## ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT

Tuesday, March 28, 1922.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, memberselect of the city council for the municipal year of 1922 and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The oath of office was administered to the mayor-elect, Hon. Lewis H. Wilkinson, by the City solicitor, Theo S. Jewett, Esq.

And the Mayor administered the oath of office to the following councilmen-elect, viz.:

Prayer was then offered by the Rev. Arthur Stanley Beale, after which the mayor delivered his inaugural address.

## **INAUGURAL ADDRESS**

#### OF

#### HON. LEWIS H. WILKINSON

#### MARCH 28, 1922

Gentlemen of the Council:

Obedient to the command of our city charter, it once more becomes my pleasant duty to preside over the inauguration of a new city government for the ensuing year. I am deeply gratified at the honor which has again been given me by the citizens of Laconia and take this opportunity to express to them my heartfelt thanks for the sincere approval which a great majority appear to have expressed of my former administration of affairs of the city, and, gentlemen of the 1921 Council, you to have had this same seal of approval placed on your work and I know that this confidence will be an incentive for us all to do better work this year. I know that we are all sorry to have our family circle broken this year by the with-drawal of Councilman Collins of Ward 6, who, by his earnest and faithful work and his long experience in city affairs, has been able to guide us around a good many pitfalls, but in Councilman Perkins we have an able successor, who, because of his many years' experience in financial affairs and business administrations, will be able to give us most efficient service and we most heartily welcome him to our circle.

In these days of industrial unrest and uncertainty, difficult problems will present themselves and we must do our utmost to solve them in the most beneficial way for the greatest good of all.

Every city official should bear in mind that we are a large municipal corporation, in other words, a twelve million dollar

business and every effort should be exerted to increase our efficiency and improve our business. I regret to have to comment upon several overdrafts in our departments the past year. Unless the different departments created by our charter are willing to co-operate with the City Government and work in harmony and understanding with the officials entrusted with the finances of the City, it will become necessary to call for an accounting and those who have contracted bills in excess of their appropriation without authorization, may be held accountable for the payment of same, for if it were not so, there would be no limit to the amount of expenditure in any department.

Each year it is incumbent upon these Departments to submit an estimate of their requirements, but, it is also our sworn duty to regulate the amounts each department should receive, and when this is done, it is then equally the sworn duty of the departments to conduct their affairs within the limits established by us. Just so long as any department claims for itself the right and power to expend what moneys it sees fit without regard to the financial welfare of the City, just so long will we be unable to regulate and control our finances. These conditions could, in most cases, be easily remedied if the departments would come to a mutual agreement to work in harmony with the Mayor and Council; it is gratifying to note that the majority of the departments do try to keep their expenses down and to cooperate with the Council.

The books of the city for the fiscal year of 1921 show a decrease in liabilities of \$28,508.13 and also a decrease in assets of \$22,298.32, giving us a net gain for the year of \$6209.81. The total liabilities including unexpended balances are \$265,-138.92 and the assets of the city, namely, cash in the hands of the Treasurer, balance of uncollected taxes and property held by tax deeds amount to \$31,980.56, leaving a balance of \$233,158.36 as the net debt at the close of the fiscal year, the same having been decreased during the past year, as I read a few moments ago, \$6209.81.

I will not tire you with more statistics as the financial statement in the city reports will be in your hands in a very short while but wish at this time to take up for observation and suggestions a few of the departments which, in my opinion, call for special mention.

#### BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

The past year has been one of consistent improvement in this department: the work has been carried along in a most creditable manner and a great deal of permanent work has been The most important and necessary project, in my done. estimation, was the construction of the Main Street bridge which may be looked at by this and future generations with a great deal of pride and which will always be a memorial to our very efficient engineer, Mr. French. This department has also made very rapid strides in the construction of permanent roads and have laid a total of 24,731 square yards of Bituminous Macadam, using the Penetration Method, giving us today a total of 133,366 square yards of Bituminous Macadam. The work on our roads was extended over a larger area than was first mapped out so that employment could be given to a large number of our citizens who were sorely in need of financial assistance. Personally, and I know that the council, whose work was finished this morning, feel highly gratified at the results obtained from this department the past year and we stand second to none in New Hampshire at the present time for our most excellent roads. This year, I recommend, that, because of the urgent needs of some of the other departments, we curtail to some extent on new work but do respectfully call your attention to the very wretched condition of Bowman Street and think that something should be done to remedy that condition; preliminary plans are already under way for the completion of the Boulevard. An appropriation should be made to thoroughly overhaul and repair our stone crusher as we depend on our native rock more and more for the building of our roads. More money must be expended on drains, both sanitary and

surface; work must start at once to remedy conditions on Baldwin Street and probably the most feasible way would be to begin at the river and work up to the source of the small brook, making it adequate to take care of the surplus water. Woodland Avenue and Butler Street should have consideration as well as suitable drains on Laurel, Clinton, and Hill Streets.

#### SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

The importance of our schools cannot be over-estimated and we must guard well the preparation of our children for the battle of life. Education is of greater importance now than ever before and I am glad to say that the standard of our schools has been brought up to rank with the best of them in the state. The crowded condition of some of our schools have given the majority of us a great deal of anxiety, but I am glad to state that the authorization of a bond issue, not to exceed \$225,000, has already been given and the plans will be in the hands of contractors in a very few days, so that in the fall of 1923 Laconia will have a High School Building large enough to accomodate our children for a good many years and said building will turn the attention of non-residents to the fact that Laconia is the finest place in the world to educate their children and one of the best places to call home. Under the provisions of the city charter, the City Council have practically nothing to do with the control and management of the schools other than the appropriation of money for school purposes so I simply ask the Members of the School Board to keep their expenses down as far as possible and to use their very best judgment when making up their budget for the ensuing year.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

This department is well regulated and well manned and should be congratulated on their most efficient service during the past year and we are most assuredly entitled to lower insurance rates. I still recommend as I did last year, a motor pump at the Ward 6 Station and I would eliminate the ladder truck at that station for it is long past its usefulness. The ladder truck at the Central Station is in first class condition and at a small expense could be put on a truck chassis and do duty between the two stations.

#### PUBLIC LIBRARY

For several years conditions have been far from satisfactory in this department and I think that our tax-payers will bear me out when I state that I do not think that we have been getting our money's worth; at the present time I have no report from the librarian and I understand for several years that it has been this way; this past winter we succeeded in having some changes made and I trust that the organization will work more as a unit.

#### PARKS AND COMMONS

This department has been seriously neglected and the commission has had to struggle along with practically no appropriation. I suggest to you gentlemen, that a fairly liberal allowance be given to them for the improvements of the parks. The drain in Opeechee Park was laid last summer so now let us continue the work as laid out in the plans made by the engineer several years ago.

