TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, County of Carroll in the State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kennett High School Auditorium at Conway, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, the 4th day of March, 1975, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 will be by official ballot, and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon. The remaining articles of the warrant shall be acted upon at 7:00 in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keep the polls open to a later hour.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750,000.00 and to borrow and hire said money in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act subject to a minimum guarantee of 50 per cent reimbursement from E.D.A., or other Federal agencies. Proceeds of this bond issue to be used exclusively to provide betterments to proposed industrial park to be located on Route 302, Center Conway, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ralph Grindle and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160,000.00 for a new Police Headquarters, construction to commence in 1975, and to borrow and hire said money in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act. Agreeable to a petition signed by Paul D. Whetton and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 and to borrow and hire said money in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act for the purchase of the Bean property on Route 16 to be used as the location of a new Police Headquarters. Agreeable to a petition signed by Paul D. Whetton. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Conway Police Commission and to return their powers to the Conway Board of Selectmen and the Conway Town Manager. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mark Hounsell and others.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt absentee voting for all future town meetings. Said absentee voting shall cover the election of officers and ballot articles only. Agreeable to a petition signed by Stephen M. Duprey and others.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes: Section

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 (Twenty thousand dollars) as the Town's share for the construction of a bridge over Lucy Brook on River Road. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$86,000.00 (Eighty-six thousand dollars) for the reappraisal of all real estate within the Town, said reappraisal to commence during the calendar year 1975 and to be completed as soon as is practicable. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rate reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following ordinance pursuant to Chapter 466 of the Revised Statutes Annotated to be called "Conway Leash Ordinance:"

Any dog found runnning at large without a license and collar may be disposed of if after ten days such dog is unclaimed. No dog shall run at large or in other ways make a nuisance of itself within the Town of Conway. Any dog found violating this ordinance may, at the discretion of the Police Chief of the Town of Conway, be impounded or otherwise restrained at the expense of the owner of said dog.

Any person, who is the owner or keeper of any dog, who shall cause or allow the same to be in violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and shall be fined a sum not exceeding \$10.00 (Ten dollars).

And further to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (One thousand dollars) to defray the costs incurred by the enforcement of this ordinance. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the North Conway Day Care Cen-

ter. Agreeable to a petition by Thomas C. Roden and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (One thousand dollars) to help defray the expenses of the Water Safety Program as carried on by the Conway Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by George W. Reny and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 as the Town of Conway's participation in the White Mountains Region Association. Agreeable to a petition signed by Herbert E. Hall, Jr. and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to limit the height of buildings within the Town of Conway to forty (40) feet above ground level. Agreeable to a petition signed by Raymond E. Lowd and others.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for the purpose of installing dry hydrants at selected locations mutually agreed upon by the fire departments operating within the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Raymond E. Lowd and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for the purpose of installing a water fountain in the Conway Village Park by the covered bridge. Agreeable to a petition signed by Golden M. White and others. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for Memorial Hospital, North Conway, N. H. Agreeable to a petition signed by Arthur F. Brown, Jr. and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 to assist the Conway Village Recreation Commission and the North Conway Community Center; \$6,000,00 to the Conway Village Recreation Commission and \$6,000.00 to the North Conway Community Center. Said sums to be allocated to the Conway Village Recreation Commission and the Board of Directors, North Conway Community Center. Agreeable to a petition sign-

ed by Briggs H. Bunker and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to help defray the expenses of the Fourth of July Parade and Fireworks in North Conway as sponsored by North Conway Post No. 95. The American Legion; the total cost of which is about \$2,500.00. Said American Legion Post to pay the balance of the cost and to make no general appeal for contributions for this purpose. Agreeable to a petition signed by Donald F. White-law and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 21. In the event Article 3 has been approved by the voters, and Article 4 has not been approved by the voters, to see if the voters will vote to approve one of the other two sites considered by the Police Headquarters Facilities Committee; namely, the Town owned land at the junction of Route 302 and the East Conway Road, known as Meeting House Hill, and the Town owned land in Center Conway adjacent to the Town Garage. Agreeable to a petition signed by Paul D. Whetton and others.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to study the feasibility of the construction of an ice arena, ascertain what Federal and/or State aid is available and report its findings and recommendations at the next annual Town Meeting; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the promotion of this study. Agreeable to a petition signed by Dana A. Haley and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purpose of financing a Town of Conway American Revolution Bicentennial Celebration during the year 1976 – this sum to be added to the Trust Fund of \$7,500.00 voted to be raised and appropriated for this purpose at the 1973 Town Meeting, of which a sum not to exceed \$6,000.00 was to be made available to the permanent five-man Fourth of July Parade Committee of the North Conway Post No. 95, American Legion Committee, for entering into contract on behalf of the Town of Conway with musical marching units necessary for a celebration on July 4, 1976; all details as to how this sum is to be used to be decided upon by the permanent Bicentennial Committee. Agreeable to a petition signed by Helen E. Nute and others. Submitted without recommendation by th Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for proper drainage on Colbath, Cot-

tage and Kennett Streets in Conway Village. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert H. Bray and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,783.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc. 1975. Agreeable to a petition signed by Pamela T. Fisher and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,304.30 for the Valley View Road for drains and culverts. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mrs. George Steward and others. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,680.00 for the Home Health Agency, the said sum being equal to \$1.00 per person, and authorize withdrawal of that sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kenneth Dole and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the maintenance of the old cemeteries in the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jonathan Tibbetts, Sr. and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to appoint three persons to represent the Town of Conway on a steering committee, said committee to research and draw up in cooperation with other towns in the valley an overall plan for future use and regulation of the Saco River and major tributaries in Conway. This plan would take into account economic, recreational, asthetic and environmental values and would be subject to Town approval at a future regular or special Town Meeting, and to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to defray expenses incurred by said committee. Agreeable to a petition signed by Chester B. Lucy and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be divided between the Chambers of Commerce in both Conway and The Mount Washington Valley, with \$1,500.00 going to the Conway Chamber of Commerce and \$1,500.00 going to the Mount Washington Valley Chamber of Com-

merce. Agreeable to a petition signed by John D. Stevens and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to partially defray the operating expenses of the Eastern Slope Regional Airport located in Fryeburg, Maine. Agreeable to a petition signed by Francis Deasy and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$135.00, in addition to the sum of \$165.00 heretofore raised and appropriated in the Town budget, to cover increased expenses in marking and decorating graves of Veterans for Memorial Day exercises. Agreeable to a petition signed by Arthur E. Hale and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the New Hampshire Housing Commission to operate in the Town, to sponsor a project under Section 8 of the U. S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended to assist elderly and low-income families and in aid thereof adopt the following resolution:

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Conway as follows: That the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Conway. That said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project, under Section 8 of the U. S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, for any of the following dwelling accommodations or a combination thereof: (a) existing standard housing: (b) rehabilitated housing, (c) newly constructed housing, the total amount of the foregoing not to exceed fifty dwelling units.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town such sums of money as may be needed, such sums not to exceed the combined School, Town and County tax budget, in anticipation of taxes for Town, County and School purposes.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Conway applied for, received and expended.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell all real estate in the Town to which the Town has title by Tax Collector's Deed, all such real estate to be sold and conveyed on or before December 31, 1975.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provision of RSA Chapter 162-G – acquisition, development and disposal of Industrial land and facilities.

ARTICLE 38. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

During the year 1974 no big new projects were either planned or instituted. The energy crisis and economic conditions have indicated this should be a time for consolidation and for reappraisal of our priorities, as well as one for attempting at the Municipal level to strive for increased efficiency within the framework of our existing structure.

With this in mind, your Selectmen have primarily directed their attention and efforts in this direction. Coping with greatly increased costs for materials and services has required the attention and cooperation of each and every employee of the Town. It is with gratification we report this attention and cooperation has been forthcoming. For this reason and this reason alone, we have been able to operate within the confines of our budget and, in fact, have been able to return a modest surplus to you. We have balanced our budget for the year 1974, and have presented to the Budget Committee and to you a budget for the forthcoming year which we believe represents a minimum increase in this period of high inflation. We have also made significant reductions where possible while maintaining the responsibilities entrusted to us.

For example, when you study the budget contained in this report you will note that reductions have been made in several categories and in other categories the same amount or only a slightly higher amount has been requested for this year. You will also note, requested appropriations for items that are not strictly municipal are contained under special articles. This has been done so that you may see more clearly what you are spending your money for. The total requested for Municipal items for this year is \$849,212.05, this represents an increase of 11 per cent over the previous year. You will also note that under debt service the requested appropriation is significantly higher than was requested last year. This reflects debt service on the Swift River Bridge bonds of \$16,000.00 for principal and \$21,250.00 for interest. We were fortunate in negotiating, with the aid of our bankers, a twenty year bond issue at 5 per cent to pay for the bridge. These bonds were placed with the Farmers Home Administration. Finally, you should note that total special articles are slightly in excess of 1.25 million dollars. This amount includes petitioned bond requests for \$940,000.00. Revenue Sharing is also contained in the special articles. We anticipate we will have approximately \$150,000.00 on hand by the close of this year. This includes both principal and interest earned from investment and will be used to reduce taxes, if you approve. We are currently receiving \$20,024.00 quarterly under the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Whether or not the Revenue Sharing program will be continued is a matter of some conjecture at this moment.

It should be reported that total real estate valuation increased last year in the amount of $3\frac{1}{2}$ million dollars. An increase of $1\frac{1}{2}$ million dollars in valuation has the effect of decreasing the tax rate by \$1.00 and for every \$52,000.00 increase in appropriation the tax rate increases by \$1.00.

The increase in unemployment within the Town is of grave concern to all of us. Within the limits of our authority, we have tried to deal with this problem by making our facilities available to the State, utilizing the Emergency Employment Act and where possible providing work projects for aid dispensed.

Fortunately the financial status of the Town is sound and, therefore, with the cooperation of Federal, State and County Governments we expect to be able to meet this challenge for the foreseeable future.

At last year's Town Meeting the Selectmen were granted authority to hire an assistant Town Manager. When the Selectmen first met last spring this matter was reviewed with the Town Manager, Department heads and office personnel and it was decided that by giving additional responsibilities to certain individuals additional personnel would not be required. In the interest of economy this continues to be the policy of the Selectmen.

We have suffered a significant loss of personnel during this last year through death and retirement. Mellen Benson to whose memory this report is dedicated died on May 19, 1974. Mellen served the Town in many capacities for over 40 years, most recently as Treasurer. He was a friend to all who were fortunate to know him. He will always be missed. We were fortunate in that Eleanor Benson agreed to assume the duties of Treasurer and was appointed to succeed him on June 11, 1974, and has done an outstanding job this year. Fred Wheeler, Ralph Banfill and Vernon Boutilier all of the Highway Department whose combined years of service exceeds 41 years have retired. Sadie Foster of the office staff also retired after 19 years of service. People of this sort are difficult if not impossible to replace.

Considerable effort has been expended in attempting to improve our relations with the various State agencies with whom we deal on an almost daily basis. Progress has been made in this area. Our efforts will continue. In addition, our present representatives to the General Court have worked closely with us in assisting with this effort and in keeping us informed as to what is going on in Concord.

We look forward to serving you this year and assure you of our desire to foster sound, economical and humane policies for the Town on your behalf.

REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conway Conservation Commission reviewed the "dredge and fill" by the Artist Falls Estate development and made recommendations to the special board in Concord. The special board ordered, "1. Return Artist Falls Brook to its original channel, restore the banks, slope, seed, and mulch the restored banks. 2. Fill in the newly created channel that by-passes the pond. 3. Breach the dam at the lower end of the pond at least 40 feet wide and down to the elevation of the original brook bed."

House Bill number 817 has provided Conservation Commissions with legislation to prevent such action as at Artist Falls.

The Conservation Commission can call for public hearings on permit applications. A property owner seeking a permit to dredge and fill, receives the application from the Water Resources Board in Concord. The application is then filed with the Town Clerk. Copies of the application are sent to the Selectmen, Planning Board and Conservation Commission. The local Conservation Commission has seven days from the filing date to notify the special board in writing of their desire to investigate the site and the environmental impact of the proposed dredging and filling.

We are doing all we can to keep on top of matters and to bring these items to the attention of the proper state and town authorities to prevent misuses and abuses, which we feel is our major role in conservation and preservation activities.

Whitaker Woods was acquired by the Town, and this conveyance is subject also to the following conditions which shall be construed as covenants running with the land. One condition is that motor vehicles shall not be allowed on said property except for maintenance purposes. In accordance with this condition, which is also a Town Ordinance, no snowmobiles are permitted in Whitaker Woods. The Conservation Commission, with the help of the Conway Police Department and others, has been seeing that this condition of conveyance is being enforced. Whitaker Woods is receiving an increasing amount of use by the ski touring public as well as being a practice area for the high school and other cross-country ski competitions. The Saco River Overlook on Route 16 and also approximately twenty acres of land along the south side of Artist Falls Brook in North Conway were acquired by the Town in 1974.

Routed signs for Pudding Pond, the Shedd Woods, and Artist Falls will be purchased and erected in 1975. The Town Common Lands have been surveyed and the corners are being monumented.

"Davis Park" and the tennis courts in Conway are heavily used and enjoyed, thanks to the late Mr. James Simonds and the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

The Commission feels that a long-range management plan along with maps and overlays showing Town lands is high priority in order to plan the different activities and many uses on these Town properties for the enjoyment of all.

Report of Library Trustees

The Conway Public Library continues to serve the public as a resource center, an information center, and a book-magazine-record institution.

The Trustees meet alternate months to care for the physical needs of the library. The windows and the bulkhead have recently been painted, the children's room is now on a separate heating zone to keep it comfortable in even the coldest weather. The clock has been electronically controlled so it does not strike from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. A unique sign has been erected at the front of the building. A book drop is included in the new budget.

Our librarian, Mrs. Kenneth Marschner, has continued to manage the library with efficiency and effectiveness. She attended the New England Library Conference in September, and the workshop for librarians in Whitefield. The library presented a display of new children's books, sponsored by the State library. We offered a display of crafts from the Carroll County Home, as well as various arts and crafts exhibitions. The annual book sale was held in August.

Estimated circulation of books is about two thousand over last year.

Two fifth grade classes from the Conway elementary schools toured the library, receiving instruction in library use, listening to brief book reviews and enjoying the children's room.

The Center Conway branch of the library, with a new sign at the street, is now open four hours each week - Wednesday and Saturday, on an experimental basis.

We are fortunate to have Mrs. Marschner as our librarian, and express our appreciation to her and the assistant librarians, Ethel Towle, Annah Carroll, Amy Gardner, Tracy Gardner and Lorraine Duncan. Laurel Smith serves as library page through the courtesy of the Community Action Program. James Richardson continues as our custodian.

We also express our gratitude to all who serve in our Outreach Program, which continues to grow, and to the public who support our library. We urge the citizens to make even greater use of this fine institution.

January 27, 1975

Subject: The Solid Waste Disposal Study and Recommendations Pertaining Thereto.

Pursuant to the Articles in the Town Warrants of the towns participating in the Mount Washington Valley Public Service Council, the Council submits the following report covering the period from Town Meeting Day to the end of December 1974.

The Council has held ten meetings since its first organizational meeting. At the organizational meeting Mr. Howard C. Dickinson, Jr., of Conway was elected Chairman and Dorcas H. Deans of Intervale was elected Secretary. Committees were appointed to study and make recommendations concerning various aspects of the solid waste disposal situation in the Valley. The committees are the Landfill Committee, the Incinerator Committee, the Recycling Committee, and the Private Contracting Committee. At the meeting the committees presented a number of experts on the various aspects of solid waste disposal and sponsored several field trips to operating disposal projects including landfill and recycling operations.

With some data provided to us by the North Country Council and with a significant assist from the North Country RC&D Committee, the volume of solid waste generated in the Mount Washington Valley was estimated to average 30 tons per day with volume during peak periods of the year amounting to 50 tons per day.

LANDFILL: A landfill waste disposal operation for the communities in the Mount Washington Valley faces an immediate problem of finding sufficient area with suitable soil conditions for such an operation. The present site of the Conway dump is marginal as to area and soil conditions have not been fully investigated. In its present status, with volume reduced by burning in one authorized open pit, the site is barely able to accommodate Conway, Albany and Eaton. With the operation of a second open pit the Towns of Bartlett and Jackson might also be accommodated but the New Hampshire Air Pollution Control Commission has recently denied the Town of Conway permission to construct a second pit. It should be noted here that landfill as a popular way of disposing of solid waste is losing favor. As compared to other methods it requires a significant amount of land with rather exacting characteristics and at highly inflated values and it is now developing that even though properly buried and managed. the decomposition of the waste produces undesirable gases at the surface of the fill and contributes to long term pollution of underground and surface waters.

INCINERATION: Incineration has the advantage of volume reduction of up to 90% which can be accomplished quite efficiently in a manner meeting present federal and state standards for non-pollution of air and water. It has the disadvantage of being quite expensive. Satisfactory incinerators are currently produced by manufacturers in pre-assembled and pre-tested units of 2500 pounds per hour. Incinerators are also custom built to meet the particular volume and treatment requirements of a using agency but such incinerators, while they might be somewhat more efficient for the volumes which they are designed to handle, require a much larger immediate capital expenditure and they leave the community without any disposal capacity when they are down for repairs or servicing. The modular units permit acquisition costs to be spread over three or four years, permit incinerator capacity to be located at several points in the service area thus reducing transportation costs, and provides some incineration capacity at all times even though one or more units may be down for repairs.

RECYCLING: Recycling is the process of withdrawing from solid waste all material which can be re-used and getting it back into the resource supply of the country. There is little doubt that as natural resources diminish recycling must develop.

Like incineration it accomplished a significant reduction in the volume of waste to be otherwise disposed of. Depending on markets for the reclaimed material, recycling can produce a profit for waste disposal operations. At the least recycling provides material resources which are becoming increasingly important in the economy of our country.

PRIVATE CONTRACTING: Preliminary studies show that complete operation of any solid waste disposal system cannot now be undertaken as a private operation without public support. In the operation of a particular system, however, some phases lend themselves to private contracting, such as scheduled and unscheduled transportation of solid waste and the operation of plants and equipment provided by public financing

SUMMARY: The Council has not come to any final conclusions and recommendations on the subject of solid waste disposal. As the year ended the smaller communities were squeezed and squirming between the deadline to cease open burning by July 1, 1975, and the cost of presently approved alternatives. An effort, sparked by Meredith, is being made to gain approval of open pit burning as an accepted method of waste disposal. There are murmurings in the legislature about extending the deadline for open burning for a year or more. There is a strong feeling that maintenance or restoration of clean air and clean water in our smaller communities does not require the expenditure of the large sums of money that at present seem to be demanded of them. It is possible that the Boston Sand and Gravel Company pit in Ossipee may be available to receive solid waste from most of the communities in Carroll County.

Under these circumstances it does not seem prudent to recommend to our supporting communities a firm course of action in solving our waste disposal problems at this time. The Council is firmly convinced, however, that the communities composing the Mount Washington Valley area can best and most economically deal with their waste disposal problems by joining in regional action as provided by RSA 53-B:1 under which the Council is now operating and by RSA 53-B:6. The Council recommends and urges the continuation of the Mount Washington Valley Public Service Council and hopes to be joined soon by the Towns of Chatham and Eaton for the mutual benefit of all communities with common problems.

Water Safety Program

The Town of Conway appropriated \$1,000.00 for 1974 to help pay costs of the Water Safety Program as directed by the Conway Chapter, American Red Cross.

Classes for Conway and North Conway villages were held at Echo Lake State Park using the facilities there during two different four week sessions. The first one was attended by children from North Conway, Kearsarge, Intervale and Redstone children. Children from Conway village attended the second session. Scheduling was arranged to meet the educational needs of children of varying abilities. Errol Wiggin volunteered as a Water Safety Aide-in-Training, and worked for four weeks. This is part of the program for preparation for being a Water Safety Instructor.

The staff for 1974 included 7 Water Safety Instructors: Helen F. Hill, Karen Junge, Jody Breen, Stefanie Cravedi, Verlene Kendrick, Lucy Warren and Helen Warren.

(342) children were enrolled for classes. Many more children who should have been there did not have transportation. Several mothers volunteered to transport children and this kindness was appreciated.

An experimental class with 5 year olds was tried during the last 2 weeks of the second session. This was very satisfying for the participating children, their parents and the instructors. Many parents, grandparents and friends watched the demonstrations on the final day. The principles of mouth-to-mouth resuscitation were taught to all pupils as the beginning in Basic First Aid.

It should be noted that the foregoing reflects only salaries and travel expense. All other costs of the program were assumed by the Conway Chapter. One yearly expense is that of training new instructors. In 1974, one person was sent to Aquatic School. His scholarship was given in memory of Joseph B. Dodge, who counselled us about weather during many summers, and whose support of the program was as vital as his personality. In 1975, 3 young persons from the Conway Chapter hope to attend Aquatic School. They will be trained by some of the finest coaches in swimming and water safety in the country. In this area of lakes and rivers, children must be taught to swim and respect the water at an early age.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN

REPORT TO TOWNS

CONWAY

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid-August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

E. Sven Carlson DISTRICT CHIEF

Report of Police Commission

The present members of the Police Commission commenced functioning as a group in May, 1974 following the resignations of Francis Deasey and Everett DeWitt. Maurice Frechette and Robert Gardner were appointed as replacements.

Since the former Chief, Albert Lane, resigned at the end of April, one of the first obligations of the Commission was to appoint a replacement.

The Commission established a criteria to be followed in the selection of a new Chief. Among other considerations, an officer must successfully pass the New Hampshire Department of Personnel examination for police chief. An advertisement was placed in newspapers advising those interested that the Commission would be considering applications for chief. All members of the Conway Police Department were afforded the opportunity to take the examination. Two members of the Department successfully passed the test.

The Commission received several applications from officers outside of Conway. Since the salary rate for Chief in Conway is relatively low compared with other towns within the State of comparable size, the applications from well experienced senior police officers was limited.

Considering all of these factors and especially the fact we had an application from a Conway Police Officer who had experience within the Department, was well acquainted with the Town, had the respect and support of the other members of the Department; our decision was to appoint this officer: M. Allan MacLean, as Chief.

In our opinion, his performance has far exceeded our hopes and expectations; he has done an excellent job considering the circumstances that prevailed when he assumed the position. The Town of Conway is especially fortunate to have this man as Chief. We are especially impressed with his honesty, integrity and absolute determination to operate a Department that is above reproach. We, as the Police Commission, have pledged our support to the Chief and to the Department to the attainment of this objective.

As with the selection of the Chief, the Commission has established, as a part of the criteria for either promotion or new appointment, the successful completion of the applicable New Hampshire Department of Personnel examination for Sergeant or Patrolman before consideration. All appointments and promotions have had the recommendation of the Chief following a careful background investigation.

During the year, the Commission has appointed two officers to the rank of Sergeant, Maurice Salmon and David Bennett. We believe we have made an excellent, although difficult, choice as there are other officers on the Department that are very well qualified.

The Chief felt that it was essential to increase the number of Special Officers available to the Department in order to provide the additional manpower that may be required for special events and to man the Department should regular officers be sick, on vacation, at training schools or otherwise not available. This was done. The Commission and the Chief used the same criteria for appointment of Special Officers as Regular Officers. (It is interesting to note that only approximately 25% of those taking the patrolman examination receive a passing score.)

The Commission and the Chief have met several times with the Selectmen and the Town Manager to discuss and resolve mutual problems. The Commission fully recognize the Selectman's fiscal 'responsibility for the Police Department and have felt a keen obligation to assist and support the Selectmen in these matters. The Town Manager and the clerks have been very helpful, the very prompt monthly status of budget report has been especially helpful. Arrangements have been made to continue regular meetings with the Selectmen and the Town Manager; we are certain that many benefits will accrue to the Town. "Harmony being the strength of all institutions."

An early accomplishment of the present Commission and Chief MacLean was to have a mutual understanding of the roles and functions of the Commission and the Chief vis a vis police to operations. As a result, it appears to the Commissioners, that we have an excellent working relationship between the Chief, representing the department, and the Commission. As Commissioners we do not interfere with the regular operations of the Department, we do not delve into individual incidents, we do not read the arrest book, we have told the Chief, and all of the officers individually, we will not interfere, not attempt to influence any arrest or charges the police may bring against any person.

By the same token the Commission meets regularly every other Thursday evening at the Town Hall with all meetings open to the public. If anyone, including officers, has a complaint concerning the operation or policy of the Department, they may present their grievance or complaint to the Commission for investigation and a report. During the past several months the system appears to be working well. A few complaints have been received, some, in our opinion, not justified, others in which the Chief has taken corrective action, and still others which the commission has made corrections or adjustments to policy matters.

The Commission, along with the extensive assistance and cooperation of all Department personnel developed and delineated, for the first time a written Compensation Regulation Policy and a Vacation, Holiday and Days Off Policy.

Administratively, the Commission along with the Chief, have: developed an improved payroll and reporting system; together with Sergeant Bennett developed a planned program of preventative maintenance for the vehicles, and a detailed record of maintenance expense; Patrolman Mullen has developed and is recording mileage and gasoline usage for each vehicle; Patrolman Sonne has developed, through interviews and establishment of a rotation list, a fair and equitable procedure for the Department to follow when asked by motorists for garage or wrecker assistance.

Chief MacLean brought to the attention of the Commission a revision, in July of 1973, of a State Law which provides for reimbursement from the Court for police department expense in connection with breathalyzer examinations for persons charged in Court with DWI. Upon completion of negotiations with the Court as to the amount per case, there will be a reimbursement to the Town from the Court, for each DWI case processed through the Conway Police Department.

The Dispatcher has a very vital function within the Police Department. After careful consideration, analysis of costs, weighing of the benefits to be derived, the Commission and the Chief felt there should be a uniformed, sworn officer functioning as dispatcher during the evening hours to midnight and on weekends. The evening hours are usually the busiest for emergency police activities, hundreds of people come into the station during the evening hours, over the course of a year seeking help or assistance; the Police Department Dispatcher is the only representative of the Town readily available, and generally the only person some one from out of town could readily locate whether it was a police matter or some other town matter. The Dispatcher is the sole representative of the Town readily available to strangers 24 hours per day. A dispatcher that has also functioned in the "field" can also more readily appreciate the problems to an incident that may arise and function more efficiently and effectively. Since the Department receives more than 16,000 telephone calls per year, many of which are of an emergency nature, it is absolutely essential that competent and experienced persons fill this position, especially during the evening hours when other police personnel may not be in the station. For these reasons, and since the cost amounted to the difference in salary between a dispatcher and an officer, the position is filled by an officer on a rotating basis during the hours stated.

