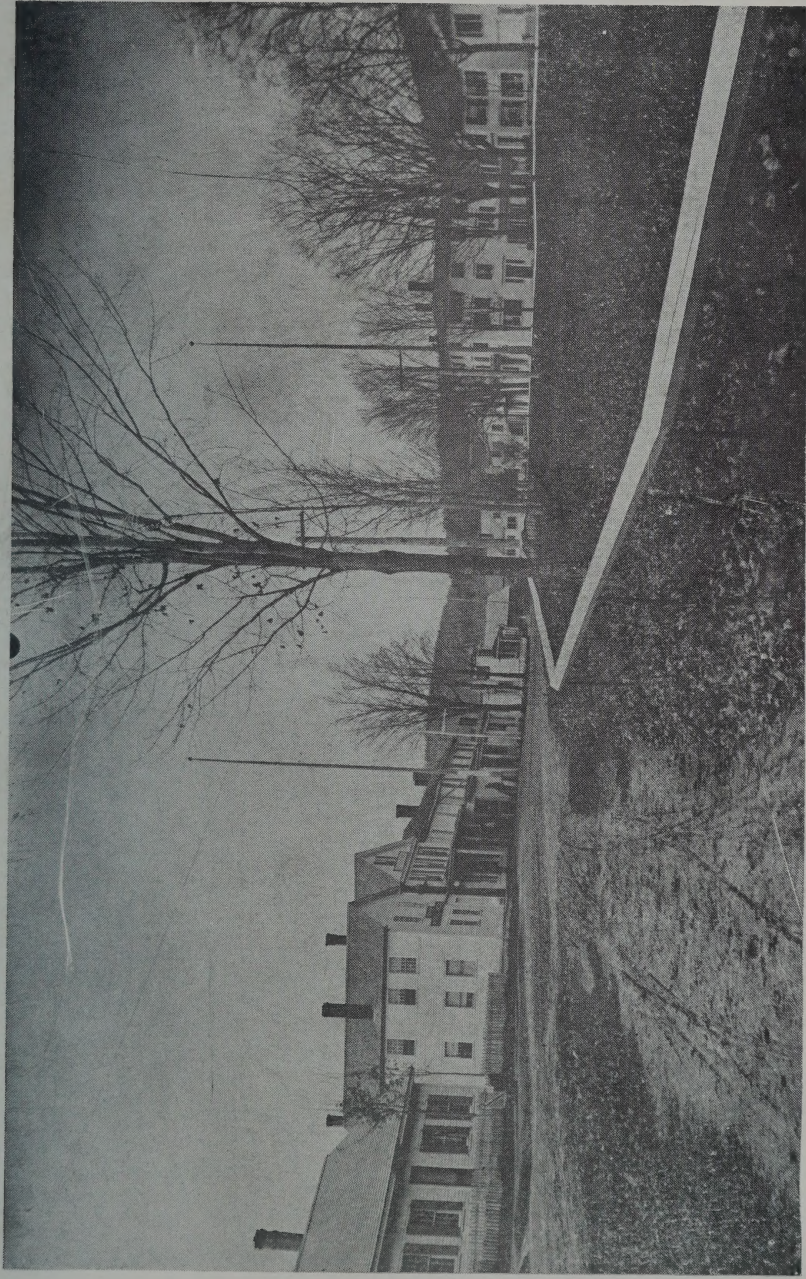


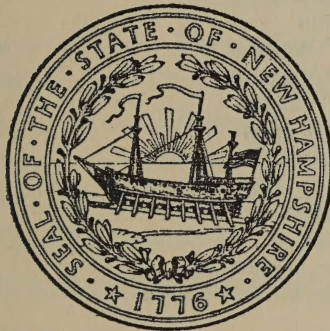

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wentworth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wentworth on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to establish the position of a Road Agent on a full time, salaried basis, and to determine the weekly salary of said agent and the minimum weekly hours such agent shall be required to work, together with any other conditions of employment which may be recommended.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town highways and bridges for the ensuing year (summer and winter.)

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept T. R. A. for construction, maintenance and reconstruction of rural post roads and Class V highways, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$557.15, the State to contribute \$3,714.34.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$775.00 for Street Lights.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Wentworth Volunteer Fire Department.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of a Town dump, or for purchasing same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

11. To see if the Town will take any action in regard to buying road maintenance equipment, and raise and appropriate or authorize to borrow a sum of money for the same.

12. To see what action the Town will take relative to playing games of Beano.

13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Common.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to raising and appropriating a sum of money for the Mt. Moosilaukee Health Center.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of one hundredth of one per cent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town together with other towns in the Dartmouth - Lake Sunapee Region Association.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for a filing system for the Town Clerk's records to comply with the State Law.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

This represents 5 percent of our nation's woodlands being wasted each year. Every fire takes its toll. Floods follow; stream flow is affected; timber, buildings, grazing and wildlife are destroyed - all because *many* are *careless* with fire in and near woodland. This can be remedied. *You* can put an end to this shameful waste! *Prevention is your business!*

You, whether *you* be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First - by setting a good example *yourself*-being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second - by using *your* individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden - the law requires it.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning - don't leave it.

3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is *dead out* before leaving it.

4. Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles - make sure they are out - use your ash tray.

5. Don't burn at home - use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Library itself has had a rejuvenation this year. There are over 6,000 volumes and each book has been individually cataloged. A cross reference by authors has been completed and it is hoped to add a cross reference by subject matter. In the selection of books special attention has been given this year to bringing our non-fiction and technical sections up to date in an attempt to provide adequate reference for students and others interested in the sciences. Yearbooks were purchased to supplement the Encyclopedia and they will now be added automatically each year.

One hundred eighty-four books were added this year either by purchase or gift. An effort is also being made to replace the best-read of the older fiction where it is still available. Five magazine subscriptions were placed through the school sales program to give them the benefit of the commission. All subscriptions are being renewed at longer periods to take advantage of the extra discounts.

There were 1,550 adult books, 988 magazines and 455 juvenile books borrowed this year and there were 111 borrowers.

The Historical Room has become a meeting place for committees and small groups. The display cases were dismantled and mounted on the outside walls to clear the floor. Shelves were made for easy display of the exhibits. Twenty-five folding chairs were purchased and the Booster Club presented a gift of two folding aluminum tables. When wiring is completed the light purchased some time ago to be mounted over the Honor Roll plaque will be installed.

The globes on the outside lightposts have been replaced and an attempt will be made to rewire the sockets in order to light them. The sign is being refinished and, weather permitting, it will be rehung.

Bids were received for drilling the well and installing the pump and were awarded to Water Wells, Inc. of Tilton for drilling and to Kenneth Mealy for installation. The total for both contracts was approximately \$900.00. With good water available the plumbing was repaired and replaced where necessary.

The gymnasium was made usable for recreation. Requests for bids to clean the walls are being held until this spring. The Booster Club purchased a folding ping pong table and a game board for use in the gym.

The Boy Scout troop sponsored by the Selectmen and The Teen Canteen sponsored by the Women's Club meet in the gym. The Home Extension Service has held its meetings in the Historical Room. The building is in use for an average of four meetings a week exclusive of the time the Library is open.

The following is a report of the activities conducted by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau Public Nursing, for Wentworth in 1960.

Home visits were made on mothers, infants and preschool children. Appointments have been made for children to attend clinics for diagnosis and treatment. Applications have been sent to N. H. Sight Conservation and accepted. Some children were fitted for glasses.

We regret the closing of the Moosilauke Medical Center in Warren, leaving the town without a resident physician. It is hoped that another doctor will soon be obtained.

Miss Ellen Clough, veteran TB nurse for Grafton County retired Sept. 1, 1960. The work for Grafton County is now covered through the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing.

Chest clinics are to be held twice a year at Plymouth, in cooperation with the N. H. Tuberculosis Assoc., with Dr. Robert Kerr examining physician and Alden XRay Technician, both of the N. H. Tuberculosis Assoc.

Notices will appear in local papers with dates of the clinics and local physicians will be notified. Residents of Wentworth are welcome to attend these clinics. A report will be sent to patient and physician by the nurse following the clinic.

The nurse has an office at 47 Main St., Plymouth.

THE MUSIC PROGRAM IN WENTWORTH

Activities in music for the lower grades have included singing of rote songs and simple reading songs observing whole, half, quarter and eighth notes and corresponding rests. Emphasis has been placed on tone quality in all singing. Singing games and rhythmic movement such as walking, running, skipping and jumping provide physical activity and development of muscular coordination while listening to music of many composers. Quiet listening and the playing of rhythm instruments have also been an important part of our music program.

Upper grades have been singing unison and part songs in many instances correlated with classroom work in other subjects. Rhythm instruments have been used for accompaniment of songs. Students have played song flutes, guitar and melody bells. Square and folk dances have been enjoyed as rhythmic activities. One class tape recorded a program of songs done in the form of a radio program. This was particularly valuable as it provided an opportunity for the children to hear themselves and analyze their own work.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

1960 - 1961

Wentworth Elementary School

Wentworth, N. H.

This school year has been one of activity at Wentworth Elementary School. The students in the middle and upper grades have found the addition of the mathematics and science filmstrips a help in understanding the basic principles of these subject areas. The addition of the 16 mm projector to the school equipment has provided another method of presenting materials in a meaningful manner.

Perhaps one of the most effective means of instruction in the upper grades this year has been the addition of the **Science Kit** which has provided limited equipment for individual science experimentation. These have been in the area of magnetism and electricity, food and minerals, simple machines and power, chemical and physical change, living things, and the earth and the universe.

There has been a continued emphasis upon individual and group research as well as an emphasis upon individual interest in reading. The library, which was set up and developed in a centralized location within the school two years ago, has been encouraged as a source for this emphasis. Low vocabulary, high interest reading books for background in social studies and science have been added to the library this year. Larger, current reference books, an atlas, and several new dictionaries have added to the usefulness of the library.

There has been a continued emphasis upon skill and learning to play together in the gym periods as well as during the supervised play at recess. The basketball backboard, added to the playground last spring, has been a growing source of recreation for the students.

The music program has been under the direction of Mrs. Arline Wilson again this year. Emphasis has been placed upon listening to and singing those songs that will correlate with countries currently being studied in the Social Studies areas. The teachers have appreciated this emphasis.

The new hot lunch program went into effect the second week in December. The boys and girls participating in this program appear to appreciate the hot meal at noon. There has been an average of 25 boys and girls taking the hot lunch this year. From the response of those taking hot lunch, it would appear that additional students will participate in this program another year.

With another year coming to a close, the upper grades are looking forward to May when they will be organizing and producing their own yearbook and preparing for graduation.

The teachers have made special effort to provide activities at all grade levels to assist the students to meet individual needs and attainments in a meaningful manner. This individual emphasis will be continued as time is allowed in the school schedule to encourage and develop the individual student. The ever present question before each teacher is: What is our overall goal? How shall we meet this goal in our everyday schedule?

It has been a privilege and a challenge to work with the 50 boys and girls enrolled at Wentworth Elementary School this year. Together we have moved forward in our activities and studies. We do appreciate the assistance and cooperation of Mrs. Olive Belyea and Miss Gladys Bayley, and the helpfulness and guidance of our Superintendent, Mr. Wayne Bowie.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

When a school in any town is running smoothly and efficiently, there is usually little need for comment and I feel that your school at the present is going along very well.

We were fortunate in having Miss Drew return as Principal and to obtain Miss Bayley in the middle grades room who with Mrs. Belyea completes this year's teaching staff. In my opinion, Miss Drew is doing outstanding work in the upper grade room and Miss Bayley, a teacher with years of experience, is doing a fine job in the middle grade area. Mrs. Belyea as always continues to be a successful teacher.

You will be interested to know that the Elementary School Supervisor for the State of New Hampshire visited your school during the fall and we received very high praise for the work of the teachers, the up-to-date books and equipment as well as the way the school was run.

The start of the lunch program has done a great deal for the school. Equipment and facilities are not yet adequate but things are going along fine and the lunch is very popular with the children. We were most fortunate in being able to secure Mrs. Hutchins as Supervisor of the Program. She is an excellent cook, gets along well with the children and in my opinion is doing a fine job. Although the program has been in operation only a few weeks, when the Federal reimbursement of 5 cents per lunch is included, we are already showing a profit.

The testing program remains the same as in previous years with achievement tests given both in the fall and before school closes in June to evaluate the work

that has been done. The first graders all receive readiness tests in the fall and each two years mental ability tests are administered to children in the 3rd, 5th, and 7th grades.

I have been somewhat concerned about the school water and with the addition of a lunch program, I wonder if the supply is adequate. There have been occasions in the fall particularly when the water was low and I wonder if it is not time to consider an artesian well for the school. With the last payment having been completed on the new room, it might be a good time to consider such a project. The question will doubtless arise in your annual School District Meeting and I am sure you will do what you think is prudent.

I have enjoyed working with you this past year and wish to remind you once again that I am willing to help you in your educational problems any way I can.
