WILFRID H. DENT

With the passing of Wilfrid H. Dent, Croydon has lost another member of the 'old guard'.

He was born in Usselly, Lincolnshire, England, April 19, 1882. As a young man he served in the Boer War and came to the United States in 1902. He was employed as a guard and messenger for Wells Fargo in South Dakota where he met his bride, Lulu Williamson.

The young couple with their three children, Ruth, Doris and Richard, came to Croydon approximately 50 years ago and made their home at Croydon Flat, where he served as farm manager for the Edgell Estate. They had two more girls, Virginia and Betty. Doris became a school teacher and as the bride of Ernest Kibbey, also made Croydon Flat her home. She taught at Croydon Flat and in Newport schools until her recent retirement.

The Dent family are members of the Independent Religious Society of Croydon Flat. Until recently, Wilfrid had been President of the Croydon Flat Church since 1932 and Lulu had been Secretary.

He served Croydon as a Selectman for 12 years but he is perhaps better remembered by the younger generation as School Moderator. His English accent and knowledge of Parliamentary procedure are still fresh in the minds of us who have attended school meetings from 1947 through 1968 while he was School Moderator. When I last visited with him he jokingly reminded me that he was still an office holder—he was the last appointed Hogreeve of Croydon!

EUGENE E. NEWCOMB

Born in Malden, Mass., later the family moving to Stoneham, Mass., where some years later he owned and operated the Central Automotive Business. For forty-five years he was a member of the I. O. O. F. and was an active member of the Lions Club.

In Sept. 1950 he, his wife, and two sons moved to Croydon to reside at Rocky Bound Farm. For many years he was employed as a mechanic for the former Heath Garage in Newport.

Gene served as a tax collector of Croydon from 1959 to 1969 and was awarded a ten year certificate of appreciation from the New Hampshire Tax Collectors Association.

And so it is to these men that we dedicate in memoriam this Town Report and hope that the future town officers will follow their example.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 6th day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, (polls not to close earlier than 6 o'clock in the afternoon) to act upon the following subjects:

- ART. 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Highway Agent, two Auditors, Library Trustee for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, and all such officers and agents as may be necessary for the transaction of the Town's business for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Planning.
- ART. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and vote to raise and appropriate \$586.73 for same. The State to contribute \$3,911.56.
- ART. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer and winter road maintenance.
- ART. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for General Expense of the Highway Department.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Dump.

- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting brush.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for upkeep of cemeteries.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Capital Reserve Fund to be used for new equipment.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights and Lighting Town Buildings.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Social Security on Town Employees for the ensuing year.
- ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for use during the year in anticipation of Taxes.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Insurance.
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.
- ART. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the cost of Library, including Librarian's Salary, heat, etc.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Newport Area Home Health Agency.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

- ART. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Solid Waste Capital Reserve Fund.
- ART. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Newport Hospital.
- ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, now organized and named the Upper Valley Planning and Development Council, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$252.00 as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses of the regional planning commission to be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes.
- ART. 22. To see if the Town will vote to establish a conservation commission under the provisions of R. S. A. 36A, and that the Selectmen shall appoint said commission, to consist of (three-seven) members, within 60 days of the said annual meeting, and that said selectmen shall also designate, for the purpose of calling the first commission meeting, a temporary chairman.
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate from Revenue Sharing Trust Fund, and transferred to Solid Waste Capital Reserve Fund.
- ART. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for the purpose of creating a Tax Map.
- ART. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund and Transfer to the Capital Reserve Fund.
- ART. 26 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

If this form is not returned to Concord in time for the proper forms to be set up, the officer in charge of the photos will not be able to process the license. NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Laws of New Hampshire

1957 . . . 466:1 . . . Procuring License: Tag.

Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, on or before April thirtieth, cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year from the first day of the ensuing May, in the office of the clerk of the city or town wherein said dog is kept, and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar to which shall be attached a metal tag with the following information thereon, the name of the city or town, year of issue of license and its registered number. Said tag shall be furnished by the clerk at the expense of the city or town from the amount received from the dog license fees.

- 1967 466:1-a Vaccination Required. Before a license is issued under the provisions of this subdivision, except under the provisions of section 6, the owner or keeper of a dog shall furnish to the clerk a certification that said dog has been vaccinated against rabies in accordance with the provisions of RSA 442 A.
- 1971 442-A:2 . . . Rabies Vaccination Required. Every dog three months of age and older shall be vaccinated against rabies. Young dogs shall be vaccinated within thirty days after they have reached three months of age. Unvaccinated dogs acquired or moved into the state must be vaccinated within thirty days after purchase or arrival, unless under three months of age, as specified above. Every dog shall be revaccinated at such intervals and with such vaccines as the commissioner shall specify from time to time. In rabies infected areas, dogs recently vaccinated should be kept under control for at least thirty days before being allowed to run free.
- 1969 . . . 466:31 . . . Dogs a Menace, a Nuisance, or Vicious.
 1. Any person who considers a dog to be a nuisance, a menace or vicious to persons, to property or to other animals may make a complaint to any law enforcement

officer, conservation officer, or a selectman of the town or city in which such a dog is kept. Such officer or selectman shall within three days after receipt of such complaint, investigate the facts and circumstances of the case, and if the complaint is sustained shall forthwith order the owner, keeper or person who harbors such dog to abate the nuisance or menace. Service of such order shall be made upon the owner, keeper or person who harbors such dog by causing a certified copy of such order to be delivered to him, or by registered mail to his last known place of abode. owner, keeper or person who harbors such dog upon whom notice of such order has been served, may, within ten days bring a petition to the municipal or district court for the town or city, as the case may be, praying that the order be reviewed by the court. After notice to the investigating officers and the person or persons making the complaint, and upon hearing, the court shall affirm, modify or dismiss such order as justice may require. During the pendency of such action and the order of the justice of the court, the owner, keeper or person who harbors such dog shall restrain such dog from running at large at all times.

- II. Under this section, a dog is considered to be a nuisance, a menace, or vicious to persons or property under any, or all but not limited to the following conditions:
- (a) If it barks continuously for sustained periods of time.
- (b) If it barks during the night hours so as to disturb the peace and quiet of a neighborhood or area.
- (c) while it runs at large on the streets or public property or property other than its owner's, it turns over garbage cans, waste containers or otherwise causes waste or garbage to be scattered on property other than its owner's,
- (d) while it runs at large it barks, growls, snaps at, bites, runs after or chases any person or persons,

- (e) while it runs at large, it barks at, runs after or chases bicycles, motor vehicles, motorcycles, or other vehicles being driven, pulled, or pushed on the streets, highways or public ways,
- (f) while it runs at large, whether alone or in a pack with other dogs, it runs after, chases, or preys on game animals, domestic animals, fowl or human beings,
- (g) while it runs at large, it digs, scratches, or excretes on any property other than its owner's,
- (h) while in heat is unconfined (confinement shall mean within an enclosed building—not accessible to any other dog).
- 1967 . . . 466:36 . . . Killing Dogs. Any conservation officer may kill any dog found in the act of maiming or in close pursuit of deer, moose, caribou, sheep, cattle, swine or poultry. No civil action for recovery of damages shall lie against any conservation officer while acting under authority granted therein. The owner or owners of any dog or dogs caught in the act of maiming or in close pursuit of deer, moose, caribou, sheep, cattle, swine or poultry, may be fined not more than three hundred dollars.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT — 1972

During the past year, over 500 books (paperback and hardcover) have been added to the Library shelves, and 1,611 were borrowed from the State Library in three visits of the bookmobile. There were a few books especially requested also, which if not available from the State Library, came from nearby Sunapee or Newport or as far away as Somersworth and Littleton, either for individuals or the school. To make more room on the shelves, some of the older, unused books were weeded out with the assistance of the State Regional Consultant, Mrs. Herrick. These were put up for sale in the Town Hall on August 12th,

with baked goods donated by friends of the Library. The sum of \$45 was raised towards the purchase of new books. The children's collection was helped by the Good Neighbor's donation of \$50, who also later donated another \$25 for book repair materials. Both were much appreciated. There have been numerous donations of books as well, and several magazines are regularly contributed, among them Sports Illustrated, Newsweek, U. S. News and World Report. Magazines purchased by the Library include N. H. Profiles, Yankee, National Geographic, Consumer Report, Changing Times, Parent's Magazine. A magazine and paperback rack was purchased by the trustees to better accommedate them. Two book clubs have been joined: Doubleday for adults; for the children, Parent's Magazine Book Club.

Ten State Library cards have been issued to patrons during the year, enabling them to use other libraries in the state.

Part of the Librarian's voluntary effort has been a successful summer story hour for ten weeks, attendance at book display meetings, book buying trips, newspaper publicity, library 'housework'. A member of both the New England Library Assn. and the N. H. L. A., the librarian attended conferences of both during the year. In mid-June she was one of fifteen N. H. librarians chosen for a week's Outreach Leadership Network institute held on the UNH campus at Durham, which was extremely interesting.

Others, the Trustees and Mrs. Jesse Hawkins among them, have given of their time to the success of the Library program. We wish many more of the townspeople would avail themselves of the opportunities the Library offers.

The business meeting was opened at 1:30 P. M. with Croydon Girl Scout Troop #834 saluting the flag. This was followed by a moment of silence in memory of Dana S. Gross who had served this town for so many years.

A total of \$65,809.20 was raised and appropriated for our expenses. A complete list of these appropriations may be found on page 15 of this report.

No money was appropriated for several "out-of-town" requests such as the Lebanon Airport, the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, Newport Fire Department and the Newport Ambulance Service.

Grant Chamberlain spoke for the committee on toilets for the town hall. The motion was made to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,715.00 to install a conventional system of toilets for the town hall. This was followed by a great deal of discussion, and one amendment that was defeated. More discussion and more amendments defeated. The final vote was to raise and appropriate \$3,715.00 for a conventional toilet system with the amendment that "the Selectmen be

authorized to expend any money necessary to expand the size of the addition to care for necessary storage."

Two roads were discontinued subject to gates and bars; the "School House Road" (this was formerly better known as the "Forehand Road") and the Turnpike from the former Beliveau homestead to the Grantham Town Line. The Burr Road was also discontinued but a recent research on the roads of the Town revealed that it has been discontinued twice previously.

We voted to have the town hall painted by a standing vote of 32 to 8.

The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Committee to investigate the possibility of purchasing a local gravel source for use on the roads with the amendment that they also investigate a suitable site for Solid Waste Disposal. This Committee is to report back with recommendations at the next Town Meeting.

The Presidential Primary was held in conjunction with Town Meeting so the counting of votes started at 6:00 P. M. with the closing of the polls and continued until the meeting was officially closed at 10:00 P. M. and the results read in open meeting.

REPORT OF THE CROYDON PLANNING BOARD

Meeting weekly or semi-weekly on Thursday evenings, the planning board has been reviewing the Sub-division Regulations of the Town of Croydon and considering amendments to these regulations. Some of the proposed amendments were suggested by Mr. Robert Ward, who at the time of the meetings with your planning board, was one of the two state planners based in Concord. Other proposed amendments became evident as towns in the Sunapee Area further developed their sub-division regulations.

Presently, the first sub-divisions in Croydon have been submitted for review and the planning board as well as the developers are becoming well acquainted with what the present sub-division regulations can and cannot do.

In the future, your planning board will face the problems of building codes, sewer codes and zoning as many of the towns in our area have.

The planning board urges that the town secure land for a sanitary landfill NOW in the event that a regional facility does not evolve by 1975. Revenue sharing funds may possibly accomplish this project.

Lastly, before sub-dividing your land, please check with the planning board about how sub-division is accomplished. A five minute chat with a planning board member will save you time and money and will in all probability, help you with questions that you will have concerning Croydon's sub-division regulations.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Croydon:

Upon the retirement of Mrs. Ettabelle Lewis last June, Mrs. Rosemary Aldrich was employed as a replacement. Mrs. Aldrich is a graduate of Pembroke College and has taken additional training at Boston University and Plymouth State College. She has had experience in teaching a one-room school.

A Teacher's Aide was employed this year. Mrs. Lois Howes is filling this position and is involved in many non-teaching duties at the Village School.

To coincide with the present law on school attendance, the School Board has adopted the policy effective in September 1973 "a child must be six years old on or before September 30 of the current school year".

One of the first steps in complying with State Elementary Standards is to develop a Philosophy and Objectives for the Croydon School. On November 21, 1972, the Croydon School Board adopted a Philosophy and Objectives which state in part:

"The child learns best by being actively involved. His curiosity is his first motivation. The teacher, in a good learning situation, continues that motivation toward problems which students meet from day to day and provides guidance in solving them. In this way, qualities of self-confidence and intelligence are developed.

"Living in a democracy, a family unit, working with and for others—all these begin to point out the direction in which we must move. Preparation for future responsibilities must begin with the decision-making process at an early age and in situations appropriate to the individual.

"This one-room school presents that opportunity for "individuality" and "non-gradedness" which can foster development of self-confidence and promote a learning situation commensurate with the intellectual growth and readiness of each child.

"In line with this philosophy, therefore, the following are the objectives of our Elementary School:

- To recognize and meet children's emotional needs for acceptance, recognition, self-esteem, and selfconfidence.
- 2. To provide appropriate materials and experiences so that each child may find success and be evaluated on his own abilities.
- 3. To promote self-discipline.
- 4. To foster respect for our democratic heritage.
- 5. To develop an awareness of other cultures and societies.
- 6. To promote an understanding of our environment and the need to preserve its resources.
- 7. To develop knowledge and skills in the language arts, mathematics, science, and the social sciences.
- 8. To develop aesthetic values and creativity and self-expression."

Pursuant to the action of the 1972 Annual Meeting, the School Board appointed a School Improvement Committee consisting of Willis H. Ballou, Jr., Thomas Ruger, Mrs. Ann Lammert, and William Walsh to make a study of school needs and report to the 1973 Annual Meeting.
