of this Town shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.
- (6) <u>Violation of Ordinances</u>. Any dwelling existing in violation of any provision of the Building Code of this Town, or other ordinances of this Town shall be deemed unfit for human habitation.

Section 9. Cooking Equipment. No owner, operator or occupant shall furnish or use any cooking equipment which does not comply with the following minimum standards:

- (1) Construction, Installation and Maintenance. Every piece of cooking equipment shall be so constructed and installed that it will function safely and effectively and shall be maintained in sound working condition.
- (2) Prohibited Equipment. Portable cooking equipment employing flame and using gasoline or kerosene as fuel is prohibited.

Section 10. Responsibilities of Owners, Operators, and Occupants.

# (1) Sanitation.

- (a) <u>Cleanliness by Occupant</u>. Every occupant of a dwelling, dwelling unit or rooming unit shall maintain in a clean and sanitary condition that part of the dwelling, dwelling unit and yard which he occupies and controls; and shall be responsible for his own misuse of areas and facilities available in common.
- (b) Cleanliness by Owner or Operator. Every owner or operator of a two-family dwelling, multi-famil of a two-family dwelling, multi-family dwelling or rooming house shall maintain in a clean and sanitary condition the shared or public areas of the dwelling and yard.
- (c) <u>Use and Operation of Supplied Facilities</u>. Every occupant of a dwelling unit shall keep all supplied facilities, including plumbing fixtures and cooking equipment, in a clean and sanitary condition and shall be responsible for the exercise of reasonable care in their proper use and operation.

#### (2) Removal of Waste Matter.

(a) Storage and Disposal of Rubbish and Garbage.

Every occupant of a dwelling unit shall dispose of all rubbish, ashes, garbage, and other organic waste in a clean and sanitary manner by placing it in approved storage or disposal facilities which are safe and sanitary. Every occupant shall provide such facilities for and within his dwelling unit and shall maintain them in a clean and sanitary manner. The owner or operator of a multi-family dwelling shall be responsible further for placing out for collection all common garbage and refuse containers, except where such facilities are for the sole use of an occupant, under which circumstances it shall be the responsibility of the occupant to place these containers out for collection.

(b) Rooming House Rubbish Storage and Disposal.

Every owner or operator of every rooming house shall dispose of all rubbish in a clean and sanitary manner by placing it in supplied and approved storage or disposal facilities which are safe and sanitary.

# (3) Extermination.

- (a) Extermination of Pests by Occupant. Every occupant of a dwelling unit shall be responsible for the extermination of any insects, rodents, or other pests in it or in the yard.
  - 1. Exception. When, however, infestation is caused by failure of the owner or operator to maintain a dwelling in a rodent-proof or substantially insect-proof condition, extermination shall be the responsibility of the owner or operator.
- (b) Extermination of Pests by Owner or Operator. Every owner or operator shall be responsible for extermination of any insects, rodents or other pests whenever infestation exists in two or more of the dwelling units of any dwelling or in the shared or public areas of any two-family dwelling or any multi-family dwelling.
- (c) Extermination of Pests in Rooming Houses. Every owner or operator of a rooming house shall be responsible for the extermination of any insects, rodents or other pests in it or in the yard.
  - (4) Heat. During the time of the year when it is necessary, as determined by the Agency, every owner or operator of every two-family dwelling, multi-family dwelling and rooming house shall supply adequate heat to every habitable room therein except where there are separate heating facilities for each dwelling unit, whose facilities are under the sole control of the occupant of such dwelling unit.
  - (5) Utilities. No owner, operator or occupant shall cause any service equipment or utility which is required by this ordinance to be removed, shut off or discontinued for any occupied dwelling let or occupied by him, except for such temporary interruption as may be necessary while actual repairs or alterations are in process, or during temporary emergencies.
  - (6) <u>Janitorial Service</u>. Every dwelling of five or more dwelling units in which the owner or operator does not reside shall have a janitor as found necessary by the Agency.

