NORTHERN COOS COMMUNITY HEALTH ASSOCIATION

REPORT OF SERVICES RENDERED IN THE TOWN OF ERROL

Northern Coos Community Health Association is one of the forty New Hampshire Community Health Agencies whose purpose is to provide health services to people in their homes, and to help both sick and well people to attain and maintain health.

One of the advantages of a locally controlled health agency is that its services can be developed in response to local needs. Our Board of Directors is made up of your friends and neighbors and they are willing to listen to and act upon your suggestions and comments.

Last year, our home visiting program served 74 patients in Errol, providing nursing, physical therapy, personal care, homemaking and health and welfare information to the townspeople.

Community wide services included expectant parents classes which touched the lives of about 25 families. These sessions are held in the fall and in the spring and are open to anyone who is interested.

Immunization clinics are held monthly on a rotating basis in Colebrook, Pittsburg, North Stratford and Errol, and we are in hopes of expanding the services offered to include health screening tests and informational services.

Our Family Planning Program offers education, counseling, referrals, and free physical exams and contraceptives for low income people.

Community services are generally free. Home visiting services are often covered by Medicare, Medicaid, or special State and Federal Grants and sometimes by private insurance. Those not covered by these are charged on a sliding fee basis geared to the financial capabilities of each patient. These free or partial fee services result in our dependence on the towns we serve for financial aid. Contributions this year are especially important, as they will help us obtain matching funds to continue and expand Homemaker/Home Health Aide Service as well as our Maternal and Child Health Services (immunization programs, expectant parent classes and family planning).

Thank you for your continued support of our activities.

ANNUAL REPORT

This has been a year of changes for CONVALESCE Home Health Agency. Early this past spring, Louise Fuller, Director, notified the Board of her intent to resign to await the last few months before the birth of their first child. At this time it was decided, due to the growing complexity of business demands on the Agency, to seek a business Manager and Executive Director. Consequently, Mrs John (Mildred) Badger was hired as Business Manager and Mrs. Stephen (Brenda) Perkins, P.H.N. became Executive Director. During the course of the summer Mrs. Donald (Norma) Tower was also hired as Secretary to replace Louise Lewis.

The Agency has continued to provide home nursing services; homemaker home health aide service and physical therapy in the home while expanding its immunization clinics to well-child clinics held every month in one of the area towns. CONVALESCE also offers complete family planning services; bi-yearly expectant parent classes and acts as information and referral source for such state services as Crippled Childrens Clinics; Sight Conservation and Cardiac Services.

On the evening of October 14, 1975 CONVALESCE moved to 142 Main Street, Apartment 2. Here we have been busily making plans for our annual meeting to be held December 9, 1975, and tying up loose ends around our forthcoming incorporation.

CONVALESCE has recently been surveyed for Medicare certification and was found to be in "substantial compliance with the Conditions of Participation".

Our total home visits for 1974-1975 number 2,339, up 373 visits from last year. We anticipate a budget of \$52,000 for the coming fiscal year.

We welcome, anytime, questions, concerns or suggestions about our Community Health Program.

AMBULANCE DISTRICT A-1

District A-1 Ambulance service has been busy again this year. A total of 327 calls were made by the ambulances located in the three towns compared to 270 for the same period last year.

The individual Corps in Pittsburg, Colebrook and North Stratford have also been kept busy with instruction and training sessions. At present there are 2 licensed E.M.T.A. instructors in our district and this past year 5 Advanced Red Cross instructors were trained.

All Ambulance personnel must be licensed and every two years must have some type of refresher course to be eligible for relicensing. At the present time in the district there are approximately 45 trained E.M.T.A. and 30 trained Advanced First Aide Ambulance attendants plus 8 R.N.'s active in District A-1.

Due to the dissolving of the Ambulance Co-ordinating Board in Concord, which approves grants for ambulances among other jobs, the matter of the new ambulance for North Stratford has been tabled, but a new board was recently formed and the grant proposal for the North Stratford Ambulance is the first item on the agenda, at the December meeting. We have been assured that this proposal will pass without any problems. This will give the District 3 new ambulances and a good back up vehicle.

Again in March we will approach the Towns at the Town meetings for their support and appropriations.

REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATOR UPPER CONNECTICUT VALLEY HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION NOVEMBER 25, 1975

This report will be only to highlight some of the activity over the past fiscal year. We arrived at Colebrook only two weeks before the close of the year and therefore most of the activities were conducted by my predecessors. After a careful study of their work we are able to make the following report.

This past year could be characterized as a year of painful searching for the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital and its affiliated programs. While there is much agreement with the fact that institutions like men either go forward or backward, there should be some of both movements in every period. We find that, on examination of ourselves, there was little forward and much backward movement. This has left many disappointed and greatly discouraged. We should, however, take heart from the fact that once bottom is reached there is only one way to go and that is up.

This year for the fifth straight year, we have lost ground financially without being able to expand our health care delivery system. It is hoped that with the introduction of sound fiscal management procedures and renewed effort to provide the best health care possible we will embark on a year of successful progress.

The hospital was surveyed by The Joint Commission on Accreditation for Hospitals and received a one year accreditation. There will be another survey next year.

The Family Health Center will not be completed as scheduled since funds are not available for its construction. We will be seeking other ways less costly to accomplish a workable group practice that will entice new physicians to the area. Our staff is overworked and needs relief.

The Convalesce Group will be seeking separate identity to pursue it's own goals, in the manner best suited to it's responsibilities. We wish them every success in their worthwhile endeavors.

The addition of two new physicians, Drs. Rabie and Shahin to our staff, has been the one bright spot this past year. They have both been well received by the communities and the staff at the hospital. We congratulate both these fine dedicated men for their efforts on our behalf.

The Auxiliary has been most helpful in its support of the hospital over the past years. We should like to thank each and every member for their loyal support and dedication to the hospital. I am looking forward to another year of pleasant cooperation with them.

Your hospital and association trustees have given of their time and efforts far beyond that which would normally be expected. Due to the hospital's poor financial position they have had to delve into the institution at middle management levèl. This has been time consuming at the expense of their families and health. We owe them a great debt of gratitude and thanks. I shall look forward to working toward a more successful endeavor with them this coming year.

Without sacrificing our excellent skilled nursing care we have reduced personnel requirements in support areas and established a new central purchasing program that will set our house in order financially and at the same time continue to provide the high

quality skilled nursing care we have in the past.

With all this behind us let's look to the future where the end of the dark tunnel is in sight. Already with only one month behind us we find that our financial picture has improved. With the continued help of all our citizens and their loyal support we will make this the finest hospital in the north country, which is what we all want.

ABOVE ALL ELSE: Let us have the loyal support and patronage of our friends and neighbors in all fifteen communities!

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

1975-76

The 1975-76 school year is now about half over and things are moving smoothly. The Booster Club has had an active year with a Halloween party, Hunter's supper, and a winter carnival coming up February 20th. So far, this year, their profits are up to \$175. The graduating Sophomores hope to go to New York City on their class trip.

The hot lunch program has really increased this year with Mrs. Marshall serving an average of 55 lunches a day. The Federal guidelines for free and reduced lunches changed with the rising

cost of living and more students were made eligible.

Again, students are participating in skiing lessons at Wilderness every Thursday. Seventeen students are transported by parents over and back. The remaining upstairs students have intramural basketball games at the town hall.

Problems this year with discipline have been relatively minor and parents-teachers night helped clear up many of them. Another

such night is planned for sometime in March.

The most irritating problems have been with the building and equipment. Stove repairs, plumbing repairs, leaky roofs and the heating system have caused many problems this year. Also the duplicating machine and film projector have broken down and have been repaired at considerable expense and inconvenience.

They still don't operate properly.

Finally, enrollment this year has increased greatly. Last year it was 64 and as of now it is 74. The increase enrollment has been really felt in Mrs. Hawkin's room where she now has 29 students. This is far too many for that small room, so we considered switching rooms around. However, that would result in bad hall traffic problems so the school board opted to replace several large bulky desks with smaller ones and remove several book shelves. Even so, the room is much too crowded and if the population continues to climb, something else will have to be done.

In conclusion, we have our problems, but I feel the sutdents are working and learning, which is our main goal.

SCHOOL NURSE ANNUAL REPORT

The school year of 1975 has presented few health problems. Because of school physicals several referrals to N.H. Crippled Childrens' Services were made. Four-B Funds from the State of N.H. has made possible some needed additional medical and dental care not possible through other services. The Lions Club was helpful in obtaining glasses when other funds were depleted.

Mrs. W. McLaughlin of UNH Cooperative Extension taught a four week unit in nutrition to the students in all grades. This program is planned on a three year rotation basis as long as it is available.

Students and pre-schoolers were included in Milan-Dummer immunization clinics held in Milan since no clinics were available in Errol. CONVALESCE Home Health Agecny of Colebrook will hold clinics in Errol this coming spring, the first being January 22, 1976. This will eliminate parents transporting their children such a long distance to Milan and also eliminate the danger of icy roads.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of the Town of Errol:

My report to you this year will focus on a few areas of education which I feel are of great importance to the people of Errol. One of these areas will deal with federal funds and what Errol will be required to do to continue accepting them in the future. The second comes from a very unstable funding picture with respect to Upton and what the impact of a change of plans by Upton could mean to Errol.

Other areas which will be mentioned include overcrowding at the school, the proposed budget, Minimum Standards, and the warrant. I shall attempt to provide sufficient details so as to assure each item is understood by everyone.

Federal Aid

When I first entered the educational field in the 50's a great deal of discussion was taking place at that time about federal aid to education. As with most issues of that kind there were those for and against; those who felt it was needed and would not lead to high government taking over local schools and those who feared such aid would lead to eventual take-over of the local schools by those in Washington. Neither seemed very likely at the time so little attention was given. In 1957 Sputnick changed the thinking in Washington. Everyone began to feel the schools in the United States had fallen far behind Russia in the area of science. A flurry of activity followed which led to the passage of the National Defense Education Act. This act began the first significant flood of federal dollars into the public school system. It was the purpose of the act to upgrade the science being taught in our schools. It has since been broadened to include several other areas of the curriculum. In recent years it has become a lesser piece of legislation and has been funded at a much lower figure.

Following the passage of the National Defense Education Act little activity took place until the Johnson Era. From 1963 through 1968 a flood of social and educational legislation was passed. Included were Title I, II, III and many others. Few restrictions were attached to the use of the money in the early stages. However, since the late 60's and early 70's the writing has been appearing on the wall. More recently since 1974 a flood of controls have been handed down from Washington through H.E.W. taking the first steps to control your schools, its programs and some of its finances. All of these controls are dependent upon Errol or any other school district accepting

federal funds. Therefore, if you wish to continue accepting this money, the federal requirements attached to them will have to be met.

The magnitude of the problem is one of a large number of dollars. Below you will find the amounts received in the 1974-75 school year:

The amounts listed above, though large for a town the size of Errol, are smaller than the amounts expected during the 1975-76 school year. Can Errol afford to replace these lost funds? The decision is and will be an important one for everyone.

The fears of the 50's are fast becoming the realities of the 70's. The transfer of power from the local community to Washington has begun. What was a trickle just three years ago has since become a flood so immense that perhaps it has gone beyond the point where people can control it. The amazing part of the whole thing is the fact that Washington only funds 9% of all school costs in the country. However, with that 9% they are in the position of "dictating" what you must do in areas of curriculum, testing materials, books, educational policy, teaching methods, and even the financing and direction of athletic programs.

The whole question of federal funding is so important to the future of local educational institutions relative to local control that it can not be taken lightly. With full appreciation for the fact that federal funds can be used to advantage and that their loss can have a heavy tax impact on the community it is my recommendation to the people of Errol that they do away with all federal aid to education from all sources regardless of their supposed benefits to the children. Errol, in my judgement can and must do without further federal funding of any kind if it wishes to control its school. Not to do so will complete a step which all of us will live to regret.

Overcrowding At Errol

This year Errol has had the largest enrollment in the past 5 years. As a result one classroom is bodily overcrowded while a second is much larger than it should be. Much discussion has resulted because of the problem with a couple of alternatives possible should the condition continue. However, at the moment the present classroom arrangement will continue.

The enrollments below indicate the size of the school and the classes which are overcrowded.

Minimum Standards

In the past, some of the people of Errol have taken a position on the Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools. However, at this time the community as a whole has not taken a position on these mandatory requirements. Therefore, it was the decision of your school board to include a special article in the warrant to give the people of Errol an opportunity to express their opinion. Article 12 will do just that.

The N.H. Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools require that each elementary school in the state provide each child with a minimum education. This is defined to mean that certain services be provided each child on a regular basis. These include all of what you have now in your school plus physical education, guidance services, library services, art, and special education.

Each community was left with the task of defining how these services could best be provided. In Errol, study committee was formed and recommendations made to the people in the spring of 1972. The proposal called for full implementation of the Standards over a period of 3 years. The last step of the plan was to have been completed for the present school year, but because of a budget reduction all programs added to the school in 1973 and 1974, plus those proposed for the fall of 1975, were lost.

Some people have asked about what the state can do if Errol refuses to comply with the law. Several actions are possible. They include the loss of state aid, having a non-approved school, and the right of parents to remove their children from the school and send them to an approved school. In the event of the last option, Errol would be responsible to pay all tuition costs and transportation costs, if the child were under 14 years of age.

It is not the purpose of the Minimum Standards to create a hardship for any community, but rather to assure that each community provides a basic education for all of its children. Also, the standards do not indicate how the standards should be implemented, but leave it to each community to decide for itself how it can best be done. This was the case in Errol.

Budget Deficit

The budget for the 1975-1976 school year will be in deficit by some \$3,205.86 in June of this year unless additional funds are provided. Where does the deficit occur? A check will indicate it can be found under tuition where a total over-expenditure of \$3,600.00 is expected. This amount was reduced somewhat by cutting expenditures in other areas of the budget. However, it is not possible to cut expenditures in large enough amounts to cover the \$3,600.00 needed.

Tuition Students

By the time you read my report, it will have become common knowledge that Upton is giving serious consideration to sending all of its children to Bethel. There are those who feel this would be to the advantage of Errol because of some overcrowding in the school and because of the added cost to educate the children. Let me assure you that tuition students in a school the size of Errol do not cost Errol much money. In reality, it provides Errol large revenues which help to reduce taxes for everyone. The Upton students represent a cost of \$800.00 to \$1,000.00 in all parts of the budget. The loss of revenue could amount to \$16,000.00—\$22,000.00 for the year. The differences would have to be made up through local taxes and the effects would be substantial. Therefore, Errol has much to gain by accepting Upton students, both for the school and for the community.

1976-77 Budget

The proposed 1976—77 budget totals \$91,740.76 for a gross increase of 18.3% over the current year. This represents \$14,158.87 more than the 1975—76 budget without the deficit of \$10,953.01 if the \$3,205.86 deficit is added to this year's budget. The increase represents a sizeable amount of money from one year to the next.

Another prospective to the budget, which needs to be looked at, is the amount of money required to be raised this year by local taxes and the amount which would be needed next year. The figures below clearly show what the difference is:

Should the Upton School District remove its children from Errol, this could mean that Errol would be required to raise as much as \$16,000.00 to \$22,000.00 more for next year. This could result in a net increase of anywhere from 74.9% to 88.8% above the current year. The effects of such an increase on the tax rate would be untenable.

Summary

The Errol School is at a crossroad where a decision has to be made. In my judgement a wrong decision will set the pattern of education in Errol for many years to come. Therefore, serious consideration needs to be given to the many questions which will be raised. Hopefully, your decision will be in the best interest of your children.

To operate a school well, takes the cooperation and effort of many people. Parents must be interested in what is being taught their children. The community must set an atmosphere where learning is important. School boards must provide the leadership to convince people that a good education is desirable. Teachers must be dedicated and interested in the welfare of children. When all these forces work together, only a good school can result.

To those of you, who have participated in the effort of providing a good education for the children of Errol, I thank. Without you we could not have achieved what has been accomplished to date.

SCHOOL LUNCH REPORT

The 1974-75 school lunch program, starting Oct. 14, 1974, operated 134 days under the management of Ida Martel and Virginia Mosher and closed on May 23, 1975. During this period 6,480 children's lunches and 361 adult lunches were served for an average daily participation of 48 children per day.

The cost of the program totaled \$5,592.00—\$2,006.00 food, \$3,443.00 labor, and \$143.00 expendible supplies and food trans-

portation charges.

Receipts for the year were \$2,004.00 children's lunch money, \$2,378.00 school district, and \$1,580.00 reimbursement from state, for a total of \$5,962.00.
