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MAYOR'S INAUGURAL ADDRESS

Gentlemen of the City Council:

To-day marks the beginning of a new year of work and responsibility for you and for me. Before going into a review of the work accomplished last year, and my recommendations for the coming year, I desire to express my appreciation to my fellow-citizens and friends for their endorsement which again places me in the responsible position of director of our municipal affairs.

Feeling that our plans of last year met with the approval of our fellow-citizens, we must now carry on from where we left off. We must assume all of the responsibilities in such a manner that no problem which may confront us will be too big for us to solve. They shall be taken up as problems of our fellow-citizens, utterly unmindful of party spirit, and I expect each one to keep this in mind throughout the year, that we may not fail to return results worthy of the faith entrusted to us.

We shall be confronted by affairs of great moment, and again we shall have those affairs brought to our attention which may seem trivial to us and yet mean a great deal to some one of our fellow-men. Therein lies our greatest duty, gentlemen, if we wish success to crown our effort. We must learn to judge measures not so much by the man presenting them as by the principles upon which they are based and the purposes they are to serve. We must render our decisions to all judgments formed fairly and impartially, keeping in mind always, economy, so that the common welfare of the whole will be benefited, not that of a fraction or part. If we will but do this we shall find at the end of the year when we are called upon to give an account of our stewardship by those same citizens who placed their affairs in our hands, that we can give that account to the satisfaction of an appreciative public whose confidence has been upheld.

According to figures presented by our city clerk, I find the financial status of the city to be as follows:

Ι

HIGHWAYS AND SIDEWALKS

During the last year we have made every attempt to satisfy the citizens in the various sections of our city in the upkeep of their roads and sidewalks, and in so far as financial conditions warranted, I feel that success has been achieved along those lines to the satisfaction of all. There is still a great need of further improvement in this direction and it will be well for us to keep these in view during the coming year.

Macadam roads have been built on Franklin street from Main street to Green street and on Green street from Franklin street to Washington street. This coming year I would recommend the macadamizing of Washington street from Green street to High street as a continuation of the plans laid last year.

I feel, too, that the various hills should be macadamized and deem it advisable at this time to recommend the macadamizing of Hamilton street, with the end in view of continuing along Grand street to Beacon street, so as to complete a loop around this section of our city and facilitate traffic conditions. I would also recommend, should our financial conditions permit, the continuation of the macadam road on Franklin street from Green street tc High street.

Last year I suggested the macadamizing of the Rollinsford road on the lower part of Main street. Application has been made for State aid in this project and if obtained, enough money will be had to complete at least half of the road this year.

Our State road is in a deplorable condition and should be rebuilt. I would recommend that the city appropriate \$10,000 toward this much-needed improvement, as the Federal Government stands ready to give \$20,000 and the State, \$10,000, making in all a total of \$40,000 to be expended. With this amount of money, a good section of the road could be completed this year.

I am very much pleased with the condition of our sidewalks, with a few exceptions, and feel that the city saves money by expending it on granolithic walks. During the year 1923, granolithic walks were laid on the northerly side of Page street, on Green street from Washington to Franklin street and on Elm street around the bank building. This year I would suggest granolithic walks on Washington street if our finances will allow it. Where the department thought it inexpedient to build granolithic walks. concrete has been used. New walks have been laid on High street from Indigo Hill road to Pearl street; on Depot street from the railroad tracks to the New Dam road, and on the northerly side of Central street. The walks on High street from Pearl street to South street, on South street from High street to Portland street, on both sides of Spring street, and on both sides of Highland street have been resurfaced. I would recommend the continuance of concrete walks in such locations as the Committee on Roads, Bridges and Drains select. I would suggest to the committee, the resurfacing of the entire walk on the socalled New Dam road.

I feel that the time has now arrived when the department should purchase a pair of horses and other equipment which, to me, is a municipal necessity. It is only with the aid of these that the department can show efficiency in keeping our roads and sidewalks passable during the winter months, because this expenditure, in my opinion, would soon prove to be an economic success. I recommend the immediate purchase of these.

Π

WATER WORKS

The State Laboratory of Hygiene, in the latest report, shows the water to be safe for drinking and domestic purposes.

The recent repairs made at the pumping station now leaves the machinery in an excellent condition. The paint put on the outside of the building has given it a more respectable appearance and I would now suggest that the woodwork on the interior be given attention. I would also mention the installation of an electric pump in place of the small pumping unit, as the latter has been in use for 27 years and must soon be replaced. It would be well too, for us to consider the building of a new filter so that the one now in use could be given proper attention. This would improve the drinking water to a great extent.

The water main has been extended to Central Park. I recommend further extension of the line so that it could be connected with the Dover line. If this were done the expense would be small, considering the benefits which would be derived. Both cities would always be protected against lack of water. I would also recommend the extension of the water main on Indigo Hill road from Green street to Main street.

As suggested last year, I believe that the sewerage system should be extended along High street, as far as our finances will permit.

