

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bath qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bath on Tuesday, March 14, 1944, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, one or more Highway Agents, and all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To hear the reports of officers and agents heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the town officers' salaries and expenses, for repairs, maintenance and construction of highways and bridges, for the support of the town library, for Old Age Assistance and the support of the Town Poor, for the observance of Memorial Day and Old Home Day, and for all necessary town charges and expenses for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$299.70.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$100

for the Town's share of cooperative participation in the White Mountains Region Association.

- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for a dental clinic in the schools of the town.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway on the easterly side of the Wild Ammonoosuc river from the former site of Wilson Bridge, so-called, to the farmyard of the Joseph Andrews farm.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 2% on 1944 property taxes paid in full on or before July 3, 1944.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the delivery of inventory blanks until April first.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired through the tax collector's deed.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Miss Marion Morse was elected to succeed Miss Elaine Roy as headmistress at the high school. Miss Morse is a graduate of Mt. Holyoke College and has completed her master's degree at Columbia.

Miss Helen Rafferty is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and is specially trained in teaching social studies.

The enrollment at Bath High School is seven at the time of writing. The per pupil cost of high school education at this school is again excessively high. The high school budget of \$3,794 will be expended by the end of the year. This means that the per pupil cost will be in excess of \$500 per pupil.

The staff in the grade school is the same as last

year.

A course in Human Behaviour was added this year. The district should consider the employment of a music supervisor for the coming year. Four other districts in the union are now employing a supervisor, who could be brought into this district for part of one day each week. This would add a great deal to the program in both the elemnetary and the high school. This instruction would cost the district two or three hundred dollars.

The roof was shingled early in the fall.

The high school room upstairs was plastered during the Christmas vacation.

Various other minor repairs have been made throughout the year.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the school board, teachers, and citizens for their cooperation during the past two years.

### BATH HIGH SCHOOL

Preparing young people for real life is the acknowledged aim of education today. All the resources of the community are being drawn on to realize this aim for the young people of Bath. We want them to be self-reliant, cooperative citizens who appreciate their parts in local, national and world affairs. They should know how to lead as well as to follow.

The sciences, social studies, mathematics and English offered in the curriculum this year are chosen and taught so that they will apply to every-day living. At the same time we emphasize methods of study and standards of scholarship in order to prepare the students for further study.

The pupils are organized in a school club which makes it possible to do their business in regularly accepted ways. Their meetings are conducted in parliamentary form. They serve on committees, hold office and are responsible for selling defense stamps, conducting the various "drives" and holding social affairs. The small membership of the school makes it necessary that every student have a responsible part in each undertaking. This assures progress for each in development of ability and social understanding. Besides the practical value of this training, it should give a background for the appreciation of current events and present problems as related to history. Social studies lessons emphasize these with the purpose of broadening the students' outlook.

A program of guidance is a feature of the education being offered this year. The problems of each individual are studied and such advice and direction as seems needed are given. These problems include matters of health, proper use of time, personality or character development, choice of vocation and plans for further training after the high school course.

There are some problems which remain to be met in the future. It is much to be desired that we develop a "physical fitness" program of games, exercise and health instruction. We lack coordination with medical service and a place where this work can be done. We need cooperation and leadership from some young man.

Also it is most desirable that the school have closer touch with the parents and patrons of the school.

Some important improvements have been made on the building since summer. The next step, I believe, is some kind of organization of parents and patrons. Such an organization would help the teachers develop the resources of the community so that the experiences of the students in school would be more helpful toward fitting them for the life which is before them.

Miss Katherine Keniston, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College, who has had several years experience at Lyme, N. H., replaces Miss Barbara Jeffrey at the Pettyboro school. Miss Jeffrey accepted a single grade position at Lisbon.

Mrs. Barbara Jones was elected as teacher at the Carbee school. Mrs. Jones replaced Miss Julia Louise Paulsen, who accepted a position in Pennsylvania. Mrs. Mary Ashley succeeded Mrs. Jones on January 1. Mrs. Ashley is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College and has had several years of experience in other parts of the state.

Mrs. Katherine Robb was engaged as music supervisor in the Bath Town School District this year. She spends one day each week in our three schools at Swiftwater, Pettyboro, and Carbee.

This change in our program has brought about a marked improvement in this phase of our instructional program. An organ has been presented to the Pettyboro school and a piano to the Carbee school. These additions have also helped in the development of a successful music program.

The district should eventually purchase a piano for the Swiftwater school.

There are now 20 pupils at Swiftwater, as compared with 11 on the same date last year. This increase in enrollment has been partly brought about by the closing of the Nutter school.

The enrollment at Carbee is 17, as compared with 13 on the same date last year.

Pettyboro has an enrollment of 11, which is one less than the enrollment at the same time last year.

Because of the low enrollment at Pettyboro, the town is not receiving state aid on the operation of that school. This means that our state aid allotment is not as large as it might be if the pupils were transported to another school. Ordinarily, when the enrollment of a rural school drops below 12, state aid is not allowed on the operation of the school, but state aid is allowed on the transportation of those pupils to another school. It is not probable that we will again obtain state aid on the operation of this school. Present indications are that the enrollment will be 9 next year.

Inasmuch as the Pettyboro school is the only school not yet wired for electricity, the school board has investigated the possibilities of having electric lights installed in this school. It has been found possible to have this work done.

The priority rating given to schools is sufficiently high for us to secure the necessary materials, even during this war time period.

There is some uncertainty in regard to the operation of this school another year, and therefore the board has decided not to do anything about wiring the school until late in the summer. At this time we will know more about the prospective enrollment and about the teacher situation.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the school board, teachers, and citizens for their cooperation during the past two years.