- (7) Transfer of Responsibility. A contract effective as between owner and operator, operator and occupant or owner and occupant, with regard to compliance hereunder shall not relieve any part of his direct responsibility under this ordinance.
- (8) Notice of Maximum Occupancy. Every owner or operator shall advise the occupant in writing either by insertion in the lease between the parties or otherwise, of the maximum number of occupants permitted in the occupied premises under this ordinance.
- Section 11. Standards for Repair, Vacating and Closing, or Demolition, or Removal. The following standards shall be followed in substance by the Agency in ordering repair, vacating, closure, demolition or removal:
  - (1) Repair. If a dwelling deemed unfit for human habitation can reasonably be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this ordinance, it shall be ordered repaired.
  - (2) Vacating and Closing. If a dwelling deemed unfit for human habitation is in such condition as to make it dangerous to the health, safety, or general welfare of its occupants, it shall be ordered to be vacated and closed.
  - (3) Demolition or Removal. In any case where a dwelling deemed unfit for human habitation is 50 per cent damaged or decayed or deteriorated from its original value or structure, it shall be demolished or removed, and in all cases where a dwelling cannot be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this ordinance, it shall be demolished or removed. In all cases where a dwelling unfit for human habitation is a fire hazard existing or erected in violation of the terms of any ordinance of the Town or statute of the State of New Hampshire, it shall be demolished or removed. For the purposes of this ordinance, removal of a dwelling unfit for human habitation shall mean removal from the Town of Salem.

Section 12. Dwelling Unfit for Human Habitation - Nuisances. All dwellings deemed unfit for human habitation within the terms of Sections 7. and 8. of this ordinance are hereby declared to be public nuisances, and shall be repaired, vacated and closed, or demolished or removed as hereinbefore and hereinafter provided.

# Section 13. Inspection of Dwellings.

- (1) Inspection by Agency. The Agency shall inspect or cause to be inspected dwellings located within the Town of Salem for the purpose of determining the condition of said dwellings and seeking information relating to violations of minimum housing standards prescribed by this Chapter.
- (2) Access by the Agency. To carry out the purposes and provisions of this Chapter, the Agency or any subordinate acting under its direction and supervision, is hereby authorized to enter, examine and survey at all reasonable times, and in an emergency at any time, all dwellings; and the owner or occupant of the same, or the person in charge thereof, shall grant free access for the purpose of such examination and survey.
- (3) Access by Owner or Operator. Every occupant of a dwelling, rooming house, dwelling unit, or rooming unit shall give the owner or operator thereof, or his agent or employee, access to any part of such dwelling, rooming house, dwelling unit, or rooming unit, or its premises, at all reasonable times for the purpose of making such repairs or alterations as are necessary to effect compliance with the provisions of this ordinance or with any lawful notice or order issued pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance.

# Section 14. Enforcement.

- (1) The Agency Powers and Duties.
- (a) The Agency shall have the power to administer affirmation, examine witnesses, and receive evidence in the course of its hearings.
- (b) The Agency shall appoint and fix the duties of such officers, agents, and employees as deemed necessary to carry out the provisions of this ordinance.
- (c) The Agency may delegate any of its functions under this ordinance to such officers as it may designate.

Whenever it appears to the Agency that there are reasonable (2)grounds to believe that there exists a violation of any provision of this Chapter, or whenever a petition is filed with the Agency by at least ten (10) residents of the Town charging that any dwelling is unfit for human habitation, it shall issue and cause to be served upon the owner, every mortgagee of record, and all parties in interest in such dwelling (including persons in possession) a written complaint stating the grounds thereof. If the person to be served resides outside the State, service may be made by registered mail; and if there are any unascertained persons having an interest in said dwelling, notice may be given them by publication in a newspaper having general circulation in the Town, such publication to be at least ten days before the date set for the hearing. Such complaint shall contain a notice that a hearing will be held before the Agency at a place therein fixed not less than ten days or more than thirty days after the serving of said complaint.

