Article 3. To see if the town will vote to grant the town of Easton free use of the town dump for 15 years for the disposal of household garbage and rubbish.

Article 4. To see what action the town will take in regard to construction of a fire station on land now presently owned for this purpose and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 for same, the town to issue serial notes for a period of 20 years. Article 5. To see if the town will vote to accept the offer of the Mittersill Real Estate Corporation to transfer to the town, without any charge, the entire existing Mittersill water system, including reservoir, wells, pumps, compressors, mains and lines, together with the necessary easements and together with the transfer to the town of the 1967 water rents; and further, to see if the town will vote to become responsible for future continuation of water service and for all necessary future expansion of the same in the Mittersill Development, the same being a condition in the aforesaid offer of Mittersill Real Estate Corporation.

Article 6. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to the reconstruction of Route #18 through the village, and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to withdraw a sum of money from the equipment reserve fund to cover the cost of a new truck and snowplow, and a new broom for the Gravely tractor.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$491.00 for the White Mountain Community Services, Inc.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

"All property owners shall be required to file with the Board of Selectmen their intentions of new building construction or additions."

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize a penalty of twenty cents on each poll tax unpaid on December 1 of each year, as authorized under Statute C66S44PL.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to allow a discount for early payment of taxes.

Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT TO HEALTH OFFICER TOWN OF FRANCONIA, N. H.

For Year Ending December 31, 1966

A Diabetic detection program was conducted this year for the first time. This test is to locate the hidden or unknown diabetic and get him or her under proper diet and treatment.

Well Child Conferences were also conducted for infants and preschool children who received a physical examination by the attending physician. Immunization shots against whooping cough, tetanus, diphtheria, small pox, polio, and measles were also given. Booster shots also to those who needed same.

Home Health Services can be arranged for by the town officials with the Lisbon District Nursing Association for the people who require public health nursing in their home and the services are prescribed for by their physician.

Booster shots of diphtheria and tetanus were also given in grades 1 and 4 at the school for those who requested it.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Fire Record

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- 1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres—a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping areas.

- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
- 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important instruct your children that matches are not play things.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE—1966

The school health program was carried out with complete physicals on all pupils, whose parents requested them, by Dr. Parker, the school physician.

Heights, weights, and vision tests were done on all pupils and audiogram tests were done on grades one and four. Notices were sent home stating any defects found.

Two children attended the Orthopedic Clinic in Littleton.

Registration day was held in May. Three children were weighed and measured by the school nurse.

In December, diphtheria and tetanus injections were given, with parents' permission, to pupils in grades one and four.

I wish to thank all those connected with the school and the parents for their assistance and cooperation.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

I herewith submit my eighth annual report as Principal of the Franconia Elementary School.

ADMINISTRATION:

The present school year began on Wednesday, September 7, with a total registration of 85 pupils. Although the enrollment has varied a great deal, as of this writing the number remains the same. A breakdown of this figure shows that 5 are in Kindergarten, 17 in Grade 1, 11 in Grade 2, 17 in Grade 3, 13 in Grade 4, 11 in Grade 5, and 11 in Grade 6. The school day for Grades 1-6 starts at 8:00 A.M. with the doors being opened at 7:45. The school day ends at 2:30 P.M. Instrumental music for all pupils in Grades 5 and 6, whose parents wish them to participate in this program, was introduced in the school in September. Miss Kathleen Bean of Littleton is the instructor. She comes to the school one day a week. Mrs. Marion Callender of Lisbon continues to teach music in all grades.

Mrs. Naomi Hodgdon of Lancaster joined the faculty as instructor of Physical Education. She replaced Mr. Glenn Stillings who resigned to take a full time teaching position in Lisbon. Mrs. Sally May of Littleton is again teaching Kindergarten. This is again held in the Town Building, due to lack of space in the elementary school. Kindergarten is in session there from 8:00 A.M. to 10:30 A.M. each school day. Mrs. Leone Philbrook of Sugar Hill, who taught Grades 3 and 4, was unable to return in September due to a severe injury received just prior to the opening of school. She has been granted a year's leave of absence. Mrs. Philbrook was replaced by Mrs. Mary Kerns of Sugar Hill who resigned in October. Mr. Vernon Wood of Littleton is now teaching the Fourth Grade. The other members of the faculty are Mrs. Pauline Cole of Franconia who teaches Grades 5 and 6, and Mrs. Evelyn Howe of Lancaster who teaches Grades 2 and 3. I continue to teach Grade 1. Mr. Richard Sullivan continues to do an outstanding job as custodian of the elementary school. Mr. Robert Sheehan is most co-operative as the Kindergarten custodian.

