

How do we express our thanks to an elected public official who, for many years, has devotedly served his community in a position of trust and integrity?

How do we go about replacing a person whom we took as a matter of course because he performed his duties precisely and efficiently without fanfare or publicity?

It is human nature to overlook the advantages we possess until we are about to lose them. Only then do we take inventory and begin to think of ways to show our appreciation.

ANNUAL REPORT — FIRE DEPARTMENT

This past year, your Fire Department responded to 44 fire calls, of which 14 were grass or woods, 2 were chimney, 1 was auto, 4 were resuscitation, 4 were electrical, and 6 were dwelling fires: the remainder were miscellanous calls. This all adds up to a total of 62 hours spent at fires, not counting approximately 50 hours at training sessions, so you can see these men give much of their time, not only at fighting fires but also at learning quicker, more efficient ways of fighting them. So, at this time, as we do each year, we want to thank each and every volunteer fireman for making this department one of which we are all proud to be a part of.

This past year, the addition was completed at the Central Station, giving us much more needed room. Hopefully, this year we will be able to equip this added space with hose racks, work benches, etc.

We also received 3 radios this year, a gift from the Police Department, which we would like to thank them for at this time, and also for their fine co-operation at the scene of fires.

The Association this past year presented the children of town with their annual Santa Claus ride around town on the fire truck. After the chilly ride, and a short delay while the department answered a fire call, Santa talked to about 200 youngsters at the fire house.

The Association also purchased a new 50-star American flag and a state flag which we hope to have flying on a new flagpole donated by the Women's Club come this Memorial Day.

FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres - - a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

- If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
- 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important Instruct your children that matches are not play things.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

As Chief of the Hampstead Police Department, I am pleased to submit my annual report to the town.

The department during the year of 1966 investigated a total of 30 auto accidents. This represents a drop of 13 over the 1965 total. We are indeed pleased to interpret the drop of accidents as being the direct result of completed alterations to the Junction of Routes 111 and 121. We can still state as in the 1965 report, that during and since the alterations we have not been called to investigate a single mishap at that location. We can also feel proud that the department was in fact responsible for such changes at that location.

In May the department received our radio system that was approved at the March Town Meeting. This has increased greatly the efficiency of the department by giving a more rapid means of communications when the need arises. Such communication is available between all department vehicles and the base police station and also affords a complete means of communication with all surrounding departments.

Our department prosecuted a total of 90 Court cases during the year. Court is held at the High School Building on the 3rd Tuesday of each month at 7:30 in the evening. These sessions of court are usually open to the general public and the department officers will welcome any interested visitor. This affords the general public an opportunity to see one small part of the department at work.

We would like to stress that the department has and is willing to use at any hour of the day or night a first aid stretcher carried at all times in the chief's car. It has been brought to the attention of this office that on numerous occasions town residents have had the occasion to require ambulance service to and from hospitals. Although our training and facilities are on a limited basis, we feel a majority of such cases could be handled by the department on a high rate of savings to the ill or injured. We feel that hospital fees are great enough not to warrant savings where it is possible. We have the sincere desire and willingness to provide this service where and when it is required or requested.

We have made progress in preparing a room in the High School Building as a police department center. We anticipate an early completion before the peak summer period. We as a department feel that the carrying out of official police matters is possible and more efficient if it can be carried out in a properly prepared atmosphere. At present it is only possible in the private homes of various department officers.

The annual Halloween parties were carried out with the assistance of the Parent-Teachers Association. As on previous occasions Halloween complaints were held at a bare minimum. We can only thank our young people for their restraint while having fun.

Thanks is extended to my officers for their ever ready willingness to assist when the call arises. Without their prompt, able response and willingness to assist when the call arises, a difficult task would be ever more difficult. As usual a word of thanks is extended to the families of my officers. Summer enjoyments which are usual within this area are on many occasions hampered or even made impossible because of pending police duty. Sad as it may seem more often than not the only thanks received is the satisfaction of doing our small tasks to make our town a better place in which to live. Thanks is also extended to the Board of Selectmen and other town officials for their never ending cooperation.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Memorial Gymnasium in said District on the thirteenth day of March, 1967 at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 2. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 3. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.
- 4. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for, to receive and to spend, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.
- 5. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to establish a Capital Reserve for the purpose of school building expansion. (Recommended by Town Budget Committee)
- 6. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to apply excess State Building Aid receipts to the cost of the well.