The owner, mortgagee and parties in interest may file an answer to the complaint and appear in person, or otherwise, and give testimony at the place and time fixed in the complaint. Rules of evidence prevailing in courts of law or equity shall not be controlling in the said hearing.

Whenever the Agency, after notice and hearing determines that, (3) according to the minimum standards imposed by this Ordinance, a dwelling is unfit for human habitation, it shall state in writing its findings of fact in support of such determination and shall issue and cause to be served upon the owner thereof an order which, if the repair, alteration or improvement of the said dwelling can be made at a reasonable cost in relation to the value of the dwelling and the ability of the owner to assume such cost, requires the owner, within the time specified in the order, to repair, alter, or improve such dwelling to render it fit for human habitation, or to vacate and close the dwelling as a human habitation; or if the repair, alteration or improvement of the said dwelling cannot be made at a reasonable cost in relation to the value of the dwelling and the ability of the owner to assume such costs, require the owner, within the time specified in the order, to remove or demolish such dwelling.

- (4) Whenever the owner of a dwelling is aggrieved by an order of the Agency, he may file an appeal with the Board of Selectmen who will hold a hearing thereon, due notice of the same first being given to the Agency and to the said owner. The Board of Selectmen after hearing and in accordance with their findings, may affirm, revoke or modify the order of the Agency. Where the order is affirmed or modified, the Agency shall proceed to enforce the same as affirmed or modified. When the order is revoked, proceedings shall be terminated.
- (5) Whenever the owner of any dwelling fails to comply with an order of the Agency, a petition shall be filed with the Superior Court by said Agency in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 48A as it may be amended from time to time.
- (6) Whenever the Agency finds that a dwelling is unfit for human habitation and has issued an order to the person responsible therefor, the Agency shall post, in a conspicuous place thereon, a placard or placards which shall include the following words: "Condemned as Unfit for Human Habitation".
- (7) Any dwelling which has been determined unfit for human habitation and which has been posted as such, by the Agency shall be vacated within the time required by the Agency. No owner or operator shall let to any person, and no person shall occupy any dwelling, which has been found unfit for human habitation and which has been posted as such by the Agency.
- (8) No dwelling which has been found unfit for human habitation and which has been posted as such, shall again be used for human habitation until written approval has been furnished by the Agency. Upon receipt of such order, the owner may remove the placard.
- (9) Except in accordance with the provisions of Subsection (8), no person shall deface, cover, or remove any placard lawfully placed upon any dwelling by the Agency.
- (10) The Agency shall make such exceptions as it deems proper for residences that are used for temporary dwellings only.

Section 15. Rooming Houses. No person shall operate a rooming house or shall occupy or let to another for occupancy any rooming unit in any rooming house, except in compliance with the provisions of every applicable section of this ordinance.

- (1) Rooming House Permit. No person shall operate a rooming house unless he holds a valid rooming house permit issued by the Agency in the name of the operator and for the specific dwelling, dwelling unit, rooming house or rooming unit. The operator shall apply to the Agency for such permit, which shall be issued by the Agency upon compliance by the operator with the applicable provisions of this ordinance. This permit shall be displayed in a conspicuous place within the rooming house, at all times. No such permit shall be transferable. Every person holding such permit shall give notice in writing to the Agency within 24 hours after having sold, transferred, given away, or otherwise disposed of ownership of, interest in, or control of any rooming house. Such notice shall include the name and address of the person succeeding to the ownership or control of such rooming house. Every rooming house permit shall expire at the end of one year following its date of issuance, unless sooner suspended or revoked as hereinafter provided.
- (2) Any person whose application for a rooming house permit had been denied may request and shall be granted a hearing in accordance with the procedures required under Section 14 of this ordinance.
- (3) Whenever upon inspection of any rooming house, the Agency finds that there may exist a violation of the minimum housing standards established by this ordinance, it shall, after giving notice to the owner and holding a public hearing as provided in Section 14, revoke the owner's permit where violations are found and may make such further orders as are authorized by the provisions of this ordinance.
- (4) Every provision of this ordinance which applies to rooming houses shall also apply to hotels and motels, except to the extent that they may conflict with the laws of the State or with the lawful regulations of any State Board or Agency.