Under the efficient management of the department, the water meter system has proved itself to be a success in every way. Financially the department has taken care of itself and returned a surplus of about \$4,000, which may be used to decrease the bond debt. This surplus, I feel, is due to a large degree to the water meter system.

III

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Steps have already been taken with a view toward reorganization. The new central fire station is practically completed. It is located on Pleasant street and from this point will be able to offer service to all parts of the city. A Triple Combination Fire-fighting Motor apparatus has been purchased, so that our city may soon boast of a motorized department. This change in the department has already proved its value to the citizens, as the larger insurance companies have instructed their underwriters to reduce their rates on dwellings in the outlying districts, as soon as the truck is placed in service.

Some repairs must be made on the fire alarm system. As the greater part of the system now in the Chandler Building will be transferred to the new central station, I recommend that these repairs be made during the transfer. Due to the extension of the water main to the Central Park and New Dam districts, new alarm boxes should be installed. These, with the hydrant service, will provide the citizens with that protection which they have long sought for, and which was always rightfully theirs.

IV

PUBLIC BUILDINGS

Our city being the guardian of very few public buildings in its keeping, a fact which should encourage all the more, that proper regard to their upkeep and appearance be given.

The basement of the city hall has been thoroughly renovated so that we no longer need be ashamed of its appearance. The police station and all of the offices have received paint and plaster where it was needed and are now in such good condition that little money will have to be spent on them for some time to ccme. The roof of the city hall, which has given us so much trouble during the past few years, has been replaced by a new roof.

Snow guards have been placed on the Chandler Building as a protection to pedestrians beneath.

Regarding the fire stations on the hill and on Lower Main street, I recommend that they be repaired and full equipment be installed in each to be used for emergency cases.

Never for a moment forgetting the service given us by those "Faithful Ones" who served in the last World War, I recommend that No. 3 Engine House be turned over to the American Legion to serve as a club room for the boys, and that the city appropriate a small amount each year to help repair and equip the house, making it suitable for a clubhouse, the city reserving the right to use the room on election days as polls.

Our school buildings will be discussed under the School Department.

V

FOREST GLADE CEMETERY

The Board of Trustees and the Superintendent in charge of this department deserve all the praise given them for the improvements made under the trying conditions of the past year. An increase from \$50 to \$100 by the owners of lots on the avenue would greatly facilitate matters in the care of these lots, as expenses have more than doubled since the deposit of \$50 for this work was initiated.

If possible this year, steps should be taken to extend our water system into the grounds as this seems to be the only crying need of the cemetery.

VI

PUBLIC LIBRARY

The careful selection of books by the head of this department makes our library one of great service to our city. I hardly believe that the management could be improved upon by any suggestions I could make.

VII

PLAYGROUNDS

The Noble Pines and Playgrounds continue to be a favorite resort of the children and their parents. The trustees know the possibilities of a good diamond and no doubt will expend money for that purpose in due time. They also realize the many benefits that would result from the construction of a swimming-pool on the grounds.

Winter sports are gaining popular favor in most of our surrounding cities. I believe that the Noble Playgrounds has facilities for almost any branch of winter sports such as hockey, tobogganing, etc., and I would suggest that some method be employed to create a greater interest along these lines for the coming winter as this would have a tendency to create a better community spirit.

I believe, too, that the time is almost at hand when there must be a playground in the South End to meet the needs of the children in that section, even though it were small and equipped only for the very small children. If some public-spirited citizen would furnish the land, it would be a pleasure to start work upon it immediately.

VIII

SCHOOLS

The excellent records of Somersworth pupils coming in from the different institutions assures us that great progress is being made along the lines of education. These excellent reports show us that the costs of education in our city are indeed small when compared with the successful results achieved. In making comparisons with other cities, the high standard of our School System is extremely satisfactory and speaks very well for the efficiency of the teachers and supervisors in charge of the work.

At the close of the school year of 1923, Berwick severed relations with Somersworth regarding the part time plan for Domestic Science and Manual Arts. Although this raised the cost of school maintenance, the School Committee felt that the value derived from these new departments warranted their continuance. Last year I suggested the installation of a new heating apparatus in the Chandler Building and stated as my reasons for the change economy in the cost of fuel. This year I go a step further in this direction and recommend that the change be made.

All of our other school buildings are in excellent condition with the exception of the High School building, which is, indeed, in a deplorable condition and it is practically impossible to improve it without a very large expenditure of money. Any further expenditure on this old building would be a waste of the public money and I would not be favorably inclined towards it.

I feel that since it is only a matter of a short time before work must be started on a new High School building, it would be well to consider the number of unemployed in our city at the present time and lay our plans accordingly. The financial standing of our city is such that we can well afford a bond issue for the purpose of erecting this much needed building. It can no longer be looked upon as a luxury; it has reached that point where it has become an absolute necessity. Leaking roofs, drafty walls, and barn floors are not conducive to study and I have often wondered how our teachers have maintained such a high standard under such adverse conditions. Having visited several of the High School buildings throughout the State during the year, I feel that we have not been just to the younger element of our city. They are not receiving the consideration they should. Education plays a very prominent place in every man's life and it is our duty to see that these younger people receive the best that our financial standing can afford. I would consider myself neither just or honest if I dared to mention our High School building in this address as anything but a disgrace to our citizens and our city, and I am certainly favorable to a building

more modern and more adequate to the needs of both pupils and teachers.

