Warrant for Town Meeting

(L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Enfield, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Whitney Hall in said town of Enfield, on the eleventh day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose by ballot, to serve for three years, one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee; to serve for one year, one Treasurer, one Clerk, one Tax Collector, one Highway Agent, one Overseer of the Poor, one Police Chief, one Cemetery Agent, one Fire Ward, and two Auditors, and such other necessary town officers, required by law to be chosen for the ensuing year.

Polls will open at 9:30 a.m. and not close before 6:00 p.m.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, the sums so borrowed to be paid before the end of the fiscal year in which the debt was incurred.

ARTICLE 3. To authorize the sale or lease of any or all, of such parcels of real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds for non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver, in the name of the Town, suitable deeds or leases of such real estate subject to such conditions or restrictions, as may be voted by the meeting.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,790.00 for State Aid Construction, to receive the sum of \$5,580.00 from the State, or act thereon.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$842.47 for Town Road Aid, to receive the sum of \$5,616.45 from the State, or act thereon.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$400.00, as requested by the State Forestry Department, to be used for the eradication of Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will raise or appropriate the sum of \$100.00 as its contribution to the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, or act thereon.

ARTICLE 8. Upon petition of Edwin G. Huntley and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for purchase of land, material

and cost of erection of building, for Fire House. Site desired: Jackman and Smith (shingle mill) property at Enfield Center.

ARTICLE 9. Upon petition of Edwin G. Huntley and others to see if the Town will raise or appropriate the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) for maintenance of Fire Truck and equipment.

ARTICLE 10. By request of the Budget Committee, to see if the Town will, by two-thirds vote of the meeting, transfer the amount appropriated to Capital Reserve for the purpose of the erection of a Community Building; to a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of payments of the Town's share of a State Aid Bridge to replace the Covered Bridge on Main Street in the Village of North Enfield.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

ARTICLE 12. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Budget and raise or appropriate the various sums recommended and posted by the Budget Committee, or act thereon.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will, by a two-thirds vote of the meeting, transfer \$4,200.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund, dedicated to the purpose of Town Truck Replacement, to the purpose of the purchase of a Tractor-loader, with cutter-bar attachment, for use of the Highway Department, or act thereon: The net earnings of aforesaid Tractor-loader, to be returned to the Truck Replacement Fund, until such time as the original cost be amortized.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote, that,—If the purposes or objects, hereinafter designated for which appropriations for the year 1952, may have been made; have not been fully accomplished during the fiscal year; then the funds so appropriated or unexpended on the unfinished portion of said object, shall be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund, dedicated to the object of its conception, until such time as the Board of Selectmen, acting as agents for the Town, shall have the opportunity or occasion

for the fulfillment or completion of or for the purpose or object, for which said appropriation was created.

The especially designated purposes for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1952, are as follows:

The net earnings of the "Town Truck" derived from Highway appropriations, for replacement purposes.

Funds for purchase of Fire Department equipment.

Also such other appropriations as the meeting may direct.

ARTICLE 16. To ballot on the following question "Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town."

ARTICLE 17. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To take any vote or transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

The circulation for 1951 was again slightly under 5000. A rough analysis of the figures would indicate that about 90% of the children in Grades I to VIII are represented as borrowers in the library and that they averaged to read six fiction and one non-fiction book each during the year as well as the usual reference work. High school students are equally well represented as borrowers and about 30% of the adults in the community read books from the library. Separate statistics for the two groups were not kept but as a combined group they averaged to read 5½ fiction and 2½ non-fiction books each during the year. Over the past 15 years an excellent collection of books in many fields of interest have been purchased as well as recent popular fiction. An up-to-date list of all government publications issued is available; also an annotated monthly list of newly published books. The Methodist and Congregational church reading lists and a Catholic bookshelf may be consulted. The Library has an unusually fine group of books on programs and parties, as well as cookbooks, books on sports and hobbies and craft books. If material on the subject you are interested in, is not in the Library we shall be very glad to either buy it or borrow from Dartmouth College or the State Library. Remember this is Your Free Public Library and that its Trustees and Staff will do everything in their power to make it useful to you either as a source of informational or recreational reading. About 385 books have been added this year and we are very grateful to Thayer and Morris Nutter, Mrs. Hunt, Mrs. Potter, Herbert McElwain, The Johnson Homestead at Enfield Center and many others for their gifts to the Library. Mrs. Harold Goodwin gave us a doll dressed in Scottish costume and we acquired a Puppet stage and five puppets for use with younger children. Material in the Historical collection has been in constant use during the year, particularly by Mr. Wil-

son B. Roberts who has been writing the fine articles for the Reporter-Advocate on the early history of our schools. Mr. Roberts has also given us a number of items, the most important bringing the completion of our early volume of town reports. Mrs. Hazel Durfee sent us an interesting Grafton county atlas published in 1890. We have nearly a complete file of Advocates from 1894 to 1908 and from 1933 to date but there are still many gaps between 1909 and 1932. The Library officially entertained the local ministers, teachers and members of the Athena Club at Whitney Hall early in December. An exhibit of new books was on display and the Librarian gave a book review of a biography by Helen Wright "Sweeper in the Sky."

REPORT OF THE ENFIELD PLAYGROUND

The playground was open from July 9 to August 31, five days a week from 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 4:00 p.m. It was under the supervision of Miss Muriel Jondro, assisted by Eleanor Stewart and Carol Cattabriga.

The playground committee met with the school board and voted to move the equipment from Huse Park to the school yard. This move necessitated expenditure of some of the playground funds, but it was deemed necessary due to lack of toilet facilities, unsuitable conditions for any craft program, and traffic conditions at Huse Park. Because the leveling and draining of the area at the rear of the school was not completed when the playground opened, the children were taken, for an hour each day, to Huse Park to use the slides, swings, etc.

This year, 125 children were registered at the playground and approximately 35 to 50 attended daily. The school lunch room was available for the craft program and for games on rainy days.

Various games were taught for group participation, and card games, puzzles, etc., were on hand for quiet play.

A special event was scheduled each week to interest the children in developing hobbies. Some of those who came to talk to the children about hobbies were: Mrs. Ivan Lathrop, Enfield, photography; Mrs. Fred Hutchinson, Canaan, brought her collection of mosses; Mrs. Ross McKenna, Hanover, woodstove; Mr. Hinman, Canaan, colored slides he had taken and also movies from the State Fish and Game Department.

Both a junior and a midget baseball team were sponsored and new equipment was purchased for the teams. Practice was scheduled daily at the ball field.

Anyone seeing the display of articles made at the playground by children ranging in age from four years

to fourteen years, and anyone watching the two baseball teams in action, will readily agree that a playground is an important part of the community.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Enfield:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as your superintendent of schools.

I am indeed happy to report that the Enfield schools, again this year, have been operating in an entirely satisfactory manner. In view of the problems that exist regarding schools all over the United States this is really quite unusual. It is due to many factors such as a trained, experienced and capable staff; a competent and sincerely interested school board; a group of parents and citizens interested in maintaining good schools; and school children who are ready and willing to respond to inspired leadership.

Teachers and Teaching

Again this year our complete group of loyal and experienced elementary teachers remained with us. In this respect we are truly fortunate because the extreme shortage of well trained

teachers still exists and is more severe in the elementary field. A number of shifts were made in the grade assignments of teachers which placed them in situations more suited to their abilities and interests. In the first two grades we have tried the experiment of having the same teacher remain with the grade for each of the first two years. This seems to have produced very beneficial results because the teacher has had an opportunity to understand and correct each individual child's problems and difficulties.

There were only two changes in the high school staff. Mr. David Knecht, a teacher with several years experience at Penacook, replaced Mr. Compronie as a science teacher. Mr. Robert Dumais, a recent graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, replaced Mr. Ahearn. Under the very able leadership of the principal, Mr. Jordan, our high school continues to progress with a high degree of student morale.

Mr. Harold Odell assumed full charge of the total music program this year which includes grade school music, chorus and orchestra. This has meant the introduction of an orchestra at a slight additional expense to the town but the results have been worth it. Many favorable comments have been made by the townspeople in regard to the whole music program. Mrs. Rena Horton, president of the New Hampshire Art Teachers' Association and teacher with several years experience, assumed the position of art teacher early this fall. The teachers, as well as the pupils, have been pleased with the results.

Many of our teachers continue to take special courses either at summer school or at extension course groups offered during the school year in the surrounding area. These give them special help in certain areas and serve to keep them in touch with the latest information on modern education.

We are continuing and expanding our program of guidance which will serve to assist each individual pupil to make a better adjustment to school life. Every pupil has a separate folder which contains many items of pertinent information such as the results of ability tests, achievement tests, school marks, teachers' opinions, etc. These folders move along with the pupil each year so that the new teacher has the benefit of the accumulated information.

Buildings and Repairs

The school board purchased one more set of desks and chairs so that now four rooms are fitted out with modern equipment, the first, fifth, sixth and seventh grades. The board hopes to place this type of desk in one more room next year.

An excellent start was made on the program leading to the development of a real playground at the rear of the high school. A suitable drain was extended across the lower end of the field. Plans are in progress to have the drain completed during the summer of 1952. A lot of fill was brought in and the field was brought to a rough level. In all this work the school board was deeply appreciative of the help and assistance given by Mr. Larmie and Mr. Gilbert. All of this year's funds allocated to this project were expended and additional funds are being asked for in next year's budget.

The rest of the stairways and the fifth grade room were re-floored during the Christmas vacation. Several other areas of the building need re-flooring before too long. Because of the fact that little or no repair work could be done during the war, the school was in a poor condition in 1946 when the board started a planned refurbishing of the whole plant. This has been done slowly so that only a small expense would be incurred each year.

For many years the school district of Enfield has been considering the possibility of expanding its facilities to include additional classroom space, and a triple purpose auditorium,-gymnasium,-cafeteria which could also be used by the general public as a community building. Various reports have been made favoring this move but no definite action has been taken. The issue has been clouded by the possibility of establishing a cooperative school district or sending the high school pupils to Lebanon. Both of these possibilities have been investigated by your school board. There seems little likelihood of establishing a cooperative school district and Lebanon could take tuition pupils for only a few years because of their limited facilities. Upon the basis of this information and a petition signed by a large number of P-TA members, plans for the proposed addition were drawn up and the necessary articles will be placed in the school warrant. This addition would allow the children to play sports, carry on physical education activities, eat their noon lunch and conduct school activities in a clean, healthy atmosphere. Furthermore, several classroom spaces now in an undesirable basement situation could be moved up into the sunlight.

Miscellaneous

This fall a very complete dental clinic was conducted by the State Department of Health for the elementary pupils of the Enfield School District. I have tried for a number of years to have this program brought to Enfield but it was delayed because the state has inadequate funds and personnel. All the children had their teeth cleaned, were given flourine treatments and re-

ceived a detailed report on the dental work which each child needed done. Of the 161 children examined only two were found who were without dental decay. The remaining 195 children had a total of 704 decayed permanent teeth and 616 decayed temporary (baby) teeth.

Last spring the P-TA solicited organizations in town for special funds which were matched with federal funds to do actual repair work on some of the children's teeth. This work was done by a Lebanon dentist under the direction of our school nurse, Mrs. Brown.

Mrs. Brown did not wish to continue this year as school nurse. The school board was faced with a real problem in this situation because trained nurses are very scarce. Furthermore, a school nurse is supposed to have had special training in public health nursing. After much scurrying around, we eventually found that Mrs. Lillian Champeau was willing to help us out. She had no public health training but was allowed to carry through this year on a permit with the understanding that she would obtain some special training before another year. We feel that Mrs. Champeau has been conducting the school nursing work in a very creditable manner.

The school board wishes to acknowledge with sincere thanks the gift of \$100.00 from the P-TA toward the purchase of an overhead projector for the school. This instrument has been very beneficial in various departments and particularly so with the teaching of reading.

Enfield was one of several schools in New England selected to assist a graduate student at Boston University in his doctorate study on the effects of certain special activities on the teaching load. The results of this study will be made available for the Enfield faculty.

We are proud of the fact that two of our teachers and a school board member are a part of the Enfield Shaker Singers group. This unusual chorus has made a distinguished name for itself and has served as a splendid advertisement not only for the Enfield schools but for the whole town of Enfield.

In closing, I would like to extend my personal thanks and appreciation to all those who have assisted us in producing good schools for Enfield.

The following table is being submitted to show the variation in enrollment which has existed in Enfield over the past thirteen years. The figures are not entirely accurate because the same dates were not used in every case for enrollment figures. As nearly as possible the figures represent the enrollment as of January 1 of the given school year and probably in no case would vary more than one or two from the numbers stated. Most schools, and particularly high schools, showed a reduced enrollment during the war years. If the holding power of the high school continues, we can anticipate a peak total enrollment of about 385 pupils in 1960-61. The actual number of pupils that may be present in the Enfield schools some years from now depends upon several variable factors which are a little difficult to analyze.

School District of Enfield

To the inhabitants of the School District of Enfield qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Whitney Hall in Enfield on the tenth day of March, 1952, at eight o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Officers or Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To choose Agents, Auditors, or Committees necessary for managing District Affairs.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income: the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 8. To authorize the construction and equipment of an addition to the Enfield Central School, such addition to include a gymnasium-auditorium and such other rooms as the District may determine, and to ap-

propriate a sum not exceeding One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) for such purposes.

Article 9. To borrow in the name of the District by the issue of serial notes or bonds, as provided in Chapter 72, Revised Laws of 1942, and any amendments thereto, including Chapter 5 of the Session Laws of 1951, a sum not exceeding One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00), for the purposes specified in the preceding Article, and to authorize the School Board to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest on said notes or bonds, and to do whatever may be necessary to the issuance thereof.

Article 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,585.00, in addition to the regular appropriation, for the maintenance of the new addition from its completion until June 30, 1953.

Article 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