- 7. To see if the District will vote to instruct the School Board to inform the Trustees of Pinkerton Academy that the District will not request termination of the District's current contract to become effective June 30, 1968.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to continue its contracts at Pinkerton Academy for at least three years and also vote to create an area school planning committee in accordance with R.S.A. A Report to the School Board and to the Voters of the District of Hampstead

This Committee appointed by the School Board has actively investigated the problems relating to high school education with which the District will have to deal this year and/or in future years and has compared objectively the likely costs and academic merits of alternatives by which they might be met as they appear at this time.

In the Town's best interests the problems which require attention at this time appear to be those surrounding the District's contract with Pinkerton Academy. This contract appears to have been intended when written to define a non-profit plan for tuitioning Hampstead's high schoolers to Pinkerton Academy until June 1978 at tuition rates determined from year to year by Pinkerton's actual costs which are specifically defined to include those of amortizing Shepard Building.

In reply to inquiry by the School Board the Trustees of Pinkerton Academy have indicated that Hampstead could negotiate termination of its contract effective June 30, 1968, or in June of a later year, subject only to reasonable stipulations regarding timing to permit necessary advance planning and approval by other towns and banks involved in a complex situation. A reply from Hampstead prior to April 1 of this year respecting Hampstead's wishes has been requested.

Since the Trustees of Pinkerton Academy have requested a vote of the School District, and inasmuch as it is deemed unlikely that another home for Hampstead's high schoolers could be arranged so soon as September 1968, it appears that the Town's best interests would be served by rejecting the implied proffer of termination June 30, 1968.

This Committee recommends that the District instruct the School Board by vote duly taken and recorded to inform the Trustees of Pinkerton Academy that Hampstead will not at this time request termination to become effective June 30, 1968. (Article No. 7, if passed, will serve this purpose.)

Pinkerton Academy enrollment is expected to reach Pinkerton's present capacity in September 1967. In following years it appears that Pinkerton will have to arrange additional capacity which could best be accomplished by new construction. In this originally unforeseen development Pinkerton's contracts to supply high school education to pupils from five towns, of which Hampstead is but one, appear to be defective to the extent that they exclude recovery by Pinkerton of amortization costs other than those of Shepard Building although permitting recovery of unlimited rental costs for the use of inferior additional space.

An ill-timed and inadequately explained request by Pinkerton Trustees for relief from that defect by amended or supplemental con-

tracts which was directed to the five towns in February 1966 has been rejected by the school boards of the five towns.

It is not known whether other towns will on consideration agree to support further expansion of Pinkerton Academy capacity by amended or supplemental contracts from their own view of the better accommodation for their own pupils in future years. This Committee recognizes that if other towns should do so it might then appear to be in Hampstead's best interests to join with them.

This Committee has investigated the likely costs and academic merits of a proposal that the District's interests would be best served by operating its own High School within the District.

Exhaustive study of the foregoing premise has been possible by the work of a sub-committee of dedicated voters who have drawn the conclusion that the relative costs per pupil to afford curriculum and other academic qualities superior to those of Pinkerton would so far exceed those of Pinkerton tuition as to be impracticable at this time or within the very near future.

The logically related proposal that a high school of comparable quality within the District might be realized at acceptable costs per pupil by the expedient of receiving pupils tuitioned to it from one or more other towns which would thereby share its total costs has been studied by this Committee to the extent of its necessarily limited abilities.

It is not possible for the voters of Hampstead to take any decisive action relative to such a proposal at this time. Before any decisive question can be put to the District's voters certain prerequisites in New Hampshire law would, or will, have to be met.

Among these prerequisites are adequate investigation which can be made only by a committee created by the District expressly for that purpose in accordance with statutes which have been designed to enable school districts to enter into and to protect their respective interests in such contracts. These define such a committee by the term "area planning committee," limit its membership to three qualified voters of which at least one must be a member of the District's school board and require that the District either elect them in the same meeting or by its vote instruct the moderator to appoint them.