#### CHAPTER II

#### Mobile Homes

# Section 1. (a) Title

This Chapter shall be known as Housing Standards applicable to Mobile Homes.

# (b) Purpose

The purpose of this Chapter is to provide basic and uniform standards, in terms of performance objectives implemented by specific requirements governing the construction, occupancy and maintenance of mobile homes.

# Section 2. Definitions

The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation of this Chapter:

- (1) Accessory Structure. A structure, the use of which is incidental to that of the mobile home, and which is attached thereto or located on the same mobile home lot. Accessory structures include, but are not limited to, portable, demountable or permanent enclosures, shade structures, and carports.
- (2) Approved. Approved by the administrative officer under the regulations of this Chapter, or approved by an authority designated by law or this Chapter.
- (3) Community Area. An area or space within a mobile home court, including fences, walls, and other minor constructions, which is designed for joint use of occupants or restricted to non-residential use.
- (4) Community Structure. A structure within a mobile home court providing laundry, toilet, recreation, parking or other common facilities; including management office and storage buildings.

- (5) Generally Accepted Standard. A specification, code, rule, guide or procedure in the field of construction of mobile homes or mobile home courts or related thereto, recognized and accepted as authoritative.
- (6) Habitable Space. Space used for living, sleeping, eating or cooking purposes; excluding kitchenettes, bathrooms, toilet rooms, storage spaces and enclosures for equipment installations.
- (7) Mechanical Systems and Equipment. Mobile home electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilating, air conditioning systems and equipment used for living purposes, including cooking and refrigeration equipment.
- (8) Mobile Home. A movable living unit equipped with a chassis and provided with the following mechanical systems and equipment: plumbing, heating, electrical, cooking and refrigeration. (See Trailer.)
- (9) Mobile Home Court. A parcel of land which has been planned and improved for the placement of two or more mobile homes.
- (10) Mobile Home Lot. A designated site within a mobile home court for the exclusive use of the occupants of a single mobile home.
- (11) Mobile Home Stand. That part of an individual mobile home lot which has been reserved for the placement of the mobile home.
- (12) Patio. A paved outdoor living space designed to supplement the mobile home living area.
- (13) Storage Locker. An enclosed space designed to provide auxiliary general storage space for an individual mobile home.

(14) Trailer. (travel or vacation). A movable living unit equipped with a chassis but lacking any of the following mechanical systems and equipment: plumbing, heating, electrical, cooking and refrigeration. (See Mobile Home.)

# Section 3. General Requirements.

- (1) Mobile home design and construction shall conform to generally accepted standards of the mobile home industry.
- (2) Materials, assemblies, and equipment shall conform to generally accepted standards with respect to strength, durability, corrosion and fire resistance, and other qualities recognized under such standards.
- (3) Habitable and non-habitable space shall be arranged, located, lighted, and ventilated so as to be appropriate for the intended use.
- (4) Mechanical systems and equipment shall be designed, installed, and located so that under normal conditions of use such systems and equipment shall be capable of functioning safely and efficiently without being forced to operate beyond the designed capacity.
- (5) Equipment requiring operation, inspection, or maintenance shall be located so that easy access to it is provided.
- (6) Plumbing, heating and electrical systems shall be properly connected to approved sources of supply when a mobile home is in a fixed location and occupied for living purposes.
- (7) Mobile home units, including mechanical systems and equipment shall be maintained and operated so as to be free of conditions conducive to personal injury or detrimental to health or welfare.

# Section 4. Design and Construction.

Mobile homes shall be structurally sound, effectively insulated, and capable of sustaining designed dynamic loading.

