Not only do you have your elected Town Officers working for the good of the town, we have several organizations in the town working voluntarily with one aim and that is to improve the lot of all and in so doing do many things for the benefit of the Town.

Each organization benefits the Town in its own area such as the:

### PARENTS CLUB

The Parents Club provides the children of the town with dental care through the yearly Dental Clinic when needed care is provided to each child, also glasses have been provided to needy children.

The sending of a deserving child to either Girls State or Boys State is also a worthwhile project.

### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lempster, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Union Hall, said Lempster, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, at ten of the clock, in the forenoon, to open the polls for voting for candidates, and at one o'clock in the afternoon for open discussion of articles of Warrant.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing; and to vote on the following question, "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in the Town?"

Article 2. To receive all reports and act thereon.

Article 3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes for the ensuing year;

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to deliver blank inventories at the time they appraise property for taxation.

Article 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 6. To see if the Town will raise the salaries of the Selectmen, Town Clerk and Overseer of the Poor, by \$25.00 each.

Article 7. To see if the Town will pay the Road Agent time and a half for over 40 hours per week for work authorized by Selectmen.

Article 8. To see if the Town desires to appropriate \$300.00 toward paying for new recording system.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Harry Hanson Trust Fund.

Article 10. To see what action the Town will vote to continue the Town Forest Committee and take any necessary action thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$692.55 for T. R. A.; the State will contribute \$4,616.98.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to pay note for construction of Lempster Mountain Road and \$1,000.00 to pay note on Loader.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to keep the Information Booth open from June 24 to Sept. 9, and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to continue and increase the Town History Fund established in 1955.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the Fire Department's annual expenses.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase Liability Insurance for the Town and raise \$250.00 to cover expense thereof.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$550.00 for the Town's share of Social Security for its employees.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$32.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Regional Association.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100.00 for White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$350.00 as interest on notes.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$200.00 to help maintain and support the Newport Hospital.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to give the Long Pond Committee permission to sell the presently leased lots and any future lots on Long Pond, same being in the Town Forest Tract, and have the Selectmen issue a Warranty Deed for same.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to give the Long Pond Committee permission to sell Hunting camp sites on Mountain Road, and Long Pond Road and have the Selectmen issue a Warranty Deed for same.

Article 24. To see what action the Town will take to accept the Long Pond Road as Class V Highway.

Article 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook—yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness—our carelessness. This, we—you—and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations—hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting your's and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you-

- 1. Follow the warden's directions.
- 2. Secure the required burning permit.
- 3. Keep your fires under control.
- 4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
- 5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School District, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

### TEACHING STAFF

Mrs. Leila Thibault resigned at the close of the 1960-61 school year. She felt it necessary for her to remain at home with her family.

Mrs. Hester Morrissey was appointed teacher of grades four, five and six to succeed Mrs. Thibault. Mrs. Morrissey graduated from the State Teachers College in North Adams, Mass., and has also studied at Keene Teachers College. She has had many years of teaching experience, the last ten years in the town of Walpole.

Mr. Roy Balla resigned last June after three years as Principal of the Goshen-Lempster School. He is now employed in the business field. Mr. John Noftle of Keene was appointed to succeed Mr. Balla as Principal and teacher of grades seven and eight.

Mr. Noftle is a graduate of the Eastern Nazarene College in Wollaston, Mass., with a degree awarded in 1953. He has also studied at Northeastern University and Keene Teachers College where he is working for his Master's Degree in Education. Mr. Noftle taught for three years in the Elementary School in Gill, Mass.

Mrs. Doris Newman returned this year to her regular assignment as teacher of the Primary Room. Mrs. Myrtie Starkey has been assigned as teacher of grades two and three.

### **CAFETERIA**

Mrs. Roy Balla has again been in charge of the school cafeteria. The quality of food served and the organization of the lunch period ranks high among the Hot Lunch Programs in Union No. 5. We consider this added service of great benefit to the children. Mrs. Balla should be commended on her fine service in the interest of the school.

All children who have wished to do so, have had an opportunity to take advantage of this school service. Monthly shipments of Government Surplus Foods have helped finance the lunch program, and enabled us to serve meals at a minimum cost to the child.

### MAINTENANCE

Mr. Andrew H. Currier resigned as custodian of the Cooperative

Building. We appreciated very much his interest and conscientious effort in keeping our classrooms clean and comfortable.

Mr. Wesley Witham was appointed janitor to succeed Mr. Currier His work has been most satisfactory and we are pleased with the condition and upkeep of our building.

During the summer vacation, the entire building will be cleaned, as part of our maintenance program. The floors will be waxed and some building improvements are to be considered.

### REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS

The following repairs were made and improvements completed during the past summer by monies voted in our current budget. We wish to list the following:

- 1. The duplicator machine was repaired and thoroughly cleaned.
- A new teacher's desk and chair was purchased for Mrs. Starkey's room.
- Plastic tops were purchased for desk tops which were worn and in need of repair.
- 4. Six new desk and chair units for pupils were purchased.
- 5. The toilet rooms and several of the classrooms were redecorated.
- 6. The exterior of the building was painted one coat, and a second coat is to be added this coming summer vacation.
- 7. A used typewriter was purchased for the use of the teachers.

### ENROLLMENT FOR 1962-1963

It is expected that we will have an entering First Grade class of eleven pupils in September, 1962. Of this number nine are from the town of Goshen and two from Lempster. Our expected enrollment in total for next fall is estimated at one hundred and sixteen pupils.

About forty-three pupils will be attending Newport High School next year, with a probable five pupils attending Claremont at Stevens High School.

Cooperative District for their fine cooperation and support during the school year. I commend our new teachers on their good work this first year in our local school. We will endeavor to continue to provide a program of education of which the townspeople may be proud, and working together we can expect this to be accomplished.

In behalf of the school faculty, I wish to express my heart-felt thanks to the Parents Club, Miss MacIver, the School Board, and Mr. Stickney for their splendid cooperation in making our school life happy and successful.

### SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

In past yearly reports your school nurse has stressed the importance of good physical health in the learning and educational program for all children. In this report I would like to emphasize the importance of good mental health in a child's educational program. Needless to say, the two cannot be separated—either one has a great effect on the other. For instance, the child with a severe vision handicap may have an emotional problem directly related to the physical problem. On the other hand, emotional problems may sometimes show themselves in physical symptons.

First of all, we should acquaint ourselves with the indications of a well adjusted child and/or good mental health. There is evidence of good mental health when the child (1) Seems happy most of the time, (2) Contributes freely in a classroom discussion, (3) Is not unduly shy, (4) Enjoys playing with other children and being a part of a group, (5) Is achieving in his studies according to his ability, (6) Attends school regularly, (7) Does not seem too often fatigued, (8) Does not day dream excessively, (9) Uses adequate self-control according to his age, (10) Is able to make and maintain friends, (11) Is interested in new experiences, (12) Does not show a pattern of stuttering or of infantile speech, (13) Does not show excessive nervous mannerisms.

If it is felt that the child needs assistance, we do have available resources within the State of New Hampshire. Perhaps the best known of these is the New Hampshire Child Guidance Clinic which functions out of Concord. In addition to the services in Concord a group from this Clinic comes to Keene once a month. At these Clinics the child is given various tests by a psychologist in order to determine the child's learning potential as well as behaviour patterns. The child is also seen by a psychiatrist who may do further tests with the child. The parents of the child discuss the child and his problems with the social worker—later a conference is held and the findings of these clinic members are discussed and evaluated. At a later date the parents have the opportunity to discuss the findings of the clinic with the persons mentioned above and to make plans beneficial to the child.

In the Claremont area a Child Guidance Clinic is made available by the Claremont Mental Health Association. This clinic is served by a Psychiatric Social Worker and a psychologist from the Hitchcock Clinic in Hanover. This clinic is available to our Supervisory Union. There is no charge for the services of the above mentioned clinics. On a private basis there is the Hitchcock Clinic in Hanover which offers a very fine service. It is extremely important for one or both parents of the child to attend with the child.

During the course of a school year several of our children attend these clinics. We feel that a great deal of benefit has been derived from the use of these services. The school and the home have a much better understanding of the child and his problems; the recommendations made through these clinics enable the parents, as well as the school, to really help the child. The children attending seem to enjoy the experience and cooperate well.

Once again I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your support of our Health Program.

### SCHOOL WARRANT

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Goshen-Lempster School District qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School in Lempster on the third day of March, 1962, at 12:00 Noon, to act upon Articles 1 and 2; the meeting to be recessed and opened again at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the remaining articles in the Warrant (Articles 3 through 10):

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose one member of the School Board for the ensuing five years.
- 3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization and building funds, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 7. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and other receipts from miscellaneous sources, in addition to the original appropriation for 1962-1963, for the school lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.
- 8. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may

now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or state agencies.

- 9. To see if the School District will vote to authorize the School Board to execute a Quitclaim Deed in the name of the District of the Goshen Center School, and deliver the same to the owner of record of the premises, in order to clear the title to the same, as said premises were previously sold, and without requiring anything further in payment; this deed to pass any interest which the Distirct may have in the premises.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