The duties and abilities of such a committee are defined in the statutes. It may combine with like committees from one or more other school districts to thereby form an "area planning board" which will then be legally competent to consider the advisability of contract between their districts in a design to join them in mutual obligations for mutual benefits and in their discretion to proceed with the production of a plan in elaborate detail for affiliation, operation, construction and curriculum which, but only after approval by the State Board of Education, can be submitted to the voters of each

district for their decision whether to accept or to reject the plan in its entirety.

The State encourages the formation of such AREA affiliations in a design to upgrade the quality of New Hampshire public education, and offers the incentives of building aid increased from 30% to 40% or more, a receiving district's borrowing capacity possibly elevated from 7% to 10% of its worth, and endorsement or guarantee of sending district's obligations by the State.

The District may take action at this time to create an area planning committee and so move toward adequate investigation of this possible avenue of improvement. (Article No. 8, if passed, will serve this purpose.) RECOMMENDED.

Hampstead's alternative to pool all of its interests in public education with those of four adjoining towns by merging Hampstead School District into Timberlane School District at this time appears to offer both advantages and disadvantages.

Timberlane is a bold venture into the most modern of designs for public education, and the first of its exact kind in New England. Its planned philosophy of operation and curriculum is believed by this Committee to promise superior academic merits including the area of teaching marketable skills, the significance of which will become more widely understood and appreciated in future years.

Timberlane's starting-up costs have been burdensome upon its taxpayers; its operating costs per pupil may appear likely to continue high by local and/or New Hampshire standards of comparison. However, with the rapidly increasing enrollment which now seems assured Timberlane's costs per pupil could become significantly reduced and with experience the promised superiority of academic merits could be proven.

Timberlane will, before very many years of continued growth, need and justify a second high school plant. That such a plant might then be located in the Hampstead area and so afford maximum benefits to Hampstead pupils at costs which might then be acceptable to Hampstead voters is a possibility which ought not be prejudiced by ill-considered rejection at this time.

Timberlane is a cooperative school district operating under the provisions of New Hampshire law, R.S.A. Chapter 195. The State encourages formation of such Cooperatives and offers to Hampstead the incentives of building aid increased to 55% and borrowing capacity elevated to 10%.

It is not possible for the voters of Hampstead to take any decisive action relative to joining Timberlane at this time. Before a decisive question of merger can be put to the District's voters certain prerequisites in New Hampshire law would, or will, have to be met.

Among these are more adequate investigation than has been possible by legally limited abilities of this study committee, a formal-

ity of petition by Hampstead School Board to meet with Timberlane School Board to jointly study the advisability and terms of possible annexation after which the joint Boards may in their discretion proceed to the production of a plan in complete detail for such merger which, but only after approval by the State Board of Education, can then be submitted to the voters of Hampstead and to the voters of Timberlane for their decision whether to accept or to reject the plan in its entirety.

The District may take action at this time to direct the School Board to petition Timberlane School Board and so move toward decisive consideration of this possible avenue to improvement at this time. (Article No. 9, if passed, will serve this purpose.) RECOMMENDED.

This Committee deems its own services to have been in the public interest, its objectives to have been for the Town's best interests. Continuation by the School Board of such an appointed committee could become, it is believed, a very good habit. Service on such a committee could become a worthwhile school of experience for voters who may aspire in the true spirit of democracy to contribute something of their own abilities in the public interest. Continuation of fact-finding and evaluation, of probing and reporting the probabilities of the future, of recommendations related to alternative solutions of problems which do or will confront the voters of the District could become of increasing value to the growing community.

This Committee recommends to the School Board that a committee of such advisory capacity be established and continued in the organization of the District.

By the Committee, February 6, 1967, agreed.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

I am presenting my Eleventh Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Hampstead. A report from the Principal will discuss in more detail the activities of the school. Statistical reports are listed separately.

