

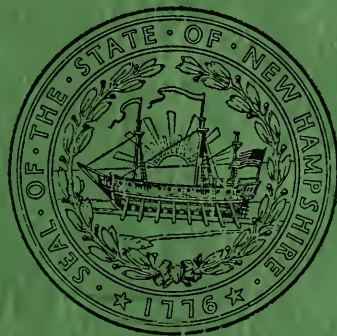

Annual Town Meeting

March 13, 1962

The polls were declared open for voting at 1:00 p.m. The business meeting was opened at 7:30 p.m. The warrant was read by the Moderator, Dana Parks, Jr. Invocation by Rev. Robert Swanson.

Articles 1 and 3: Already being acted upon by balloting.

Article 2, 4 and 5: (Budget items) It was voted in the affirmative that these articles be laid on the table for later discussion.

Article 6: A motion was made and seconded and voted in the affirmative to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow \$30,000.00 on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7: Voted in the affirmative to hear reports of agents, auditors and officers heretofore chosen.

Article 8: It was voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of White Pine Blister Rust (Estimate \$150.00).

Article 9: It was voted in the affirmative for the Town to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. (Estimate \$200.00).

Article 10: It was voted in the affirmative that the Town raise and appropriate a sum of \$150.00 for the Franklin Hospital.

Article 11: It was voted in the affirmative that the Town use \$2,500.00 of the Capital Reserve Fund interest for road maintenance in the flood control basin.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have the Town reassessed and raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,500.00 to cover the expenses.

It was voted by voice vote in the affirmative to pass over this article.

The voice vote was challenged. The legal voters were then polled to determine how many were in favor of passing over this article: Yes — 56; No — 6.

Article 13. A motion was made, seconded and voted in the affirmative, that the Selectmen be authorized to sell the old town truck.

Article 14: To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to withdraw a sum of \$5,000.00 from the accumulated interest of Capital Reserve Fund to reenforce South Road and Pingree bridges.

A motion was made and seconded and it was voted in the affirmative that this article be accepted as printed.

Article 15: To see what action the Town wishes to take as to where the TRA money is spent, and to enforce same. (By petition)

A motion was made and seconded that the selectmen be instructed to sign up TRA money so as to expend only the amount necessary to seal what was tarred last year on the Whittemore Road; the remainder of the TRA money will be signed up to be expended starting at Route 4 and will continue down the Mill Road and will be so constructed each year until it ends at Donald Prince's place.

In favor of the motion: Yes — 29; No — 26.

Article 16: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

A motion was made and seconded that the Moderator appoint a new Zoning Committee to make further studies and hold a public hearing prior to February next in order that an article could be put in the Town Warrant. An amendment was made to the preceding motion that the three member committee of last year — Max Parris, Frederick Adams, and Milton Humphrey — be increased to a five member committee.

This motion was voted in the affirmative.

George Bork and Ray Prince, Jr. were appointed at the meeting and each accepted the appointment.

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

A motion was made and seconded that the town budget be accepted as printed with the addition of \$200.00 for the State Tax Commission Audit and \$500.00 additional for Winter Maintenance, with the stipulation that the town's share of the TRA money cannot be expended (\$691.91) unless the selectmen follow the voting of the town meeting and sign up the TRA funds as voted in Article 15. Also that a copy of this article and article 15 be sent to Mr. Avery of the State Highway Dept. and Mr. Brown, Division 5, of the State Highway Dept. in Lebanon.

In favor of the motion: Yes — 35; No — 16.

Article 2: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same. Voted in the affirmative to accept this article as printed.

Article 5: To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Budget. Voted in the affirmative to accept this article as printed.

It was voted in the affirmative that the polls be closed and the meeting adjourned at 10:15 p.m.

The following elected officers were sworn in at the meeting: Max F. Parris, Charles C. Taylor, Arthur Schaefer, and Ruth H. Benedict.

11. To see if the Town will vote to use \$2,500.00 of the Capital Reserve Fund interest for road maintenance in the flood control basin.

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of the zoning committee, or do anything in relation thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salaries of Town Officers as follows:

- Selectmen — from \$200.00 to \$300.00
- Town Clerk — from \$125.00 to \$187.50
- Collector — from \$175.00 to \$262.50
- Treasurer — from \$125.00 to \$187.50

During the year one new two inch nozzle and five new hats were purchased with the hope of adding a few hats each year.

There has been excellent response of men at the meetings and fires and the officers appreciate the interest the men of town have shown.

The department is appreciative to all who have contributed to the organization and especially to the ladies who have contributed and seen that coffee and food have been supplies to the men while at fires.