CONCLUSION

Gentlemen:

You have heard my reports on the various departments, in which I have pointed out to you the work accomplished during the last administration and the improvements I would like to see made this coming year.

We are starting the new year in a very excellent condition, financially, with a surplus on hand greater perhaps than was ever before had in any administration. Efficiency alone could save this money and I feel that the council deserves great credit for the efficient manner in which the affairs of our city have been handled. We must not forget, however, the outlook for the coming year. The unsettled condition of labor is bound to create hardships for some of our citizens and for this reason I believe that now is the time to spend as much money on labor as our financial conditions will permit.

Our inhabitants must be kept in town if possible until labor conditions become more favorable.

But I again repeat my warning of last year, that I will sanction expenditures for only such improvements as would meet with the approval of our citizens, in my opinion. I say this to you not in the manner of a threat but only that you may keep in mind, always, that we are but the servants of the people and have promised, in so far as it is possible, to fulfill their wishes, and exercise as much care in the expenditure of their money as we would our own. I feel confident that I will receive your co-operation this year as zealously as I did last. I shall continue to give my honest effort to the advancement of our city's welfare, and I know that each one of you will do the same.

If the policy of economy and conservation practiced last year is applied and followed this year, we shall have showed some progress and still have decreased our debt. If we do this, I am certain that nothing more will be expected from us by our good citizens.

Amend Chapter XXI, Section 1, of the Ordinances and any amendment pertaining thereto with reference to that part which refers to the board of engineers by striking the entire section relating to same and inserting in place thereof the following to read, "The Fire Department of the City shall comprise of a board of engineers consisting of a chief engineer, a first deputy engineer, and a second deputy engineer, driver of motor apparatus, Central Fire Station, with 30 first call men and 25 second call men, Triple Combination Chemical and Hose Car, 1 Hook and Ladder Truck, 1 Hose Wagon, Deluge Co. No. 1, and Conqueror Co. No. 4. The number of men in any of said companies may be increased or diminished at any time by a vote of the City Council."

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Somersworth, that the Ordinances of the City of Somersworth be and hereby are amended as follows:

Amend Chapter XXI, Section 2, of the ordinances and any amendment pertaining thereto with reference to that part which refers to the chief engineer, by striking out the entire section relating to same and inserting in place thereof the following, to read,

"The chief engineer or either of the deputy engineers may be removed from office at any time by vote of the City Council; the standing committee on fire department shall have power to suspend either of said engineers, without pay, provided that such suspension shall not be effectual, if it be for a period exceeding thirty days, unless the same shall be approved by the City Council."

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Somersworth, that the Ordinances of the City of Somersworth be and hereby are amended as follows: Amend Chapter XXI, Section 4, of the ordinances and any amendment pertaining thereto, with reference to that part which refers to the appointment of the stewards by striking out the entire section relating to same and inserting in place thereof the following to read,

"The board of engineers shall appoint a steward for Deluge Co. 1, and Conqueror Co. No. 4 fire house, who shall not be a member of any company, and who shall keep the apparatus and building of his company, together with all that pertains to the same, in thorough repair and best of order; each steward shall be paid the same salary, and shall be subject to removal at any time by the chief engineer, and be subject to the same fines as regular firemen, which fines shall be deducted from his salary."

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit to you a report of the affairs of your Fire Department for the past year.

The number of alarms responded to during the year, including still, house, engineers, and general, numbered seventy-four. Permits to burn brush, etc., 32.

The co-operation of those burning brush, etc., by securing a permit, and burning under favorable conditions is greatly appreciated by your local fire officials, and those of the State Forestry Department. The comparatively small loss in our section by forest and woodland fires, is due, to a great extent, to this co-operation, and I sincerely hope this good feeling will continue. The disposal of litter, slash, etc., in compliance with the fire laws is approved of by this department.

During the past year, I have visited the several school buildings, and, without notifying teachers or pupils, have sounded the fire signal on the respective fire gongs, and witnessed and timed the exit of children from the buildings. The best of order prevailed, and I am pleased to say that the most crowded school building can be emptied of scholars in one minute. The matter of school fire drills is an extremely important one, and I earnestly request the teachers to continue to regard it as such.

Department

Previous to July 1, 1924, our Fire Department consisted of "call numbers" only. On the above date, a regularly paid driver was appointed to care for the Central Fire Station and our motor truck.