# (a) Body and Body Framing

- (1) Body frames shall be designed and constructed as complete units. Wall and floor surfaces shall be firmly attached to body framing members. Doors and windows shall be securely framed in place. Framing and exterior skin shall be surface treated or painted to prevent deterioration.
- (2) Roofs shall be pitched for proper drainage and shall be weathertight. Roof decks shall be of metal or noncombustible materials.
- (3) Wood body framing shall be of seasoned lumber and shall provide adequate support and rigidity. Members shall be joined so as to insure permanent attachment to each other.
- (4) Metal body framing shall be of structural formed sections, riveted, bolted or welded together. Where different metals are joined precaution shall be taken to prevent electrolytic action.
- (5) Insulation of floors, roof, and exterior walls shall consist of non-combustible materials.
- (6) Ventilation shall be provided to minimize deterioration of structural members from condensation or other causes.

# (b) Chassis

- (1) Chassis shall extend substantially the length of the body and shall be capable of supporting the live and dead loads to which subjected.
- (2) Tongue or drawbar shall be secured to the chassis and shall be capable of supporting the weight of the forward end of the mobile home. If designed to support gas cylinders, the tongue shall be of sufficient strength and shall permit secure attachment.

- (3) Hitch shall be securely attached to the tongue so as to become an integral part of the tongue.
- (4) Axles, spring assemblies, and wheels shall be capable of supporting the calculated loads.

#### (c) Placement

Placement of mobile home on mobile home stand by jacks or supports shall be such as to insure the retention of the mobile home in a fixed position.

#### Section 5. Space Requirements.

# (a) Maximum Occupancy

The maximum number of occupants of a mobile home shall be limited to the number determined on the basis of the square feet of floor area of habitable space, exclusive of habitable space used for cooking purposes, in accordance with the following:

- 150 square feet for 1 or 2 occupants;
- 250 square feet for three occupants; and
  - 80 square feet additional for each occupant thereafter.

# (b) Height of Habitable Space

Habitable space shall have a minimum ceiling height of 7 feet over 50 per cent of the floor area; and the floor area where the ceiling height is less than 5 feet shall not be considered in computing gross floor area.

# (c) Bathrooms and Toilet Rooms

Bathrooms and toilet rooms shall have provisions for privacy, and shall be provided with floors of moisture resistant materials.

#### (d) Prohibited Uses

Bathrooms, toilet rooms, kitchens and kitchenettes shall not be used for sleeping purposes.

#### (e) Exits

A mobile home shall have a safe and unobstructed primary exit and an emergency exit located remote from the primary exit.

# Section 6. Light and Ventilation.

# (a) Habitable Space

A mobile home shall be provided with natural light and ventilation adequate for the intended use of each habitable space in accordance with the following:

Window area shall equal at least 10 per cent of the floor area of each habitable space; and

Openable area of windows and other openings used for natural ventilation of each habitable space shall equal at least 45 per cent of the required window area, or mechanical ventilation shall be provided as set forth in Section 6 B-16.

# (b) Nonhabitable Space

A mobile home shall be provided with light and ventilation adequate for the intended use of nonhabitable space in accordance with the following:

Kitchenettes, bathrooms and toilet rooms shall be provided with light of sufficient intensity and so distributed as to permit the maintenance of sanitary conditions and the safe use of the space and the appliances, equipment, and fixtures; and

Kitchenettes, bathrooms and toilet rooms shall be provided with natural ventilation consisting of openable areas of not less than 1½ square feet for bathrooms and toilet rooms, and not less than 3 square feet for kitchenettes; or mechanical ventilation shall be provided as set forth in Section 6 B-16.

# Section 7. Mechanical Systems and Equipment.

# (a) Plumbing

#### (1) A mobile home shall contain:

Kitchen sink, Flush-type water closet, Bathtub or Shower, and Lavatory.

