TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Andover on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To vote (official ballot) on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town?"

3. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray the expenses of town government for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same. (Estimate \$6000).

4. To see what action the town wishes to take regarding additions and/or alterations to the town hall, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

5. To raise and appropriate money for highways and bridges under the following items:

- a. General town road maintenance. (Estimate \$10,000).
- b. General highway expenses. (Estimate \$3,500).
- c. Blacktop and asphalt. (Estimate \$3,500).
- d. Town road aid. (Town's share \$683.54).
- e. Street lights. (Present service: White Mt. Power Co., \$700—Public Service Co. for Flaghole lights, \$135).

6. To raise and appropriate money for the protection of persons and property under the following items: a. Police department. (Estimate \$100).

b. Fire department. (Estimate \$2,000).

c. Civil defense expenditures. (Estimate \$100).

d. White pine blister rust. (State requests \$400).

7. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to deed a plot of land in East Andover village to the East Andover Fire Precinct as a site for a fire station.

8. To raise and appropriate money for the care of the cemeteries. (Estimate \$400).

9. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day flags. (Estimate \$50).

10. To raise and appropriate money for the use of the town libraries. (Estimate \$500).

11. To raise and appropriate money for defraying the expenses of the town health department, as follows:

- a. General expenses, which cover dump maintenance, vital statistics and miscellaneous. (Esmate \$200).
- b. Salary of a district nurse. (Present salary \$2,200, plus \$50. monthly car mileage allowance).
- c. Contributions to Franklin and New London hospitals. (\$150 each in 1954).

12. To raise and appropriate money for taking care of the poor, including old age assistance and aid to soldiers and their families. (Estimate \$4,500).

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for continued improvements at the bathing beach at Highland Lake, and to take any action on regulating the use of the beach.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

15. To see what action the voters of the town will take with respect to zoning the precinct or restriction of certain areas for business enterprises. (Included on petition of 18 voters).

16. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SELECTMEN'S SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

It gives us pleasure to report a continued gain in the financial position of the town during 1954. Nearly all net expenditures were kept within authorized appropriations, and the total unexpended balances of all accounts at the year's end exceeded the overdrafts by \$3,324.25.

The December 31st town balance sheet shows a 1954 addition to surplus of \$2,681.60, and a present total surplus of assets over liabilities of \$13,941.63. This in spite of a \$2,000 withdrawal applied on the purchase of the Austin-Western road grader. It must be pointed out that this is not a cash surplus, but represents approximately the amount of unpaid and unredeemed taxes on the books at the end of the fiscal year.

Town Government. We suggest an appropriation of \$6,000 for 1955, a \$200 increase over last year. There will be less election expense in 1955, but off-setting this are three items which we feel demand attention at the Town Hall, regardless of any other action the town may take on additions or alterations to the building. These are (1) shingling the addition over the stage area, (2) a new floor for the stage itself and (3) the purchase of at least two rubber-tired chair carriers for moving our new chairs on and off the hall floor. Unless otherwise instructed we also plan to continue replacement of the old wooden chairs with steel ones.

We wish to commend Donald Crisp for his excellent job of installing the new stage curtain, and the teachers and students of the high school for their work on the floor and ceiling of the main hall.

One unplanned item of expense last year was the purchase of a new Burroughs adding machine for the selectmen's office. The old one finally gave out.

An interim study committee established last spring by the school district has come up with recommendations for alterations and additions at the Town Hall, to give (1) more floor space for basketball and (2) more seating capacity for games and graduations. Your selectmen have been asked to work out definite plans for such changes and to provide an estimate of their cost. We do not know the wishes of the majority of the townspeople on the subject, but do feel that if more room *must* be provided for school athletics and other functions it would be better judgment to spend a few thousand dollars in expanding the present facilities at the town hall than to try to KEEP UP WITH THE JONES' by building a brand new gymnasium at this time.

A plan or plans will be ready for the town meeting discussion, and a place provided in the warrant for such action as the voters may wish to take.

Fire Department. The 1954 town meeting raised \$2,000 for all fire protection under the new plan adopted at that time. Thanks to the cooperation of the East Andover Precinct this was the actual net amount spent. Realizing that its 1954 expenses would be abnormally heavy due to the need for replacing nearly all its fire hose at one time, the East Andover voters authorized a precinct tax of not to exceed \$600 to partly share in this expense and enable the town to keep within the authorized \$2,000.

For the coming year we feel that a continued \$2,000 will be enough to cover normal operating expenses of our two departments and other fire protection items.

East Andover Fire Company has two objectives for 1955, (1) a fire station of its own and (2) building a tank truck to carry about 600 gals. of water. Nearly \$800 is already available for the first project and \$150 earmarked toward the second. The precinct and fire company hope to finance the new fire house without aid from the town. Article 7 in the warrant does ask the town to transfer a plot of town-owned land in East Andover village to the precinct as a site for the building.

Citizens' Fire Company at Andover also has a project to jack up and remodel its fire station to better house and handle the equipment there.

Highways and Bridges. 1954 was not an easy year for road repair and maintenance. We were swimming in

mud much of the time when it would normally be dry, and along in late summer came hurricanes Carol and Edna. Carol caused as estimated damage of about \$2,500 to our town highways.

The Austin-Western road grader was purchased immediately after the 1954 meeting. It has proved a good investment already, but due to the soft condition of many of our roads and ditches it could not be used to best advantage on all of them last summer. A much needed power sander was also purchased for blacktop and winter sanding.

Thanks to Hurricane Carol the road on the east side of Haley Hill was badly washed out. This has since been given a complete widening and face-lifting. We believe this road should now have a surface treatment of more gravel and be black-topped, to end if possible the need for continually repairing washouts.

The Flaghole Road from the Haley Road corner to the Ward Hill blacktop section has been widened and much improved, and the strip of TRA construction running west from the foot of Flaghole Hill received an asphalt top.

1954 TRA funds constructed a new road base from John Jurta's to the top of Marston Hill. Thanks to the willingness of Mr. Jurta to sell gravel from his nearby field this job cost far less than was estimated, leaving enough TRA money to cover all the asphalt used on the Flaghole section. This, plus the almost continuously wet road conditions all summer, accounts for the unspent funds in the blacktop account. This coming summer more surface treatment of some of our older blacktop roads will be called for, and we recommend the same \$3,500 appropriation for backtop.

Health Department. Since last October 18th the town has again had a public health and school nurse in the person of Miss Mary Tricker. Until very recently she has been commuting from her home in Dunbarton, having an office in the home of Mrs. David Heden. She may be called there, or calls left for her, on week days and Saturday mornings. The phone is Andover 50-14. As this report goes to press Dan Cupid has got into the act and Miss Tricker has become Mrs. Wallace (Sam) Clark, but we understand that the office arrangement at Mrs. Heden's will continue for the present.

As no nurse was in sight last spring when the time came to make up the tax list, your selectmen reduced the \$3,800 authorized by the town meeting for a nurse salary and new car to \$1,800, enough to carry through the program from that time on. The old nurse car was sold for \$300, and Miss Tricker is being paid a \$50 monthly mileage allowance to cover the use of her own car while on the job. We feel this will prove more satisfactory than maintaining a town car.

Before Miss Tricker took over the job the Nursing Committee employed Mrs. Della Spiller of New London to make the required health examination in the schools. During last year, and for several years past, members of the committee have given many hours of their time and many miles of travel in carrying out the town health program. The committee has regular monthly meetings, often more, and we feel that its members deserve a great deal of thanks from the town for the unpaid service they have so freely given.

Cemeteries. Members of the highway force have carried on the cemetery work during the past year. A new rotary lawn mower was purchased, the fence at the old church cemetery at East Andover was repaired, and a new fence across the front of the Hobbs Cemetery on Taunton Hill partly constructed.

Libraries. In the not too distance future the residents of the east end of the town will probably be able to enjoy a new library in East Andover village, provided in the will of the late ex-Governor Nahum J. Bachelder. Several provisions in this bequest must first be clarified by the Superior Court, and this section is now pending. When this William Adams Bachelder Public Library becomes a reality the present library at East Andover can be combined with it, and some plan of co-ordination worked out between its trustees and the town library committee. Until that time arrives no change in our present library setup seems called for.

Highland Lake Bathing Beach. Two summers ago, in 1953, there seemed a danger that our beach and parking area at Highland Lake would soon be over-taxed to handle the number of people using it. At the start of the 1954 season your selectmen worked out a plan to handle week-end crowds by making a 25c parking charge on Saturday afternoons and Sundays. Taxpayers and regular residents of the town were asked to purchase 25c season stickers for their automobiles, and all others were charged 25c for each trip to the beach on week ends. It was our hope that this small parking fee would pay for the parking attendant and contribute some additional funds for improving the beach.

Again we did not count on the weather, as only one fair, hot week end occurred during the entire bathing season. On that week end over \$30 was taken in, showing the possibilities of the plan in a normal hot season. After barely breaking even the first month, and then losing money on several consecutive week ends, the plan was dropped as unnecessary for the rest of the season.

We would like the opinion of the townspeople on this matter, and will bring it up for discussion at town meeting. Given a normal, hot summer in 1955 the problem will be back with us again. With a little supervision our parking area will handle 75 or 80 automobiles; without regulation less than half that number parked at random can fill the area so that no more can use it.

Budget Comments. The combined budget of the town and school district calls for a total appropriation of \$80,460.20, which is \$4,793.36 less than the amount raised and appropriated at the 1954 meetings.

The above figures cover only the appropriations which are included in the town and school budgets, which appear separately in this report. Any changes in these amounts voted by either meeting will, of course, increase or decrease the total amount to be raised by taxation. In any case, the amount submitted in the town budget cannot be considered final, as there is no way of determining at this time the amount of the 1955 Merrimack County tax. The figure included in the budget is the amount assessed against the town in 1954.

There is nothing in the budget to cover any additions or alterations to the town hall. Any money voted for this purpose will be an extra, and be reflected in a higher tax rate. No definite estimates on this project are yet available, but a rough estimate of one suggested plan would be \$10,000 to \$12,000.

While we are glad it has happened that way, this is not the time to grow complacent and let down our guard, or to neglect our fire fighting equipment. Like a football or basketball team with a long winning streak, we are bound to suffer a loss sooner or later. When it comes we may be sorry indeed if we are not ready.

The town has a fairly good assortment of hand forest fire tools and Indian back pumps. The main supply is centrally located at Andover Fire Station, with others at the East Andover Station, Proctor Academy and the Ragged Mt. Fish and Game Club.

The Andover and East Andover fire trucks are reasonably well equipped to fight any small forest or grass fires in accessible locations, and each carries a portable pump and $1\frac{1}{2}$ " hose which can be carried in to difficult spots off the highways. Each also carries a booster tank of water for immediate use, as does the Proctor Academy truck also.

Perhaps the greatest equipment need now is a tank truck, for those places where no water is available. The building of such a truck, to carry about 600 gals., is one of the present objectives of the East Andover Company.

Fire fighting equipment is good. We must have it, and maintain it in condition to use at a moment's notice. But better even than all the equipment we can possibly afford is a determination on the part of every citizen to remain acutely fire conscious and to be careful with fire at all times. If we will all do this the need to use our equipment will be greatly diminished. I and my deputy wardens appreciate the support you have all given us whenever we needed it. With that continued support it is our hope that we may be able to keep Andover's fire losses at a minimum again in 1955.

REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

The Andover Civil Defense organization has been tested a number of times this year by various governmental organizations and by a hurricane. The exercise has been good for us.

Our outstanding need is to re-establish the observation post. In order to start someone must be willing to take on the job of Supervisor or Chief Observer.

All Civilian Defense personnel need your support, especially your encouragement, for it is apt to be a discouraging job.

In the early years of Civilian Defense we were concerned mostly with the atom bomb and the possible stream of refugees that would result. Today, with the H bomb, germ warfare, and probable diversionary attacks the chances of direct damage to Andover have been multiplied many times. This makes it necessary for each of us to go over our original plans very carefully.

ANDOVER

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ASSOCIATION

For the first nine and one half months of 1954 the town was without the services of a district nurse, and during that period the nursing committee made other arrangements for carrying on the necessary health work in the public schools.

Early in the year the 1953-1954 examinations of school pupils were made by Mrs. Della Spiller, R. N., of New London, with the help of several members of the committee. Constance Martin, R. N., gave the T. B. patch test in the high school, and Lucille Marshall, R. N., conducted the annual pre-school clinic, which included free physical examinations, vaccinations and immunizations. Twelve children were in attendance.

In addition to regular monthly meetings the nursing committee met twice with the school board and superintendent of schools to co-ordinate school and town nursing.

Arrangements were made with Dr. Frank Livingston of the State Dental Board for Dorothy Powers, dental hygienist, to give sodium fluoride treatment in the grade schools. Ninety-nine pupils and ten pre-school children received this treatment. The only cost for this was lunches for the hygienist. Sale of tooth brushes and some lunches provided by parents kept this small cost very low.

On October 18th Miss Mary Tricker, R. N., became our new town and school nurse. While living in Dunbarton she has an office at David Heden's, where she may be contacted or calls left for her. She is on duty during week days and until noon on Saturdays, and for emergency calls only during the rest of the time. The telephone is Andover 50-14.

The annual rummage sale was held in November. Proceeds have been used for first aid supplies for grade schools, financial aid in the hot lunch program, transportation to clinics, lunches for the dental hygienist, glasses for needy children, and medicine and clothing where necessary.

In January 1955 we consulted with State Nursing Director Florence Clark, R. N., and her assistant, Mildred Matson, R. N., for help in revising our policies to provide more efficient operation of the nursing service.

REPORT OF MARY TRICKER, R. N. PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The following is my report of nursing services rendered during the three months I have been employed by the Town of Andover.

The grammar school children and the high school children have all been weighed and measured. Inspection of hair, teeth, tonsils and eyes have been completed. Five defects in vision were found on examination and these have all been corrected by glasses.

My home visits have been classified as follows:

Visits to the chronic ill	97

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There has been a demand for nursing service for the chronically ill and indigent in the town, and these have been taken care of as the need was made known.

The only communicable diseases which came to my attention were a small outbreak of impetigo in the Village Grammar School at the beginning of the school year. The impetigo has been successfully controlled and no new cases have been seen.

I have made three calls on Sundays and holidays in cases of acute illness or where continuous care was imperative.

The 25th of October I attended, at Concord, an institute on the eye and discovery of common refractive errors. The institute was given under the combined sponsorship of the State Departments of Health, Edution and Welfare. Methods of testing eyes and a criteria for reference were discussed which were a great help to me. On December 17 a program entitled "A Guide for a School Health Program" was held in Keene. At this time we discussed the responsibilities and privileges of the various members of the school community in maintaining the health of our children. A printed manual covering these things is now in the high school.

The first of November all basketball players were examined at the high school by Dr. John Ohler of New London. Those who had not had chest X-rays in the past year were X-rayed at New London Hospital on November thirtieth.

Many articles of clothing were donated to needy townspeople through the efforts of the nursing committee, and appreciation was expressed by those receiving them.