The Chief has submitted to the Commission plans for coordinated training of all personnel. The Commission has supported the plan as we believe it is realistic and will be effective. There remains much for the Commission to accomplish during the coming year: Together with the Selectmen, Town Manager and the Chief, we hope to have a delineated purchasing procedure that will protect the interests of the vendors, the Department, the responsibility of the Selectmen and be efficient. We are in no way implying that there should be detailed written procedures for all to follow, for their protection as well as the interests of the taxpayers.

The Chief is desirous of establishing a new reporting and record keeping system for implementation in January 1976 which will be compatible with State and Federal Agencies and yet not be unduly burdensome for a police department of this size.

The Commission, Police Department Personnel with the assistance of the State Personnel Department and personnel from the office of Police Standards and Training have made preliminary investigation and analysis into a new concept of compensation which would be based on achievement, such as successful completion of independently supervised examinations in various fields of law enforcement. Hopefully we will be in a position to implement this plan in 1976.

Much has been said and written over the years about the inadequacy of the present police headquarters. The Commission decided that to continue to ignore the problem was to disregard our responsibilities. The Commission established a Police Headquarters Facilities Committee and asked that Committee to investigate all alternatives and make their recommendations. The selection of the members of the Committee was predicated on both geographical representation within the Town and for representation of people from different interest groups. The Selectmen were also included on the Committee.

The Town certainly owes this Committee much gratitude for their time, effort and sincerity in developing a proposal for the voters to consider. The Committee incurred no expenses to the Town nor any future obligations to the Town should the proposal be defeated by the voters.

The year 1974 was a particularly difficult one for the Conway Police Department. Early in the year we spent a great deal of time investigating a homicide. By the end of summer, the department suffered the loss of a total of 4 veteran officers (including the Chief).

This loss of experienced men has meant a great deal of extra work on the remaining officers.

However, on the brighter side, we have been very fortunate in hiring some very capable men to fill the vacancies. All of the men hired have had some previous police experience.

New Hampshire law requires that 3 of these men will have to attend the Police Academy during the year of 1975 for six weeks each. I am of the opinion that within the next year we will experience a substantial improvement in effectiveness and efficiency of the department. A great deal of progress has been made due to the help of the three Police Commissioners and the entire department, but a great deal remains to be done.

This year's total department activities has decreased very slightly from 2656 investigations in 1973 to 2593 in 1974. However, the increased arrests for serious offenses more than offsets the decrease in minor violations. Example:

Offenses such as these require a great deal of time to investigate as well as prosecute. The assistance of the New Hampshire State Police and the Carroll County Sheriff's Department has been requested and received on numerous occasions. However, I, as Chief, have had to make priorities as to the amount of time spent on many investigations.

I have submitted a request for Federal Funds to enable this department to have a full time investigator. The cost to the Town would be approximately \$475.00 for 1975, and with a second Federal Grant in 1976, approximately 50% of the investigator's salary. The investigator's position as it was in the past was primarily occupied with Court preparation, with little time available for actual investigation. In the future I would have the position of investigator and prosecutor filled by 2 different men.

My request for 2 cruisers is based upon the fact that as of February 1 the mileages on the present 4 cruisers are as follows, No. 60–141,000; No. 59 – 65,000; No. 58 – 114,000 and No. 57 – 91,000. I think that the ability to operate those vehicles within our maintenance budget speaks well for the officers, but I do not think this is a sound practice. The total yearly mileage for the department is approximately 225,000 miles. I feel that a replacement of 2 vehicles per year is a necessity.

With the poor economical situation in mind, I have tried to keep my requests for 1975 to the barest minimum. However, it should be mentioned that in poor times that police agencies are often the busiest and present trends would seem to bear this out.

In conclusion I would like to thank the Police Commissioners in particular for the many hours of help they have given me. To the officers and the rest of the department a thank you for their continued cooperation and support that makes it possible for me to fulfill the duties of my office.