- (2) Hot and cold water supply shall be provided at kitchen sink, bathtub or shower, and lavatory. Cold water shall be supplied to water closet.
- (3) Plumbing system shall be designed and arranged so as to facilitate connecting to approved exterior water supply and sewerage disposal systems, provide adequate water supply to all plumbing fixtures and dispose of all liquid wastes therefrom.

# (b) Heating, Ventilating and Air Conditioning

(1) A mobile home shall contain:

Space heating equipment, and Water heating equipment.

- (2) Areas allocated for installation of space heating and water heating equipment shall provide adequate clearance so that the surface of adjacent combustible materials will not exceed a safe temperature. Curtains and draperies shall not be used in such areas.
- (3) Space and water heating units shall be of an approved type for installation in a mobile home. Fuel burning water heaters and furnaces other than those having a sealed combustion space, shall not be located in sleeping rooms, bathrooms and toilet rooms.
- (4) Space heating units shall have sufficient capacity to maintain a minimum inside temperature of 70°F., based on the average of the recorded annual minimum outside temperatures for the locality, and shall be provided with manual or automatic temperature control devices.
- (5) Water heating units shall have sufficient capacity to deliver at each hot water outlet an ample supply of water at a minimum temperature of 120°F., and such units shall be provided with safety devices arranged to relieve hazardous pressures and excessive temperatures.
- (6) Electrical space and water heating equipment shall be of an approved type and shall have adequate circuit protection devices.

- (7) Gas and liquid fuel-burning equipment shall be specifically designed for the type of fuel used. Flues and vents shall be suitable for the type of fuel used and shall be installed so that the surface of adjacent combustible material will not exceed a safe temperature.
- (8) Automatically operated heat-producing equipment using utility gas shall have a valve that will automatically shut off the flow of gas to the main burner when the pilot flame is extinguished.
- (9) Automatically operated heat-producing equipment using liquefied petroleum gas shall have a valve that will automatically shut off the flow of gas to the pilot light and main burner when the pilot flame is extinguished.
- (10) Fuel-burning space and water heating units shall be vented. Other fuel-burning equipment shall be vented where the discharge of products of combustion into the space where the equipment is installed would be unsafe.
- (11) Liquid fuel-burning equipment shall be vented and shall be provided with means to prevent spilling of fuel.
- (12) Fuel storage containers and gas cylinders shall be mounted outside the mobile home, or in a space that is vented to the outside and is vaportight to the inside.
- (13) Warm air supply ducts and fittings shall be of noncombustible materials.
- (14) Return air ducts shall be of noncombustible material where exposed to temperatures which are unsafe for combustible materials.
- (15) Return air grilles in doors and partitions shall be of a permanent non-closable type. Openings for return air shall not be located in bathrooms, toilet rooms or kitchenettes.

(16) Mechanical ventilation, where required, shall exhaust air at rates not less than the following:

For habitable space - 2 air changes per hour; For bathrooms and toilet rooms - 25 cfm; and For kitchenettes - 100 cfm.

(17) Air conditioning for habitable space provided in lieu of mechanical ventilation shall supply an amount of air not less than that set forth in Section 6 B-16, with at least 25 per cent of the required quantity taken from the outside.

# (c) Electrical

- (1) A mobile home shall contain an electrical wiring system and service equipment.
- (2) Electrical wiring shall have adequate capacity for designed lighting and appliance equipment. Individual circuits shall contain overload protection devices.
- (3) At least one receptacle outlet shall be provided for each multiple of 12 linear feet of wall space or major fraction thereof in each habitable space and kitchenette. Bathrooms and toilet rooms shall have permanently installed lighting fixtures and switches located so as not to be an electrical hazard.
- (4) Exterior equipment shall be weatherproofed to insure protection of equipment from the elements. Service equipment shall have means for quick disconnection from the source of supply.
- (5) Provision shall be made for grounding noncurrent carrying metallic parts of the electrical system. Such grounding shall be common to one external supply point. Provision shall be made for exterior source grounding of electrical system.

# (d) Cooking and Refrigeration

#### (1) A mobile home shall contain:

Cooking equipment, and Refrigeration equipment.