I have enjoyed the work here and would like to thank all of you who have made the hard job of getting adjusted to a new position and people easier.

c. The granting of a right of way to the Kearsarge Telephone Co. across the high school land, said R/W to be a 14 ft. wide strip of land extending from the high school road to the new cement block building located behind Mr. Hamp's used car lot. If granted the telephone company agrees to pay all costs of arranging for legal papers and if a road is built, not to cause any drainage difficulties.

d. The sale of a discarded Walter Turner table saw and motor. Any offers for these items will be accepted by the school board and presented at the March meeting.

11. To conduct any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Andover School District :

In reporting to you this year I would like to say that your schools are, on the whole, in excellent condition. Enrollment at the high school is up and tuition pupils have increased over last year. There is a fine spirit of interest within the student body, a basic core of fundamental courses of instruction available and a capable staff of teachers to direct the learning activities.

Your elementary buildings are filled with children. The schools at East Andover and at the Village are crowded in grades 1 through 3, but you will be able to get over this crucial enrollment period if some redistribution of children is made. Grades 4 to 6 are not too crowded. By assigning some of the third grade pupils to the teachers of grades 4 to 6, the load may be more nearly equalized in terms of numbers. This will be done if need be.

The School Board, in planning with the Superintendent to take care of the elementary enrollment next fall, ruled that it would be best to admit to the first grade only children who would reach the age of 6 years not later than December 31 of the year that they enter school for the first time. Heretofore, the Andover School Board has admitted first graders who might not reach age six until the first of March following entrance in September. This policy allowed children to enter school who sometimes were too young and not ready for the work of grade 1. It is a known fact that children vary widely in their readiness for learning, but in most cases they do not adjust well to school life at first if they are much below age 6 years. It is expected you will have heavy enrollment in the elementary divisions this fall — in fact just about all you can stand with your present housing facilities.

You need to paint your school houses this summer and to make some interior improvements in each building for which your school Board is already making plans.

Your high school is much improved by having the ceiling in the shop partially sound proofed. This has greatly relieved the noise from the shop machinery and made it at least possible for a teacher of a class in the room above to be heard by her pupils. No effective teaching or learning can go on in competition with the shop planer when it roared as it has in the past. The new ceiling has eliminated much of this noise — to the benefit of the other classes.

I hope there will be some action taken in finish grading the high school grounds. It should be done.

I would suggest also that careful study be given to the shop courses, as they presently exist at Andover high school. It is questionable if such a program, with such long class periods, is giving Andover the most for its money. Under the present program of vocational shop work, the class must run for 3 hours every day simply to get a little federal money.

If the work were offered in Industrial Arts, the same instruction could be given, in fact more and better variety could be provided, more boys could take the courses and the matter of scheduling could be far easier. Also, if you continue under the so-called Trades and Industries program, there will have to be more equipment replacement soon. A lot of the machines are worn out and are not now usable until repairs are made. Shop work for boys is not intended to be too strongly vocational — it cannot be in small high schools, because those schools cannot afford the heavy machinery necessarv to make the work valuable. Ninety minute periods, 5 days per week, should be enough. But if a school gets Federal Aid the periods must be twice that long and the emphasis then goes toward a vocational shop rather than a general Industrial Arts Program.

The whole program needs definite study and evaluation by the local School Board, the Superintendent and the State Department of Vocational Education.

I would also like to see some type of instrumental musical training at Andover High School. I feel that the children could profit greatly from such training. If a full-time instrumental specialist were to be used in other areas and shared with Andover it would be a good arrangement. It is money well spent to teach children to play musical instruments — if only to find out whether or not they can play, — and thus open another door of opportunity for them if they have talent.

I have spoken of some things I would like to see done. The people through their support and encouragement of School Board and Superintendent can really get the things they want the schools to offer their children. Working together, we can accomplish worthy achievements.

I want to thank every member of my School Committlee, every teacher on the staff and every individual parent who has helped to make our school year successful.

I look forward to working with you for the educational growth of the children.