To the Board of Assessors I would ask that they use their very best endeavors to get their valuations in early so that the collector can send the tax-bills out in good season; if bills could be sent out the first of July, a small discount could be made for early payment and the City would not be under the necessity of hiring so much money in anticipation of taxes.

In conclusion, gentlemen, let us always bear in mind that the business we are to do is not for the interest of any individual nor any one corporation for we are sent here to conduct the public business in the interest of the whole people and to give every one a square deal. Let us be diligent, watchful and loyal to Laconia.

#### For Payment of Bills Against the City

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk, not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock M., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the Council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the City Treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7:30 o'clock P. M., at the City Clerk's office.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That the sum of \$225,000.00 be and hereby is appropriated for the purpose of erecting a high school building on land on Union Avenue in said City of Laconia and acquired by said City of Laconia for High School purposes.

That the City of Laconia issue its bonds to the amount of \$225,000.00 for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the erection of said high school building in accordance with the provisions of an act passed at the January Session of the Legislature of 1921 known as "An Act in amendment of Chapter 241. Laws 1893 and Repealing Chapter 297, Laws 1915, relating to a School District in the City of Laconia" and in accordance with the provisions of an act passed at the January Session of the Legislature of 1895, known as the Municipal Bonds Act. 1895, as amended by Chapter 129 of the Laws of 1917, entitled "An act relating to Municipal Finances, and to amend Chapter 43, Session Laws of 1895 authorizing municipal corporations to issue bonds, said bonds to be serial bonds extending for a period of twenty years from the date of their issue for the sum of one thousand dollars each or some multiple thereof, and to be made payable to bearer with interest coupons attached, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed five percent per annum and an equal amount of said bonds to be taken up annually from the date of their issue.

Said bonds and interest thereon shall be payable at whatever banking institution the finance Committee of the City Council may designate.

That the City Treasurer, subject to the approval of the finance committee of the City Council, is hereby authorized and empowered to fix and determine the date of the issue of said bonds, their denomination, the time of payment, the rate of interest thereon, and the kind of currency or coin in which they shall be payable.

That the finance committee of the City Council is hereby authorized and empowered to advertise and receive bids for the purchase of said bonds, which bids shall be submitted to the City Council for their approval or rejection or such further action as the City Council may determine in relation to the same. That the finance committee of the City Council is hereby authorized and directed to contract for the engraving and printing of the necessary blank bonds for the use hereby authorized, the expenses for the same, when approved by the City Council, to be paid out of the City Treasury upon the order of the Mayor.

That an annual tax be levied and collected by the City each year hereafter until the expiration of the last year provided for the payment of said bonds sufficient to pay \$11250.00 of said bonds each year, and to pay the accrued interest on said bonds outstanding as it shall become due from year to year.

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# Twenty-second Annual Report of BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

Laconia, N. H., Feb. 14, 1923

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We herewith submit for your consideration, the twentysecond annual report of the Board of Public Works; together with the detailed reports and recommendations of the City Engineer, Street Commissioner and Superintendent of Sewers.

As the work of the year is reviewed, we would express our appreciation of the attitude of your honorable body in the acceptance of many of our recommendations for work, the granting of appropriations and continued co-operation all along the line.

The large job of the summer was the construction of Federal Aid Project No. 151, which includes the south end of the Weirs boulevard, so-called, from a point near the Bell cottage to Lake Street, which section was regraded, culverts relaid and new culverts installed and an asphaltic macadam surface constructed and new guard rail erected. One-half the expense of this Project was borne by the Federal Government, the work having been inspected and approved by their Engineer. The Daniel Webster Highway is now hard surfaced through the City limits, from the Belmont Town line to the Meredith Town line, a condition which is greatly appreciated by all travelers, and properly a matter for considerable local pride.

The Bowman Street improvement made last summer consisting of the repair of old drains and construction of new, and surfacing with Bituminous Macadam, transformed the condition of this much traveled thoroughfare in a manner which seems to meet general approval.

The new bridge at Messer Street which was authorized last summer has been erected and completed with the exception of laying the wearing surface of the roadway and finishing concrete surfaces, painting the structure and railing on the approaches; this project is a substantial addition to our permanent Bridges.

Necessary temporary repairs were made on the Church Street Bridge but the City Engineer reports that the repairs made will last only for a short time and the question of a new Bridge must soon be faced.

It is the opinion of your Board that this question of a new Bridge at Church Street should soon receive your consideration, and after that it is our belief that the attendant improvement, the widening of Church Street from Main Street to the Bridge, must soon follow.

We believe in the continuance of our municipal policy of the past few years, to extend each year as far as practicable the hard surfacing of our more important thoroughfares, for we have an experienced organization and good equipment for this class of work.

We endorse the suggestions of the Street Commissioner as to streets where a pavement is especially needed and would recommend that in the selection of work to be authorized for 1923, special consideration be given to Messer St. from the south railroad crossing and end of present macadam to Union Avenue; Gilford Avenue from Union Avenue to Highland Street; Elm Street from Franklin, now McGrath Square to the end of macadam at School Street, Veteran Square (in part); South Main Street from Champlin Street southerly.

The matter of the extension of our sanitary sewer system should receive serious attention. Sewers have been petitioned for in several localities and are badly needed in others as well, and we hope by some means funds may be provided for meeting this very imperative need.

#### CITY OF LACONIA.

A piece of work which proved somewhat difficult, last season, was the construction of the conduit enclosing Gilbert Brook, which is now built from the river to a point about three hundred feet south of Court Street. We recommend that an apportionment of funds be made to continue work upon this project this year.

The Street Commissioner's recommendation of new surface drains on Walker Street., Endicott St. from the State Road to the White Oaks Road, and on Sheridan, School, North and Belvidere Streets, we hope you will favorably consider.

Several streets have been resurfaced with gravel from the Hammond bank, just over the line in Gilford; if suitable material can be obtained near by, we desire to continue this work on certain streets, as the results obtained, amply justify the continuance of this class of work.

As explained in detail, in the Street Commissioner's report, our street sprinkling apparatus has become inadequate, and for the continuance and improvement of this service, we recommend the purchase of a new motor sprinkling and flushing truck.

#### BOWMAN STREET IMPROVEMENT.

An appropriation made for the purpose enabled this department to put this much traveled street in good condition. The work consisted of the repair of existing drains, the construction of a new drain from Academy St. to Whitcher place, regrading the street, and the laying of an asphaltic macadam pavement the entire length of the street.

The total cost of the project was \$4,137.73 or \$1.45 per sq. yd. for 2,844 sq. yds. of pavement laid.

The Church St. bridge rebuilt of wood in 1909 became dangerous and repairs costing \$2,088.44 were made. The deck and sidewalks were removed, new stringers put in where old stringers were so rotten they could not be used. A new deck and sidewalks were laid and the whole surfaced with a layer of asphaltic concrete. The track of the street railway across this bridge makes the cost of maintenance and renewals very much more than it otherwise would be and none of this cost is paid by the Street Railway Company.