- (2) Electrical cooking and refrigeration equipment shall be of an approved type for installation in a mobile home and shall have adequate circuit protection devices.
- (3) Gas burning cooking and refrigeration equipment shall be of an approved type for mobile home installation and connections to rigid pipe shall be made with approved flexible metal gas appliance connectors.
- (4) Fuel storage shall conform to the requirements of fuel storage for heating.

#### Section 8. Maintenance.

A mobile home shall be maintained in a safe and sanitary condition.

# (a) Interior

Floors, walls, ceilings, furnishings and fixtures shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition. Exits shall be maintained free of obstructions.

# (b) Garbage and Refuse

Suitable containers shall be provided for the temporary storage of garbage and refuse within the mobile home.

# (c) Screening

From May 15 to September 15 entrances to the mobile home shall be provided with self-closing type devices or screens, and windows and other openings used for ventilation shall be appropriately screened.

#### (d) Extermination

Mobile home shall be maintained free of insects, vermin and rodents. Extermination shall be effected in conformance with generally accepted practice.

# (e) Flammable Materials

Flammable cleaning liquids and other flammable materials shall be stored in a safe, approved manner.

#### CHAPTER III

Section 1. Conflict of Ordinances. This ordinance shall not interfere with or annul any ordinance, rule, regulation or permit, provided that, unless specifically excepted, where this ordinance is more stringent, it shall control.

Section 2. Invalidity. The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate any other section or provision thereof.

Section 3. Take Effect. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Article 10. To see if the Town will resolve, pursuant to the Housing Authorities Law of New Hampshire, that there is need for a Housing Authority to function in the Town of Salem, to be called, "The Housing Authority of the Town of Salem".

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to approve the application by the Housing Authority of the Town to the Federal Government for preliminary loans, and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a Cooperation Agreement with the Housing Authority by adopting the following resolution: Be it Resolved by the Inhabitants of the Town of Salem that there exists in the Town a need for low rent housing at rents within the means of persons and families of low income as defined in the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, which need is not being adequately met by private enterprise; that the application of the Housing Authority of the Town to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Housing Assistance Administration, for a preliminary loan in an amount not to exceed four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) for surveys and planning in connection with low rent housing projects of, not to exceed approximately one hundred (100) dwelling units, be, and hereby is approved; and the Selectmen are authorized to execute, on behalf of the Town, an agreement with the Housing Authority providing for the local cooperation required by the Housing Assistance Administration pursuant to the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, and to act in any manner relating thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer under the provisions of R.S.A. 33:71, 1955, to borrow, in anticipation of taxes, such sums as are necessary for the operation of the Town, and to set the rate, effect the issuance of notes, and to otherwise negotiate for the sale of notes to be paid within the present fiscal year.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Manager to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal Interest Free Loans, and to expend the same, as may be required for the preparation of plans and designs of Town Roads, Municipal Buildings, extension of the Water System and other Town functions.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Manager to apply for, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal funds as may be made available, and to expend the same.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Central Merrimack Valley Regional Planning District. The objective of this agency will be to plan for and encourage regional planning.

Article 16. At the request of Clarence Hall and others: To see if the Town will authorize the Town Moderator to appoint a committee of seven (7) to study the Town Zoning Ordinance and make recommendations to the next Town Meeting. This committee shall consist of a member of the Planning Board, the Salem Civic Group, the Contractors' Association, one from North Salem, north of School Street and east of Route 28, one from West Salem, west of Route 28 and south of the Windham line to the Methuen line, one from South Salem, east of Route 28 and South of Cluff Street to the Methuen line, one from the center of town, north of Cluff Street to School Street and east of Route 28 to the Methuen and Haverhill lines.

Article 17. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for planning and constructing a Municipal Garage and determine whether any such appropriation will be raised by taxation, by transfer of available funds, by borrowing or by any combination of these methods, and further to apply toward the cost all funds available from local, State or Federal grants, aids or donations as well as interest accrued or earned.

