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TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE (L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necesary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the Control of the White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.30 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$1,502.00.
- 5. To raise and appropriate, for economic advancement of the Town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in cooperation with other communities, a sum not exceeding one-hundredth of one percent of assessed valuation, the sum of \$105.00.
 - 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate

the sum of \$205.00 to reimburse the people responsible for the water hole on the Exeter Road.

- 7. To see whether there shall be a new and complete revaluation of all real estate in the Town of Hampton Falls prior to the assessment of 1953 taxes and whether such a revaluation shall be done by the board of Selectmen or by the State Tax Commission. (by Louis B. Janvrin and 10 signers)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Collector of Taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the State Head Tax and fix the amount thereof.
- 9. To see if the Town wishes to take any action in regard to the Mill Bridge on Kensington Road and raise and make appropriation for same.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.
- 11. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responible for the administration of the plan.
- 12. To see if the Town wishes to take action in regard to the Town Dump.
- 13. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate the sum \$500.00 to start clearing roadsides of bushes.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell any property acquired by tax sale.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

- 7. To Choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton Falls:

I herewith submit to you my twenty-third annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

The current year began Wednesday, September 3, 1952, with a beginning enrollment of seventy-seven. This compares with last year's September enrollment of 61. The increase started last year, with the registers closing in June, showing a total registration of 67. There are also forty-six pupils registered in neighboring high schools. Hampton Falls School District is now responsible for the education of 113 of its children.

The film strip library authorized at the Union meeting of last year has been purchased. The entire collection consists of twelve libraries of approximately 40 film strips each. They are strictly teaching aids dealing with school subjects. The fundamental processes of Arithmetic are illustrated by colored films. History, Geography, Health, Nature and elementary Science are brought nearer to the child by pictures. The Union voted to continue purchase of visual aids next year—the cost to each district being proportional to the number of children enrolled in its schools.

As an aid to effective use of these films and other modern visual and auditory helps, Harvard-Boston University Extension is conducting a course during the current semester at the Hampton Centre School. This work is of College grade giving credit toward either the Bachelors or Masters degree at Boston University. The teachers of Hampton Falls are enrolled for this course.

I believe we have a good teaching staff in our school. We must do all we can financially and professionally to keep them with us. New Hampshire teacher colleges and the University are graduating fewer teachers than are required by the schools of the state. It is a fortunate district that can keep its teachers for a number of years. Teachers who understand the community and its children are valuable to us.

By its courses in Art and Music, Hampton Falls is enriching the present and future lives of its children. A visit to the school will convince any citizen of the value derived from these activities. Their purpose is one of appreciation based on knowledge of the more elementary phases of composition in these two fields. The majority of us enjoy a good music composition or a work of art as listeners or observers rather than participants. Some knowledge of the simpler phases of the work, however, add to the enjoyment derived.

The Parent-Teacher Association is an active group working for the interest of our children. Each of our children are now receiving a subscription of the "Weekly Reader". These papers, graded to the reading ability of the pupils, is a help in the teaching of reading. The Weekly Reader is edited by reading experts who understand the most successful methods of teaching children this very important skill. This gift of the P.T.A. is a definite contribution to the effectiveness of our school.

The association gave a Christmas party to the pupils. As a means of helping each child feel himself a member of the school family, parties of this kind are valuable. The tuning of the pianos was much appreciated by the music classes.

The health of the pupils is being watched by our

school nurse and the school doctor. The Keystone Telebinocular purchased by the Lions Club to this Union, is being faithfully used to test the seeing of children. An audiometer, presented to the State Board of Education by American Legion of the Hamptons, will test the hearing ability of each child in the district during the current year. Aside from a yearly physical examination by the doctor, the school nurse makes regular visits to the school.

Our building is a pleasant place in which to work. The pupils are purposefully busy. The standards of our teachers are high. I wish to congratulate Hampton Falls upon the work of its schools.

ART TEACHER'S REPORT

This year the main objectives of the art program are again the development of imagination and creative ability, the encouragement of each child's love of beauty and the greater use of his artistic judgement in his daily life.

The upper grades studied lettering, color harmony design. They spent several weeks at the beginning of the year studying Mexican and Indian design, utilizing these designs in the decoration of their large folders. They made designs for several textile stenciling projects, carrying each project through from the original designs to the finished product. They showed marked improvement over the previous year in their grasp and skill in this subject. They also worked with finger paint, clay and crayons illustrating several stories in the latter medium.

The lower grades worked with crayon, finger paint, cut paper work, clay in order to give each child an opportunity to experiment with different mediums and thereby develop his skill and imagination in a medium of his own choice, so that his special talent and skill might be recognized and encouraged.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to all who have cooperated so splendidly in making this a successful year.

BUILDING CODE AND ZONING ORDINANCE HAMPTON FALLS, N. H.

ARTICLE I

In pursuance of authority conferred by Chapter 51, Section 50-71, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended by Chapter 110 and 278 of the Laws of New Hampshire 1949, and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals, prosperity, convenience or general welfare, as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development, of the inhabitants of the incorporated Town of Hampton Falls, New Hampshire, by securing safety from fires, panic and other dangers, providing adequate areas between buildings and various rights of ways, by preserving the rural charm now attached to our town, the promotion of good civic design and arrangement, wise and efficient expenditure of public funds, and the adequate provisions of public utilities and other public requirements, and by other means, now therefore the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of Hampton Falls, New Hampshire in official meeting convened.

SECTION I

For the purpose of this ordinance the Town of Hampton Falls shall be considered one zone.

SECTION II

Definitions

For the purpose of this ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section.

- A. Home produce and products means and includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident, also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bonafide resident of any property.
- B. Right of way means and includes all town, state and federal highways and the land on either side of same as covered by statutes to determine the width of rights of way.
 - C. Permanent residents. A family shall be considered per-

manent residents when they have used any building continuously as a residence for a period of six months or more.

- D. Tourist homes shall mean and include dwellings where transient accommodations are provided for a price.
- E. Hotels shall mean and include any building which contains more than twelve rooms and advertises to accommodate people with food and sleeping quarters for a price.
- F. Front yard. A space extending for the full width of a lot between the extreme front line of a building and the nearest side of the right-of-way.
- G. Frontage shall mean the length of the lot bordering on the public right of way.
- H. Camps shall be considered buildings of such a nature that they may be used for recreational purposes during seasonal parts of the year.
- I. Tourist cabins and motels shall mean and include building where transient accommodations are provided for a price.
- J. A trailer camp shall mean a place or site where two or more trailers are located for permanent dwelling purposes.
- K. A junk yard or automobile grave yard shall be defined as a place where four or more wrecked or dismantled cars are kept outside of a building.

SECTION III

Residential District

The Residential District of Hampton Falls shall enjoy the following provisions:

- 1. There shall be between the nearest side of any main highway and the extreme front of any building a yard having a minimum depth of twenty five feet. No building shall be located nearer than ten feet of its side property line.
- 2. Home produce and products may be bought and sold and exposed for sale in Hampton Falis.
- 3. Frontage. Each building site shall have a frontage of at least one hundred and fifty feet.

- 4. Minimum Land Area.
- a. No building site for dwelling purposes shall be less than fifteen thousand square feet.
- b. Tourist cabins shall have a distance of not less than twenty feet between each unit.

SECTION IV

Non-conforming Buildings, use of Buildings and Use of Land

- 1. All non-conforming properties in active use or established for such purpose when this Ordinance is passed and adopted may continue indefinitely in their present use.
- 2. A non-conforming use may be altered or rebuilt if the cost of such construction does not exceed 100% of the assessed value of the building at the time of application for the change.
- 3. A non-conforming use which becomes nonoperative or vacant for a continuous period of one year shall not be reoccupied except by a use conforming to the district in which it is located.

SECTION V

Enforcement

- 1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 2. There shall be an Inspector of Buildings who shall be appointed by the Selectmen who shall be the same as the Inspector of Buildings for the Town Building Regulations.
- 3. The Building Inspector shall issue any and all building permits requested when such permit is in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 4. Permits. After pasage of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect any building or alter the bulk of any building or relocate any building in Hampton Falls without first obtaining a building permit from the Building Inspector.
- 5. No permit, however, shall be issued unless the proposed structure will present a reasonable appearance and will be in keeping with the neighborhood and unless the building is to be finished on the exterior in a permanent manner and is to be

suitably painted on the outside whenever the same is of wood or a material customarily painted. This is intended to eliminate the erection of structures obviously out of place for the neighborhood where they are to be located and which may have a detrimental effect on the property values and neighborhood character. When an objection on the account of the appearance of a proposed structure, as above dictated, is raised by a majority of the families residing or owning property within a radius of 1500 feet of the property in question, the board of adjustment shall hold a public hearing to receive the evidence on both sides and shall have the authority to decide whether the permit shall be issued or not.

- 6. That no land or place of business in the Town of Hampton Falls, N. H. shall be used for an amusement or entertainment center, a dump (except the municipal dump duly regulated), a trailer camp, or place for refuse, waste or junk of any kind, nor for an automobile junk or grave yard, carriages or other vehicles, abandoned machinery or tools or appliances, nor used in a manner that is disorderly, unsightly, noxious, offensive or detrimental to the public, or to the owners or occupants of adjacent property or prejudicial to the general welfare of the community, without the approval, in writing, of the Board of Adjustment upon such conditions as they may determine.
- 7. Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, after due notice, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other legal action.

SECTION VI

Board of Adjustment

1. Within thirty days after the adoption of this ordinance the board of Selectmen shall appoint a board of adjustment of five members, and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to this Board which conform in duties to the provisions of Chapter 51 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended. The Board of Adjustment here provided shall conform in membership and term of office as provided in Chapter 51, section 57 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire. In addition to the general powers granted said Board by said Chapter 51, it may, in harmony with and subject to its provisions:

- a. Permit construction of a non-conforming temporary building for an initial period of not more than one year. Permits may be renewed by the Board of Adjustment for succesive periods of not more than one year each.
- b. Waive the building site frontage requirement where there are unusual conditions of street curvature. In such cases, however, the average width of the lot shall be equal to or greater than the frontage requirement.
- c. Waive the 15,000 square feet lot area requirement on lots served by either a public water system or a public sewage disposal system, where after a thorough investigation of soil and drainage conditions the Board finds that such an exception would not be detrimental in any way to the future health of the neighborhood.

SECTION VII

Amendments

1. This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling the meeting.

SECTION VIII

Penalty

1. Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance may be fined not more than ten dollars upon conviction for each day such violation may exist.

SECTION IX

Saving Clause

1 The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not effect the validity of any other provision.

SECTION X

When Effective

1. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

BUILDING REGULATIONS AS AUTHORIZED UNDER SECTION 18-21. INCLUSIVE, CHAPTER 176, REVISED LAWS OF NEW HAMPSHIRE 1942

SECTION I

The inspector of buildings shall be appointed by the board of Selectmen and shall be the administrative officer of this Ordinance. He shall receive applications and fees for permits for the erection or alteration of buildings and electric wiring thereof as provided in this ordinance, shall keep complete records of all applications and his action on the applications; promptly survey and inspect all buildings, alterations, or uses proposed, accept and deposit with the Town Treasurer all fees collected by him under this ordinance, and may issue permits for erection, alterration, or remodeling of all buildings, and the use of land, if in his opinion the proposal complies with the law of the state, this ordinance and other town ordinances and by-laws, provided that in any instance where license or permit fees for uses are required his permit shall constitute only an approval on which the proper authority may issue a license on payment of required fees; any other duties prescribed by law shall not in cooperation with the fire warden in any matter in which their duties as prescribed by law may coincide or conflict and shall take such action in the enforcement of this ordinance as may be directed by the selectmen.

SECTION II

No building construction shall be started or alterations of existing buildings of an estimated cost of more than \$400.00 until a permit thereof has been issued under the terms of this ordinance except no permit shall be required for repairs considered necessary in the ordinary run of wear and tear.

SECTION III

No application for a permit required by this ordinance shall receive action by the building inspector unless made in writing. All applications for a permit to build, construct, alter or remodel any building shall be accompanied by a sketch or plan of the proposed building or alterations, and a statement of its intended use when built, constructed, altered or remodeled. A fee of one dollar shall be paid for all permits issued.

SECTION IV

Upon receiving such application the building inspector shall promptly take such action as may be indicated in the way of investigation or public hearings to acquaint himself with the merits of the application. He may, without judging the application on its merits, refer the application to the board of adjustment. If, however, he finds the proposed building, alteration, or use of building to conform with the law and this ordinance he may at once issue the permit in writing over his signature. If he finds the proposal in any conflict with the law or this ordinance he shall fix whatever restrictions or conditions on the proposed construction or use as may be in his best judgment, right and proper, or for reasonable cause refuse the permit.

SECTION V

No building or structure shall be erected, altered, rebuilt, or remodeled unless in compliance with the following:

- A. Exits. No building intended or designed for any public use or congregation of people shall be erected, or used for any purpose which does not provide adequate exits.
- B. Chimney construction. No chimney shall be built, erected, or altered below the roof unless containing a tile or brick lining and with an iron clean-out door at or near its base, and shall extend at least three feet above the roof. No chimney shall be built, erected, or altered below the roof having wood or other combustible materials within one inch of the chimney and no chimney shall have its base resting upon any floor or beam of combustible material.
- C. Smoke pipes. No smoke pipes shall be installed or erected so as to be within twelve inches of any combustible floor or ceiling, unless amply protected with non-combustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed or erected which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible material, except when guarded by a double collar of metal with air space of at least five inches, or by at least five inches of brick or other non-combustible material between the pipe and the combustible material. Trailer smoke pipe installations conforming to Board of Underwriters Code shall be acceptable.
- D. Electric Wiring. No electrical wiring shall be extended or installed in any building, or in any reconstruction, alteration,

or remodeling of any building unless such extension or installation shall comply with the regulations and amendments to regulations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, known as the National Electric Code.

- E. Foundations. All structures shall be set on solid foundations of cement. brick, stone or other acceptable masonry except that in special cases where buildings are to be used for accessory use the building inspector may waive the requirements of this section and permit the use of wood, metal or masonry piers.
- F. Minimum building area. Every dwelling unit except tourist cabins to be used by a single family shall have a minimum ground area of five hundred square feet.
- G. Sewerage. All dwellings and all commercial, public or industrial buildings shall be equipped with town sewer entrance, cesspool, septic tank, sanitary chemical closet or approved vault, subject to the approval of the Health Officer.
- H. Exception. The construction of small accessory buildings not use for living purposes, together with minor alterations, repairs and general upkeep of existing buildings shall be exempt from the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION VI

Board of Adjustment. The selectmen shall appoint a board of adjustment of five members, one of whom may be a member of the planning board, said board to serve without compensation. The Board of Adjustment shall have authority to allow slight variances from the specific terms of this ordinance, where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result.

SECTION VII

Amendment. This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting.

SECTION VIII

Enforcement. Upon any well-founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the selectmen shall, on their own initiative, after due notice, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Super-

ior Court or by any other appropriate legal action. Whoever violates any of the provisions of the above regulatins may be punished upon conviction by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of each violation.

SECTION IX

Takes effect. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

SECTION X

Conflicting provision. Whenever the regulations made under the authority hereof differ from those described by any statute, ordinance, or other regulation, that provision which imposes the greater restriction or the higher standard shall. govern.

SECTION XI