CURRICULUM:

Personal guidance and individual attention are given each pupil. The faculty strives at all times to help each child realize his or her potential, both as a student and a good school citizen. The basic psychological needs of childhood are carefully observed. Individual differences are noted. Good work habits are emphasized. Much attention, of course, is paid to the teaching of the basic fundamentals in each subject.

As I have reported in the past, the phonetic approach to reading is taught with care and precision throughout the school. The Speed-i-o-scopes are in constant use. The techniques developed through their use have been found very helpful in training children in the complex task of reading. Speed and comprehension go hand in hand because it is easier to comprehend a thought unit than an isolated word. In addition, the children enjoy the novelty of using these mechanical devices.

Enrichment materials are continually being incorporated at all grade levels to provide stimulation and challenge for each pupil. The Science Research Association Reading Program is now being used in Grades 2 through 6. It encourages an individual rate of progress in reading. Room libraries are growing rapidly. New books are added each year. Paperback books are also being utilized. As a result, each child enjoys reading at his own level of ability and interest.

The faculty of your school is very cognizant of the value of a good Visual Aids Program. It continues to

be a very important part of the school curriculum. New filmstrips, pertaining to all subjects, are added each year. Filmstrips, also used in correlation with records, are a source of much interest and educational value to the children. Television also is utilized to the fullest despite the handicap of a limited viewing area.

The school's testing programs are still in effect. The Achievement Tests are now given in the fall so that they may be used for diagnostic purposes.

The new 1966 GUIDELINES AND RECOMMEN-DATIONS FOR N. H. PUBLIC ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS, compiled by the N. H. Department of Education, is being carefully studied. As in the past, the faculty of your school will continue to follow the concepts set forth in such a report.

SCHOOL LUNCH:

The school lunch program continues to operate smoothly under the capable managership of Mrs. Thelma Gilman of Bethlehem. Mrs. Gilman replaced Mrs. Louise Peabody who resigned at the close of the 1965-1966 school year. As of this writing, there are approximately 68 children participating daily in this program.

SCHOOL HEALTH:

Dr. Ralph Parker and Nurse Virginia McAllister have given complete physicals to the pupils in Kindergarten and Grades 1-6, whose parents so desired. Mrs. McAllister's report will give you further details as to her other activities in this school.

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES:

The children enjoyed a foliage tour in the fall due to the kindness of Mr. Hamilton Ford. Refreshments, "hosted" by Mr. Richard Coney, added to the trip's enjoyment.

Open House was held during Education Week in the fall. No special programs or special classes were planned. The usual procedures were followed so that a true picture of the school's activities could be obtained. Parent attendance was most gratifying.

The annual Christmas Program, with 100% pupil participation, was presented in the school auditorium Tuesday evening, December 20. School parties were held the following day.

The pupils in Grades 5 and 6, under the tutelage of Mrs. Cole, carried out an enjoyable Christmas project in art. They designed and made individual gifts for all the pupils in the school in conjunction with their other Christmas art activities.

The Ski Program, sponsored by the Franconia School District, is in effect again this year. There are 45 children enrolled in this program. Mr. Vernon Wood, 4th grade teacher, is supervising the children.

The University of New Hampshire Theater for Children presented "Snow White and The Seven Dwarfs" at the Bethlehem School. The entire Franconia Elementary student body, from Kindergarten through Grade 6, attended this performance.

Pupils from Grades 5 and 6, under the direction of Physical Education Director Glenn Stillings, participated in the Track Meet at Lancaster in May. Mr. Ford donated the use of his bus. Mr. Sullivan assisted in this activity.

An assembly, "Poetry Jubilee", was presented in the school auditorium on April 20, 1966, under the direction of Mrs. Leone Philbrook. It climaxed a poetry contest which was part of the school's Language Arts Program. The idea of such an assembly originated with a School Board member, Mrs. Nancy Cole.

Later every child's contribution was entered in the

Creative Writing Contest conducted by the Overlake Day School of Burlington and WCAX Television. There were 1,056 entries in the contest from 52 schools located in Vermont, New Hampshire and New York. Nine judges chose 23 winners of first place and 28 winners of honorable mention. This school tied for first honors with the Shelburne Central School in Shelburne, Vermont, each winning a total of seven. This school also won seven honorable mentions.

A Field Day for Grades 1-6 was held on June 3. Later, during a school assembly, ribbons were presented the winners of the various contests.

CONCLUSION:

I wish to express my appreciation to the people of Franconia; the Board of Education; Superintendent of Schools, William Grass; Educational Consultant, Leslie Cummings; Business Administrator, Oliver Cole; and the staff and pupils for their cooperation and assistance.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Franconia School District:

It is with pleasure that I submit my report to you as Superintendent of Schools.