Personnel

Eight teachers joined the Central School Staff this current year. They were Mrs. Jean Robbins, Grade 1, a graduate of Pembroke College with teaching experience in Reading, Massachusetts; Miss Barbara Boyd, Grade 2, a graduate of the University of Massachusetts with teaching experience in Erving, Massachusetts; Miss Faith McLaughlin, Grade 2, a graduate of Regis College, with teaching experience in Wayland, Massachusetts; Mrs. Kay Herlihy, Grade 4, a graduate of Rivier College with teaching experience in Dover, and Nashua, New Hampshire and Bradford, Massachusetts; Robert Cortese. Grade 5, a graduate of Emerson College with teaching experience in Eliot, Maine and Lowell, Massachusetts; Warren Cooke, Grade 5, a graduate of Bridgewater State College with teaching experience in Medford and East Longmeadow, Massachusetts and Salem, New Hampshire; Raymond Gradual, Grade 7, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with teaching experience in Auburn, New Hampshire; Robert Wilmot, a graduate of Plymouth State College with teaching experience in Laconia and Woodsville, New Hampshire.

There will be a need to revise the Teachers' Salary Schedule. Salary schedules are being raised in all districts and with a continued shortage of qualified teachers, Hampstead must raise their schedule in order to compete. The very fact that Hampstead has a large turnover of teachers each year makes it imperative to do everything possible to attract and hold good teachers.

Housing

It appears that the Central School will adequately house grades 1-8 for this coming school year. However, additional space will be needed for 1968-1969 unless Grade 8 or Grade 7 or both are housed elsewhere. Enrollments are increasing abnormally in Rockingham County and we have no reason to think that Hampstead will be an exception.

Educating Secondary Students

Hampstead citizens have been bombarded with information concerning three possible means of educating their secondary students, namely: continue with Pinkerton Academy, join Timberlane Regional or build their own High School. Each alternative has attractive features. It is not an easy decision to make.

Cost is an important consideration. However, ask yourselves what will you receive in each case for your money.

If you wish to build a school of your own, determine what your enrollment must be to make it feasible. Are you familiar with the requirements set by the State Board of Education?

If you wish to wait and see as far as Timberlane is concerned, then be ready to act if and when Timberlane adds additional housing or it may be too late.

It would appear that the Study Committee should be continued in order to be able to inform the people of any and all developments.

Federal Aid

Hampstead has benefited from Title I and Title II of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965. Title I has provided an enrichment of the readiness program for the disadvantaged child.

Title II has provided additional library material and audio-visual records and filmstrips. Headstart has been one of the most successful of the aid programs. Two of Hampstead's pre-schoolers were able to profit from the class held in Atkinson last summer.

Hampstead school children are still able to benefit from Title III of the National Defense Education Act. The Government matches what we spend for various items in several areas of the curriculum as need arises.

I believe we should continue to accept Federal Aid and I believe that a continued effort should be made to reduce Federal controls to a minimum and that local and state authorities should be given freedom to develop their own specific needs.

Improving Education in New Hampshire

Education is becoming more costly and the local property taxpayer is absorbing most of the cost. The 1966 Governor's Conference on Education recommends as its top priority, the following recommendation which should relieve the property taxpayer and at the same time improve the extent and quality of education. The Conference recommended that the New Hampshire Legislature raise and appropriate sufficient State funds to implement in full all existing legislation for State Aid to Education. In particular, State Foundation Aid, School District Reorganization Aid, Aid for Special Education and School Building Aid. (It is interesting to note for example, that if State Foundation Aid is implemented in full for 1967-1968, Hampstead would receive \$24,149.73. They receive nothing now.) The Conference further recommended that the State Board of Education develop standards leading to quality education for Elementary Schools and that the Board raise and strengthen existing standards for secondary schools. Compliance with these standards shall be required for participation in any State Aid Program.

Another priority that was presented is as follows:

It recommended that the New Hampshire legislature require kindergarten programs for all public school pupils of the State, that all public and private programs of pre-school education be brought under the supervision and regulatory control of the State Board of Education and that the State Department of Education be staffed to meet these responsibilities.

It is interesting to note that the Governor's Conference was made up of seventeen state-wide co-operating organizations and they formally committed their full support of all reasonable methods of raising revenue at the state level to finance the projected costs of increased financial aid for quality education.