Our lone motor piece is an American-LaFrance, triple combination, type 75, one of the modern motor fire apparatus. It will render pump, chemical, and hose service. It was "mustered in" on the above date, being stationed at our new Central Fire Station on Pleasant street. Since its installation, it has proven itself most efficient, both in performance, and in responding to alarms. It certainly fills a long-felt want, and I trust your Honorable Body will soon have a companion for it in an as equally important piece, a ladder truck. Our present ladder truck is nothing more nor less than a relic. It is hand-drawn (ancient style), heavy, incomplete, and beyond the stage whereby it can be repaired, or remodeled, to represent anything modern in fire apparatus. The proceeds from the sale of this piece, and one or two of our hand-drawn wagons, plus a small amount (small, considering service it will render) would place in our department an up-to-date city service, or combination ladder truck. I respectfully urge our City Fathers to give this matter attention at their earliest convenience.

On the same date that we welcomed our new fire fighter, July first, 1924, there went into service a re-organized fire department. The present force consists of thirty-two first-call men, who respond with the apparatus; and twenty-two second-call men, who hold themselves in readiness, if needed.

Thus far this plan has proved successful, and the cooperation and feeling among the firemen is worthy of mention.

Fire Alarm System

The fire alarm system has been given needed attention during the past year. Among the most important improvements are the following:

The installation of a new air compressor; the replacement of the old gravity batteries, located in the Chandler School basement, with new-style batteries; and motor generator at Central Station; (this is a commendable change, as the old batteries created an unsightly corner in the school basement); the erection at headquarters of a fourcircuit switchboard; a repeating box (from which any box number or call can be sounded), and a new tapper. On the outside over three miles of new wire has been hooked up, two new boxes installed, and all boxes newly painted, as well as the air system in the basement.

The present system has been in operation several years, and will require more or less attention, as all things of a mechanical nature do.

Recommendations

Appreciating both the industrial conditions at the present time, and the need of adequate fire protection, I recommend to your Honorable Body the following:

First-The purchase of suitable motor apparatus.

Second-The re-establishment of the fire precinct.

Third—The purchase of a pulmotor of proven practicability.

In conclusion, I thank all who have assisted me in the performance of my duty during the past year, not forgetting the gallant fire laddies for their 100% co-operation.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the Honorable City Council of Somersworth, N. H.

Gentlemen: In submitting the report of the Librarian of the Public Library for the past year, the trustees desire to call attention to the excellent work the Library is doing in the community. A public library, properly conducted, is an educational force in a community, as well as ministering to the entertainment and enjoyment of our people.

The increased expense of books and supplies, etc., have made the annual cost of library maintenance in recent years much greater than it used to be, and only with the strictest economy is the Library able to do its work with reasonable success on the appropriation allowed. A much larger appropriation could be wisely used for library purposes, developing the institution along educational and recreational lines, which would make it even a larger influence for good in the community.

We have no doubt that you will give the Library such reasonable support, certainly not less than last year's appropriation, as appears to you reasonable in view of the demands of other departments on the city's finances.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

Somersworth, N. H., March 1, 1925.

To the Trustees of the Somersworth Public *Library:

Gentlemen: Herewith is submitted the report of the Librarian for the year ending February 28, 1925.

No one can contemplate the work of the past year without finding much that is satisfying and still more that is encouraging. Although there was no one particular event or development of importance, it proved a successful year. The regular work of the library was carried on without interruptions, the library having been open 297 days, both a ternoons and evenings.

The circulation record shows an increase over that of previous years, which is most gratifying in view of the many attractions other than reading; last year I mentioned some competitors of book reading; this year I must add crossword puzzles to the list. The great requisite for book reading is leisure; with automobiles, movies, radios, weekly magazines, and hourly newspapers, we are living in a hectic age. Human beings have only a certain amount of leisure, and if they spend an evening at the movies or listening to the radio there is no time left for a good book. However, so long as the race persists, the demand for books cannot die out.

During the past twelve months the circulation of books was 32,201, which is a record year, being 3,467 more than in 1923, showing that neither movies, radios, nor crossword puzzles caused a decrease in the use of books in our library during the twelve months. New books were added twice a month, as in previous years. Since the number of volumes published in 1924 was over 9000 and our book fund for the year was \$1,200.00, it is easily understood that the elimination of book titles from long lists forms one of your librarian's chief diversions.

A great deal of time has been given to the revision of the card catalogue. The cards were originally written in ink. It was in 1900 when the catalogue was established in this library. Since all up-to-date card catalogues are now type-written, an endeavor is being made to rewrite the older cards, making the entire catalogue more uniform and therefore much easier to consult. This work is being done mornings and spare moments during library hours.

Our public library's needs at present are many. No repairs of importance have ever been made to the Chandler building, although it was built some thirty-five years ago. The room is filled with books of worth, fast having to push a little closer together to make space for younger relations; new stacks are badly needed.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation for your co-operation in every particular during the year; I believe I am especially fortunate in the personnel of the Board and trust it may continue as at present.

I am also fortunate in having Mrs. Stella Winn as an assistant; her work has been entirely satisfactory and she has been most conscientious in the performance of her duties.

