




To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bridgewater in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Bridgewater on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March, next to act upon the following subjects:

Polls to be open from 11 A.M. to 6 P.M.

Business Meeting at 8 P.M.

1. To choose a Selectman for three (3) years and all other necessary Town Officers.

2. To choose a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

3. To vote on the question "Shall sweepstakes tickets be sold in this town?"

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$425.12 for T.R.A., provided that the State contributes the sum of \$2,834.14.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the cost of a program of revaluation of the taxable property in Bridgewater for the ensuing year.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to remove from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established in 1961, for the purchase of a Grader.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to supplement the amount under Article 4 for the purchase of a Grader.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Town Garage to be used for the storage of the Forest Fire Truck and off season highway equipment.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Current Expenses during the ensuing year, as estimated in the Budget, except Highways and Bridges.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Construction on Highways for the ensuing year.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,938.69 for payment of principal and interest on long term notes.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

Financial Condition:

Close of fiscal 1963 finds the town in good financial condition. Last year's deficit of \$1,305.64 is down to \$204.98. Balances due on truck notes are \$1,000 on the G. M. C. and \$1,548.69 on the Jeep. It was possible to hold the tax rate to \$4.00 the same as the previous year without borrowing funds for the bridge job on the East side of Town.

Summary of Findings and Recommendations

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Bridgewater for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets:

December 31, 1962 — December 31, 1963: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1962 and December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$2,100.66 in 1963.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

*Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues:
(Exhibit A-3 and A-4)*

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$908.02, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$175.24, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,083.26.

*Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:
(Exhibit B-1)*

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1963, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit F)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1963, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit F.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by

source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

General Comments

Current Deficit:

The current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) was reduced by \$1,100.66, from \$1,305.64 to \$204.98, in 1963, as shown herewith:

Highway Department:

Highway expenditures were at an all time high for the past year primarily as a result of the unusual snow condition last winter. Breakdowns on the old 4-wheel drive pickup necessitated more than usual equipment hire.

Equipmentwise the department is in very good condition except for the Hueber Maintainer. Now approximately 16 years old, it is both difficult and expensive to keep in repair. After careful consideration of this problem we recommend that a portion of the money now in the Captial Reserve Fund be withdrawn and a small appropriation be authorized to allow the purchase of a used grader. This should be one of the small size machines but larger than the Hueber and if possible equipped with a snow wing. Several of these units are now on the market in the \$2,500 to \$3,500 price range. We feel that the amount of use for this machine does not warrant the purchase of new equipment.

We are also of the opinion that the town meeting should provide funds for a building to shelter equipment not in actual use. This includes snow plows during the summer months, and the grader and York rake during the winter months. We suggest that such a building be erected on land now owned by the town near the Grange Hall.

Two improvement projects authorized by the Town Meeting were carried out in 1963. After careful consideration and study the bridge building firm of Curtis Mooney & Son were awarded a contract to replace the wood bridge with a concrete structure near the Tucker residence on the east side of town.

On the Whittemore Point Road near the Curley residence a hazardous situation was relieved by lowering

the grade and straightening a curve in the road. The original plan of improving about 350 feet of road was enlarged to include 630 feet. This has been graded and graveled with a minimum of work necessary to prepare it for surfacing.

We feel that an annual appropriation should be made for the next few years to improve or rebuild certain sections of the Whittemore Point Road and that section of the road between Route 3A and the Town Dump. While it is possible to ask for T. R. A. funds for rebuilding purposes it does not seem advisable to halt construction on the road now in progress. Our older roads are now beginning to show the strain of many years of travel, especially those portions which were not well constructed. It would seem that a well planned program of repairs and improvement is in order at this time, and, in view of this an article has been inserted in the warrant.

Fire Department:

Despite the hazardous conditions during the fall, which were considered to be the worst in 60 years, we had no Forest Fires during the year. One building fire required a call to the Bristol Fire Department, and the town will be reimbursed for the cost of suppressing the fire on the Power Line construction near the river.

Considerable progress was made on the State Truck during the past year. A rotary pump was installed with piping arrangement for two suction inlets, two outlets for 1½" hose, a booster connection, and provision for filling the 275 gal. tank directly from the pump. A booster reel will be installed with a capacity of 150 feet of booster hose.

Purchase of 250 feet of 1½" double jacket hose will allow Deputy Warden Jenness to have at his house the Pacific Marine pump for use in emergency.

Completion of the Tilton Brook project during the coming year will contribute still more to the fire defense of the community.

Town Dump:

The problem of refuse from out of town was solved to a large extent by erecting a sign forbidding this practice. However, more than the usual amount of brush, due largely to last winters storm, required more bulldozing and care. We appreciate the fact the brush was deposited on the dump rather than attempting to burn it on the spot thereby exposing adjacent property to fire danger.

Revaluation:

We have asked for an appropriation in the warrant to enable the Selectmen to start on a program for the complete revaluation of the Town. In order that this may be done in an efficient manner the Selectmen will have to examine each property, measuring land and computing square footages of the buildings, conduct research of recent sales to establish current values. As the inventory of the taxable property in the town now consists of 577 parcels of real estate it can be realized that a large amount of extra time will be required.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American traditions of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience — a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump—it's safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a

year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.

4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Let's all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The formation of the Newfound Area School District will, on July 1, 1964, mean the end of the Bridgewater School District, as such. It will then become a part of a larger district, all of whose voters will be vitally concerned with the education of all of the children. The success of our endeavors will be governed to a large degree on their interest and participation in the government of the larger district.

As far as the present school year is concerned, we have made changes in the two areas of the school curriculum which should benefit the pupils. We have started the use of "Modern Mathematics" in the lower grades. This is basically a new approach to the old problem of teaching the concept of numbers, and to get pupils to think correctly about them and to know more about reasoning with them.

We have also introduced a new method of learning to read. Based on phonics, it will result in a child having a larger vocabulary, greater speed in reading, and a better understanding of what he reads.

I want to thank the members of the school board with whom I have worked, as well as the teachers. Their interest in the welfare of the children and their cooperation with me are deeply appreciated.