During the past year (1965-66) there were 99 pupils enrolled in Franconia Elementary School. The average membership was 85.57.

This school year there are 85 pupils attending Franconia Elementary School, in grades K-6. Of this number, there are 10 pupils from Easton, 15 from Lisbon Town and 5 from Sugar Hill. There are 15 pupils enrolled in Littleton Junior High, and 31 pupils enrolled in the Littleton Senior High School.

The Franconia District is studying with the Lisbon-Littleton AREA-Coop group in an attempt to meet the minimum standards and re-organization of the school districts according to the recommendations set forth by the Interim Commission that was legalized by the New Hampshire State Legislature.

This group has made progress and will in the near future present a report to each of the school districts making up the study and at that time the voters of Franconia will have the opportunity to discuss and vote. Your representatives on this study have been: Mrs. Nancy Cole, Mr. James Moulton, and Mr. William Hjelm.

The Supervisory Union office has been consolidated into one unit at 33 Main Street, Littleton, N.H. This expanded Supervisory Union is in keeping with the State Board of Education's plan of re-organization as recommended by the Interim Commission of the 1963 General Court. Mr. Paul Henry has been appointed the Assistant Superintendent of Schools and Mr. Oliver Cole the Business Administrator. This organization will, I am sure, better meet the needs and purposes that have been set forth by the State program for improving education.

An area which has become quite controversial and one which affects our schools in many ways, is Federal Aid to Education which I would like to review with you at this time.

Federal Aid to Education has become substantial this school year. Although, this may be an area many would wish away, I firmly believe that the amount in years to come will dwarf the 1966 figures.

A question often asked of me is, "What is this Fededal Education Law?" In answer: there are many laws assisting and affecting education financially.

1. The Elementary-Secondary Act of 1965, or more commonly called the 89.10 bill.

There are 5 titles in this bill that grant aid from the local school district up to and including the State Department of Education. However, only titles 1, 2 and 3 affect us locally.

Title 1 is specifically allocated to the local districts and we have received in the White Mountains Supervisory Union #35 during 1966-67, \$41,769.93 and will receive similar amounts for the 1967-68 school year. The U.S. Congress will determine future allocations after 1968 (as with all titles). The money received under this Title 1 must be used for the educationally deprived and is being channeled into programs which are badly needed.

Title 2 is for the entire Supervisory Union as a unit and we received \$6,091.00 for the 1965-66 school year. Our entitlement for the current school year is \$7,259.- 40. These monies must, by law, purchase library, audiovisual aids, supplies, materials, etc., only after inventories are completed. This project is directed by Mr. Gordon Flight of Bethlehem and a program has been initiated which rotates materials and equipment throughout our 10 district Union.

Title 3 is for area or regional programs and although it is centralized in our Supervisory Union office, the area served is the entire North Country (7 Supervisory Unions from Woodsville and Conway, north). This program Project "ARISE," has an operating budget of \$74,850.00 and is concerned primarily with social enrichment. Mr. Stanley Tufts, Project Director, and his staff have already initiated programs in which your children have become involved in an interesting and challenging enrichment project that will have lasting effects.

2. The next major Federal Education Law, that affects us here, is the Vocational Education Act of 1963. This act granted the White Mountains Regional School District \$240,000.00 during 1965, of which \$205,000.00 is presently being used to construct their new High School Building, and \$35,000.00 to purchase vocational equipment as the new building nears completion. Without doubt, additional dollars from this act will assist with employment of staff, etc.

3. The Economic Opportunity Act has several titles of which Title 2 has affected our schools considerably. The 1966 Summer Head Start Programs operated under this act. Mr. C. Douglas McIntyre of Whitefield is the director, and operates one of the largest Head Start programs in New Hampshire at a cost of \$16,-354.00 and involving approximately 61 children.

The three above education acts, although the largest in dollars, are not by any means the only Federal programs your schools deal with annually. The 1917

Smith-Hughes and George Bardeen Acts, the National Defense Education Act, the Manpower Development & Training Act, School Lunch and Government Surplus programs, all of long standing, direct much of the supplies, equipment, food, milk and dollars into your school budgets. Each is very important and each contributes to the education and welfare of your children.

In closing, may I take this opportunity to thank the Board of Education, the State Department of Education, our Administrators, and the staff of the Superintendent's office for their continued cooperation and support.

Therefore, it is proposed that the town of Franconia set aside funds at the rate of one dollar (\$1.) per resident (based on the 1960 census); this amount totaling \$491.00.

Funds so appropriated by the townspeople of Franconia indicate their willingness to share with their neighboring towns in the responsibility of providing mental health services to our own area.