General Rules

Firemen, as well as citizens, should familiarize themselves with the following rules for giving alarms of fire:

- 1. Never pull a box for a fire seen at a distance.
- Never pull a box while the alarm bells are ringing, not until a box has completed its four rounds. Two boxes cannot operate together, and neither will work if two are pulled at the same time. Never pull two alarms or two boxes for the same fire.
- 3. To ring in an alarm, break the glass in the key-box and open the outside door with the key. Pull down the brass crank seen inside, till it stops, then let go. Then let the box alone. The clock will be seen or heard to be running, and the alarm will follow in half a minute or so. Close the door, but do not try to remove the key, as it is locked in track lock and can only be removed by a release key, which is carried by each engineer, who will, as soon as convenient, release and return it. Remember that the firemen will come directly to the box which has been pulled, and be sure that some one stays at the box to direct them to the fire.
- Never pull an alarm for a fire seen at a distance. Never touch a box except to give an alarm of fire. Give an alarm for no cause other than actual fire. Don't give an alarm for a chimney fire.

Receipts

Pumping Station

The buildings at the pumping station are in very good condition externally, excepting the coal shed, which needs shingling and a few minor repairs. The pumping mechanism is in very good working order and is giving satisfactory results, and the only expenditure involved during the year was for packing and pump valves. The steam boilers have had several inspections, both externally and internally, and have passed the test as provided by the insurance company.

Filter Bed

The filter bed is working very satisfactorily, and has been kept in condition by several cleanings during the past year.

Stand Pipe

The stand pipe has developed no leaks during the year and apparently is in good condition.

Distribution Piping

During the past year two extensions were laid, one of which gave water supply to the Mount Calvary cemetery and Forest Glade Cemetery, requiring the laying of five hundred feet of 2" pipe and seventeen hundred feet of 1" pipe, beginning at West High street.

The second extension was laid from Green street and Indigo Hill road to Main street, requiring sixteen hundred feet of 6" cast iron pipe, including two hydrant connections.

Service Pipes

There are now 1,077 services in use, thirteen having been laid this year, not including several lines having been renewed on account of broken goosenecks, caused by corrosion at curb cock.

Hydrants

Upon addition of two hydrants above stated, the total

is now 107, and all have been found in good condition after making the usual tests and inspections.

Meters

Many old meters have been replaced by new ones during the year, nine of which were new services, making a total of 633 meters, five of which are privately owned, as found in the report of the Superintendent on another page of this report.

To the Board of Water Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—I herewith present to you the annual report of the operations of this department for the year ending February 28, 1925.

Pumping Station

The buildings at the pumping station are in very good condition, excepting the coal shed, which should be shingled.

The pumping machinery is in very good condition, the only expense being for packing and pump valves. The boilers have been inspected externally and internally several times and have been passed by the insurance company.

Filter Bed

The filter bed has been cleansed several times and is doing satisfactiory work at this time.

Stand Pipe

The stand pipe is in good condition and has not developed any leaks this past year.

Distribution Piping

Five hundred feet of 2'' pipe and seventeen hundred feet of 1'' pipe was laid to the cemeteries from West High street, and sixteen hundred feet of 6'' cast iron pipe, with two hydrant connections, was laid on Green street and Indigo Hill road to Main street.

Service Pipes

Thirteen new services were laid during the year, making 1,077 now in use. Have had several leaks on service lines caused by broken goose necks and corrosion at curb cock.

Hydrants

The hydrants have had the usual inspection and found in good condition. With the two new hydrants added this year we now have 107 hydrants in the City.

Nine new services were metered during the year and many old ones replaced by new ones.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Members of the School Board,

Somersworth, N. H.

Gentlemen:

I have the honor of submitting herewith my fifth annual report as Superintendent of your schools. The year just closing has been one of real progress in the schools, notwithstanding the financial depression in the city. The teachers have worked hard, faithfully, and intelligently. The class-room work at the end of the year showed the results of their efforts.

Somersworth is fortunate in having few changes in its teaching force. The only change during the past year was the election of Miss Lillian Barclay of Watertown, Mass., to teach French in the High school in place of Miss Eleanor Warren, who resigned to accept a position in Porto Rico. Owing to a great decrease in the Union Street school, the number of regular teachers in that building was reduced from four to three.

School Attendance

The school attendance for the present year has been materially affected by the discontinuance of the evening school, by the fact that many people have moved from the city, and third, by the opening of Holy Trinity Parochial School. The attendance at the High school, the Burleigh and Chandler schools has been fully up to normal, in fact, slightly higher than usual. On the other hand, the number of pupils registered in the Union Street school was very small. The accompanying table shows a slight gain in the High school, a loss of approximately 100 in the elementary schools, with no evening school, as compared with the attendance records of 1922.

The attendance records show many encouraging features. 55 pupils, or approximately 10%, were not absent or tardy during the entire year. The number of cases of tardiness amounted to 193, or out of every 1,000 of attendance the average was slightly over one, a very unusual record. The attendance at the High school was 96.9. The average for all schools totaled 95.4. These facts show vigilance on the part of the teachers and efficiency on the part of the truant officer.

