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TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sanbornton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town hall in said Sanbornton on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the decoration of soldiers' graves and the proper observance of Memorial day.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the laws passed at the January session, 1905.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of town debt.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

7. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to distribute the resident blanks for inventories at the time they appraise the property to be taxed.

8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

For the Year Ending June 30, 1924

As there were very few scholars in the Gaza district that school was closed and after thirty years of inoccupancy the Brook school was reopened, there being prospects of a sufficient number of pupils, mostly children of permanent residents, to make a good school. This necessitated repairs, a large part of which were badly needed for the preservation of the building. The North Sanbornton school was closed and the pupils attended a nearby school in Meredith. The New State pupils were taken care of at the Hill graded school. The Hunkins school was closed and the five pupils conveyed to the Square.

As our Superintendent states, we had some difficulty in getting permanent teachers in some instances, nevertheless, we were fortunate in securing good ones in most cases.

As to repairs, we laid much needed hardwood floors at Calef Hill and Chapel, the old floors being badly worn and admitting much cold. This present year we have started painting our schoolhouses on the outside and, as per Mr. Libbey's report, have laid another hardwood floor at Meadow.

We are much gratified with the improvement in attendance and decrease in tardinesses.

There have been nine pupils attending High schools and Academies, three of whom graduated from Tilton School in June; and two in Junior High school.

The increase in the estimate for support of schools is due to slight increase in teachers' salaries and additional conveyance expense in the Osgood district, we,

therefore, recommend the appropriation of \$5 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation.

Please read carefully the Superintendent's report and our financial statement and estimates. We urge that you attend the annual school meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Sanbornton :

I herewith submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Sanbornton schools.

During the year, 1923-24, five schools were in session the full 36 weeks required; and one, North Sanbornton, had to be reopened April 7 for nine weeks. The Brook school had six different teachers, the Chapel, three.

I am glad to state that, so far this year, the only change necessary to make, has been one at Meadow school. Here the first teacher, with good training, good methods and experience, failed in her discipline. We were fortunate in being able to fill her place. I consider that we have a good teacher in every school and that each teacher is doing excellent work with what she is given to do with. I still must complain that we are not giving either teachers or pupils the proper equipment with which to do all that could be done. I refer particularly to supplementary reading matter.

To me, it seems an unfortunate thing that some mutual understanding cannot be reached between School Board and Trust Fund Trustees that we may know how much of the John Doe Taylor, No. 1, trust fund would be available for purchasing these much needed books.

The repairs on buildings the past year have been much appreciated. A new floor and replacing of the old desks with new ones at the Meadow school has made quite a modern looking school room of this, heretofore, rather ancient looking one. The "Brook" has been much brightened with a coat of new paint. The toilets should be the next big improvement to be given attention.

I call your attention to the statistical table and its comparison with the previous year. The per cent. of attendance is very much increased this year over that of last. The number of tardinesses has been reduced from 498 to 198, over 60%. The probable reason for this decrease is because teachers have made the school interesting and pupils have wanted to be there on time. An excellent habit to inculcate.

A rather unusual thing happened at the North Sanbornton school this year. A teacher was secured and the school opened in September with seven pupils. After about eight weeks the school had to be closed as all the children were taken by their parents to another town, where they had gone for lumbering. It is probable this school will again be opened in the spring.

One of the eighth grade graduates from the Sanbornton schools last June entered the eighth grade of the Franklin Junior High school in September, according to the plan recommended by me and adopted by the district last year. She is enjoying the school and making a splendid record. The experience, with pupils coming from outside schools to Franklin this year, convinces me more than ever, that it is better to take this eighth grade in a junior high school than in the country school if the child intends to enter a high school.

The teacher situation is improved quite materially. I mean by that, there are more to be had than for several years past. The number, however, willing to go out into the country, to the rural schools, is not large. I believe that, within two years, we will be able to secure Normal graduates even for our rural schools, as the Normal schools of the state are crowded and are increasing the number of graduates each year. These graduates will want schools somewhere. Our hope is in the surplus number.

The schools as a whole are in good condition; the interest seems good; the attendance, thus far, has been good and the teachers seem interested to be really helpful to those in charge. They are all proving that education consists of far more than what comes from books and the children are progressing satisfactorily.

I wish to acknowledge the co-operation you, as a Board, are giving me, and the readiness with which you accept and act upon my suggestions, so far as your finances will permit.