This structure should be of reinforced concrete but in view of the fact that the Messer St. bridge was to be built during the summer it was not deemed advisable to have both bridges under construction at the same time.

The repairs made will last for a short time and the question of a new bridge must be soon faced.

The Messer St. bridge having become unsafe plans were made in this office for a steel truss bridge with a concrete deck and sidewalk and the Council granted an appropriation of \$20,000 to cover the estimated cost of same.

The structure was designed for a 20 ton truck load, 100 ft. span and width of 35 ft. over all.

The abutments, wing walls and approaches were built by this department. The steel was fabricated and erected by the Boston Bridge Works and the reinforced concrete deck built by this department.

As the steel was erected so late in the season it was impossible to entirely complete the project.

There remains to be done the removal of wooden forms under slab deck, laying asphaltic wearing surface on the roadway, finishing concrete surfaces, painting the structure and railings on the approaches.

The amount expended to date is \$18,005.06 leaving a balance of \$1,994.94 which is adequate for the completion of the project.

The Mill St. bridge was given extensive repairs which cost \$421.25 but it is still in rather poor condition and must be renewed soon.

The steel bridge at the Weirs was cleaned and given a coat of paint. This bridge is not adequate for the traffic on the main trunk line and the approaches are too narrow. Although on a state road the State contributes nothing toward its maintenance.

The Fair St. bridge is in a poor condition and must be renewed in the near future.

Since 1906 this department has built nine reinforced concrete bridges and one of steel and concrete, all of which are now in excellent condition and good for an indefinite period.

During the same period they have rebuilt of wood the Church St. and Mill Street bridges (twice), the Fair St. (once), and the life of these structures will be short.

#### SURFACE WATER DRAINS.

Drains were built in the following locations: Academy Street near Beech Street, Cole Street, Court Street, (repaired and manholes built), Dixon Street at Pine Street, Elm Street at Railroad Avenue, Elm Street culvert repaired (near Grange Hall), Gilford Avenue culvert (near Highland Street), Opechee Street near Messer Street, Stark Street near St. Catherine Street.

Gilbert Brook from the river to 300 ft. south of Court Street was enclosed in a reinforced concrete conduit three feet four inches square with walls of approximately six inches thickness.

This conduit was located under the sidewalk in Rowe Court removing the brook from private land and south of Court Street was located on a right of way granted by the abutting owners of land.

The original appropriation of \$6,000 was increased by the City Council to allow extension beyond the original plans. Many difficulties were encountered in prosecuting this work, such as large logs, old tan pits, muck, quicksand and water, and the cost per foot was more than expected, but great benefit should result to the adjacent property and to a considerable surrounding section.

I recommend that a sufficent sum be appropriated to continue this conduit across Main and Pine Streets this coming season. If an appropriation sufficiently large is made it will be possible to lay reinforced concrete pipe manufactured at or near the site, with suitable machinery installed for the purpose.

It is my opinion that such construction would be cheaper and much less difficult to install with conditions as they exist and answer the purpose equally well.

If this conduit is extended to Joliette Street, it will be feasible to build the much needed drains on Joliette, Baldwin, Lovell and Merrimac Streets.

I wish to call attention to the great need of suitable drains on Walker Street, Endicott Street, at Weirs from the State Road to the Oak Road, and on Sheridan, School, North and Belvidere Streets in Ward 6.

#### EQUIPMENT.

Some additions, such as a wagon loader, new crusher, new road machine, were made to our equipment which add to the .

economy and efficiency of operation of the department. A one ton motor truck, a street sweeper, and a motor sprinkler are greatly needed.

#### FRANKLIN SQUARE IMPROVEMENT.

Franklin Square (now named McGrath Sq.) in Ward 6 was improved by installing curbing, re-building retaining walls and railings, relocating and re-building drains, re-locating drinking fountain, and regrading and concreting sidewalks. The cost of the work was \$2,569.93, which leaves a balance, in the appropriation of \$3,000, of \$430.07. The intention was to lay 1,200 sq. yds. of asphaltic macadam pavement, but as the necessary equipment was tied up on state road work until late in the season this item was deferred to next season.

#### MAINTENANCE OF BITUMINOUS MACADAM

The cost of maintaining 92,848 sq. yds. of bituminous macadam built previous to 1922, exclusive of state roads, was \$4,642.16 or five cents per square yard.

Maintenance consisted of repairs and renewals and the treating of such areas as required the same with either tar or hot asphalt.

#### SIDEWALKS.

Bituminous concrete sidewalks were built as follows: Dixon Street, 469 sq. yds., Highland Street, 334 sq. yds., Parker Place, 176 sq. yds., Province Street, 659 sq. yds., Winter Street, 570 sq. yds.

3,016 sq. yds. of old tar concrete sidewalks were recovered with asphalt.

Crushed stone sidewalks were built on Dewey Street and Sheridan Street and many crushed stone sidewalks were re-• surfaced with fine crushed stone.

#### ANNUAL MEETING.

#### STREET SPRINKLING AND OILING.

The usual amount of water sprinkling and oiling was done and in addition a carload of calcium chloride was applied, principally to gravel and cinder surfaced roads.

We have used for three years a motor sprinkler consisting of a tank and spraying apparatus taken from a horse drawn sprinkler and mounted on a Nash Quad truck, hired from the State Highway Department. This truck is getting worn and it is increasingly difficult to keep in repair, especially difficult to get repair parts. This truck is also unsuitable for the purpose, being hard to steer and control in traffic, and I would recommend that either a new sprinkling and flushing truck be bought, designed and built for the purpose, or that a two ton chassis be bought and the old sprinkling apparatus be mounted on same. This matter should receive immediate attention.

#### STATE ROADS.

An appropriation of \$11,588.22 from the Federal Government, \$3,862.74 from the State and \$7,725.49 from the city enabled us to complete the surfacing of the Daniel Webster highway between Lakeport and the Weirs. \$22,634.56 was spent on this project which entailed the following work. Culverts relaid and new culverts built, roadway regraded, railings built. 9,624 sq. yds. of asphaltic macadam laid.

This project completes the hard surface road on the trunk line from the Belmont line to the Meredith line.

Under the heading of Trunk Line Maintenance \$5,752.24 was expended, one half of which amount was furnished by the State Highway Department.

This covered the maintenance work from the Belmont to the Meredith line exclusive of the distance, through the city, from West Street to Stark Street.

\$188.64 was expended for State Aid Maintenance and covered the maintenance work done on the State Aid Road on North Main Street from Oak Street to the Mathes place.

#### GENERAL.

The past season was one of successful accomplishment and the large number of projects undertaken were nearly all completed, usually under the estimated cost of the same.

The amount of pavement laid exclusive of the state road work, was below the average, and as the road building equipment will not be in use on state roads this coming season it would be desirable to appropriate sufficient funds to employ it on some of our streets badly in need of surfacing.