Fundamentals

During the year special emphasis has been laid upon the fundamentals of education. Such "tool subjects" as spelling, handwriting, the four operations of arithmetic, addition, subtraction, multiplication and division, have received more attention than formerly, especially in the High school. Definite standards of attainment have been established, so that we can compare our schools with schools in other places, by means of standardized tests which have nation-wide use. About three years ago our methods of spelling were changed, and a spelling book was placed in the grades. Spelling as a part of the English work has been a regular subject in the High School for only about a year. There is still room for material improvement in the High school spelling. This is shown by the results of a State-wide test in spelling given by the State Department of Education May 25, 1925. The following are the percents: Grade XII, Seniors, 81.8; Grade XI, Juniors, 86.6; Grade X, Sophomores, 86.6; Grade IX, Freshmen, 83.4; Grade VIII, 90.

Finances

Your attention is called to the financial report for the school year 1924-25. While the expenses of the year were under \$47,000 there were no heavy coal bills during that period. The expenses for school supplies were also very light, only \$356.38, covering all pencils, paper, erasers, ink and other supplies bought for the pupils' use during the year. This was possible owing to a large supply on hand at the beginning of the year.

The overhead expenses of the school system are very heavy owing to the fact that the pupils are housed in four separate buildings instead of centralized in one or two.

On the other hand the school tax of the City of Somersworth, on the basis of equalized valuation, is less than that of any city in the State of New Hampshire. There are only a few school districts in the State which spend less. According to the records of the State Board of Education, the cost of public education in Somersworth during the year 1923-24 was \$5.27 per thousand dollars of equalized valuation. There were eleven school districts with lower expenditure; and of the eleven, four did not spend anything for high school education. Out of 252 school districts in the State, Somersworth ranked 238 in order of least expenditure. Inasmuch as the expenses for 1924-25 were several thousand dollars less, the ranking will be still lower.

Promotions

In my previous reports, I have called attention of the public to the matter of annual promotions. I wish to re-state briefly my conclusions on this subject. All children do not develop at the same rate either physically or mentally. To compel all children to eat the same amount of food would be a crime. To compel all children of the same age to do the same intellectual work would be a still greater crime, if not an impossibility. Moreover, it often happens that the child who develops slowly intellectually in the end far surpasses the one who develops rapidly. Sometimes a false pride on the part of the parents leads them to over-emphasize the importance of their child's being promoted at the end of the year.

Health Supervision

In November, 1924, Miss Louise M. Smith was elected school nurse, devoting her entire time to health work in the schools of Somersworth.

Your attention is invited to her special report, which shows that substantial results have been accomplished. Moreover, Miss Smith expects to be with us next year, so that the results of her work will be cumulative. It is very important that the boys and girls learn and practice the rules and facts which promote good health not only as children, but which will enable them to be healthier and happier the rest of their lives.

High School

Attention is called to the report of the headmaster of the High school. Your High school is making a remarkable record in preparing boys and girls for college. Of the four classes which have sent students to college in the past four years not one student has failed to carry the work, and many of them have attained very high This is truly a remarkable record, and is a very rank. high commendation of the work of the school. These students have gone from the Commercial Course as well as the Academic Course. Ordinarily, Commercial students fail in college work. These facts indicate also the strength of your Commercial Department.

Certain changes have been made in the program of studies in the High school, by which it is hoped that more pupils will be attracted to the school and take advantage of its opportunities. French has been made a first-year instead of a second-year study in two courses. The Commercial Course has been very materially strengthened, and the General Course broadened. The work in Manual Arts in the High school must of necessity be restricted to woodwork, and cannot be carried profitably beyond the Freshman year because of lack of equipment for metal work.

Home and School

The schools exist for the benefit of the children. In order to secure the best results it is necessary for parents and teachers to co-operate intelligently. In case of misunderstanding or difficulty the Superintendent has always been willing to investigate each case upon its merits. There have, however, been very few instances of misunderstanding, and with very few exceptions these misunderstandings have been cleared up. It has been the aim of the School Department to interest parents in the work of the children, not only on special occasions but regularly throughout the year.

During the past school year the attendance of parents and friends was very encouraging. During Education Week, the public was specially invited, and in the High school and Chandler school, classes were held in the evening for their convenience. The purpose of Education Week is to enable the public to see the regular work of the school, not something which is specially prepared for the occasion. The excellent exhibit of the work done by the special teachers, held at the end of the year, was largely attended. Many visitors have enjoyed the special holiday programs prepared by the teachers. Would it not be possible for every parent to visit school at least two hours every year?

The attitude of parents has been most encouraging. We hope it will continue. Teachers and Superintendent gladly welcome conference with and suggestions from parents and others.

Prizes

W. C. T. U. Prizes.

In the spring of 1925 prizes were offered by the local Women's Christian Temperance Union for the best essays on "The Effects of Alcohol and Nicotine upon the Human Body." The pupils displayed unusual interest in the preparation of these essays. The essays were written in school under the immediate supervision of the teachers.

Leadership Prizes.

Through the interest and co-operation of the Monday Afternoon Club, prizes of five dollars each were awarded to the boy and to the girl in the graduating class, who, in the opinion of the High school faculty, best represented the ideals of the Somersworth High School, in character, conduct, co-operation, school activities, and scholarship. These prizes were awarded to Fernande Marquis and Arthur Gilbert.

