THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Jackson on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subject:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

- 3. Maintenance of summer highways and bridges.
- 4. Snow removal from highways and dooryards and sanding highways.
 - 5. Street lighting.
- 6. Old Age Assistance, J. H. Hodge account and poor relief.
 - 7. Maintenance of Cemetery.
 - 8. Memorial Day exercises.

- 9. Maintenance of parsonage.
- 10. Town Library.
- 11. Fire protection
- 12. Police protection.
- 13. Memorial Hospital.
- 14. Sidewalk construction.
- 15. Jackson Ski and Outing Club.
- 16. Eastern Slope Region.
- 17. Skating Rink.
- 18. To rehabilitate town treasury for over-expenditure account of fire protection in 1949 of \$768.18.
- 19. Retirement of debt on Town Garage now standing at \$3,000.00.

To see if the town will raise and appropriate as follows:

- 20. The sum of \$2,547.00 for State Aid Reconstruction of highway on east side of six-mile circuit between Valley Cross Road and Jackson Village, state contributing the sum of \$5,092.00.
- 21. The sum of \$215.57 to secure Town Road Aid, state contributing the sum of \$862.29.
 - 22. The sum of \$300 to paint the Town Hall.
- 23. The sum of \$1,600 to purchase Dodge Fire Truck now owned by Mrs. George Bushee.

- 24. The sum of \$200 to re-open lower end of Old Thorn Mountain Road.
- 25. The sum of \$80 for support of White Mountains Region Association.
- 26. The sum of \$353.00 to cooperate with Town of Bartlett in perambulating and clearing boundary lines between the two towns.
- 27. The sum of \$4,250.00 for the construction of a new cement bridge and raising the grade level by three feet at site of wooden bridge on Dundee Road near residence of Daniel Dinsmore, the state contributing a like amount, \$4,250.00.
- 28. The sum of \$1,200.00 to construct reinforced concrete bridge and raising the grade level by three feet at site of present wooden bridge on Iron Mountain Road between residences of Asa Abbott and Mrs. Jesse Abbott.
- 29. The sum of \$300.00 for tarring surfaces of roadways between Village Inn Restaurant and residence of Wendell Drew on Thorn Hill Road, and between Route 16 and residence of Carl Hayes on Iron Mountain Road.

To see if the town will vote as follows:

- 30. To impose a summons of \$.20 on poll taxes uncollected after October 15th, 1950.
- 31. To authorize the selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- 32. To authorize the selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax deeds.
- 33. To authorize the selectmen to dispose of the Dundee Schoolhouse.

- 34. To take action to secure a town dump and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 35. Shall provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town?
- 36. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

The Library was open a total of 107 days from January 8th to December 31st. From July 1st through September 3d it was open daily from 10 a.m. to 12 noon; from September 6th through September 27th it was open three days a week at the same hourse. The remainder of the year it was open each Saturday from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

During 1949 2219 books and magazines were taken from the Library. The Bookmobile visited five times leaving 197 books in addition to books left at the eschool. On the last two visits of the Bookmobile only books for children were left, due to curtailment of State appropriations to the State Library. The loss of adult books from the Bookmobile has been keenly felt by the users of the Jackson Library.

Twenty-nine books were added to the Library by purchase and gift, making a total of volumes in the Library 5,630. In addition the Library has subscriptions to the following magazines: Saturday Evening Post, Reader's Digest, Ladies Home Journal, Good Housekeeping McCalls, America Home, Child Life, Jack and Jill, Living Tissue, Our Dumb Animals, New Hampshire Troubadour, Red Book, American, Cosmopolitan, and Life.

REPORT OF THE FIRE WARDEN

FOREST FIRES - OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public — YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION — fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is wiorth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- 1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- 2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

 Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.