I would call your attention to the following streets where a pavement is especially needed.

Messer Street from the south railroad crossing to Union Avenue, Gilford Avenue from Union Avenue to Highland Street; Veteran's Square (in part); South Main Street from Champlin Street southerly and Elm Street from McGrath Square to School Street.

I would urge the great importance of having the appropriations for this department made or decided upon as early in the year as possible to allow the assembling of material, for the preparation of plans, and the execution of preliminary work such as the repairs and alterations to water and gas pipes, sewers, drains, etc., and to allow for the distribution of the work throughout the working season.

This department suffered the loss of Foreman John J. McDonough, who has been a faithful employee since 1909, when he commenced work for this city. Mr. McDonough, although ill in health for some time, attended to his duties until a short time before his death, which occurred Feb. 1st, 1923.

#### SEWERS.

The following sanitary sewers were constructed during 1922.

There was appropriated for this work the sum of \$5,600, leaving a balance in sewer construction account of \$870.07.

Sewers have been petitioned for in several localities which \*should receive careful consideration.

The sewerage situation at the Weirs was given some attention and at my request Mr. Harrison P. Eddy of the engineering firm of Metcalf & Eddy of Boston, a nationally recognized expert on such matters, was requested to look over the situation and make a preliminary report. Mr. Eddy's report should be of interest to all and is consequently attached to this report.

No further action has been taken in this matter.

The usual maintenance work was done during the year and the usual amount of trouble encountered from tree roots in the sewers, especially the roots from Carolina Poplars. Laconia, like other cities, is having some trouble from an accumulation of hops, corn and other grains, which seem to find their way into the sewers.

#### PLUMBING.

This department issued 177 permits for plumbing work during the year and tested all work done.

Killourhy had been connected with this department for nearly thirty years, except while in the military service during the World War, and his cheerful and loyal service to his department and city will be greatly missed by all of us.

REPORT OF HARRISON P. EDDY OF METCALF & EDDY ON WEIRS SEWAGE.

Boston, Mass., April 25, 1922.

Mr. Chas. A. French, City Engineer, Laconia, N. H.

Dear Sir:-

In conformity with your request, I visited Laconia on April 20, 1922, to confer with you upon the sewage disposal of that portion of the city known as The Weirs. During my stay, in company with you and Mayor Wilkinson, I visited the Weirs and two localities in that vicinity, where it might be possible to provide sewage treatment plants. In accordance with the suggestion of Mayor Wilkinson, I send you this report, which deals primarily with impressions gained during this visit. It should be remembered that this report is not based upon detailed engineering studies of your problem, and therefore that it must be considered merely as a preliminary discussion of the general features of the problem.

The Weirs is essentially a summer colony having, I should judge, a summer population of about 2,500 persons, and a winter population of about 500. The summer season may perhaps extend over a period of about four months, during which the average population may be taken at about 1,500 persons. On holidays, Sundays and days during which there are special attractions, The Weirs may be visited by as many as 10,000 persons.

This colony has been developed in a manner similar to many other resorts, there being a number of hotels, the largest of which is said to have about 300 rooms. In addition to the hotels, there are a number of cottages and on the lake shore northwest of the main highway, there is a thickly built up district.

**Present Sewerage Facilities.** There is at present no general sewage system. There are, however, a few pipe lines, apparently utilized jointly by several owners. These pipe lines discharge directly into the lake. There are also a number of cesspools, or sceptic tanks, serving individual cottages. These cesspools have proven unsatisfactory. In some cases, ground water finds its way into them to such an extent as to cause them to overflow. In other cases, they become quickly filled and require cleaning during the summer season. This process is a cause of offensive conditions.

It is stated that it is not uncommon for sewage either escaping from cesspools, or from other sources, to find its way to the surface of the ground, causing objectionable conditions. It appears that a substantial quantity of sewage now reaches the shore waters of the lake.

Inconvenience and Potential Danger of Present Method of Sewage Disposal. There can be no doubt that the shore waters are now contaminated with sewage, either discharged directly through pipes, or finding its way through the ground, or over the surface of the ground.

The water for consumption at the Weirs is pumped from the lake at a point a short distance northwest of the Weirs settlement. There is more or less bathing and boating along the water front, and there has been some agitation for establishing a bathing beach in this vicinity. While the quantity of sewage reaching the lake is relatively small and there is a great dilution there can be no doubt that conditions are potentially dangerous. The disinfection of the water supply, offers a valuable safeguard, but in case of lapse of such treatment, there is opportunity for the use of contaminated water. There is also opportunity for infection, due to bathing in contaminated water.

The water supply of the City of Laconia is taken from Paugus Bay, just north of Lakeport, a distance of approximately four miles down stream from the Weirs. As the entire discharge from Lake Winnepesaukee passes through Paugus Bay, and the quantity of sewage reaching the lake from the Weirs is extremely small, it is evident that there is a very large dilution. Information is not at hand to estimate the length of time required for the water passing The Weirs to reach the water works intake at Lakeport, but the indications are that this period of time is not sufficient to adequately safeguard the Laconia water supply. I understand that the water supply is disinfected with chlorine, which no doubt serves as a very valuable safeguard. I am advised also that the typhoid fever statistics have not thrown any suspicion upon the water supply, nevertheless, the potential danger ought to be recognized, and when the Weirs is provided with an adequate sewerage system, means should be furnished for the treatment of the sewage in such a manner as to reduce to a practical minimum the danger of the contamination of the water supply of the city.

The sentimental objection to the discharge of untreated sewage into the waters from which the city's supply is taken, should be recognized. While it is not desirable to over-stress the danger and sentimental objection to the discharge of this very small quantity of sewage into the large flow of water from Lake Winnepesaukee, these features of the problem should receive due consideration, and the danger and the sentimental objections removed insofar as may prove practicable, if and when The Weirs shall be provided with an adequate system of sewers.

Sewer System Desirable. There is no doubt of the need of an adequate sewer system for The Weirs. Such an improvement is justified by the number of persons to be served, by the need of safe-guarding the health of the community, and of providing for the satisfactory disposal of the sewage.

It is evident that a sewer should be constructed through the main street of The Weirs. The area laying between this street and the lake shore may be served either by a sewer laid along the margin of the lake, or if it should prove more economical, by several sewers leading to a pumping station on this tract of land, from which the sewage could be pumped into the principle sewer, laid in the main street.

It would be possible to serve the tract of land between the main street and the water front by a series of parallel sewers in the avenues grading toward the lake, as will be discussed later in connection with the treatment of the sewage.

Treatment of Sewage in Septic, or Imhoff Tanks. It has been suggested that the sewage of The Weirs may be treated by passing it through septic tanks. Such tanks should be of sufficient size to permit the sewage to remain in them for a number of hours, during which time the solids will settle to the bottom. The settled sewage will overflow from the tanks at a rate corresponding to that of the inflow.