Women's Club Prizes.

Membership cards in the Somersworth and Berwick

Women's Club were awarded for high scholarship to two girls of the incoming Senior class. These were awarded to Doris Paradis and Jessie Lanouette.

Metropolitan Prizes.

An account of these prizes with the winners is given in the special report of Miss Alma Roy, supervisor of drawing.

National Highway Education.

The Highway Education Board, having headquarters at Washington, D. C., offered a four years' university scholarship to the high school pupil in the United States writing the best essay on National Good Roads. Miss Paradis' paper won the prize for the State of New Hampshire and will represent this State before the national board of judges. It will be recalled that Miss Paradis won the State prize in the W. C. T. U. essay contest a year ago.

Your attention is called to the special reports which follow.

In conclusion I wish to express my full appreciation for the hearty co-operation which I have received during the past years from the school board, teachers, parents, and general public. It is only by united, cumulative effort and intelligent co-operation that the best results can be achieved.

REPORT OF HEAD MASTER OF HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools, and Members of the School Board:

Gentlemen:

I herewith present to you the fifth annual report of the Somersworth High School.

In comparison with other schools we have been fortunate in the small number of teaching changes which occur from year to year. This year there was but one, due to the resignation of Miss Warren and the appointment of Miss Barclay to fill the vacancy.

The past year has been characterized by the same steady growth in accomplishment which has been a distinctive feature of former years. That the work of preparation is comprehensive as well as intensive is evidenced by the fact that our graduates, irrespective of their choice of courses upon entering college, do exceedingly well. Of last year's class of fourteen graduates, eight entered the University of New Hampshire and the remaining six entered other schools of post-secondary grade.

Despite the pressure of the required academic work we have been able to devote a little more time to extracurricula activities. For the greater part of the year one full period a week has been given over to inter-class debates, discussions of topics of popular interest and the organization of various clubs. Work of this sort has evinced a noticeable interest on the part of the pupils, so much so that it should be given a regular place on the daily time-table. The debate which was a part of our Education Week program aroused much favorable comment among those who were present. We had hoped that the culmination of our efforts along these lines would be attained in a debate with some other school in the Interscholastic League, but Farmington High School, with whom we were paired, was obliged to close because of an epidemic and as a consequence the debate had to be cancelled.

The sole innovation this year and one which seems to prove efficacious in reducing retardation to a minimum is the change in sessions for the spring term. The school still maintains a two-session plan, the first from 8:15 a. m. to 1 p. m. and the second from 2.30 p. m. to 3.30 p. m. but only those pupils whose work is not up to the standard are required to attend the afternoon session. In this way two objects are served. The loss of time occasioned by mid-week ball games is eliminated, and one extra hour is secured for conference of teachers with backward pupils. This plan necessitates a somewhat longer day for both teachers and pupils, but the results secured seem to be ample justification for it.

The building in which our activities are housed is becoming more dilapidated each year. If it were not for the patience shown by our boys and girls in enduring the many physical discomforts, the eagerness with which they look to the mental good rather than the material, the withholding of all claims to those comforts which are rightly theirs; if it were not for these qualities, I repeat, the efficiency of teachers and pupils, obliged as they are to work in such a sombre atmosphere, would decline sharply. It is this spirit of the school, the will to conquer despite great handicaps, which is creating here in Somersworth a power for good more potent than the finest school building in the richest community of the State. This spirit is worthy of better appreciation by the citizens. It is dynamic and therefore commendable.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF DRAWING

To the Superintendent of Schools, and Members of the School Committee of Somersworth:

Gentlemen:

In submitting my report I wish to first thank the superintendent, school committee and teachers for their assistance and kind co-operation.

This year the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company offered prizes for the best Clean-up Week posters and all the pupils entered the contest with an astonishing amount of zeal and interest. Some unusual work was done, and the judges, Mrs. Mooney, of Somersworth, Mrs. Tighe and Mrs. Nutter of Salmon Falls, after much consideration finally awar l⁻d the prizes as follows:

First prize, \$5.00—Frances Sanborn, 8th grade. Second prize, \$3.00—Eleanor McKeon, 8th grade. Third prize, \$1.00—Estelle Gagne, 5th grade.

The following received honorable mention:

Elizabeth Carpenter, 7th grade. Menelaus Diamond, 6th grade. Leona O'Graini, 5th grade. Constantina Troubataris, 5th grade. Francis Donovan, special room.

At Christmas time Miss Smith, the school nurse, requested that the students make health posters to be sent to various places throughout the State and place some in each schoolroom in the city. The ideas and wording of the posters were to be of their own choosing, and a great deal of ingenuity and originality were shown.

We have previously done a great deal of mechanical drawing in the High school, but this year we have substituted free hand drawing. Most of the work done has been of practical value, however. Posters were made for Senior class sales and for the thirtieth anniversary of the Woman's Club. In fact, throughout the schools, from the fifth grade up, the students have made posters and signs in wide varieties and seem to be very interested in that field of work.