Looking ahead at our own elementary program, I believe we must look closely at the value of non-graded classes, individualized reading programs and the development of individualized curriculum materials. We must keep abreast of the latest developments in education. I believe we should have elementary guidance and library personnel either at the local or Union level.

Appreciation

This will be my final report as your Superintendent. I look forward to retirement with mixed emotions but I have no regrets. Most important I will treasure the friends I have made and I am most deeply appreciative of the support and cooperation given me during my association with the people of Hampstead. I am particularly appreciative of the courtesies extended to me by all School Board Members, Principals, pupils and Staff Members.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and Citizens of Hampstead:

This, my fourth annual report as Supervising Principal, will include reports from the school nurse-teacher, music supervisors, remedial reading specialist, and the speech therapist.

The growth of the school population continued in 1966. There were 352 pupils enrolled on the opening day of school. Double classes were the case in all except grade six.

The staff in 1966 consisted of fifteen classroom teachers, one remedial reading specialist, one nurse-teacher, two music supervisors, one speech therapist, one secretary, and two custodians.

In the area of curriculum, the new Reading program was continued into grade five, a new supplementary literature program was introduced in grade eight, and Latin instruction was started for one section in the eighth grade. The Science Research Associates Modern Mathematics program was completed in all eight grades.

A Specialty Fair was again held at the gymnasium in May. Grades five through eight participated. Educational field trips were held for all grades.

In athletics, a soccer team was organized under the co-sponsorship of the school and the Hampstead civic club. Mr. Warren Cooke was coach. Also, interscholastic and intramural basketball, and interscholastic baseball were offered for boys. The girls' program consisted of interscholastic basketball and softball.

Graduation exercises for the eighth grade were held on June 21, at the Hampstead Congregational Church. Mr. Glendon N. Emerson, Chairman of the school board presented diplomas to thirty-seven graduates. Mr. Kenneth H. Sheetz, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, was guest speaker.

The week of November 7-11 was National Education week. Open house was held on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday.

The P.T.A. sponsored book fair was held in November under the supervision of Mrs. Mary Smith.

The school library reached a level of over eighteen hundred volumes during 1966. I wish to thank the many parents for their service as volunteer librarians. Also, appreciation is extended to individuals and organizations for their gifts for the library.

Appreciation is also offered to the Hampstead P.T.A. for their efforts in behalf of the children.

Pupils from grades five through eight participated in the annual National Spelling Bee sponsored by the Manchester Union Leader.

In the area of testing, a new form of the Stanford Achievement Test was administered to pupils of grades two through eight. Other standardized tests given during the year were: Metropolitan Readiness Tests and SRA Mental Ability Tests in grade one; Otis Mental Ability Tests given in grades two, four and six; and Orleans Algebra Prognosis Test, grade eight. In addition, basic reading tests were given to all pupils as well as various individual diagnostic tests.

The annual New England Reading Conference was held at the Statler-Hilton, Boston, Massachusetts. Mrs. Shirley Bevington and Mr. Richard Grey attended.

School children were transported by Mr. Frank Howard of Hampstead. Milk was purchased from the Wason-MacDonald Company of Haverhill, Massachusetts and Turner's Dairy, Salem, New Hampshire.

Physical examinations were administered by Dr. Raymond E. Moore and Dr. William R. Hart, assisted by school nurse-teacher, Mrs. Dorothy Scott, R.N.

Mrs. Charlotte T. Zimmer, Reading Specialist, reports as follows:

"Seventy-three pupils received remedial reading. The groups averaged four in number and some children had individual assistance. Mrs. Zimmer had from 12-14 classes per day of twenty minutes each. Children would be released from remedial reading if they were successful on standardized tests following instruction. Phonic and word analysis skills were stressed.

"On the second day of school in September, all second grade pupils were tested. At mid-year and the last week in May, every pupil in remedial classes was tested. Other tests were given during the year as needed. The following tests were given:

"All pupils above Grade I, entering Central School for the first time, were given grade placement tests as well as Otis Intelligence Tests. Five WISC tests were administered. Of the 73 pupils who were in remedial classes, 49 reached grade level, 61 showed a gain of 1 year or more, and 12 improved at least 6 months to 1 year."

