NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Section 6—Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually on or before April 30 cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year from the first day of the ensuing May, in the office of the clerk of the city or town wherein said dog is kept, and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar distinctly marked with its owner's name, and bearing attached to said collar a metal tag distinctly marked with its registered number. Said tag shall be furnished by the clerk at the expense of the city or town from the amount received from dog license fees.

Section 18—The mayor of each city and the selectmen of each town shall annually within ten days from May first issue a warrant to one or more police officers or constables directing them to proceed forthwith either to kill or cause to be killed all dogs within such city or town not licensed and collared according to the provisions of this chapter, and to enter complaint against the owners of keepers thereof; and any person may, and every police officer and constable shall kill or cause to be killed all such dogs whenever and wherever found.

Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L.S.] To the inhabitants of the Town of Cornish, in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Cornish, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at Ten of the clock in the forenoon and to close at four o'clock, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing: 1 Selectman for 3 years, 1 Trustee of Trust Funds, 1 Library Trustee for 3 years.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repairs of highways and bridges.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repairs and upkeep of Cemeteries.

6. To see what action the Town will take in making up any deficiency in the Mercer Fund and raise money therefor.

7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money if necessary in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or otherwise administer on property acquired through tax sales.

9. To see if the Town will vote to trade the truck and raise money therefor.

10. By request: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Seven Dollars (\$1407) for State Aid Construction and instruct the Selectmen to apply for State Aid or would the Town rather raise Seven Hundred Eleven Dollars and Eighty Seven Cents (\$711.87) for Class V roads: in case we apply for State Aid, the State will pay us (\$2814) Two Thousand Eight Hundred Fourteen Dollars. If we apply for Class V the State will pay us (\$2847.51) Two Thousand Eight Hundred Forty Seven Dollars and Fifty One Cents.

11-A. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of (\$800) Eight Hundred Dollars for the bridge on the east end of the Townhouse road and (\$2150) Twenty One Hundred Fifty Dollars for the bridge on the west end of said road by the Grange Hall.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the George H. Stowell Free Library.

13. By request: To see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of (\$300) Three Hundred Dollars for E. L. Huse, M. D. for the ensuing year to insure the services of a Doctor for the people of Cornish.

14. By request: To see if the Town will vote to sand the dangerous places on the roads, caused by being slippery from ice and snow, and to see what sum of money shall be raised for same.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Town Poor, Old Age Assistance and Soldier's Aid.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of (\$100) One Hundred Dollars for Street Lights on Cornish Flat for the ensuing year.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of (\$25.00) Twenty Five Dollars to paint the outside of addition or jail at the office building on Cornish Flat.

18. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply for State Aid and Bridge Aid for the completion or any part of the construction of the highway known at the Townhouse road and borrow money therefor. If it is found after all applications are in that there is extra money available the State will match us 2 to 1.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) to be used for culverts only.

20. By request: To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of (\$18) Eighteen Dollars for additional Forest Fire Equipment recommended by the Fire Warden.

21. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to make necessary repairs on the tool shed on Cornish Flat to accommodate the Town truck and raise money therefor.

22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money to exchange the tractor if the one we have becomes impractical.

23. To see what action the Town will take about revising Town History.

24. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue subject to gates and bars, the Park road from H. B. Howe's farm house to the Plainfield town line also the crossroad from Park road to Junction of Burr road between H. M. Mack's and Loren Colt's.

25. By request: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to rent the Town Hall for dances and other public entertainments.

26. To see if the Town will vote to include vital statistics in the Town Report hereafter.

27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50) the income of which to be used for the care of the Charles W. Johnson lot in the Edminster Cemetery to be known as the Philip Johnson Fund .

28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) the income of which to be used for the care of the Adolph Miller lot in the Child Cemetery to be known as the William N. Miller Fund.

29. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue such portions of the highway between Ayer's corner to Carrol Kenyon's being no longer required because of relocation of said highway in the course of the reconstruction of same.

30. By request: To see what sum the Town will vote to raise or appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said amount to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

31. By request: To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of (\$50) Fifty Dollars to defray cost of labor and expenses incurred by the late Rev. Frederick J. Franklyn in collecting data for a supplement to the History of Cornish.

32. To hear the reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.

33. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF G. H. STOWELL FREE LIBRARY

To the Citizens of Cornish:

The local schools have taken part in varied library activities this past year. The reading contest among upper grade pupils was very successful. The eighth grade prize was won by Audrey Osgood, honorable mention Cora Stimson, the sixth grade prize by James Kibbey, honorable mention Frances Bates. No seventh grade pupil entered. The contest is again underway and it is hoped all upper grade pupils will enter.

Another exhibit of school work was displayed at the library at the close of the school year and was enjoyed by many visitors.

During Book week in November the library displayed posters made by the school children, representing book titles, and a very interesting button collection loaned by Miss Mary Bugbee.

The South Cornish School children helped to arrange an attractive snow scene in the library fireplace at Christmas time.

The Chadbourne district has borrowed almost one hundred books this year thanks to the kindness of Mrs. George Putnam, who offered to keep a deposit of books at her home.

The trustees have purchased three sets of books this year that will be of special interest to all. "Picturesque Tales of Progress," is a profusely illustrated eight volume world history for children but has been enjoyed by young and old alike. "Copeland's Treasury for Booklovers," contains a wide selection of choice English and American prose and poetry. Adams' "March of Democracy," is an interesting and readable history of our own country.

Mrs. Bugbee is resigning after twelve years service on the board of trustees, seven years as secretary and treasurer. We wish to express our sincere appreciation of her long active service to our library and community.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of Cornish:

I hereby submit my seventh annual report as your superintendent of schools.

We were fortunate in retaining the services of five teachers from last year's force,—Mrs. Merrill Tatro at Cornish Flat, Mrs. Winifred Barton at the South School, Mrs. Marjorie Kidder at the Center, Mrs. Ethel Johnson at the City, and Miss Reta Batchelder at the Tracy School.

Miss Dora Pinkham who organized the Chadbourne School well last year accepted a position in Maine and the position here has been filled by Miss Eleanor Richardson of Claremont. Miss Richardson earned her degree at Keene Teachers' College last spring. She was very highly recommended to us.

A rural school is a difficult position for any teacher, and especially for a beginning teacher. Yet the rural school develops the abilities and personalities of teachers faster than the single grades of the well heated well regulated city schools. They are excellent training for the teachers with the fires, hot lunches, playgrounds, and several grades of work to prepare and check, but the effects on the pupils is open to debate.

When most of us older citizens attended school, pupils placed samples of their home or desk work on the board and explained what they had done. There were no state plans of study to be met, in most schools even spelling was oral, and the teachers plans for the next day consisted mostly in an ability to do a few arithmetic problems. They had few if any papers to correct.

The first reaction to this is "Let us go back to those schools." They had good teachers and bad teachers in those days just as we have to-day in public schools. We compared a good school in those days with the other schools of those days. There were good and poor horses in those days also, but we see very few driving horses on our roads to-day.

No matter what we think about this situation, our pupils will have to compete in the world of tomorrow with men and women who have been educated in modern schools with curricula that include music, art, physical training, health, citizenship, social geography, etc.

The immediate problem is to find good teachers for rural schools. The new state regulations do not allow us to hire teachers

without special training, and most of the girls graduating from our normal schools are not interested in teaching an eight grade rural school.

Cornish has met this problem in part by combining so that four of the schools of the district have but four grades each. I feel and hope that the day will not be far distant when the Cornish roads will be improved to that extent that the pupils will be able to be educated in one building near the center of the district, or perhaps in two, one in East Cornish and one in West Cornish. This would allow the teachers time for the individual help needed to help pupils cover the large amount of material required of them to-day, and doubtlessly it would be an advantage to give a part of their high school training within the district.

Cornish has bought new stoves for the South School and the Charbourne School. These stoves are large enough to keep the rooms warm.

Last fall changes were made at the City School to protect the health and comfort of the pupils.

An unlooked for expense was placed on the district this winter by the breaking down of the floor at the Center School. It has been repaired easier and to a much better condition than I expected possible at this time of year.

I wish to thank the citizens, school officials, and teachers for their kindness and help.
