

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31,

On November 19, 1935 twenty of Auburn's progressive citizens met at the Grange Hall to discuss the possibilities of organizing a Volunteer Fire Department. The Chief of Candia V.F.D. was guest speaker and contributed instrumental advice on how to get organized. The Ladies Auxiliary of the Volunteer Fire Department was established the same year. With many more new members, lots of hard work and great enthusiasm by 1936 we had our first homemade truck, which was housed in a leanto, built on the side of the Town Barn. Now thru the efforts of both organizations, and its faithful workers we have the Fire House pictured on the cover of this Town Report. Built with money earned by running card parties, dances, giving minstrel shows, individual contributions, and now each year the Annual Bazaar. Our equipment now consists of Two Trucks - one 800-gal. Tank Truck equipped with a 150-gal. per minute pump, carrying approximately 1500 feet hose., plus a Portable Pump and other fire fighting equipment; Second Truck with 500-gal. per minute pump, carrying 2000 feet of hose.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Auburn, in the County of Rockingham in the said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Auburn on Tuesday, March 11, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First: To bring in your ballots for:

Town Clerk for the ensuing year,
One Selectman for three years,
Tax Collector for the ensuing year,
Town Treasurer for the ensuing year,
Highway Agent for the ensuing year,
One Library Trustee for three years,
One Cemetery Trustee for three years,
One Trust Fund Trustee for three years,
Three Auditors for the ensuing year,
Police Chief for the ensuing year.

At seven o'clock in the evening, the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second: To see if the Town will vote to incur debt for Temporary Loans in the anticipation of taxes.

Third: To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust Funds as may have come in during the Year and Trust Funds as have not been previously accepted.

Fourth: To see if the Town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham fund for schools or library.

Fifth: To see if the Town will vote to maintain a street light on top of knoll on Reading Street.

Sixth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to purchase advertising space in the 1959 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region, or act in relation thereto.

Seventh: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the purchase of Highway Equipment.

Eighth: To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors' Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

Ninth: To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular elections.

Tenth: To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

Eleventh: If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and see if the Town will designate the selectmen to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

Twelfth: To see if the Town will vote to accept the minimum specifications as set forth by the Highway Committee as a requirement for any roads that may be accepted by the Town in the future.

The Highway Committee recommends the following:

1. Fifty foot right of way and a deed of the right of way to be recorded.

- 2. Twenty foot minimum width of road, with a minimum 12 inches depth of gravel, properly graded and drained.
- 3. If said road to be accepted is a dead end, an adequate turn around shall be provided for the proper manipulation of all Town equipment.

Thirteenth: To see what action the Town will take in regards to having the following officers elected or appointed.

- 1. Highway Agent.
- 2. Tax Collector.
- 3. Chief of Police.

Fourteenth: To see if the provisions of Chapter 287 of Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of beano in this Town. (Vote on Official Ballot.)

Fifteenth: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Sixteenth: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Polls will open at 10:00 o'clock A. M. and close at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

REPORT FROM THE ZONING BOARD

The Zoning Board has tried to fill the obligations of their office to the best of their ability and to the best interests of the town. We have all put a great deal of time and effort into planning out the town and arrived at the conclusion that the town divided as it is by the Lake, it was impossible to make specific zones for residential, business, and industrial areas. We felt it had to be left to the discretion of the board members to decide on the best interests of the town with each application filed.

All applications filed to date have been given the utmost consideration and we have tried to be fair in all decisions. To date the only applications we have refused have been for buildings not in accordance with the surrounding area and motor vehicle junk yards.

We would like to state clearly why we have done so. The surrounding towns have adopted or are in the process of adopting zoning laws and they all have ordinances banning junk yards. This has caused us to receive numerous applications to establish junk yards in Auburn. We are proud of our town and know that the majority of the people are too. Therefore, we feel that Auburn should not be the junk yard for this territory. It will reduce the value of the adjacent property and cause fire hazards.

We also have to look to the future in granting permits for what may appear to be a remote piece of property today may be a thickly settled area of the future. This explains the boards reluctance to issue any permits that would lower the standard of living. The board is always open for suggestions that would improve the town and will continue to work to the best of their ability to keep Auburn a good place to live in.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE

The Committee chosen at the School District Meeting March 8, 1957 held joint meetings with the School Board and the Superintendent until several workable plans were developed.

On May 22, 1957 the first public meeting was held at the Severance School at which time the various plans were submitted to those present.

Following the meeting at Severance a similar meeting was held at the Town Hall on May 24, 1957.

At both meetings the sense of those present was overwhelmingly in favor of a centralized school at the Village location.

Subsequently the Joint Committee on May 31, 1957 requested of the Budget Committee an appropriation up to \$65,000.00 This amount was approved and voted by the Budget Committee.

The adjourned School District Meeting reconvened on June 7, 1957, approved and accepted the recommendations of the Joint Committee.

The School District meeting re-elected the committee and requested its cooperation with the School Board and the Superintendent during the construction period.

Construction bids were requested with twelve General Contractors responding.

The award was made to Ralph Nay Construction Company of Nashua, New Hampshire who was low bidder at \$57.984.00

Very substantial savings were affected through direct purchase by the School District of Electrical Fixtures and Tile Flooring.

Additionally the Superintendent and the Board with the full approval of the Committee took advantage of price situations and purchased furniture, equipment for the kitchen and other items at very low costs.

The Bond issue, subjected to bids from five financial institutions was awarded to the low bidder, The First National Bank of Boston at 3.75%.

Throughout the construction period the Committee, the School Board and the Superintendent worked in close harmony, meeting at regular intervals at the site observing progress to the conclusion of construction.

REPORT OF THE HELPING TEACHER

Much of the work of the helping teacher during the present year has been in the area of curriculum development. Much of the work done in the summer was in the social studies area of the middle and upper elementary grades. This was in preparation for meeting with teachers to clarify and strengthen the program. The proposed changes and developments are not vast ones to be easily noticed, but rather of a type to strengthen the program which has been adopted. One project that is noticed by the pupils is in the fourth grades of the union. In this grade, there is a study of New Hampshire, but there is a lack of suitable material for pupil use. Material was presented to the teachers by the helping teacher, meetings were held to discuss it, and then each of the teachers having fourth grade youngsters took a section to develop. This, with the material on additional topics that were suggested, has been developed by the group and resulted in a duplicated booklet of approximately fifty-five pages for pupil use in each of the fourth grade rooms of Supervisory Union No. 10.

Another activity started during the summer was a rather thorough study of the results of the standardized tests given in our schools. The findings show that our average is about that of the national figure. However, as in most school systems, there is still some need for additional attention to the needs of pupils at each end of the ability scale. An action of the community at the last Town Meeting should help this situation. Teachers having a single grade will be able to do more with individual youngsters.

During the school year, the curriculum work has continued. Efforts have been made to locate materials to aid in the presentation of various units in the grades and to get the materials listed for the teachers. Most of each school day is spent in the schools of the union with an effort being made to aid teachers requesting help with specific problems, but some time is spent in visits to all classrooms.

Enrollments

There was practically no change in the total enrollment. The figures are 223 in 1958 compared to 221 in 1957. There is however, approximately a 7½% increase in the actual enrollment as of January 15th. We have 219 pupils compared to 206 last year. There are 33 more pupils in grades 1-4 than in grades 5-8. There are 31 pupils per grade in 1-4 and only 23 in grades 5-8. This average continued would resull in an enrollment of 250. The building program was not undertaken any too soon for it could accommodate such an increase.

The typographical error in the high school enrollment figures for the last year would mislead unless a correction were made. The figures actually should have indicated that the total enrollment was 38 rather than 75. In light of the corrected figure the current enrollment of 47 is a large increase. With high school tuition figure increasing and the number of students also increasing the problems of high school tuition costs and high school enrollment are going to be problems that will be present for some time to come. In recognition of the problem the school board has

included an article to begin checking on possible solutions of our secondary problem. Such a study may lead to a permanent solution of the problem of secondary education for the town.

Personnel

The unfortunate death of Miss Margaret Cronin just prior to her retirement took one of the most loyal and conscientious employees of the district. Her knowledge of the community and its people was of great value in meeting the health problems of the school community. It was very difficult to replace her for her work was done in three school unions. At last through a reorganization within our own union Mrs. Rae Sives of Londonderry was engaged to work in the four towns, Auburn, Chester, Londonderry and Windham. This was the only change in personnel at the union level. The fact that all other personnel remained is of great value in continuing and improving the services of the union staff to the children of the district.

There was one change and two additions to the teaching staff. Mrs. Marjorie Benz succeeded Mr. Gerald Weibel. Mrs. Mary Spaulding and Miss Sonia Markarian were the additional staff members. All were either experienced teachers or graduates of accredited institutions.

In the face of current conditions the district is fortunate that its geographical location has made it possible to secure qualified and experienced personnel. The position of the community and the state has weakened in the past year. It has been weakened because the average salaries paid in Maine and Vermont is approaching the average salary paid in New Hampshire. The reason that this is true is the fact that the legislative bodies in both states adopted state wide salary schedules. A table of the average salaries paid in the New England States will point out why the competitive position of the state and community are weakened.

The average for the current year in the district is \$3,358.70. The figure reveals the weakened competitive position of the district.

There are other factors that are helpful in the present situation. The factors that are most helpful locally are the geographical location and improved working conditions.

The present school plant is one of the most modern and educational sound buildings for communities similar to Auburn. Teachers will and do enjoy working in such a building with educational tools and single grades of a workable size. In addition the tools that make teaching an interesting and challenging process are made available in sufficient quantity to make it possible for children to advance at an optimum rate. These factors are part of the attractiveness of a teaching position in the district.

The status of the teacher too has been improved in the community and the state. People everywhere are beginning to recognize the worth and value of teachers in the lives of pupils and also accepting them as human personalities with the problems and feelings of humans. With the improvement in the teachers status there is hope that we can with additional financial support in teachers salaries carry on successfully in the face of increased competitive bidding for the services of good teachers.

Finances

The gross expenditures show an increase of \$16,139.52. Three areas are primarily responsible for this increase.

Debt and interest are responsible for a \$7,293.75 increase. This is, of course, due to the expansion program and is the beginning of the payment of the new school debt.

High School tuition has increased by \$6,150. This is due to the increase in both high school tuition rate and number of pupils. This is one of the areas which are a legal responsibility of the district that must be met. The total anticipated expenditures in this area is \$24,000. The other increase is due to an increased share of the nurse's salary because of increased equalized valuation.

Teachers salaries and retirement account nearly \$3,500.00 of the increase. These three items are responsible for all the increase in the budget for all other items of increase are more than counter balanced by decreases in other budgetary areas.

The increase in the equalized valuation also resulted in a decrease in the amount of state aid. The combined result of an increase in anticipated expenditures and decrease in revenue results in an increase of \$20,000, in the levy.

The special articles are designed to meet requests of district residents and improve the school situation for the children of the district.

The concern of parents and residents of the district to make an educationel opportunity equal to any in the area, through facilities, staff and educational supplies creates an opportunity for the supervisory staff and the school board to meet the needs of the pupils of the district. It is a pleasant experience to work under such conditions.