Mrs. Dorothy Scott, R.N., reports it was with great enthusiasm that she started her first year as School Nurse-Teacher in Hampstead. The total school health program has three divisions: School Health Education, Healthful School Living and School Health Services.

Mrs. Scott further reports:

"School Health Education is the process of providing learning experience which favorably influences understanding, attitude and conduct relating to individual and community health. Health education helps children and youth learn how to live beautifully, provides them with knowledge and understanding useful in solving individual and group health problems, and instills in them a sense of personal health responsibility.

"Healthful School Living is a phrase that embraces all efforts to provide at school, physical, emotional and social conditions which are beneficial to the health and safety of all pupils.

"School Health Services are the procedures carried out by physicians, nurses, dentists, teacher and others, to appraise, protect and promote the health of students and school personnel.

"At the beginning of the school year each pupil had a cursory examination which consisted of inspecting glands, throat, teeth, head and extremities. The yearly medical examination for all students in grades 1, 3, 5 and 7, and those new to the school was held in October and November by Doctors Moore and Hart. Parents were notified of any defects. The hearing screening of all pupils has been completed.

"A program of Dental Health Education for all grades was held during November under the direction of the State Dental Hygienist.

"Other programs to be carried out this year are the vision screening, immunization clinic, and tuberculin skin testing. Also special programs on Personal Hygiene, Smoking, and Grooming and Beauty will be held.

"I wish to thank all the parents and friends of the Hampstead Central School who have so willingly assisted me."

Our music program was directed by Mrs. Eleanor Maynard in grades 1-4 and Mr. William Howard in grades 5-8.

Mrs. Maynard states:

"The music program in the first four grades consisted of singing on pitch with a pleasing tone quality; rhythmic expression through use of rhythm instruments and the dance; listening and enjoying good recorded music; and music reading to gain a better knowledge of the written music and to help prepare the student for glee club and the instrumental program of the upper grades.

"An instrumental program was begun in grades five through eight. Twenty-one students took lessons on the flute, clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, baritone horn and the drums. A group of four students, who already played instruments, met with me once a week as an instrumental ensemble and will be the nucleus of a future school band."

Mr. Howard's objectives were to encourage children to sing and enjoy singing for its own inherent values. This is attained by presenting music of many types — folk songs, humorous songs, patriotic songs, songs of foreign countries, songs of famous composers, etc. The

second objective is to teach children to understand the fundamentals of music — scales, intervals, note values, key signatures, etc. The second objective is attained by a systematic and continuous presentation of small "doses" of instruction in the theory of music.

Mr. Howard's comments follow:

"In addition to the broad primary objectives cited above, the children will be given an opportunty to gain an appreciation of the language of music, of the various types of instruments, and of the lives of the great composers.

"The chorus has continued for pupils who wish to enjoy an extra period of singing in addition to their regular classes. This chorus provided the nucleus of a Christmas program presented by all of the pupils of grades 5 through 8, on December 23."

Mrs. Nancy Williams, Speech Therapist, submits her report with pleasure in her first year at the Central School.

"When school began in September, 1966, all students were given a speech evaluation in order to determine their speech therapy needs. After all students had been carefully screened, classes and individual sessions of approximately one-half hour were scheduled for a **once per week** visit to the school. Though both group and individual meetings were given this time limit, many times a more relaxed schedule was advantageous as regards the attention spans and interests of speech pupils. However, most scheduling is observed in order to accommodate the twenty-eight students who presently need speech work. In most cases, within this eight per cent of the student body, the speech problems are articulory in nature, but more severe problems encountered in the school include substitution, omission, distortion, baby talk, cluttering and stuttering.

"It is important to bear in mind, which the speech program at school progresses quite satisfactorily, that parents also plan an important part in correcting ill-formed speech patterns. Without the aid and interest of parents the program cannot be effective, for it is this reinforcement and encouragement which will help put the child on the path to normal and easily executed speech."

In conclusion, sincere appreciation is extended to the School Board, Superintendent, Assistance Superintendent and other members of the administrative staff for their continued support and cooperation.

I also wish to thank the staff of the Central School for a year of progress. Of course, I am most grateful to the parents of the children for their interest and support. It has been a pleasure to serve you.
