TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline in the
County of Hillsborough in the said State,
qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Hall in said Town of Brookline on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative to same.
4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.
8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing.
9. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on taxes.
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to charge a twenty cent penalty on each Poll Tax remaining unpaid after September first, or take any action relative thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for necessary equipment and replacements for the Fire Department.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Aid for permanent improvement of highways or take any action relative thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Melendy Pond property, also known as the Town Forest, or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from the Mary R. French Estate the income to be used for perpetual care of the John French lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

16. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to increase the existing Capital Reserve Fund for Repairs to the Town Hall.

17. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund for Town Road Maintenance.

18. To see what sum the Town will vote to transfer from the unencumbered surplus for the purpose of increasing the existing Capital Reserve Fund for Repairs to the Town Hall.

19. To see what sum the Town will vote to transfer from the unencumbered surplus for the purpose of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund for Town Road Maintenance.

20. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance on the Town Hall.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$575.00 as a deficiency appropriation for the Averill Road Bridge.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract for Snow Removal, or take any action relative thereto.

23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract for janitor service at the Town Hall, or take any action relative thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of the old fire engines or take any action relative thereto.

25. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to establish a dump on the town land on the Mason Road in North Brookline or what action the Town will take relative thereto.

26. To see if the Town will vote to observe during the month of August, 1949, the 50th Anniversary of Old Home Week and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$59.00 to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in co-operation with the 37 other communities in this Region.

28. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Brookline:

I herewith present my tenth annual report, the thirtieth in the series. It not only consists of the statements immediately following, but many of the other, statistical and financial, which are combined in this School Report. I commend them to you as worthy of your careful reading and study.

1. School Calendar

I desire to call attention to the school calendar printed elsewhere. Under a ruling of the State Board of Education, schools must be in session a full thirty-six weeks or 180 school days. Institute Days and Teachers' Convention are counted toward the 180 and up to five more days may be counted for approved workshop for teachers. All other days lost must be made up. Without workshop time counted, the normal school year must be 177 days of teaching.

During the course of a year, I hear many remarks about the early opening in September, too short a vacation at Christmas, the late closing in June, going to school on this rainy day and no holiday for Columbus Day. I am certain many of these questions would be answered if you took a calendar and, starting with Labor Day, marked off the school days possible to June 15th. This, considering the first paragraph above, allows but few days before the end of June to make up days lost.

2. Teachers

A. You will note from the list of teachers printed elsewhere that the staff is again new this year and has been reduced from three to two teachers. Mrs. Scully transferred to Mont Vernon and was succeeded by Mrs. Eulalie F. Cogswell, formerly of Nashua. Miss Devlin transferred to Portsmouth and Mrs. Lena Walker of Nashua was chosen in her place. Mrs. Burton's posi-

tion was abolished by the changes made, whereby the 7th and 8th were transferred to Nashua.

So the teaching staff changes and the need for more teachers becomes greater.

B. Need I call your attention to the shortage of teachers, especially in the Elementary field? The situation grows worse with each added year and now is so acute that only about one-tenth of qualified candidates are available for grade-school positions. The remaining nine-tenths must come from the ranks of the lesser qualified, from former teachers returning to help during the emergency, from re-training high school teachers, from closings and consolidations of schools and even from willing volunteer workers with little or no training beyond high school. This school department needs to know prospective candidates now, if all services are to be continued next year. You are asking for more and better schools. We would like to give them to you but the personnel is not available. Will you help?

For long-term planning, there should be one candidate going to a teacher training institution for every 120 pupils in your school system. These should be in the ratio of three candidates for elementary work to every one for secondary work.

C. Closely akin to the above is the subject of salaries. Some of our citizens point to the increase in salaries over the past years as equal to and greater than the cost of living increase. Others say teachers are not paid enough and their working conditions are poor, that they receive poor salaries and suffer unjust demands on the part of the public that they have to be different from workers in other employment and have to have more training. To me, both groups are honest in their thinking and are correct in part; however, that doesn't produce teachers when we need them. What should we pay? What can we afford?

The teaching profession has said that the minimum salary for a fully qualified teacher should be at least \$2,400 per year. The maximum should be approximately twice that sum. Not a budget in this Union meets this minimum or the maximum.

3. Improvements

The biggest improvement has been in the opening of the new room at the Daniels Academy Building. This new room, housing grades 1-3, was made from the former quarters of the Library by removing a partition, adding new fluorescent lights, blackboards and redecorating. A new entrance to the cloakroom corridor and toilets was added, and wash bowl and drinking fountain installed in this room and in the other schoolroom. The former corridor from the front entrance to the schoolroom was blocked off by a door in order to provide cloakroom space for the new room as well as an entrance and waiting room for the Selectmen's quarters. The former ticket office now serves as a supply room for the schools.

It is my opinion that the Committee has done an excellent job in making the changes. My only regret is that funds were not available to put in modern furniture in this new room.

I hope the side entrance corridor and toilet rooms may be redecorated this next summer.

4. Appreciations.

I am very grateful to the serious and honest thought the School Board has given to school problems. They have spent much extra time this year—what with added problems of extra enrollment, teacher shortage, new building plans, and the consolidated school study.

I am very appreciative of the efforts of every teacher to improve the work of his pupils. The cooperation this year has been splendid, morale — good.

I would not forget the parents and pupils. This has been a busy and profitable year. Your interest has been

keen and helpful. To the new Parent-Teacher Association, I express my sincere hope for a successful career. This organization can and, I hope, will prove a most valuable adjunct to the school.