This method provides for the removal of a portion of the suspended matter. The effluent will contain a substantial

quantity of finely divided substance; it will generally be dark in color, it may have an offensive odor, and it is certain to contain large numbers of bacteria. This cannot be considered a purification process. It will, however, prevent the escape of the coarser solids, which may prove unsightly in the shore waters.

The other primary function of the septic tank is the digestion of the solids by means of bacterial action. In this process, the organic matter becomes disintegrated and changed in character, so that generally it is comparatively free from odor. It may be so finely divided that a considerable portion of it will ultimately escape with the effluent, thus preventing the accumulation in the tank of a large quantity of sludge. In general, however, it is found that such tanks serving comparatively large communities, do require the occasional removal of the accumulated sludge.

A modification of the septic tank, which may well be considered in this case, is that known as the Imhoff, or two-story tank, in which the sewage passes through the upper compartment in a comparatively short period of time, and the solids which are deposited in this compartment automatically pass through slots in the false bottom and enter the lower, or sludge digestion compartment. 'Here the organic matter is subject to digestion in a manner similar to that going on in the septic tank, and is ultimately rendered inoffensive. Each of these tanks has certain advantages which it is not necessary to discuss in this report.

One possible site for a septic tank to serve The Weirs is in the park just east of the outlet of the lake, in which case the discharge would necessarily be into the waters entering Paugus Bay. A system of sewers into such a tank would appear to provide reasonable protection for the shore waters, but there would be potential danger to the city's water supply and the sentimental objection already discussed.

Disinfection of Tank Effluent. It is possible to automatically and continuously disinfect the effluent from such a tank before its discharge into the lake waters. In this way, an additional safeguard to the water supply would be afforded, which together with the time consumed in reaching the water works intake, and the disinfection of the water supply, would afford a substantial safeguard.

Such disinfection would not be particularly expensive, but it would require inspection at least once each day to make sure that the apparatus for applying the chemicals was in good working order, that there may be no lapse of the proper disinfection. It will be advisable also from time to time to make bacterial tests to determine the quantity of disinfection to be applied, and the efficiency of the treatment.

It has been suggested that instead of providing a single tank for the treatment of all the sewage, individual tanks might be placed along the lake front in each avenue. While it would be possible to construct such tanks in a manner to assure the removal of the coarse suspended solids, it would be hardly practicable to arrange for the adequate disinfection of the effluents from these tanks. The discharge of undisinfected effluent from such tanks directly at the shore, would not seem to be desirable.

Treatment of Sewage in Tanks and Upon Sand Filters. A hurried inspection of land lying east of and at a distance from one-half mile to a mile from the outlet of the lake, indicates that there are deposits of suitable sand for the filtration of the sewage. It appears to be practicable to pump the sewage over the hill to a suitable treatment plant site, where a tank could be installed for the removal of the suspended solids, and sand filters could be provided for the filtration of the settled sewage after leaving the tank. This plan is by far the most effective and satisfactory one for the treatment of this sewage from every point of view, except that of cost. Obviously, it would be considerably more expensive than tank treatment, disinfection and discharge of the disinfected sewage into the outlet from the lake.

The available sand appears to be of such size and lies at such an elevation that the sewage would pass through it and ultimately escape with the natural ground water. While such ground water undoubtedly ultimately finds its way into the lake, the sewage would be so highly purified that there would be no practical danger of contamination of the lake water.

Further Studies Required Before Reaching Decision. In order to reach an intelligent conclusion as to the best methods of providing sewers and treating the sewage, it will be necessary to make an investigation, including estimates of cost of the work involved in the several methods herein described. It is obvious that the most satisfactory method, sewers with tank treatment followed by filtration through natural sand beds, will cost upwards of \$50,000, but whether the additional cost of that method over the cost of tank treatment at the outlet of the lake is justified, can only be ascertained by a careful estimate of costs. This estimate should be predicated upon a general plan for providing the necessary sewers with tank treatment and disinfection at the lake outlet, and tank treatment and sand filtration on suitable land east of said outlet.

The need of adequate sewerage and disposal of the sewage of The Weirs appears to be of sufficient importance to justify the making of such an investigation.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT

## **Report of Chief Engineer**

His Honor, the Mayor and Council in accordance with the requirements of the City ordinance.

I herewith submit for your consideration the report of the Fire Department for the year 1922.

The Department responded to 46 Box alarms and 117 still alarms, making a total of 163 for the year.

One motor driven pump chemical and hose car was purchased during the year.

Extensive repairs have been made at the Lakeport fire station to house the new machine.

The plates on our storage battery are now on their fifth year of service. As the tenure of usefulness is but three years, they will have to be renewed this year.

Repairs on the fire alarm system have been made. New wires strung and changed over on new poles. The system is in good condition. There is a demand for new fire alarm boxes in several sections of our city, but our storage battery system must be enlarged to carry extra boxes.

One fire alarm repeater should be purchased and the system made in four circuits, two to Lakeport.

During the past year one pair of Horses have been purchased, and one man appointed permanent at the Central Fire Station. When the new machine is placed at Lakeport station one man must be appointed to operate the machine. The Department have about 8000 feet of good fire hose, one thousand feet was purchased last year, several new parts have been purchased for the different pieces of apparatus which makes the up keep very expensive, but we have made every effort to keep within the appropriation. His Honor, Mayor Wilkinson, and his Council have taken a deep interest in the welfare of the Department which has enabled it to reach its present state of efficiency. I want to thank the police department, the City Engineer and his men for their co-operation in assisting at fires.

### DIRECTIONS FOR GIVING AN ALARM.

To open the box break the glass and turn the key. In each box there is a small bell called a telltale, designated expressly for the purpose of informing you whether an alarm is being transmitted the instant you open the door.

Open the box and if this bell is not heard, pull down the hook the whole length of slot once only and let go. But if this bell should be heard, it would indicate that another box had been pulled and it would be useless to attempt to pull another until the one already pulled had performed its mission. Unless your presence is most urgently required at the scene of the fire, remain at the box to direct the department.

Never open the box or touch anything pertaining to it except in case of fire.

Never give an alarm for a fire seen at a distance.

Be reasonably sure that there is a fire before giving an alarm.

Never give an alarm for a chimney fire unless there is imminent danger of the building catching.

The fire alarm system is under the direction of the Chief Engineer.

### FIRE PREVENTION.

1. Do not build a fire in an open fireplace and go away and leave it, or use an open fireplace without a substantial fine mesh spark screen.

2. Do not use a stove unless it has proper brick or metal protection underneath.

3. Do not destroy or injure insulation by hanging electric light cords on nails or hooks.

4. Do not leave lighted kerosene lamps near inflammable materials, or under shelves.

5. Do not use matches except safety matches.

6. Do not allow children to have matches, much less play with them.

7 Do not throw burnt matches on the floor or into waste baskets, and never throw away a burnt match until you are absolutely sure it holds no spark. 8. Do not hang clothes in contact with or very near hot stoves or stove pipes.

9. Do not go into closets with lighted matches or candles. If necessary to have a light, keep an electric torch for such purposes.

10. Do not decorate a Christmas tree with paper, cotton, or any other inflammable material. Use metallic tinsel and other non-inflammable decorations only. Use asbestos fiber to represent snow instead of cotton.

11. Do not permit children to light or extinguish the candles. They are liable to set fire to their clothing or the tree. Be sure that the tree is securely set so that children in reaching for things cannot tip it over.

12. Do not allow Christmas trees to remain inside buildings after the holidays. The tree itself ignites readily when the needles become dry. A large number of fires usually occur in January from this cause.

13. Do not thaw frozen or water pipes by applying a torch or open flame of any kind. Wrap loosely with cotton cloths and pour on hot water, or send for a plumber.

14. If the smell of gas is strong in a room, first open all doors and windows, and then seek the leak. Never stop a leaking pipe or fixture with wax, putty, adhesive tape, cork or wooden plug or other makeshift, except as an emergency stop pending permanent repairs. Send for a plumber. If light is not needed elsewhere in the house, it would be safer to cut off the supply at the meter.

.15. Never make a light in a gas filled room, and never seek a leak with a naked flame of any kind when gas is escaping freely; if a light is necessary use a hand electric torch. Breathe gas very cautiously, it is dangerous to life.

16. If there are rubber connections to gas appliances, substitute solid metal pipes where possible; in other cases see that the rubber tubing is in first class condition.

17. If electricity is used inspect the wiring carefully wherever exposed. If you find the insulation ragged anywhere, or if you have doubt whether the wiring is in safe condition,

call an electrician and have it put in condition so he can approve it. Do not take the chance of having a fire give you the first warning that electrical hazards exist.

18. Do not pile soft coal against a furnace wall or near it. Soft coal is liable to spontaneous ignition, and heat increases the hazard. Always keep soft coal piles shallow as possible; better not to exceed 3 or 4 feet high.

19. Do not bank houses in winter with leaves, straw, or other readily inflammable material, unless entirely covered with earth; a chimney spark or a carelessly thrown match or cigarette may ignite it.

20. If your house has a shingle roof, and sparks are falling anywhere in its vicinity from some fire however distant, proceed immediately to wet the whole roof. Wind is very freakish, and might change in an instant and flood the roof with sparks. After wetting it, stand by with a hose, fire extinguisher, or even a pail of water and a dipper to extinguish any coals that may fall upon it.

Wooden houses have been saved from a nearby fire by nailing carpets or blankets on the exposed side from the eaves downward and keeping them wet.

21. Do not depend upon your landlord to protect you; inspect your home yourself from cellar to garret, and insist that things which are unsafe be made safe.

22. If you do not feel competent yourself to make structural inspections indicated in this section or elsewhere in this pamphlet, ask the Chief of the fire Department to send you a man, provided you are within the jurisdiction of such an organization; otherwise select a competent builder, and give him a copy of this pamphlet for his guidance.

23. Remember above all other things that Carelessness is your worst enemy as regards safety from fire.

# **REPORT OF TREE WARDEN**

To His Honor, Mayor and City Council:

During the past year several permits have been granted to abbuting owners for the removal of decayed trees in front of their homes.

Several Maple and Elm trees have been treated and the large cavities filled with cement.

We have removed a number of loads of dead limbs. There are approximately eight hundred trees on the various streets that should be pruned and treated this year. I would also recommend that where trees are removed they should be replaced by young Maple trees.

# **REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR**

I have the honor to submit my report as City Solicitor of Laconia for the year last past. During the year the City has been quite free from any new litigation. The two equity suits of the Laconia National Bank and First Unitarian Church against the City in relation to the establishing of the street line in front of the property of the plaintiffs on Bank Square were tried at great length before the County Commissioners. The award of the City was raised to \$2.50 a square foot for the land taken in front of the Church and the Bank building. The question of the line is still in dispute and an appeal has been taken which will be tried later. The case of Houle Vs. City of Laconia asking for land damage still stands continued. During the year last past, I have also attended to the various legal services demanded by the City and have furnished legal opinions to the various City Departments and have prepared all necessary legal papers in relation to the same. All matters which have been submitted to the Law Department have received careful consideration and attention.

# MUNICIPAL COURT

# **REPORT OF CLERK**

Fo the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my eighth annual report as Clerk of the Municipal Court of Laconia.

The criminal cases brought before the Court and the disposal of the same are shown in detail by the report of the City Marshal. The cash receipts of the Court and the disposition of same, summarize as follows:

Some repairs will have to be made on the isolation hospital if the buildings are to be kept standing, underpinning, piazza, posts, floor, paint, etc. The buildings have more than paid for themselves during our small pox epidemic, and grade taken from the lot. I am informed by our city engineer. Mr. French, has saved the city a considerable amount of money, and there is a big lot left, which is of easy accessibility for future use. As there is no likelihood of having a new guarantine building, the local board of health would recommend putting into good condition the present building. This would mean city water, electric lights, two bathrooms, septic tank, and the buildings repaired outside and painted. With our beds and bedding, stoves and utensils already there and in good condition, we should have a very respectable hospital. Although Laconia has been fortunate in not having an epidemic, it will be sure to come some time.

# LACONIA PUBLIC LIBRARY

# **REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES**

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

The undersigned, trustees of the Laconia Public Library, herewith transmit to you the annual report of Arthur W. Dinsmoor, Treasurer; showing the financial condition of the library for the year ending February 15, 1923.

The trustees, having been favored with an appropriation of Six Thousand Dollars for the year just ended, an increase of Two Thousand Dollars over the prior year, have been able to accomplish much to preserve the beautiful library building which our city is so fortunate to possess by reason of the generosity of the late Major Gale, and to augment the service of the library to the public.

The advent of the year 1922 found the library years behind the times in the matter of new and up-to-date books, especially as to late works of fiction. With the added funds available the committee of the trustees chosen and empowered to purchase books, have added to the stacks approximately Three Hundred new books during the year, the larger number being late fiction, but including also a considerable number of juvenile books, in which the library was also sadly deficient. A recent addition in the form of a series of illustrated books for very young children, something which the library has not heretofore possessed, have proved very popular with the little ones.

The opening of the year also found several years' accumulation of books, largely of popular fiction, out of circulation because of need of rebinding. During the year nine hundred and thirty-three of such books have been rebound, placed in circulation, and eagerly received by the patrons of the library. Also fifty volumes of magazines have been bound. There still remain approximately four hundred volumes which need to be rebound, being in consequence out of circulation. It will therefore be seen that the books available for circulation in the library during the past year have been increased to the extent of over twelve hundred volumes. The necessity of buying new books in comparatively large lots made it impracticable for the book committee to give the examination prior to purchasing, which under different circumstances would have been possible, the committee realizing that the patrons of the library were entitled to an addition of new and up-to date books with as much expedition as possible.

