

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday the tenth day of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

ART. III. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of Highways and Bridges.

ART. IV. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$286.53 for Class 5 Highway Assistance or T. R. A. so-called.

ART. V. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00 for the celebration of Memorial Day.

ART VI. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid on or before a certain date.

ART. VII. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appopriate for fire protection.

ART. VIII. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5.00 for the support of the Sullivan-Grafton County Fire Warden's Association

ART. IX. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of snow fence.

ART. X. To see what action the Town will take on the three items of appropriation suggested by the Tax Commission as follows:

To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the following purposes:

LANCOON TOWN REPORT

(1) to provide for additional fire protection.

(2) to provide watchmen and additional police protection due to the war emergency.

(3) for the use of the Town Health Officer due to the war emergency.

ART. XI. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Blister Rust Control.

ART. XII. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate on the State Plan for Bridge Aid to rebuild the White Iron Bridge, so-called.

ART. XIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22.50 for its share in the publishing of a book in accordance with the plan of the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Region.

ART. XIV. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ART. XV. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

ART. XVI. To allow Accounts.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

The financial report of your Fire Department has so little to do with the actual work of the Department that the Warden feels it expedient to make a written report in addition. The routine expenses of the Department were \$32.61 including the \$10.00 appropriation for the tools. But besides this the Department disbursed \$330.00 divided as follows:

Langdon was lucky to escape the extraordinarily hazardous dry season of 1941 with no fires at all; but what was Langdon's good luck last year, by no means indicates that we are safe from danger in the future. The Marlow Fire cost that Town in excess of \$20,000 and would have meant bankruptcy if it had not been for special legislation that made the State take over all above $\frac{16}{20}$ of 1% of the Town's valuation.

The work of the Langdon crews that worked on these fires was highly spoken of and the men themselves gained valuable and varied experience in fire suppression. Lessons sharply brought out were the value of different methods under different conditions as for instance—back pumps at unexpected water holes, back fires (burning out) in the quiet hours of the day along good roads, the tremendous importance of well cut fire lines and trails in rough country. There were many lessons learned by costly mistakes, the most glaring of which was the fact that an incompetent guide caused the total waste of one good Langdon crew on the third day at Marlow. These men tramped all day long without reaching any fire, altho they were led by a guide who had lived all his life in the neighborhood.

Your Warden supported by the Deputies has been interested in the Fire Warden's Association of both Sullivan and Cheshire Counties. He is President of the former and a delegate from it to the State Fire Warden's Federation. As a member of the legislative committee of the Federation, he has been working in close co-operation with the Forestry Department to obtain legislation regarding forest fires and to assist in formulating policies regarding the forest fire service. These associations are supported by the members and are no expense to the public. It is safe to say that this work has personally cost your Warden in excess of \$200.00 But he believes that the efficiency of the

Forest Fire Service at this point in National Defense is almost of first priority over any other defense effort in this area. The danger of sabotage to say nothing of incendiary bombs seriously threatens our woods. The greatly increased cutting of lumber has rapidly increased the slash areas.

Your Warden believes that one of the greatest needs of the Forest Fire Service is the development of a group of men in each District or County to assist the Warden and the District Chief in the handling of large fires. Rody Andrews and Chief Baker were seriously crippled at Marlow by the lack of a competent staff to scout the fire and transmit their orders. Any assistance you can give your Warden, in winning the decision to establish such staffs throughout the State may save this Town a colossal loss at some future date. It is the best answer to the wasting of man power. Many chances to check the Marlow Fire were lost because no one knew of the threatened points soon enough, and Chief Baker did not have the staff to insure prompt carrying out of his orders.

The Warden wishes to publicly thank the boys and girls who took part in the Junior Ranger Program. He wishes that he had more time to devote to these classes. They showed that they had thoroughly learned the lessons taught them by performing expertly at the Marlow Fire, the boys on the fire line, and the girls in delivering food. The boys won the State Championship and a trip to the White Mountains and the girls should have because they were the only girl Rangers in the State.

The fact that people in town used extreme care in burning brush and rubbish contributed in no small degree to the good fire record we had in 1941. The townspeople also were careful to obtain permits for burning.