Article 18. At the request of Alcide H. Demers and others: To see if the Town will vote to install 8-inch water pipe to extend the water system from the present system on North Main Street (near Watson's store) to Wheeler Dam Road, a distance of approximately 2,112 feet and on Spicket Lane from North Main Street, a distance of 528 feet, a total of 2,640 feet, and raise twenty-three thousand seven hundred sixty dollars (\$23,760) for the same.

Article 19. At the request of Chelsea DeLotto and others: To see if the Town will vote to extend the water line approximately eleven hundred (1,100) feet on Pond Street and raise the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the same.

Article 20. By request of Ralph Brandano, Leo Bouchard and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand nine hundred and ninety-four dollars (\$6,994) to install approximately four hundred (400) feet of 24-inch drainage pipe, two hundred sixty (260) feet of 30-inch drainage pipe, fill, loam and four catch basins on town easement from Williams Street to Shepard Avenue and make any other provisions deemed necessary by the Town.

Article 21. By request of Ralph Brandano, Leo Bouchard and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand nine hundred and ninety dollars (\$5,990) to install approximately four hundred (400) feet of 24-inch drainage pipe, fill, loam and three catch basins on town easement between Ackerman Street and Williams Street and make any other provisions deemed necessary by the Town.

Article 22. At the request of the Greater Salem Mental Health Association: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) to be paid over to the Greater Salem Mental Health Association's program.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500) to be matched by a like amount from the Highway Safety Commission for the purchase of an ambulance.

#### Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to:

- (a) authorize the Town Manager and Selectmen to purchase an aerial ladder truck;
- (b) authorize the Town Manager and Selectmen to take such actions as they deem proper therein;
- (c) authorize the Selectmen to issue bonds and/or notes in an amount not to exceed fifty-eight thousand dollars (\$58,000) for the purpose of financing this purchase; and

(d) authorize the Selectmen to apply to the purchase all available funds including interest and Federal grants.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to purchase approximately fifty-one (51) acres of land adjacent to the present dump site and raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-eight thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$38,250) for this purpose.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to:

- (a) authorize the Town Manager and Selectmen to extend the municipal water and sewer systems,
- (b) authorize the Town Manager and Selectmen to take such actions as they deem proper therein,
- (c) authorize the Selectmen to issue bonds and/or notes in an amount not to exceed two hundred sixty-five thousand dollars (\$265,000) for the purpose of financing the project, and
- (d) authorize the Selectmen to apply to the project all available funds including interest and Federal grants.

Article 27. By petition of William J. Falwell and others: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) and will indemnify Spicket River Corporation against any loss, cost or damage to which it may be subject in lowering the water level in Millville Lake, restoring the level thereof and for the cost of any repairs to the dam and water control mechanism occasioned or revealed by such lowering and restoration.

The foregoing procedure will be accomplished in late fall of the year so that the excessively prevalent Fanwort (Cabomba Caroliniana weed) can be frozen out and thus will assist in the removal of Fanwort and other deleterious material from Millville Lake.

Article 28. At the request of Anna and Emil J. Comeau: To see if the Town will vote to install a drain between 35-37 Linwood Avenue and raise money for the same. (\$500 - \$1200)

Article 29. By request of the Conservation Commission: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be placed in a Conservation Fund, thereby making it possible for the Commission to apply for the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) from the Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trust.

Article 30. By request of Maurice Arlequeeuw and others: To see if the Town will vote to accept Palmer Street in Arlington Park, tar and gravel it, and raise money for the same.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to furnish space in the Municipal Building for a permanent registry office.

Article 32. By request of the Salem Conservation Commission: To see if the Town will vote to direct the Salem Conservation Commission to acquire by gift or bequest a strip of land fifty (50) feet in width on either side of the Spicket River for conservation and recreational purposes.

Article 33. By request of the Salem Planning Board: To see if the Town will vote to accept the following streets as listed below:
