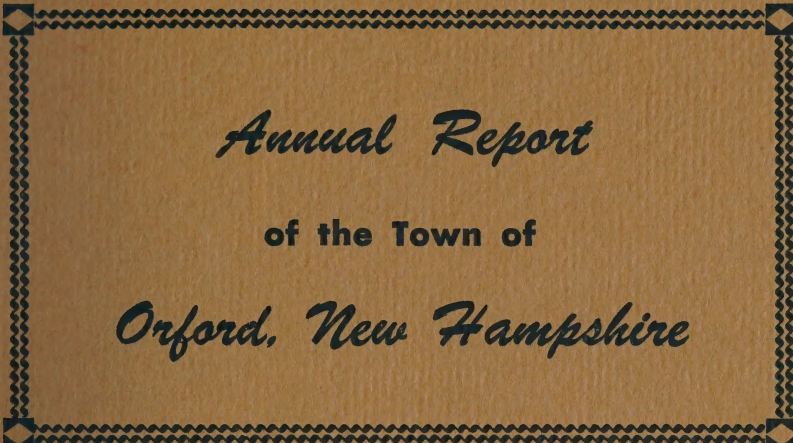

## TOWN WARRANT

### State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year; also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds and one Library Trustee for three years.

Article 2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads for the ensuing year.

Article 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.

Article 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.

Article 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed or otherwise.

## TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Dartmouth - Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the State aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$562.62 for that purpose.

Article 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.

Article 15. To see if the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relating to playing games of Beano shall be adopted in this Town.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.

Article 17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust and \$150.00 for care of trees.

Article 19. To see what action the Town will take in regard to road equipment and how much money it will vote to raise and appropriate for same.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to be paid over to the Federal Airport Project.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds to be used to buy road equipment.

Article 22. A. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law.

B. To see if the Town will vote to have members of the present Budget Committee become the members-at-large on the Budget Committee under the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law; their terms of office, from one to three years, to be arranged among themselves; and hence forth will elect members-at-large by ballot or acclamation at the annual Town meeting, maintaining the membership at six.

## TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to increase the length of the Road Agent's term of office from one to three years and otherwise reorganize the Road Department in respect to wages, inventory of equipment, etc.

Article 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen (1) to execute an option agreement with the Post Office Department for the conveyance by the Town to the Department or its assignee of a portion of Town land west of the street opposite the Common, (2) to convey such tract to the Post Office Department or its assignee, and (3), in event a building for use as a post office is constructed on such tract, to provide for filling and surfacing a strip of land between the present road and such lot; to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for such purpose; and to see what other action the Town will take relating to land for a post office.

Article 25. To see what action the Town will take to improve library services and facilities in Orford and to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for such purposes and to improve, repair, alter or extend the library - Town office building.

Article 26. To see if the Town will appoint a Zoning Commission to make a report to the next town meeting, containing recommendations as to whether zoning should be adopted in Orford, boundaries of any suggested district or districts, and proposed regulations for adoption by the Town; to see what other action the Town will take relating to Planning and Zoning; and to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for such purposes.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to preserve the priceless heritage, received from past generations, of the Mall and Common on both sides of Orford Street; and, if it is felt necessary, to raise and appropriate a sum of money to survey and mark the boundaries of these areas which are so important in maintaining the beauty of Orford.

Article 28. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note:

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple:

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles — use you ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home. Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

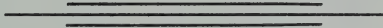

## SCHOOL DISTRICT WARRANT

### State of New Hampshire

**Grafton, S. S.**

**School District of Orford**

To the inhabitants of the School District of Orford qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Memorial Hall in said District, on Wednesday, March 16, 1960, at 8:00 P. M., to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for three years, and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1959-1960, a sum of money to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1960, in order to meet obligations due primarily to unanticipated costs for repairs, supervisory travel, added cost for electricity and the addition of Workmen's Compensation Insurance, and, also, to make up the deficit due to receipt of less tuition than was anticipated.

**SCHOOL DISTRICT WARRANT — (Continued)**

Article 10. To see if the District will raise and appropriate Seven Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$720.00) in order for the District to avail itself during 1960-61 of federal funds to be distributed under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864, and to authorize the School Board to make application for, to accept on behalf of the District, and to apply against this appropriation any or all grants or other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for making alterations in the Street School and the Orfordville School in order to reduce fire and other hazards.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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### ORFORD ANNUAL SCHOOL REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I present herein my report for 1959, my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford. In preparing the report I have used much of the material from the report of Mr. Paul Wenners, Principal, to me.

#### School Building

The new school building is proving to be of great value to the school program and also to community activities. The seventh and eighth grades have been moved to the new building, thus freeing a room for high school use. The same can be said for the cafeteria. The new kitchen and the tables set up in the gymnasium provide an efficient and pleasant place for the lunch program.

Memorial Hall is now in use fifteen periods a week for much needed and valuable Physical Education classes. Also, it is, of course, used for organized games and athletics. An additional valuable use is shown in the following quotation from Mr. Wenners' report:



"Memorial Hall is also being used for a new assembly program. Many programs are being presented by the students, who plan and carry them out. In this way they learn to cooperate, to plan, to overcome obstacles, to gain confidence before an audience, to speak with clarity and poise. Other programs, presenting speakers with experience in many areas, and including skilled musicians, artists, entertainers, and successful professional and business people, will be presented during the year to broaden the interests of the students."

The high school program and the housing of students has been further materially improved by alterations within the old building. Rooms one and two, formerly the science and home economics rooms, have been united to provide a more adequate science laboratory, and through the aid of funds from the National Defense Education Act, four good science tables have been installed. Room nine has become the new home economic laboratory, and is provided with one of the two new kitchens that is planned. Space for a second kitchen unit is available when needed. Room five, a small room, has become the School Library. Room three has been divided into two rooms, numbered rooms two and three.

There is urgent need for an adequate teachers' room and better toilet facilities for the students. At present, the teachers have only a small toilet room located under the front stairway. A room of larger size with separate toilet facilities for men and women is needed. This room would also provide needed space for conferences and for caring for ill or injured students. I hope that funds may be made available in the very near future for the small amount of alteration necessary to provide such a room.

### **Curriculum**

The following are quotations from Mr. Wenners' report to me:

"The placing of grades seven and eight in the new classroom in Memorial Hall not only made possible the enlarged Science and Home Economics Departments in the high school, but also gave these grades a learning area away from the larger and older students whose interests are apt to be much different from and too mature for pupils of these age groups. It is, however, planned to organize a six-year high school for 1960-61 in order to bring pupils of grades seven and eight

into the high school for specialized instruction in some subjects, especially those requiring expensive and not fully utilized equipment, including science, mathematics, and foreign languages, as has been done already in shop and home economics; in the latter two subjects, grades seven and eight pupils are this year receiving instruction two periods a week instead of the one formerly available.

"In the high school, separate English classes are now conducted, in all four grades, for college preparatory and general students, permitting the giving to each group of greater individual attention to specific needs, as for advanced work in literature and composition, — or for corrective spelling, punctuation, and grammar, and reading for comprehension of material necessary in their expected employment. Similarly, separate classes are held in the field of mathematics. Commercial students may study business rather than plane geometry, or the more elementary arithmetic of the General Business Course, rather than either algebra or general mathematics, while shop students can go from general mathematics to shop mathematics. Latin has been taken by a small group especially able to benefit from intensive work in the field of language, as a foundation for careers requiring a high degree of familiarity with this important tool of learning. Many general students in the sophomore class are benefiting from the new practical course in Health and General Biology, while the college-bound students are able better to concentrate upon College Preparatory Biology. All freshmen are now required to study general science, and many juniors and seniors have elected the new course in Physical Science, available to those not taking College Physics and College Chemistry. By 1960-61 all students will be studying a four-year sequence in the social sciences: In the freshman year, a course still bearing the old name of Civics, but now including simple psychology that might be titled "Understanding Yourself and Others", as well as a study of occupations to broaden students' knowledge of the requirements and rewards of occupations often unknown to them, and a study of local and state government; in the sophomore year, World History and Geography, as a basis for the work of the junior and senior years — United States History and Problems of Democracy.

"Art and Music groups are enjoying better facilities this year, and are growing in size. The art class meets now in the former kitchen in the basement of the high school, where the sink can be used and the shelving can hold large draw-

ings between classes. The addition of a ceramics kiln is greatly needed before more advanced work in this field can be done. Ceramics and other forms of hand work can become the source of needed income for many families in this area — making articles for sale to the tourist trade and summer vacationists, as is done in Gaspe, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick in Canada, and in both Maine and Vermont. The Glee Club now has the use of Memorial Hall for practice, as does the newly formed class in Art and Music Appreciation. The people of Orford and many nearby towns were pleasantly surprised to hear the Glee Club and many individual students at the first Christmas Pop Concert, held on December 16, and attended by some 175 people. This concert showed that music has a definite place in Orford. With further emphasis on these subjects, art and music, even better Pop Concerts and other musical and artistic events, can be enjoyed by the community of Orford and its cooperating neighbors.

"The newly-organized Guidance Department directs the giving of special tests, the supplying of information on available scholarships and college entrance requirements, the compilation of information about the educational and personal qualifications of students planning to go on to higher education or to seek employment, and counseling students with emotional and other personal problems. Its functions are numerous, and its helpfulness and effectiveness are daily more evident."

### Orfordville

The Orfordville School continues to function effectively and well. The teachers there are doing excellent work in the fundamental preparation of their pupils. They are alert to new ideas that will be helpful.

The classes are overlarge, particularly when there are two grades to a room. As of November 25, 1959, there were 28 pupils in the combination first and second grade, 34 pupils in the combination third and fourth grade and 29 pupils in the combination fifth and sixth. In double grade rooms of that size, no teacher, regardless of how hard she tries, can do the job as she would like to do, either for the group or the individuals. The teachers deserve credit for the effective work they are doing under these conditions. We should begin to give thought and study to the problems that increased enrollment will bring to these classes.

## School Grounds

The acreage acquired at the time that the new building was built will eventually provide excellent recreational fields and also an opportunity for projects such as tree planting and other forms of agriculture and nature work. There is, however, still much to be done in the way of grading, filling, and seeding. Not all of it can be done in one year. I hope, however, that through a community project or some other means, a substantial amount of work can be done in the spring of 1960.

## Salaries

The teachers are the schools. I feel, therefore, that I can not emphasize too often the need for Orford to continue to improve its salaries if it wishes to attract and retain good teachers. I call your attention to the following salary comparison quoted from figures compiled by the State Department of Education:
