TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Hillsboro-Deering High School Auditorium, in said Town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Election of officers will take place between ten o'clock in the forenoon and six o'clock in the afternoon. Articles 2 through 25 will be taken up at 7:30 P.M.

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years; Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk for one year; Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for three years; one Water Commissioner for five years; one Fire Commissioner for three years; and all other necessary Town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Town officers to the Auditors, the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees or other Town officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers salaries, Town Officers expenses, Town Buildings, Street Lighting, and all current expenses of the Town. Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-eight Thousand, Two Hundred, Twenty Three Dollars and Thirty-seven cents (\$48,223.37) for the building, repairing, and maintenance of highways, bridges, culverts and sidewalks. Sponsored by the Selectmen and Highway Agent.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) for the sealing of Town Roads in Hillsborough, or take any other action relating thereto. Sponsored by the Selectmen and Highway Agent.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be applied to the Capital Reserve Fund for the future

purchase of Highway Equipment. Sponsored by the Selectmen and Highway Agent.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey by deed, under such conditions and to such persons as the Board may consider proper, the title to real estate taken by the Town in default or redemption from tax sale. Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town and in anticipation of taxes. Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be applied upon the account of the Hillsboro District Nursing Association. Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred, Sixty-one Dollars (\$661.00) to aid the Concord Hospital in Concord, New Hampshire. Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) for the support of Band Concerts for the coming season. Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) for operating a recreation program for children. Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the transfer of Seventeen Thousand, Seven Hundred Thirty-nine Dollars and Thirty-six Cents (\$17,739.36) plus accrued interest, if any, from the Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Equipment, to be applied towards the purchase of a fire engine, as contracted for, or take any action relating thereto. Sponsored by the Fire Commissioners.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand, One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$17,160.00) for the purpose of purchasing a fire engine, as contracted for, or take any action relating thereto. Sponsored by the Fire Commissioners.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be

applied to the Conservation Fund towards the cost of acquiring land and other conservation purposes in the interest of the Town. Sponsored by the Conservation Commission.

Article 16. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be withdrawn, as required, from the Sewer Sinking Fund for the purpose of improvements to the Sewer system during 1971. Sponsored by the Water Commissioners.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) from the Sewer Department income for the purpose of operating the Sewer Department for the year 1971, or take any other action in relation thereto. Sponsored by the Water Commissioners.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for the Water Department income for the purpose of operating the Water Department for the year 1971, or take any other action in relation thereto. Sponsored by the Water Commissioners.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of purchasing a Police cruiser or take any action relating thereto. Sponsored by the Selectmen and the Police Chief.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,400.00) for the purpose of purchasing a Police radar unit, or take any action relating thereto. Sponsored by the Selectmen and the Police Chief.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for preliminary expenses of the Bicentennial Committee, or take any action relating thereto. Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as an ordinance for the Town of Hillsborough the "Town of Hillsborough Sewer Ordinance", as proposed by the Selectmen and Water Commissioners and printed in the Town Report, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as an Ordinance of the Town of Hillsborough, an ordinance creating a Board of Police Commissioners for the Town of Hills-

borough as printed in the Town Report, or take any other action in relation thereto. Sponsored by Petition.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Subdivision Regulations of the Town of Hillsborough as originally adopted at a Special Town Meeting held December 6, 1966, as more particularly published in the report of the Planning Board published in the Town Report, or take any other action relating thereto. Sponsored by the Planning Board.

Article 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE SUBDIVISION
REGULATIONS OF THE TOWN OF HILLSBOROUGH

Section III, E. — To correct duty of Board as to approved plans so that said Section III, E. will read as follows:

- E. The Board shall, within 30 days from the date of submission of the final plat, approve or disapprove the plat in accordance with Section 23, Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. If the Board approves the plat, the Chairman or Secretary shall transmit the signed original plat to the subdivider, who shall be responsible for recording the same at the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds.

Section IV, B. — To increase the minimum width of roadways from 40 to 50 feet, so that Section IV, B. will read as follows:

- B. No street or highway right-of-way shall be less than 50 feet in width and may be required to be more if a greater street width is warranted in the opinion of the Board. The apportioning of the street widths among roadway, sidewalks and possible grass strips shall be subject to the approval of the Board.

Section IV, G. — To add definitions of Town Water and residential lots fronting on public water so that said Section IV, G. will read as follows:

- G. Lot size, width, depth, shape and orientation shall be appropriate for the location of the subdivision and for the type of development and use contemplated. Residential lots served by both town water (owned and operated by the Town of Hillsborough) and town sewerage shall be not less than 10,000 square feet. Residential lots served by neither town water nor sewerage shall be not less than 15,000 square feet. Residential lots served by neither town water nor town sewerage shall be not less than 30,000 square feet. Residential lots fronting on public water shall conform to these restrictions but in no case shall they have less than 100 feet frontage on water nor shall they be less than 15,000 square feet in area. Lots for commercial and industrial purposes shall be at least 40,000 square feet where there is no public sewer, and shall include adequate area for off-street service and parking facilities required by the type of use and

development contemplated.

Section V, C. — To add reference to lot areas so that said Section V, C. shall read as follows:

C. Location of property lines and their approximate dimensions; lot areas, existing easements, buildings, water courses, ponds or standing water, rock ledges and other essential features.

Section VI, B. 2. — To add the reference to lot areas so that said Section VI, B. 2. will read as follows:

B. 2. Street lines and names, building lines, pedestrian way, lot lines, lot areas, reservations, easements and areas to be dedicated to public use and areas the title to which is reserved by the developer.

Section VII — To add a cross-reference on the requirements for the drawing or plat, so that said Section VII will read as follows:

Where a proposed subdivision is of such size (less than four lots) as to present no engineering problems (requires no streets to be created, extended or widened; proposed utilities are individual on-lot systems) and few, if any, planning problems (no parks or other public facilities are required) the Board may waive the filing of the preliminary plat and may require only a general drawing or a final plat. This drawing or plat shall conform in all respects to the provisions of Section VI, B. 1, 2 & 3. The Board may also approve the subdivision at the time of initial Planning Board hearing.

Section VIII — To change the present Section VIII to Section Number X and to insert a new Section VIII to read as follows:

General Provisions.

A. No building in any subdivision shall be located within 50 feet of the average, mean, high-water level of any lake, pond, or any stream with a normal, year 'round flow. Boathouses may be excepted from this provision; a boathouse is defined as "A structure designed solely for the protection and storage of water craft.

B. No person shall occupy any tent, trailer, house or structure of any description, upon any lot in any subdivision, unless such structure is serviced by (1) the municipal sewer system of the Town of Hillsborough, or (2) a septic or other sanitary waste disposal system, specifically approved by the N.H. Water Supply &

Pollution Control Commission.

- C. The Board of Selectmen of the Town of Hillsborough and two persons holding no Town office, said persons to be appointed annually by the Town Moderator, sitting as a body shall serve as a Board of Appeals, and any person who is aggrieved by any decision of the Planning Board, upon written petition within 20 calendar days to this Board of Appeals, may have the case reviewed. Such Board shall act as a Board of Adjustment with all the powers and responsibilities as set forth in Chapter 31, Section 66 and following where consistent herewith.

Section IX — To strike out the existing Section IX and to rewrite in order to increase the penalties and to make them applicable to all parts of the ordinance, so that said new Section IX read as follows:

- I. No person, corporate or otherwise, being the owner or agent of any land located within the Town of Hillsborough who shall sell said land, transfer the same or offer the same for sale or transfer, which land constitutes a subdivision as herein described, without having had prior approval of said subdivision in accordance with the procedures herein, shall be deemed guilty of violating this ordinance.
- II. Further, any person who shall erect or maintain any building or other structure upon any lot within any subdivision, contrary to the requirements specified herein, without having obtained prior variance or approval of the Planning Board, shall be deemed guilty of violation of this ordinance.
- III. Any person found to be guilty of a violation of this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$500 and each violation may be deemed a separate offense. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Town, through its solicitor or other official, designated by its Selectmen, may petition the Superior Court to enjoin any transfer or sale or proposed transfer in violation of these ordinances or any building in violation of this ordinance; and may, at their option, recover said penalty by civil action.

These amendments shall be effective upon 30 days after adoption by the Town, and shall be recorded with the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds and the Town Clerk.

TOWN OF HILLSBOROUGH SEWERAGE ORDINANCE

In order to preserve the well-being of the Town of Hillsborough, and pursuant to the authority of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 31, Section 39, the following ordinance is hereby adopted.

Section 1 — Purpose and Definitions:

This ordinance is designed to regulate the use of public sewerage and drainage systems, the discharge of waters and wastes into the systems, and to provide the penalties for violations of this ordinance.

Definitions:

Unless the context specifically indicates otherwise, the meaning of terms used in this ordinance shall be as follows:

1. Sewerage Works shall mean all facilities for collecting, pumping, treating, and disposing of sewage and polluted industrial wastes.
2. Town shall mean the Town of Hillsborough, acting by and through its Selectmen or, in appropriate cases, acting by and through its authorized representative.
3. Sewage shall mean the normal water-carried household and toilet wastes discharged from residences, business buildings and institutions, excluding ground, surface and storm water.
4. Sewer shall mean a pipe or conduit for carrying sewage and polluted industrial wastes.
5. Public Sewer shall mean a sewer in which all owners of abutting properties have equal rights, and is controlled by public authority.
6. Combined Sewer shall mean a conduit receiving both surface runoff and sewage.
7. Sanitary Sewer shall mean a sewer which carries sewage and polluted industrial wastes, but excludes ground, surface and storm waters.
8. Storm Drain shall mean a conduit which carries ground, surface and storm waters and drainage, but excludes sewage and polluted industrial wastes.
9. Sewage Treatment Plant shall mean any arrangement of devices and structures used for treating sewage and polluted industrial wastes.
10. Industrial Wastes shall mean the polluted wastes from industrial processes as distinct from sewage.

11. Garbage shall mean solid wastes from the preparation, cooking and dispensing of food, and from the handling, storage, and sale of produce.
12. Properly Shredded Garbage shall mean the wastes from the preparation, cooking, and dispensing of food that has been shredded to such a degree that all the particles will be carried freely under the flow conditions normally prevailing in public sewers, with no particle greater than ½-inch in any dimension.
13. Building Drain shall mean that part of the lowest horizontal piping of a drainage system which receives the sewage and polluted industrial wastes from pipes inside the walls of the building and conveys it to the building sewer 5—feet outside the inner face of the building wall.
14. Building Sewer shall mean the extension from the building drain to the public sewer or other place of disposal.
15. B. O. D. (denoting Biochemical Oxygen Demand) shall mean the quantity of oxygen utilized in the biochemical oxidation of organic matter under standard laboratory procedures in 5-days at 20 degrees C., expressed in parts per million by weight.
16. pH means the logarithm of the reciprocal of the weight of hydrogen ions in grams per liter of solution.
17. Suspended Solids shall mean solids that either float on the surface of, or are in suspension in water, sewage, or other liquids; and which are removable by laboratory filtering.
18. Natural Outlet shall mean any outlet into a water-course, pond, ditch, lake, or other body of surface or ground water.
19. Watercourse shall mean a channel in which a flow of water occurs, either continuously or intermittently.
20. Person shall mean any individual, firm, company, association, society, corporation, or group.
21. Shall, is mandatory; May, is permissive.

Section 2 — Rules and Regulations

The Board of Selectmen may make such rules and regulations relating to the use of the sewerage works of the Town as they shall deem expedient.

Section 3 — Sewer Connections:

The sewage from every building or structure intended

for human habitation use or occupancy shall be conducted into a sewer provided there is a sewer in the street within 200 feet of said building, and provided the Town may exempt any building from the foregoing requirement until such time as it may determine. On all streets provided with a sewer, the sewage from all buildings hereafter constructed shall be conducted into such sewer. No privy, vault, or cesspool for sewage shall hereafter be constructed on any property abutting on a street provided with a sewer.

Section 4 — Permits:

Permits to connect with a sewer shall be issued in a form and manner and for a fee as approved by the Board of Selectmen, provided such permits may at any time be revoked and annulled for such cause as they may deem sufficient, and all parties in interest shall be held to have waived the right to claim damages on account of such revocation, provided that such revocation shall be annulled on compliance with the provisions in this chapter and the rules and regulations of the Town of Hillsborough.

Section 5 — Unpolluted Wastes:

No persons shall discharge or cause to be discharged any storm water, surface water, ground water, roof runoff, subsurface drainage, cooling water, or unpolluted industrial process waters, to any sewer.

Section 6 — Disposal of Storm Water:

Storm water and all other unpolluted drainage shall be discharged to storm drains or to a natural outlet approved by the Town. Industrial cooling water or unpolluted process water may be discharged upon approval of the Town to drains or natural outlet.

Section 7 — Interceptors and Traps:

Grease, oil, and sand interceptors shall be provided when, in the opinion of the Town, they are necessary for the proper handling of liquid wastes containing grease, oil, sand or other materials which, in the opinion of the Town, will damage or interfere with the operation of sewers or drains or give rise to hazardous conditions therein. All interceptors shall be of the type and capacity approved by the Town and shall be located as to be readily and easily accessible for cleaning and inspection. Grease and oil interceptors shall be constructed of impervious material capable of withstanding abrupt and extreme changes in temperature. They shall be of substantial construction, watertight, and equipped with easily removable covers which, when bolted

in place, shall be gastight and watertight. Where required, all grease, oil and sand interceptors shall be installed and maintained by the owner at his expense, in continuously efficient operation at all times.

Section 8 — Wastes Inadmissible to Public Sewers:

No owner, agent, occupant, or other person having charge of the premises drained into a public sewer shall discharge into such sewer any of the following described waters or wastes:

1. Any liquid or vapor having a temperature higher than 150 degrees F;
2. Any garbage that has not been properly shredded;
3. Any ashes, cinders, sand, mud, straw, shavings, metal, glass, rags, feathers, tar, plastic, wood, or any other solid or viscous substance capable of causing obstruction to the flow in sewers or other interference with the proper operation of the sewerage works;
4. Any waters or wastes having a pH lower than 5.5 or higher than 9.0 or having any corrosive property capable of causing damage or hazards to structures, equipment and personnel of the sewerage works;
5. Any water or wastes containing a toxic or poisonous substance in sufficient quantity, either singly or by interaction with other wastes, to injure or interfere with any sewage treatment process, constitute a hazard to humans or animals, or create a public nuisance;
6. Any waters or wastes containing suspended solids of such character and quantity that unusual attention or expense is required to handle such material at the sewage treatment plant;
7. Any noxious or malodorous gas or substance capable of creating a public nuisance;
8. Any inflammable liquid which is harmful to the sewers or drains, the treatment works or processes or which will result in hazardous or obnoxious conditions in the sewage works;
9. Any material or liquid known by said person to be harmful to the system or any part thereof.

Section 9 — Industrial Wastes:

The Town with the advice of a sanitary engineer shall determine the quantity and quality of all industrial wastes which can be properly taken into the sewerage works in addition to the sanitary sewage from the Town, and the

Town may regulate by appropriate rules and regulations approved by the Board of Selectmen the flow of industrial wastes into the sewerage system. The Town shall have the right to require an applicant, owner or contributor of industrial waste to install and maintain at its own expense, such regulating and metering devices as may be needed to control, measure and record the flow of industrial wastes from his premises into the sewerage system.

Section 10 — Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD):

The admission into the public sewers of any waters or wastes having

1. A 5-day biochemical oxygen demand greater than 300 parts per million by weight;
2. Or containing more than 350 parts per million weight of suspended solids;
3. Or containing any quantity of substances having the characteristics previously described in Section 8;
4. Or having an average daily flow greater than ten (10) percent, of the average daily sewerage flow of the Town, shall be subject to the review and approval of the Town. When necessary in the opinion of the Town, the owner shall provide such preliminary treatment as may be necessary to
 - (a) Reduce the biochemical oxygen demand to 300 ppm. and the suspended solids to 350 ppm. by weight, or reduce objectionable characteristics or constituents within the maximum limits established by the Town after consideration of the characteristics of the section of the sewerage works into which the waste water will be discharged;
 - (b) Or control the quantities and rates of discharge of such waters or wastes. Plans, specifications and any other pertinent information relating to the proposed preliminary treatment facilities shall be submitted for the approval of the Town, and no construction of such facilities shall be commenced until said approvals are obtained in writing.

Section 11 — Preliminary Treatment:

Where preliminary treatment facilities are required or provided for any waters or wastes, they shall be maintained continuously in satisfactory and efficient operation by the owner at his expense.

Section 12 — Control Manholes:

When required by the Town, the owner of any property discharging industrial wastes shall install a suitable control manhole in the building sewer to facilitate observation, sampling and measurement of the wastes. Such manhole, when required, shall be accessible and safely located and shall be constructed in accordance with the plans approved by the Town. The manhole shall be installed by the owner at his own expense and shall be maintained by him so as to be safe and accessible at all times.

Section 13 — Standard Tests:

All measurements, tests, and analysis of the characteristics of the waters and wastes to which reference is made in Section 8 through 10 shall be determined at the control manhole provided for in Section 12, or upon suitable samples taken at control manhole. In the event that no special manhole has been required, special methods of sampling the waste waters satisfactory to the Town will be made by the owner at the request of the Town.

Section 14 — Special Agreement:

No statement contained in this ordinance shall be construed as preventing any special agreement or arrangement between the Town and any industrial concern whereby an industrial waste of unusual strength or character may be accepted by the Town for treatment, subject to payment therefore by the other municipality.

Section 15 — Conflict of Ordinances:

If a provision of this ordinance is found to be in conflict with any provision of any zoning, building, safety or health or other ordinance or code of the Town of Hillsborough or the State of New Hampshire existing on or subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance, that provision which, in the judgment of the Town, establishes the higher standard of safety and protection of health shall prevail; and that ordinance or provision which sets the lower standard is hereby declared to be invalid to the extent that it is found to be in conflict with the ordinance or provision which sets the higher standard and is hereby repealed.

Section 16 — Constitutionality:

Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase in this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and

effect, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Section 17 — Violations:

Any person, firm, partnership, or corporation found to be violating or in violation of any provision of this ordinance, shall be served by the Town of Hillsborough with a written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a reasonable time limit, as determined by the Town, for the satisfactory correction thereof. The offender shall, within the period of time stated in the notice, permanently cease all such violations. Upon expiration of such notice the Town may apply to Court of Equity for such relief as may be just.

Section 18 — Penalties:

Any person, firm, partnership or corporation who shall be found to be in violation of any provision hereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in the amount not more than the highest amount allowed by New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 31, Section 39. Each day in which any such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate violation.

Section 19 — Liability:

Any person, firm, partnership, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall become liable to the Town of Hillsborough for any expense, loss, or damage, including reasonable legal expense, occasioned to the Town by reason of such violation.

Section 20 — Inconsistent By-Laws:

All ordinances or parts of ordinances which are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 21 — Effective Date:

This ordinance shall take effect upon its acceptance by majority vote of those present and voting at duly called meeting of the Town of Hillsborough.

ORDINANCE

Creating a Board of Police Commissioners for the Town of Hillsborough

This ordinance is adopted with the purpose of providing a means for the maximum coordination of effort in law enforcement for the Town of Hillsborough; to establish a publicly elected commission to maintain a close working relationship between the Police Force and the Town, and generally to maintain a high standard of public safety and welfare in the Town of Hillsborough as authorized under Sections 4 and 39 of Chapter 31 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated.

SECTION ONE:

The management, appointment and removal of all police officers in said Town shall be vested in a Board of three Police Commissioners; they shall have the power to make all reasonable rules, by-laws and regulations for the government of said police officers, and may enforce the same by suspension or expulsion from the Police Force as they see fit, after a fair hearing and for just cause. In any such hearing findings of fact shall be final.

SECTION TWO:

On or before the 1st day of April, 1971, the Chairman of the Selectmen, together with the Town Counsel, Police Chief and Judge of the Hillsborough District Court, shall appoint three Police Commissioners, each of whom shall have been a resident of said Hillsborough for at least three years immediately preceding the date of his appointment, and none of whom may hold any other elected position within the Town during his term as commissioner. One of the said commissioners shall hold office for the term of one year from the 1st day of April, 1971; one for the term of two years, and one for the term of three years from said date, or until their successors are appointed and qualified. Thereafter, as a commissioner's term expires, some person qualified as aforesaid, shall be elected on the annual town ballot to succeed the commissioner whose term expires, who shall serve the full term of three years unless sooner removed. Any vacancy in said Board shall be filled as aforesaid only for the unexpired term.

SECTION THREE:

The Selectmen, together with the Town Counsel and the Judge of the Hillsborough District Court, shall, by majority vote, have full power to remove any or all of said commissioners after a fair hearing and for just cause.

SECTION FOUR:

The Police Force of said Town shall consist of a Police Chief and such number of regular police officers as the commission shall determine. They shall devote such time to the performance of their duties as may be required by the commissioners. The Board shall have the power to appoint as many special officers as may be considered necessary, who shall perform such services as may be required of them by the rules and regulations of the Board. Special officers shall exercise, when on duty, all the powers of police officers under the laws of the State.

SECTION FIVE:

The Board of Police Commissioners shall serve without compensation.

SECTION SIX:

The said Board shall elect one of their number who shall act as Chairman, and one who shall act as Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the commissioners, issue all notices, and attest such papers and orders as the Board shall desire.

SECTION SEVEN:

The said Board shall, in the month of January, make a detailed report of their doings to the Selectmen of said Town which shall be published. Said report shall include the proposed annual budget for the Hillsborough Police Force. Budget recommendations shall be subject to the approval of the Selectmen. The records of said Board shall be open at all times to public inspection.

SECTION EIGHT:

It shall be the duty of the commissioners appointed under this act to see that all the criminal laws and ordinances of the State and Town are faithfully and impartially enforced within said Town.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1970 was one of many frustrations for the Town of Hillsborough because of the closing of Sylvania's Semi-Conductor operation. Unemployment is at the highest level since the early nineteen fifties. However, through the concerned efforts of David Cowden, Robert Morgan, and the Sylvania staff, another division of Sylvania, the Lighting Division, has taken over operation of the plant. Although employment will not be as great as previously, it is a most welcome step towards stabilizing our working force in the community.

Currently your Selectmen are talking with an out-of-state firm that may locate its operation in Hillsboro. Hopefully a favorable announcement can be made soon.

During the year 1970, two of the Towns' dedicated citizens have retired from responsible Town positions. Our many thanks go to Elizabeth Baldwin, Tax Collector and Secretary to the Selectmen, and "Doc" Baldwin, Moderator, for their concerned efforts on behalf of the Town.

Word has been received that the plans for the sewerage treatment plant and collection systems have been approved by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. This means that the project could move ahead when the funding becomes available. At the present time, Federal and State monies are not available to us, and any form of pre-financing of the project is out of the question for our community. We will not ask for action to be taken at Town meeting this year. The Selectmen will make application for Federal and State monies as soon as they become available.

Highway Department appropriations will ask for a \$9,000.00 road sealing project to be started as soon as possible this spring. In past years, town streets and TRA roads have been built, but we must now undertake a heavy project of sealing to protect the investment we have made. TRA work will continue on the Bog Road to the so-called "Four Corners".

Police Department appropriations will call for an amount of \$36,315.00 to operate the Department for the coming year. With the current heavy use of the Police Cruiser, it seems advisable to trade rather than face heavy maintenance costs that occur during the second year of operations.

This amounts to a \$2,500.00 appropriation. Also requested is that the Radar unit be replaced. We have been advised that the present unit is operating on borrowed time.

The Bicentennial committee has been appointed and currently is planning the 1972 event. As time goes on, more people will become involved, as individuals, Clubs, and organizations offer ideas and services. A \$1,000.00 appropriation is being requested to cover preliminary expenses.

Looking forward for this year of 1971, we wish for our citizens a solution to our problems for full employment, easement of drug activity, and for the peace of our minds and our community.

HILLSBORO RESCUE SQUAD

A total of 114 calls were handled by the Hillsboro Fire Department Rescue Squad during 1970, assisting area townspeople for various "emergencies". We emphasize emergency here because, of the 114 calls last year, only two-thirds could technically be classified as emergency calls. The remaining third could have been handled by the people themselves or by regular ambulance services. Once again we stress that the Rescue Squad is a volunteer non-profit unit, established for emergency use only. All of the Rescue Squad members are employed by various businessmen in town and it is not fair to the employers to lose their employees for a non-emergency call. For emergencies, the employers are understanding and cooperative, and their generosity should not be taken advantage of. If you have an emergency, dial 464-312 and the squad will respond immediately; however, if it's not an emergency, please use existing ambulance services in the area.

In this, our Third Annual Report to the Town of Hillsborough, we show a 54 percent increase in calls answered from the previous year. Through donations from merchants, organizations and area residents and through our paper drives and barbecues we have been able to obtain the necessary equipment, supplies and training to handle the increase. Your generosity and cooperativeness gives us the incentive to continue our project.

Due to the increase in calls and the fact that the ambulance is nearly three years old, the Squad will be raising money in the next few months to purchase a new ambulance. As with the present ambulance, the new emergency vehicle will not be added to Hillsboro's tax-supported items. The squad pays for insurance, maintenance and gas expenses through its fund-raising projects and contributions. Just remember to save your old newspapers and magazines. Also, remember that come spring we'll be selling our barbecued chickens. Right now, we are selling extinguishers at the fire station for which we receive a 10 percent profit.

PARK BOARD REPORT

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1970

The following areas come under the supervision of the Hillsboro Park Board: The Fair Grounds, Butler Park, Beard's Brook Beach, Manahan Park, and a public beach right of way at Emerald Lake.

On the Fair Grounds the High School baseball field was "dug-up-and-done-over"; a new backstop was installed behind the Little League diamond; the tennis court was resurfaced and the fence posts around it were straightened and reinforced. Thanks are due to Don Vairo and his assistant Carroll Pierce for coaching the Little League, also to Al Boisvert who with the help of Ron Goss and Wally Lowell managed the Farm and the Sandbox teams. The donation of several loads of loam and sand by K. Wilkins was greatly appreciated.

After the usual Spring spruce-up of Beard's Brook Beach and of Manahan Park by the friendly Lions the water front activities got underway with lifeguard Steve Pinzari. The swimming program for children and grown-ups was continued under the able and popular leadership of Tom Walton and Mary Jane Colton assisted by Peggy Dubois and Russ Galpin. The high point was a truly exciting water Olympiade.

A Town Ordinance was approved and published by the Selectmen "to provide pleasant and safe recreational areas for the children and residents of the Town of Hillsborough."

There are many things that should or might be done. For example, The Little League playing field should be re-conditioned, the wooden back stop and the benches by the softball diamond should be repaired, the two basketball backboards should be replaced, a partial fence or a netting should go around the ends of the tennis court, the bathhouse at Manahan should have a roof to protect the inside structure from decay, some senior citizens would like an access road and parking area by the waterfront so they too might enjoy Manahan....Another Town Meeting is just around the corner and now is the time to give some thought to how much we can afford to spend for recreational activities and how such appropriations should be used.

Before we can even begin to think of possible improvements, innovations, and new acquisitions, there are certain basic expenses which must be budgeted, such as:

Lifeguards and Swimming Instruction	1,800.00
Children's Bus Transportation	\$ 700.00
Maintenance and Repairs	\$ 300.00

In other words, a budget of \$3,350.00 is required just for maintaining a status quo.

The Park Board was grieved by the untimely death of one of its most faithful members, Richard "Pinky" Foster.

Jeanne Whitney is retiring after many years of loyal service. Jim Knox, Bob Smith, and Bob Baum have new jobs which involve many miles of travelling every week. Therefore, they too will no longer be able to serve on the Park Board. As of 1971 we need five public minded residents to make up a new Park Board of the Town of Hillsborough.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Planning Board has found it necessary to hold bi-monthly meetings since June due to the heavy load of town subdivisions during 1970.

During the twenty-two regular and special meetings some thirty-four small and large subdivisions have been approved. These varied from less than one acre to 111 acres. Lot sizes ranged from a subdivision variance of just under 7,000 square feet to approximately 89 acres. The largest subdivision consisted of 33 lots.

Four public hearings were also held. Three of these were in reference to large subdivisions while the fourth was in reference to proposed Land Subdivision Regulation changes. These proposed changes pertain to: 1) establishment of a Board of Appeals, 2) setback regulations from water, 3) increase in roadway right-of-way, and 4) clarification of several existing Sections. A complete list of proposed changes appears elsewhere in this report.

Through working and planning with the New Hampshire Soil Conservation Service, the Board expects to have an up-dated Soil Map of Hillsboro by the spring of this year. This will be of considerable value in assisting in proper planning of house/camp lots, as well as land use capabilities of swamps, woods, and fields. This should also prove helpful to property owners, prospective buyers and builders of property.

The Board sent a letter to the State Highway Commission favoring the new highway extension of Routes 9 & 202 from Henniker to Hillsboro and also urging that they give the

earliest possible consideration to a Hillsboro by-pass. It is felt by the Board that very serious traffic and safety problems will exist unless a by-pass is completed at the time of the extension. As it stands now, no by-pass is planned by the State for at least ten years after completion of the extension to Hillsboro. Based on present traffic predictions, the State anticipates that by 1981 the designed 2 lane 2 way roadway on a 4 lane divided limited access right of way will need to be 4 laned. Dumping this 60 miles per hour traffic at the rate of 900 vehicles per hour into the Hillsboro Square would be stifling.

In addition, the Board has held joint meetings with the Conservation Commission on matters of mutual concern and overlapping interest. The items which drew the most attention were the construction of property within Ellenwood Brook and certain sanitary and mobile trailer violations.

It had been planned for 1970 to up-date the "Town Planning 1960" report, directing its attention to land use and recreational and esthetic problems. Due to the non-anticipated heavy load involving the above mentioned activities, this is now planned for 1971.

The Board continues to work for a better Town through Planning.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

Twelve meetings were held by the Commission itself. The Chairman filled invitations to lecture to organizations in Tilton, Peterborough, Hancock, and Jaffrey, as well as the Methodist Church, Historical Society and Bird and Garden Club in Hillsboro. Charles Allen lectured to the Purling Beck Grange in East Washington. The Chairman represented the Commission at the two-day Regional Congress of the New England Conservations Commissions and following the Congress was asked to serve as Chairman of the Nominating Committee to instigate a New Hampshire State Association of Conservation Commissions. Discussions, exhibits, etc. on the importance of open-space planning, developments based on land and water capability, and pollution control, were highlights of the Congress.

Requests for information and materials were filled (in consultation) with the Hillsboro Camp for Girls; the potential Contoocook River Valley Association; the Hanover and North Hampton litter campaigns; Keene State, New England, and Nathaniel Hawthorne Colleges on Earth Day activities; materials on conservation projects was supplied periodically to the Hillsboro-Deering Cooperative School. Interest and concern of High School students in the Commission's functions were appreciated. The Commission provided a scholarship to a selected student for a summer session at the Bear Brook Conservation Camp.

The Chairman led seven Lower School classes on nature walks behind the School in the spring; submitted lists of trees, bushes, birds, and flowers in bloom there to teachers for future reference. Several attempts to film activities on the School's natural area and at Gleason Falls (as requested by Stiles, Associates) failed; however, the pesticides, paper, and roadside litter pick-up was enthusiastically carried out and documented with the cooperation of two biology classes, Boy Scout Troop Number 73, members of the Commission, and many responsive members of the community. The State Pesticides Control Commission was pleased to collect the fifty pounds of pesticides from Cyrus Phelps's barn.

The Commission shared material on open space planning, solid waste disposal, and pollution control, etc. with the Planning Board and the Selectmen, dealing with evidences of pollution with them and the Health Officer. At the State Highway Division's Hearing on the extension of Route 9 from Henniker, concern was expressed for avoiding the flood plain

of the Contoocook River.

Plans were initiated for the replacement of street trees in the spring of 1971.

Articles were prepared for local newspapers on the natural features of the Town, disposal of pesticides, diseased trees, School exhibits, the Conservation Fund, House Rock purchase, survey on bird feeders in Town, use of the School's natural area, the New England Congress, the Town pick-up campaign, appointment of Donald Bonnette to the Commission and Edwina Czajkowski to the Audubon Society of New Hampshire's SEE project. The availability of Tasker's window for a display on the use of detergents was appreciated.

Negotiations for easements were pursued with owners along Sand and Beard Brooks; attempts continue to assist owners of large tracts in the Concord End area in appropriate land use.

After long negotiation, the House Rock property (so-called) of 18.3 acres on the Sand Brook Road was bought for \$2,250 with Conservation Fund money (thanks to the Townspeople and the Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trusts Fund). Plans were made to improve the area for the enjoyment of the Townspeople next spring; meanwhile, it is gratifying to know that the New Hampshire Natural Areas Forum has added the site to its LIST of outstanding natural areas in the State. The Commission feels that it is indeed fortunate to find (and be able to preserve) a geological phenomenon with historic interest in a lovely natural setting - all easily accessible for the interest and enjoyment of the public.

The Commission received the top award from the Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trusts Fund last year. No more funds are available from that quarter; therefore, the \$500 requested from the Town this year is most earnestly solicited.

The fire season of 1970 was not a quiet one in this area, on the contrary, it was a very busy time with some towns reporting a greater number of fires than in past years. This record is not good.

Both state and towns are striving to meet this challenge. Results show that we are not doing enough, we must do more in the matter of fire prevention education, a more active inspection program and a more prompt, complete investigation of fires where definite cause is not known with court action where the need is indicated.

We must insist that minor children are given needed supervision, this is a parent's responsibility.

Your Warden and District Chief stand ready to help in this work.

Our gratitude to all who have helped in forest fire prevention and suppression this past year and we look forward to this continued help in our effort to improve our good prompt detection system and fast suppression action. This, coupled with a good prevention program, will improve our fire record.

Follow these simple suggestions to help:

Set a good example for others by observing fire permit laws and regulations; take your debris and waste to the town dump; keep matches away from children and be sure your smoking material is dead out when discarded.