The purchasing committee have adopted the practice of purchasing new books in reinforced publishers' bindings, as a matter of economy, and in the interest of durability and a continued uninterrupted use of the books after their purchase. The expense of reinforcement is but a small addition to the cost of the book, and will obviate the expense of rebinding, the book so treated being available for constant circulation until worn out. Books purchased in publishers' bindings without reinforcement average to need rebinding in six months or less, taking the book from circulation when it is new and when its use is most valuable, to say nothing of the expenses of rebinding.

In addition to new books several new periodicals have been added to the reading room, also works of reference and technical books.

After twenty years' use with but slight attention in connection with its interior, the library building was in need of refinishing and redecorating, and this was one of the principal matters considered by the trustees in requesting an addition to the annual appropriation.

During the past year all of the interior on the first floor, with the exception of the librarian's office, has been thoroughly and completely refinished and redecorated, including the tables and chairs in the reading and reference rooms, and also including the stairway near the entrance and the small hall at the rear of the same. This work was done by contract and by local workmen, at a cost of approximately Six Hundred and Eighty Dollars; the second floor should be given the same treatment the coming year.

Since the library building has been in use it has been impossible in cold weather to properly heat the librarian's office without carrying a pressure of from 12 to 15 pounds of steam on the heating boiler, while experts agreed that it never ought to be necessary to carry more than from 3 to 5 pounds pressure to heat all parts of the building with the heating plant functioning properly. After consulting local experts as to a remedy the trustees installed last fall an auxiliary radiator in the librarian's office, at an expense of \$57.50, and during the past severe winter 5 pounds steam pressure has proved sufficient to heat all parts of the building at all times. It is evident that this improvement will cause a large saving in the fuel bill as time goes on.

Among the other items in the nature of additions, repairs and improvements made in connection with the library during the year are: the purchase of a power lawn mower and the construction of a house for the same; two large new rugs added to the entrance hall; six new book-cases for storage in the basement; the overhauling and repairing of the automatic damper control connected with the heating plant; the re-fastening of the copper ridge coverings on the roof, and repairs to the top of the chimney serving the heating plant.

For the general expenses of the library during the coming year, the re-finishing of the upper floor, the re-binding of books, and the purchase of new books, we respectfully urge that the sum appropriated for the year 1923 be not less than \$5,500.

The trustees wish to express their tribute of appreciation of the long and faithful service of the late Assistant Librarian, Miss Julia S. Busiel, whose death occurred December 11th, 1922, after some thirty years' connection with the library.

Miss Hazel J. Clark, for several years employed in the library, has been appointed assistant librarian to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Miss Busiel. WILLIAM F. KNIGHT, CHARLES L. PULSIFER, FRANK P. WEBSTER, STANTON OWEN, FREDERICK W. FOWLER, JOHN S. GILMAN, ARTHUR W. DINSMOOR.

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## **REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN**

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Laconia Public Library:

#### Gentlemen:---

My sixteenth annual report, covering the work of the library for 1918, was my last full report. It had become increasingly difficult to compile the statistics in addition to the routine work devolving upon me in the winter months. As the bookstack was crowded, it became necessary to send books to the basement to make room for new additions. New cases for the basement were provided only as the need became imperative. Therefore the books stored there could not be arranged in logical order except by frequent rearrangement, which the librarian could not find time to plan or his assistants to effect. More and more time was required to find anything in the basement.

The calls from High School students for assistance became more numerous and more exacting and the assistants at the loan desk found less and less time to devote to reference work because more time was required to find books to satisfy the demands of borrowers. More and more of the librarian's time was used in assisting high school students. It had become the custom to order new books the last of the year or in January to use the balance of the appropriation. Those books must be selected, ordered, checked on the bills and made ready for circulation so far as possible at just the busiest season of the year. The librarian explained the situation to Mr. Ashman and understood that it was more important to keep up the current work than to prepare a full report to the neglect of the needs of patrons.

You have greatly relieved the burden resting upon the librarian, by assuming the task of selecting and buying new books and by providing for the maintenance of decorum in the building. The librarian had steadily fallen behind with his own work, but in 1922 the tide turned and he began to gain slowly. However, the relief was largely offset last year by unusual hindrances. The confusion in the basement has grown rapidly. The janitor has not been able to give as much assistance there as hitherto, owing to the severe illness of his wife and his own sickness. The refinishing and redecorating of the interior of the building was urgently needed and added much to its attractiveness, but the workmen unavoidably added to the difficulty of waiting upon the public and hindered the routine work of the library.

The assistant librarian was absent from the 27th of September until her death on the 11th of December. Miss Clark and Miss Danforth worked extra time and did all they could to keep up the current work, but they could not finish the annual inventory which Miss Busiel had been unable to complete before her illness. After her death Miss Ada Hall was appointed an assistant. She could work only three hours a day in December. Having had no previous experience in a library, she could not make good the loss of Miss Busiel and required considerable instruction and assistance. She became ill and was out a week in February, while the statistics for the report were being compiled. She has learned the work rapidly and will doubtless become a useful assistant in time, but it will be many years before she can be as valuable as Miss Busiel, with her thirtyfive years of experience during the time when the library grew from a few thousand volumes to its present size. Miss Busiel had a remarkable knowledge of the books of the library and even their location on the shelves. Few, if any other, knew as many residents by name as Miss Busiel. She is greatly missed at the library by those associated with her here.

Miss Clark, who has been appointed assistant librarian, has given faithful service for more than six years and knows the library more intimately than anyone else. The patrons of the library find her courteous and obliging and she never spares her own time or strength in serving the interests of the library. The librarian is thankful that he can have an assistant so loval and faithful in Miss Busiel's place. Miss Danforth has attended the summer school of the Public Library Commission at Durham two seasons and shows a desire to learn the technical work of the library as rapidly as possible. If she and Miss Clark had not been eager to work extra time and to come to the library on Sundays and holidays to do the work they could not do on regular library days, the patrons could not have been served satisfactorily after Miss Busiel became ill. They certainly deserve larger salaries than they receive. Mr. Jones, librarian of the Lakeport branch, is another faithful worker. He takes good care of his building beside serving the public from noon until nine o'clock, except while he gets his supper. He frequently works at his desk long after the closing hour. The librarian hopes that you will show your appreciation of his faithful assistants by more adequate recompense in the near future.

Both libraries were greatly improved in their interiors during the year. You do not mention the improvement at the Ossian Wilbur Goss reading rooms in your report as that building is in charge of a separate Board of Trustees, but it seems worthy of record that the interior of that building was refinished and redecorated in the same manner as the Gale memorial library during the year.

The last call for copy for the 1923 report came before the analytical table of gains and losses in books was ready for the printer, but I am appending the statistics of growth for the three years for which no report has been published and the statistics of circulation and registration for the years of 1921 and 1922, completing that record to date.

To the Auditor of the City of Laconia:

We respectfully submit herewith our report for the year ending February 15, 1923.

During the year the trustees have given personal attention to the application of the available income from the many trust funds in their custody toward the care and preservation of the specified burial lots. In numerous instances the principal fund is so small that the annual income is insufficient to properly care for the lot, and in such cases these lots have necessarily been neglected, but for this condition the trustees should not be criticised. There are numerous trust funds of \$50.00 only and, under present conditions, the income from such a fund will not properly care for any lot. The trustees advise persons providing trust funds for the care of cemetery lots to set apart not less than \$100. for the small lot, and as much larger sum as the greater size of the lot and, considering also the larger number of monuments and other things connected therewith, will require. Information along this line can be secured by inquiry from those in charge of the various cemeteries.

New trust funds aggregating \$3750. have come into the hands of the trustees during the past year.

The trustees have been much concerned in connection with their visitations to the various cemeteries in the city by reason of the sadly neglected condition of many graves in connection with which there are no funds available for care and preservation. Round Bay cemetery is especially noticeable in this respect. Some of the oldest residents of this section are buried there, and most of the graves are a tangled mass of briars, fallen headstones and depressions, a sad reminder of the oblivion which comes with the lapse of time. Some benevolentminded person, seeking for an object worthy of their gratuity, might well turn to this sadly neglected spot, and by the expenditure of a little money, become a real public benefactor, serving to preserve some of the earliest history of the section as well.

To avoid some misunderstanding which has arisen in the past the trustees would call attention to the fact that no income is available for application to the care of a lot until the end of the year from its payment to the city.

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# **REPORT OF PARK COMMISSION**

Laconia, N. H., Feb. 19, 1923.

To the Mayor and Council of the City of Laconia:

Again the report of the Park Commission is presented to your honorable body for attention.

An innovation introduced last year proved to be of such practical worth that it would seem desirable to have it become an established custom, and that was the joint meetings of the Park Commission with the Mayor, and the committee on parks and commons from his council; the result of these meetings was a sympathetic understanding as to the aims of each, and a unified action in the development of these aims.

At Leavitt Park the permanent improvements have been continued, consisting as in previous years of clearing, grading and leveling the land; the tennis court on the Elm Street side of the park, has been practically completed, and a base ball ground laid out in the northwest corner of it. Two iron settees, and three baby swings have been added to the park equipment.

Early in the season the Mothers' department of the Lakeport Woman's club held a successful carnival on the grounds, which is in accordance with the policy of the commission, that the park be used for all community gatherings whenever possible.

The season at the playground was a successful one, the director being Mr. Harold S. Fitz of Providence, R. I., who returned for his second season. He was ably assisted by Miss Ida Jones of Lakeport, who brought ability and faithfulness to her first year's work.

The Lakeport playground association was also of much service; a meeting at the opening of the season, at which the director and assistant were present, struck the key note for the ten weeks' session—an understanding as to the needs of each; and a willingness to render and receive advice and service.

At the height of the season a carnival was held, at which the association proved invaluable to the directors; these carnivals are a part of the required work, some of the results of which are more far reaching and important than the financial side of it, which is rather a necessity, as the incidental expenses of the playground are financed in this way, only the salaries of the directors being met by the appropriation from the city.

The average daily attendance the past season was 89; boys 52, girls 37; showing an increase over the previous year of 21 in the daily average.

The recommendations made by the director for the coming season are as follows:

A top dressing of hard pan and suitable nets for the new tennis court.

Repairs on the netting of the old court.

Toilet facilities.

Minor repairs and improvements to the diving raft.

Completion of the ball field.

The land in front of the teeter boards smoothed for a croquet court.

Draining of the land where the swings are located.

More teeter ladders and swings.

An electric light at the north end of the park.

A new flag. The one now in use was the gift of J. Mooney Sanborn in 1915, and has been in constant use.

The director suggests also, that the playground children be given the precedence in the matter of holding a carnival.

The playground at Opechee Park was successfully maintained under the direction of Mr. Everett R. Walker of Providence, R. I., and Miss Shirley Sanborn of Gilford, N. H.

The directors brought to their work energy and enthusiasm

and their efforts were greatly appreciated by the children who daily attended the playground.

The total attendance for the season was 14,604; Boys 7,592; Girls 7,012; Average daily attendance 253; Total number of visitors recorded 1,533. These figures are interesting as they show that a large number of people are daily enjoying the playground.

The annual lawn party was held August ninth and the record attendance again demonstrated the value of Opechee Park as a recreation center for the entire City.

The increased appropriation made by the City Council enabled the Commission to purchase some much needed apparatus. This apparatus included six steel swings, two teeter ladders, one travelling ladder, four kindergarten chair swings, four baby hammocks and one large maple slide.

Mothers who brought their babies and small children to the playground found the hammocks and chairs of great help in caring for the little tots and the continuous use of the other apparatus by the older children proved its value.

Hand work taught during the season included sewing and basketry for the girls and woodwork for the boys. An effort will be made during the coming season to develop this phase of theprogram and greater emphasis will be placed on organized play.

In order that we may continue to develop and improve our playgrounds, we recommend to your honorable body an appropriation of \$1,400.00 for this work. Last season our salary budget amounted to \$800.00 and we expect it will be fully that amount this coming season. The additional \$600.00 is needed in order that we may construct two tennis courts, one for the girls and one for the boys, each with wire back stops, repair the raft and provide other supplies needed during the season.

We hope the results of the united efforts of your Commission so ably assisted by the Mayor and Council in providing the necessary funds to carry out our recommendations will be a source of gratification to the taxpayers.

Under the guidance of the plans provided by Mr. French, the City Engineer, the bathing beach has been improved and a large section of the oval within the race track has been graded and the soil put in piles for future use. Bath-houses have been constructed for both boys and girls under the Grand Stand at much less expense in building and maintenance than could have been provided in a separate building.

Owing to the lateness of the season, it was not deemed advisable to construct the toilet for which an appropriation of \$1,094.00 had been made and following the instructions of your honorable body, this sum was expended in further grading of the grounds.

The Grand Stand has been repaired and made safe for use and all the property in the control of your Commission is in satisfactory shape. It is our intention to construct the building for which an appropriation was made last year as soon as the condition of the weather will permit so that suitable toilet accommodation for Opechee Park may be provided. We would recommend that the barn and out-buildings at Leavitt Park be removed and that the house be used for housing and toilet purposes and that the sum of \$500.00 be appropriated to remodel the same for the use of the children at the Park.

We also recommend that the sum of \$1,000.00 be appropriated to continue the grading at Opechee Park.

We wish to express our appreciation of the efforts of your honorable body to co-operate with the Commission in all matters pertaining to the welfare of our children who more than all others use our parks.