This year we held our usual exhibition in connection with the Manual Training and Domestic Science departments. Work from all the grades and every type was shown.

In concluding, I would like to urge that an effort be made to supply the class-rooms with more pictures of an artistic value. We already have several good specimens of what I mean. If the students could constantly have before them examples of perfect art by celebrated artists they would learn to recognize perfect workmanship when they had an opportunity to see it. This would be rather a preliminary to "appreciation of art," since we are unable to have such a course in our schools.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools and School Committee of Somersworth:

Gentlemen:

In presenting my fourth report, I desire first of all to express my thanks for the cordial co-operation the superintendent, teachers, and pupils have accorded me.

Work at the High school and in the grades is being carried along in the usual manner and compares favorably with that of last year. We regret it has been necessary to combine two grades in some cases, as it is somewhat of a handicap in our music course, as well as other studies, but we are aiming to do the best work possible under the circumstances.

One of the greatest problems of superintendents and teachers is that of bringing school and community together. This can, in part, be accomplished by bringing the parents into the school. Has it occurred to you that music is one of the strongest magnets for this purpose?

Several programs have been given during the year and have been largely attended by parents and friends. Besides arousing public interest the children enjoy them and are also benefited.

Music Week was noted in all the schools and a special program was given at the Grammar building; piano, violin and mandolin solos were rendered and papers on "The Value of Music" and "American Music" were read. The folk-dancing program held in connection with that of the Domestic Science, Manual Training, and Drawing was a success and we regret not having sufficient room to accommodate all the visitors.

Through the courtesy of the superintendent and school committee your supervisor was privileged to attend the Music Supervisors' Conference at New Haven, Conn.

This convention was a source of inspiration and brimful of suggestive ideas, some of which we have been endeavoring to put into practice.

The chief objective in the teaching of music is the raising of musical standards and the increasing of musical efficiency. This is our aim.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF DOMESTIC ARTS

To the Superintendent of Schools and Members of the School Board:

Gentlemen:

It is with pleasure that I submit my second annual report of the work completed in the Domestic Arts Department of the Somersworth schools.

The aim of the course in cooking is to teach the children to select, prepare, and serve meals suitable for the average home in any community. In sewing it has been my aim to teach the children by actual experience to design, purchase material, and make their own clothes.

In grade six the pupils have learned the different stitches and the use of the sewing machine. They have made hand towels and aprons for their cooking classes, Christmas gifts, collar and cuff sets, nightgowns and slips or bloomers. In cooking they have made simple dishes preparatory to the more advanced work next fall.

The work done in grades seven and eight was about the same, but carried out in such a way as not to be a mere repetition. The girls preserved various kinds of fruits, canned many fall vegetables, made conserve, jelly and some kind of pickle. When the canning season was over they prepared foods that would help them to cook and serve the three well-balanced meals of the day. Grade seven served suppers and grade eight served huncheons. In sewing, the girls made various kinds of underwear, Christmas gifts, skirts and blouses. In grade eight they made dresses. The High school classes had courses in cookery, household organization, sewing and millinery. In cooking, the girls had more advanced work than in the grades. They studied food values, cost and preparation. They served dinners and an afternoon tea. In household organization the plan was to learn how to organize a home. They studied suitable sites, made plans for an inexpensive home and for remodelling a home already built. In sewing the girls made one piece of underwear, skirts, blouses, new and remodelled dresses. In millinery they made and remodeled hats.

At the end of the year an exhibition was given of the canned goods and sewing. For an exhibit of their cooking the girls served tea, sandwiches and cookies which they had made.

I wish to thank the school board, the superintendent, teachers and parents, for their very helpful co-operation during the year.

The work in the grades has been carried on in a manner intended to develop the natural talent of the pupils and acquaint them with the more intricate methods of cabinet-making and general woodworking.

The High school class has taken steps in paneling and surface joining and have made considerable progress in this work.

The addition of a speed lathe to the equipment would accomplish a great deal in the teaching of the more advanced woodworking in the 8th grade and High school classes.

There were 353 recorded visits made to the children's homes with instructions to the parents in the value of

preventive work. It takes from twenty minutes to one **h**our for this kind of a visit.

Visits were made in all the schools once a week and class talks given in the lower grades.

A demonstration of the prone or Schaefer method of resuscitation in case of drowning was given to the children of the upper grades of the Chandler, Burleigh and St. Martin's Academy, also lessons in bandaging.

Nutrition work was carried on in all the schools and all the underweight children were weighed once a week.

A clinic for underweight children under the auspices of the N. H. Tubercular Association, with Dr. Kerr and Miss Finn from headquarters in attendance, was held March 24 at the Union Street school. Forty-seven children were examined. Ten showed slight tubercular tendency; five are under the care of their family physician and are improving in weight, the other five were re-examined by Dr. Kerr June 5th at Salmon Falls and they all show a marked improvement. They will be kept under observation.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation and loyal support given me by the members of the school board, superintendent of schools, and teachers and all others who help to make this work a success.
